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ISLANDERS ARE HEARD AS

Park project is shelved for good

International Park proposal has been shelved by the International Joint Commission.

When the Commission suggested a park to take in the Canadian Gulf Islands and the American San Juan Islands, with administrative headquarters at Point Roberts, there was no roar of approval from the islands.

The Commission which is concerned essentially with the arbitration of water rights between the two countries, had been debating the supply of water to the small American colony hanging from British Columbia's shores. The proposal offered would supply to the area in exchange for its function as headquarters of the park. Gulf Islanders were fearful of

losing their identity and property rights to an international administration with only distant representation.

When Driftwood invited readers to cast a ballot on the proposal, only two in more than 700 supported the plan.

The criticism expressed in this newspaper was relayed to Ottawa and to Washington, D. C.

FOURTEEN SEATS FOR NOVEMBER ELECTIONS

- SCHOOL TRUSTEES AND ISLAND TRUST MEMBERS

Municipal elections come up on November 16, when 14 seats must be filled.

Nominations close on October 28. Included in the category of municipal elections are balloting for school trustees and for the local trustees of the Islands Trust. Ownership of property is not required

in order to run for office.

There will be four seats to be filled on the school board. Mrs. Sheila Fraser, of Salt Spring Island and Mrs. Clare McAllister, of Galiano, will announce their plans later.

Vacant seats are open on Pender Island, with the with-

drawal of Mrs. Betty Vasilev and on Salt Spring Island with the retirement of Bob Marshall.

Two local trustees will be named from each of the five Gulf Islands for the Islands Trust.

This year is a first for local trustees of the Islands Trust.

The trust is a new entity and the candidates for office are running blind; as yet their duties have only been broadly outlined.

Candidates must fulfill the same requirements as those for other municipal offices in the province. A candidate must be a Canadian citizen or a British subject. He must have resided in the province for the past six months and must be over 19 years of age. These requirements apply similarly to candidates for office on the school board.

A candidate for island trustee need not reside on the island where he seeks a seat. He need not be a resident of the islands at all.

There is no present requirement for an Islands Trust candidate to make a disclosure of his assets. The Disclosure Act may be amended by order in-council to cover local trustees, but as yet no such order has been passed.

Candidates for the office of local trustee on the Islands Trust may obtain nomination papers from the Capital Regional District offices in Victoria or from the Gulf Islands School District office in Ganges.

Deputy Returning Officer Wilfred Peck will have the papers mailed to any candidate who calls or writes to him. The regional office on Yates St., Victoria will also arrange to mail nomination papers.

The Islands Trust is not a function of the Regional District. The district has been asked to handle the election on behalf of the provincial government and all costs involved will be borne by the government.

No further details of the duties or remuneration of local trustees have been revealed.

Candidates for office on the School Board may also gain nomination papers from Mr. Peck, who has been appointed Returning Officer for the November 16 election.

Citizen of the Year on Salt Spring Island is Mike Byron.

The Gulf Islands Secondary School teacher was named on Friday evening at the annual dinner of the Chamber of Commerce.

Mike Byron, whose real name is not Mike at all, has spent the past dozen years teaching at the island high school and farming at Beaver Point. In addition, he has blended the two pursuits and there are many students on the islands raising stock in accordance with his instruction.

with sick animals and he has donated stock and produce to community organizations and to others, the dinner guests were told.

RETIRED INSURANCE MAN NOT RETIRED YET

CHUCK LONGEUAY THROWS HAT IN RING

Newcomer to the election ring is no newcomer to community service. First hat in

the ring was that of Charles J. Longueay, who is seeking election as local trustee on Salt

Spring Island for the Islands Trust. Two will be elected. Chuck Longueay was born in Calgary and promptly moved to gentler climes. As an infant he came out to the coast and never looked back. In Vancouver he went to school and progressed through elementary, high school and business school. Having got out of school, he looked around at sports and kept a keen interest in sports and recreation.

Prior to the outbreak of war he was a member for 10 years of the YMCA and served as a director of the Grandview Branch.

The Salt Spring Island candidate was well-known in soccer circles on the North Shore. He went through the whole circuit, as player, coach and referee. He was secretary of the North Shore Juvenile Soccer League. He also played in the Coast League, mostly with St. Saviour's. He was an all-star goalie in the Vancouver

and District League.

When he wasn't playing soccer, he was skiing and when he wasn't doing either of those things he was an ardent golfer.

Before the Second World War, Chuck was a member of the militia. When war broke out he joined the active force to serve with the First Searchlight Regiment. He was pensioned out for medical reasons.

As a member of the Royal Canadian Legion, he has been director and served as first vice-president of the Salt Spring Island Branch.

In the field of business, Mr. Longueay was in insurance after he had run his own company in Vancouver for seven years and retired to re-enter the insurance field.

Originally, he was a manufacturer's agent. For 18 years he served with the Prudential Insurance Company of America. He explains that the company has no connection whatsoever with the Prudential As-

urance Company, of England.

He was staff manager in Greater Vancouver for over 10 years and in charge of the group department for Western Canada for two years.

In 1969 he retired to Salt Spring Island. Retirement lasted for two years, until 1971. That's when he became associated with the Salt Spring Island Insurance Agencies Ltd. By now he is again semi-retired but still puts in a few hours a week with the island firm.

Since coming to the island, Chuck Longueay has been linked with the community. He has been for four years a member of the Salt Spring Island Golf and Country Club; he is a member of the Chamber of Commerce and the Rod and Gun Club. He is also a past member of the Rotary Club on Salt Spring.

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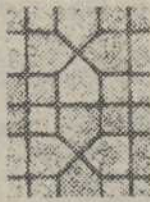

WHERE DOES IT ALL LEAD?

It's a fringe benefit, living on the fringe of the United States. It comes in radio signals and in television programs. Not only CBC for southern Canadians; not only CTV; but everything which is made available to the United States listeners and viewers, as well.

It should be rewarding and impressive entertainment. It is neither.

There was a day when the stables were recognized as a centre of uncouth language and earthy conversation. With the disappearance of the stables, television has taken over. The quality of television entertainment is possibly at a particularly low ebb. The average program is still acceptable in its category of entertainment. Unimaginative and slightly monotonous, television fare is based on the guiding principle that viewers are mindless, irrational apes who will swallow the same medicine in the same dosage, night after night after night, always provided that it comes in differently wrapped packages.

To improve the quality of entertainment the industry has looked to the movie world.

The movies were dying on their feet until a few years ago a smart operator realized that the fare which passed out of usage with the passage of the stables was not dead, but merely dormant. The average film was plentifully larded with oversized bosoms and naked buttocks. Four-letter words were in and the theatres sounded more like a barracks. Once again, the movie theatres filled and everyone was happy.

Today, the movie of yesterday is the television entertainment of today. The obvious difference is that the theatre audience attended the presentation of this popular tripe by volition. They had to go to the movie theatre to see it. Not so today: now it comes to all of us. For many viewers who don't really care whether their small children are in the habit of using obscene language, the movies are harmless. For those parents who feel that every three-year-old should be thoroughly versed in the manner of sexual intercourse, the films are a delightful relief. For those people, television is a delightful escape to reality and freedom of expression.

Unfortunately, there are those parents who feel differently. There are some who still embrace the old puritanic views of the Victorians. They are outside of it all. And they have no answer. They cannot protest to another nation that the other's standards are too low for them. They cannot simply throw out the television. There's always one next door.

It is an unfortunate state of affairs where those who abhor censorship find themselves censoring the quality of shows now being seen.

Worse still; the standard of shows seen today can only be clearly described with the use of a number of those very four-letter words under fire!

School Trustees are sought

The school trustees of the province have launched a province-wide campaign to attract qualified candidates for the November 16 school board elections.

The B. C. School Trustees Association is urging people interested in running for school board to write for a special booklet designed for school board candidates.

The booklet describes the role of the school trustees in exercising local control over the schools, legal qualifications, and the requirements of the new disclosures act.

In announcing the program, BCSTA President Eileen Madson of Windermere said that trustees would prefer to fight an election rather than win by acclamation. "If there's no election the trustee and the community lose the opportunity to discuss educational issues and priorities during the election campaign," said Mrs. Madson.

Although a trustee might

win a seat on the school board by acclamation, the real loser is the community.

"We know that over the past three years the public has become more concerned with educational issues than in the past," said Mrs. Madson. "We're hopeful that this increased public interest will mean more candidates for trustee and fewer acclamations."

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? Inquest ?

So far we have discussed how the misuse of schools, hospitals, clubs and orphanages have adversely affected our homes. The last human institution I will discuss is the day care centre.

In the long run day care centres will cause more disruption of the home, than any good it may do. The most impressionable time of a person's life is the years between two and four. The individual's personality is formed a long time before they ever reach kindergarten. It is unnatural to give our children, in that age group, to someone else to raise and to be the determining factor in their character. If a working mother sends her children away to a centre, the instructors have the children far more of their waking hours than do the parents.

We must be very careful of this government of ours. They could in time, make it compulsory to send our children to day care centres. We will then have 'state raised children' as they have in Russia.

We must never 'push off' children onto someone else, in order to satisfy our own desires, or to escape the responsibility of raising them.

The reason we have so many teenagers feeling unwanted and unloved, is that the parents will use any excuse to get the children out of the way so that they can live their lives the way they want to, unhampered by restriction.

Next week I will discuss humanism and its effect on the home.

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NO POLITICS AS LAND CONTROL IS CONTINENTAL CONCERN SAYS LANE

When B. C. Land Commissioner Bill Lane came to Ganges to address the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce last week he offered fervent support for the principle of land preservation.

The concept of agricultural land reserves in neither British Columbia, nor Socialistic, he told the annual dinner meeting of the Chamber. Governments in Canada and the United States are enacting similar legislation to protect farmland from residential development.

As far as his own board is concerned, it is not politically oriented, he assured the meeting. There is no government interference in its decisions and "no sinister instructions as to how it is to be administered."

Nor are personalities involved when it comes to making decisions, emphasized Mr. Lane.

"We have no way of knowing who owns this or that." In terms of land reserve the Capital Regional District has been among the most difficult to designate because of the configuration of the land, observed the commissioner.

The Regional District did an excellent job, he added. His staff may have inadvertently made mistakes, but they are being sorted out.

Mr. Lane offered some information on this very new function.

Golf courses and similar uses are very welcome on land designated for agriculture. The farm land is not all going to be used for some time.

The Commission is empowered to acquire green belt lands and has an initial budget of \$5 million for this purpose. A number of people have already donated land to the Commission.

William Lane was legal counsel for the municipality of Richmond for 18 years before assuming his present duties. He was the "attorney-general of Lulu Island", recalled Tom Toynbee on introducing the speaker.

The Land Commissioner is a landowner on Salt Spring Island and his wife is the former Betty Greer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T.H. Greer who spent their summers on the island for many years.

In British Columbia farm land was disappearing at the rate of 15,000 acres a year when the new act came into force, continued the speaker. The population is, at the same time, posing pressures on food production.

California is one of British Columbia's main sources of food supplies. Its population now exceeds that of Canada, Mexico, with a rapidly rising population, is looking to raising frogs as a new source of protein.

He recalled the movement in the United States towards

farmland preservation. Senator Jackson, a Conservative Democrat, has been the leader of this campaign south of the border, said Lane. Agricultural land preservation is the movement of responsible, conservative-minded, middle-of-the-road Americans.

All Canada is looking at the loss of farmland to residential use. The staff of the B. C. Land Commission was invited to Quebec City to explain the pattern here on the coast for the concerned government of Quebec, recalled Lane. He has visited Prince Edward Island and Ontario to speak with the governments there.

HONORARY APPOINTMENT FOR DESMOND CROFTON

The Colonel's back with the Regiment!

Des Crofton is back in uniform. At a formal ceremony in Nanaimo last week Lieut.-Col. Desmond Crofton was appointed Honorary Lieutenant Colonel of his old regiment, the Canadian Scottish.

The appointment runs from May 30, 1974 until May 29, 1977.

The presentation ceremony consisted of the handing over of a formal scroll announcing the appointment in the name of the Queen.

Accompanied by Mrs. Crofton, the man who led the Canadian Scottish into battle after D-Day formally became Honorary Lieutenant-Colonel when the regiment was awarded the freedom of the city of Nanaimo by the irrepressible Mayor Frank Ney.

Honorary Colonel of the regiment is Col. J. R. Nicholson, PC, OBE, QC, LL.D., former Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia.

Appointment offers the privileges of the rank but it also demands certain duties.

"Honorary Lieut.-Colonels have always played an important role in the welfare of their Unit," wrote Lieut.-Gen. S. C. Waters, CD, Commanding Officer of Mobile Command, in St. Hubert, Quebec, "and I know that... I can count on your support in helping us to build an even more effective militia."

Col. Crofton was not always Col. Crofton.

He was among the Salt Spring Island boys in the 1930s who rallied to the call for reserve soldiers on a week end basis. Majority of Salt Spring Island veterans, looking back to those who enlisted from the island, were with the Canadian Scottish. The island platoon was 38 strong at one time and most of the recruits went overseas with the regiment.



LIEUT.-COL. DESMOND G. CROFTON, E.D.

Lieutenant Crofton was platoon commander when the troops went away at the beginning of the war. He had undertaken his initial military training at Esquimalt, and was already commissioned before war broke out.

He served with his regiment in eastern Canada and in England and was commanding officer when he was wounded and sent back to hospital from France.

To dozens of Salt Spring Islanders today Des Crofton is simply "The Colonel". He earned his rank in a fighting regiment and there are many among those who served with him who won't let him forget it.

Col. Crofton is now one of 200 or so "distinguished Canadian citizens appointed as Honorary Lieutenant-Colonels and Colonels to Militia and Air Reserve units across Canada."

ANNUAL PLEA FOR SAFETY

ROAD GOES TO MINISTER

As often as trustees of Gulf Islands School District ask for the closing of a Ganges Road, the provincial department of highways refuses it.

Last week the trustees heard a further refusal after a final request this year.

Kanaka Road runs through the school grounds, bisecting the playing fields.

Highways Manager G. Harper was unsympathetic. If the road was a hazard to children the board could erect a chain link fence, he suggested.

There is only one house on Kanaka Road, trustees were reminded. The closure had been requested in the interests of safety.

Bob Marshall recalled that the property had been given to the highways department by the school board in the first place.

School Superintendent Don Hartwig explained that the incident took place prior to 1969 and that the department took a 15 foot strip off the playing fields. There was a gentle-

man's agreement at the time that the 15 foot strip would be exchanged for Kanaka Road.

"Jim Campbell was reluctant to give the strip without written agreement," said the former school principal. "But the board had decided that the department of highways was trustworthy and they went ahead with the transaction."

The board plans to appeal to the minister.

THIRD NEW HORIZONS GRANT FOR MAYNE

Senior Citizens Group No. 34, of Mayne Island, has been given \$3,198 by the New Horizons program to expand their recreational activities for an increasing membership.

Additional equipment and materials will be obtained for craft activities, and floor levelling will be done to permit carpet bowling and other games. Additional pumping capacities and piping will be obtained for a garden project. This is the third New Horizons grant made to this group.

Hugh Campkin of Stewart Road, Mayne Island is the project co-ordinator.

New Horizons is a program of the Department of National Health and Welfare to finance projects by groups of retired people to help get them active and involved in their community.

RUMOURS PERSIST WARNS LETTER

Rumours are difficult to dispel, warned BC Ferries in reply to an enquiry from Gulf Islands School District regarding reports of imminent ferry schedule changes.

There were rumours of impending changes in Outer Island ferry schedules, the board had written.

The letter from BC Ferries suggested that the school district might name a representative to the Islands Transportation Committee.

Transportation committee includes the Outer Islands, but the board has no representative and Salt Spring Island has not been represented on the committee for a number of years.

POLICE LAY CHARGES

Police at Ganges have laid charges against juveniles responsible for smashing a car windshield.

On October 4, during a dance at the Gulf Islands Secondary School, the windshield of the car owned by Vice-Principal Hugh Archer, was smashed. RCMP were notified and laid charges following a brief investigation.

BOARD FAVOURS ANALYSIS AND PLAN

THREE WAY PROPOSAL FOR OUTER ISLANDS

Completely new approach to the establishment of a middle school for the Outer Islands has been suggested by the department of education.

The suggestions were made at an informal meeting of trustees of the Gulf Islands School District and the department officials. The proposal for a middle school was examined in the light of the circumstances that led to its submission.

Taking part in the discussions were J. Phillipson, J. Meredith and L. Canty, of the department of education as well as Gulf Islands School Board Chairman Charles Baltzer, Nonie Guthrie, Clare McAllister and Secretary W. J. Peck.

The meeting discussed the difficulties of providing speci-

alist teachers to a small secondary school and the shortcomings of libraries, laboratories, home economics, and shop courses.

Need for detailed study and the costing of transportation and other factors were given a work-over. The meeting also recognized the very low teacher-pupil ratio in the small secondary school and the increased costs resulting from that ratio.

Chairman Baltzer had outlined the discussions of past months and the original proposal by the Inter-Island Committee for a Mayne Island-based middle school.

School would offer junior secondary subjects to include a wider range of grades. Pender Island parents had agreed with the proposal with the

proviso that it would have to be located on Pender Island.

The discussions brought out a number of alternative solutions which might be further developed and offered to island parents are alternative proposals. Students could continue to board on Salt Spring Island, as at present, and use the facilities of the Gulf Islands Secondary School.

Outer Islands students could attend a middle school serving all four Outer Islands or there could be elementary-junior secondary schools on three of the Outer Islands.

Leading up to the three alternative proposals were discussions on the problems of students in grades below 11 or 12 who have to live away from home. The meeting looked at the possibility of retaining

younger children closer to home while providing some kind of modified program.

Mobile classrooms were considered for movement from island to island and mobile accommodation for the teacher involved.

Variety of factors have bearing on the proposals and the meeting decided that a co-ordinator would be required to assemble information and to keep in touch with parents, teachers, the school board and the department of education. Comparative costs would be required with each alternative proposal.

Mr. Phillipson invited the board to come to his department with a detailed report and to ask for "seed money" to get the project under way.

Birthday party for 98 year old at hospital

There was a very special birthday party in the Extended Care of Lady Minto Hospital this month. It was Mrs. Helen Townsend's 98th birthday. Her family and friends were all about to congratulate her. The day I interviewed her I found her interested in a game of Bingo at which she won a prize -- an attractive ornament to be used in her room or given to one of her grandchildren.

It was in 1912 that the pioneer Salt Spring Islander crossed the Atlantic with a friend, Ethel Barnard. Helen Maude came over for her marriage to Herbert Townsend. The Townsends were married in North Battleford, Saskatchewan, where they farmed for 20 years.

Mrs. Townsend found it quite a change. She came to a log house with primitive conditions from her former home in the city of London. Their two daughters, Gladys and Mabel, were born there.

Today she can laugh as she recalls the washing machine she used on the prairies. It was called a cradle and was operated by moving it back and forth. The water had to be hauled from the well and heated for the laundry.

A friend, Mr. Muntz, wrote to them suggesting they give up their Saskatchewan farm and come to Salt Spring. They did this in 1932 and they never regretted their decision. The weather was kinder and doing housework was less arduous here.

Mr. Muntz was very well known on the island for his expert knowledge of genuine antiques. He could spot a fake every time. He knew the methods used to fake antiques. If he became really interested in a subject he would hold forth at public meetings. Other members of the audience would get up and leave the meeting when Mr. Muntz got to his feet. It was a custom that could be followed today.

The Townsends rented a farm on Lee's hill. It was owned by the G. A. Maudes and each month Mr. Townsend would walk from Lee's hill to the Maude's house in Fulford with the rent.

Mrs. Townsend, unlike many of the elderly residents

of Salt Spring, likes the island today better than she did in 1932.

They soon made friends here.

Mrs. Townsend was a member of the Women's Institute and was President of the Burgoyne United Church Women's Auxiliary for 20 years. They worked with the Solarium and other organizations.

After her husband, Herbert Townsend, died nine years ago, Mrs. Townsend lived alternately with her daughters, Mabel and Mrs. Cliff Lee. She has been in the Extended Care for about 2 1/2 years and likes it very much.

"They are all so good to me." I saw a lovely bag Mrs. Townsend had woven -- a shoulder bag. She has done cushions, "They call them pillows now," a draw string bag, one with handles and has done loom weaving as well. She specially enjoys hand weaving. The head nurse told me Mrs. Townsend does more work than most of the other patients in occupational therapy.

When you're in the hospital nip along to the Extended Care and have a chat with Mrs. Townsend. She enjoys visitors as do all the patients there.

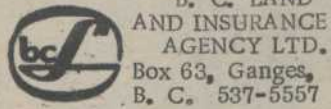

TROUBLE WITH DEER

This is the latest proposal for keeping out deer. It comes from the Fish and Wildlife Branch, by way of Mrs. Marc Holmes, Isabella Point, who passes it on without yet having proved it.

And, although Jean Holmes can't say firmly that it works, she is confident enough to encourage its use.

The fence is a sloping wire, described as a slanting or overhanging fence. The following text explains how it is done.

This type of fencing is less expensive to construct than upright fencing because fewer and shorter posts are needed and lighter gauge wire can be used. Slanting fences are part-

icularly suitable for temporary fencing, as the few posts can easily be removed and the wire more readily rolled. This type of fencing is also suitable for locations where an upright fence would be unsightly or otherwise unsuitable.

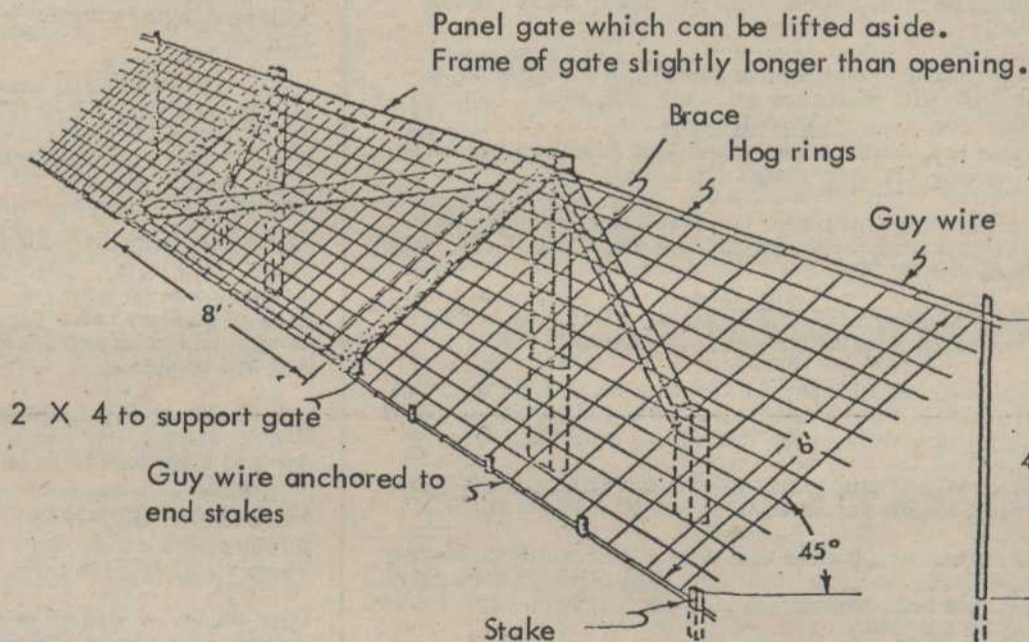
The slanting fence is effective because it acts primarily as a psychological barrier to deer. Deer usually first try to crawl under such a fence and then, finding this impossible and with the wire extended above them, they are discouraged from jumping. For this reason slanting fences are effective in one direction only.

Overhanging woven wire mesh fences are not recommended in heavy snowfall areas since the fence is subject to being crushed by the settling snow pack. Under such circumstances the fence can be modified by using smooth wires stretched horizontally at 4-inch spacings.

The basic design for the slanting fence consists of approximately 6 ft. of mesh wire supported by a guy wire stretched between widely spaced posts. The high side of the fence is the side away from the area to be protected.

For temporary installations, light chicken wire or stucco mesh may be used. For permanent installation, wire no lighter than 12-1/2 gauge is advisable. If woven wire is used, vertical stays should not be over 6 to 8 inches apart and horizontal line wires should not be over 4 to 6 inches apart. Six ft. steel posts are recommended, spaced up to 30 to 40 ft. apart.

A hinged gate is needed if there will be considerable traffic. Adequate side wings should be provided. If little traffic is expected, a panel consisting of a light wooden frame with wire mesh stretched over it is often satisfactory. For easy access where no gate is needed, a stile is simple to construct.
