Parties prepare for vote

Voters from coast to coast will go to the polls on July 8 to elect a new government in Ottawa. Last week the Liberal government fell when the New Democratic Party declined to support the budget introduced by John Turner.

Campaigning will begin as soon as the candidates have been nominated. First nominations in Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands will be heard on Sunday, when New Democrats will meet in Nanaimo.

On Wednesday, May 22, the Liberals will meet at the Tally Ho Hotel in Nanaimo to name their man.

LOTS OF PEOPLE AROUND ISLANDS

There are lots of people around the islands. According to figures released by the Capital Regional District there are 6,990 persons scattered through the islands.

Of this total, 3,892 live on Salt Spring island and 3,098 are on the Outer Islands. Breakdown from island to island was not provided.

The vital statistics of the rest of the Capital Region is also provided.

Saanich municipality is the largest single entity in the Capital Region with 68,819 people. Second place is taken by the city of Victoria, with 64,772 souls. Lagging far behind in population is Oak Bay with its 18,825. Esquimalt houses 14,060.

Sidney is thriving with its population of 6,347, while

neighboring Central Saanich trails with 5,791 and North Saanich stands at 4,073.

In the unorganized areas to the west are Langford, with 11,480; Colwood's 9,234; Sooke, 4,887; View Royal, 3,728 and Metchosin, 2,029.

Trust aims at other Islands

- REGIONAL DISTRICTS ARE TOLD

Islands Trust Act will be modified to meet the demands of islands spokesmen, Municipal Affairs Minister J. C. Lorimer has promised the regional

districts. It is not aimed at the five islands, at all, he explained.

When seven regional districts met with the minister on Thursday last week they outlined the objections raised by islanders to the new Islands Trust legislation.

The delegation was headed by Chairman Jim Campbell, of the Capital Regional District and, himself, an island resident from Saturna.

The minister told the delegation that the new trust is not intended to operate as a fifth level of government, but to work through the regional districts. It will employ no staff of planners or other experts and will use the staffs already working for the regional districts.

He also emphasized that the Islands Trust will be a diminishing force in the islands, relinquishing its authority to the Regional Boards as they implement local planning and controls. Capital Regional District already has full local planning throughout the islands.

Mr. Lorimer also undertook to listen carefully to all proposals from the islands.

The Islands Trust Act caused a furore two weeks ago when it was introduced into the provincial legislature as a measure to control development in the islands. Adding to the heated reaction to the bill were the statements by the minister that the municipalities had been negligent in implementing planning and controls among the islands and by the NDP caucus that the act was intended to protect the islands from foreign millionaires.

SHORTEST HEARING ON RECORD

Shortest public hearing on record on Salt Spring Island opened a few minutes late on Monday afternoon and closed a few minutes later.

Application was heard for rezoning of part of the property of Valcourt Building Centre Ltd. from Industrial 2 to Commercial 1.

The application was necessary because of errors made at the time of the preparation of the zoning by-law, no. 66, stated Mrs. Yvette Valcourt, speaking to the application.

No other comments were made and Chairman George Heinekey closed the hearing.

EXTRA POLICE FOR WEEK END

Police reinforcements, auxiliary police and additional park rangers will be spread over the islands at the week end to meet expected hordes of campers and week end visitors.

Two police boats will patrol the waters here to be on call to any island.

May 24 week end is the annual invasion and additional police and cars will be stationed on all the islands to meet the challenge.

In past years hundreds of youthful visitors have come to the islands to live it up for the first long week end of summer. Islanders are hoping that the cold, wet weather will deter many from coming here.

Opening ceremonies will be undertaken by Hugh Curtis, MLA.

Baby contest, under the direction of Les Ramsey, will start at 2 pm. Entry form appears elsewhere in this issue.

Afternoon program of entertainers will keep busy until 4 pm, when the final offering, Dale Horrocks, guitarist, will be on stage.

There will be a young people's concert from 4.15 pm until they are weary.

Sideshows of every kind will be presented by various community organizations presenting them for the purpose of raising money for the Lions Recreation Complex at Central

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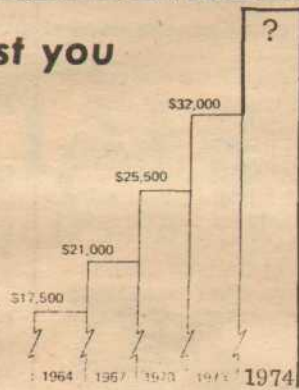

WHAT ARE WE VOTING FOR?

Don Quixote is back and into the heart of Canadian politics.

There is Don Quixote in the person of Don Robert Stanfield, valiantly jousting with the windmill of inflation while an admiring Canadian audience gazes spell-bound at his skill in fighting such a foe.

More ludicrous than Don Roberto in the guise of the Spanish madman is Don David Lewis, in the role of Sancho Panza, egging his Tory master on to greater achievements in his contest with the shadow of inflation.

Like the original Don Quixote, this pair of Canadian heroes tend to talk more than they act and like the Cervantes gentleman, they recognize in that windmill more than is evident to lesser mortals.

There are Canadian voters who would not support Coleridge in his summary when he said that put together Quixote and Sancho Panza formed perfect intellect.

It has been said of Don Quixote that it was the saddest book ever written and this is equally apt in the Canadian scene.

If this election is to be fought on the single issue of inflation there is only one irrefutable answer and that is that prices will have risen while the fight is on. Unfortunately, like Don Quixote's windmill, the steady rise of prices will still stand long after the contest.

Both Conservative and New Democrat leaders may believe that they have, in fact the answer to inflation. If they had the answer, then why have they not insisted on sharing the information? If they have shared the information already, then anything we hear of the cure for inflation is a sad hoax perpetrated on the Canadian voter in an effort to win votes.

Inflation is worldwide. It cannot be defeated by increased production, nor by easing of taxation, nor by unrealistic demands for high wages, nor by unprecedented profits.

There is probably, in all truth, no current, workable, available answer.

TRUST FINDS NO FAVOUR AT MAYNE

The hall was filled to capacity for the meeting at Mayne Island on Saturday, May 11, to meet with Hugh Curtis, MLA, to discuss Bill 112, the Islands Trust Act.

Ruth Zuest was in the chair, in the absence of Vic Griffiths, president of M.I.R.A.

Mr. Curtis was requested to read the contents of the Bill for the benefit of those who hand't read it.

Participation by the audience was keen and reasonably good humored.

The meeting on Mayne was the third held to date. The general consensus was that the Bill was not acceptable in its present state. Suggested changes were recorded by Pearl Brau to be kept on file for reference by the minister of municipal affairs.

College students all over North America are streaking these days and no one knows where the phenomenon will break out next, though the manifestation of it is fairly consistent - the so-called intelligent young people running around naked.

It is not really new, but the media have made it a continent-wide success if indeed, success can be measured by nudity. In the law it is called indecent exposure, and in some parts, at least, it warrants a \$500 fine.

Reports of the year's activities will be given and a new executive and board elected.

The nominating committee has prepared a slate and nominations may also be made from the floor, with prior consent. Nominees must have been members for at least six months.

The Gulf Islands Community Arts Council has this year paid out grants totalling \$1,375 as follows: Weavers' Guild, \$255; Potters' Guild, \$220; Painters' Guild, \$50; players, \$150; singers, \$150; Galiano Spinners and Weavers, \$250; Galiano Painters, \$125; Mayne Island Paint and Sketch Club, \$75; Pender Island Painters, \$100.

The council has a membership of 300.

Following an outstandingly successful Art-Craft '73 Show, convened by Maggi Schubart, it presented for members a winter program of three events, Prof. H. G. Glyde of the

Banff School of Fine Arts, Kathleen Curran, photographer, of Vancouver, and the Pacific Wind Quintet of Victoria. It has co-sponsored, with the local school, the Purcell String Quartet of Vancouver, and the Summer Singers of Victoria, in public concerts.

Also to be discussed at the annual meeting will be the new "Access to the Arts" policy proposed for the province by Provincial Secretary Ernie Hall. Three of the main points of the policy are the creation of a new B. C. Arts Council, with a full-time administrator and staff, to replace the present B. C. Cultural Fund; greatly increased funding for the arts and creation of 15 regional arts panels, each with eight members; two appointed by government, and six elected by each local artistic community.

These panels would replace the 57 councils presently in existence in the province.

The present government grant is only a small part of the revenue of the local council, the greater part coming from the summer show and membership. It is therefore hoped that the meeting will consider as desirable some form of local council as coordinating body for cultural activities, no matter what new government policy is instituted.

March gave considerably more rain than the very dry 1973. The early part of the month was cold and blustery, with the occasional snow flurry. Around the mid-month we had a clear week, with quite a little sunshine, reverting to rain on the 25th. There was overnight frost on seven days, the lowest shade temperature recorded being 24 deg. F. Spring officially commenced at 16.07 hours on the 20th, the sun crossing the equator at that time.

April was a month of light showery weather, with one reading of 0.50 ins., and every other fall under a tenth of an inch. The morning temperatures rose from 42 deg. F at the beginning of the month to only 49 deg. F at the end of the month. During quite a part of the month we were living in the area of a cold low, and the temperatures were below normal, except for the period around Easter week, when the temperatures were normal or slightly above normal. Sunshine was generally patchy.

This year there is a good moisture reserve in the land.

CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT

Pursuant to Section 766AA of the Municipal Act, the following text of By-law No. 174 cited as "Park Regulations By-law No. 1, 1974", is hereby published.

A BY-LAW ESTABLISHING REGULATIONS GOVERNING THE MANAGEMENT, MAINTENANCE, IMPROVEMENT, OPERATION, CONTROL AND USE OF ANY REAL OR PERSONAL PROPERTY IN A REGIONAL PARK OR REGIONAL TRAIL WITHIN THE CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT.

The Capital Regional District Board in open meeting assembled enacts as follows: -

1. INTERPRETATION

In this By-law, unless the context otherwise requires,

"Regional Park" includes any regional park within the meaning of the Regional Parks Act within the Capital Regional District.

"Regional Trail" includes any regional trail within the meaning of the Regional Parks Act within the Capital Regional District.

"Motor Vehicle" means a vehicle that is designed to be self-propelled.

"Person" includes any corporation, partnership or party.

2. The management, maintenance, improvement, operation and control of Regional Parks shall be the responsibility of the Director of Engineering of the Capital Regional District or such other person as may, from time to time, be charged with the responsibility by the Capital Regional Board.

3. No unauthorized person within the confines of a Regional Park or Regional Trail shall: -

(a) carry on any activity that will restrict, prevent or inhibit the public use and enjoyment thereof as a Regional Park or Regional Trail;

(b) construct, install, erect or place any structure, or shelter or carry out any improvement or work of any nature;

(c) permit any animal or fowl to run at large or feed;

(d) cut, break, injure, deface, remove or in any way damage or destroy any tree, shrub, plant, turf, soil or rock, or any structure including any seat or sign, or in any way foul or pollute any lake, stream, pool or pond;

(e) transport or deposit any rubbish, waste paper, litter, cans, bottles or broken glass or any other substance except into the receptacles provided for this purpose;

(f) sell or display for sale any refreshments or any articles or things or conduct any business;

(g) carry or discharge any firearms or dangerous weapons of any description in violation of British Columbia Regulation 232/73;

(h) explode any combustible or other explosive material; make open fires except in designated areas during specified periods of time, or throw or place upon the ground any lighted match, cigar, cigarette or other burning substance;

(i) post, paint or distribute any advertisement, sign, placard or hand bill of any kind whatsoever;

(j) molest, disturb, frighten, injure, kill, catch, trap or snare any bird or animal;

(k) conduct himself or herself in a disorderly or offensive manner or molest or injure any person, or obstruct or prevent the free use and enjoyment of a Regional Park or Regional Trail by any person;

(l) drive or propel or permit to be driven or propelled any type of motor vehicle except in areas which have been specifically designated for such use;

(m) ride or drive any horse or other animal except in areas specifically designated for such use;

(n) make or cause noises or sounds which disturb or tend to disturb the quiet, peace, enjoyment, comfort or convenience of persons in the vicinity;

(o) carry out any logging operation or use a Regional Park to facilitate such operation;

(p) use car parks or any other area for overnight accommodation in a tent, car, camper or in any other manner;

4. No person shall do any act or suffer or permit any act or thing to be done in contravention of this By-law.

5. Every person who, without lawful excuse, contravenes this By-law by wilfully doing any act which it forbids, or omitting to do any act which it requires to be done, is guilty of an offence and is liable, on summary conviction, to a fine of not less than \$25.00 and not more than \$300.00 for a first offence and for each subsequent offence to a fine of not less than \$50.00 and not more than \$300.00. A separate offence shall be deemed to be committed upon each day during and in which the contravention occurs or continues.

SCHOOL GOES OUTDOORS FOR WEEK

The children at Saturna School have been getting their exercise lately - with swimming lessons in Victoria and an outdoor learning week.

The swimming program for the school has just come to an end. The children, teachers and a rotating crew of dedicated parents, have been travelling to Victoria for the past 10 Thursday afternoons. The swimming lessons were given at the Crystal Pool, and all the children enjoyed themselves thoroughly and greatly improved their swimming skills.

Last week, the whole school was involved in an outdoor learning experience on Saturna Beach, thanks to the kindness of Lorraine and Jim Campbell.

The children, from largest to smallest, clambered over rocks, examined tidal pools, looked at trees, collected specimens, studied all sorts of flora and fauna, and went on nature walks and scavenger hunts.

They were joined on Monday and Tuesday by the students from Mrs. Eve Kerr's class of Richmond Elementary School in Victoria. The seniors took responsibility for showing their new friends around the island, feeding them dinner, and billeting them overnight.

Thanks are also due to the good-hearted parents who helped make the visit such a success for the "city children".

At Saturna Beach, the senior children cooked all meals, washed dishes, and kept the living areas tidy. Everybody ate very well, with gifts of fish and a turkey.

The seniors experimented with making homemade soups (seasoned with juniper leaves), spaghetti sauce (seasoned with juniper leaves!), pancakes, porridge, and scalloped potatoes.

The primary and kindergarten children were fascinated by their glimpse of farm life, and helped make butter, feed the new lambs on the bottle, and hand-spun wool on an old spinning wheel.

The older ones also camped out at Taylor Point in lean-tos they built themselves, and ate food gathered from the beach and forest and cooked over a campfire. Special

thanks to Jim Lang, from Garibaldi Park, who volunteered his time and energies to make this outing a huge success.

The younger children spent less time over at Saturna Beach, but they supplemented their experiences there with further visits on the island; to Winter Cove, Narvaez Bay, and East Point. They studied the beach and forest areas, and brought specimens back to school for their collections.

Another sea-saw battle which developed right at the start and lasted to the finish line was between Brian Dunbabin's Dystocia and Jack Langdon's Ginger Tea.

Les Ramsey and crew in his 23-foot Anna Christina abruptly ended a lovely cold chicken and potato salad dinner in Sansum Narrows when the tide almost fetched them up on the rocks.

One of the more interesting entries was Tom Butler-Cole's 23-foot Nereid, ably crewed by the father and son team of Mick and Sydney Jones. The Nereid carries sails made of Egyptian cotton which become extremely heavy when wet. The Jones boys had their work cut out for them in the steady rain at the start.

Because of the lack of wind Deg Degroot had the most frustrating of days. A large, heavy displacement vessel, such as the Anywhere sails best in a

gale of wind and cannot compete in light air with the smaller, light displacement boats. However Deg gave a good account of himself and the Anywhere before retiring from the race early Sunday morning in the mouth of Ganges Harbour when the winds fell to zero.

Don Layard on the Bellerophon was up with the leaders for a good portion of the race only to frustratingly lose the wind at Southey Point while McMillan's six meter Erin and Geoff Cue's 30-foot Tessera found a strong westerly that took them from Southey Point to the finish line in just over three hours. Don had ingeniously rigged a laundry basket to stow his spinnaker on deck; --it worked beautifully --only three and a half minutes to hoist and set the big sail! There was only one hitch. On one foredeck manoeuvre to get the spinnaker up and set in record time he hoisted the laundry bucket, spinnaker, sheets and all.

The front running boats picked up a strong westerly down Trincomali Channel which developed into gale force gusts as they rounded the turn for home. It was here that Laurie Neish started working for his passage and Aileen praised the Doug Thomas wet suit, wrong fit and all. Aileen reports

Clarion with the Neish's was second, Dunbabin's Dystocia was third, Langdon's Ginger Tea was fourth with McMillan's Erin fifth.

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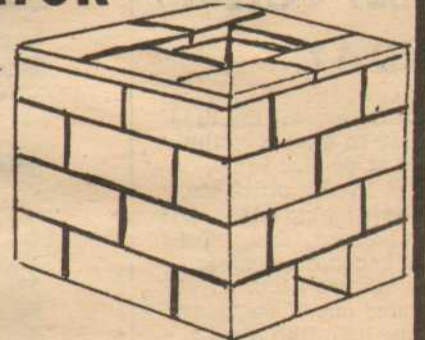
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
