## THEY WANT NO LATE FERRIES

People of Vesuvius are not in favour of later ferry trips to Crofton.

The noise of traffic into the late evening lets a lot of Vesuvius residents from supporting any change, said Gunter Burger last week while meeting with the B. C. Ferry Authority officials.

The community would favour the installation of a larger ship rather than an extra service, he reported.

## No more ferry ticket sales at Fulford or Vesuvius

— LONG HARBOUR TERMINAL NOT AFFECTED BY CHANGE

This week will bring a new system of ferry tickets for Salt Spring Island. Travellers to the island, from Swartz Bay and Crofton, will purchase their tickets at those two outer ports. The tickets will cost twice the present rate, but there will be no charge made for leaving the island.

New procedure will come into effect on Thursday morning, Aug. 22, at first sailings.

The new tickets are not "return tickets", noted Bob Anderson, Islands terminal agent. They are simply island tickets and the price levied represents twice the cost of the present single trip. If a traveller comes to Salt Spring Island from Swartz Bay and leaves from Long Harbour he gets no refund. It is not a return ticket and there will be no compensation for failure to use the outward portion of the

ticket.

Tickets will be taken or sold at Swartz Bay and Crofton only. Traffic entering the ferries from Vesuvius or Fulford will board the ferry without surrendering a ticket and without any formalities.

The converse also applies. The traveller coming to the island on the Long Harbour ferry will be able to leave by either of the other two ferries without paying a fee.

New project has been introduced for two reasons. The system will make for quicker loading and turn-around at Salt Spring Island. It will also ease the burden on the ship's officers who are required to sell tickets in addition to their normal duties.

The system applies whether the traveller is using commuter tickets or paying cash. It applies to all types of vehicle.

For the initial period the present type of commuter tickets will be used. In the course of the next several months a new ticket will be introduced and put into service. In future a passenger at Swartz Bay will be required to surrender two commuters' tickets instead of one. He will then offer no ticket at the island ports upon returning to the Vancouver Island ports. The present tickets are usable indefinitely.

New tickets, when they are printed, will specify the terms and books will almost certainly cost twice the present figure, Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce was warned on Monday.

At the present time a car book for Salt Spring Island costs \$7.50 and an adult passenger book costs \$2.50. Later books will cover 10 round trips and will cost the proportionate \$15 and \$5.

No change is planned in the issue of tickets for the Outer Islands.

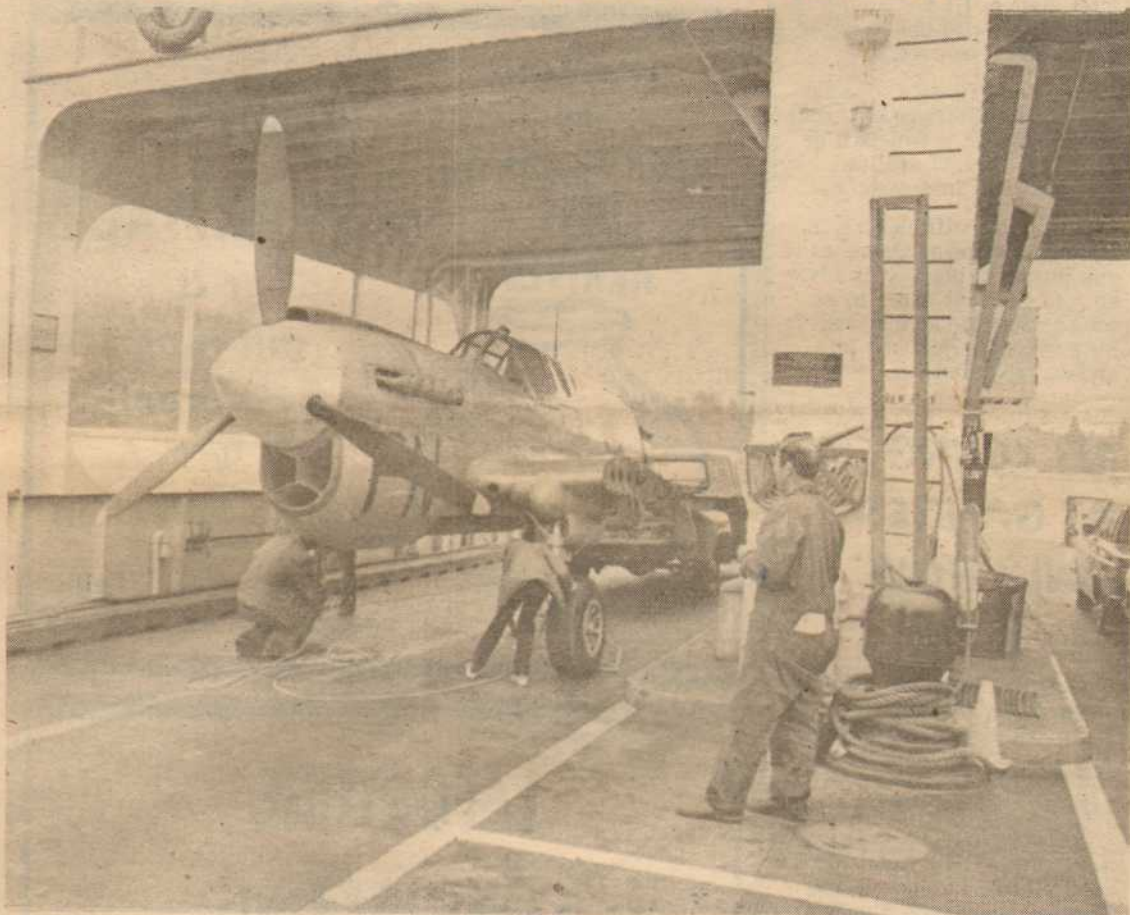
On Monday morning Terminal Agent Bob Anderson was accompanied by ferry officials Bob Innes and David Price to outline the new system.

## LOG HAULING UNDER INVESTIGATION

It isn't the complaints and it isn't the delay, but log-hauling by ferry from Salt Spring Island may be eliminated.

B. C. Ferries is making an investigation of all aspects of extra-heavy vehicles on the small Vesuvius Queen. Number of Island loggers have been hauling out logs through Vesuvius.

Problem facing the ferry authority is the weight of the vehicles, laden and the small capacity of the ship. The Vesuvius Queen carries a maximum load of 60 tons. A load of logs accounts for 40 tons, leaving room for about 10 full-sized cars or 15 lightweight imports.

The problems of leaving cars behind has occurred at midday, when the noon ferry sailing is non-operative and traffic piles up for the 1 pm sailing. This is not the main consideration, Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce learned on Tuesday meeting with officials of B. C. Ferries.

The weight of the truck is only partially balanced by the 10 cars. The ferry still shows a marked list. The list is aggravated when it comes to un-

loading and the apron is still level.

Another problem occurs in the early morning when there

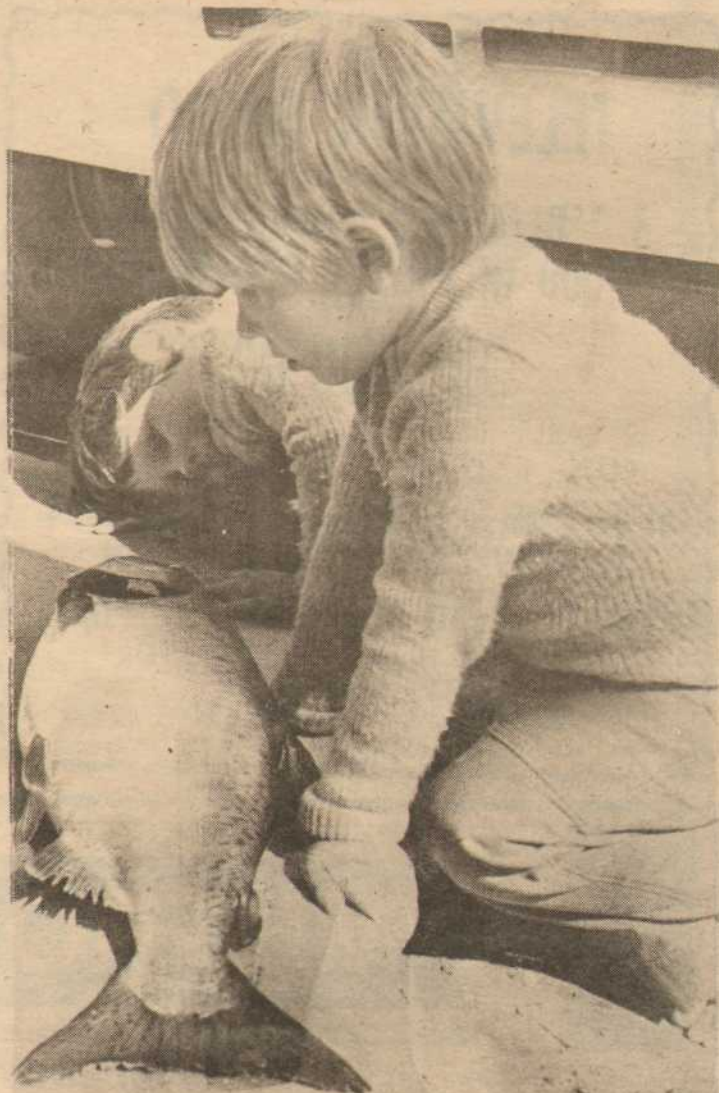
young and older residents as well as summer people.

It's a funny thing how people figure you out. I worked with a fellow some years ago and then he quit and went north. Years later he retires and I never knew what a fine fellow he was until I heard the speeches at his retirement dinner. I only wish I'd known all that when we worked together. Few weeks ago I went into the RCMP office in Ganges and placed my car keys on the counter while I made a few notes. Now, the police office is one place I figure things can safely be left around. When I came to drive away, there were no keys around. Just as I was getting set to write about the insecurity of the G.R.C., a somewhat sheepish member of the community walked in with my keys he had lifted from the counter while he was talking. Then, last week end, I was at the scene of a car crash and neither police nor ambulance crews had a crowbar to open up the wrecked car and extricate the driver. I lent them a car jack with a long stem. At the end of the job I was looking for my jack and there were some wisecracks about losing it to the RCMP when one of the officers explained that he had returned it to my car and placed it in the trunk. My car was the victim of a hit-and-run at Fulford earlier in the summer. When it was all cleaned up, the ICBC wanted a notarized statement that it was in fact a hit-and-run. Who paid the fee, I asked. Why argue? I found that the bill was just over \$200 and where it exceeds \$200 there is no deductible \$100. I didn't argue after that. A hit-and-run of less than \$200 costs the owner his deductible amount. Once the damage rises beyond that magic figure, the ICBC pays all.

In accordance with the terms of "The Art Policy" recently announced by The Minister, The Honourable William Hartley, a Regional Centre will be opened at The "Open Space" Gallery, at 510 Fort Street, Victoria.

The Centre will be open for receiving submissions between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 6:00 P.M. on August 31st, September 3rd and September 4th, 1974.

"Works of Art" submitted will be viewed by The Provincial Committee on Art and selections made for purchase for "The Provincial Collection."

The term "Works of Art" refers to Paintings, Drawings, Prints, Batiks, Weavings, Tapestries, Pottery and portable Sculpture. All works should be properly framed or mounted, etc.

A maximum of three works per artist may be submitted.

The Provincial Committee on Art will be selecting works for purchase on the 5th and 6th of September.

The Committee is composed of nine members: The Provincial Co-ordinator of Art, The Co-ordinator of Consultants (an architect), five Art Consultants and two Regional Representatives.

All artists will be notified by mail of the decisions of the Provincial Committee on Art. Works that are not purchased for the Provincial Collection should be collected from The "Open Space" Saturday, September 7th, through Friday, September 14th, between the hours of 10:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M.

The following is an extract from "An Art Policy" for the Department of Public Works, Provincial Government:

"It should be understood by all Artists that the success of the Art Policy is dependent upon it establishing the highest possible standard of Art for the People of British Columbia. The criteria that will be used to evaluate all the Art presented to the Committee, will be similar to standards used to judge Art at national and international levels."

# Up to Port Hardy is long, long journey

If you have a beef about ferry services try going up Vancouver Island. When you have travelled on the ferry from nowhere to nowhere you find yourself on the same island

you left four hours before. The Island Princess once sailed around the Gulf Islands and was named in honour of the islands by Oswald New. She was ultimately acquired by the provincial government and went into service between Kelsey Bay and Beaver Cove. Main claim of both communities to distinction is that they are logging camps. Kelsey Bay consists of a few acres of cement pad and some very attractive rusting hulks which are set there to break the thrust of the rolling seas rushing into the bay and to serve as a conversation piece for the travellers to the north end of Vancouver Island.

On Friday last week the wind was blowing with some energy and the sea was a trifle bumpy. The Island Princess came in with a rhythmic rolling motion, very attractive on film and very effective on the stomach.

No Galiano Islander would recognize the Island Princess. She has undergone a major operation. The two halves of the hull were separated and a new section inserted between the shells. She is now a catamaran, with the port half of her original hull sailing about 20 or 30 feet from the original piece on the starboard side. Where, once, the passengers descended into the infernal regions of the ship to take refreshments, they now climb to the lofty regions to eat in the cafeteria which, despite its impressive name looks very much like the coffee bar on the Mayne Queen or the Bowen Queen.

There is no indication to the traveller when he may eat and there is only limited warning of what he might get. The vet-

eran north-island traveller knows these things and it's up to the stranger to find it out. As the last vehicle was loaded aboard, the skipper warned the passengers to hold tight as the ship rolled while turning a round. We did and it did.

Four hours and many minutes later we arrived in Beaver Cove, the northern terminal. Any resemblance between Kelsey Bay and Beaver Cove just ain't there. The ship docks and the cars drive off, led by a heavy truck and a Vancouver Island Coach Lines bus.

The road from the wharf is narrow and unpaved. It makes a right-angle turn at the top and climbs steeply alongside a high cliff. On the right is the logging camp.

On Friday the logging camp was making a log sorting dump. As a result, the road was blocked and we made a detour. We only heard one car lose its muffler at the detour and we didn't stop to see how some of the unfortunate city drivers would cope in such a situation.

Through the camp, across the railway and over the

bridge in a cloud of dust obliterating everything and we were on the 43-mile highway to Port Hardy. A good road and paved, even.

Port Hardy is the thriving metropolis of the north island. There for a long time, it had been a poor relation of Alert Bay, on Cormorant Island, for many years. With the arrival of mining on a large scale, the town gained the shot in the arm that was to bring it ahead to its present position.

Much of the lumber produced in the northern community must be diverted into its own community. There are new homes, new stores, new hotels and a new town. In four years everything has been duplicated. As fast as the buildings rise in the town, the roads are torn apart in the approach.

The approach to the town is less than inspirational. It started that way, years ago and no amount of fishing or logging was going to change it. At last it is being changed and will probably contribute to a new rash of deaths once the entrance to the community is

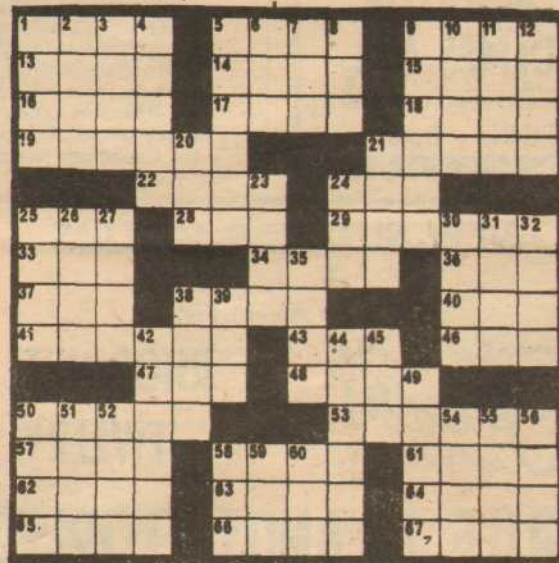
- (1) within twenty-five (25) feet of the natural boundary of a lake;



# THEY ONLY KNOW ISLANDS ARE HERE

Property owner from Point Roberts had me by the lapels over the week end to tell me what he thought of the island people who would demand special privileges of the government and then reject the idea of an international park.

That he favoured an international park was very evident. That he was not certain of what it would entail for the islands was equally evident. He favoured the establishment of the park for the fact that it would bring about a greater degree of international co-operation and he feels that international co-operation is the going thing.

The comments brought home the fact that while islanders have established a common stand on island planning and on international parks, the people of British Columbia... and the state of Washington... have only vaguely understood the situation.

My lapel sailant informed me that he resented the manner in which the people of the islands have arbitrarily demanded the right to plan their islands. He also resented the suggestion that island people should have any say in the manner in which the island might be developed. Oddly, he was of the opinion that they should be developed in the same manner as Delta or Ladner and he also felt that they should be protected, but by an international commission rather than an island-centred British Columbian function.

The significance of what he told me was not in his opinions. Like most islanders, most British Columbians are entitled to their own opinions.

The significance was that any British Columbian, interested in planning, interested in island planning, could re-

main so uninformed of island planning deliberations for so many years.

Outside the islands it is unknown that two provincial governments have taken steps to clamp down on islands development. Outside the islands it is popularly believed that the people of the islands designate the Gulf Islands as special communities of a very fragile ecology.

The average British Columbian is convinced, apparently, that the islands imposed their own development bans and that they went to the provincial government demanding special privileges reserved for the islands only.

Many islanders have met with tight restrictions when planning to use their properties. Residents throughout the islands have battled over an acceptable program of island development. The story of island planning is a tale of strife and fire and fury.

It is far from gratifying to find that it is an unknown story among those who feel themselves to be well informed.

# Building near lake restricted

## - PROPOSAL

Modification to the Salt Spring Island zoning by-law has been proposed in order to regulate the construction of buildings in the vicinity of lakes or other fresh water.

Public hearing will be held on Salt Spring Island in the Legion Hall, Ganges on Tuesday afternoon, Aug. 27. Islanders may speak to the proposal at that time.

Amendment to the by-law would prohibit the construction of any building within 25 feet of a lake natural boundary or within 100 feet of the natural boundary of any watercourse or source of water supply.

Third section would prohibit building on any ground surface less than two feet above the natural boundary of a lake or natural water course in the immediate flood hazard area.

## SIX WEEKS TO MAKE RESERVATIONS

Reservations on the Sechelt Queen can be made for a maximum of six weeks in advance, Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce delegates were told on Monday.

The six-week period was adopted arbitrarily, explained spokesmen for the B. C. Ferries. It allows a traveller sufficient time to make a booking in advance, without leaving the system open to abuse and permitting a traveller to monopolize the service.

Traveller who constantly makes reservations and fails to show up is jeopardizing his privilege of reserving a space.

are not 10 cars to travel to Crofton. The ship cannot sail with only the logging truck and the logs are held over.

The reason for hauling out on the ferry is the convenience and the promptness. Island loggers in possession of small quantities of logs can dump them, at the present time, and wait for a long time before selling them. Hauled away by truck, the logs bring an almost immediate payment.

There is a move to restrict log dumps and there are no facilities on Salt Spring Island for hoisting a load of logs.


A man in possession of a small quantity of logs is faced with a long delay in getting his money out of them, explained Hal Leighton. He listed about 15 logging operations among the islands, who, together, haul out a substantial volume of timber.

Barges would be uneconomical and there are no assurances that a mill will be in operation on the island by the beginning of fall.

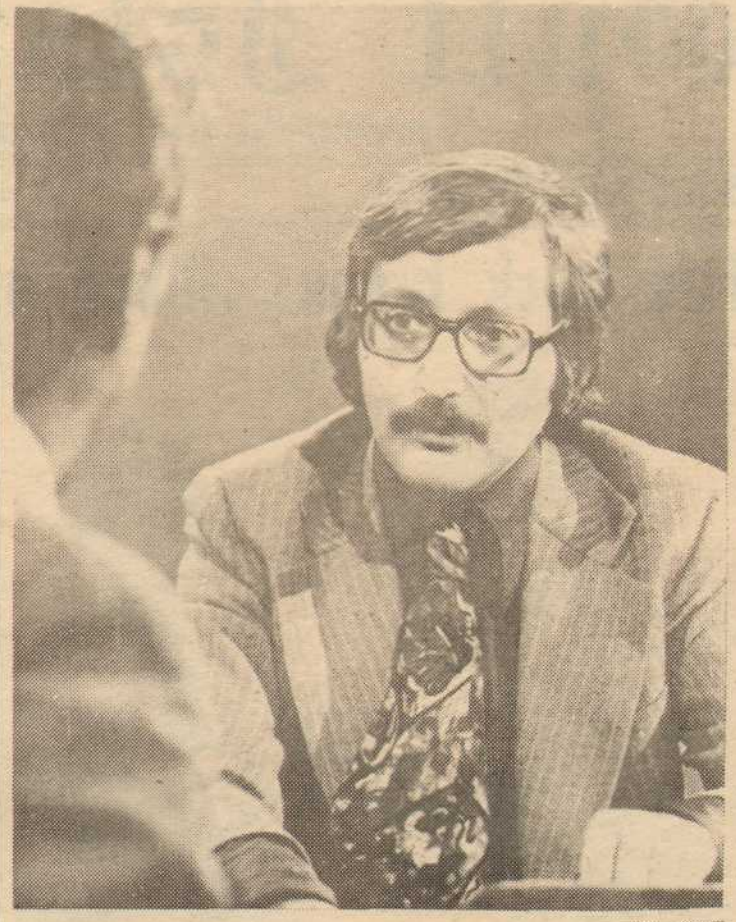

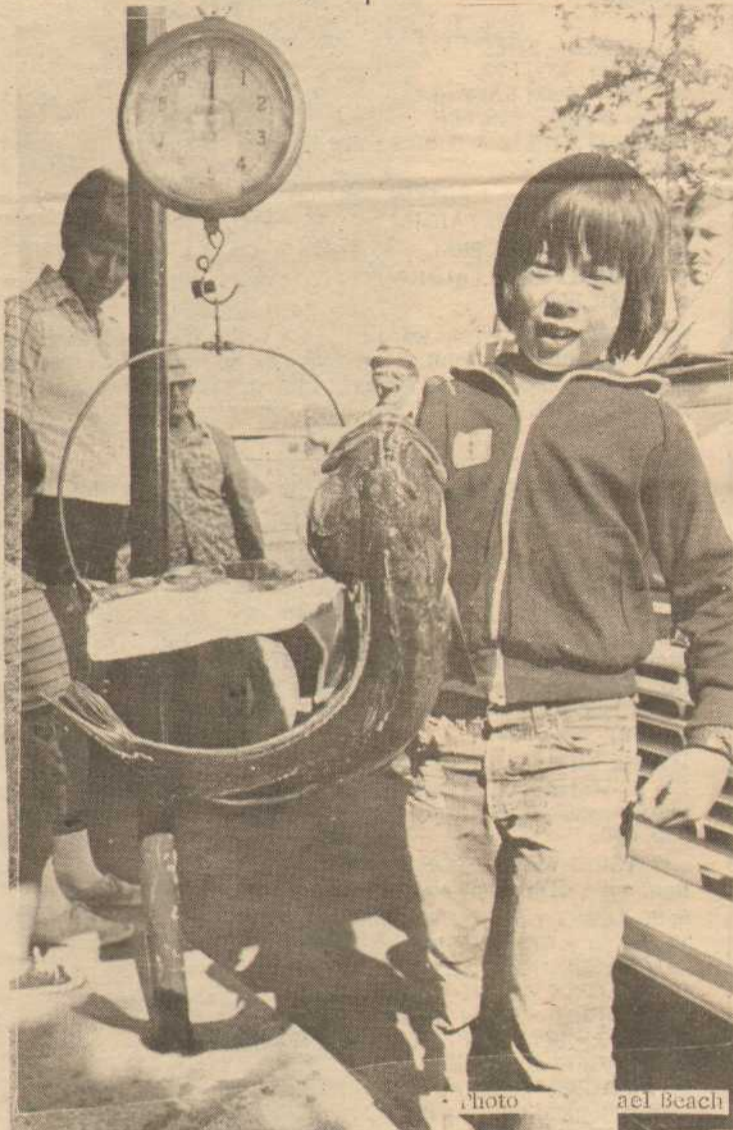
## How to catch fish

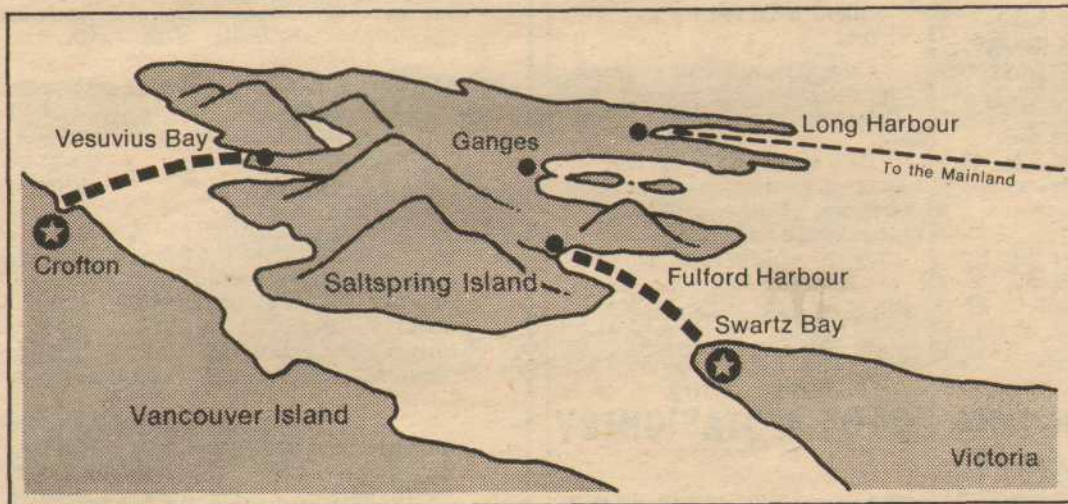
for which he owes the bowler in question half dozen glasses of bitter. Castaways won the second game with a score of 73 for 5.

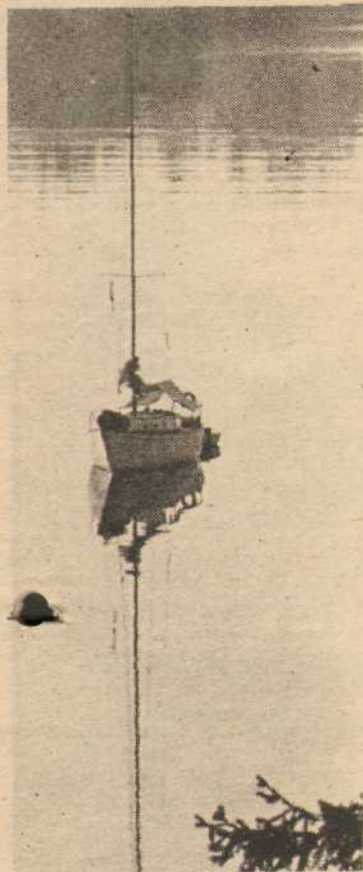
In order to speed traffic handling and permit ship's officers freedom for their other duties aboard, round-trip fares are being introduced for the convenience of residents of, and visitors to, Salt Spring Island.

All ticketing between **Vesuvius Bay** and **Crofton** will be done at **Crofton terminal**. Between **Fulford Harbour** and **Swartz Bay**, ticketing will be done at **Swartz Bay terminal**. Round-trip fares on both routes will then become \$2.50 for automobiles, \$1.00 for passengers, \$.50 for children, age 5-11. All other vehicles will be

charged double the current rates for a round-trip. No charge will be made from Salt Spring terminals to Vancouver Island after August 21st.

Holders of **commuter books** will have two commuter tickets taken at either Swartz Bay or Crofton. All existing commuter books will be honoured even after new round-trip books are issued. No ticket sales will take place aboard ship. Commuter books will only be sold ashore at Swartz Bay and Crofton (Vancouver Island) or Long Harbour (Salt Spring) terminals.

Cool wet July sets no records

— AT GANGES

July was cool and overcast at Ganges, with a near-record rainfall for the month and only 13 days were sunny and warm.

Weather report comes from Howard Carlin, Ganges, Hill, Dominion weather observer.

The maximum temperature for the month was 84 deg. and the minimum, 47. Maximum mean temperature was 68.9 and minimum mean, 52.6.

The month brought 2.20 inches of rain, which has only been exceeded in recent years by 1972's 2.48 ins.

In 1973 the high for the month was 89 and the low, 47. Precipitation amounted to 0.31 ins.

Previous years show July figures as follows: 1972, 85, 46; 2.48 ins.; 1971, 92, 45; 0.57 ins.; 1970, 86, 48; 0.93 ins.; 1969, 82, 47; 0.46 ins.; 1968, 87, 45; 0.79 ins.

CANADA PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

ELIZABETH the SECOND, by the Grace of God, of the Kingdom, Canada and Her Other Realms and Territories, Queen, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith.

To all to whom these presents shall come -

GREETING. ( WHEREAS pursuant to the provisions of Section 766 of the Municipal Act the Capital Regional District was incorporated by Letters Patent issued on the first day of February, 1966

AND WHEREAS, Section 766 of the Municipal Act, provides inter alia, that, in addition to the functions conferred by that Act, a regional district has such functions as are provided by Letters Patent or supplementary Letters Patent, and for this purpose the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may, on the recommendation of the Minister, provide in the Letters Patent or supplementary Letters Patent such further objects, powers, obligations, duties, limitations, and conditions in respect to any or all functions requested pursuant to this section:

AND WHEREAS the Regional Board of the Capital Regional District has requested the function of land assembly, housing and land banking, which request has received the affirmative vote of a majority of all the Directors having among them the majority of all the votes, as required by subsection (4c) of section 766:

AND KNOW YE THAT by these presents We do order and proclaim that on, from, and after the date hereof the following be added to the objects, powers, obligations, duties, limitations, and conditions of the said regional district: -

DIVISION XII - Land Assembly, Housing and Land Banking

1. All member municipalities shall participate and share in the cost of the function pursuant to this Division.
2. The regional district is empowered to undertake land assembly for the purpose of housing, either public or private and, public housing, pursuant to the provisions of the National Housing Act, The Municipal Act of the Province of British Columbia, the Housing Act of British Columbia, and other legislation of the Province of British Columbia pertaining to land assembly and public housing, as if the regional district were a municipality.
3. The annual net cost attributable to this function of the regional district shall be apportioned among the member municipalities on the basis referred to in subsection (1) of section 782 of the Municipal Act.
4. The annual net expenditure of the regional district pursuant to this function shall in total not exceed the product of one-quarter of a mill on the total value of land and improvements within the regional district referred to in paragraph 3.
5. The Regional District Board may by by-law assume the assets, rights, obligations and liabilities for any existing or approved project under the National Housing Act.

AND THAT the Letters Patent incorporating the regional district be amended accordingly.

In testimony whereof, We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent and the Great Seal of Our said Province to be hereunto affixed.

WITNESS, the Honourable Walter S. Owen, Q.C., LL.D., Lieutenant-Governor of Our said Province of British Columbia, in Our City of Victoria, in Our said Province, this 25th day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seventy-four and in the twenty-third year of Our Reign.
