## BURNING PERMITS NEEDED

### Boat Race For May Day

Although there are still many details to be ironed out, preliminary plans are shaping up for May Day, at Ganges on Saturday, May 16.

The general pattern will follow that of previous years, at Fulford. Salt Spring Rotarians will bring a midway to the island and Lions directors have generally supported the project.

At Fulford on the May Day evening there will be a dance in the Fulford Hall. Mrs. R. Reeves reported that the committee will sponsor the dance and commented that the Fulford Hall has consistently attracted a large attendance of youngsters at its dances. She was expressing surprise at a recent comment from an adult that dances are no longer popular among youngsters.

Steve Nelson, at Ganges Boat Yard, is sponsoring the water sports during the morning. Big event will be the power boat race. The Five-Minutes-Out is open to all power boats irrespective of size. Requirement is that the boat run out, away from the starting point at full throttle. When the five-

minute signal is given each boat must race back to the starting point.

If a boat returns in less than five minutes and a few seconds he will be disqualified on the grounds that he was not going out at full throttle. Every power boat is eligible and each stands an equal chance.

Race will be staged in the morning and the time will be announced later.

## NEW REGULATIONS

### BUILDING CONTROLS

— NO INSPECTIONS YET

Although the standard of building among the islands is now established in accordance with the National Code, permits are not yet required.

Building regulations are now in force among the islands. They have been in force since last November, although few residents of the district were aware of that fact.

All building must conform with the National Building Code.

Although the regulations are in force, permits will not be required until a building inspector has been appointed for the islands. The regulation will affect no new structures or alterations provided that all work is in accordance with the National Building Code.

Regulations have been in force here since November 1, 1969.

When the minister of municipal affairs last year applied a control on minimum lot sizes, he also instituted a system of building control. Few in the province were aware of the application. The ministerial decision overrides regional legislation and was effective from last November. Recent action by the Regional district merely confirms the minister's action.

Majority of building among the islands has conformed, largely, to the National Building Code for several years. The code specifies minimum standards of stressed materials and seeks to avoid qualities and standards of housing below those generally acceptable.

Regulations are not retro-active. The homeowner making alterations may undertake any

new construction he pleases. The existing building is not required to conform to the national code but any new work must meet its specifications. By this means a new room on an old building would be constructed according to the code, although the rest of the house did not conform.

## AT MAYNE ISLAND

### One Change in Water Board

First annual meeting of the recently incorporated Campbell-Bennett Bay Improvement District was held in the Community Hall, Mayne Island, attended by about 50 of the approximately 150 property owners in the two bay areas.

The new Improvement District was formed under Letters Patent by Order-In-Council under Section 53 of the Water Act on March 7, 1969. Jurisdiction over the waterworks system be-

came effective in March of this year, following acquisition of the original equipment and a legal easement of the main well.

The Board of Trustees elected at the annual meeting includes Wallace J. Twamley, chairman; Harry F. Redman, Victor Haggart, William Wilks and Les Way. All were re-elected to a second term except Mr. Way who makes his entry into the water picture, replacing retiring trustee Wm. Ferguson.

In his first annual report, Mr. Twamley announced that the new District plans to improve and modernize the waterworks system in stages. A primary undertaking will be the installation of a storage tank in the first phase of the program.

Jack Menzies has been appointed treasurer of the Improvement District. Mr. Redman was named assessor. Assessment notices are being mailed to all property owners this month.

The chairman also reported that a connection fee of \$100 per property will be made.

The annual tax for the first year at least, has been set at \$18. Suggested actual water

charge was given as \$3 per month for the first 400 cubic feet, with water rates rising according to consumption in excess of that figure.

Tribute was paid to a number of property owners who had voluntarily kept the original unorganized water system in operation through the old water users' committee. Special thanks were extended by the chairman to Mrs. Kay Carpenter and H. G. Goodwin, W. McAllister, Hugh Fraser and Victor Haggart.

First meeting of the new Board of Trustees was held at the Redman home and it was decided to give priority attention to the storage tank requirement in consultation with the Water Controller's engineering department.

Official tests of the water from the system are also being requested of the government's health inspection department.

Building regulations do not control sanitation, although in many parts of the province the building inspector maintains inspections of plumbing and sewage systems.

Electrical inspections are completely outside the range of building controls. An independent inspection service is maintained by the provincial government in respect of electrical installations.

Building inspection department for all the Capital Regional District is located at Goldstream Ave., in Colwood. It is in Victoria at the southern end of the Malahat Drive.

It would not be fair to charge for a building permit and to provide no inspection service, commented Bill Gerry, in charge of the inspection services in the regional district. There will be clear and ample warning given, he added, as soon as an appointment has been made and permits are required.

Salt Spring Island Community Planning Advisory committee has received a report on By-Law 43, which establishes the building code for the island. This matter was referred to its Code sub-committee, chaired by A. Pike. It also adopted a resolution to be forwarded to the Regional District requesting that final proclamation of the by-law be held up pending a study of the proposed code by the local community.

After study, the code sub-committee recommended that barns and accessory farm buildings be exempted from the by-law for farms over five acres and where the building was fifty feet or more from the property line. In addition, it recommended that the building inspector be a resident in order to not delay the normal processes of construction and the obtaining of permits.

The recommendations of the sub-committee were unanimously approved by the full Community Planning Committee and were sent on to the District Board.

## BLOODSUCKERS?

Hard times brought hunger and despair and tragedy. Affluent times bring plenty and dispute and strife.

Present wave of strikes and labour disputes will continue apparently until such time as the veriest fool can see that there is no more money to be shared out and demands are curtailed.

At no time in the past have demands for increased wages been so widespread or so unrealistic. For the man who wants a bigger piece of pie, there is no possible objection to the majority of current demands. To the man who has always believed he owned the pie, there is no possible reason for these demands.

To the man who has no finger in the pie, who has no manufacturing colossus to safeguard his interests or bargaining colossus to guarantee his security, there is neither reason nor justification.

The pensioner, the small-time operator is caught in the squeeze and factions devoid of conscience are unlikely to afford him very much consideration.

Greed and blackmail are the mainstay of Canadian society today. If we could all enjoy the fruits of either vice we would go along with the vicious circle as do the majority of Canadians. Denied a share in the spoils, we are the more fearful for the future, squeezed dry by militant disputants.

Perhaps there is a future in all this. Perhaps we can face a long and brilliant future punctuated by weekly price and labour wars. It is more likely that we are already sucking the blood of the future economy and that our children will be paying for our indifference.

## TWO OLD HOMES GONE

Recently, in the midst of all the new building and improving two very old Galiano landmarks were dismantled and burned.

Oldtimers remember the time when the Burrill Brothers had the home built, and also when the Bellhouse home was built.

The Bellhouse residence was built in the early 1890's, making it more than 70 years old. Many residents remember the happy times spent there.

It seems that a bachelor named Mr. Worg lived there for a little while, and Mrs. Bernard Stallybrass, eldest member of the Scotty Georgeson clan on Galiano, remembers when her family lived at the light-house on Mayne Island, across the Pass, and they used to row across for a visit and a dance in the spacious living room.

Misses Kitty and Ada Bellhouse lived there following that, and the land now belongs to their great-nephew, Leonard Bellhouse. It is he who had the old house taken down now, to make way for a more modern house.

Mr. Joe Burrill came to Galiano in 1896, buying a large portion of land on which he had a house, and later, a store built. In 1899 his brother, Fred Burrill, came to live there also to help with the store, but mostly to do the cooking. And what wonder-

ful cooking it was, too! Folks were lucky to go and have tea with the Burrills, and enjoy the many varieties of cakes and home-made bread that he baked.

Joe, along with being the efficient storekeeper, was an accomplished pianist, and played his piano for hours every day.

In 1947, the Burrills sold the store, and retired. Fred died in 1950, and Joe in 1956. The land is now owned by their nephew, Geoffrey Finnis, and Mr. and Mrs. Cam Prior.

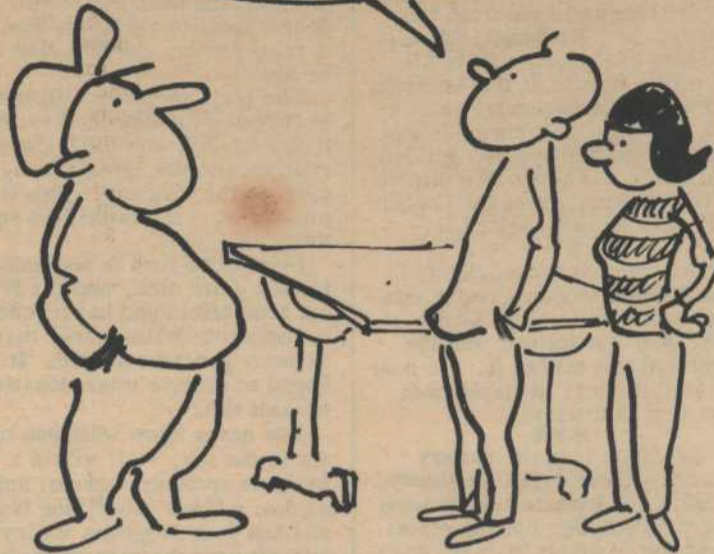

# COMMITTEE AUGMENTED

Salt Spring Island Community Planning Advisory Committee has followed up publication of the questionnaire with its final reorganization.

New members, nominated at its meeting on April 6, attended the first meeting of the enlarged committee, April 23 in the School District Board room. They are R. McWhirter, G. A. Kennedy, R. Toynbee, J. Rozzano, A. Pike and D. Seward. The Chamber of Commerce has appointed Jack Russell to the planning committee for liaison.

Since his appointment to the Advisory Planning Commission of the Regional District, Adrian Wolfe-Milner did not feel that he could continue to serve as chairman of the committee. His resignation was received with regret and he was extended warm appreciation and thanks for his work. He will continue to serve as a member of the committee.

Henry Schubart Jr. was elect-

ed to serve as temporary chairman until the enlarged committee was in full operation.

Sub-committees have been formed to work in special areas of planning effort; subdivisions and land use; local government, services and resources; recreation, parks and cultural activities; transportation and roads; building code, controls, pollution and conservation.

Strong community support for planning, zoning and a building code, shown by the results of the planning questionnaire, has already resulted in prompt action by the Salt Spring Island Community Planning Advisory Committee. At its meeting April 6, the committee unanimously passed a resolution in favor of an interim zoning by-law and recommended that the Advisory Planning Commission forward it to the Capital Region District Board for study and adoption.

This action was prompted by the realization that a final zoning by-law for the island would not be passed until completion of a long-term community plan, and that this might take one or more years to complete. In the meantime, there would be no legal control over the use of

land and therefore no protection against noisy, unsightly and polluting uses, and no control over the height and bulk of buildings.

The committee recommended that the whole island be zoned immediately for one and two-family housing only, with the exception of appropriate areas of Ganges and Fulford Harbor which are already commercially developed, and also excepting buildings for farming and accessory buildings; height of buildings to be limited to two story and twenty-five feet.

The committee realized that this might create hardship under certain circumstances and therefore recommended that a Board of Variance be appointed, as provided in the Municipal Act, to permit other uses where it was considered in the public interest.

Region district director Marc Holmes reports that the resolution has been conveyed to the District and that its recommendation will be forthcoming in about two weeks.

The next meeting of the Community Planning Advisory Committee will be held on Monday,

May 11 at 8 p.m. in the School District Board Room, Ganges.
