CRUISER ADRIFT

Overhot and flat batteries

Two ferry vessels were delayed by a distress signal on Saturday afternoon after leaving Swartz Bay.

Vancouver ferry saw the skipper of a large pleasure cruiser waving for help and relayed the call by radio to the Bowen Queen. The Salt Spring Island vessel went alongside the So Yo from Vancouver to offer help. She was considerably north of her normal route.

The Bowen Queen stood by while a sailboat came to the rescue and took the stricken cruiser in tow.

Skipper of the So Yo reported to the ferry crew that his motor had overheated and that two batteries had died on him.

It was not without its lighter aspects. The skipper hung over the prow of his crippled boat and tied a rope to the ring.

"At least he can tie a bowline," commented an impressed crew member.

"That wasn't a bowline," protested a passenger, "that was two half-hitches." Bowen Queen carried on to Fulford Harbour while the So Yo struggled back to Swartz Bay.

PATIENT'S HOME IS WRECKED

Home on Reid Island was visited by vandals while its owner was away in hospital. When Joe Silvey returned to his Reid Island home, from Lady Minto Hospital he found the house had been torn apart. Theft and damage amounted to more than \$10,000.

RCMP are investigating the wrecking of his home. His possessions had been ransacked and what was not stolen was smashed.

SATURNA PLANT LAYS OFF STAFF

Light aggregate plant at Saturna Island is closed.

All staff received their final cheques at the week end and the operation ground to a halt.

Rumours of the closing of the plant recently were followed by a strike, when the employees asked for a hike of \$1 an hour and other benefits. Strike was not settled, but the plant has been closed.

The plant cools finely ground shale and produces a lightweight aggregate for mixing with cement in construction.

Similar plant on Salt Spring Island closed down a decade ago.

Operators of the Saturna plant report a steadily declining market and no hope has been held out for a resumption of its operation.

Sheep are wantonly killed

Worst incident of sheep-killing in years came to light on Salt Spring Island last week.

W. John Stepaniuk, of Ganges reported to the RCMP detachment at Ganges the discovery of three dead sheep on his farm. All had been shot dead and left.

Police have investigated the killing and have not yet discovered the culprits.

"They appear to have been simply wantonly killed," commented a police spokesman.

Nude bathing is illegal warn police

Nude swimming is reported on the islands. Nudity, warns the RCMP Detachment at Ganges is prohibited under the Criminal Code.

Nude bathing is not permitted on public beaches, nor on beaches open to the public gaze.

ONE DAY LESS IS THAT ONE DAY LATE

There will be one more day next week. Driftwood will appear on the street 24 hours later than usual.

Monday is a statutory holiday and Driftwood staff will sleep it off. They will arrive, refreshed on Tuesday morning and get going 24 hours late.

OFFICER GOES TO ALBERTA

Const. Ken Danforth is leaving the islands. The RCMP officer has been at Ganges for several years.

The move to Edmonton spells a major change in duties for the police officer. He will be stationed with the crime laboratory at Edmonton, where he will specialize in investigation.

RCMP have crime laboratories in a number of cities across the country. Each lab serves the detachments in the same general area.

First move in the new move was the purchase of a home. Mr. and Mrs. Danforth have already bought their own home in the Alberta city and that makes up for the move from the gentle climate of the coast.

Danforth was stationed at the north of Vancouver Island before coming to the islands.

Point Roberts want no park

When a director of the Capital Regional District went to the state of Washington to listen to American reaction to international parks, he was invited to speak for the district.

George Heinekey was in Point Roberts last week to take in the meeting on the problems of the American colony. He introduced himself to the

committee members and was invited to take part in the deliberations.

Meeting was held by a state committee of three, two senators and a representative. The main point at issue was the lack of water in Point Roberts.

The meeting heard a proposal for the provision of housing for about 50,000 people

in the six square miles that is Point Roberts. Meeting, both American and Canadian participants appeared to favour the development proposal.

Development plan provides for extensive public beaches as well as other services.

The plan was endorsed from the floor, said Mr. Heinekey.

In connection with the international park proposal, the meeting voted two in favour and about 200 against the mooted plan. Meeting was approximately evenly divided into Canadians and Americans.

A state senator warned the meeting that the international park proposal would result in the loss of all property rights.

When Mr. Heinekey spoke of the islands opposition to the plan and the straw vote taken by Driftwood he was warmly applauded.

B.C. DAY IS MONDAY IS HOLIDAY

Next Monday is BC Day. In British Columbia it is a holiday. Some workers get paid for the day if their agreement requires the employer to do so.

Stores will be closed. Post offices will distribute no mail and banks will be sealed tight. Industry will grind to a halt. It is a holiday.

The day was declared a statutory holiday by the BC Legislature at the last session.

Rochon was found on the beach and was taken to Ganges. He was pronounced dead by Dr. Ron Puhky. Death was attributed to a fractured skull.

The dead man had been employed on the island at Galiano Lodge.

of the big mammals along the coast between Victoria and Campbell River.

Any islander seeing a killer whale between those two dates is urged to call, collect, Nanaimo 758-6432, for the killer whale census.

The census office will dispatch a fast boat and cameraman. By photographing the whales, fisheries and other officials will be able to identify each animal. The whale's dorsal fin is like a human finger. It carries an indelible and unmistakable print. The nicks and marks in the fin are not the same for any two animals.

The census must be carried out by boat, explained Dr. Michael Bigg at Nanaimo. The killer whale will stay under water for up to five minutes at a time and a plane cannot stay with him.

Do it quickly, urges Bigg. See a whale... make a call. That way the boat has a good chance of getting there in time to see what's going on.

IMPEACHMENT 200 YEARS AGO

While the story of impeachment is prominent in every news report in any medium available, the story of earlier impeachments in other lands has been forgotten.

The original impeachment proceedings were a function of the British administrative system. Provision was long since made whereby the House of Commons could bring charges against an individual in

connection with his administration of his duties as an officer or servant of the Crown. He would then be tried by the House of Lords.

This system of protection of the public business was allowed to lapse a century ago and the routine of impeachment is now transferred to the courts in England.

Last time impeachment was used in the British system was about the middle of the last century when Lord Palmerston was threatened with it.

Last great impeachment trial was that of Warren Hastings. The trial followed his brilliant administration in India, when he saved an empire for Britain. His methods of raising money for the maintenance of troops, his lack of political influence and the political expediency of the day all contributed to his trial after he had saved everything that Clive had earlier won.

The trial proceeded for nine years from the time that Edmund Burke opened the case in the House of Commons.

It was the last great trial for impeachment. It was the last trial of its kind in which the action failed and it was the last impeachment proceedings in which the accused won his case and lost almost everything else.

ADOPTED CHILDREN

New proposals for the maintenance of a register for adopted children represents a complete reversal of the philosophy of adoption. It savours a little of the modern trend towards a mechanical human relationship, unhindered by emotion or other irrational considerations.

If it is to be the right and privilege of the adopted child to have access to his natural parents at the time of his majority, the principle of the absorption of the adopted child into a new family is an archaic memory from a foolish past.

It is a problem in human relationships and no answer is positively right and no answer is positively wrong. It would be woefully wrong, however, to make such a scheme retroactive. Adoptive parents and natural parents have entered into an undertaking in accordance with all the protection available under the law. They are entitled to expect the community to honour its commitments.

INTERNATIONAL PARK

Director George Heinekey returned from a meeting in the United States colony of Point Roberts last week to report that the public hearing called by the state government had flatly rejected the concept of an international park. Subsequent meetings in the state of Washington were reported to have shared that view of a park to embrace the Canadian and the American islands.

Mr. Heinekey also reported that when he reported to the Point Roberts meeting a summary of the recent straw vote carried out by Driftwood he met with applause.

This public reaction in the United States to a proposal already rejected by Canadian islanders takes the likelihood a little further away. With the most vitally affected areas of two countries both showing hostility to the plan, it is less likely to be endorsed by the four governments whose approval is essential to its adoption.

Plan would establish a 3,000 square mile marine park with administrative headquarters in Point Roberts.

Offered by the International Joint Commission, the proposal would require the approval of the governments of British Columbia and Washington State as well as Ottawa and the United States government in Washington.

DRIVING SOMEWHERE ?

City driving demands constant attention and all your driving skill. Chances of having an accident are many times greater driving in the city than on rural highways. You can reduce those odds by applying the basic principle of Defensive Driving.

Get the complete traffic picture. Pay particular attention to traffic ahead, not just to the vehicle directly in front of you but to the movements of vehicles far ahead, so you can anticipate emer-

gencies.

Move along with the traffic flow - neither faster or slower - although you should always stay within the posted speed limit. Heavy city traffic has to keep moving smoothly and steadily. A little thought and courtesy on your part will go a long way to prevent a delay or even an accident.

Sudden stops in city traffic are common. Watch for any advance warning of traffic stopping ahead. Always maintain a safe following distance

- at least one vehicle length for each 10 m. p. h. of speed.

Motorcycles and bicycles often slip into tight spaces - between vehicles or between the curb and your vehicle - so watch for them. Because of their small size and manoeuvrability you must be alert for their presence and be prepared for anything.

A great many accidents occur at city intersections. Pedestrians crossing and vehicles accelerating, stopping and turning are just a few of the intersection hazards that require constant alertness.

ON THE FREEWAY

The technique of driving freeways is different, but the following tips will help you to avoid mishaps -

Know your exit before you enter the freeway. If the highway is unfamiliar, study your route map ahead of time.

When you enter the freeway, build up your speed in the acceleration lane so you can blend with the traffic already on the roadway. Avoid any abrupt deceleration or stopping as you enter the freeway. It can set you up as a target for a rear-end collision. Drivers travelling the freeway can assist vehicles about to enter the freeway by moving to the left lane if it is clear of traffic - a good rule, a courteous one to the driver of the entering vehicle.

While driving on the freeway, use the right lane except when passing. On freeways with more than two lanes in one direction, select the lane that suits the speed you plan to drive. Never slow down suddenly in a traffic lane. If you must stop for some emergency, slow down gradually to warn other drivers and get as far onto the shoulder as possible.

Watch your fuel gauge; fuel stops are far apart.

Remember to use your turn signal when passing or changing lanes. As in other types of driving, you must communicate your intentions to other motorists. If you miss an exit go on to the next one. Never back up on a freeway.

When leaving the freeway, move into the appropriate traffic lane well in advance. Enter the deceleration lane and reduce your speed to the posted limit of the ramp. Check your speedometer for an indication of your speed; don't rely on your senses.

It is dangerous to swim alone--anywhere, anytime. Always swim with a buddy, and if possible at times when a lifeguard is on duty. Keep in the swim with Red Cross Water Safety.

- Don't start a campfire where the Forest Service, a property owner or a tenant has posted a notice prohibiting fires.



- Don't start a campfire when a strong wind is blowing.



- Don't build a bigger fire than necessary. The best cooking fire is small and hot.



- Don't build a campfire larger than four feet in diameter and three feet in height at any time.



- Don't leave your campfire unattended. Escaped campfires can become costly forest fires.

Indian game sanctuaries for visitors

At this moment in time, one of the greatest problems facing mankind is the question of ecology and the conservation of natural resources and wildlife.

India is vitally concerned with these questions, and has taken steps to ensure that one of its greatest tourist attractions — wildlife — will endure.

The country now maintains a great wealth of wildlife

throughout most parts of India. Half a century ago, India was a sportsman's paradise for hunting, but eventually game reserves were established in order to protect indigenous animals from the threat of possible extinction.

With the formation of a new India in 1947, many of these reserves were re-designated and became known as wildlife sanctuaries. Thus, the country's

wild animals and birds living in these areas are now fully protected. There is still a limited amount of game outside these sanctuaries open to sportsmen, but the government feels most visitors to the country would rather view the wildlife in natural habitats than hunt.

India's wildlife sanctuaries and national parks extend a cordial welcome to visitors.

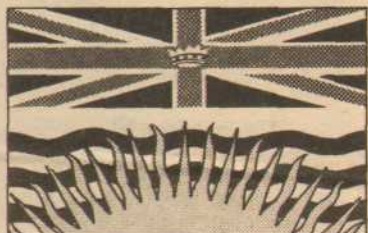
You can't keep boats on microfilm. But you can keep records that way.

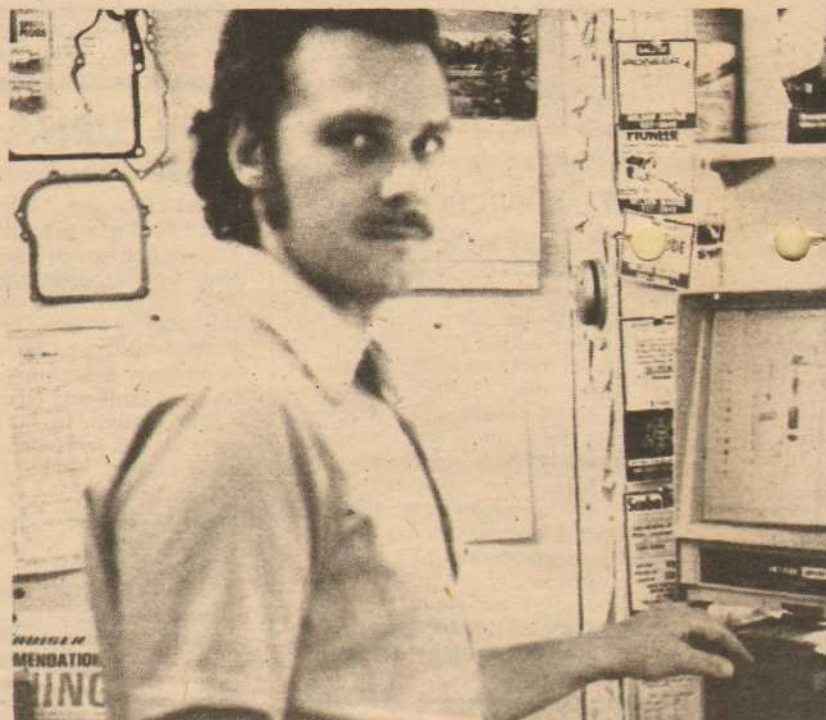

The new film and reader system for parts catalogues is not the only innovation this year for Nelson Marine.

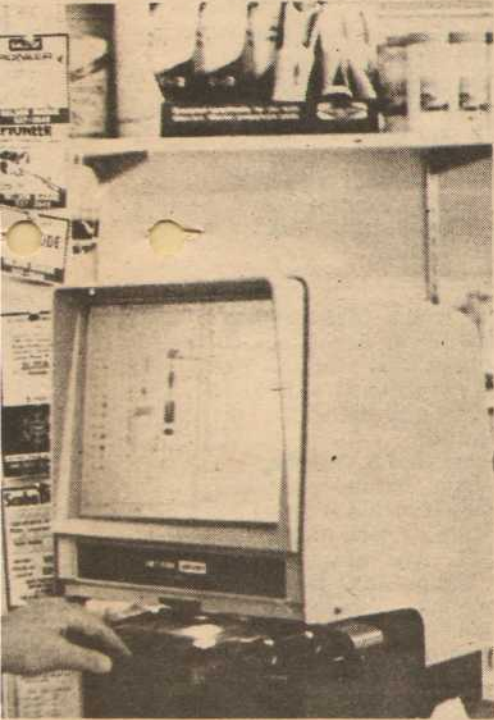

In addition to repairs to any and every boat motor, the operation also offers fibreglass and other structural repairs and painting and service to any small motor from chain saw to lawnmower.

To round off the list of his various operations, Steve adds diving and salvage.

The shop, which was once the ranger station on Salt Spring Island, is equipped with sandblaster and a spark plug re-threading tool.

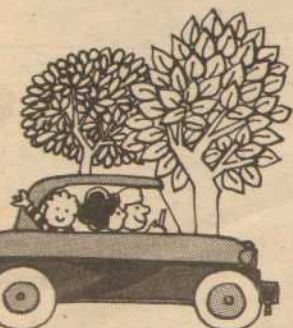

PROPOSAL COULD END ADOPTION AT AGE 19

Reunion registry is under discussion by the British Columbia Commission on Family and Children's Law. The proposal is for the establishment of a register in which would be re-

corded the names of the natural parents, the child and the adoptive parents. By this means the adopted child would be given the opportunity to refer to the register and ascer-

tain the identity of his natural parents.

Proposal runs contrary to any concept of adoption in this province for decades. In the past the identity of the natural parents has been studiously guarded and neither child nor either parents could learn anything of the antecedents of the child or his ultimate whereabouts.

The register would repres-

ent a constant opportunity for the adopted child to learn of his origins once he had reached the age of 19.

Number of British Columbians and islanders have expressed vigorous opposition to the plan.

In the past an adopted child grew up as part of his new family. He was accorded the same privileges, responsibilities, love and guidance as

the natural children of the same home. In return, he was, for ever, the child of that home.

If in later life he expressed the desire to learn the identity of his natural parents there was no way he could go about it.

Adoptive parents have formed an association in order to protest the proposals. Organization to Save the Adoptive Family is protesting the establishment of a register of adoptions and has already prepared a brief for the commission. Address of the organization is Box 1660, Victoria.

He would lean forward towards his audience and rub his hands together to explain that a man, obviously a double-dyed fool, had asked him how he would make up his cabinet.

The voice would rise and the hands would sweep round in a circle.

"I told him I would have no trouble at all." And his arms point triumphantly to the local candidate, sucking his teeth and peering through the hair that's fallen over his be-pumpled nose. "My candidates are all Cabinet material!" The voice always rose to the "all" and then died down. That one I heard until I retched each time it came out.

Easy? Perhaps. Exciting? Inspiring? You make the next guess.

The Liberal would speak at a joint meeting and next would come the Socialist. You write it that way and the Liberal was going to clap you in jail for writing his name along side the Socialist and the Socialist would be spitting mad for not having been mentioned first.

Those were the joyous newspaper days before television.

The Committee will also be prepared to hear verbal presentations at these Hearings.

SPEC still protesting sewer

Permit for the installation of a sewer system in the Ganges area is still under fire from the Scientific Pollution and Environmental Control Society

The Vancouver-based environmental group has opposed the project since its first appearance. The society appeared before the public hearing and presented a lengthy brief charging that the project could prove a detriment to the long, shallow harbour.

A new brief has been presented to the Pollution Control Branch, protesting the decision of the branch to issue a permit for the installation.

The society draws attention to the shallow, unflushed nature of the harbour. In face of the combined effects of wind and poor mixing, special attention must be given to the degree of treatment and the location of the outfall, says the society. Whether there is enough diluting water at the outfall site is a matter of opinion, it states.

"Because of the importance of this area to the region, and the province as a whole, it is best to take the conservative approach, environmentally, that is the approach with the greatest safety factor."

Proposed monitoring system is also under question in the society's brief. Although ex-

tensive, it may not be good enough to indicate environmental damage immediately. The system may also prove inadequate, contends the society, to show exactly where the contamination is coming from, the system or other sources reaching the harbour.

It had been suggested, says the brief, that SPEC had not provided any alternatives. The society contends that it has offered others. In its original brief it suggested that the outfall be extended into deeper water, somewhere between a half-mile out and a two-mile run.

The system might be installed while experiments are carried out to determine a more suitable location for the outfall. If the Pollution Control Act is not sufficiently flexible to allow of such a proposal, then it should be changed, contends the society.

An overall plan for Salt

Spring Island should be prepared by islanders to specify desired population limits and growth of facilities.

Size of the treatment plant should be limited, says SPEC to prevent exponential growth, if the residents object to such development.

Final recommendation of the society is that the area of the projected sewer service be expanded to bring in as many residences as possible.

SPEC does not feel that the presently proposed system meets the requirements for a safe and clean environment. Permit should be withheld until there is a high degree of assurance that the system will be completely effective.

Brief is signed by Don Watmough, original sponsor of SPEC's objections.

In the meantime the Capital Regional District is continuing with the preliminary assessments of the sewer project,

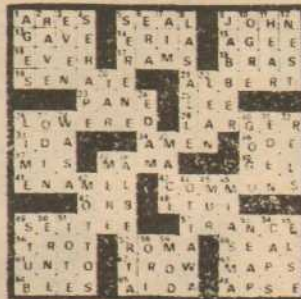
LOSES ON TWO COUNTS WHEN HE APPEARS IN COURT AT GANGES

Regulations passed pursuant to the Land Commission Act stipulate that (a) Applications under s. 9(2) for Exclusion from the Agricultural Reserve, and (b) Applications under s. 11(4) for Permission to Carry on Non-Farm Uses in the Agricultural Reserve, are to be submitted through the Regional District Offices and should not be sent directly to the Land Commission. Official applications for Exclusion must be accompanied by a fee of \$25.00, said fee has been established by Provincial Order in Council. Applicants for exclusion should bear in mind that requests considered by the Regional District at their Statutory Hearing under s. 8(3), have, in most cases, already been reconsidered by the Land Commission before the designation of the Agricultural Land Reserve Plan.

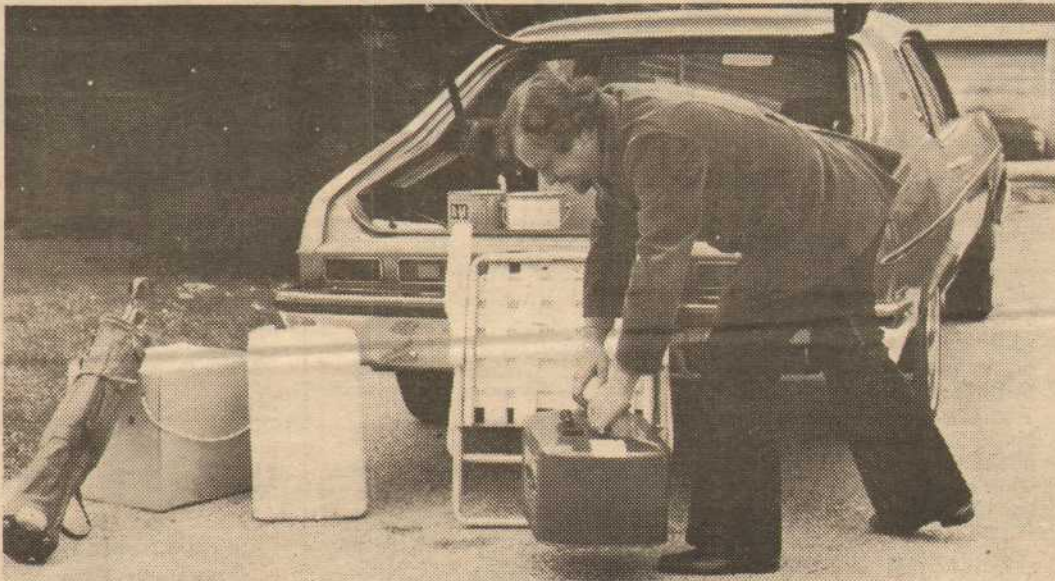

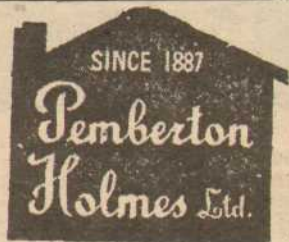

HOW CAN I???

By Anne Ashley

Q. I have plastic material that has become wrinkled and refuses to iron out. How can I deal with this?

A. Try passing your iron over the ironing board cover until the cover is quite warm, then spread the plastic over it, smoothing it over with your hands. This often has a surprising way of smoothing out these wrinkles.

Q. Is there any way to add "burning life" to candles?

A. Candles will burn considerably longer if given a coat of shellac, which tends to retain the molten wax around the wick, instead of its running down the side of the candle.

Q. How can I clean stained wallpaper?

A. Fingermarks can sometimes be removed by rubbing over them with a piece of bread. A fresh grease spot will often come off if you hold a piece of white blotting paper or a facial tissue over it with a warm iron. Also, many marks can be obliterated by careful use of a soft art-gum eraser.

Q. How can I make a good job of washing out dress shields?

A. Use lukewarm water and a teaspoon of baking soda for this. Rub soap on a small brush, and brush both sides of the shields.

Then rinse in water of the same temperature.

Q. What is a good way to prevent a washed sweater from stretching?

A. One such preventive involves your rinsing procedure. Try rinsing the sweater in a colander, squeezing out the excess water gently. One section of my new household manual deals with laundering techniques.

Q. How can I forestall the danger of yellowing in white clothing I am storing away?

A. Dip a sheet into bluing water, using enough bluing to make the sheet quite blue, then spread over the top of the chest in which the clothes are stored.

Q. How can I keep the bottom crusts of my fruit pies from becoming soggy with the juice of the fruits?

A. Bake the shell of the pie for about five minutes before putting in the fruit filling — and this will keep the juice from penetrating.

Q. How can I remove rust stains from an enameled sink or bathtub?

A. One very good rust remover is a mixture of 1/2-cup of grapefruit juice and one tablespoon of salt.

PEOPLE ARE KIND SAY KINDLY COUPLE

The Petersens, Ejnar and Pearl live near St. Mary Lake in the home that Mr. Petersen built, with the help of a friend. If you live in that general area and have ever needed a helping hand, I'm sure you found him willing and eager to offer it.

Ejnar is a Dane who left his native land, as a young man, when the urge for adventure compelled him. At first he considered going to Argentina but it was his mother who persuaded him to try Canada instead. When he first arrived in this country he farmed north of Prince Albert, Saskatchewan. His wife, Pearl, was born in Vancouver. They met in 1944 but, being cautious, felt it necessary to know each other quite well before taking the serious step into matrimony. They married in 1948. Mrs. Petersen was a practical nurse before her marriage and she also did welfare work.

Mrs. Petersen is social convenor of the Salt Spring Island Garden Club. They both enjoy their part in this club.

"After we'd joined we found people so friendly and kind." These are two qualities they both have in large measure. Pearl is also an expert bowler; something else they both enjoy.

It was in 1948 that the Petersens read about Salt Spring Island and liked what they read. They also read about a gardener here who had rigged up a carrier for weeds and produce. He made a cart with two bicycle wheels and attached it to his bicycle. This enabled him to harvest in comfort. It was the forerunner of our mechanized aids today, no doubt.

When this couple first arrived on the island they weren't too keen but, instead of leaving immediately, they decided to stay for ten days. Again, their cautious attitude shows through.

They rented a cabin from a man who raised chinchillas. Actually, they were on their way back to Vancouver when they bought the lot where their house now stands. They bought the property from Colin Mouat. It was the peace and quiet of the island that they found irresistible. They hope Salt Spring can be preserved as it now is. Its earlier charm and tranquility has gone, but we still have been able to keep a vestige of it.

The Petersens have no children of their own but enjoy the young people who stop in at their home. Prior to coming here Mr. Petersen worked for the Parks Board.

They owned their lot for 12 years before they were able to start building. Their first Christmas here they were invited to the Jesse Bond home for dinner.

They'll never forget it. The warmth and the welcome made that a very special Christmas.

When the Petersens had an anniversary dinner here in their new home, they had it sitting on the floor and found it most enjoyable.

When they were first here they'd meet friends every time they went to Ganges. Now, along with the rest of us, they find new faces outnumbering the old ones. This they find rather sad.

Before they moved over they bought supplies at Mouat's and, though they were not known here, Mouat's would wait until they returned again, in weeks or even, months. The Fuller brush man would call while the Petersens were here for the week end, prior to building, and he'd leave their order outside somewhere. Nothing was ever touched, regardless of the length of time it stayed outside. This is no longer true of our island.

The Dodds family had their farm across the lake when this couple first began coming over. They loved hearing the sheep and now miss that sound, along with others associated with farming. Lassie, one of the island's best known and loved individuals, who is always

kind and thoughtful, went out of her way then, too, to do anything she could for them. The Petersens don't forget this either.

Earlier there were only two doctors here and, at that time, too, there were only 700 registered cars. Now, Ganges seems more like a thriving metropolis -- traffic jams are not infrequent.

The Petersens have a small but adequate garden and Pearl cans her own vegetables. She makes delicious rose-hip jelly. They like gardening, these two.

I learned from others that the Petersens are wonderful neighbours. When questioned, they both agreed, "We like to help others. People are always so kind to us."

NEW AMBULANCE HEADQUARTERS

There's still an ambulance service on Salt Spring Island. Bill's Taxi operator, Bill Simpkin, is now responsible for the island ambulance. The service still uses the Lions Ambulance vehicles and the taxi operator keeps a list of available drivers.

Change has come about since the provincial government took over ambulance services. The province undertook to recognize Lions Ambulance Plan membership, but in all other instances the service costs \$5 a trip and the province meets the rest of the cost.

Under the Lions scheme drivers were volunteers and the service operated at no cost to plan members. Membership cost \$5 a year.

The government took over services in the larger centres and undertook to underwrite such smaller community services at the Salt Spring Island operation. The service club had no wish to operate as a function of government and declined the invitation to continue to run the service.

The club will receive compensation for the use of its vehicles and the provincial government has undertaken to make an offer for the purchase of the two ambulances. The club is not under obligation to sell them and if they can realize a better price outside the ambulance service they may sell them where they wish.

There is no change to the patient or person calling for the ambulance. Bill's Taxi is responsible to keep a list of drivers available and to keep the vehicles running. The provincial government accepts financial responsibility for the operation.

It is the third phase in island ambulance service. Two decades ago the service was provided by the Volunteer Fire Department. The Lions took it over and operated it in the black for a decade. The province is now responsible for the service at an increased cost.

Driver gets a flat fee for every trip he makes. Fee varies according to his qualifications.
