LIONS AT SATURNA SATURDAY

There is now a Lions Club on each of the major Gulf Islands.

BY PROVINCE

New Islands Trust looming

Gulf Islands are popular this year.

Last week the provincial government published its new islands trust program for restricted development of the islands.

Municipal Affairs Minister James Lorimer has introduced the islands trust as a superin-

tendent standing over the islands, exerting new controls on construction and subdivision and not unlike an auxiliary regional district essentially concerned with planning and overriding most other legislation exerting any control on development.

The new program comes in the wake of the International Joint Commission's pressure on the federal government to swap the islands for Canadian domestic water for the American Point Roberts.

When the Islands Trust Act was introduced on Wednesday last week into the provincial legislature, Hugh Curtis, MLA for the Islands was prompt to challenge the clause which denied Islanders the right to appeal to the courts.

The minister was prompt to amend the restrictive clause.

New act is based on the recommendation of the Select Committee on Municipal Affairs which toured many coastal islands last summer. All matters relating to construction or subdivision will, under the terms of the new act, which is not yet in force, have to be approved by the trust committee. The new committee can reverse the ruling of the Capital Regional District, but that regional board may not take action in defiance of the trust committee.

Committee will include three general members, named by the provincial government and two local members for each island, elected by the islands communities in the November elections.

When a question arises concerning any island the general members and the two local members from the island concerned will meet.

Sawyer is Number one fisherman

Bill Sawyer is a fisherman. Last week he proved it. He lives on Tripp Road and operates a resort on St. Mary Lake and he fishes to prove it can be done.

At the week end he caught two bass in the vicinity of two and a half pounds each. They were the first of the season.

Ponchos can be dangerous. Last week Superintendent Cam Stewart told Gulf Islands school trustees of a freak accident at Lake Cowichan which nearly took the life of a young student. A small girl was playing on the slide in the school grounds when the bell went. She made to slide quickly down the outer edge of the slide when the cord at her neck caught the metal-work of the slide and jammed. Without a sound, she was swung off her balance and hung by the cord. It tightened round her neck and she was slowly strangling when a young teacher saw her. The teacher couldn't reach her and called the principal, who carried a pocket knife. He cut her down and applied artificial respiration. If the short teacher had stayed to try or if the principal did not carry a knife or if neither had had any knowledge of first aid the child would not have survived the accident, commented the superintendent. He cited the incident as justification for the call for at least one competent first-aid man in every school.

The world of television is filled with a series of very beautiful young men explaining how they manage to bear such lovely locks. Some use a masculine, stinking shampoo. One unfortunate uses a baby shampoo.

When the Second World War came to a close and all veterans were looking for an easy way to wear their hair long, but short in comparison with a later generation, I became a young industrialist. I was engaged with a few other youthful entrepreneurs in the manufacture and sale of cleaning agents. It was a successful business until, unfortunately, the oil companies withheld supplies of detergent from all but the larger soap manufacturers. We had it laid on the line that the new detergents were too profitable to be allowed to small operators and our small operation collapsed. We had been making and selling cleaning fluids much as

every housewife uses in the kitchen sink. We had also been making shampoo. Shampoo is nothing new. It is 200 years since the word came into the English language from India. It means a massage, usually of the scalp and the word refers to the massage, the soap or powder used and the whole operation. We made shampoo the same way everyone else makes it. You mix detergent with water. This washes all the grease out of the hair. Then you add lanoline to put some grease back into the hair. Then you add perfume to convince the user that it is a fine product. Then you add reams of nonsense about how it helps hair and nourishes hair and grows hair. And it is nonsense. I made shampoo and I sold shampoo many years ago. You know how I wash my hair? I use soap.

Bouquets were falling from the skies at Fulford. When Mrs. G. A. H. Baxter received a bunch of artificial flowers the donor was a seagull. Mrs. Baxter looked a little sideways at the gift which the seashore bird had possibly pinched from a cemetery.

It was a good strike while it lasted and now the mail is moving again there are all kinds of bills coming in again. Best part of it was the offers of help last week to get Driftwood out. The Outer Islands went by school trustees. Trustees after the meeting on Wednesday afternoon grabbed Driftwood and sped home. The other good thing about it was the cheerful aspect of local postal staff faced with nothing to do except listen to beefs about the mail strike.

While the mail was a-missing there were lots of people making phone calls. The phone was too busy and the calls were hanging fire. It's grim and the phone is so often on the blink, but during the strike you couldn't shoot the phone company. It wouldn't be possible to gear the phone service to the need when other communications are out.

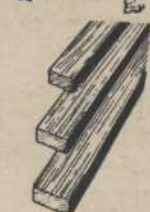

REINDEER TESTS NEW GROUND FOR RESIDENTS



When the garden fertilizer manufacturer, Reindeer Schuitema, came to Salt Spring Island a week ago, he was all set for a busy afternoon. The manufacturer brought two members of his staff to assist with soil sampling while he was located at Fernwood Store

From 12.50 until 5.20 pm

he and his associates sat outside their van talking to more than 120 bearers of sample earth.

The visitors brought their fishing gear but they fished not a minute. There were crowds outside the store, reports Ron Cunningham, and a line-up extended right across the forecourt at one time.

commercial parking lot has no foundation in fact, small part of this property being used for parking would not in any way affect the taxes as a call to the Provincial assessor's office would confirm. The land is not taxed as a farm because it is not farmed, as required by Provincial statutes.

Second: Mr. Cudmore's application for release of various land parcels from the Agricultural Land Reserve were handled in a most proper and legal manner. The maligned Advisory Planning Commission had nothing to do with his appeals. Its members did go to great effort to ensure local land owners had every opportunity to find out where they stood and to make appeals a relatively simple matter.

Personally, I was careful not to even look at Mr. Cudmore's appeals so that I could not be accused of prejudiced action. The end result for him was that rather large acreages were released from the Land Reserve but not the relatively small parcel by the hall. This was all done solely on a technical basis, i.e., re-examination of the land by soil scientists. I do not recall that Mr. Cudmore appeared at the official public hearing to ask for further relief.

In any case, any argument he has regarding taxes or land classification is now entirely with the Provincial Government. I can see no justification for making the Fulford hall or the community suffer.

STRIKES, STRIKES, THE OUTCOME?

Sir,
As a very young British soldier our Regiment was sent to India to relieve regular troops for service in France.

For about 2 1/2 years we covered many places there including the N.W. Frontier. Our last station was in Ferosipore where it was 120 in the shade and there wasn't much shade.

In October while there, in 1918, we received orders to proceed to Siberia and, to say the least, it was a surprise. We were dishd out with Arctic clothing and on November 11, 1918 were half way between Bombay and Vladivostok; finally arriving there in a dirty old tramp steamer in which makeshift wooden bunks had been made in the holds. We were put in some old Russian barracks. The temperature was 60 below.

After a few weeks we then left by train in four-wheeled box cars, 24 men in each with a small pot bellied stove in the middle. We had started a journey on the Trans-Siberian railway which took us 28 days to our first destination Omsk.

There we found out our mission was to support Admiral Kolchac's white army opposing the Bolshivik revolutionary army. After being there for a while we again entrained and advanced to Ekaterinburg where the Russian Royal family were murdered. Yes, I saw the actual small house where

it happened. However, to make a long story short I saw the horrors of a revolution, men, women, and children killed by the hundreds. I could write a book about it. However, I will come to my point. First, there is a great difference between a Communist and a Bolshivik. It was the Bolshiviki that created the revolution under Lenin. A Bolshivik whose sole dedication is the overthrow of government and law by force.

Now, this force can be by arms or economic power, with a strong underground movement of subversive agents working and infiltrating all labour movements urging them to defy the ruling government or their employers.

I saw the results, and may it never happen here, but I am afraid it could. We were 2,500 miles from the nearest Allied help and had to retreat back to Vladivostok - across the Pacific and across Canada, across the Atlantic, arriving home in December, 1920. We had travelled a total of 45,000 miles by foot, steamship and train.

In closing, a true Communist is one who helps and shares with his fellow men. An example is the Fulford Community Hall which was built by 100% volunteer labour, gifts of lumber, nails, horses to haul all heavy requirements. Similarly the Beaver Point Hall. I could write pages and pages of what I have seen but this is probably taking too much of your valuable space now.

HER MAJESTY, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of British Columbia, enacts as follows:
 1. In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires, "designated island" means an island designated in schedule B under this Act or from time to time under the regulations; "general affairs" means matters relating to the object of the trust and affecting (i) more than one designated island; or (ii) one or more islands, other than designated islands, situated within the trust area, but does not include local affairs; "general trustee" means a general trustee appointed under section 2; "island" means all land comprising an island, and includes surrounding land attached to and extending from an island, whether or not water flows over or under it; "land" includes Crown land as defined in the Land Act; "local affairs" means, in respect of a designated island, matters relating to the object of the trust and affecting only the designated island; "local trustee" means a local trustee elected under section 4; "minister" means that member of the Executive Council charged by order of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council with the administration of this Act; "municipality" means a municipality as defined in the Municipal Act, and includes a regional district; "trust" means the trust established under section 2; "trust area" means land situated within the boundaries described in schedule A; "trust committee" means (i) where a decision, approval, recommendation, or other proceeding is required or permitted under this Act to be made or taken in respect of general affairs, the general trustees; and (ii) where a decision, approval, recommendation, or other proceeding is required or permitted under this Act to be made or taken in respect of the local affairs of a designated island, a committee consisting of not less than two general trustees and one local trustee of the designated island.
 2. (1) There is hereby established a trust, to be known as the Islands Trust, consisting of three general trustees, and their successors, who shall be appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council to hold office during pleasure.
 (2) The Lieutenant-Governor in Council shall designate one general trustee as chairman and one other general trustee as vice-chairman.
 (3) Any two of the general trustees constitute a quorum.
 (4) A vacancy in the membership of the trust does not impair the authority of the remaining general trustees to act.

3. (1) It is the object of the trust to preserve and protect, in cooperation with municipalities and the Government of the Province, the trust area and its unique amenities and environment for the benefit of the residents of the trust area and of the Province generally.
 (2) For the purpose of carrying out the object of the trust under subsection (1), the general trustees shall, in respect of general affairs, and the local trustees shall, in respect of local affairs, (a) make recommendations to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council respecting the determination, implementation, and carrying out of policies for the preservation and protection of the trust area and its unique amenities and environment; (b) make recommendations to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council respecting the acquisition, use, and disposition by the Crown in right of the Province of land situated within the trust area; (c) co-ordinate and assist in the determination, implementation, and carrying out of municipal and Provincial Government policies for the preservation and protection of the trust area and its unique amenities and environment; (d) subject to the Archaeological and Historic Sites Protection Act, locate and identify archaeological and historical sites within the trust area; (e) hear and decide upon any matter relating to general affairs or local affairs, as the case may be, that is required, under this Act, to be heard and decided upon by general trustees or local trustees; (f) prescribe rules and regulations respecting meetings and hearings; and (g) carry out such other duties as the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may from time to time direct.
 4. (1) There shall be two local trustees elected for each designated island.
 (2) The first election of local trustees after the date this Act comes into force shall be held on such date, and in such manner as the minister may direct.
 (3) Subject to subsection (2), the provisions of the Municipal Act respecting the election of electoral area directors under section 772 of that Act apply, with the necessary changes and in so far as they are applicable, to the election of local trustees.
 (4) The electoral area director of the regional board of the regional district in which the designated island is situated is entitled to notice of, and to attend and take part in, a meeting or other proceeding of the local trustees of the designated island, but he is not entitled to vote at the meeting or proceeding.
 (5) For the purposes of local affairs, any two general trustees and one local trustee constitute a quorum.
 5. Where doubt exists as to whether a matter relates to general affairs or to local affairs, the chairman of the general trustees, upon application by a local trustee or a general trustee, shall determine whether or not the matter relates to general affairs or to local affairs.
 6. (1) No municipality shall enter into, pass, or adopt a community plan, regional plan, zoning by-law, land use contract, or other similar plan, by-law, or contract regulating the use or subdivision of land within the trust area, unless the plan, by-law or contract is approved by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council under this Act or the Municipal Act and by the trust committee having jurisdiction in respect of those affairs.
 (2) Subject to subsection (5), no person shall construct or enlarge a building or improvement upon land situated within the trust area unless the construction or enlargement is approved by the trust committee having jurisdiction in respect of those affairs.
 (3) Subject to subsection (5), no registrar under the Land Registry Act shall accept an application for deposit of a plan of subdivision under that Act, the Real Estate Act, or the Strata Titles Act all or part of which consists of land situated within the trust area, unless the plan is approved by the trust committee having jurisdiction in respect of those affairs.
 (4) The Crown in right of the Province, or an agency of the Crown as defined in the Public Service Labour Relations Act, shall not develop or dispose of land situated within the trust area unless the Crown or the Crown agency first gives notice of the development or disposition to the general trustees.
 (5) A trust committee may, in granting approval under subsection (1), or upon application at any time, order that subsections (2) and (3) do not apply, or do not apply subject to such terms and conditions as the trust committee may prescribe, to land in respect of which a by-law or land use contract referred to in subsection (1) is approved by the trust committee and the Lieutenant Governor in Council.
 (6) For the purposes of this section, the general trustees shall act as the trust committee in respect of islands other than designated islands.
 7. (1) An application for approval by a trust committee under section 6 (1), (2), or (3) shall be made to the chairman of the general trustees, and shall be accompanied by such information as the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may prescribe.
 (2) Upon receipt of an application under subsection (1), the chairman of the general trustees shall determine whether the application relates to general affairs or to local affairs, or to both general and local affairs, and shall refer the application to the trust committee that, in his opinion, has jurisdiction in respect of the affairs to which the application relates.
 (3) Where a trust committee is of the opinion that the approval of an application under section 6 (1), (2), or (3) is contrary to the object of the trust, it may refuse to approve the application.

(4) The trust committee may approve the application, or may approve it subject to such terms and conditions as the trust committee considers necessary or advisable.

8 (1) Where

(a) a general trustee or local trustee is dissatisfied with a determination of the chairman under section 5; or

(b) an applicant under section 6 (1), (2), or (3) is dissatisfied with a refusal by a trust committee to approve an application, or with an approval subject to terms and conditions, he may appeal the determination or refusal to the minister.

9 (1) Notwithstanding the Public Service Act, the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may appoint a person as manager of the trust and may fix the remuneration and other expenses to be paid to him for his services as manager.

(2) A manager under subsection (1) shall be appointed during pleasure and shall be responsible to the general trustees for the administration of the general affairs of the trust and for such other duties as the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may prescribe.

(3) Subject to the Public Service Act, the general trustees may appoint such employees as they consider necessary for the general affairs of the trust, and may designate the title, office, and responsibilities of an employee.

(4) Notwithstanding the Public Service Act, but subject to the approval of the minister, the general trustees may engage and retain such persons as they consider necessary as consultants, experts, or specialists, and may fix their remuneration.

(5) The Lieutenant-Governor in Council may direct that the Public Service Act or the Public Service Superannuation Act, or both of them, applies to a general trustee, the manager appointed under subsection (1), or a person engaged and retained under subsection (4).

10. No general or local trustee shall, while he is a trustee, and during the period of two years after the date he ceases to be a trustee, acquire an interest in land situated within the trust area unless he has the approval of the minister.

12. For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this Act according to their intent, the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may make such regulations and orders as are ancillary thereto and not inconsistent therewith; and every regulation shall be deemed to be part of this Act and has the force of law, and without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may make regulations and orders

(a) respecting the distinction between general and local affairs;

(b) exempting land or buildings, or classes of land or buildings, from the provisions of section 6 (2) and (3); and

(c) amending schedule B.

13. Upon the requisition of the minister, the Minister of Finance shall pay out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, or out of the Revenue Surplus Appropriation Account of the Consolidated Revenue Fund, or partly from the Consolidated Revenue Fund and partly from the Revenue Surplus Appropriation Account, such sums as may be required from time to time to carry out the purposes of this Act, up to the thirty-first day of March, 1975, and thereafter shall pay out of those funds, or any of them, such sums as may be authorized by an Act of the Legislature for those purposes.

14. (1) This Act, excepting this section and the title, comes into force on a date to be fixed by the Lieutenant-Governor by his

Proclamation, and he may fix different dates for the coming into force of the several provisions.

(2) This section and the title come into force on Royal Assent.

All the land, except land situated within a reserve as defined in the Indian Act (Canada), on all the islands situated in the Strait of Georgia, Howe Sound, and Haro Strait lying to the south of a line commencing at the most easterly corner of Lot 140, Comox District being a point on the high water mark of Vancouver Island on the easterly shore thereof; thence south 70 degrees east in a straight line to the point of intersection with the middle line of Sabine Channel; thence in a general south-easterly direction along said middle line and passing to the north east of Jervis, Paul, and Jedediah Islands and continuing south-easterly along the southeasterly prolongation of the aforesaid middle line of Sabine Channel to the point of intersection with a straight line drawn from the most southerly extremity of Young Point (Lasqueti Island) to the most southerly southwest corner of Lot 6274, Group 1, New Westminster District; thence northeasterly along said line to the most southerly southwest corner of Lot 6274 and north of a line commencing at the northwest corner of Section 74A, Lake District being a point on the highwater mark of the Saanich Peninsula on the easterly shore thereof; thence east to the point of intersection with the easterly boundary of the Province of British Columbia, save and except therefrom the above described area, those islands lying within the boundaries of the City of Vancouver and the District Municipalities of Delta and Richmond.

LIVESTOCK SHOW ON MAY DAY

Livestock exhibition is planned as part of the May Day Fair at Ganges on Saturday, May 18. It is the first time for many years that the island has prepared for an agricultural show.

Sponsoring the exhibition are the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce and the Gulf Islands Secondary School. Entry fee in each class will be used to provide prizes. It is not intended to make any profit out of this part of the May Day Fair, says Jack Althouse, co-chairman of the program.

In charge of the livestock show is Mike Byron.

All entries for the show must be submitted by Tuesday, May 14. No entries will be accepted after that date. Second deadline is on Saturday. Any

animal not delivered to the show by 10 am, Saturday, May 18, will be refused. Animals may be left overnight Friday and supervisors will be on duty all night.

Show is divided into cattle, sheep, hogs, goats and poultry. Separate sections are set up for dairy cattle and beef. Dairy includes Jersey, Guernsey, Holstein, Ayrshire or cross-bred. Beef cattle are Hereford, Angus, short horn, Charolais, or cross-bred.

In each are classes for cow, cow and calf, bull, heifer over 6 mths.; calf under 6 mths. Sheep includes ewes and lambs, rams, yearlings and butcher lambs (pen of four).

Hog classes provide for sows, boars or weaners, in pens of two and goats will come as does, bucks or kids, under 6 mths.

Entry fee in each of these classes is \$5. Chickens will be entered as two hens and a rooster, with awards for various breeds. Geese, ducks, turkeys, pheasants, pigeons and guinea fowl will be shown in pairs. Information on the livestock show may be obtained from Mike Byron at the secondary school or Jack Althouse, Churchill Road, RR 1, Ganges.

NEW ISLANDS TRUST

PLANNERS ASK FOR CHANGES

Community planners on Salt Spring Island are the first group on the islands to call on Municipal Affairs Minister James Lorimer for changes in his Islands Trust Act.

Special meeting, on Monday, of the Salt Spring Island Community Planning Association decided to ask for an appointment with the minister to discuss various aspects of the new act which are affording concern to the association.

The association expressed concern over the "extremely wide powers" given by the bill to the general trustees. The objects of the trust are stated in rather vague terms, said the planners.

There was some fear expressed that the islands within the trust could eventually become Coney Islands.

The association wants protection of the legitimate interests of people living and earning their livelihood on the islands.

Definition of local affairs as distinct from general affairs is not adequate, decided planners.

Remuneration of elected local trustees was considered by the association. If the remuneration is not substantial it would preclude those people who work for a living, it was felt.

STUDENTS AT LADY MINTO HOSPITAL

The Women's Auxiliary to Lady Minto Hospital have staged a six-week program for senior students at Gulf Islands Secondary School.

There are 34 teenagers taking the course and they are just finishing the last two weeks, taking their exam next Wednesday.

It has been sponsored by the Women's Auxiliary and considerable help has been given by the hospital.

Lectures as well as discussions with the administrator, doctors and nurses have taught the young adults a wide range of equipment and procedures in hospitals. The course is part of the curriculum at school for participants.
