### Parades On Saturday

Veterans and others will be on parade on Saturday, Nov. 11, to pay tribute to those who never lived to attend a parade after the war.

Islanders will hold formal Remembrance Day ceremonies at Ganges and at Saturna.

On Saturday veterans and others will assemble outside the Legion Hall in Ganges at 10.30 am. For those who find the march too exhausting, or who prefer to take part in a shorter ceremony, there will be opportunity to join the parade outside the Shell Station.

The parade will march to the tarmac apron in front of the Cenotaph for the formal memorial service.

After the parade the informal gathering of ex-servicemen will take place at the Legion Hall. Reception will be followed by luncheon for members and their wives, and members of the Ladies' Auxiliary and their husbands.

Legion Hall will be open all

day to enable veterans to meet and re-fight the battles of at least three wars.

At Mayne the laying of wreaths will take place at 8.50 am. at the war memorial outside the church of St. Mary Magdalene.

Mayne Legionnaires will travel to Saturna for the parade at 11 am at St. Christopher's Church.

For the first time for some considerable years, there will be an Armistice Day Service, on Saturday, at Galiano. It will start at 10.45 a.m. Rev. O. L. Foster will come to Galiano for the service and it is hoped for a good turnout at the Church of St. Margaret of Scotland.

Week of November 5-11 is Remembrance Week and all veterans and others are urged to wear a poppy at this time in remembrance of the serving members of the forces who never came back and in aid of those who did and lived to suffer.

### DAVID LOTT BACK HOME AGAIN

Back to work in Ganges is Veterinarian David Lott this week.

Dr. Lott has spent several weeks in Ethiopia, to examine the stock-breeding practices of Ethiopian farmers. He was sent there by the Canadian government and will make his report to Ottawa.

It was not his first visit to Ethiopia, but on a previous occasion he was simply passing through, and saw little outside the capital city of Addis Ababa.

His strongest impression of the character of the country was the steepness of the grades used for farming. Hillsides are cultivated by an ox-team where it is difficult to understand how the animals can find a grip, he told DRIFTWOOD.

### IT'S LATER THAN YOU THOUGHT!

It's later than you thought! Nominations for school trustee close on Monday, Nov. 20. The date has been advanced this year since the spring session of the provincial legislature.

In previous years the nominations closed the last Monday of November. They now clamp down the second-to-last-Monday, said Mrs. Audrey Bridgen, returning officer, this week.

### CHANGE DATE AT MAYNE

A date has been changed at Mayne Island.

Planning is an island way of life. Salt Spring Island and Galiano have already produced plans. South Pender has approved an island plan.

On Saturday afternoon, Nov. 18, Mayne Islanders will be invited to hear a plan outlined by the Mayne Island Ratepayers Association. The date is now confirmed for November 18.

There has been a close similarity between the island plans so far revealed.



### GANGES IS CLOSED SATURDAY

Saturday, Nov. 11, will be a general holiday in Ganges. Stores and businesses will be closed while residents and workers mark Remembrance Day.

Government and school establishments will be closed on Monday, Nov. 13, to compensate for the loss of the Remembrance Day holiday and students will enjoy a special holiday on Monday for possibly the same reason.

### One more name down for election

One candidate has so far announced her plans to seek election to Gulf Islands School Board in December. She is Mrs. Bertha Matthews who has already served a two-year term.

Mrs. Matthews will stand for re-election in the Pender Island section of the district.

Neither the three other trustees whose terms expire in December, nor any newcomers have yet announced themselves.

Candidates have another 10 days to make the decision. Nominations close on Monday, Nov. 20.

### IT'S ONLY FIVE ACRES THERE

When a planning dispute arose on Gabriola Island recently reference was made to the alternative of restricting development to a five-acre minimum.

A number of southern Gulf Islanders asked why it should be set at five acres, when the local minimum lots size for new subdivisions is frozen at 10 acres.

During the federal election campaign one of the candidates was "Wild Bill" Matthews, of Gabriola. He explained that almost immediately after the introduction of the 10-acre ban Gabriola Islanders met for a planning discussion and decided to adopt an island community plan calling for a five-acre minimum lot size.

## DEDICATE CAIRN AT PETER ARNELL PARK

Despite pouring rain and heavy mist, a fair crowd attended the dedication of the memorial cairn in Peter Arnell Park on Sunday.

The cairn has been erected by the Corporation of B. C. Land Surveyors in memory of the late Peter Arnell, who was shot while surveying near the woods on Galiano in 1968.

The memorial looks out over the Strait with a commanding view of the Gulf Islands and the mainland mountains.

Former employer and partner Adrian Wolfe-Milner introduced the afternoon's ceremony with a brief tribute to Peter Arnell. He recalled that the tragedy of his death was magnified by the fact that he left a young widow and three small children.

T. E. Marcus recalled his association with the deceased through the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce. Peter had been particularly interested in the provision of parks on the island and in 1968 he and Peter Arnell, with Gavin Reynolds, had decided that an alternative to Mouat Park was needed. They had driven out to the present park site and made a survey of it.

Later, after his death on Galiano, Mr. Marcus had approached the provincial government and had gained their approval

for renaming the park, Peter Arnell Park.

Earlier this year, when the Chamber of Commerce had

gained a Local Initiatives grant for park development, the park's name was so impressed with the work carried out under Gavin Reynolds' supervision they had given a carte blanche approval to the development of the look-out.

Mr. Marcus recalled the pleasure he had derived from his brief acquaintance with Peter Arnell.

"I am younger for having known him," he told the assembly.

Bernard White, of Duncan, president of the Corporation of B. C. Land Surveyors, was introduced by Mr. Wolfe-Milner. He spoke of Mr. Arnell's background. He came from England and was engaged originally in mining survey work. After a time in eastern Canada, he decided that he would rather work above ground and when he came to Salt Spring Island to work with Adrian Wolfe-Milner, he was already commissioned as a B. C. Land Surveyor.

The provincial association of surveyors had decided to construct a memorial cairn in his honour, explained Mr. White, and it was his privilege to unveil it.

He hoped that residents and visitors using the park would recall their indebtedness to Mr. Arnell for the facility.

Ceremony was simple and brief and in less than an hour the group was dispersing.

GALIANO HUNTERS' PLEA  
OUTLAW SHOTGUNS FOR DEER

Integrated Plan is ready for presentation to Galiano Islanders on Saturday, Nov. 18, Galiano Chamber of Commerce was told on Wednesday.

It was the quarterly meeting of the Chamber in the Galiano Hall. Chairman was Frank Reader.

Secretary Mrs. Fred Robson read the minutes of the last council meeting for reference only, and it was noted that 60 answers were received in response to the first plan presented to the people.

Blacktopping recently carried out on the island was not satisfactory as it is rippling badly in some places, it was reported. Department of highways reports that this will be fixed as soon as the warmer weather comes again.

Steve Riddell reported on meetings held by the two planning committees on the island, the appointed committee and the Citizens' Committee. The integrated plan is ready for presentation to the people, he stated.

A vote of thanks was given to all who have worked so hard to draw up these plans for the future of the Island.

Publicity chairman Mrs. H. Knudson reported that there is a good supply of brochures on hand at this time.

Health and Welfare chairman Mrs. Clair MacAllister reported that she recently attended a conference at the University of Victoria, at which an interesting point was that a recommendation was made that the Federal Government develop community health centres and a larger role should be given to the smaller areas.

She also said that a large number of people are attending the first aid classes now in session at the Hall, under the direction of Dr. Hart Scarrow.

It was agreed that more public beach accesses were needed and this matter will be pursued further.

Mr. Reader then introduced Dr. James Hatter, Game Commissioner of B. C. from the Fish and Wildlife Branch, Vancouver.

Dr. Hatter said that he was pleased to be back on Galiano. Hunting is a form of recreation, said Dr. Hatter. To

those who do not hunt this means little, but it is meaningful to a lot of people.

"We must recognise that things are not like they used to be on Galiano, with the influx of people wishing to come over and build summer homes, and some subdivisions here now."

There are no predators on the island, and the hunters do no damage to the ecology of the area, he emphasized. If an area is closed to hunters, deer soon become tamer, and do more damage to gardens and crops.

Hunting is an effective way of keeping deer more wary, he noted.

"The transient hunter is the problem," he added, "the one who does not know the area as the Islanders do."

Islanders are not meeting a challenge by simply closing the whole island to hunting, said the speaker, and asked the meeting to hear recommendations made by the Rod and Gun Club.

He paid tribute to the Rod and Gun club on the island. They have one of the finest clubhouses for such a small group, and they have reason to be proud of it, he told the chamber.

Fred Robson, a director of the Rod and Gun Club, reported that a meeting had been held in the afternoon, with seven members, five of whom were chart-

er members. They had come up with some recommendations,

\* The Rod and Gun Club recommends outlawing of the shotgun for deer:

\* Hunting to be permitted north of the double-tower line, from Taylor Bay across the island to Montague Bay, and closed within one-half mile of subdivisions on the north side of the line:

\* They strongly recommend that a deputy officer be appointed to check off-island hunters and this as soon as possible.

Bob Knowles, who is a consulting Forester, spoke briefly, saying that it is a tragic mistake to prohibit hunting on an island which is largely forested, as long as the rights of those who do not wish to hunt are protected. He pointed out that deer are not an endangered species, and there should be a means of obtaining satisfaction to all without hurting anyone, as long as there is a framework within which to work.

Mr. Riddell said that he feels a complete closure of the island is not necessary, but restrictions are now necessary.

Mr. Riddell thanked Dr. Hatter for his observations on hunting on Galiano.

GANGES PROVINCIAL COURT

Jack D. Langdon, Ganges, was fined \$20 when he was found guilty of assault by Magistrate D. G. Ashby last week. He pleaded not guilty. Case arose over an incident in a Ganges hostelry.

Also appearing in Ganges Provincial Court, Robinson Arthur Woodley, Ganges, was fined \$50 or 14 days on each of two counts of possession of nar-

cotics. One count referred to hashish and the other to marijuana.

Christopher White, Ganges, was fined a total of \$60 as a result of driving off the road in an October fog. He was charged with driving without a licence. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$25 or three days. He also pleaded guilty to a charge of driving without due care and

attention and was fined \$35.

Abandoning a vehicle on the highway cost Michael John Heiden a \$10 fine. He was charged under the Highways Scenic Act and was found guilty.

Dorothy Sneddon, Ganges, paid a \$10 fine for a parking violation when she appeared before Judge Ashby. She pleaded not guilty and was convicted

## WE WILL REMEMBER THEM

On Saturday throughout the islands veterans of recent wars will gather to recall the highlights of long-fought campaigns. The same veterans will be taken back in mind to the men who fought and lost.

When the First World War ended, the optimists of the world described it as war to end all wars. Had the people of the western world lived by the slogan of the First War, other conflicts could not have taken place. But we did not remember them and we fought again.

In the light of today's morality we are frequently

reminded that war and taking of life are evil.

But in the light of yesterday's morality we recall the camaraderie and the fraternal virtues shown by the men who served and we know that once a man is committed to a life-and-death battle he is either more than a man or less than a man. All of us who served found that under strain of strife a man usually exceeds himself. And that is what the veterans remember when they quaff a drink on Remembrance Day. They remember the times when an ordinary Canadian boy showed himself indifferent to his own hurt or deprivation in a supreme effort to help his neighbour.

War is intrinsically evil. But the civilian soldier has so often proved himself essentially good under its evil restraint.

And that is why we remember them.

## HIS NAME WILL LIVE ON

Peter Arnell Park is part of the recreational facilities of Salt Spring Island. For as long as there is a Salt Spring Island there will be a Peter Arnell Park.

It is a small tribute to an islander who died four years ago in a Galiano wood. Peter Arnell was shot while working as a surveyor.

The death was sudden and the islanders lost a good friend. That he should be the victim of a hunting accident made the death the more tragic. But that he was a man who devoted his spare hours to the community he had chosen made the accident the more widely recognized.

Mr. Tom Marcus engineered the naming of Peter Arnell Park in his honour. It was a tribute to the memory of man who recognized the needs for parks.

Mr. Gavin Reynolds worked with his team of temporary park workers to make a look-out and a park.

The Corporation of B. C. Land Surveyors undertook the erection of a cairn in his memory and the community provided rocks to build the cairn.

On Sunday the cairn was dedicated by the president of the surveyors' corporation, Mr. Bernard White.

But we must bear in mind that this tribute was not made in token of the way Peter died. It was in honour of the way he lived.

## HOW CAN I ???

By Anne Ashley

Q. How can I soften up a stiffened chamois?

A. Rinse the chamois in two quarts of lukewarm water to which a teaspoon of olive oil has been added. If possible, dry it in front of an electric fan. This treatment will make the chamois quite soft and usable again.

Q. How can I keep my fingernail polish in prime condition?

A. If you keep your nail polish in the refrigerator when you are not using it, it will stay in better condition and can be used to the last drop.

Q. What is a good means of making candles burn longer and with less dripping?

A. Coat the candles, all but the wick, with soapsuds, and they will last longer and burn with no smoking or dripping. Allow them to dry in their holders before lighting them. Candles will also burn more slowly and without dripping if they have been stored in the refrigerator.

Q. What is a quick and easy way to brighten and freshen my rugs?

A. Put a little turpentine in a bucket of hot water, dip a broom into this solution, and go over your rug with gentle strokes. This not only brightens your rugs, but is a good moth preventive, too.

Q. How can I effect a home cleaning of some of my furs?

A. Even white furs can be cleaned by rubbing cornmeal

or warm, dry bran carefully into them, and then, after working the cleanser in thoroughly, simply shaking the furs out.

Q. How can I get rid of those long-time stains in my bathtub caused by dripping faucets?

A. A soap filled steel wool pad used with scouring cleanser usually does the trick. Mild rust stains also may be removed with a pumice stone. It leaves no scratches. A soft cloth, moistened with kerosene, is also a good remover of rust from enamel sinks and toilet bowls.

Q. How can I make the job of cleaning ashtrays easier?

You can save 25% to 50% on evening, night and Sunday calls which you dial yourself.

—There is a 25% discount on calls between 6 p.m. and 11 p.m. weekdays and 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. Sunday.

—There is at least a 50% discount on calls between 11 p.m. and 8 a.m. any night (maximum cost 23 cents per minute).

In exchanges where DDD is not yet available, calls that could otherwise be dialed direct will be handled by the operator at the customer-dialed rate.

### Operator Handled Calls

The three minute minimum charge remains in effect on calls placed through an operator.

Calls placed by an operator will cost more than a comparable call you dial yourself.

There is a 25% discount on overtime charges only (each minute in excess of the initial three minutes) on operator-handled calls from 6 p.m. to 8 a.m. weekdays and all day Sunday.

Calls made from hotel telephones, coin telephones, radio telephones, and toll stations; calls made to Zenith numbers and calls charged to credit card numbers will be rated as operator-handled calls. There is no longer a 25 cent surcharge for collect calls, calls charged to a third number and calls where the operator is asked to report back with time and charges.

### NOTE:

The three-minute charge and the existing rates will be retained for customer-dialed calls between the following communities:

Bowen Island-West Vancouver, Haney-Port Coquitlam, North Vancouver-Whalley, Port Coquitlam-Whalley, Agassiz-Chilliwack, Bowen Island-Deep Cove, Whalley-Whytecliff, Bowen Island-North Vancouver, Bowen Island-Vancouver, Christina Lake-Grand Forks, Grand Forks-Greenwood, Whalley-West Vancouver, Castlegar-Trail.

All operator-handled calls between these points including person-to-person calls will be charged at the new rates.

### CALLS TO MOST POINTS IN CANADA, OUTSIDE B.C.

The Canadian Transport Commission has approved a new rate structure for calls between B.C. and most other points in Canada.

The new rate system is similar to that approved for B.C. Tel's operating territory. The only differences are:

—There is a 30% discount on customer-dialed calls placed between 6 p.m. and *midnight* weekdays and from 8 a.m. to *midnight* on Sunday.

—There is a 50% discount on customer-dialed calls placed between *midnight* and 8 a.m. any day. (Maximum cost 30 cents per minute.)

—These discounts apply on overtime charges only on operator-handled station-to-station calls.

—No discount is applicable on person-to-person calls at any time.

### NO CHANGE IS PROPOSED AT THIS TIME IN RATES FOR CALLS TO POINTS OUTSIDE CANADA.

## Sunny and dry in October

October on Mayne Island was fine and sunny, reports W. W. Hunt-Sowrey, Weather Observer at Mayne.

Total precipitation for the month amounted to 1.50 ins. Total precipitation to date is 24.34 ins. There was precipitation on six days.

In 1971, month's rain was 1.8 ins, and the 1971 rain to that date was 24.64 ins. with rain on 13 days.

The rainfall given is actually more than fell in the month, as the day for observation purposes is from 8 a.m. to 8 a.m. There fore we had to include 0.45" which actually fell on Nov. 1, as the rain did not begin until after midnight.

The month proved to be a record one for sunshine. Actual sunshine hours are not recorded at this station, but 17 days were recorded as sunny, which means that the cloud cover was never in excess of 25%, and the sun shone most of the day.

Fog and/or heavy mist was recorded on eight days, but September and October always have fog or mist, in part due to the slash burning season.

White frosts were recorded on two days, and on the 30th, the sunrise temperature was 29 deg F, the first recorded frost this fall...a little earlier than usual.

As usual, at the end of October, the ground is not yet saturated, so water can still be a problem. There was no thunder or hail.

## NO WAY OUT FOR RAIN OR

Depressing months for a group of Ganges businesses start with the fall. At the foot of Ganges Hill the Gulf Islands Florist and Handicrafts collects the winter rains from the run-off.

On the opposite side of the street Driftwood stationery store and Mod'n Lavender collect the run-off from the other side of the hill.

In addition to an excess of water, the stores at the foot of the hill stand on a narrow section of street, deliberately narrowed by the department of highways in an ineffective effort to control the water from the hill.

Slippery roads introduce a further hazard from the acute danger of pedestrians slipping on the tarmac ridge on each side of the road.

In the past islanders using the stores at the foot of the hill have made a U-turn at this point, but the RCMP have recently cited the Highways Act which forbids a U-turn at this point.

The resurfacing of Salt Spring Island roads was a benefit to all islanders, agrees Eller Timbers of the florist shop, but she feels it was done in this particular section at the expense of the businessmen and property owners.

The effect of the work on the highway has been to create hazardous pedestrian walks and irregular sidewalks with dangerous hazards.

### A GASTRONOMIC TOUR OF FRANCE

From the journal of Ione V. Guthrie  
With illustrations by Caroline Hamilton

#### Hossegor - Longon

We left the mountains for good yesterday, slowly losing altitude as we approached the flat coastal plain which borders the Atlantic and continues at least as far north as Bordeaux.

A fat, rich region of France, with magnificent forests, many of sweet chestnut in flower, and even the occasional magnolia, huge trees that appear to be wild. From the palms, figs, and even bananas, we gathered this must be a pretty mild climate.

The incredible richness and variety of French agriculture are a constant surprise, far more varied than California, for instance.

At noon we visited Lourdes, still in the foothills of the Pyrenees. Not so colorful as when I was here in 1958, for most of the religious orders have given up their medieval habits, and of course, the religious are great visitors to this shrine.

However, crowds still poured past the statue of Our Lady in her grotto, and we joined the queue to collect some holy water, in a pill bottle, for a Roman Catholic friend at home.

The church built on top of the shrine is very large; in fact three stories high, with a dim crypt and many worshippers. It is difficult to comment on Lourdes, except to say that it is obviously tremendously important to the pilgrims who come to see the famous grotto, and spend their money on all sorts of garish religious mementoes in the town.

#### Lost at Bayonne

We approached the Atlantic coast near Bayonne, and promptly got lost trying to avoid the mass of harbours, railways and resorts which crowd this corner of France so close to the Spanish border.

On the right road to Hossegor at last, we found this to be one of a string of resorts which I suppose continues right round the French coast.

Here, the actual villages are set back some distance from the sea, because the beach, endless miles of it, is backed with rolling sand dunes. This

is a happy place, entirely devoted to holiday visitors. Considering the hordes of people here - quite as congested as the Mediterranean, but not so smart - we were very lucky to find a room on our second try, for the magnificent sum of 25 francs, about \$2.50 each.

It was after five when we found our way to the beach, which was still packed with people as far as the eye could see. And there was the booming Atlantic, with real waves, exhilarating to plunge into, and almost as warm as the Mediterranean.

A late dinner at our modest hotel reminded us of the inter-

I was on the point of removing it and presenting it to Madame, but Caroline sensibly suggested that if we kept it turned off, and the door locked, perhaps we should avoid any misadventures.

We have had a very lazy day on the beach, swimming and sunbathing, and eating and drinking when the spirit moved. First, citron presse, that lovely

fresh lemonade, then crepes with sugar and Grand Marnier. Wonderful to watch the skill with which the batter is spread lace thin on the iron griddle. Finally the sort of ice cream concoction I haven't eaten since I was a child. Mine was

A great armchair exercise in the District is criticizing the Regional Board. The Regional Board isn't perfect. No such body is. And criticism, if founded upon knowledge of the subject, is never remiss, especially if constructive. But from the oft heard harangues which issued at meetings around here it is all too clear that most of the noise is made by people who know least, or anything, about it.

That was made clear at a joint meeting of the Metchosin and Albert Head Ratepayers last week held so that members of the public could examine and discuss a recent proposal on land distribution drafted by the Regional Board.

After listening to several inane statements which had nothing to do with the meeting--but plenty on the alleged ills

of the board, one clear minded man got up and said that one fact should be recognized: the board exists whether you like it or not, or if you think it's legal or not. It was also pointed out that there are 18 such boards in the province and that no one had a vote on bringing them into being as they are children of the provincial government.

It might be wise to make an effort to find out a few answers before yelping in public lest many other people discover how unenlightened you are. If it takes three or four years before you begin to wonder what happened to a regional study then you couldn't have been very interested in the first place.

Board directors are humans like anyone else, whether they are good at the job or not. And they respond like humans. If you want to be heard why not write a courteous letter explaining your situation and ask to be heard. When appearing, again be courteous. Waving a club isn't going to endear you to anyone. If you haven't tried it, maybe you should. Maybe

ice cream smothered in marrons soaked in rum, and blanketed in whipped cream. What debauches, and no wonder I'm getting so fat!

A quiet afternoon nap followed, and then back to the beach for a late afternoon swim. It is comparatively cool here, air temperature 72 degrees, sea 68. By this afternoon it was quite breezy, and the surf up considerably. In fact I had never swum in such waves, although Caroline says they were nothing compared to Barbados. We made the most of it, for this was our last swim in France.

We shall be sorry to leave Hossegor, which reminds me of Carmel, California, all sand and pines. There are all sorts of shady villas, where it would be pleasant to spend a longer holiday.

We had to eat at our hotel tonight, an undistinguished meal, except that it leaned towards the east rather than the west: sausage and goose liver pate of Gascony, and confit d'oie, the roasted meat of the superfatted geese which are used to make pate de foie gras. Very rich and tasty. A good Bordeaux red to go with it; even an undistinguished Bordeaux is a treat to us poor benighted Canadians.

**Longon**

Last night I had a dream. I plunged a dagger into the map of France. It landed on Longon and out poured not blood but wine, sauternes and Graves to the south, Medoc to the west, St. Emilion cognac before and armignac behind. So here we are in Longon, nearly in the centre of the riches of Bordeaux.

We were in no hurry to leave Hossegor, and were delighted that there was a fullblown market filling the main streets - china, glass, shoes, clothes, and two large covered buildings filled with fruit, flowers, vegetables, meat, and the bounteous fruits of the sea. What rich-

es the French have! No wonder Canadian food seems so dull in comparison!

We tore ourselves away at last, and had an easy day's drive to Longon. We travelled through Landes, a comparatively lonely region of France.

Although we were miles inland, the soil was nothing but sand, presumably blown in from the Atlantic dunes through endless ages of time. At the end of the eighteenth century the whole region was planted to pine trees, which evidently thrive on this thin dirt. As a result there are all sorts of forestry operations, the making of turpentine, paper, lumber and so on.

The only edible products of the region are birds and small game, which turn up in the menu as pates and terrines of various sorts.

On the way to Longon we passed through Roquefort, and were assailed by a powerful smell - cheese making? or a nearby pulp mill? Whatever, milk is sent from all over the country to make the famous cheese, which is matured in underground caves at an even temperature of 46 degrees. The blue veins are achieved by sprinkling the milk curd with mouldy breadcrumbs. The cheese is very expensive, even in France.

**Gastronomic Paradise**

Our hotel at Longon has a reputation as a gastronomic paradise; but I have to admit that in retrospect Bordelaise cooking is definitely not for me. We sat in charming surroundings outside under the plane trees, and the service was first class. But the meal was simply overwhelming.

Three kinds of pate, one ham, one meat, and brandade de morue, the last a thick creamy mixture of pounded cod, garlic and oil; followed by snails Bordelaise, small and strong tasting in a very rich meaty sauce, something like oxtail stew, and not a patch on the fat snails of Burgundy in garlic butter; and steak and green beans.

We were truly flummoxed by the sheer quantity put before us. Of course, the whole point of eating in the Bordeaux region is to choose something to go with the splendid wines. Since this was our only night in the area, I had half a bottle of sauternes for an aperitif, and it was gorgeous, deep yellow, heavy and sweet. It makes a travesty of the thin anaemic, Canadian concoctions which are sold under the name. Our dinner wine was a local claret type; again, even a nameless red in such a region is well worth the drinking.

Longon, a drab little town, redeemed itself in our eyes by throwing its annual folklorique festival in the village square that night. There were dancers in vaguely Arlesienne costumes striped dresses, coloured aprons lace fichus, starched little head dresses, and mittens. They danced with tremendous verve and energy.

There was also the gymnastic class from the local school, the girls in red tights and the boys in white. Their families burst with pride as they flipped up and down and turned cartwheels. Longon also had a perspiring town brass band which played in the intermissions.

But what really stole the show was a tiny boy in yellow pants and a blue and white striped shirt - he couldn't have been more than two years old - who took the floor when no one else was there, and danced as though his heart would burst with delight, arms, hands, fingers waving, feet stamping, head thrown up to the coloured lights and the shimmering plane leaves, in pure, unpremeditated joy. He got a tremendous ovation from the crowd.

The nicest thing about this festival was that it was so local, definitely not staged for tourists. We were lucky to see it.

# Subdivisions Add Up To Planning Figure

Galiano Citizens Planning Committee met in the Galiano school, bright and early on Sunday morning, with president Basil Benger in the chair.

He welcomed members of the committee and those who came to see the committee in action, and take part in discussions.

Mr. Benger reported on the plans now drawn up for approval, by the joint sub-committee consisting of himself, Woody Coward and Reggie Brannan from this committee, with Miss Jean Lockwood, Mrs. Fred Robson and Steve Riddell from the appointed committee.

A rapid calculation on the blackboard made it clear that Galiano has already reached its target of population density. If all available land now subdivided is sold and built on it will represent population density of one person to six acres, he told the meeting. This is the figure established in the plan. Some members expect greater pressure to be brought on the Island for more subdivisions in the near future.

Reg Brannan was unanimously appointed vice-chairman.

It was agreed that there should be definite control on future park land.

"We all recognize the need for parks," said Woody Coward, "but we are concerned with flooding the Island with people. We generally feel that Islanders are not too keen on having a lot of outsiders."

Norman Russel pointed out that the predominating factor is the land that is available, and how long will it take "x" number of people on it before it wears out. It is up to islanders to ascertain the number of people to be on it.

There will be a public meeting in the Galiano Hall on Saturday, Nov. 18, to present to the public the draft plan drawn up by the joint sub-committee

for Galiano.

Next meeting of the Citizens' committee is at the call of the chair.
