BOAT RAMP REPAIRS ARE CARRIED OUT

New rock wall and heavy fill will hold the boat-launching ramp at Ganges for another year

On Saturday a crew of volunteers got down to rock bottom with over hundred tons of fill

and mechanical help. Taking part in the project with material and equipment



were Dino Facca, of Gulf Coast materials, Harvey Reynolds, Norman Twa, Ken Byron and Fred's Bulldozing.

The fill was dumped near the site and volunteers built up a sea wall. Biggest enemy of the ramp, explained Tom Marcus, is the floating log, which gently worries away the rocks in the sea wall.

It was senior citizens' day. Of the volunteers, four were over 60 and two under 20. In the middle came Spencer Marr and Leo Bedford who supplied "the brute force needed on some of the more stubborn boulders," explained Mr. Marcus. Higher up the middle ranks was Alf Herbert. Other volunteers were Vince Prior, Jim Gilson, Len Tuppen,

David Sykes and Ron Pauls. Project lasted for two hours on Saturday and a new look had been gained by the ramp.

NEW SEWAGE PLANT

The association investigated and found the allegation to be FALSE! In fact, a three-phase operation disposal system will be introduced. This sewage purification system employs a hydro-shear aerating tank and will be the first of its kind on the island.

Fire On Pender Near Call

Brush fire on Pender Island was attributed to a carelessly thrown cigarette on Monday evening.

Serious damage was averted when the blaze was caught almost as soon as it broke out.

Elmer Bowerman was bringing his bulldozer along the road to Hope Bay when he saw the

smoke. He hurriedly sounded an alarm and went to work on the fire with his machine.

Fire Warden Les Cunliffe was alerted and about 35 men were called to help. By Monday night the fire was out.

Woods and homes would have been threatened if the fire had not been seen early in its rise, said Mr. Cunliffe.

YOUTH '71 SELLS ITS PRODUCE

Youth '71 wrote a new chapter in success last week with the sale of its first produce. The student employment program on Salt Spring Island is divided into three sections. One group makes novelties and handicrafts for sale at the Youth '71 booth near the Ganges Boat Basin. Another group is engaged in cleaning up Salt Spring Island and analyzing water samples. Third section is cultivating three plots of land and selling its crops.

Bob Blundell, of Harbour Grocery told Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce on Friday that he was offering the first carrots and onions to come from the students' summer project.

A new exhibit by local photographer Philip Hildred, is also on display.

Fire By-Law Again

For the second time in less than a year ratepayers of Pender Island will go to the polls on Saturday to decide whether to establish a fire protection district.

Fire district will construct a fire hall and acquire fire-fighting equipment if islanders support the project.

Only North Pender Island is affected. Residents of South Pender have not sought to be included.

The Penders have no fire department and the by-law seeks to furnish the equipment to form and operate a volunteer service on the island.

Last December a by-law covering all of the Penders was rejected by a slim margin.

If the plan is approved islanders will go ahead with the acquisition of fire truck and hall and the recruiting of firemen to handle the equipment.

Tom Collinson was her great-grandfather and besides being the first Postmaster he was also the first Justice of the Peace. He built the first lodge and store at the head of the Government wharf at Miners Bay.

Margaret's husband Fred also has forbears dating back to Mayne in the 1880's. His grandfather, Thomas Bennett, settled on Mayne during that year and was the first proprietor of Point Comfort lodge which opened for business on June 30, 1897.

Members of the sixth generation since Tom Collinson will be present to help celebrate Mayne Island's Centennial Fall Fair on Saturday.

INTERESTING NEW BOOKS HERE

White whales are in the news these days, in film and story.

One of the latest acquisitions at our library is Peter Matthiessen's "Blue Meridian", an account of an expedition by professional divers to find and film the great white shark, one of the most dangerous underwater creatures. Matthiessen, in easy readable style, has made this a great adventure story and the color illustrations are magnificent.

Still at sea, but vastly different in content, are the two books on naval warfare in World War 2: "Atlantic Rendezvous", by William Murray, is the personal story of a young naval radio officer during the period 1940/41 and in addition to graphic re-telling of the battle of the Atlantic, Murray's attempts at escaping from Germans, French and Spanish are exciting reading. In contrast, but very readable and factual, is "Fiasco" by John Deane Potter. This is an account of the breakout of the German battleships during World War 2 - almost nostalgic reading for ex-naval men.

From sea to sky - and away from war - is the new Arch Whitehouse book "The Sky's the Limit". This traces the history

of the U.S. Airlines from pioneer days to the present.

These and other new books, both fiction and fact, have been added to the library shelves within the last week by purchase and donation.

THE SEA IS DYING

The sea is dying and swimming is gradually receding from the reach of the public. Few beaches remain in the highly populous centres of Canada. Among the islands beaches are generally approved for bathing by the Greater Victoria Metropolitan Board of Health. On Saanich Peninsula two beaches are approved and around the coast of southern Vancouver Island most beaches are unsafe for

bathers. Following is the official list of areas that are closed for bathing:

All areas that are unsafe for bathing have been posted, these include: Kinver Beach, The Victoria Inner Harbour Area, up to and including Selkirk Waters, The Gorge and Portage Inlet, Esquimalt Harbour and adjacent areas. The Dallas Road Waterfront from Howe Street, including Clover Point and Ross Bay, to St. Charles Street, The Twin Beaches, Beach Drive, The Golf Links Beaches - Beach Drive, Glenlyon Beach - Beach Drive, Foot of Rutland Road, Foot of Humber Road, Small portion of Cadboro Bay on the North East corner, adjacent to Tudor Avenue. Deep Cove, Cordova Bay - at mouth of creeks, Sidney Waterfront and Brooks Park Beach - Brentwood.

"A" WATER BOATMAN —

Aquatic bugs about half-an-inch long, body slightly flattened. Hind legs long, slender and flattened for swimming, are held at sharp angle to the body, resembling oars of a small boat. Boatmen feed on small organisms on mud bottoms of marshes and ponds. Often gathering in large numbers, their bodies, surrounded by air bubbles glisten like quick-silver as they move about. They can fly well.

"B" WATER STRIDER —

Long legged and slender this semi-aquatic insect is able to skim and dart about on the surface of the water. Food is aquatic organisms and tiny insects, taken on or just beneath the surface. The largest water striders will measure slightly over half-an-inch in body-length.

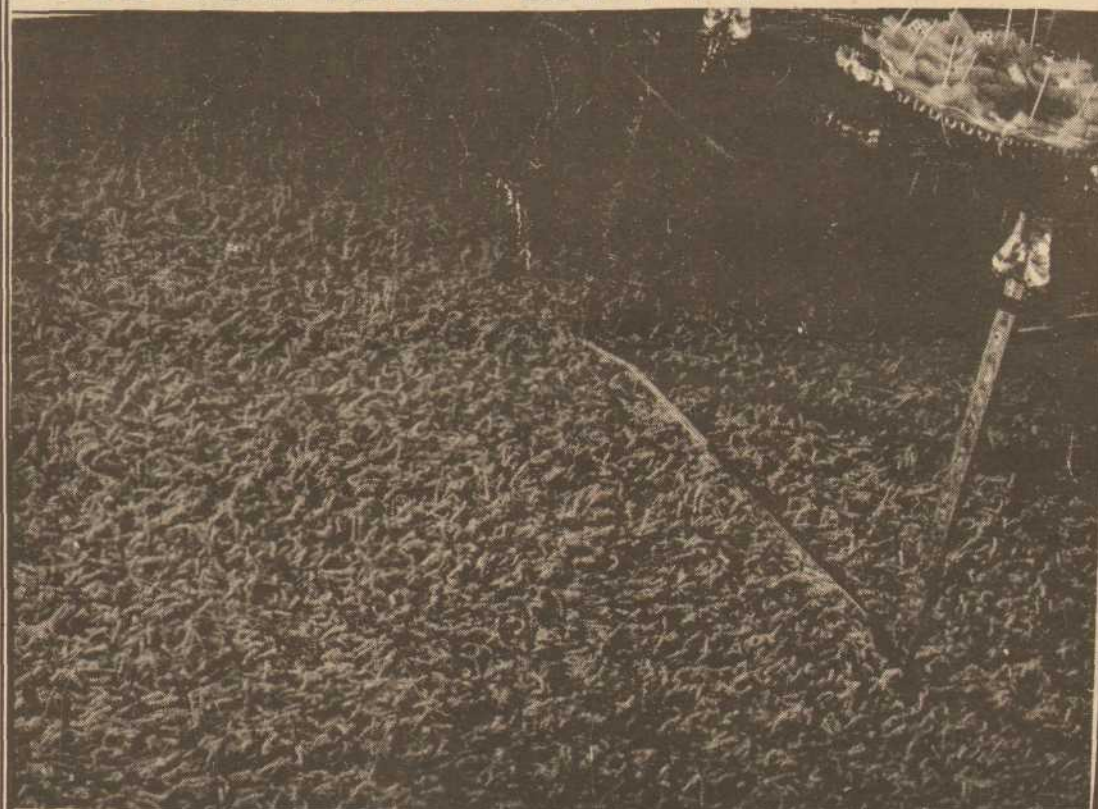

2) Develop zones based on the above knowledge in relation to the concept of most appropriate use.

3) The development of building restrictions, set-back restrictions, surface use restrictions parcel size and subdivision restrictions.

Time Schedule

Three months from the date that the Capital Regional Board agrees to delete Saturna Island from any proposed by-law on an interim basis the Saturna Community will submit to the Capital Regional Board, the landuse and development control plan with such a supporting by-law or by-laws as are necessary.

This approach, although unconventional, is experimental in nature. Ideas of value which arise from it could benefit all areas in the region.

Report of the Zoning Subcommittee of the Capital Region met in July to consider the proposal. Following is the report of the sub-committee:

This sub-committee wishes to stress that the draft zoning by-law for the Outer Gulf Islands is an interim measure which will provide a foundation for a future zoning by-law to be prepared after agreement on a regional plan.

The interim by-law dealing only with existing uses provides protection while the future planning for the Islands is considered. It is similar in purpose to

By-law No. 66 in force on Salt Spring Island.

Because of the nature of the interim zoning by-law it is legitimate to enact it before acceptance of a regional plan. The sub-committee also wishes to underline that there is no conflict between this proposed by-law and the proposals for the future of Saturna Island. This is because the by-law does not purport to contain proposals for future development.

The issues raised in Mr. Campbell's communication will be a part of the discussions on the future policy for the Islands which will be considered after the interim zoning by-law has been enacted, but as a preliminary reaction to the Saturna proposals this sub-committee recommends that the Board adopt the following four principles

In a future development policy for the Islands there can be

variations as between one island and another to reflect their unique conditions and individual preferences but such variations should be co-ordinated and built into one instrument such as a regional plan or a by-law for an electoral area.

The Board fully endorses the concept that the nature of the land and its natural functions should be a major criterion in deciding the future use of the land.

To underline its determination to consider future proposals for the Islands as soon as possible, the Board will within 60 days of the completion of the interim zoning by-law present tentative suggestions for a regional plan

for the Islands for full debate and consideration and will, prior to that date, continue to involve the Advisory Planning Commissions in its preparation.

That as a part of this consideration of a plan for the Islands, the Board will be pleased to receive and consider any plans or suggestions from any Island.

Margolin is unhappy with the deteriorating environmental conditions in the American state and he looks with no more enthusiasm to the social decay.

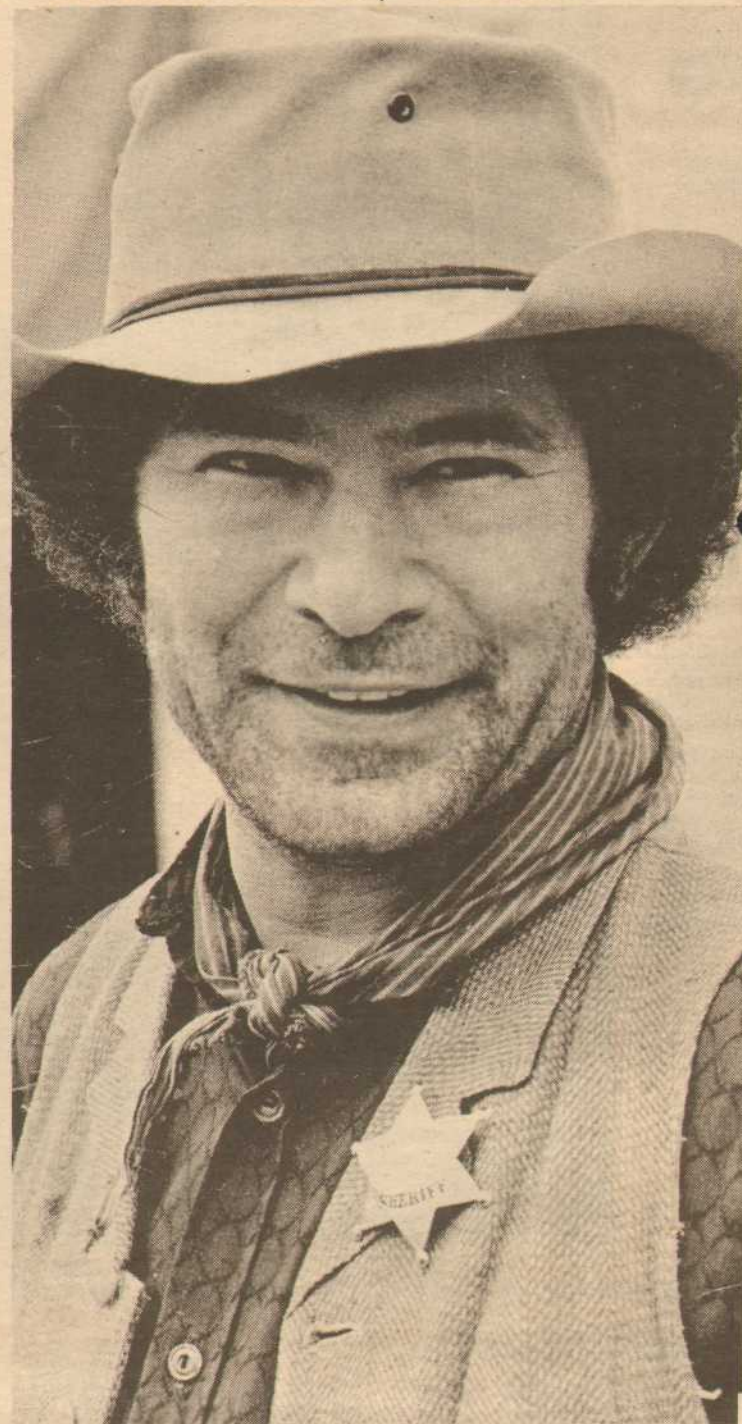
"I wanted somewhere where the air is clean and somewhere that when you send your kids to school all you have to worry about is whether they'll bring home poor grades."

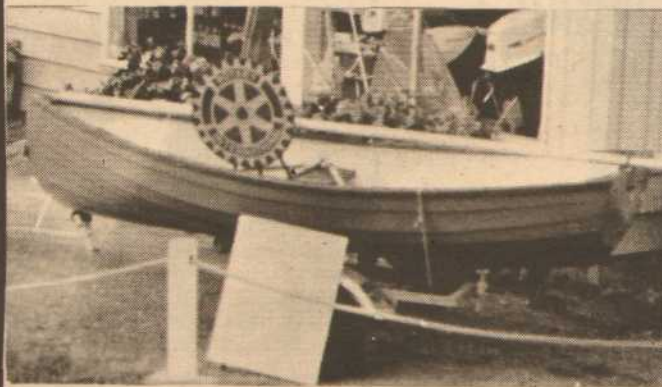

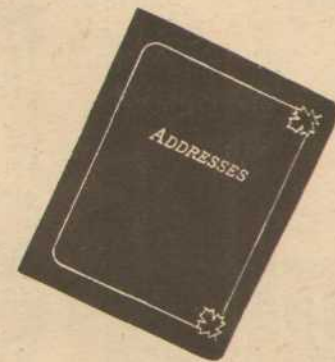

MAYNE AND VANCOUVER

LIBRARIES AND THEIR ORIGINS

Most libraries in British Columbia came into being through the public spiritedness of a few citizens who were willing to give time and thought to establishing a library and further, to see that it was maintained. Like F. Carter-Cotton, owner and editor of Vancouver's News-Advertiser, during the eighteen-eighties, they firmly believed that a well-founded library should be a part of any community which had any claim to enlightenment.

Mayne Island library is at this first stage of its history. Under the auspices of the Mayne Island Community Association several hundred miscellaneous volumes have been gathered together, donated by residents and commuters. At present these are housed in the waiting room of the doctor's office. The issuing of books to borrowers and receiving those returned is all part of the voluntary work of the members of the Community Association.

Salt Spring Island library had gained the next step by being eligible for a grant from the Provincial Government but unhappily this has been withdrawn and they now have to rely on their own resourcefulness.

Vancouver's public library had perhaps, a unique beginning. It all began at a lumber mill, later named the Hastings Mill, on the south shore of Burrard Inlet. At the time, 1870, the mill was separated from the embryo city, Gastown, by dense forest which swept down to the shoreline. Captain Raymur, the manager of the mill, was responsible for the first collection of books

which was to develop into a municipal library.

On first seeing the chaotic state of the area surrounding the mill, Raymur is supposed to have exclaimed "What is the meaning of this aggregation of filth?"

When told that it was a by-product of the mill he answered "Aye, aye, and I'll make the beggars mind me. I'll not permit a running sore to fasten itself on an industry entrusted to my care." And he proceeded to make the mill a civilized, decent place in which to live and work. In addition to bunk houses he erected a separate building to be used as a sitting-room for the mill hands and which became known as Bummer's Hall. It was here that the library was established and named "The New London Institute."

Within a very short time the name was changed to the Hastings Institute as a compliment to Admiral Hastings who was a personal friend of Captain Raymur and who probably gave his ship's books to the Hastings Institute.

It was said that his officers and men had read them over and over again and there was no use taking them back to England. Admiral Hastings was Commander-in-Chief of the North Pacific Squadron and departed for England at the end of his tour of duty on the coast in April 1869.

It was not long before the mill itself and the growing community was named "Hastings". Gastown too was expanding. Gassy Jack, the most colorful figure of the period, had a board-walk made from the mill to his saloon

Because the men at the mill were frequenting the various places of entertainment in the neighboring community the library was deserted and the books gathered dust.

Three other notable figures of the period were, the Reverend H.G. Fiennes Clinton of St. James' Anglican Church, Francis Carter-Cotton, owner and editor of the News-Advertiser and H.P. McCraney, a contractor and alderman. It was the concern that these men felt for their fellow citizens that led them to accept the 400 books offered to Fr. Clinton by the manager of the mill.

In a very short time they publicized the fact that a library was to be opened and called on people to donate books and magazines to add to the initial 400. The first library in what was to become Vancouver was started in a room above a hardware store at 136 Cordova Street West.

An interesting side issue connected with the library when it was being operated from rented space at the Y.M.C.A. on Hastings Street was the appearance of a group of stuffed sea-lions. They had been caught in local waters and had somehow reached the mayor of Vancouver who instructed them to be displayed on a platform in the library. Later these were joined by a stuffed swan said to have been shot off Gabriola Island.

The steady development and importance of the Vancouver Public Library was only achieved because there were public spirited men and women who believed that in a progressive society it was essential to make books available to all.

Accidents among the Quail family are apparent, - one little fellow with a broken leg, and yesterday, another with a broken wing. I hope it is not stones cast by some thoughtless person but don't think anyone would do that around here, - may be wires. We seem to put up so many things that can injure wild life, as wires, windows, vehicles, the price of progress, it seems.

Visiting their sister Grace (Mrs. Art Young) at Solimar, are Mrs. C. Burdette of West Vancouver, and John Freer and his three sons, from Kitsilano. All cottages are full of guests, says Art Young. provides high oxygenation and maximum bacteriological breakdown.

In the final phase, the sewage passes into a clarification compartment where the solids are settled. The settled sludge is continuously withdrawn and returned to the aerating tank by a sludge air lift pump where it ultimately is oxidized to a flaky ash.

The clarified effluents are both aesthetically acceptable, odor-free and can be discharged into the sea without creating any pollution, reported Wayne Cooper.

ROAD SIGN POLICY UNDER FIRE

New controls of road signs came in for a blast on Friday when Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce heard a plea for help from Miss June Mitchell.

Miss Mitchell is associated with her mother, Mrs. James Mitchell in the Studio, on Beddis Road. The two artists are engaged in painting and pottery. They dispose of their work direct to the public.

For many years the Studio could be found by a direction sign outside their home on Beddis Road. When the administration of island roads passed from the Nanaimo office of the department of highways to the Victoria office a new policy was imposed whereby all signs which failed to strictly conform with regulations were ordered removed.

Since that time The Studio has operated without its sign in accordance with governmental decree.

Without a sign, explained the proprietor, no one can find the studio.

The two ladies had protested to John Tisdalle, MLA, but the government edict still stands.

Members of the chamber were warm in their support.

Letter from the province had explained that this is a tourist-orientated province. One member protested that without any signs, the province could not cater to tourists.

Resorts are permitted more signs and larger one than were permitted previously. Spencer Marr, president of the chamber, explained that he has signs everywhere now to his resort at Cushion Lake. They are far larger than he would have asked for.

New regulations placate the bureaucrats and serve no other purpose, he suggested.

The chamber will ask the government for relief from its restrictive regulations. The home industry is a significant part of the islands' economy, commented Mr. Marr. It is an activity which particularly needs identification.
