Appointment Is Welcomed By Islanders Seeking Protection

As minister of fisheries, Vancouver's Jack Davis made a valuable contribution to the safeguarding of the Gulf Islands' future.

It was Mr. Davis' proposal to establish a marine park of the Gulf of Georgia in order to prohibit despoliation of the waters surrounding the islands. The minister took this action at a time when the provincial government had announced, through its minist-

er of mines, Frank Richter, that oil exploration would take precedence over protection of environment.

Last week's announcement of Mr. Davis' new appointment as minister of pollution has been welcomed by islanders.

Every resident of the islands who feels that oil development and industrial expansion would be de-

trimental to the Gulf Islands should write briefly to the minister of pollution, in Ottawa, telling him so. It doesn't even cost a postage stamp to write to Mr. Davis.

The more ambitious might send a copy to Premier Bennett, which does cost six cents. Don't mutter under your breath... Let the minister know how you feel, right now!

LOOP HYDRO FOR ISLANDS

New power service is under way for the islands.

Improved reliability will be provided for most of B. C. Hydro's Gulf Islands customers by a power distribution loop which is now under construction.

When the construction program has been completed, five islands - Salt Spring, Galiano, Mayne, Saturna and North Pender - will be linked by a loop system combining conventional overhead powerlines and submarine cables.

Power will be able to flow either way around the loop. If a circuit break disrupts the supply from one direction, electricity will still be available from the other direction.

This loop system, is being constructed to a 25,000-volt standard which will permit more power to be made available to the Gulf Islands when required.

At present, Salt Spring Island is connected to the Vancouver Island power system by two 25,000-volt submarine circuits. Other submarine circuits link Salt Spring to Galiano, Galiano to Mayne and Mayne to both North Pender and Saturna Islands.

A 16,000-foot-long submarine circuit from Salt Spring Island to North Pender Island was completed last January. The final link in the loop system, a submarine extension from North Pender Island to Saturna, was laid at the beginning of the month across Plumper Sound from Razor Point to Breezy Bay.

Reconstruction of existing overhead lines forming part of the loop is completed on Salt Spring and Saturna, and in progress on North Pender. Final phase of the project will be the conversion of lines on North and South Pender and on Salt Spring to 25,000 volts.

Electrical service to Thetis and Kuper Islands, east of Chemainus, also will be made more reliable with the installation of a new submarine cable link to the Vancouver Island system.

Scheduled to be in service this winter, the new underwater circuit will extend about 16,000 feet from Coffin Point, near Ladysmith, to the west side of Thetis Island, near Camp Columbia.

Thetis and Kuper Islands now receive power via submarine cable from Salt Spring Island.

END OF SUMMER

Last of the high temperatures for 1970 has passed.

Maximum temperature during the month of September was 74 deg. on the 27th, according to the weather report from Dominion observer H.J. Carlin, Ganges Hill.

Low was 43 deg., recorded on the 15th. Precipitation amounted to 1.94 ins. The month experienced more sunshine and less rain than average.

Maximum mean temperature was 64.7 and minimum mean, 38.5 deg.

September was not as dry since 1966. Mr. Carlin has listed figures for the previous four years: September, 1969, 4.58 ins.; 1968, 2.15 ins.; 1967, 2.37 ins.; 1966, 1.46 ins.

GOING AHEAD

RATEPAYERS GROUP

Since their inception in August, the Salt Spring Island Ratepayers' Association has lost no time in processing the organization and clarifying its objectives.

Provincial government recognition and approval of the organization has been given, effective September 11, according to a spokesman of the association.

The executive committee has held three meetings since the election in August. The committee has conducted an active correspondence with the Capital Regional District Planning Department. Correspondence has centred around areas of concern to ratepayers in the currently proposed zoning by-law.

Working in concert with the Island representatives to the Planning Committee, members of the ratepayers' association have attended the recent meeting of the Regional District in Victoria.

The purpose of the association is to act as a sounding-board for the opinions of the majority of ratepayers. This includes all tenants as well as property owners.

It necessarily follows that the more people who take an active interest in the work of this association, the more representative will be their efforts on behalf of all Salt Spring Island residents.

To this end, the public is invited to complete the application for membership in the ratepayers' association which will appear in the next issue of DRIFTWOOD.

PRISON FOR GANGES MAN

One man went to prison for four months and his companion was given a 12 months suspended sentence when they pleaded guilty in Ganges provincial court on Friday to breaking and entering.

Christopher White of Ganges, was sentenced to four months' imprisonment by Judge M. F. Peiler. The judge explained that White was on probation from a previous charge of breaking and entering a dwelling house in Vancouver when he was found in Ganges Pharmacy, in the early hours of September 30. Duane Tatroff was placed on probation.

The judge was taking into consideration the fact that White is young and was very drunk at the time, he noted.

White objected to the term, drunk and asked for the word, inebriated to be used.

"Is that a better word than drunk?" asked the judge.

"I believe so," responded the accused.

The sentence carries the recommendation that White be sent to a forestry camp. Breaking and entering is looked on very seriously by the courts, Judge Peiler told Tatroff. "There was a time on this island," continued the judge, "when nobody thought of locking their doors. During the past five years it has reached the point where everybody locks his door."

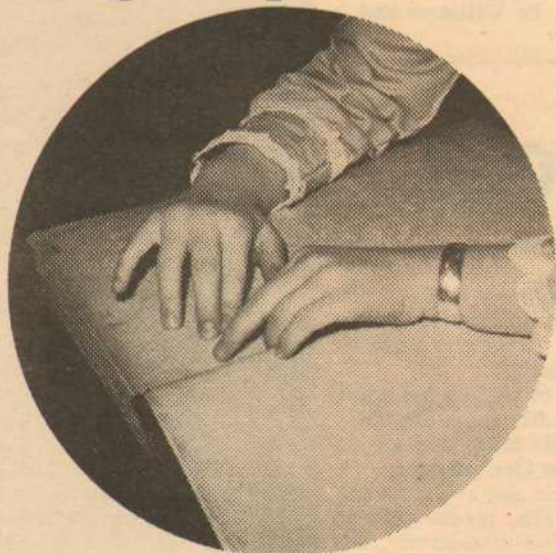

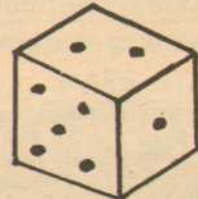
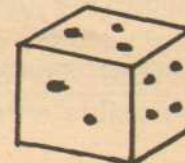

LET'S BE SENSIBLE!

While the world faces an entirely new problem of unrest; while the nation faces the first blow of anarchy, the city of Victoria is concerned about rude words.

The city fathers, in their urban wisdom, took to other cities the plea for special laws to prohibit rude words to police officers.

We have known many police officers in various forces in many communities. We have yet to find a man who was unable to take care of himself under difficult conditions.

The majority of officers have shown themselves more adult than the sponsors of a slightly silly recommendation.

Such piddling projects bode ill for the future. In the face of unprecedented community problems, can the capital city of the west not devote its intelligence to the urgent unrest of the day and postpone its fun and games of administration until the picture has cleared?

It makes a poor example for little communities in the province.

MAN OVERBOARD!

And the man overboard is us!

We have planning. We need planning. But we do not need every petty restriction on living which is important in the larger centres.

The restrictions which are valuable and needed on a city lot cannot have the same significance in the case of a 10-acre lot on the east coast of Saturna Island.

The planning department and the members of the Capital Regional Board might do well to bear in mind the different character of the islands. Majority of islanders are permanent residents in close communication with their neighbors. Variation from the city pattern of living is quite reasonable. On the islands it is illogical to protect a neighbor from the manner of use of a large property hidden from the public gaze.

For many years a man has been able to live in a trailer while he built his house. No longer is it permitted.

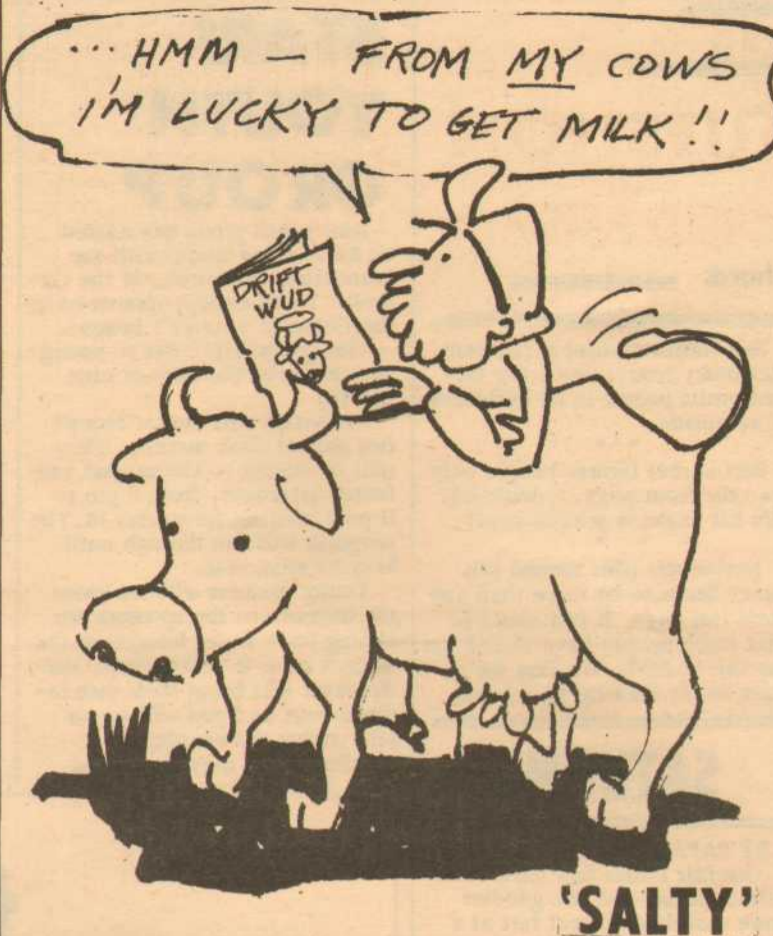
The planners and administrators could well consider the provision of temporary permits to use a holiday trailer while a home is prepared. If such a permit were issued subject to the approval of owners of neighboring property, there could scarcely be a valid objection elsewhere.

Purpose of planning cannot be simply to keep up the values of property. Planning enables the community to live together in harmony while enjoying the greatest possible latitude in the individual use of property. Too many interpret it as the greatest possible restriction on use.

 On TV, recently, the Social Credit Minister of Welfare, Mr. Gaglardi, led us to believe that 30 per cent of the inmates of nursing homes must be accepted at welfare rates, which are below operational costs for these homes.

In the second place, it is not built of "particle board". The outside is covered with Aspenite Chipboard, which most people think of as an attractive finish in a rustic setting. Aspenite is becoming very popular. Many expensive homes on the mainland are using this panelling to some degree.

MAYNE ISLAND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT BY-LAW NO. 12

A BY-LAW FOR THE REGULATING OF THE DISPOSAL OF GARBAGE

The Trustees of Mayne Island Improvement District ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1. No person shall dispose of or dump any garbage or debris along any highway, road, road allowance, lane, beach or foreshore, publicly owned land or park.
2. No person shall dispose of or dump any garbage or refuse on privately owned land without the permission in writing of the owner of said land.
3. No householder or property owner shall allow garbage, debris or refuse to accumulate on his premises in such quantities or in such manner as to constitute a hazard to health if so determined in writing by the local Health Officer, or to create a nuisance to other residents if so determined in writing by the Trustees of the District.
4. No garbage will be collected as a commercial venture in the District without the approval in writing of the Trustees of the District.
5. Every person who disobeys or fails to comply with any provision of this by-law shall be guilty of an offence and be liable, upon summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars and in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.
6. This by-law may be cited as the "Garbage Regulation By-law".

Luckily, the Logans' place has expandable rooms, and their 5 acres, provided parking space for friends who helped George and Addie celebrate their 30th anniversary, September 24, at Port Washington.

Jack Bridge presented the couple with a picture by Ora Symes. Someone had recalled Addie saying, years ago, "I don't want a mirror over the mantelpiece. But some day, I'd like a painting of flowers." So Mrs. Frank Symes did portraits of some of the Logans' pet posies, making their bowl turquoise green, to match sofa and chair covers.

"Ora's painting means more to me than just a picture," Addie says. "It was a lovely evening. I have never had a party like it in my life. I didn't have a thing to do. We enjoyed every moment." So did wellwishers, who agreed it was one of the best parties ever. An extra special guest was Mrs. Evelyn Pollard of The Maples, her first party in about 10 years. Bill Logan, 18, was away at school.

The gathering was instigated by Mrs. A.E. Craddock and Mrs. Randi Odden, "in recognition of service by the Logans to the Penders, for the past 30 years."

"When there is trouble, or illness," someone said, "Addie is the first one there. She inherits her mother's generosity. Mrs. Amies was known for her kindness. Nobody could spend a night at the Amies' without leaving with a pat of butter, or a few eggs."

Mrs. Annie Amies and Mrs. Annie Symes were great friends. Bob, Alex, Jack, Addie and Morris Amies, went to school with Frank, Elah, and Kay Symes, and played on the Otter Bay beach. While Capt. Amies was at sea, Mrs. Amies ran their 60 acre farm at Otter Bay, with help from the children.

POWER BOAT IS OUT FOR HUNTING GAME BIRDS IN PROVINCE

Regulations covering the use of a power boat in hunting migratory game birds and the hunting of black brant in the Boundary Bay area have been introduced. They have been added to the Hunting Methods Regulations of the British Columbia Wildlife Act.

Migratory game birds may not be hunted by the use of a power boat, unless the boat is beached, resting at anchor or fastened against a fixed hunting blind.

A hunter may not retrieve a dead or injured bird in a power boat if he is carrying a loaded firearm.

A "power boat" means any boat, canoe or yacht powered by electric, gasoline, oil, steam or other mechanical means. An outboard boat without its motor is not a power boat.

ex Keeler's house, Port Washington, by the Rev. John Richardson. George's sister, Hilda, (Mrs. George McLarty), was Addie's attendant. Jack Amies, was best man. Mrs. Madge Cousineau played the wedding march. Mrs. Keeler and her daughter, Janet Pugh, gave a reception, and the couple left on the Princess Mary for Seattle. Except for routine trips to Victoria, the Logans have hardly been off the island since.

The Logans bought from Olive Grimmer Clague, on the Summer Bay waterfront. George built their comfy house. Their avid gardening produces veggies, lawns and a dazzlement of flowers; a joy to all, especially the deer. George hears them conferring in the bush. "Let's go over to Logans' for a spot of salad. George's peachtrees are in leaf."

Where would the Penders be, without the Logans? In a strong tide, a late steamer warps into the wharf, maybe slicing a few piles, at Port Wash, Hope Bay or Otter Bay; and there is the faithful George, or Addie, ready to take you 15 miles to Gowlland Point, with a 4-mile detour to Clam Bay.

"South Pender people!" said Addie, one pitch black morning at 1, the Lady Rose being extra late. "Drop me off at the big tree, you say. And you get out, with your bags and bundles, and disappear into the bush!"

Roads have taken their toll of the taxis. The first, 1930, an Overland, came from Sidney on a seiner, that served the salteries at Otter Bay. There followed 2 Chevs, an Oldsmobile, 2 Dodges, Chev, Rambler, Ford and 6 trucks. "We didn't have new cars until 1947 and 1949, both Dodges," Addie says. "It was nothing to have 9000 miles on the speedometer." George can't figure the thousands of miles they have run, hurdling deer; around curves, over bumps into potholes; and never an accident.

In 1934, George began a trucking service to Victoria, and brought in building supplies.

Before a bridge joined the Penders, in 1955, George taxied the mailbags, twice a week, from Port Washington or Hope Bay, to postmaster John Freeman waiting in his launch, at Brown-ing Harbour, near The Maples, who ran them through the Canal, to Bedwell Harbour and the South Pender P.O.

When the Logans have time to look, the view from Sea Breeze is really something. Up Trincornall Channel, north west to Galiano and the entrance to Active Pass. West, over Prevost to Vancouver Island, and the beginning of Ganges Harbour. And the sunsets! A good setting, for good people.

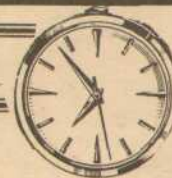

Asks For Dismissal Of Charge

Charged with breaking and entering with intent to commit an indictable offence, Donald Joel Morrison, of Ganges, promptly moved that the case be dismissed "in the interests of justice".

Judge M.F. Peiler, in Ganges provincial court on Friday, declined to accept the submission and order a remand.

Morrison is charged with complicity in the breaking and entering of Ganges Pharmacy on September 30. Two others have already pleaded guilty and been sentenced. Morrison pleaded not guilty.

The motion to dismiss the charge was based on the assertion

that as Morrison, himself, was without intention of doing anything, the charge of breaking and entering with intent was unjust.

"Intent is a pretty vague statement," explained the accused, "and I did not break and enter and had no intent to do anything." He was interrupted by Crown Prosecutor E. Rogers.

"He should not be allowed to elaborate and I am sure he will get a fair trial."

Morrison asked for a further remand to engage counsel.

Prosecutor objected. He had time to engage counsel and it would merely necessitate a further journey from Victoria to Ganges.

Judge Peiler recalled asking the accused whether he understood the position at the initial hearing on September 20.

"I pointed out to you your right to counsel," he stated, "You were definite in declining counsel."

He had made plans to see a lawyer on Saturday, stated the accused.

He added that he had failed to understand the charges and that he had so stated at the preliminary hearing. The judge replied that he had understood Morrison to say he did understand.

Prosecutor Rogers changed his stand and agreed to a remand.

When the judge chose Friday, Oct. 16, the accused suggested that a week later would be better in order that he might finish the house he is building.

"I can't help that," retorted the judge, "You tell your lawyer that we are going ahead on that date. You have had plenty of opportunity already." Bail of \$500 was extended.
