The restriction has been introduced by the Capital Regional District.

PROJECT WAITING FOR APPROVAL

Construction of the new grocery store next to Mouat's Trading Co. store has come to a halt this week. R. M. Toynbee, president of Mouat's, reports that approval of the designs is holding up the issue of the necessary building permits. Concrete has been poured in readiness.

PERMITS NEAR \$200,000

Building permits issued by building inspectors on the Gulf Islands during the month of September amounted to a total of \$194,426.

This was the value of 16 permits. Three were for structures other than single-family dwellings.

There were six permits for dwellings on Salt Spring Island to an estimated value of \$92,528. On Mayne Island two permits amounted to \$29,300.

Five permits on the Penders amounted to \$68,598. Of this total, two permits totalling \$35,162, were in respect of dwellings on South Pender.

Three permits for other structures included a \$2,000 barn on Salt Spring; a \$500 alteration on Pender and a \$1,500 storage shed for Mayne.

If it is then approved with amendments by the board it will be given a third reading. The by-law must then be approved by the department of municipal affairs and the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council.

Mr. Holmes would not support the suggestion that it might be in force by mid-November.

He Doesn't Speak for Me

I don't often take strong issue with the member of parliament who represents me. If I feel he is letting too much go by and neglecting his home constituency, I feel saddened. If a member appears to be idling too much of his time away, I conjure up all kinds of indignation; mostly that he should do it when I can't. It is probably resentment as much as anything else.

This week, after watching the television reports of the tragedy that has been Montreal during the past week, I have to take issue with my member.

He has appeared on the national radio and television services to speak of the situation in Quebec and the pattern of Ottawa's handling of the situation.

His statements and observa-

tions are so far removed from anything I feel on the subject and so far away from the majority of islanders that I cannot sit back and say nothing.

We have all wept silently at this pattern of history. We have watched the beautiful picture of Canada shattered by one incident. The principles of truth and justice went by the board. Mr. Douglas retained his own principles and we may feel happy that he should.

Mr. Douglas cannot support the government in its handling of the situation. It is against his principles to invoke the War Measures Act. It is not against mine.

Mr. Douglas observed that the government should have introduced new legislation to deal adequately with the situation. He even inferred that such new legislation could be instant law, brought in at once, brooking of no delay.

In my book, Pierre Trudeau has gained immense stature from his skillful handling of a grim situation. Not from his conquest of a threat to Canadian life, for that has not been resolved, but from his firm, prompt and probably effective command of the situation.

Trudeau has proved himself a man of action when the country had seen in him a debater rather than a mover. He has come out of the affair as a leader.

I cannot feel the same confidence in Mr. Douglas. He has offered criticism of the Trudeau handling of the problems on the grounds that invoking the act was contrary to his principles. Trudeau was positive and firm and resolute. Douglas was negative, uncertain and without a workable alternative.

From the Gulf Islands, thousands of miles from Montreal, I would like to make my own small plea. Mr. Douglas was speaking as leader of his party...not for me. And I pause to wonder, which does he represent in the house?

Why Does a Narwhal Have a Tusk?

Alan Best Recounts Tale of Capture

Why does a narwhal have a tusk?

There is no known reason for the tusk. The northern mammal grows its teeth in youth and all but one left tooth then disappear. This single tooth grows forward from the creature's mouth to form a long tusk.

Not even the narwhal knows why he has it.

Alan Best, formerly of Salt Spring Island and now curator of the Stanley Park Zoo, described the capture of five narwhals when he spoke to a Salt Spring Island audience on Friday evening.

The former islander explained that he had been among those sponsoring the capture of a narwhal, largely because there had never been a narwhal in captivity before.

Result of the expedition has been to bring a keen national awareness of the plight of the

northern mammal and a drive for its preservation.

Expedition went to the northern tip of Baffinland. Led by Dr. Murray Newton of the aquarium in Vancouver, the party

included Mr. Best and Ed Lee, of Galiano.

Of Mr. Lee, Alan Best had this to say.

"He was so good with boats... he was so good with everything

that he was an invaluable asset to the party."

The narwhal population was once spread throughout the Arctic, explained the speaker. It is largely restricted to the area off Baffinland, today. The narwhal is hunted by the Eskimo for its tusk, which the hunter sells, and for the skin which he eats. It is likely that the skin provides a vitamin or similar content lacking in the Eskimo diet otherwise, said Mr. Best.

He noted that the myth of the unicorn was almost certainly based on the single-tusked narwhal. Sailors and other travelers would find the tusks in northern Europe and in the course of time a horse was invented to carry the tusk, he explained.

The tusk is salable at \$9 a pound.

The day of the big capture nearly proved a big loss.

Air Service Cut Back

With shorter daylight hours, winter schedule of Victoria Flying Services to and from the Gulf Islands will go into effect Monday, Oct. 26 and continue until February 28, it is announced by John R. Sturdy, VFS agent.

On Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, flights will leave the Islands for Vancouver at 8:30 am and 1:30 pm with return flights from Vancouver at 9:30 am and 2:45 pm.

On the same days of the week flights will leave for Victoria at 10 am and 3:15 pm, and from Victoria at 8 am and 1 pm.

On Saturday and Sunday there will be one flight to Vancouver at 1:30 pm, and from Vancouver to the Islands at 2:45 pm. The Victoria flight will depart at 3:15 pm, and from Victoria at 1 pm.

There will be no Wednesday flights during the winter period.

The aircraft stop, by reservation, at Ganges, Montague Harbour, Miners Bay, Bedwell Harbour and Lyall Harbour. Besides flights to and from Vancouver and Victoria, inter-island service is provided.

Women have been liberated on Salt Spring Island. The whole picture is mixed up and the adult education business has been the cause of the mixture. There's a bunch of he-men welders all striking arcs and going to town. But in the midst of the welders is Marg Simons, pouring on the metal with the best.

Then you look into the women's classes and sure enough, you've got them all mixed up again. On Thursday there was a fair-sized class of artists and daubers working at their batik with a will. In the middle was Paul Schubart waxing his patterns with the best of them.

Even the stenographers have lost their girlish figures with Larry Anderson pounding on the keys.

In some of the classes there is no pounding and no painting and no welding, but they are just as busy and just as determined.

"Buenas dias," calls out Dorothy Hook. She is hipped on Spanish on Thursday evenings.

If you can't keep your mind on driving you shouldn't be behind the wheel, asserts Jake Javorski, the instructor in defensive driving.

Valerie Knowles has dyed. Both hands. The red won't come off and it's not blood, she asserts. That's the cost of batik... and tie dying. Caroline Hamilton is the instructor and half of Salt Spring Island seems eager to learn. It's the only class carried on in the elementary school on Thursday nights. They need a lot of room for that job.

The welding is the dirty end of it. The welders gather around

the forge and the lights flash and the smoke rises. The transformer hums as pupil after pupil finds his welding rod very eager to weld itself to the job.

The happy brewers are enjoying the experience. The class is held at the home of the instructor D.C. Goodman and the students are learning the art of wine-making and brewing.

The superintendent of adult education, Mrs. Olive Layard, has introduced as wide a range of subjects as possible.

If you don't want to talk Spanish with Tony Richards, you can play golf under the tutelage of Bob Foulis. If golf is too tough, then there's a women's keep fit class to bring you up to pitch. If both are too strenuous, say farewell to Mary Stepanuk's exercises and settle for Mrs. Swanson's tuition at the keyboard of a typewriter.

Cliff Hatch, ex-Air Force pilot and instructor at a Vancouver Island flying service, is offering pilot's ground school. This is a first on Salt Spring Island and it is probably the first in a community the size of Salt Spring Island. This is a course rarely offered away from an airport or a community served by an airport. Cliff Hatch is not always dancing with his head in the clouds. He also squares away on the ground and is the spokesman, if not the instructor, for the square dancing classes.

Ruth Hamer is the seamstress. Mrs. Hamer teaches sewing by the Bishop Method. Or the crochety can crochet to fill in the time and Mrs. L. Sommers teaches how.

New mode of living and eating is offered by Mrs. H. D. Brumble in the course on the study of herbs and useful wild plants. You can recognize the herb scholars... they're all chewing the cud.

Any student at night school can record the event for posterity by attending photography classes under the direction of Philip Hildred.

Or go play-reading. Lois Pharis directs the course.

For the outer islands the pattern is different. Art at Galiano is offered under the direction of David Anderson, Saanich artist. Dave Anderson is a former teacher at the Adult Education Institute in Victoria and the moving spirit behind the Saanich Peninsula Art Centre.

Two are for the new year, - at Pender the instructor in art will be Prof. H. G. Glyde and at Mayne, Mrs. Joyce Mitchell will be teaching art.

It is notable that art is offered on all the islands and that every island has attracted painters and other artists of considerable ability. The artists, everywhere, show great enthusiasm.

Defensive driving is offered for both Mayne and Pender on a share basis. If enough on the two islands want the course, instructor Jake Javorski will take the course to the islands.

Sewing course is also offered at Galiano, as well as a keep-fit course by Kay Johnston.

On Pender there is a golf class by Bill Goldsworthy and everyone (Turn to Page Three)

MAY HE NOT DIE IN VAIN!

Over the grave of Pierre Laporte stands a nation unified as rarely before.

Pierre Laporte was little more than a name to most of us in the west. A prominent Quebec Liberal, a Quebec cabinet minister...few of us had seen him, let alone met him.

With his kidnapping, his name became common knowledge, for a few brief days.

He died, not as a victim of the assassins, but as a martyr for Canadian unity.

Dead, he remains only as a memory to his family and his friends but as a symbol to all of Canada.

A nation has grieved his passing. In the far western islands, we have been shocked and dismayed by the blow. There have been tears shed by Islanders for what he was and what his death means to a peaceful and peaceable nation.

Has his martyrdom left a legacy?

We would like to think so. We would like to think that we, out here, so far from Quebec, will avoid emotional, unthinking prejudice against French Canada and Canadians. It is this living by unthinking prejudice that prompted his murder. Let us do better than that.

We would like to think that we will make an effort, in the English-speaking part of the nation, to work with the French Canadian and to understand his position; to learn of his problems and to help him to solve them.

We would like to think that when a controversy arises over some matter of bi-cultural relations, we will recall Pierre Laporte and his death at the hands of those who could not and would not pause to listen to the other man's viewpoint.

We would like to think, above all, that Canadians, from every city and town and village will strive to make their land the nation they always believed it to be; to love the land in which they make their home and to love their neighbors as fellow Canadians in their own beloved country.

Then, and only then, Pierre Laporte has not died in vain, for his assassins stand frustrated, their evil machinations routed.

Twenty-five years ago certain nations came together with the hope of achieving world peace. This organization is the United Nations. Their hopes were great ideals high. What happened?

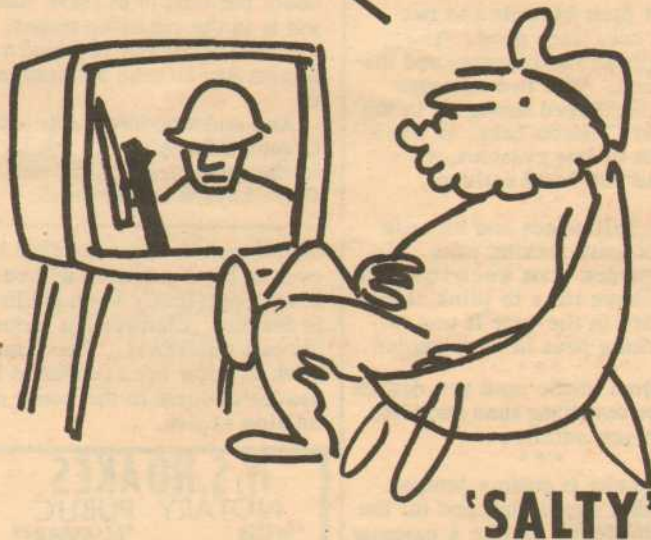

Back to Enterprise, and east, passing Hay River, along Great Slave Lake, to Pine Point, and its base metal Cominco Mine, lead and zinc; en route to Fort Resolution.

Down through Wood Buffalo country, the world's largest national park, 17,300 square miles where the buffalo roam, on the highway, to Fort Smith on the Slave River at the Alberta border.

Retracing from Fort Smith to Edmonton, south east to Lloydminster; through Saskatoon, Regina, to Estevan. A Sentimental Journey, to Lewis' birthplace, Lac Qui Parle, 12 miles away; not seen for 29 years, was foiled by impassable mud.

Lewis' parents, Leif and Randi Odden, came from Skien, birthplace of Ibsen, near Oslo, to Portal, North Dakota; and farmed with other Norwegians, later spreading across the border.

In 1941, the Oddens, at the request of an Estevan friend, lawyer W.W. Lynd, agreed to caretake, that winter, at Beautyrest, Otter Bay. Thus the Oddens arrived at Hope Bay on the PRINCESS MARY, December 4, 1941.

Robin and Lewis returned via Trans-Canada No. 3, parking at Vernon with Squire Jack Amies, on his 22-acre Coldstream estate; and picking macs, to pay for their keep. A night with the Norman Pollards at Coquitlam; and so home.

In 1968, the Intrepids explored the Yukon and Alaska; and there could be more Arctic adventures ahead.

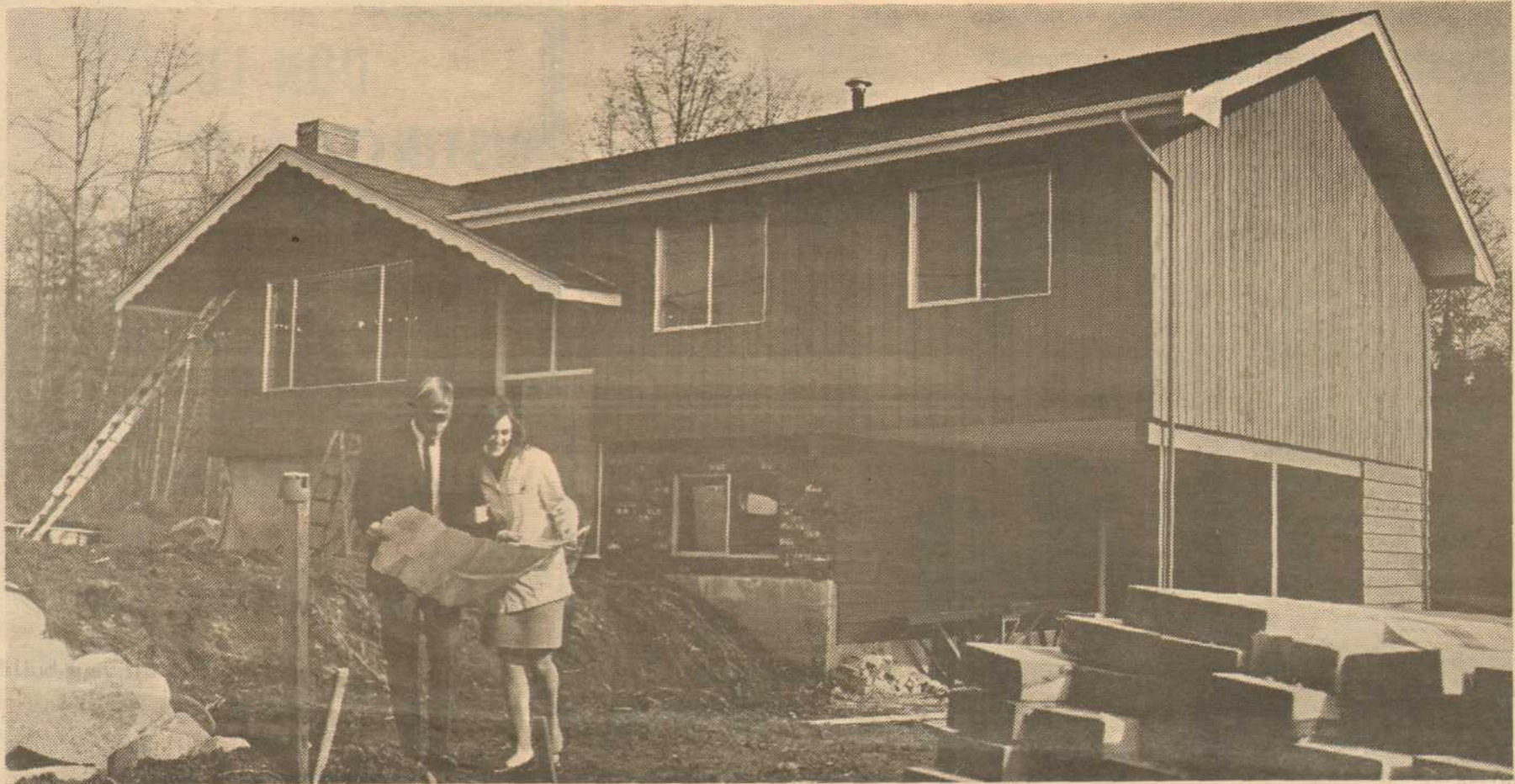

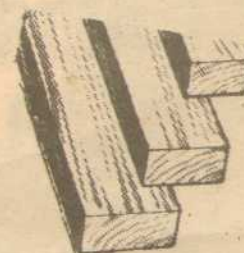

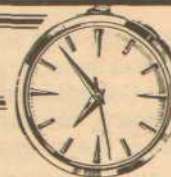

MAYNE ISLAND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT BY-LAW NO. 9

A by-law respecting the installation of Fire Hydrants in water systems within subdivisions of land in the area comprising the District.

1. The Trustees of Mayne Island Improvement District ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

- Every owner of a proposed subdivision shall submit his plan of subdivision to the District for approval respecting FIRE HYDRANTS in a waterworks system to be installed therein, prior to submission to the Department of Highways for approval under the Land Registry Act.
- Before the Trustees of the District approve the subdivision plan as hereinbefore submitted, they may require the owner or owners of the proposed subdivision to deposit a sum of money or Government of Canada bonds and their guarantees or Province of British Columbia bonds and their guarantees, as a guarantee that Fire Hydrants will be installed therein.
- Every owner of a subdivision and every owner of land who subdivides any parcel of land within the District shall install, at his own expense and at no cost to the District and under the supervision of the Trustees of the District, or their representative, all Fire Hydrants deemed necessary by the District to provide an adequate supply of water for fire protection within the said subdivision, and shall pay for all engineering costs; the said Fire Hydrants shall become the property of the District.

2. Every owner who disobeys or fails to comply with any provision of this by-law shall be guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding Two Hundred Dollars, and in default of payment thereof to Imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

3. This by-law may be cited as the "Subdivision Water Regulations By-law in respect to Fire Hydrants."
