minimum size announced

Minimum size for a farm on the islands is 30 acres. Director George Heinekey of the Capital Regional District reports that the size has been established by the department of municipal affairs.

Mr. Heinekey added that the arbitrary size is not practical.

"It should be judged on the productivity of the land and the type of farming undertaken," he protested.

The 30-acre minimum is a figure introduced in the amendments to the original draft

Total agricultural land reserve on Salt Spring Island is 8,172.93 acres. This represents 17.3% of the total island area. Lower proportion of Outer Islands land is so designated.

On the Outer Islands, the 7,778.13 acres is 14.47% of the total area.

Other parts of the Capital Regional District have far larger agricultural land areas designated. Exceptions are Victoria, Oak Bay and Esquimalt, with no farmland reserves.

Mr. Heinekey told Driftwood last week that he has a map of the entire Capital Region in his office at the Court House. He is awaiting a large map of Salt Spring Island to show the

details of reserved land on that island alone.

Other areas of the district with land reserves are, North Saanich, 5,180 acres, or 44.69%; Central Saanich, 7,627.3 acres or 61.64%; Saanich 7,097.3 acres, 26.7%; View Royal, 494.1 or 15.34%; Langford, 33.56%; Colwood, 15.6%; Metchosin, 23.46% and, Sooke, 2.63%.

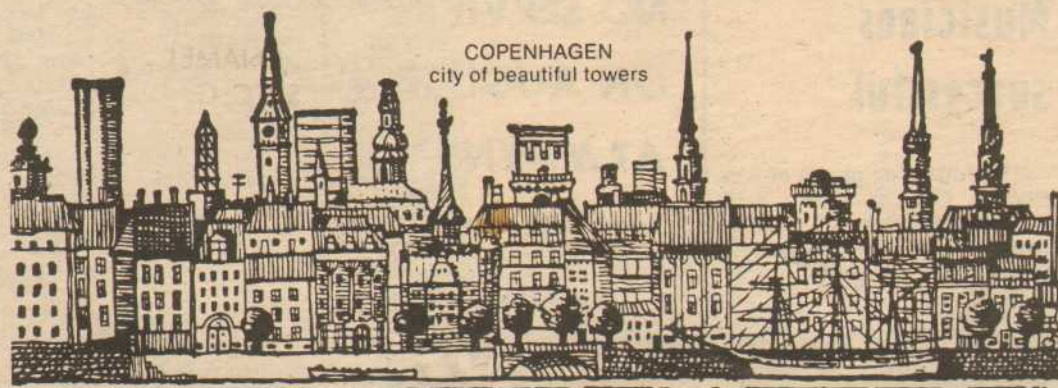

THE ARBITRARY FARM

Newest interpretation of the Land Commission Act has set 30 acres as the minimum size for a viable farm in the islands. The Land Commission Act was not one of the government's most popular legislative projects and the sweeping generalization that all property so designated could be farmland was one of the issues over which many land-owners found themselves at issue with the provincial government.

Director George Heinekey has already taken issue with the minister for his adoption of the 30-acre figure. The Salt Spring Island regional spokesman feels that an arbitrary figure is unsatisfactory for its lack of concern with the nature of the property. There will be many to agree with him, but the act still provides for an appeal against inclusion in the Agricultural Land Reserve.

Salt Spring Islanders should check the new maps in Director Heinekey's office to ascertain the designation of their own properties. If they disagree with the classification they can, and must file an appeal.

The present specifics are of interest and concern to islanders. Of far greater importance is the likely reaction of the government to any protest or plea for amendment of such classifications.

SUMMER THEATRE

For two summers in succession there has been a summer theatre program staged on Salt Spring Island. Actors and directors have come to the island from Hollywood to take part in the presentation of less than common plays with a greater than common level of quality.

Author of the Summer Theatre is Mr. Stuart Margolin, who came from the Hollywood stage to enjoy his island property and promptly brought the stage to his new home.

This means of bringing exceptional quality performances to the islands has been warmly welcomed by hundreds of islanders. It is an annual event which many islanders look forward to. In the ordinary course of events professional theatre would never be seen in so small a community.

It is likely that many of the islanders who attend these shows have only a hazy idea of how the summer theatre works and how it gets its money. It is only because the players voluntarily take part that the project ever came to light. In general the participants give their very valuable time for almost two weeks of long-drawn-out rehearsals. The event could never come into being any other place. Travel and out-of-pocket expenses are met from the revenues of the theatre.

Salt Spring Island Summer Theatre is a theatre society at Ganges. It has its own bank account in Ganges. Those are its only assets. The assets are small because the account is small. The community is in the debt of the Summer Theatre because it usually costs money to stage a show here. It can never pay dividends. That is merely another reason to be grateful to Mr. Margolin and his merry men.

THERE'S MORE TO A REACTOR THAN ITS POWER OUTPUT CANADA'S SCIENTISTS LEARN

(DAILY COLONIST)

Late in February in an article from Washington, Nigel Hawkes wrote in The Observer that "critics are beginning to turn an unflattering spotlight on the pride of America's nuclear power program, the fast breeder reactor. What they have to say has implications which go far beyond American shores, because Britain, France and the Soviet Union have also given the fast breeder a prominent place in their energy planning."

Mr. Hawkes went on to explain that the villain in the fast-breeder reactor is plutonium, "an essential ingredient in fast breeders and quite possibly the nastiest material known to man," and according to experts "fiendishly toxic." Plutonium is produced in commercial nuclear power plants by the bombardment of uranium-238 with neutrons, he said; in the case of the successfully designed fast breeder the plant would produce more plutonium to fuel further power generation than it would burn in the form of uranium.

According to Mr. Hawkes the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission estimates that by the year 2000, cumulative production of plutonium in the United States alone will have reached 4,500 metric tons, and a fair proportion of this will be shipped about the country in trains, from reactors to reprocessing plants. If fast breeders are to come, man must learn to live with an extensive traffic in one of the deadliest poisons he has yet discovered. That calculated U. S. production, he quoted

scientists as saying, would be sufficient if distributed around the world as an aerosol to give every person on earth 10 million times a cancer-producing dose.

Thus the announcement that Britain has decided to enlist Canadian technical and supply facilities in co-operatively developing its next generation of nuclear reactor power stations comes as a sign of recognition that Canada's Candu system, using unenriched uranium and a heavy-water coolant and not producing a great deal of plutonium, is likely to be more acceptable than the American system not only at home but wherever nuclear power stations may be marketable.

British Energy Minister Eric Varley indeed has virtually said so in remarking that the decision on co-operation with Canada did not imply any judgment on the safety of the U. S. system but that nevertheless there were fears that the U. S. system might not en-

joy "public confidence."

No wonder the president of Atomic Energy of Canada, Dr. Lorne Gray, was reported "thrilled" by the announcement. It does not mean that Canada will profit immediately by sales of heavy water and equipment to the United Kingdom, but it does give a pat on the back to Canadian achievement and, at the same time, it provides hope of an expanding export industry.

Power costs boosted by hike

Electric rates will be increased for all categories of consumers to meet rising costs of providing service, says B. C. Hydro.

Increases announced today range from up to 20 per cent for residential customers to about 70 per cent for bulk power users.

For 78 per cent of residential customers' bills, the increase will amount to less than \$3 per month. Included are bills for monthly consumption below 900 kilowatt-hours (kwh). For customers who are at the monthly minimum level (66 kwh or less) the increase will be only 40 cents.

"Since the last increase in

Hydro's residential electric rates, in 1970, there have been tremendous inflationary pressures affecting our capital expenditures and operating costs," Mr. Cass-Beggs said. Since 1970 the price of diesel oil increased nearly 80 per cent, and Bunker C oil went up more than 200 per cent. Hydro requires oil, to fuel its thermal and diesel generating stations, explained a spokesman for the utility.

The retail consumer price index for British Columbia increased 24 per cent between 1970 and 1974, from 121.8 to 150.6. The Canadian general wholesale index has gone up even faster during those four years, from 289.9 to 444.5 -- an increase of 53 per cent.

The new residential rates go into effect on and after August 1, though the increase may not show on bills for most customers until October 1 or later, depending on each customer's billing period.

Following are some comparisons of monthly residential electric costs (excluding provincial sales tax) at the present and new rates:

* A small apartment suite without electric water or space heating, monthly consumption 150 kwh -- monthly cost will rise 90 cents from \$4.50 to \$5.40;

* A house with electric water heating but not electric space heating, monthly consumption 1,000 kwh -- monthly cost will rise \$3.20 from \$16.70 to \$19.90;

* A house with both electric water heating and electric space heating, monthly consumption 3,000 kwh -- monthly cost will rise \$7.20 from \$38.70 to \$45.90.

FARMLAND RESERVE IS UNDER FIRE FROM JIM CAMPBELL OF CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT

An Agricultural Land Reserve in the Capital Regional District was approved by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council on June 28 and designated by the B. C. Land Commission on July 9.

It is not yet known how much the amended version differs in size from the plan submitted by the district to the B. C. Land Commission more than seven months ago.

Regional Board Chairman Jim Campbell, who has been a farmer on Saturna Island for the past 28 years, commented after examining the maps returned by the commission that that government agency had shown a "total lack of sensitivity" to the district's recommendations.

Not only had they ignored the district's recommendations for inclusion of certain lands and exclusion of other lands, but they had turned the task over to technical people who prefer to draw straight lines rather than follow natural contours of the land, Campbell said. "They subverted our work and I am really very disappointed," he said.

There has been a freeze on the subdivision of all farm land over two acres in size throughout British Columbia since December 21, 1972.

No building permits have been issued for non-agricultural construction on such property since January 18, 1973, with one exception - that since June 4, 1973, one single family dwelling per lot has been allowed, providing the dwelling would be eligible for the home-owner grant.

These restrictions imposed by Cabinet Orders are still in effect but now they will apply in this district only to property designated as farm land on the land reserve maps.

Anyone interested in presenting his views is requested to inform the committee of his intent to do so as soon as possible. Written briefs should be submitted by Friday, August 23, 1974.

The committee will review and study all briefs, after which a series of public hearings will be held in September when persons who have submitted briefs will be given an opportunity to speak and answer questions on their submission.

The places, dates and times of the public hearings will be published in the press early in September.

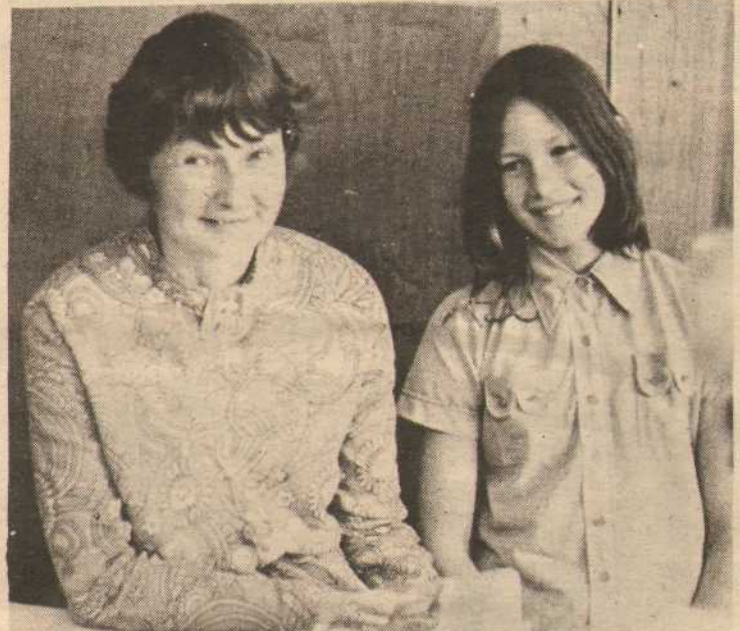

THE BEAUTIFUL PEOPLE

PLAY IS WARMLY RECEIVED BY ISLANDERS

Summer theatre made a solid hit on Salt Spring Island last week.

For the second year in succession Stuart Margolin's dream of professional theatre in the sticks came true for islanders and island visitors. Saroyan's Beautiful People were beautiful on the island stage as a series of enthusiastic audiences flocked to the Activity Centre to take it all in.

The company was strictly professional, with one local participant. It speaks well for the artistry of Salt Spring Island's Marilyn Taylor that no visitor could have identified the only amateur in the cast.

The Beautiful People was not everyone's play but the majority of islanders enjoyed the presentation and forgot the lack of plot or continuity that is essentially Saroyan.

Quality of the performance was high and it sailed through without a hesitation or a hair out of place. Taking the burden of the opener was Bobby Coker in the role of Owen Webster, hopping about the stage until Harmony Blueblossom appeared in the person of Marilyn Taylor.

Elayne Heilveil as Agnes was a young woman in love, illogical and more in the clouds than normal. Agnes was cast in the forties and could easily have been forecast for the seventies.

The motive force of the play was Jonah Webster, John Anderson. He was the meaning behind the pattern and his soliloquies were the outline of Saroyanism. For the duration of the play Anderson was Webster.

The light relief was George Furth's interpretation of the in-

surance agent, Mr. Prim, chasing the missing mouse.

Directing the play and taking the part of Dan Hillboy, Stuart Margolin was a convincing rub-a-dub.

If there had been an award for the top clerical role it would have been presented to Clark Gordon as Father Hogan. In truth, it could have gone nowhere else as there was only one clerical role. Michael Dunnagan floated through the play in the haunting strains of a mouth organ, finally showing himself in the last moments of the last act, accompanied by Steve, otherwise known as Jerry Riopelle.

Not every visitor was delighted. The play did not appeal to those who were expecting a more substantial plot. Those who went to see what this group of accomplished Hollywood actors would do with a

notoriously ethereal tale were treated to a pleasant evening's performance.

This is the end of the second season of summer theatre on Salt Spring Island. Last year Gardner McKay's very simple Sea Marks opened the series with Joshua Bryant and Margot Kidder as the only players.

The more sophisticated theatregoers looked askance at the production, but the simple islanders laughed with it, wept with it and enjoyed it.

The Beautiful People would never have been produced on Salt Spring Island under any other circumstances. The Summer Theatre chose it, cast it, rehearsed it and presented it. Next year's choice may be anything, but it is just as likely to be a mediaeval drama as a television style of light entertainment.

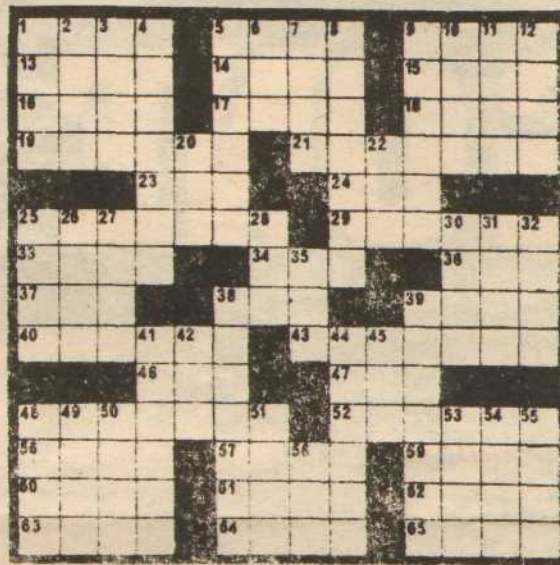

QUESTION: What does the church refer to when they talk about the second coming of Christ?

ANSWER: The Subject of Christ's coming back to earth is the most frequently mentioned subject in the New Testament. There are over 300 references to it. His coming deals with a time in the near future when Christ will make an actual physical return to the earth. Being so prominent in the scriptures, it should be one of the main doctrines of the church, and yet some people say that it is not really important. But its very important to realize that once Jesus comes again the day of God's grace, that we live in, will be ended. This is why I preach salvation so much, because the time is so short, and God's patience with this sinful world is running out. Once Christ comes, you will have lost your chance to accept his love and salvation.

Jesus is coming back in the same manner as he ascended up into heaven. They actually saw Jesus going up and disappearing through the clouds. (Acts 1:9-11) In John 14:1-4 Jesus states that He was going up to heaven but that He would return to get all the people that truly believe on Him, and take them to a place He has prepared in heaven. (1 Thessalonians 4:13-18)

Paul lived his life in expectation of Christ's return. (Romans 13:11, 12) The urgency of the time motivates us to tell all those who will listen, that Jesus loves them so much that He died and rose again. And He even loves us so much that even through our failures, He is coming back for His true church. But it's our responsibility to become a member of His church and thus receive the eternal life He has for us. (Revelation 3:20). To do this we must personally pray and ask Christ's forgiveness for our sin. We then ask Him into our life, to change us and give us eternal life. Once we have expressed our need to Jesus that we need Him in our life as saviour and Lord, that is when we obtain God's salvation. From that time on He will never leave us nor forsake us. Jesus now keeps us in His hand till He personally returns for us at His second coming. (Romans 10:13 1 Peter 1:5).

TRAINING VETERINARIANS IN GHANA

Salt Spring island veterinarian is in Africa. He is teaching the rudiments of animal care to young students who will work to safeguard cattle and other farm animals in the future.

Dr. David Lott, accompanied by his wife, Joan, has been sent to Ghana by the Canadian government as part of a foreign-aid program. They are stationed in Pong Tamale at the veterinary college.

The island family is not completely cut off from home. They still read Driftwood, albeit a little later than islanders. The May 23 issue arrived in Pong Tamale on June 29, which is a very fair service for surface mail, wrote Mrs. Lott.

Life on the school station is a mixture, she reported. "We have a large, spacious, two-bedroom house, lino-tiled throughout with high and airy ceilings. There are two sets of glass doors and large units of six-foot louvered glass wind-

ows in the living room. They are sited so that there is almost always a breeze going through. In addition there is a large ceiling fan. Bedrooms are the same.

"There is 24-hour electricity from a generator on the

outside tap. But we are thankful for that amount. They say that last year in the dry season none of the houses or livestock barns had water for 15 days. Then it had to be hauled by tractor from the river four miles away.

hangs idle over the bathtub. But not to worry - who needs hot water when the temperature is in the 80s.

The greatest help around the house is the cook-steward, Francis. Francis started working as a cook's helper "when I

cattle when they're really hungry. It's a slow job but breaks the monotony of classes and provides an opportunity for a lot of kidding around by these cheerful young people.

Shopping is difficult on our weekly trips to town in the school's only vehicle, a beat-up Bedford pickup. One week there was no margarine, another no flour. The next week the only flour you could buy was in large sacks - 140 lbs. for \$26. Prices are horrible - cornflakes \$1 for 6 oz., instant coffee 3.49 for 8 oz., and we had to pay \$35 for an electric kettle! Petrol is \$1.50 a gal, but as our V.W. ordered in March still hasn't arrived we haven't yet had to bear that pain. The only real bargain is big avocados at 10¢ each and the nicest pineapples I've eaten anywhere for 40-50¢ depending whether they're large or super-large.

One item I was expecting to find which doesn't seem to exist is postcards, so I hope the people to whom I promised one will bear with me until I find some.

I'm glad to hear summer has come to Salt Spring. Hope it's a good one!

"As the tractor is elderly and needed for a host of other jobs, I wonder if it will survive another dry time..." We have a good fridge which works hard to keep ahead of the heat. The stove is propane and adequate. Getting the propane itself is a bit of a problem, they only allow one cylinder to a customer so you have to run out before you can get a refill! This happened one day last week and meant sending a boy on a bike to a nearby village to buy charcoal and a little burner cleverly made out of tins - price 90¢. It worked but supper was late that night! A hot water heater was put in the house in April but no one knows how to hook it up so although the electrician comes 21 miles from Tamale every 2 weeks or so to visit it, it just

was a pikin" in 1939, so really knows his stuff. We are going to be spoiled rotten and may never recover.

This is a picture of Dave with some of the students who are training for para-veterinary duties. This day they had been on a work session doing fencing in an effort to keep the sheep, goats and cattle of squatting villagers out of the improved pastures and test plots. The minimum of equipment they have to work with is hard to believe - some angle iron posts (because of termites), barbed wire, tying wire, one sledge hammer and a barrel for the man to stand on, a hammer, pair of pliers and a bent pipe with a notch in it for pulling the wire tight. Anything less than 7 strands is unlikely to keep out both goats and

BODY FOUND AT MUSGRAVE LAST WEEK

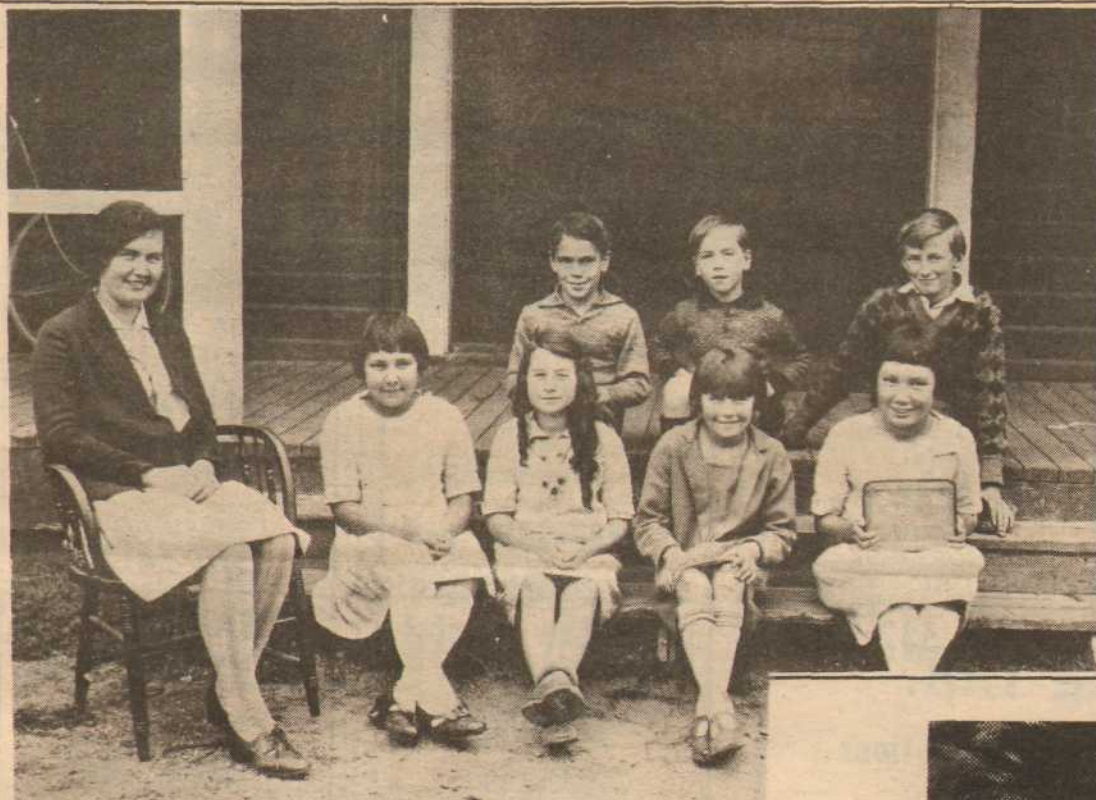
Prospector who had worked on Salt Spring Island was found dead on Tuesday last week.

THAT'S WHERE THE CALL GOES

Islanders who pay income tax may call the district taxation office free of charge. This is no change in policy. Only change is the office they call. In the past, the toll-free tax

office number linked the caller with Vancouver. In future the island taxpayer will be connected with the Victoria office.

Rates of income tax will not

be affected by the change.

Announcing the change from Vancouver to Victoria, a spokesman for the taxation office explained that the switch has been made in order to offer an improved service to islanders.

Residents of the Gulf Islands seeking information on their income tax affairs should, in future, write to the District Taxation Office at 1415 Vancouver St., Victoria.

New Victoria-based link applies to all the islands, including North and South Pender, Saturna, Mayne, Galiano, Parker, Gossip, Prevost and Tumbo Islands.

Number for income tax is Zenith 0-4000.

Taxpayers are warned of a tip for checking their returns. When the islander gets his income tax return at the end of the year the number in the top left-hand corner should be "28". It is the number by which they are identified in the computer. Previously this number was 27.

"Anyone not picked up in the computer change-over," said the same spokesman, "should change the 28 to 27, in ink."

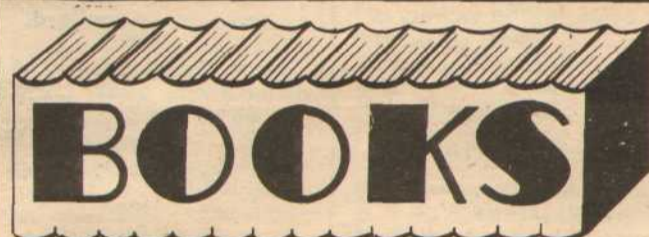
Work on the hall addition is coming on fine. They laid a lot of cement last week and should be able to start on the construction part very soon.

HOW CAN I???

By Anne Ashley

Q. How can I clean leather and nylon upholstery in my car?

A. Whip up a solution of detergent and ammonia, and using just the suds and a clean cloth or brush, go over the upholstery with this. Finish off by wiping with another cloth rinsed out of clear water. Usually does a first-rate job.

Q. What is the proper way to cut off excess carpeting?

A. Turn the carpet upside down, and use a very sharp knife to sever the cords. As a guide for making a straight cut, keep the knife blade between two parallel filler or warp strands.

Q. What can I do about a shrunken sweater?

A. This sweater can often be restored to shape by wetting it, dropping it into a pillow case, hanging the pillow case on the line by the hem, and letting water drip into it. Do not wring the sweater.

Q. How can I keep buttonholes from fraying when working them into loosely-woven fabrics?

A. You can achieve a good, long-lasting buttonhole if you'll first apply a thin line of clear fingernail polish exactly where the hole is to be made. Let this

dry, then cut the buttonhole with a razor blade or buttonhole scissors, and work as usual.

Q. Any suggestions for the repair of a broken coil on a hot-plate?

A. Try hooking the two ends of the break together, putting a pinch of borax on the joint, then turning on the heat. The coil will often weld together very nicely.

Q. How can I keep watercress fresh and crisp for several days?

A. Wash and drain it, then place it in a heavy paper bag and keep in a moderately cold section of your refrigerator.

Q. Any special tips for the neat filling-in of deep, ugly-looking nail holes in my plastered walls?

A. Here's one good repair: Mix up a little talcum powder or cornstarch with a few drops of water, force this into the holes, and smooth off around the edges with your fingertips. More such repair tips are included in my new household book.

Q. Is there anything I can do about a dish that is cracked, but not actually broken?

A. You can often obliterate the crack and strengthen the dish just by setting it in a pan of milk and boiling for about 45 minutes.



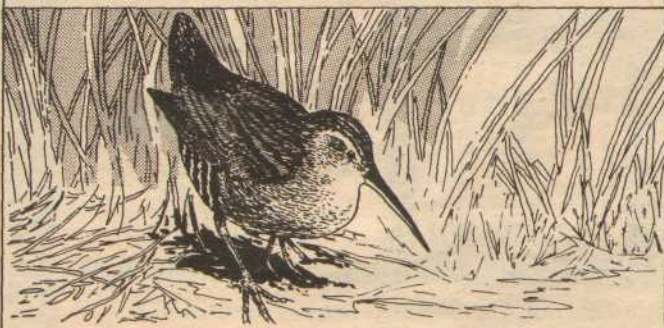

Electric rate increases: the reasons why.

In order to meet the rising costs of providing service, B.C. Hydro's electric rates will be increased for all categories of customers.

For residential customers, the increase will be up to 20%; for large industrial customers, the increase will be 50 to 55%; for bulk power users, approximately 70%. Revisions of other non-residential rates, including general rates for commercial customers, are still under review and will be announced soon.

Inflation Affects B.C. Hydro, too

B.C. Hydro experiences the effects of inflation in many areas, just as you do. In addition to higher wages and salaries, higher material costs and interest rates, B.C. Hydro is faced with increases in fuel costs and new expenditures for environmental protection measures. Among the latter are:

- Advance studies of environmental and social impact of all potential new power projects.
- Measures to offset and compensate for effects of projects approved for development.
- Improved clearing standards for new reservoirs and clearing programs to transform a number of older reservoirs into attractive recreation areas.

Prices Rise Rapidly

Since the last increase in B.C. Hydro's residential electric rates in 1970, there have been tremendous inflationary pressures affecting our capital expenditure and operating costs.

Let's look at some of the changes during that time. Since 1970, the price of diesel oil has increased 80 per cent. Bunker C oil has risen more than 200 per cent.

The retail consumer price index for British Columbia increased 24 per cent between 1970 and 1974, from 121.8 to 150.6. The Canadian general wholesale index has gone up even faster during those four years, from 289.9 to 444.5—an increase of 53 per cent.

Increase Less Than \$3 Per Month On Most Bills

- On 78% of residential customers' bills (those with monthly consumption below 900 Kilowatt hours) the increase will amount to less than \$3.00 per month.
- For customers who are at the monthly minimum level (66 kwh or less) the increase will be only 40¢.

These new residential rates go into effect on and after August 1, 1974, although the increase will not show on most customers' bills until October 1 or later, depending on each customer's billing period.

Here are some examples of monthly electric charges at the present and new rates:

- Small apartment suite without either electric space heating or electric water heating: monthly consumption, 150 kwh — present monthly cost, \$4.50; cost at new rates, \$5.40, an increase of 90¢.
- House with electric water heating, but without electric space heating: monthly consumption, 1000 kwh — present monthly cost, \$16.70; cost at new rates, \$19.90, an increase of \$3.20.
- House with both electric space heating and electric water heating: monthly consumption, 3,000 kwh — present monthly cost, \$38.70; cost at new rates, \$45.90, an increase of \$7.20.

The increase in residential electric rates will be the first since 1970. When you compare the increase in the cost of electricity with the price increases affecting virtually every commodity and service in recent years, the relative stability of electric rates is apparent.

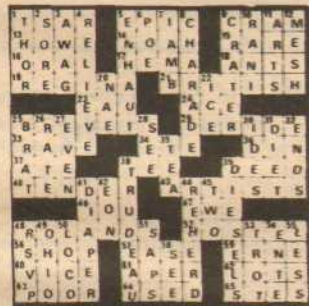
RULES TO TAKING FISH

Clam diggers are out there, digging. They are digging some very tasty clams lately, but not all diggers know all the rules.

Sections of island coastlines are closed to shell-fish harvesting. Detailed lists of the closed areas are obtainable from the health department or the department of fisheries, but, in general, the closed areas are those in the vicinity of wharves and other shore installations.

No shellfish in B. C. are poisonous in themselves, but they may be made unfit to eat in one of two ways; either by feeding in waters that are polluted by sewage or by feeding on toxic organisms.

The organism named Gonyaulax catenella affects mainly clams and mussels. If these organisms move in to an area where shellfish are bedded they may become unsafe for human consumption.



During the summer months the organisms grow rapidly and may give a red tinge to the sea water, hence the common name - red tide.

By cooking seafood adequately, bacteria will be destroyed. This is not true for shellfish affected with the red tide poison. Cooked or uncooked, the toxic material stays intact.

A pamphlet put out by the fisheries branch suggests that all shellfish be cooked unless you are certain the water which covered them was clean.

To harvest clams the best idea is to get to the beach at low tide and dig where squirts of water are coming out of the sand.

For butter and little neck clams the limit is 24 clams per person per day.

The Razor clam digging areas are presently closed due to the red tide, according to the fisheries pamphlet.

For crabs the possession limit is six in any one day and the minimum size is six and one-half inches across greatest width of shell.

The possession limit for oysters is 25 in the shell or one quart of shucked oysters per person per day.

DANGER TOYS

Floating toys can be blown away by the wind or spurt from tiny damp hands. In an attempt to recover his toy, a child can be lured into deep water.
