## APPEALS LAGGING BEHIND

Appealed your assessment this year? You may have to wait a long time before you get a reply. The office of the assessment commissioner in Victoria reports that it may be a long time before anything happens. The assessment office has had an unusual number of appeals this year, reports that office, and these will necessitate the appointment of an additional board to hear appeals on Vancouver Island and the Gulf Islands.

The information comes from Hugh Curtis, MLA, who enquired on behalf of an islander. The island man had heard nothing about his appeal and had enquired about the likely date.

Mr. Curtis agrees that the workload appears to be heavy. It is obviously too heavy for one board, he commented.

The local MLA also has the view that many of the many appeals have come from the Gulf Islands.

The assessment board might better have at least acknowledged the appeals, he added.

## NEW GRAVEL FOR NEW ISLAND ROADS

New supply of gravel is to be hauled into Pender and Mayne Islands this fall.

Department of highways is planning to bring in a large supply of high-quality crushed gravel for next year's paving.

An "extensive pavement recap program" is planned for next spring, according to Highways Minister Graham Lea.

Hugh Curtis, MLA, has asked the minister for a copy of road repair plans to facilitate the handling of complaints and reports.

## DOUGLAS MAJORITY SLASHED

Tommy Douglas took the Islands seat with a total poll of 18,033. Don L. Taylor, Conservative, polled 15,195; Raymond Kane, Liberal, 9,752 and Ernest Knott, Communist, 262.

The riding bore the same pattern as other parts of Canada with a sharp reduction in support for NDP. In 1972 Tommy Douglas went in with a majority of 15,304. Although the absence of a Social Credit candidate was reflected in the augmented Tory support, there is no indication that this was the only influencing factor in the change.

# Islands go Taylor—Douglas goes back

- TURN-OUT OF ISLAND VOTERS 70%

Gulf Islands went Tory on Monday as the Nanaimo-Cowichan-Islands riding stayed with New Democrat candidate Tommy Douglas. Elected from the riding of which the islands form part, Douglas was one of only two New Democrats to hold their seats in British Columbia.

There was a big attendance at the polls among the islands, when about 70% went to the polls. The total vote on the islands showed 1,314 for Conservatives' Taylor and 1,076 for Douglas.

Mayne and Prevost was the only Outer Island poll to favour the New Democrat candidate and on Salt Spring Island, Tripp Road gave an 88:63 vote for Douglas vs. Taylor, while Vesuvius Bay, a mile or so further west, went for Taylor 134 and Douglas, 77.

Rainbow Road came up strongly for Douglas and "Wharf" was not arguing, with a 35-vote for each of the top contenders.

South Salt Spring island sort ed out its 30 votes and gave 16 to Douglas. Fulford also favoured NDP with 88:57, while Musgrave gave 54 to Taylor and 48 to Douglas.

Had the islands voted wholly in favour of the Conservat-

ive he would still have failed to take the seat. There was more than a 2,000 vote difference.

**A NEW PHASE**

There was a large representation of Communist candidates, including the appearance in this riding of the Communist candidate, Mr. Ernest Knott. That no Communist candidate was elected was also predictable. There is not a big support for the extremist view, in either political direction.

The new government has been given a mandate and the members of the new Parliament have heard the voice of the Canadian voter.

And it's about time. Canada has shown the way; it only remains for parliament to follow.

 Alf Temmel came from Europe to make his way slowly to Salt Spring Island. That was many years ago.

Today there are evidences of Temmel's influence everywhere on Salt Spring. The Harbour House Hotel, the Ship's Anchor Inn, Ganges Crest, they all have examples of his work.

Stores and other buildings on the island greet their customers and visitors with signs of Temmel's work.

Tourists are now being invited to take a look at his work and familiarize them-

selves with the island.

Alf Temmel is the man behind the bright signs. Temmel is the painter who dreamed up the murals in the beer parlour at Harbour House. The mural in Ship's Anchor Inn is his work as is the painting of Salt Spring Island in the K & R.

Store signs abound and there are churches announcing their services through Temmel's handiwork.

And he's really only half-way there. If he could influence all businessmen and property owners, Alf Temmel would eliminate every garish, jarring sign and replace it with a pleasing style in keeping with the business and the community. The same goes for decoration. The Fulford artist would welcome a smooth pattern of painting in the village area where each building and each colour complemented the store next door.

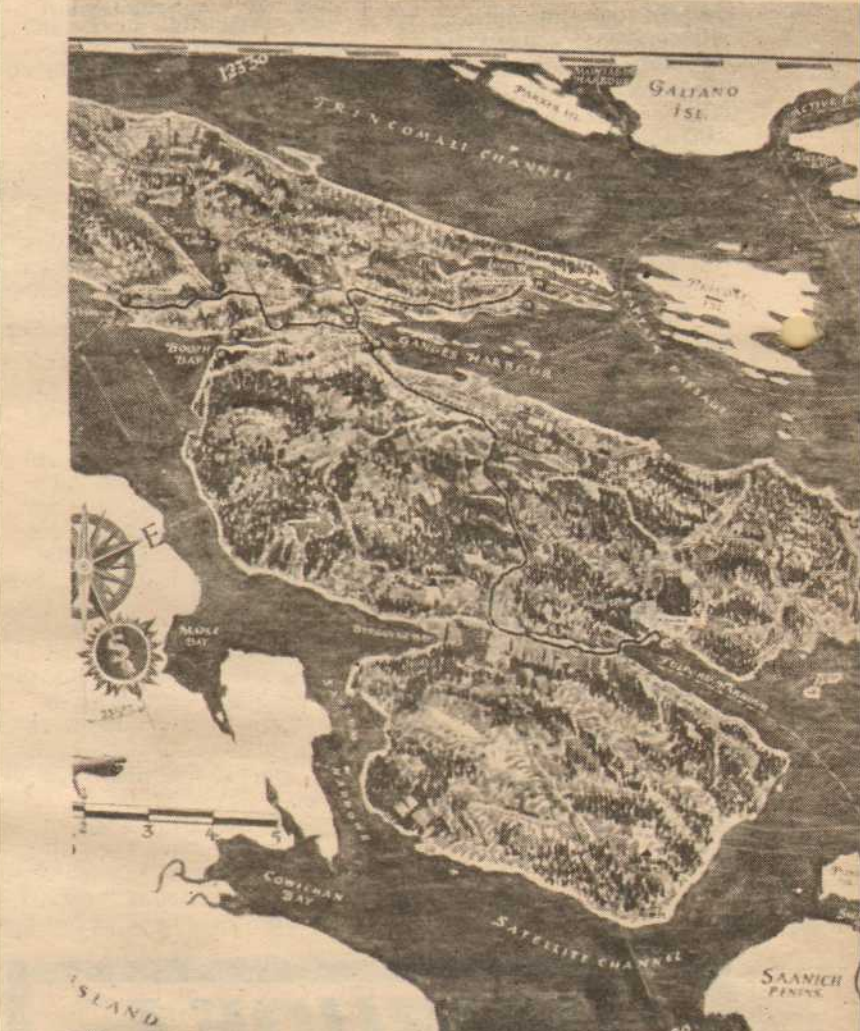
Trouble is he's a man with a brush and a conscience.

Combination of house-painting and other painting kept the Temmel family happy on Salt Spring Island. The house-



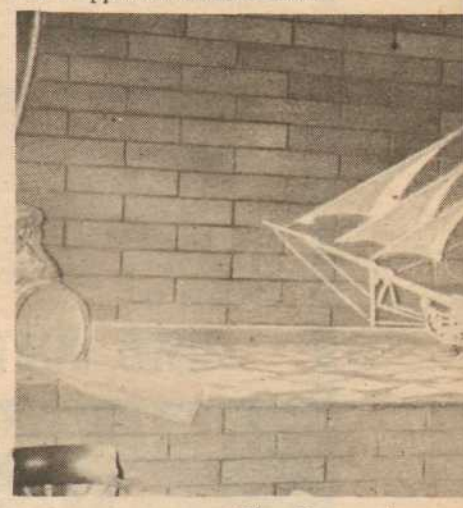

The project was undertaken under Local Initiatives Programs and the sole sponsor was Mr. Reynolds, who has had considerable experience of this type of job, on behalf of the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce. This year the Chamber declined to support him when the directors learned that it would involve access to private property. Gavin was not fazed by that refusal.

He went it alone. And now he's all smiles. From January 14 to June 28 he went into the woods with a crew of 12 and cleared out almost every stream on Salt Spring Island.

The crews have cleared some 50,000 feet of stream bed. They have cleaned the water systems and they have rescued fish from death in dried-up creeks. The entire crew has worked like Trojans for more than five months.

Streams which have lain buried beneath vegetation and dead logs are now open and free. Areas which for years have been inaccessible to fish have been opened up and more fish will be swimming in island lakes next fall as a direct result of the LIP crew's work.

The streams were fouled with the debris of years as fallen trees obstructed and heavy undergrowth made a valiant attempt to bury the dead trees.

The crews cleaned up the outlet from Rosemary Lake on Mount Bruce, explained Gavin. The old floodgate had rotted away, leaving the lake to slowly drain itself. His keen regret was a lack of funds. If the provincial government had co-operated they could have achieved so much more, he

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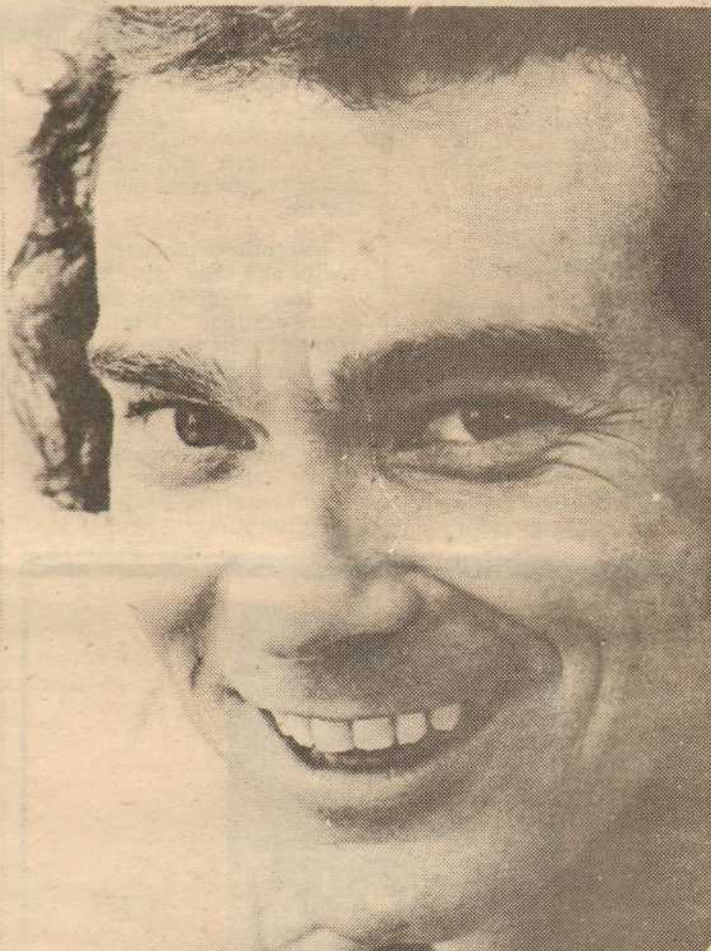

# Finding out you've been cheated is bad. Finding out it's legal is even worse.

Most deals are good deals but too often unsuspecting consumers have been taken for a ride by unscrupulous businesses. What seemed like a fair deal turned out to be a raw deal and to make matters worse it was legal. Now all that's changed because of the Trade Practices Act — the first of its kind in Canada. It's designed to stop 'sharp' practices and in doing this it also helps honest businesses who've had to put up with unfair competitors for too long.

## Now the law can help you stand up for your rights.

The Trade Practices Act is now law in British Columbia and will be administered by the Department of Consumer Services.

Its aims are quite simple: to stop misleading and deceptive practices quickly and to help consumers recover their losses if someone has taken advantage of them.

By familiarizing yourself with the Act you'll become an informed consumer making it far more difficult for you to be the victim of an illegal practice. And if you should become the victim, the Act will help open the doors to the court so you can stand up for your rights.

## Consumer transactions defined.

Doing business in the marketplace of the '70's is often more than just the straight sale of merchandise. So the Trade Practices Act also defines the leasing of goods, the supplying of services and the granting of credit, as consumer transactions. This definition applies where you've entered the deal after July 5, 1974. Only dealings governed by real estate, insurance and securities legislation are exempt.

## Types of illegal business practices.

Two basic types of practices are prohibited by the Act: deceptive and unconscionable.

Deceptive practices include everything from a dishonest sales pitch to misleading advertising and phone solicitations or exaggerated repair estimates. In other words if it's misleading, or has the tendency to mislead it's deceptive.

Let's say you were told your new car will get "30 miles to the gallon" when in fact you'll probably have difficulty in getting 20 miles to the gallon that's deceptive.

Another example is T.V. repairs. You're told you need a new \$75 picture tube when all your set needs is some minor adjustments.

If the court agrees that you've been misled, then you have a right to recover any loss or damages suffered and the deceptive practice will also be stopped — for good.

An unconscionable practice is one that involves high pressure tactics and slippery, tricky deals. You've been conned, the business in question knows it and the court won't enforce the "bargain". Or to put it more politely, if the agreement is so highly unreasonable as to be unfair, or the circumstances surrounding the transaction are overly harsh, the court may declare the entire transaction to be unconscionable. If so, the supplier cannot enforce the contract but you may sue him if you have suffered any loss.

An example might be an elderly consumer who has literally been badgered into a long-term contract. Another possible situation may be, where you are led to believe you are renting a colour T.V., but in fact you are committed to buy the set from the start.

These are only a few examples of the type of selling tactics and other misleading practices that are the target of the Trade Practices Act. To help you the Act lists examples covering a broad range of deceptive acts or unfair schemes.

## Who's in charge?

A Director of Trade Practices will be appointed to handle consumer complaints and investigate possible wrong-doings by suppliers.

The director will have a number of options available in order to settle a dispute.

First of all, an attempt will be made to discuss the matter with both sides and amicably resolve the matter. We're confident the great majority of cases can be handled this way.

If it appears the law has been broken, the director can ask the supplier to sign an agreement promising to abide by the Act and, for example, give the consumer back any money lost in the transaction.

If the supplier refuses, the director can ask the courts to settle the matter quickly and fairly.

## Putting an end to "caveat emptor".

"Let the buyer beware" is a saying that's thousands of years old and the Department of Consumer Services will do everything possible to help you become aware of deceptive and unconscionable practices so that you will know when someone is trying to take advantage of you.

Service Centres will be opened at several locations in the province to receive and act on complaints. The centres will be staffed by counsellors, researchers, investigators, specialists when necessary and volunteers all ready to help you. They'll be located in areas where you shop, close to public transportation and equipped with library resource facilities.

## Get in on the act.

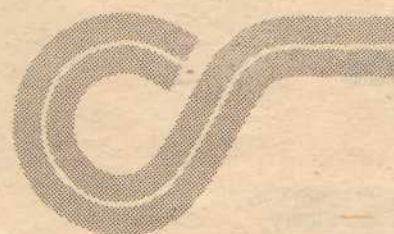
One of the most important aspects of the Act is that it makes it easy to help yourself.

The Act catalogues traps for the unwary, loopholes and common abuses to watch for and what you can do about them... and there is a lot you can do. You can pursue a complaint on your own, and if necessary, go to court on it. You can ask the judge to stop the illegal practice and to help other consumers in addition to yourself who may have lost money due to the same sharp practice.

So learn all you can about the Act and don't forget to use the valuable services of organizations like the Consumers' Association of Canada, Better Business Bureaus, the newspaper help columns as well as the Department of Consumer Services.

Now responsible consumers and honest businesses can stand up for their rights. With the help of the Trade Practices Act you've got what it takes to get yourself a fair deal.

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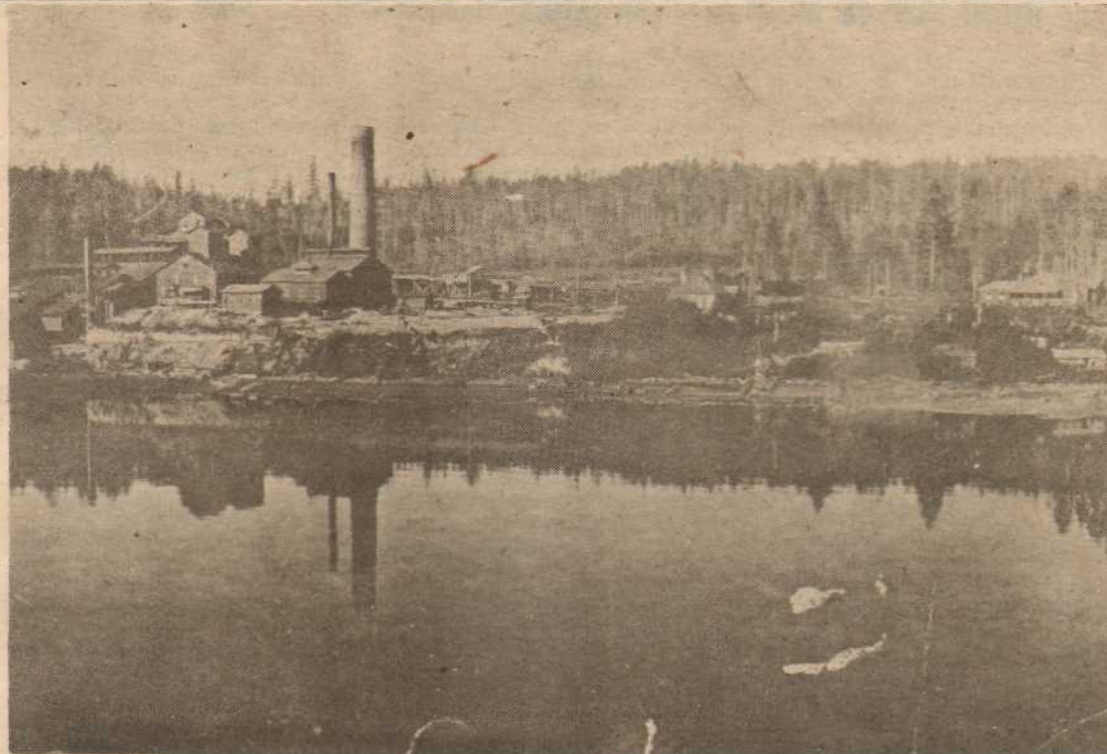

## DON'T THROW GARBAGE THERE!

Recycling is not a garbage collection service. Recycling is a service to recover articles and materials that can be re-manufactured into usable items.

Newspapers can be processed into pulp again and then manufactured into paper for a second time around. Only clean newspaper, tied in bundles, can be handled. If the paper is not clean it will not readily respond to the chemicals used for recycling.

Tin cans can be melted into steel and tin and the resultant metals can be used again. Tins must be clean. The reason

for this provision is that clean tins are easier to handle and dirty tins soon become re-tolling to the handlers.

Glass bottles and jars can be melted and used again. The recycling depot is not so much interested in pop and beer bottles, which can be re-circulated, as wine and spirit and other bottles for which there is no other means of disposal.

Aluminum foil, egg cartons, fat in sealed containers and scrap paper, not aluminized or waxed are all acceptable. Plastics cannot be recycled. If islanders persist in using

recycling depots for garbage, they will be closed, reports Recyclist Ken Simons.

## DON'T LOOK LIKE THAT... BRUSH THEM

Almost everyone has been embarrassed by suddenly discovering a piece of food lodged against a tooth. The discovery usually occurs at the point where you are trying to make a good impression on someone by giving them a big, wide smile.

Avoiding this kind of embarrassment is one major reason we brush our teeth. Dentists call this a "cosmetic" reason for brushing. They point out though, that the most important reason for brushing is that it will prevent almost every known dental disease. However, for the one person in seven who suffers from "hypersensitivity", property brushing can be a painful ordeal.

Dentists are not sure exactly why some people have touchy teeth, but they suggest there may be a number of causes such as dental surgery, receding gums, a chipped tooth, or incomplete calcification and hardening of tooth enamel if the victim is a child.

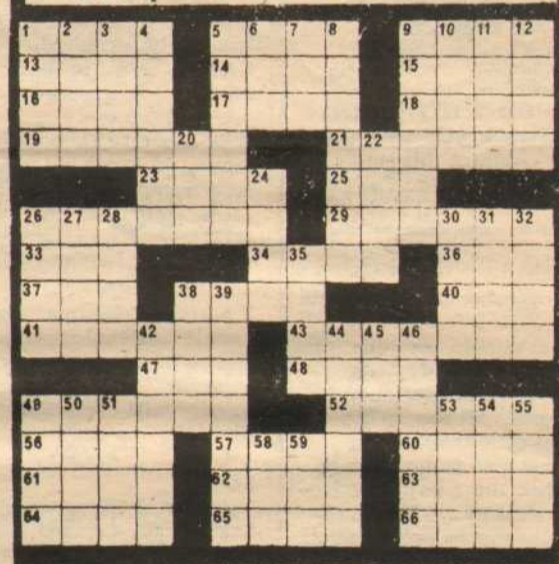

# CANADA PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

ELIZABETH the SECOND, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom, Canada and Her other Realms and Territories, Queen, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith.

To all to whom these presents shall come -  
GREETING. ( WHEREAS pursuant to the provisions of Subsection (7) of Section "J. Lorimer" ( 50 of the Health Act, the Lieutenant-Minister of Municipal Affairs ( ant-Governor in Council has by Order-in-Council No. 1640 dated the 16th day of May, 1974, made the following regulation:

"The Capital Regional District is authorized to assume the exercise of the powers and duties of the Greater Victoria Metropolitan Board of Health; AND FURTHER ORDERS THAT the Capital Regional District shall exercise the powers and duties of the Local Boards of Health within its jurisdiction, namely District of Oak Bay, City of Victoria, Township of Esquimalt, District of Saanich, District of Central Saanich, District of North Saanich and Town of Sidney."

AND WHEREAS pursuant to the provisions of subsection 6 of section 47 of the Health Act, the Lieutenant-Governor in Council has by Order-in-Council No. 1641 dated the 16th day of May, 1974, made the following regulation:

"The Capital Regional District is authorized to assume the exercise of the powers and duties of the Victoria and Esquimalt Union Board of Health and the Saanich and South Vancouver Island Union Board of Health; AND FURTHER ORDERS THAT the Capital Regional District shall exercise the powers and duties of the Local Boards of Health within its jurisdiction, namely District of Oak Bay, City of Victoria, Township of Esquimalt, District of Saanich, District of Central Saanich, District of North Saanich and Town of Sidney."

AND WHEREAS the Regional Board of the Capital Regional District has requested that the powers and duties as may be necessary to enable it to provide and administer within the Capital Regional District, all community health services and programmes required by statute or approved by the Minister of Health including Public School Health Services, be a function of the Capital Regional District.

NOW KNOW YE THAT by these presents We do order and proclaim the following be added to the objects powers, obligations, duties, limitations and conditions of the Capital Regional District, and the Letters Patent of the Capital Regional District be amended accordingly.

### DIVISION XI - COMMUNITY HEALTH

1. Commencing on the 1st day of April, 1974, it shall be a function of the Capital Regional District, within the regional district to exercise the powers and duties conferred by the said regulations and any amendments thereto and such further powers and duties as may be necessary to enable it to provide and administer within the Capital Regional District, all community health services and programmes required by statute or approved by the Minister of Health including Public School Health Services.

2. All member municipalities participate in the function of the Capital Regional District provided by this Division.

3. Prior to the 31st day of October in each year the Regional District shall prepare a budget for the function provided by this Division for the immediately ensuing year in co-operation with representatives of the Provincial Government.

4. The Capital Regional District shall be reimbursed by the Government of the Province of British Columbia for seventy per centum of the total annual costs of the said community health services and programmes including capital, operating and administrative costs incurred by the Capital Regional District (hereinafter called "the Provincial Government Share") in the following manner:

The Provincial Government shall estimate the Provincial Government share prior to the commencement of each fiscal year of the Capital Regional District and shall pay one-twelfth thereof to the Capital Regional District on the first day of each month during such fiscal year. As soon as possible after each three month period during the said fiscal year the Capital Regional District shall submit to the Provincial Government the actual costs incurred by it during such period and any over-payment or under-payment shall be adjusted forthwith thereafter.

5. The net cost incurred by the Capital Regional District pursuant to paragraph 4 hereof for the purpose of this Division shall be apportioned among the member municipalities on the basis of one hundred per centum of the assessed value of land and seventy-five per centum of the assessed value of improvements as fixed for taxation for school purposes in the current year, excluding property that is taxable for school purposes only by Special Act.

6. The levy against properties within the electoral areas of the Capital Regional District, shall be reduced by thirty per centum of the cost of providing health services within those electoral areas and which, based upon the 1973-74 fiscal period of the Province, has been calculated at about \$75,000.00 or .75 mills.

7. The levels of the various community health services and programmes to be provided as aforesaid by the Capital Regional District shall be at service levels acceptable to the Minister of Health.

8. The Regional Board may employ such officers and employees, professional and otherwise, as are required for the purpose of the function provided by this Division.

9. The professional officers and employees employed by the Regional Board shall be of a standard at least equal to that established by the Minister of Health for such employment.

10. Subject to the Health Act, Medical Health Officers shall be appointed by the Regional Board in consultation with the Provincial Department of Health.

11. The Officers and employees of the Capital Regional District operating and administering this function shall avail themselves of the consultative services provided by the Department of Health.

12. The minimum health programmes and services for children including those enrolled in the public school system provided and administered by the Capital Regional District in the school districts within the Capital Regional District shall be not less than those programmes and services defined in the Health Branch Policy Manual, Volume III, Chapter XIII as published in August, 1971 as amended from time to time. Professional activities with dual roles in health and education shall be carried out as follows:

(a) Psychologists - those utilized by the Capital Regional District shall be employed by the Mental Health Branch of the Department of Health of the Province of British Columbia.

(b) Psychometricians - This service is the responsibility of the school districts.

(c) Speech Therapists - those utilized in the community shall be employed by the Capital Regional District. Those utilized solely in the schools shall be the responsibility of the school districts.

(d) Audiologists - shall be utilized in the community and shall be employed by the Capital Regional District.

(e) Learning Disability Therapists - may be employed by the school districts and the assistance of other agencies may be utilized.

(f) Vision and Hearing - screening of children shall be the responsibility of the Capital Regional District.

(g) Other pertinent services for the prevention of illness and maintenance of health among children shall be provided by the Capital Regional District after negotiation between the Capital Regional Board and the School Boards involved subject to the approval of the Minister of Health.

13. Community health services and programmes provided and administered by the Capital Regional District shall include the provision and administration of inspection, referral, educational and other non-therapeutic dental health services to school and pre-school children.

14. At least once each year on or before the first day of October, school health services in the Capital Regional District shall be reviewed by the Capital Regional District Board with representatives of the various School Boards within the Capital Regional District to ensure an adequate opportunity for programme and service recommendations to be received.

15. The annual net cost of the function provided by this Division shall not exceed the product of two mills on the assessed value of property as fixed for taxation for school purposes in the current year within the participating member municipalities excluding property that is taxable for school purposes only by Special Act.

16. The powers, duties, and obligations of all participating member municipalities and any other local authorities to perform the function conferred on the Capital Regional District pursuant to this Division shall be transferred to the exclusive jurisdiction of the Capital Regional District including, but without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the powers conferred upon the Council of a Municipality by section 634 of the Municipal Act.

AND THAT the Letters Patent of the Capital Regional District be deemed to be further amended accordingly.
