Walker Hook Sale Stopped

- COURT UPHOLDS BAN

Sale of Walker Hook Place lots has been stopped again. Last summer the sale was stopped by provincial Superintendent of Insurance, E. T.

Cantell. Mr. Cantell ruled that the lots could not be sold on the grounds that permits to build on them could not be obtained.

Greater Victoria Medical Officer of Health, Dr. J. L. M. Whitbread had refused permits to construct septic tanks or to drill a well on the quarter-acre lots.

The developers had protested his action and Judge M. L. Tyrwhitt-Drake upheld the developers. The Crown then appealed his ruling and the Court of Appeal has set aside his judgment.

The subdivision was approved and registered in 1891. Lots are too small to meet requirements which did not exist at the time of subdivision.

Sparkling the drive to have the subdivision denied was Director Marc Holmes, of Fulford Harbour.

The coronation of the May Day queen will take place immediately after the parade of

ISLAND SCHOOLS AND ISLAND PEOPLE

Probe into every aspect of education is planned on Salt Spring Island on Saturday, May 25.

Sponsored by the Board of Trustees of Gulf Islands School District, the all-day debate will enquire into the philosophy of education as well as its practical aspects in terms of discipline, curriculum and the use of school facilities for other purposes.

The discussion is open to the public and will include teachers, trustees, parents, students and potential employers. Pensioners and long-haired youths will also be invited to take part.

Trustee Ione Guthrie will be chairman and a speaker from Vancouver, D. John Lynn, editor of Education, B. C. will give the keynote address.

In addition to an expression

of opinion by the participants, there will be a session of group discussions. Tables will be set up with a spokesman for each segment of the community, teacher, student, employer and others. The tables will then report back to the main meeting.

The islands have already been through the process of community participation in planning the future development of the islands. This is citizen involvement in the principles and the purposes of the community schools.

An application form appears on Page Five and readers wishing to attend may use the form or pre-registration.

The program starts at 9 am and continues through the day, with lunch served in the school.

Fifty Years of Ministry

On Sunday, May 20, Rev. T. F. Wright of St. Mary Lake, will celebrate the 50th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood of the Church of England in Canada, now known as the Anglican Church.

The ordination service was held in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, Ontario, where he had been ordained to the diaconate the previous year.

Mr. Wright was studying at Western University when the First World War broke out in 1914. Being a member of the militia he was immediately

called to serve. After a few months training he was sent overseas early in 1915 and did not return to London until 1919 to continue his studies. In the Second World War Mr. Wright joined the R. A. F. and served as a padre with the rank of Squadron-Leader until December, 1954.

He was based in England, Scotland and Germany during those years. After returning to Canada he served in the Peace River district before moving to Canmore, Alberta.

He retired to Salt Spring in late 1967.

HOSPITAL REPORTS ARE PRESENTED

INCREASE IN EVERY DIRECTION DURING 1972

Everything went up in 1972 at Lady Minto Hospital. There were more patients, more staff, more work and more hospital.

Annual reports presented last week at various islands showed an increase in every area, except births, which

were down.

Chairman Joan Purchase, of North Pender told the islanders that the hospital now enjoys the services of a radiologist, one general surgeon, one obstetrician and gynaecologist, one specialist in internal medicine, two psychiatrists, one

plastic surgeon, one ophthalmologist and one orthopaedist in addition to the active full-time doctors in general practice and two courtesy staff. There are also two dentists on the courtesy medical staff.

Miss Purchase reported that the board of management is

undertaking extensive changes to the kitchen to take care of additional meals.

The Capital Regional Board approved the sum of \$16,700 for this purpose and tenders will be called shortly.

During the past year new equipment has been installed,

including an emergency operating room stretcher and a post-operative recovery stretcher. In the laboratory are a flame photometer, blood bank refrigerator and a new microscope and other equipment.

Square dancers may obtain tickets from Al Brown at \$4 per couple.

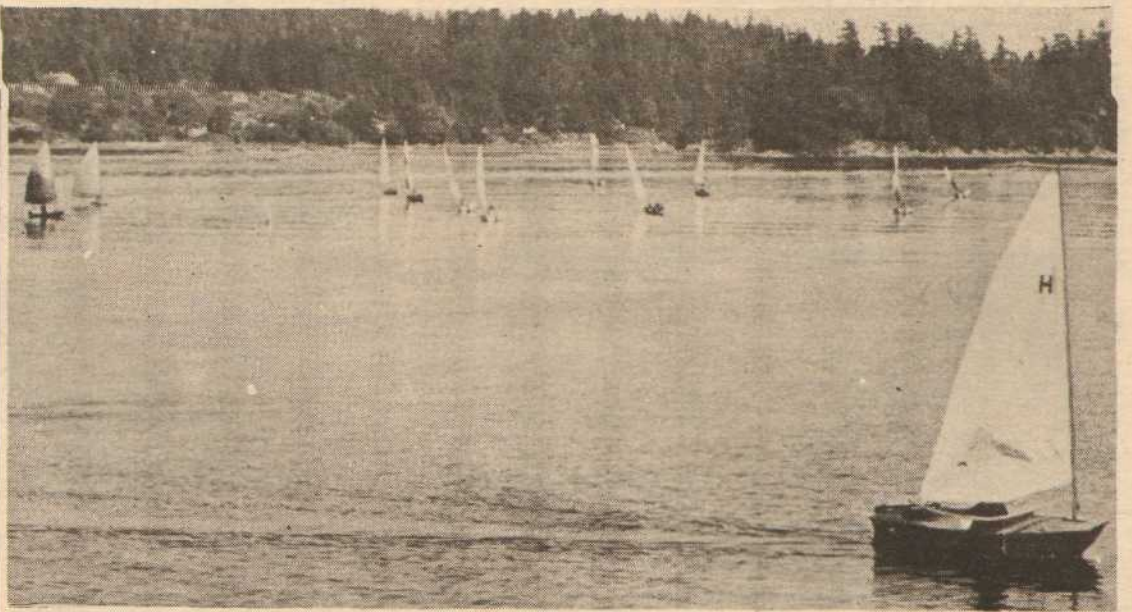

The overflow from a large sitting room, filled sunroom, dining room, a large hall and veranda. Flowers glowed and spring was busting out all over. So were parcels, cards and a sheaf of telegrams.

The Captain looked up at the next in the presentation line and lo! There was John Carcaud, second officer on the City of Victoria when MacPhail was captain.

In comradesly style the amazed man stammers, "The Devil's playing some trick on me!"

Without warning, the Carcauds had returned from Rhodesia to West Vancouver and hastened to the fray. Carcaud, 91, plans to make his 100, too. "Happy birthday, dear Captain! Happy birthday to you!" and with bulbs flashing and the crew at attention, the birthday boy cut his cake.

And what a cake! From Port Washington artist Joan Purchase No Pender Big Event is valid without one of her marvels.

Marion Kirk, Vancouver, with Pender parents, recalled "my grandfather, George Kirk, chief engineer, and my father, John W. Kirk, sailed with Capt. MacPhail on the City of Victoria. And the captain used to cruise Gulf Island waters with Charles Roope, Vancouver, on his 40 ft. yacht Kyang."

When action came, the misgivings went, commented Des Crofton.

Armed with a red cross on his uniform cap and a red cross on his haversack, the Torontonain padre went out into noman's land every time they were in action, bringing in the wounded recalled his former commanding officer.

Both had reminiscences of war.

The bishop referred to the day when Crofton was wounded lying dazed in the field hospital, his only concern was for his watch. He urged the padre to take it and look after it for fear he might lose it while unconscious.

On Sunday Crofton was wearing that same watch.

The meeting was not simply the greeting of old friends who had been through the heat of battle together. It was the return to his old regiment's home-ground of a popular padre. It is not simply his visit to his old C. O., either. Fighting Bob came back to meet as many of his old friends and acquaintances as he could. He met them in Victoria and in Chemainus and on Salt Spring Island. Some he hadn't seen for 50 years. There were many he didn't meet, but the visit was very short.

He soaked up the sunshine, because the summer is a little later in Newfoundland, where the sea around him was frozen when he left.

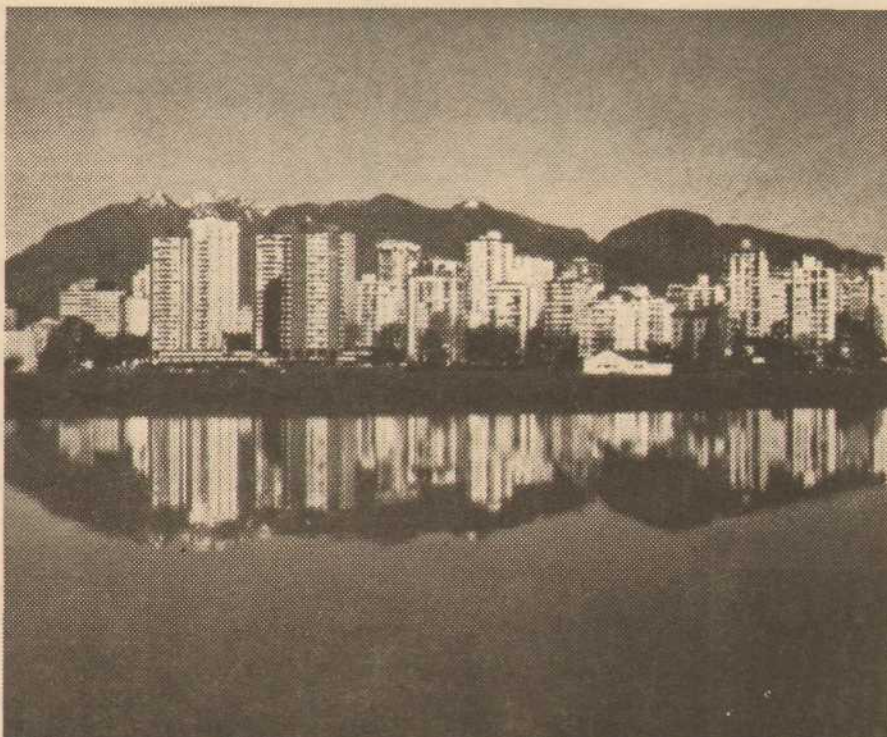

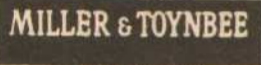
