Checking Lakes On Island

— FOR POLLUTION

New survey has been launched on Salt Spring Island. This time the survey is functional and has little direct bearing on planning.

The Greater Victoria Metropolitan Board of Health is carrying out a check on the various lakes on Salt Spring Island to ascertain the degree of pollution or effect of the steady increase in the island population.

The survey will be carried out by a group of students under the direction of Bruce Sinclair, of Victoria.

Three lakes are included in the program. They are Cush-eon Lake, Stowell Lake and St. Mary Lake.

PERSONABLE POTATOES

ANNUAL COUNTRY FAIR

Carrots of some length and potatoes with personality are part of the Country Fair planned by the Anglican churches on Salt Spring Island for Saturday.

For contestants 11 years old and under the vegetable classes are looking for the longest carrot and the best looking potato. If the potato looks like Wayne Cooper, it's a sure winner says the sponsor of the contest.

The carrots and potatoes do not have to be grown by the contestant, merely exhibited by him.

For older contestants, there is a home gardening class. These must be peas, carrots, beets or potatoes. In addition to contests there will be the stalls of goods of every kind, and entertainment.

The Country Fair is the successor to the Garden Fete which has been the annual project of island Anglican churchgoers for many years.

Once again it will be staged in the secondary school grounds at Ganges, from 2 pm to 4 pm.

FARM LAND RESERVE

LAND COMMISSION ACT REACHES ISLAND

Start has already been made on the designation of farm land on Salt Spring Island. Under the terms of the new and hotly contested Land Commission Act, all parts of the province must be designated for agricultural reserve land. Any land so designated will be retained for farm use and may not be subdivided for residential or other purposes.

On Monday evening the Salt Spring Island community made its first entry into the selection of farm land. A joint committee was formed by the Salt

FARM LAND PROJECT

NO HEARINGS ON ISLANDS

Public hearings in respect of agricultural land designations will be held in Victoria and not on the islands.

Director Marc Holmes told DRIFTWOOD this week that the hearings would not be brought to the islands, despite his urgings, because the Capital Regional District lawyers contend that it would not be legally possible to separate parts of the district for the purpose of such hearings.

"It's not a matter of choice," said Mr. Holmes, "It's not my choice and it's not the board's choice. The lawyers say we must."

All land designated for agriculture, under the new Land Commission Act, must be shown to the public, explained the Salt Spring Island regional director.

Subsequent public hearings will all be in Victoria, he revealed.

THREE CARS IN \$1,500 CRASH

Driver was charged with driving without due care and attention following a three-car accident on Fulford-Ganges Road last week in which one car was completely wrecked. Total damage was estimated at \$1,500.

On Tuesday, July 17 Greg Molnar, of Ganges, was driving south on Fulford-Ganges road when his car went out of control and struck the left rear of the car travelling north and driven by Mrs. Marie Hull, Lower Ganges Road. The Molnar car rolled over and slid into the car driven by Mrs. Hull's husband, Don Hull. The Molnar car then rolled into the ditch, according to RCMP.

Damage to the Mrs. Hull car amounted to about \$300 and to the car driven by Mrs. Hull and to Mr. Hull's car, it was estimated at \$1,000. The Molnar car was a complete write-off, and he was taken to Lady Minto Hospital, suffering from lacerations to the scalp. He was the only person hurt.

Molnar was charged and will appear in court. Where the police consider that the offence is more serious than to merit the issue of a traffic violation report, the driver can be charged in court, RCMP explained.

Already in the election race is Jim Wilkinson. The incumbent Director Marc Holmes has not announced his plans.

GRINNING THROUGH HIS WORKS

Grey Campbell never stays for long. That's one of the chores of publishing books on a large scale. When Grey was publishing one or two books in a year and the returns were grim and the pressures were low, you could always have a chat with him.

Today, he has a score of books on the go and he is up to his eyebrows in colour plates. He drives his camper through Ganges and runs into DRIFTWOOD. With one hand he fans through the sample colour

plates to be part of his latest and most ambitious of all books Wild Flowers of British Columbia, by Lewis Clark. The other hand is ruffling the few strands of hair he hasn't worried away years since.

Mind you, any other publisher would be out of his mind by the time he had run ragged getting adequate support for the publication of his newest tome. There is no question but that Wild Flowers will be one of the outstanding productions of the coast in years. It is undoubtedly authoritative and it has few challenges.

Dr. Clark is an artist with a camera as well as an authority on provincial plants. He has shot over 500 colour pictures for the book and his colour work is that of an expert. In 20 years I've seen Camp-

bell enthusiastic, but this book has had him running in full circles for so long he may never get back down to earth.

The other 30 or so books were part of the life, selling books. This is the No. one on his list. And if I had to foot the colossal bill for printing those colour plates it would be my last, as well. The book is

planned for this fall to sell at \$25. Special collector's edition sells for \$170.

There's a lot of book and a lot of colour pictures and a lot of work still remaining for the Sidney publisher on this one presentation.

And the odds are he'll still be grinning when the book has receded into repeat orders. —F. G. R.

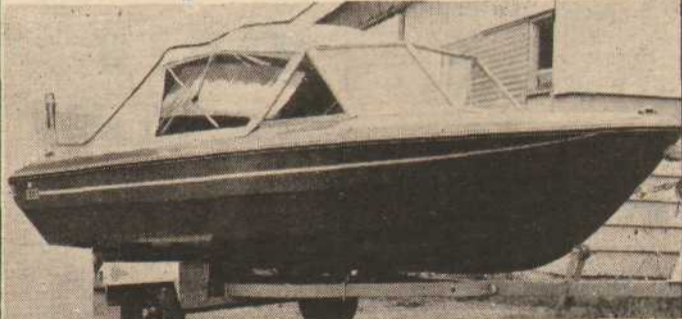

Recently I wrote a letter. I mailed it to a friend in Sidney whose address is very familiar to me. I know his house, because I lived across the road from him for some years. I know the name of the street for the same reason. I was not aware of the precise manner of address for postal purposes. One letter was duly received by him, and acknowledged. The other came back to me, marked "Insufficient address." Over the years I have enjoyed a good experience of most postal services, particularly in view of the fact that I have been associated with the mailing of thousands of items each week for many, too many years. But the service offered by some post offices is outstanding. I had the name of a friend but no address some years ago and I addressed a letter to the name of the recipient, "in the street of the Palace Theatre" and the name of the French town. I had a reply in no time at all. That was the postal service in France. Then I look at Doidge's Annual, printed in Plymouth, Devon, in 1915. It explains that, due to the war there are only four deliveries of mail daily in Plymouth, at 7 am, 11 am, 3 pm and 7.30 pm. So, things have fallen off in the last 60 years! But when you think about it, ven prof reeding was bttr in 1915?

Trouble with salmon derbies is that with the price of fish going up like it is, you need an armoured car to take your catch home.

Only real problem with watching the Watergate Theatre on television from the United States is the secret suspicion that if the majority of us had been placed in just that position, with the same opportunities and the same motivations we would probably be facing just the same trying tribunal. Victor and Vivienne Menzies of Pender Island are a long way from the lands which suffer constantly from the inroads of leprosy, but they are close to the problem. NOT AS A VILLAGE

Whether we like it or not, we are growing up in the islands. Biggest island in the Gulf group, Salt Spring is growing up the fastest because it is the biggest.

With growing up comes the threat of responsibility. Like a boy in his teens, Salt Spring Island looks to the future with misgivings punctuated with regret at having lost the lighthearted days of youthful freedom.

That's us!

When Mr. W. M. Mouat suggested to the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce the other day that islanders should give some thought to incorporation, he was looking to the day when the island must accept responsibility for its own future.

We have the provincial government. Its department of municipal affairs looks after the interests of the islands in their relation to the rest of British Columbia. We have the Capital Regional District. But that authority is concerned with all of the region and sees the islands solely as a small part of the whole.

There are two barriers to incorporation: one is lethargy and the other is fear. Most islanders look at incorporation with the strong suspicion that taxes already climbing steadily will soar. Trouble is, they may be right. There is a considerable faction on all the islands more fearful that the isolation of insularity might bring about a fighting administration that would be constantly torn by conflict.

The provincial government has hinted at a hike in the mill rate for unorganized territory. For many years this rate has been pegged at 10 mills. If the province were to boost the rate to 15 mills, then there would be a new line of thinking. There would be no question but that self-government would not only be more desirable, it would be cheaper.

When this comes about, let us not look to the incorporation of part of Salt Spring Island. Establishment of a village around Ganges with a possible district municipality around it later would only lead to friction in the years to come. The only form of incorporation which will ensure future harmony is district incorporation of Salt Spring Island as one unit. Like boys, incorporated areas are in constant conflict. Big boys live more harmoniously than little boys. Municipalities likewise. Let's not get small about this matter when it comes up. And inevitably it will!

ILLOGICAL MURDER

Whether the hangman is an agent of God or of Conservative vengeance has not yet been fully threshed out in Ottawa. This week one spokesman for Death commented that we are more concerned about the murderer than his victim. He is wise or he obviously would not be in Ottawa, but his logic is of the schoolroom. Your publication is, or should be responsible though, responsible to the decent, working people who support our society against whom slams such as this are aimed.

I would like to offer the following comments.

The deer harvest on Vancouver Island last season had not been so low since the early 50s, needless to say there are over twice the deer hunters now. The incidents involving cougars attacking people, pets and livestock are reaching record numbers. The reason why is simple. Their natural food supply is reaching exhaustion, due largely to poor management on the part of the Fish and Game Branch. No one wants to see the cougar or any other predator extinct, but maintaining a high population of them is senseless. Without deer cougars will not survive.

The cougar presently on Salt Spring Island made 16 known kills in one three-week period, plus an unknown number of un-found kills. These kills comprised of one goat, one ram sheep weighing over 200 pounds two lambs, four ewes, five fawns, and three doe deer, one rare fallow doe carrying young. Only the fawns were eaten. Farmers are paid no compensation for predator kills. The Fish and Game Branch presently employs no predator hunter or hounds on Vancouver Island.

He indicated that another MLA whose riding includes more northerly Gulf Islands, had voiced similar objection and I certainly have the feeling that the Minister himself feels that this is a province-wide policy which is not appropriate in most instances in the Gulf Islands.

While I regret this latest instance of lack of follow through by the Minister of Municipal Affairs, Mr. Lorimer, I am still hopeful that the wishes of the majority of Gulf Island residents will be recognized and respected by the Highways Department itself.

EMERGENCY AID

Editor, Driftwood,

I would like to make a comment regarding the near-tragedy of the Howland youngster last week.

The local Fire Department now owns an "E. and J." Resuscitator, through the foresight of the Fire District Trustees. This equipment differs basically from an "Inhalator" by reason of the fact that it can mechanically apply artificial respiration as one of its functions. It can also be used as an Inhalator by a very simple one hand adjustment. The pressures that are involved are factory set and are not adjustable. It can be used with complete safety on a new born baby or a 300-pound man.

When discussions were being held regarding the purchase of this equipment, it was noted that if one life was saved it would have more than proved its worth. I think it has proved its worth in this case.

It must be remembered however, that there is no magic in this or any other similar piece of equipment. Time is of complete importance. Mouth-to-mouth resuscitation should be learned and some other means of artificial respiration should be known and applied until medical or other help is available.

In the 16 and under class, Jeremy Hope won a rod and reel for a ling cod.

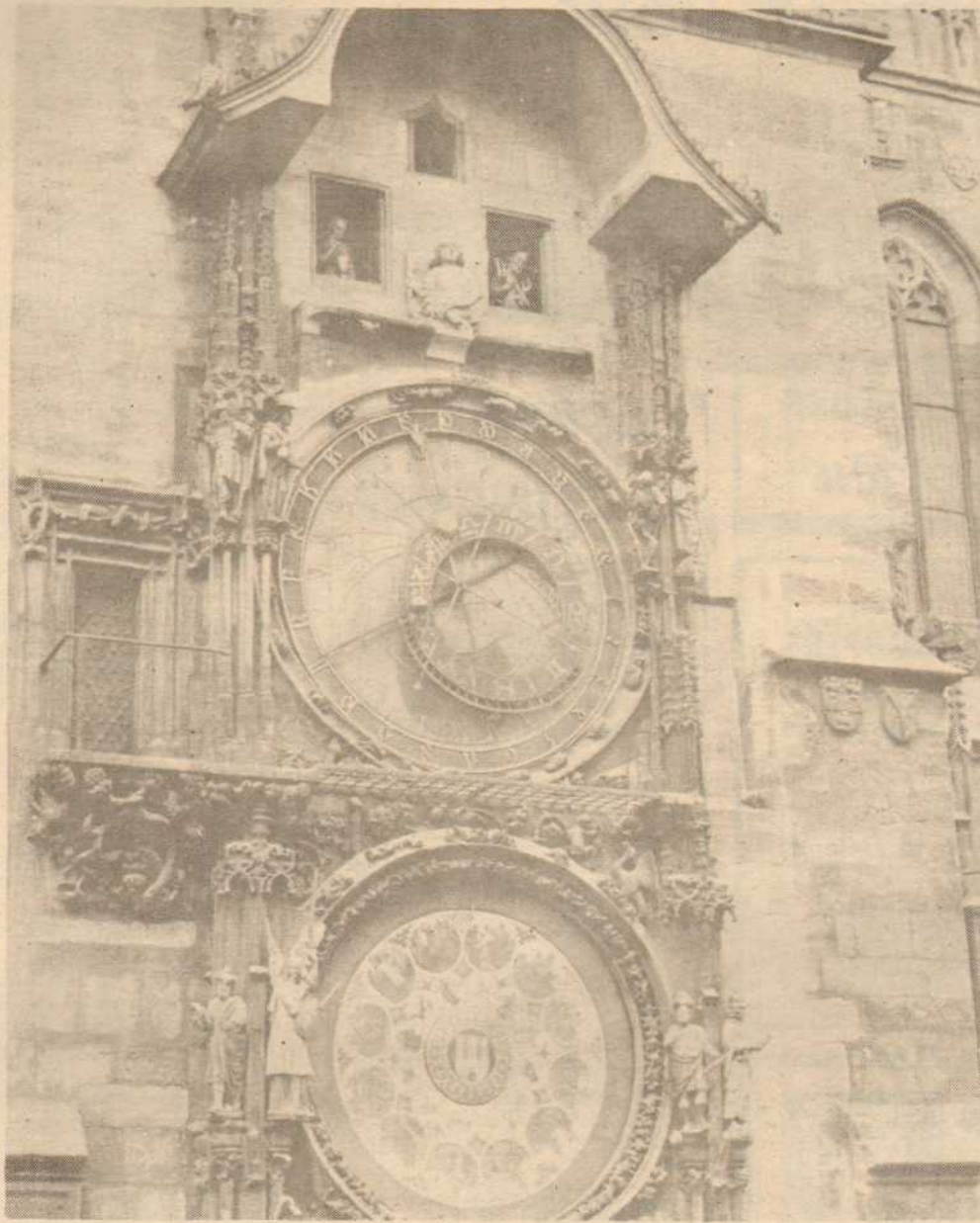
First draw prize of \$20 was won by Lorne Silvey, of Powell River; second \$5 by Leonard Hanson, Sidney.

OLD TOWN CLOCK IN PRAGUE'S OLD TOWN



MAKER WAS BLINDED TO GUARD SECRET

One of the tourist attractions of central Europe is the astronomical clock that faces onto the Old Town Square in Prague, the capital of Czechoslovakia.

The present clock is a reconstructed model of the old one which was damaged by fire at the tail-end of World War II and which pre-dated the birth of Christopher Columbus. Astronomical clocks were fashionable in those days and the Prague city council commissioned Master Hanus, an esteemed technician of the time, to construct this one. He succeeded so well that his clock soon became the talk of Europe.

According to legend, the city councillors, concerned that Hanus might build a better and bigger clock for some other city, had him blinded. Friends found him home in bed one morning in a state of fever, his eyes cauterized. The blinded man later asked to be taken before the clock where, after a moment of contemplation, he reached inside and stopped it. Years went by before anyone could be found to get it running again.

The clock is in two parts, an upper section showing movements of the sun and moon and time of day, and a lower part showing days of the week,

months of the year and signs of the zodiac. Visitors to Prague today gather to watch the clock strike the hour, when small doors at the top open and statuettes of Christ and the Apostles appear in succession while one of the carved figures on the side, Death the Reaper, tolls the passing of time.

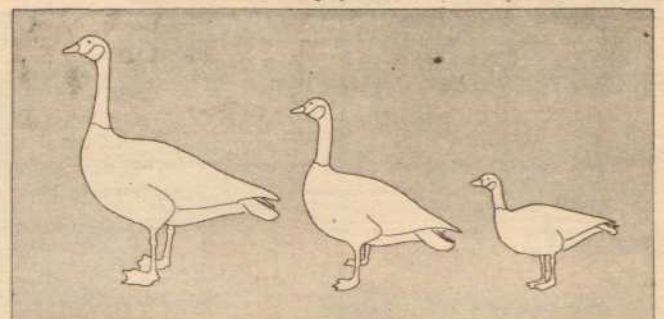
Several readers recognized the late manufacturer of the Winch's "Grand Duke" cigar.

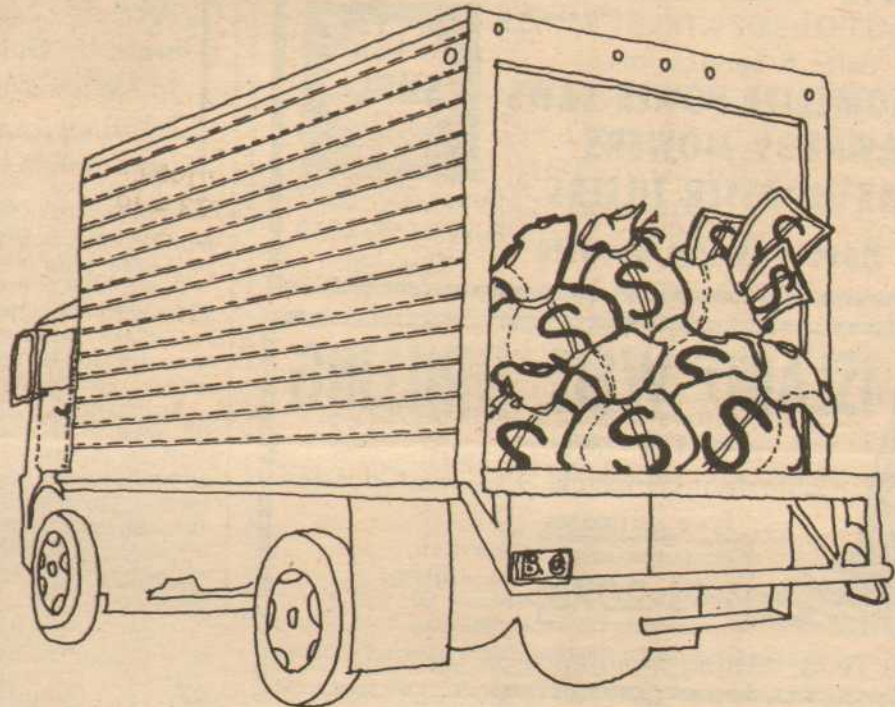

KEEP GRASS DOWN TO KEEP GRASS UP

The purpose of mowing is not merely to keep down unsightly growth, but rather to build up a vigorous, fine, strong grass. The secret in mowing is to keep the blades long enough to prevent the roots being starved, but short enough to be attractive to those passing-by your home. The height should not vary a great deal.

The greenskeeper's rule is to mow often, but not too closely. In this way excess leaf-growth is prevented, fertilizer loss curtailed and the menace of weeds, insects and coarse grass is reduced. The grass assumes a dwarf habit and the production of extra shoots is stimulated.

How many times should you mow a lawn - this neighbours depends on the type of lawn you want. If you want a golf course type of lawn then it should be mowed twice a week when the grass is vigorously growing in summer. Once a week is recommended in spring, autumn and under drought conditions.

If you mow your lawn just when you feel like it, and the grasses are actively growing producing a large quantity of leaf and you decide to "chop" it down, it will shock the grass and reduce its vigour. Make grass cutting a "ritual", your lawn will love you for it.

RESIDENTS ASK FOR BAN

Restriction on commercial fishing of crabs in Fulford is imminent.

Two agencies have protested the commercial taking of crabs in the harbour since the depletion of stocks over the years. At one time Fulford Harbour was a notable source of the crustaceans.

A petition has been taken up by Tim O'Donnell and others, asking for a commercial ban. Regional Director Marc Holmes has also pressed for such restriction. Department has been asked to impose a total ban or a restriction on traps for at least two years.

Plea has gained the sympathetic support of fisheries department personnel here. District Superintendent at Nanaimo G. W. Whinsby and E. W. Armstrong at Duncan have both offered their support and have recommended support of the petition to the coastal fisheries supervisor at Nanaimo, J. H. Hourston.

HOW CAN I???

By Anne Ashley

Q. What causes stickiness in an iron when pressing?

A. Too much starch, improperly rinsed clothes, or dirt on the bottom of your iron will cause sticking. If it's the bottom of your iron that's at fault, rub with a damp cloth when cool, and polish with a dry cloth. For stubborn cases, use silver polish, or run the iron over table salt spread on waxed paper. In the case of rayons and other synthetic fabrics, too hot an iron will cause sticking.

Q. How can I accomplish a fast, neat, and painless leg shave with a blade razor?

A. By moistening your legs first with hand cream, and then shaving. No lathering or rinsing is needed, and the skin remains softer, with fewer nicks.

Q. How can I keep cheese from drying out?

A. Grandmother's method is still good today -- wrap the cheese in a cloth dampened with vinegar.

Q. How can I recondition my furs?

A. Professional treatment is best, but if you wish, you can try this: Wet the fur with a hairbrush, then brush against the nap. Hang in the air until dry, and beat lightly with the right side

of a rattan. Finally, comb the hair out carefully into place.

Q. How can I clean the bottoms of copper pans when I am out of copper polish?

A. Try pouring on some catsup, rubbing this well over the metal -- and the tarnish will vanish like magic!

Q. Can you suggest a recipe for an "unusual" kind of dessert to be served at some special event?

A. Try this: Put a spoonful of heated, prepared mincemeat on top of vanilla or coffee ice cream. Top this with a cube of sugar which has been dipped into lemon or rum extract, light a match to it, and you have a flaming dessert.

Q. How can I treat tarnished brass?

A. A lemon rind dipped in salt will remove most corrosion or tarnish from brass. The care and cleaning of other household metals is dealt with in my new book.

Q. What can I do about animal stains on my carpets?

A. Deal with these as soon as possible after they have occurred, by sponging with a solution of 1/2-cup of salt to a quart of water. Follow by sponging with a solution of one part ammonia to 20 parts water. Best results are achieved when soonest applied.

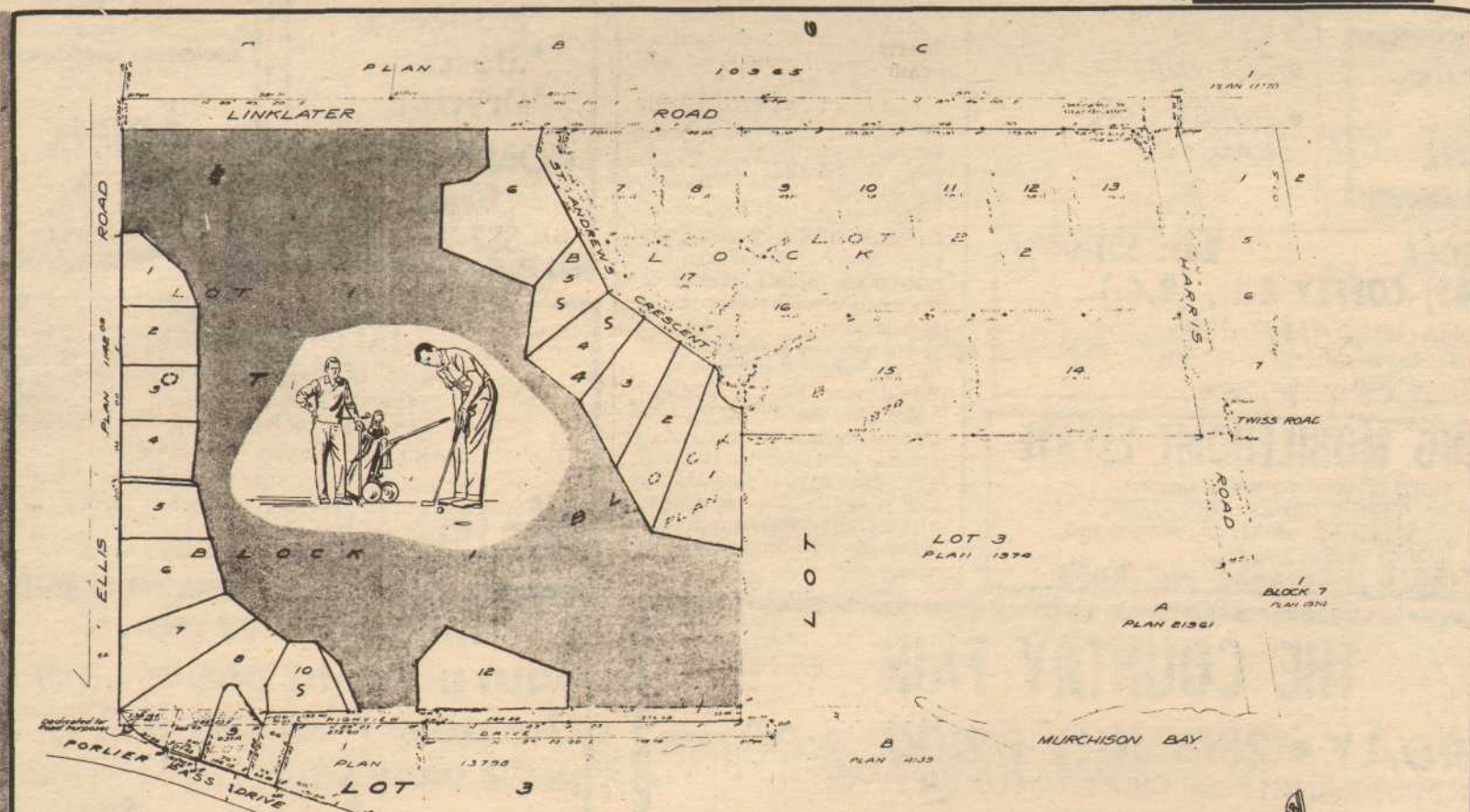

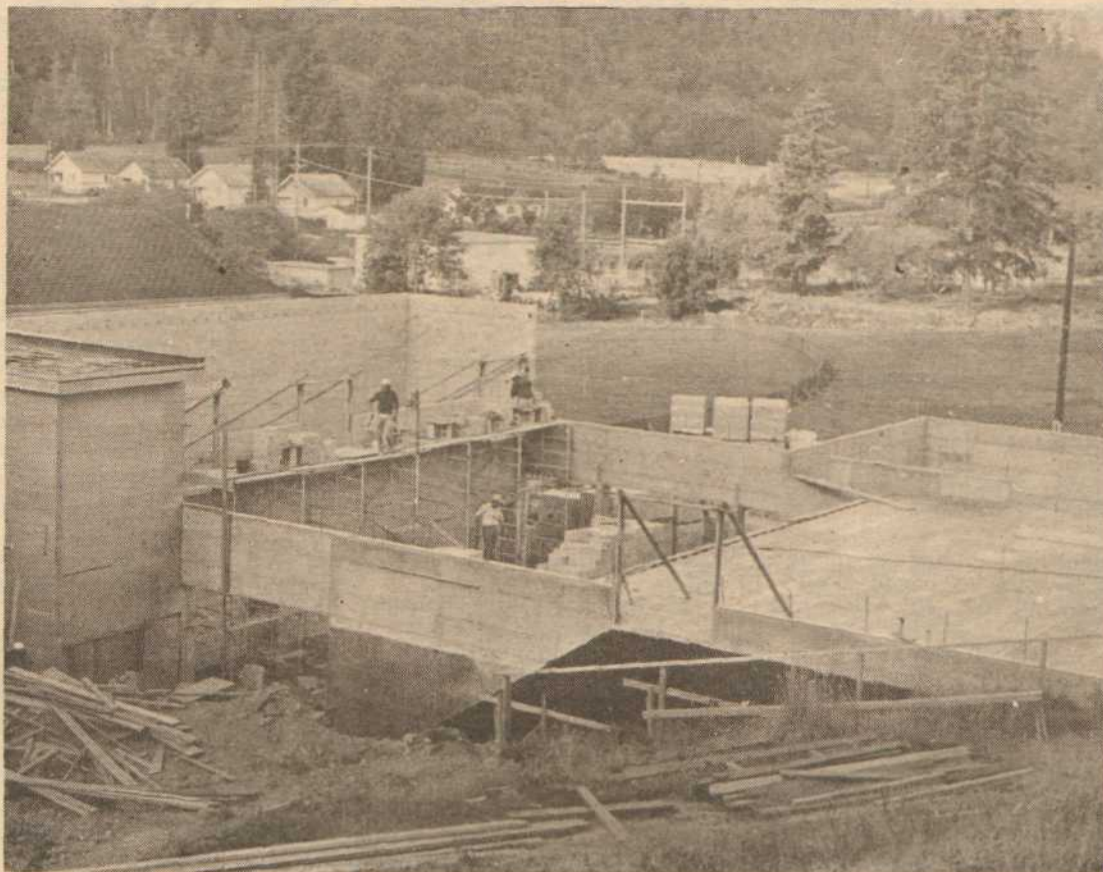

designation should be settled by an inspection on the ground by a qualified agrologist.

The committee also looked at irrigation with misgivings. It was recommended that the irrigation capacity of the land be excluded in view of the hazard to the domestic water supply posed by deep-well irrigation projects.

Committee will meet again on Thursday evening. The pressure is on the members to meet the deadline set up in the new act.

On Thursday Director Holmes will report back from the Capital Regional Board and on the board's reaction to the committee's policy recommendations.

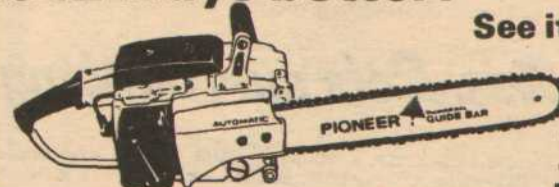
