What Was Bright Light?

Travellers on the Salt Spring Queen on Monday evening were treated to a lighting display which left them curious.

Mrs. Harry Williamson reported that passengers and crew all examined a brilliant light in the sky above the ferry as it left Swartz Bay on its final trip.

It was not an aircraft, explained Mrs. Williamson because there were no other navigation lights. The light was too brilliant to examine through a telescope and it veered off at sharp angles.

When the ferry docked at Fulford the light was approximately overhead, but there was no clear explanation of it available.

Lady Minto Hospital is no larger than it was a year ago. Plans are still under way for the new expansion authorized by ratepayers two years ago.

Last week the Capital Regional District board learned that the major hold-up had been solved.

The sewage disposal problem at the hospital has been straightened out, the board was told and work is only held up by the B. C. Hospital Insurance Service.

The estimated operating costs of the hospital when enlarged have been prepared and must be examined by the service before construction will be permitted.

Estimates have been with the service for four weeks, but approval has not been given yet.

Meeting attracted about 125 people, majority of whom were members of the association before the meeting started. There were about a half-dozen visitors who were not among the list of members.

Quiet meeting was solely concerned with the election of a board of officers and Chairman Quentin Wilson warned his audience that no other business would be accepted.

Serving with Mr. Sawyer are vice-president, Wayne Pearce; Treasurer, Bram Oudshoorn; recording secretary, Mrs. A. S. Marr; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Dorothy Sneddon.

Ten directors were elected from a slate of 20 candidates. Elected were J. S. Cooper, Reg Taylor, Bob Malcolmson, Mick Jones, Quentin Wilson, Joe Nickerson, Rev. Fred Anderson, Mike Stacey, Wilf Bangert and Don Layard.

Meeting was adjourned for five minutes before the elections in order to permit members to nominate candidates from the floor after ascertaining the

willingness of such candidates to serve.

The Capital Regional District was sympathetic on Wednesday last week, but felt it couldn't do anything to cut the cacophony of acid rock on Pender Island.

Reluctantly, the board will inform Miss E. W. Hoffman, Hooson Road, and neighbor Arthur Freeman that nothing can be done to control the noise of a practicing rock group comprised of drums, cymbals, electric guitars, banjo and amplifiers.

Both Pender Island residents had complained to the RCMP at Ganges but said they had been informed no by law existed to order that volume on a rock band amplifier be turned down.

When it was suggested that the Regional District create such a by law, Mayor Art Young, Esquimalt, said the Board should avoid the move.

When she could, she used to assist in collecting for the Red Cross and various other community projects, and she always took a great interest in all activities. Among her close relations who came to the funeral service were her brother Ken Tahouney of Victoria and Mrs. Mabel Pearson, her sister, of Victoria.

Vernice's people came in the early 1860's with the first Hawaiian colony who ventured into these parts in James Douglas's time. Many of her relations and friends came from far away to attend the funeral.

There is drama high and low among the feathered friends that entertain us with episodes in their daily life around us. On Sunday, high above the fir tree, an eagle, several sea pigeons (or some kind of sea gull, - slim dark, with white-tipped wings) and crows, had a flying, squawking argument amongst the misty clouds.

Several crows seemed to have invaded a nest high in the fir tree and two small birds, probably red-wing blackbirds, because a pair was nesting up there this spring - started the attack, driving the crows away from the nest by the pestering method usually adopted by small birds against their large foes.

They were successful in getting the crows' attention away from the nest and soon the eagle and gulls joined in the scrimmage and for half an hour, the action was fast and noisy; and finally the small birds returned to their post on the fir tree and the crows flew off protesting. (I think they came down to attack our prune tree because I heard their squabbling out at the back orchard). The bald eagle, of course, had retired quietly into the clouds.

Then Monday, these small gulls were busy gobbling something on the beach at low tide, with several of the large gulls when there was a hoarse honk (something like the old Ford car horn) and along came the big gray crane, wings spread wide, beak pointing fiercely ahead like a rapier, and he announced his taking over the territory as he stilted into the shallows.

No one took any notice of him and he spread his wings and stalked towards the smaller birds flapping and squawking. A sea

gull, a big white herring gull, faced him and stood his ground; the small gulls went on gobbling; the crane, plainly nonplussed, folded his wings and pranced stiffly.

The gull went on about his business as did all the other marine birds. Disgusted, the crane took off and tried to oust a fellow crane and last seen, they were flapping away up-harbour, and left the rest of the beach to peace and quiet once more.

Though the winds begin to blow cool and the night closes in earlier each day, the summer is by no means ending. There is still the Indian Summer to look forward to. Though the swallows have left our place, a lone hummingbird still feeds on the flowers, probably a young one not quite prepared to go on the long migration flight. Hope he doesn't miss the sailing-off date.

"They don't let you drive at 93," commented Frank Newnham when he returned to Ganges on Monday.

Fit and active, Mr. Newnham was back on Salt Spring to meet old friends and see his once familiar haunts. He stayed at Harbour House overnight.

For many years Mr. Newnham lived on Mansell Road. He left to live in Sidney about 10 years ago.

A new look over DRIFTWOOD and its plant was a must on the Newnham list. A former printer, the visitor operated a printing plant in Calgary before coming to British Columbia to retire. He was a pioneer of the photo-offset system of printing.

Looking back on a lifetime of printing and promotion, Mr. Newnham enjoys the question which he used to hear so often, "Did you ever know Bob Edwards?"

"Know him," reminisced the nonagenarian, "I used to print his paper!"

When a pleasure craft caught fire recently in Bedwell Harbour it was the quick thinking of a young employee of the Bedwell Harbour Resort that saved the day.

Large cruiser had filled up at the fuel dock when it burst into flame. It was cut adrift to move away from the fuel dock, but a change in wind brought it back towards the fuelling area. It drifted past the pumps and came up against one of the mooring fingers, now well ablaze from end to end.

Nick Lott, employed about the marina during the summer, sped towards the burning vessel in a runabout. He threw a line onto the cruiser and secured it. He then nonchalantly towed the blaze away from the wharf. The tow rope burned out as the vessel was clearing the fuel dock but almost at the same time the burned-out shell sank beneath the surface.

Charolais cattle are all the rage. Two Salt Spring Island cattle breeders invested in Charolais cows last week. Murray White came back from the PNE with Flapper, the champion offspring of grand champion Charolais bull, Boxeur. While Flapper is valued at about \$5,000, with a calf already growing and now in calf again, the sire is valued at an astronomical figure. Boxeur is valued by his owners at \$500,000. That's a lot of bull, weighing in at 2,600 lbs. They have declined an offer of \$350,000. While Murray White plans to breed his new acquisition, Fred Luddington also looked kindly towards the Charolais. It is a breed which puts on weight very quickly. Fred came back to Salt Spring Island, the proud owner of a heifer. Fred Luddington and G.E. Croft are in the deal together. They already

have a Charolais bull and they are planning to concentrate on the French breed. The characteristic of the Charolais is the rate at which it gains weight, explained Murray White.

There appears to be an affinity between Islanders and the Arctic. When an exploration team returned last week from Baffinland, with six Narwhals captured in their native northern waters, two of the party were islanders. Second-in-command of the expedition was Alan Best, curator of the Stanley Park Zoo. Among his companions was Ed Lee, of Galiano. The exploits of the travellers in the Arctic and their capture of five almost legendary marine creatures will be the subject of a lecture at Ganges in the near future. Olive Layard, director of evening classes in the Gulf Islands School District, has arranged an address by Mr. Best as part of her program.

Customs service will be provided at Bedwell Harbour throughout the month of September. Extension of the period has been approved this year in token of the activity there. The port was established at Bedwell Harbour about 10 years ago and the activity has increased almost yearly. The summer customs port was instituted in order to permit foreign vessels coming into the islands to come directly instead of making a detour through Sidney to clear customs.

Bruce Swanson, of Sunset Drive, knows where the big fish are. He doesn't only find them he shows others where they are. Bruce is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R.W. Swanson. He has spent several summers as a guide at Painter's Lodge in Campbell River. Top Swanson fish of the season was a 60 lb. tyee. Anyone beat that?

Only feature of the Gulf Islands exhibit at the PNE which was not mentioned last week was the name of the sponsor. Nita Brown launched the project and worked on it until it was completed. Then she was left out of the report!

Food thieves are abroad on Salt Spring Island. Last week end burglars broke into the club house of the Salt Spring Island Golf and Country Club. They stole food and other commodities besides inflicting damage on the interior of the building.

RCMP at Ganges are investigating the incident.

Earlier break-in at Ganges involved the Ganges Meat Market when thieves, several weeks ago, stole frozen meat from the deep freeze.

Keen water man reports his pleasure in looking into the waters on the west side of Salt Spring Island. Crofton pulp mill was closed for two weeks, he recalled, and he could see through the shallow water at the shore. When the mill is working the sea is too discolored to permit him to see anything, he moaned.

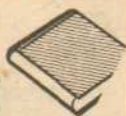

CHECK THAT MAP!

New zoning by-law is now prepared and a copy of the plan for Salt Spring Island is available in three places on the island.

The plan and the by-law explain the permitted use of property on Salt Spring Island. Every property owner must examine them. He must ascertain that the use to which he puts his property is in accordance with the charted use on the map.

If a property owner operates a resort he must make sure that the zoning map says so. If he operates a store, similarly, he must make sure that it shows as such on the map.

If the map does not agree with the use of his land he must file his objection at the public hearing on September 14.

The property owner who fails to protest a discrepancy cannot correct that error after the public hearing.

Every Salt Spring Islander should and must examine the zoning map and check his property. No one else is going to do it for him.

Any error must be reported to the public hearing. And that is all there is to it.

CHAROLAIS IS MORE POPULAR ON SALT SPRING

A recent arrival to Salt Spring Island is "Moormaid Dora", RFC 230409, a Charolais heifer. Dora is the offspring of the famous Belphegor (Bingo) an imported French Charolais bull. "Bingo" is one of the three top test rated Charolais bulls in Canada. The heifer has been bred to Beauregard, another highly rated French bull and will calve in March, 1971.

This fine heifer is the second Charolais brought to the Island by Croft and Luddington this year. In April, Aiglon 1st of Charose Acres, arrived. Aiglon 1st is a son of the famous French bull Aiglon, whose progeny is much sought after both in Canada and the United States.

The two men hope to put Salt Spring Island on the Canadian Charolais map and would be pleased to exchange views with anyone interested in these fine cattle.

The reason that there are no salmon this year is obvious when one hears of the Russian fishing fleet on the west coast of Vancouver Island from people who have seen the way the fish are being scooped up before they even reach our coast.

These boats are bigger than the B.C. government ferries and drag a huge net at a high rate of speed which enables them to catch everything from herring to the largest fish that swims. When the news says the Russians are fishing hake it means they already have cleaned up on everything else.

The picture that explains it all is the one I have from the front page of the Vancouver Sun of July 29. When there are 23 or more Russian trawlers catching this much fish with every tow the amount of their catch is staggering. It shows that unless offshore fishing limits are established at 200 miles the fishing stocks will be wiped out soon.

The commercial fishermen are protesting and the sports fishermen should be protesting also before it is too late. This seems to be the only way to get things done.

Hospital Project

Many steps have been taken towards enlargement of Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital to include a fifteen bed extended-care unit.

Doug. Cavaye, Chairman of the Hospital Board, and Harold Hoffman, administrator, present the following details for the information of Gulf Island residents.

In March, 1969, the minister of health gave approval to plan

a fifteen bed extended-care unit. During the next four months the hospital Board of Management selected Wagg and Hambleton as architects and received B.C. H.I.S. approval. A building committee composed of Board Members, Medical Staff and other key personnel of the hospital met to develop the program and submit it for approval by the Capital Regional Hospital Board and the B. C. Hospital Insurance Service.

In August, 1969, an estimate of costs was forwarded to B. C. H. I. S. and the architect was advised to carry out preliminary work and prepare sketch plans. In October and November the architect presented schematic drawings which required some revision in consultation with B.C. H.I.S. Wagg and Hambleton's preliminary estimate of costs (\$272,040.00) with revised drawings was presented to the Capital Regional Hospital Board in December.

In the early months of 1970, further revisions were required, but in June the B.C.H.I.S. advised that a stage had been reached where a pre-construction and operating budget for the enlarged hospital could be prepared.

association had already gained 274 members. Mr. Oudshoorn stated that the treasury stood at \$211 after current expenses had been met.

Under the new regulations governing tenancy the tenant of a property is considered a taxpayer, the meeting was told, and as a result of this ruling, the association is open to all property owners and tenants of island property.

Less than a dozen members had read the Gulf Islands Study, it proved. Chairman Wilson urged all islanders to read it as a guide to the pattern of planning.

Mr. Wilson also noted that the association of the San Juan Islands with the Gulf Islands in planning had caused some anxiety.

The integration referred to in the Gulf Islands Study is for the purpose of unifying types of pollution control, he explained.

"Pollution knows no political boundaries," explained Mr. Wilson, "and we must have integrated planning between the two island groups."

has approved and presented to the B.C.H.I.S. an estimate for 1970 costs of \$16.75 per patient day. They now await B.C.H.I.S. approval of the estimated operating costs. As one can see, the opinions and approvals of several authorities have to be considered, but Mr. Hoffman, the administrator, anticipates commencement of construction in the early spring of 1971.

In fact, an essential part of the new construction is already under way. Improvements to the sewage disposal facilities were planned by consulting engineers Ker, Priestman, Keenan and Associates Ltd. Four tenders were received and the low tender by Scarff Equipment Ltd., Ganges, accepted - \$8,946.40 plus costs of pumps, electrical controls and engineering fees for a total cost of \$12,106.00.

The application for approval of funds was presented to the Capital Regional Hospital District on July 27, and approved July 29, 1970. Then the Minister of Health, the Hon. R.R. Loffmark approved the funds on August 19, 1970.

Finally Dr. Whitbread of the Greater Victoria Metropolitan Board of Health has issued a permit to proceed with construction of the new ground absorption field for septic tank effluent and installation of sewage effluent pumps in the present septic tanks.

That work has begun; our extended-care unit is in sight.

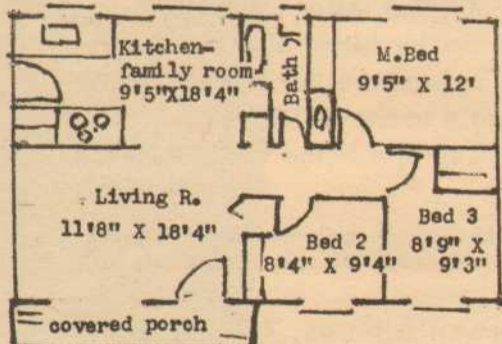
