BONES FOUND ON BEACH

Mr. Parker joined B.C. Tel in 1957, and prior to his recent appointment he served as Powell River customer service manager.

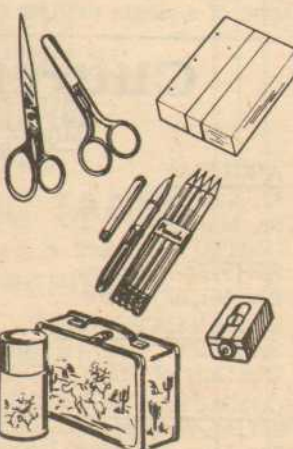
In his new position Mr. Parker will be responsible for telephone installation, repair service and commercial division operations in Victoria and all towns on the Saanich Peninsula.

Establishment of a Fall Fair on Salt Spring Island might provide a new form of island activity, with wide community participation. An aggressive community organization might do a lot worse than investigate the possibilities behind a fair for the island.

It is very evident that farming is no longer an important part of the island's economy. Yet, farming is facing a precarious position in many other places where there is, nonetheless, a fall fair.

The fall fair of today draws exhibits from the garden, the kitchen and the workshop.

It would be a new experience for many islanders and it could prove a profitable venture for a club with enough volunteers to support it.

HAZARDOUS ROAD

May I point out a very dangerous section of highway, where there will be a serious night time accident soon.

This is the North Beach Road, running north from Fernwood Wharf about 1/2 to 3/4 miles. The bank has eroded for many years, and especially last winter so that in places to pass another car in the dark, one could easily plunge down over the bank to the beach.

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TWO ISLAND BOYS ON HISTORY OF GHOST TOWN

Two Salt Spring Island boys are steeped in history.

Hal Wright is only 16; far too young to remember when

the majestic mountains around here echoed with the clanging of miners' picks and the saloons rocked with the boisterous bawdy ballads of the day.

It was 1896. Silver was kingmaker and heartbreaker. And Sandon thrived atop the boomtown heap.

Thousands came here from California, Colorado, Oregon and Idaho. They streamed here from across Canada. They carried their hopes and dreams in knapsacks and saddlebags. Some hit it big and returned home rich beyond their wildest expectations.


Most wound up toiling for wealthy mining firms. A lot never again saw home. They died wretched and broke and, except for a few weather-worn wooden cemetery markers, long forgotten.

Hal Wright first visited Sandon five years ago with his grandmother. He kept coming back to this ramshackle ghost

town. The years--and vandals--have been hard on the old ghost town.

Part of their job is to prevent vandalism, but Hal admits that most of the damage has already been done.

town, drawn by a deep appreciation of its unique history. Today he is in charge of preserving that history--at least what's left of it.

Under the federal government's Opportunities for Youth program, Hal and a friend, Steve Anderson, 16, both of Ganges, have started a museum in Sandon. It is located in the ghost town's old Kaslo-Slocan railway station, built in 1894. Hal is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Wright, Lang Road. Steve's parents are Rev. and Mrs. Fred Anderson, Ganges.

Back then, Sandon was silver rich and boasted 24 hotels, 22 saloons, four newspapers, a brewery, a half dozen or so bawdy houses, three churches, three sawmills, a soft drink factory, a cigar manufacturer, several prosperous banks and an opera house.

Sandon also had the most advanced electric light system in North America at the time. Water from the generators was flumed in from surrounding mountains. A few of the town's ancient fire hydrants still operate, although the once modern fire department no longer exists.

Hal and Steve have gathered up piles of old relics, documents, photographs and newspapers. Much of the material comes from the provincial archives in Victoria. A few artifacts were donated and Hal and Steve unearthed some others.

The boys spend their time compiling historical data to add to the museum, and they conduct tours of Sandon for the more than 10,000 tourists who yearly drop by. This summer

Over the years, souvenir hunters have stripped the last few buildings of anything of value. Floors, walls and ceilings have been ripped apart in the search for old coins. Buildings have been looted of light fixtures, intricately carved wooden stairway railings and bannisters--anything people could carry off.

But destruction is not new to Sandon. A fire swept through the town in 1900, destroying most of the business section and the Sunnyside residential section, once lined with stately homes. The fire started at the opera house, when an actor carelessly discarded a cigarette butt.

The First World War took away many of Sandon's young men most of whom did not return. About the same time silver prices fell and most of the mines folded. The last body was buried in the town cemetery in 1918, according to Hal, and by then Sandon, too, was dead. Only a few people stayed on.

By 1925 it was well on the way to becoming a ghost town. But from 1941-45 about 1,200 Japanese Canadians were interned at Sandon. Most left after the Second World War, but a few elderly residents stayed on, tending their little gardens and living out their remaining days in a tranquil setting, protected from post-war bigotry.

In 1955 the lower portion of the town was ravaged by a flood. The population then was about 30. The only person to remain in Sandon is Gene Peterson. He has lived in the town for 50 years and he works a small mine

Hal and Steve live in a small mountain cabin in Sandon which was given to them by Mr. Peterson.

"We call him the mayor," said Hal.

A handful of other people have moved to Sandon in the past few years; some are artists, others craftsmen who find inspiration for their work in the peaceful atmosphere and breath taking scenery.

When Steve returns to school this fall on Salt Spring Island, Hal will stay on in Sandon, gathering more relics and photographs, more information and background for the museum.

"I'd like to restore one of the buildings on my own," said Hal "Sandon has such a unique history, well worth knowing and preserving. Once it was a city of 3,000, with 7,000 miners working in the mountains around. Now it's a place where people come and remember..."

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There are still two methods open to undertake a sewer system in Ganges. Tom Marcus, of the committee on incorporation of the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce, has produced a summary of the costs of a sewer system in a village municipality. His figures also show the cost of operation of a village in the sewer designated area.
 A sewer constructed in a village would be a very much cheaper system than a sewer constructed within the Capital Regional District, says Marcus.

The tables and summary have been compiled by Mr. Marcus.
 Even with a government grant of \$16,000 and toll charges on schools and hospital of \$8,000, some \$20,000 would have to be paid annually by home-owners and businessmen. Flat rates of \$108 on homes and \$250 on 40 businesses are suggested to bring in the bulk of this sum.

The purpose of this enquiry was to look into the feasibility of establishing a sewerage system under a village corporation. Sources of revenue are available other than those obtained by direct taxation, and at the same time a more equitable basis of taxation may be possible.

The "village" as presently envisaged and for which tax and population data were obtained lies within the boundaries as set in the Engineers' report. In view of the small number of people, their scattered distribution, and the varying lie of the land, it would appear that Jim Wilkinson has been most judicious in his selection of areas to be served.

The persons resident within this area number about 240. The net tax value is \$777,000. With the general increase of 10% in land assessments and the inclusion of improvements completed this year, this value should increase to around \$820,000 in 1973. As will be seen from the table of statistics for B.C. villages of comparable size, some seven of the villages are not as well-off as Ganges is, taxwise.

Public works costs vary considerably from year to year. In some years costs are negligible. Snow removal accounts for a considerable portion of the cost in many villages.

Only three of the villages listed have sanitary sewers: Sayward, Harrison Hot Springs, and Lytton, each with two miles. Special assessments are relatively high in Sayward, which was incorporated as recently as 1968.

In spite of this, Sayward's mill rate is remarkably low.

In the following estimate of revenue and expenditure current mill rates have been used

been reduced to a more acceptable \$11,250. This figure, of course, could be further reduced by reducing the surplus.

The standard provincial grant of \$30 per capita is a considerable source of revenue. Where road mileages are small and population relatively high a surplus is available. First \$25 of the grant is for road maintenance and construction.

Alone among municipalities, villages have to pay no share of welfare costs, nor do they have to pay for police protection and law enforcement.

There is no reason why a village of Ganges could not extend its boundaries to include a larger population. Properties not

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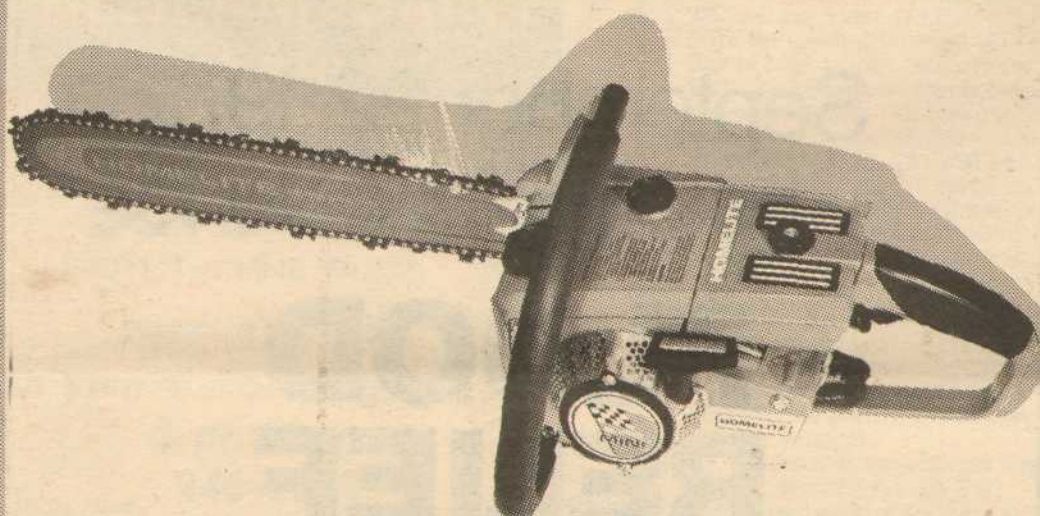
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In 1965 the affairs of her part-time service at home expanded beyond the scope of her space or time and she moved into a Ganges office, now occupied by the Shape-Up Shop.

Monday afternoon a car left the road at the junction of North Beach Road and North End

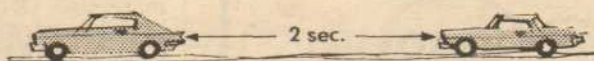
Road, Ganges, struck a tree and was totally wrecked.

Mrs. M. C. D. Hobbs was driving south on North End Road when her car left the road.

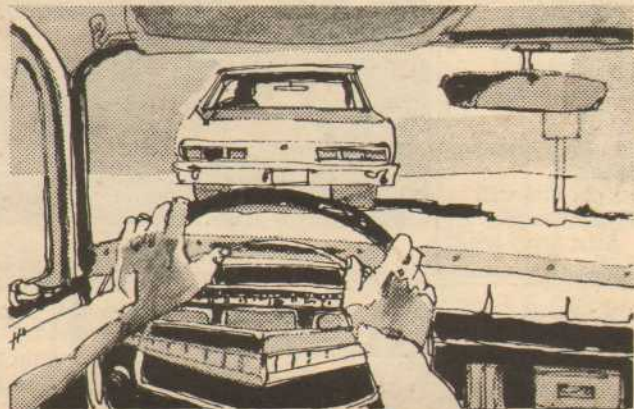
She suffered a fractured col-lar bone, and bruises and cuts. The car was a 1967 Buick.

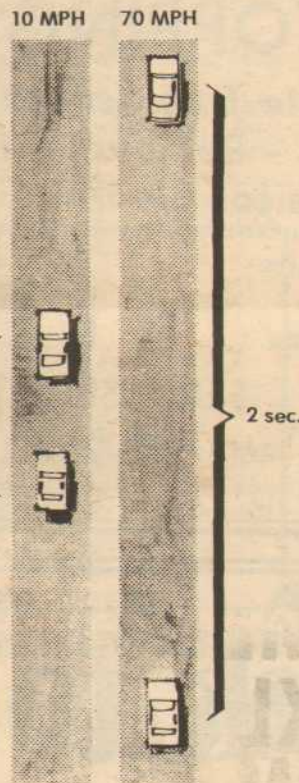

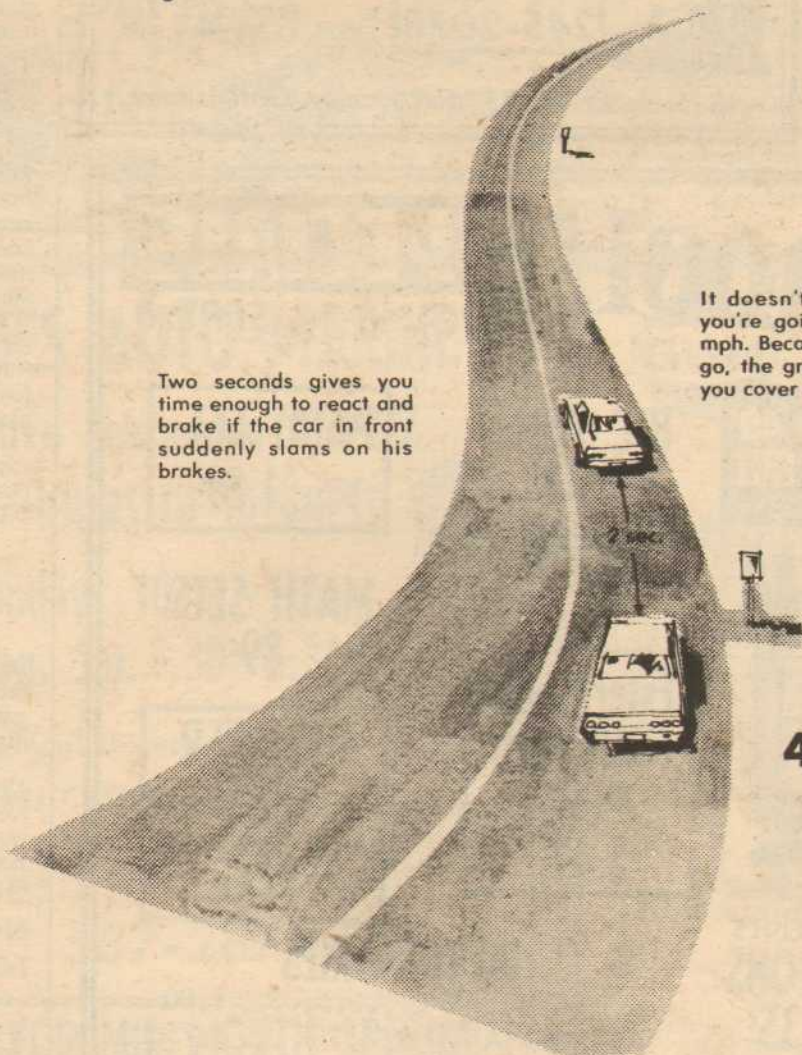

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All Set For Cross Canada Run

All aboard for Halifax!
The Ganges Runner is away.

On Tuesday, Sept. 5, when islands students are returning to

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school, Bill Arnold and his family will set out for eastern Canada at a brisk pace.

Setting the pace will be Bill, himself, on his Cross Canada Run.

For the past month the island athlete has been a familiar sight as he runs up and down Salt Spring Island in readiness for his run from coast to coast.

He will start running on Tuesday and he will stop running on or about the beginning of December in Halifax.

While Bill runs, his family will accompany him by bus. He has converted a school bus to a holiday home. His family will move from town to town with him and he will live and sleep in the bus when he is not active on the road.

For several years Bill has taken part in various athletic programs on the island and he has been in the forefront of the Salt Spring Island Lions Walkathon for several years.

The running is part of his make-up. He was running in England and when he moved to Ontario he immediately joined a running club.

As far as he has been able to find out there is no Cross-Canada running or walking record and it appears his will be the first attempt to establish a record. There are a number of such records south of the international line.

Program for the long hike has already been prepared.

The Cross-Canada Run will commence at approximately 11 am in Ganges. First brief leg

will be from Ganges to Long Harbour, with a couple hours' rest aboard the Queen of Sidney Tuesday night should see him in Aldergrove, all set for the Fraser River Valley, he figures.

Preliminary trials will be staged on Saturday, Sept. 2, when Bill will run 50 miles in Ganges with a contest on the time he takes.

Nearest estimate of the time will win \$100 prize. Of the revenue from the Ganges run, \$1,000 will go towards the cost of the Cross-Canada Run and the remainder will be handed over to the Salt Spring Island Recreation Commission.

Ganges run will be through the community 50 times. Bill may decide to do it in two parts to avoid over-tiring himself.

And then it's all out for Halifax!

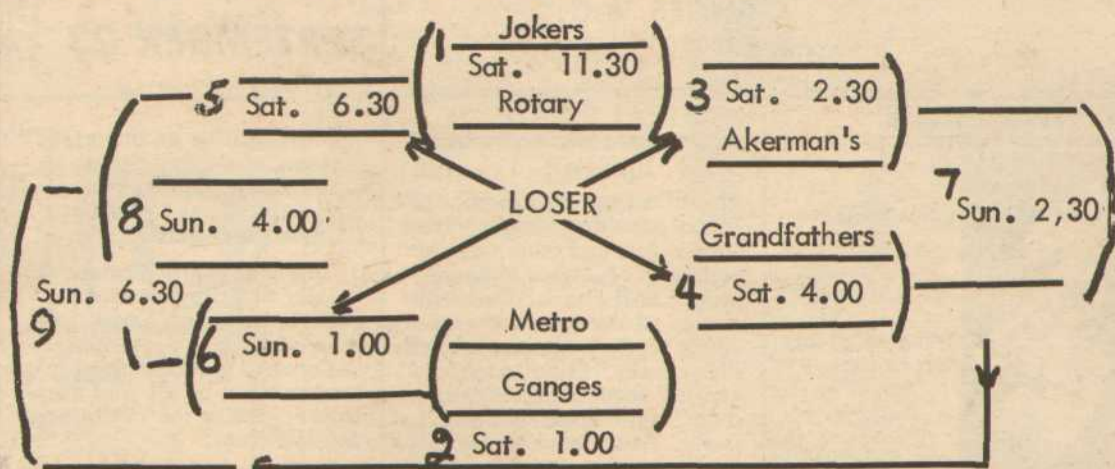
