PENDER DELEGATES OPPOSE DAILY TRIPS

OUTER ISLANDERS CALL FOR HIGH SCHOOL

— TO INVESTIGATE INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL

More than 40 people gathered in the Saturna Island Hall on Saturday, Feb. 9 to discuss the transportation of school children to Ganges, or to find an alternative way of teaching higher grades.

In the beginning, it seemed

that most of the parents were in favor of daily transportation to the school at Ganges. As the day wore on, other ideas included building a school on one of the Outer Islands.

Tom Davidson, trustee from Saturna, opened the meeting, and introduced the chairman

of the school board, Charles Baltzer and trustees Betty Vasilev, of Pender and Pearl Brau of Mayne. He introduced delegations from all of the outer islands.

A school for children from Mayne, Pender and Saturna was suggested, with a triangle system between these three

islands, but Galiano would be left out of this scheme.

Mrs. R. Weatherell told the meeting that most parents on Galiano were in favor of daily transportation. George Hacking did not agree. He thinks it is beneficial to have the child go away from home for their education at this age.

Gordon Berry, of Pender, said that the majority of parents of children from ages 12 to 14 feel this is a poor time for children to be separated from their parents. They should have parental guidance he asserted and most of the audience agreed. He said what is needed is a larger school on Pender to handle more grades there. Pender Islanders are against daily transportation.

People from Saturna agreed that it is quite a shock for their children to come from a small school, where they have been taught their first grades by one teacher. An intermediate step to a slightly larger group of children is needed, the meeting was told. They

Hikers take hammer to driver

—CONTENTS OF WALLET STOLEN

Police are searching for two young men who beat up a Salt Spring Island driver and stole his wallet when he gave them a lift in his pick-up last week.

Harry Williamson was driving from Ganges to his home at Central when he picked up two youths at St. George's Church. He drove out of his way to the junction of Upper Ganges Road and Scott Road and let them off.

That was as far as he was going, he told them.

They argued with him, urging that he drive them all the way to the ferry terminal, but he replied that he had to go home.

One of the men grabbed the hammer from Williamson's carpentry tool kit and struck the island driver on the head. He felt the blow and blacked out. When he regained consciousness, his wallet had been torn from his pants pocket and the contents thrown on the truck floor.

Gone was the sum of \$35. There was no sign of his assailants.

He drove to the Gulf Clinic and was treated by Dr. Peter Rowell. After treatment to his head injuries, he was sent home to rest. Doctor found no fractures.

Mr. Williamson has always stopped for hitch-hikers, he explained later. He is now changing his habits and picking up hitch-hikers is one of them.

50 MILLS FORECASTS HARCUS

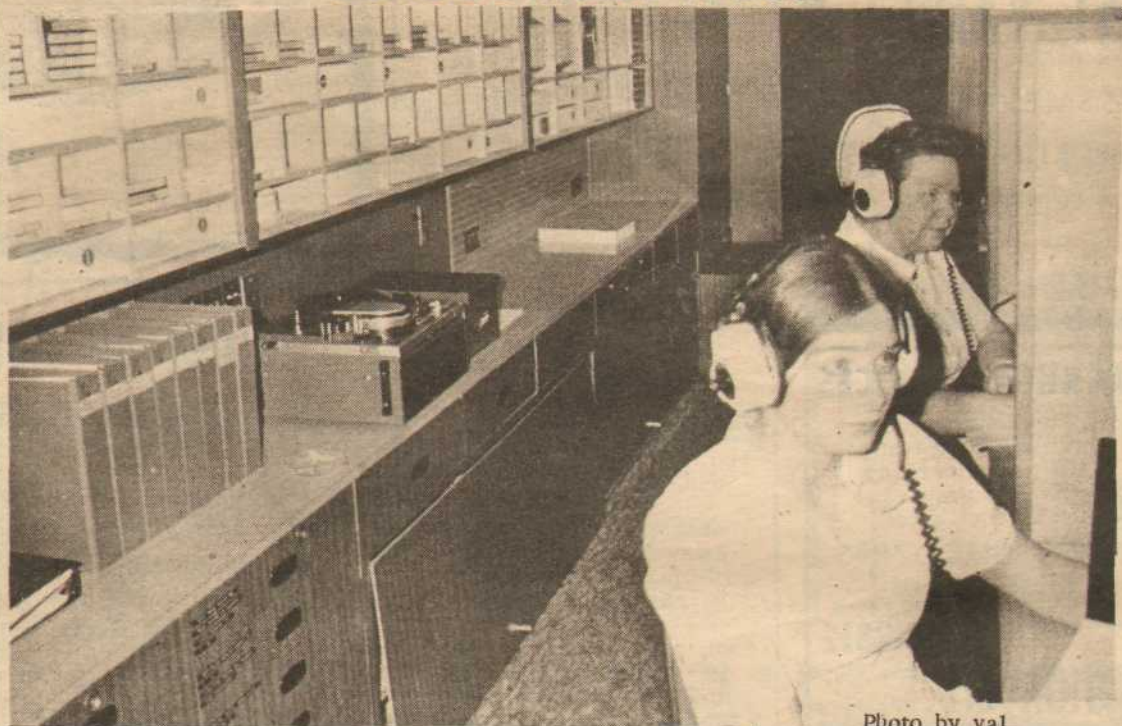

THREE NAMED TO LIBRARY BOARD

Three new directors were named to the board of the Salt Spring Island Public Library Association on Monday afternoon.

To serve for two years are Mrs. W. R. Flewin, Mrs. Campbell Carroll and Mrs. Trevor Wheeldon. The board is weighed down with women as a result of the election. Already serving for another year is Mrs. A. W. Wolfe-Milner. Earl Hardie and I. C. Shank are the other two members.

Fourth candidate was George Wells. He was unsuccessful in his bid for office. Mr. Wells served for several years on the library board and has contributed to the library even while not serving on the board.

Meeting heard a report from Treasurer Hardie showing a total operating budget of \$3,772. Funds amounting to \$3,721 stand to the library's credit.

Circulation rose in 1973 to 25,691, reported Secretary Connie Porter. There were 648 members at the close of the year and this number has been augmented since January 1.

Library purchased 300 new books last year and another 392 were donated to bring the total to 8,690.

The library was open for 22 hours weekly, concluded Mrs. Potter.

Mrs. A. W. Wolfe-Milner expressed the thanks of the directors to the more than 50 volunteers who keep the library going.

There is so much eager help that her job is easy and pleasant, she told the meeting.

Chairman I. C. Shank expressed the members' regret at the death of A. Marshall Sharp last year and asked for a minute's silence in tribute to Mr. Sharp and Mrs. Stan Haw-

kins who died last year.

New shelves, at a cost of \$1,500 had been installed and the library had greater capacity without undertaking new construction, he told the meeting.

VAN TAKES LEAP 50 FEET

Last Friday a van took an unusual and fatal trip over the cliff along Walker's Hook Road. It is owned by Bill Alexander who has not yet been located. Those responsible for the shove have not been named, the Ganges Detachment of the R. C. M. P. are investigating. Its recovery will demand more effort and cost than the remains are really worth. Where it lies now it is submerged when the tide is up.

HOW CAN I???

Q. Please comment on the problem of waffles that stick in the iron.

A. They usually stick for one of the following reasons: The waffle iron was not properly cleaned. The lid was lifted before the waffle was baked. The batter was poured before the iron was hot, the grids were not properly seasoned, or it may be that the

recipe doesn't call for enough fat. Try adding one or two extra tablespoons of fat.

Q. How can I, when preparing a package for shipment, assure that the string will not eventually loosen?

A. By wetting the string before you tie it around the package. It will shrink as it dries, and make a tight knot.

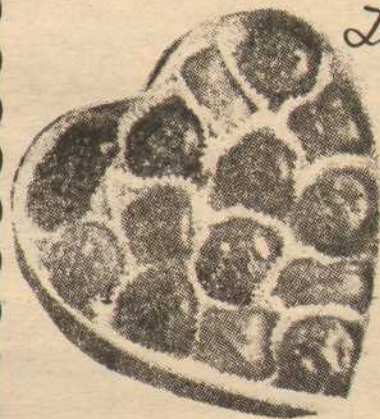
the occasion, and called on George Boyle of Duncan to propose the toast to the bride.

Mary Hawkins was not a pioneer in the sense that she was one of the first settlers here. She was, most certainly, a pioneer in the world of books and lending libraries.

A library would have come here, inevitably, in the course of time. Contribution made by the sponsor of the library was that of bringing it here at that time, with the degree of finesse which has been its character and with the almost complete freedom from governmental aid or supervision.

The Mary Hawkins Memorial Library is a well-earned tribute to the memory of every notable Salt Spring Islander.

Our sincere thanks to all of you.

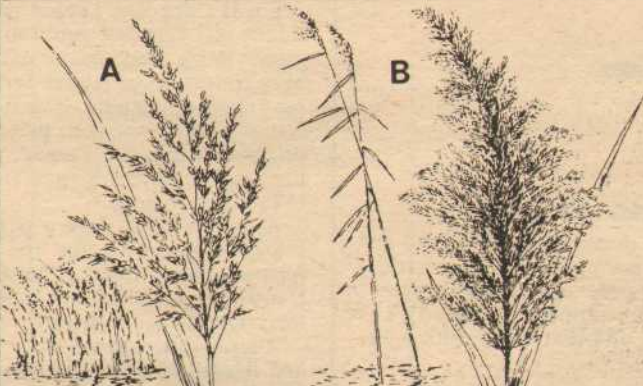

SHOP AT HOME

MARSH WORLD

A - WHITETOP GRASS. A wetland grass, growing in one or two feet of water, reaches a height of four feet. Often in dense stands along marsh edges. Not rated high as a duck food, but valuable as nesting cover and shelter for broods.

B - PHRAGMITES: CANE REED, FLAGREED. Found in marshes across the continent. Grows to 15' high, stem smooth, leaves narrow, tapering to a point. In the fall the reeds turn golden yellow. Dense stands of this picturesque reed, plumed tops waving in the wind, tower above all other marsh plants. It has no food value for wildlife but provides cover and nesting habitat.

would then go to the big school at Ganges for their last grades.

Mrs. Ken Silvey, of Galiano said that only a very small number of children graduate from Ganges school. Most of them drop out before the end, she explained.

Mrs. Hank Knudson said that some parents cannot afford to board children at Ganges. She has three children who go there, and this is the greatest problem. Economics of boarding was one of the main problems.

Again it was agreed that children should be at home with their own parents every night, and most people feel that Salt Spring is getting the benefit of tax dollars from the Outer Islanders.

Mr. Baltzer spoke to the meeting then as one of the people who has boarded children from the other islands. He said that his own experience has been that they are well-fed and they get to school on time. When it comes to studies, he admitted, he can only tell the other child to do his studies, but he cannot compel them to do so, as he might with his own child.

"I can say to my own son, I want to see your work, but really, there is no way I can ask the other child to get down to study," he said.

It is a terrific challenge to take Grade 8, and a large transition to go to another school, he added.

Mr. Baltzer then spoke of a White Paper being brought down in the Legislature during the next few weeks, by Education Minister Eileen Daily. This could have some bearing on school problems here.

He said that he appreciates the feelings of parents from the Outer Islands, and is pleased to get more dialogue with them. Pender people think it is time for a school to be built on one of the Outer Islands, and it is time that Outer Islanders stood up and said just what they want, "not what is being given to them."

"We should establish the fact that we all feel this need," said Mr. Davidson. He suggested a referendum if possible, to get another school. Mr. Baltzer said that a referendum must wait for another two years, as there was one last year and we can only have them every three years.

There was further discussion on daily transportation. It was suggested that B.C. Ferries be asked to either change their present schedule, or put on another boat for the children.

Pender representatives stood firm in their determination not to send their children to Ganges. They will teach

them at home, with supervision, for correspondence courses.

There was also discussion whether or not Grades 7-8-9 could be taught in one room at Pender or Mayne.

Two points were agreed on, one a stopgap for the immediate present, and working towards a high school on one of the Outer Islands in the near future.

Another problem cropped up, that of having several children and if there were an intermediary school on Pender or Mayne outer islands mothers will have to take their children, sometimes quite a few miles, to boats to go to this school, still have children who are going to school on Salt Spring and some of them at school on Galiano.

This would mean several trips to Montague or Sturdies Bay in one day. It is not feasible, they asserted.

Mr. Baltzer spoke of a forthcoming meeting of several of the water taxi operators to consider daily transportation to and from the Outer Islands. He is no longer sure whether it is wanted, he remarked. He will need a clear majority of 80% to 85% in favor of daily transportation to be able to consider it.

After more discussion, a vote was taken of people present.

Pender Islanders do not want daily transportation, but Mayne, Galiano and Saturna approved it.

There was one dissentient from Galiano. Question was raised whether parents who want to board their child at Salt Spring, regardless of availability of daily transport, would be entitled to a board allowance.

Mrs. Vasilev said that some parents from Pender were not present, and some of them might agree to daily transportation. It was agreed that it is necessary to have all parents agree on the type of transportation they want for their children.

Mr. Davidson said that now each island should get together with their trustees, and send

DON'T SAY THAT AGAIN!

Set a thief to catch a thief!
If the old saying has any truth in it, then at least it gives some slight justification to the belief commonly held that the mere fact of parentage brings with it the divine gift of wisdom in parental control.

Otherwise, we have to suppose that every human being is born with this wisdom inherent in him. A beautiful thought, but, like love, not always without an overtone of sadness. Because, if the "thief" saying is true, then we should also "set a child to catch a child". And this is not so absurd as at first it might seem.

How many parents can convince themselves that they consciously try to place their childhood days at the disposition of their children whilst they practise the wisdom of parenthood?

The most-often used phrase is "I would never have done that, as a child".

Not a profound observation to make for the edification of a knowing and enquiring young mind. Either it is false, and made without reflection, offered far from memory, and made in a thought process guided by too many years of adult consciousness; or it is true and irrelevant.

"So what?" says little Johnny, "things were different when you were a child."

What a little beast, to formulate such criticisms! How awful, that he should think like that. Worse still, he's right!

Every time that we use these trite criticisms and comments, we are straining the belief of a child in our perception; we are giving him a free ticket to make a journey in his mental speculation to a place beyond parental limits. He knows that Dad is either a liar or a fool. Eventually, he'll get the picture, and bracket liar and fool together.

Set a child to catch a child. Try, let us decide as parents, at all times and in all things to correlate a youngster's goodnesses and naughtinesses with those same actions as we remember them in ourselves.

How many adults can say with all sincerity "I was never naughty"? Try it for yourself. And if indeed you were naughty, then say further, how naughty? You may find it depressing, you may find it interesting, possibly even hilarious. But there's one thing you will find, if you work at it, if you can bring yourself to believe in its possibilities: you'll find you never again mention in conversation that miserable cliché of modern pessimism, "the Generation Gap".

Chamber meeting on Galiano

The annual meeting of the Galiano Island Chamber of Commerce was held at the Galiano Hall on Saturday night, February 9 with president Frank Reader in the chair.

In his welcoming remarks, Mr. Reader gave a warm welcome to Hugh Curtis, M. L. A. for Saanich-the-Islands, for coming to speak to the meeting.

Following the reading of last year's minutes of the meeting, the business arising included the question of work on the pavement during the year. Some parts of the road still need work and the problem will be left to the incoming committee.

The curve at Shaw's Landing now has warning signs but the curve itself is still there.

The question of Clanton Rd. is still not resolved, and will also be left to the new council.

On the welcome news of the Galiano Plan now being accepted, Mr. Reader reminded people that there is still a lot of work to be done now.

On the question of a resident policeman, he said that he has given this much thought, and feels that we do not need a resident policeman as of this time. George Hacking pointed out that all police cars are radio equipped for immediate contact with their office, also the MP 73 carries radios, and would be used for any emergency as it is now. These are in answer to the question of a time-lapse whe-

ther there was a police car on the Island or not.

Mr. Reader thanked the Rod and Gun Club for their work during the year in obtaining a resident Game Warden for the last hunting season.

He then asked for reports from committees, Norman Russell reporting on parks and roads, with special reference to beach access roads, which is an ongoing report.

The access road to be moved at Scoones Road on the Gulf side has been approved from the highways department, but there has been no action to this time. On the question of removal of derelict cars from the roadside, it seems that they can be removed from hydro right-of-way if they obstruct work there, but it is difficult to have one removed from the roadside.

Planning chairman Steve Riddell said that he is pleased that the Plan has now been approved, with some alterations to conform with the existing Act.

"We should not expect to have anything happen just because of this", he warned.

The ten-acre freeze is still on, but they now have the opinion of Galiano Islanders.

Speaking on the coming "legislation to protect the Gull Islands", he said that nobody knows what this means and we will have to wait until it comes out this session of the legislature.

Treasurer Hall Tingley reported that there are 145 members now. The first-aid fund is bigger than ever, being in receipt of many donations from grateful people.

Publicity chairman Jack Bickerton told the meeting that the general consensus was that this Chamber should do little

or nothing to extol publicity on Galiano, so brochures were distributed on the Island only.

A new brochure is currently in the process, with the help of Betty Fairbank. He also said that the new notice board is now relocated near the post office.

Mrs. Zona MacDonald asked if signs could be posted at the ferry terminals to tell people when the campsite is full, so they will not have to arrive on the island with the cost of the trip to find only that they have to go back on the next ferry. Mr. Curtis spoke on this question later, when he addressed the meeting.

Mr. Reader pointed out that the only way to stop hunting on the island is to have a ban on firearms, and that only with consent of landowners. As of now, the largest landowner, McMillan Bloedel, encourages hunting so it cannot be done at this time.

Mr. Hacking said that during the last hunting season, he had checked cars coming off the ferries, patrolled the power lines and Gulf Side also. He feels this action has cut down on illegal hunters coming to the island.

Election of officers for the coming year then saw John Liver elected president and nomination of a vice-president left to the incoming council. Secretary is Elizabeth Fowler; treasurer, Hall Tingley. Directors, Mrs. Joan Callaghan, Mrs. Betty Stewart, Mrs. Mary Backlund, Basil Benger, Jack Bickerton, Robert Knowles, Ron Thompson and Warren Wilson.

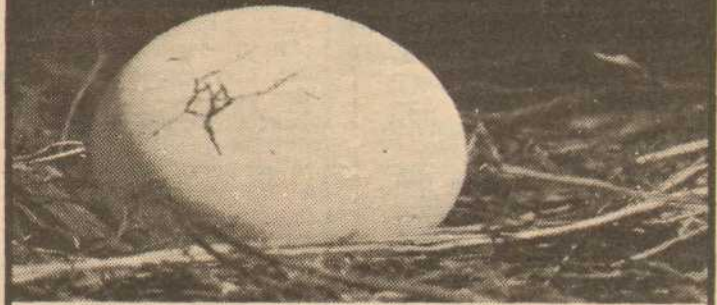

ment policy was by no means perfect prior to Bill 71. "Tinkering" as you call it, had occurred under the previous administration, and there was need for a complete review of property taxation from philosophy through to practice. However, your Government has continued the "tinkering" but this time with a sledgehammer. If, as your letter indicates, the intent of Bill 71 was to restore "fair play" in taxation and relate assessments to market values, why does it not provide that all land be assessed at a standard percentage of market value? This is the approach recommended by the Union of B. C. Municipalities and a number of experts in the field of taxation. The decision of the Government to ignore the advice and to penalize the owners of business and vacant property through higher assessments makes good politics, but what does it do to that fair play we were talking about?

We appreciate your letter and the assurance that the Government is interested in equitable taxation, but we must respectfully suggest that you take a close look at Bill 71 and its results to see what happened to those good intentions.

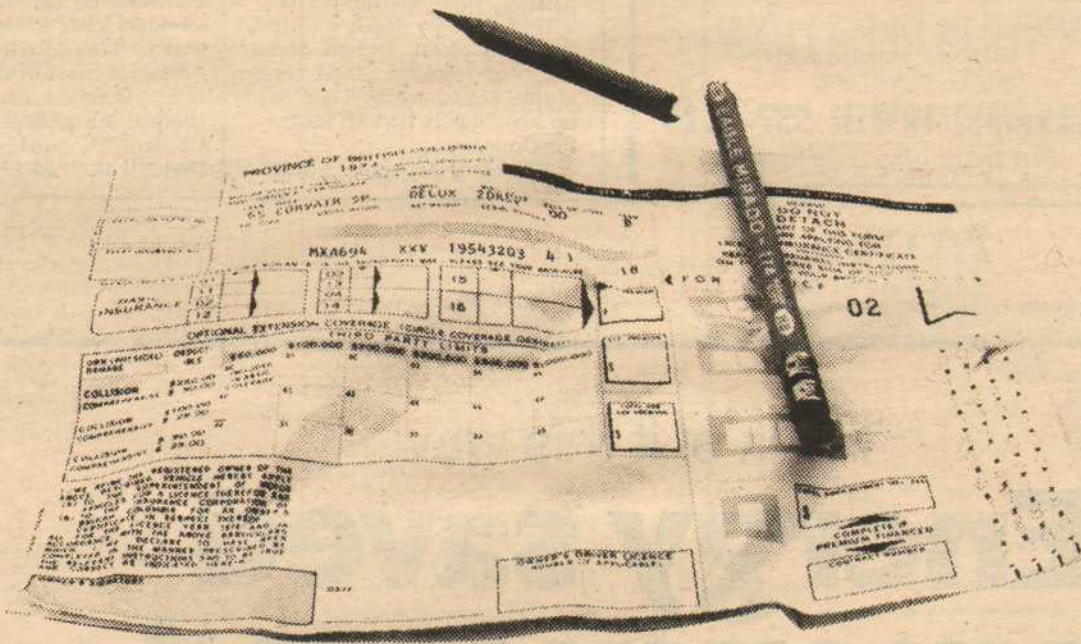

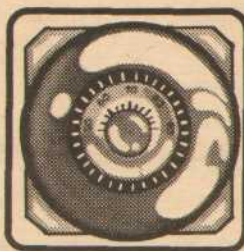

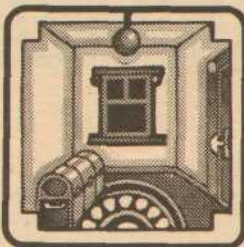
TEMPERATURE:

Finally, if you take a winter vacation or a ski weekend, 55° is quite adequate and you'll be able to get temperatures back to a comfortable level soon after you return.



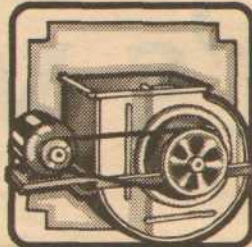
FURNACE FILTERS:

Here's an item that is often forgotten. Filters should be cleaned periodically and replaced twice a year to ensure efficient heat transfer to the living areas of the home. And now is a good time.



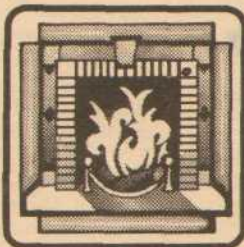
UNOCCUPIED ROOMS:

There is really no point in paying for valuable heat for areas you're not using. Try this. Close the registers or radiator valves of unoccupied rooms. Where you have electric baseboards, turn the thermostat down. Afterwards, check to see if there is any dampness or condensation. If so, let just enough heat in to establish a satisfactory atmosphere. Simple to do but it can save good money over a winter.



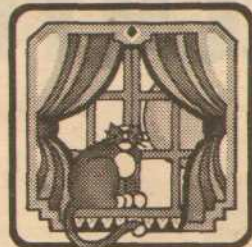
FURNACE FANS:

During the cold weather, your furnace fan should operate almost continually. This prevents hot and cold spots and provides better comfort at lower temperatures. If the fan and motor have bearing oil cups, it is good maintenance practice to inject 2 or 3 drops of lubricating oil at the same time you are changing your filters. Naturally, units that are sealed will not require this attention. If your fan is belt driven, check that it is not slipping. (Note: For your own safety, always shut off the power to the furnace when lubricating or changing filters.)



FIREPLACES:

Whenever you're not using your fireplace, be sure that you keep your damper tightly closed. If you find that your damper does not close tightly, or is corroded, or, if your fireplace does not have a damper, seal off your fireplace opening with a decorative panel. An open fireplace can go unnoticed, yet be one of the biggest sources of heat loss in your home!



DRAPES:

On a bright and sunny winter day, leave your drapes open and benefit from the sun's energy. At night and on dull days, keep them closed for insulation.

WEEKEND AT WESTMINSTER ABBEY

At Westminster Abbey for a weekend was a quiet peaceful way to spend a holiday. It all started with a description of a massive fresco "The temptation of St. Benedict" done by a Rev. Dunstan Massey O.S.B. in the Vancouver Sun.

After the usual ferry trip in the unearthly hours of the morning to Vancouver, another two hours ride brought me to Mission a short taxi ride from the Abbey.

I was met by the guest master who showed me to a clean well appointed room with a shower. Father Dunstan arrived after a while and was mildly amused to know of an East Indian coming from Ganges. Informing him that it was on Salt Spring Island, that rang

a bell "Yes, Malcolm Muggeridge was supposed to visit us", I did remind him that we have other celebrities as well

FIVE YEARS WORK IS LABOUR OF LOVE

Jack Webster, W. A. C. Bennett which made us laugh again as both personalities seem to come from either end of the political spectrum.

We talked about art, agreed that art should be for the community and should have the human aspect emphasised to bring it back with the mainstream of life.

About Father Duncan, a gifted man who had his first one man show in the Vancouver Art Gallery at the age of fourteen, he looks about 35

years old (though I didn't ask his age), bespectacled with expressive hands, a man of great patience and devoted to meticulous research.

The fresco in question came up eventually, he described in great detail the various difficulties involved in the selection of pigments and their mixing, the search for bricks which had to be of evenly fired temperature all hand picked by him, his futile correspondence trying to find somebody who knew something about the technique of doing frescos, search in libraries, he even thought of writing to the great muralist of Mexico, Siquieros. Eventually a man in Haney who does signs for Safeway for a living and works furiously in the back of his studio on what he wants to do gave him some information. The numerous experiment: and meticulous recording of colour mixing took a number of years. To this date the painting has taken over five years to complete.

At the end of a long walkway for monks the fresco shows the young St. Benedict struggling symbolically with his own passions. Other symbols like the Olive tree stump with a little olive shoot, the Dogwood tree, the finding of water in the symbolic desert are all

painted in a curious mixture of perspective which leave the spectator dumbfounded. Salvador Dali's Madonna of Port Lligat flashed through my mind. The total effect of the fresco is good and it slowly draws you into it. A little patch at

the right hand corner remains to be done, Father Dunstan he will finish it in another two weeks.

The main beauty of the fresco done in the INTANACO method is that the mortar which is mixed with lime goes on wet, the colours which are raw pigments mixed with rain water go on to the wet mortar upon drying all the colours become waterproof with a unique soft effect.

We talked about Giotto, Michaelangelo, we were both impressed by Michaelangelo's fresco work in the Sistine Chapel. Father Dunstan had the good fortune of meeting Lauren Harris in his studio when he was young. It was also a great experience for a Hindu to be invited to the inner sanctum to dine with the monks. A silent meal, simple food with no waste. Quite a meeting ground for a Hindu and a Christian, ART!!!

Left Westminster Abbey wishing Father Dunstan lots of luck in his venture of future frescos, five years for a fresco is definitely a labour of LOVE.

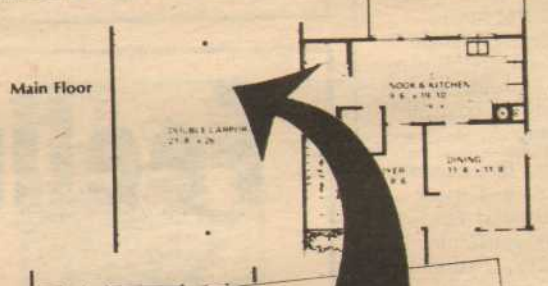

ADDRESSES ANNUAL MEETING AT GALIANO

LEGISLATORS FACE FULL TIME JOB SAYS CURTIS

Work of an M.L.A. cannot be completed in eight weeks, Hugh Curtis told the Galiano Chamber of Commerce on Saturday.

The member of the legislature for Saanich and the Islands told the meeting that he can

now devote all his time to the affairs of his constituency.

He is on leave of absence from Radio CFX and his term as Mayor of Saanich has come to a close.

Mr. Curtis was welcomed by retiring president, Frank

Reader.

His mail is very heavy and he welcomes letters from his constituents, he assured islanders. Mr. Curtis gave islanders his telephone number and assured them that his secretary would take messages

should he be out, travelling in his constituency.

If he succeeds in nothing else during his term of office, he continued, he will hear the problems of his constituents, regardless of their political feelings.

He cited several ways that problems could be followed up for action.

This is a vast riding to represent, because of its diversity. The southern boundary is near the Town and Country Shopping Centre in Saanich and it runs right up to the Gulf Islands. There was loud laughter to greet his remark that the islands represent exactly half of his work. Mr. Curtis hurriedly explained that this remark was meant in "the most complimentary manner," as the balance of the riding takes a lot of work to municipal governments, but the islanders come straight to the MLA.

He congratulated Mr. Reader for keeping him informed on problems of the Chamber, and hoped for continued support from the new council.

Mr. Curtis was delighted at having the Galiano Plan now signed and said so.

People who wish to have a copy of the legislation regarding the Gulf Islands, should advise him ahead of time.

He said that he asks for the strongest possible input from the Islanders themselves, otherwise he feels it will not work at all.

He spoke briefly on the "assessment fiasco", and assumed that people have appealed if they feel they have been wrongly dealt with.

The International Joint Commission has been shelved for one year, and he is very critical of this body of people, for their way of bringing the Gulf Islands into a Point Roberts problem. "Their pencils slipped," he said.

Fred Robson said that the Islands have come a long way this past few years, having now been mentioned in the Throne Speech. A few years ago, no one knew where the Gulf Islands were, or even existed.

On his question of a reservation system in Montague Park, Mr. Curtis replied that this problem is being taken up with the Government and the B. C. Ferries. It is also being pursued by him.

Mr. Hacking thinks that it is quite feasible to have some kind of a notice posted regarding the park, with close cooperation from people concerned.

Mr. Reader asked if a tape could be made to be played on the ferry on the way over to the islands, warning everyone of the dangers of fires, and asking everyone to be very careful with campfires.

The president then thanked Mr. Curtis for coming over to speak to this meeting, then asked the new president, John Liver to take the chair for the remainder of the meeting.

Mr. Liver thanked everyone for their confidence in him, and as the time was a little late, asked the new council to remain for a short meeting to decide when the first council meeting will take place.

Salt Spring Island library has a new name. By a sweeping vote on Monday afternoon members of the library association supported the proposal to change its name from Salt Spring Island Centennial Library to the "Mary Hawkins Memorial Library".

NEW MAN HEADS FERRY SERVICE

General Manager of Gulf of Georgia Towing Co. Ltd., Charles Gallagher, 42, has been appointed as General Manager of the B. C. Ferry Division.

Mr. Gallagher will assume his new post on a date to be set in mid-March, at a salary of \$33,000 annually. The post has been held until now by Monty Aldous who is being retained by the ferry service in another capacity.

Mr. Gallagher, as Manager of the 24-ship fleet will have jurisdiction over about 2,800 employees. He brings to the job 27 years of experience in various shipping concerns in Canada, England, Ghana and Nigeria. He was awarded the post in competition with more than 300 applicants from all parts of Canada.

Born and educated in Liverpool, England, he is a veteran of the Royal Air Force. He is married and has a son and a daughter and resides at present in Vancouver. He came to British Columbia in 1967 as Assistant to the President of the Gulf of Georgia Towing Co. Ltd. He rose to General Manager and Division President in short order.

If you've got kinks, feed 'em!
That's the message of an entirely new cook book written by a Salt Spring Islander who figures that everybody's got kinks and that they should live with their quirks and enjoy them. The book tells you how to cook with them.

Maureen Bendick knows a thing or two about kinks and quirks. She's a psychologist with experience in a wide range of people and the conviction that there is no such thing as a "normal" person.

The book offers a recipe for everything. If the reader knows he's ridden with symptoms, odds are he'll find some of the symptoms right here in this book. If he hasn't any or if he doesn't know he has any, he can still cook to the tune of some symptom he might have had if he had had something.

The first recipe is lined up with Aboulia and is offered as abouliabaisse. Any fool can eat sole with shrimp, but it takes a special flair to recognize the inability to make even simple decisions as residing in the simple sole.

The problems of alcoholism are confined to a soup with wine and scrambled eggs with rum.

End of the affair is Zeitgarnik Effect. It is the sort of thing you would expect a book to end with. You might even expect the cook to end with it. It is a complete German potato salad.

The recipes are unlikely to bring on any of the symptoms but they are also unlikely to cure them. They are offered as a parallel to the problems

of living and a means of making living more pleasant.

Any similarity between this book and the symptoms is coincidental. You may not learn a lot more about what makes you kooky, but you can get fat on carrying out the investigation.

The book is a means of escape from her hang-ups for an otherwise perfectly normal psychologist. At least, that's my diagnosis.

Even if an outfitter could afford to abandon his horses, and this doesn't apply to many they are humane individuals who are aiding in conservation. Outfitters truly love their horses.

They are an important part of the outfitters' equipment. These men take great pride in their horses and have developed them into fine animals with good, sure footed qualities -- very necessary in mountain hunting. They are fancied by hunters from the middle west states -- horse country. These people are amazed at the feats these well trained mountain horses perform. The well-being and, in fact, the very lives of hunters are dependent on these splendid animals. When a colt is born up in the mountains the guides will bring them out on their saddles when they're too young or the going is too tough. It's quite illogical to accuse such individuals of abandoning such valuable animals when their very livelihood depends on horses.
