TRUSTEES NAMED FROM THREE ISLANDS

Three new trustees were elected to Lady Minto Hospital board of management last week.

On Mayne Island Mrs. Betty Fry was re-elected after serving a one-year term.

Robert Hindmarch was named at Saturna. He takes the seat formerly held by Lorraine Campbell. Mrs. Campbell has served out the full three terms and the hospital bylaws prohibit a further consecutive term.

From Salt Spring Island Mrs. Iola Brookbanks will fill the chair vacated by Mrs. Ethel French.

Trustees were all elected at the five annual meetings staged throughout the islands last week.

Islanders heard reports from Chairman Paul Layard, Administrator Harold Hoffman, and Hospital Auxiliary and medical staff.

Spencer Marr was named auditor.

Medical Chief of Staff Fred Saunders prepared a report in which he explained that there were nine members of the medical staff, up by four from last year.

Some skills are duplicated and when a doctor is off-island there remains another to offer his specialty.

"This has been working out very well," reported Dr. Saunders, "and the hospital is

working around the clock."

Pamela Wilson asked whether the board had given any thought to a second storey on the hospital.

The chairman explained that this could not be considered while occupancy of the hospital stands at 80%.

Staff of the hospital numbers 55, said Harold Hoffman in reply to a question from the floor.

The chairman also spoke of the work of Lorraine Campbell

in connection with the hospital. "She is out after nine years," he told his audiences, "She has done a magnificent job!"

He also spoke of the retirement of Mrs. French. "We have deeply appreciated her knowledge and her experience," he told the meeting. Mrs. French was the provincial government representative on the board before being elected to serve as local representative.

BUT VOTERS WERE NOT ON VOTERS LIST

Balloting on the watershed lot size by Salt Spring Island residents recently has pointed up the considerable number of islanders who believed they

were on the voters list when they were not, reports Director George Heinekey.

The list is not up to date. He cited the 141 ballots which were rejected in the watershed vote because the voters were not listed.

Vote is not directly related to property ownership. Every islander must check that he is on the list.

Salt Spring Island residents may pick up a registration card at the Gulf Islands School District office in Ganges or at the Regional Director's office in the Court House at Ganges.

Cards may then be left with the regional office in Ganges or mailed to the regional office in Victoria.

The voters list is available at the school board office or the Court House.

Outer Islands residents may call Victoria or Ganges or write to the Capital Regional District office in Victoria to ascertain their standing.

If they are not on the list they will not be able to vote in the regional elections in November.

AT LONG HARBOUR

Police nab two for safe job

Two young men, both from Sydney, Nova Scotia, were arrested at Long Harbour on Monday night and charged with breaking and entering Mouat's Store last week.

Dennis Alexander Dufour and Norman John Bodhaine appeared in Victoria Provincial Court on Tuesday afternoon to hear the charges.

Constable M. W. Dew reported the apprehension of the two men at about 5 pm Monday. They were attempting to leave the island, he reported.

Burglary at Mouat's was discovered on Tuesday morning last week, after the safe had been forced open and about \$2,000 in cash, cheques and clothing was taken from the store.

They even consider wastes

New sewer committee has been formed to investigate a sewer system for the Ganges community.

Taking part in discussions on the question are Lionel Coulthard, Regional Director George Heinekey, Mike Lar-mour, Paul Layard, Spencer Marr, Isobel Marr, Norman Mouat, and Tom Toynbee.

Also to be invited to take part in the discussions are Charles Horel, Charles Baltzer and Frank Richards.

Committee was formed from the nucleus of three members of the Salt Spring Island Planning Association.

Initial discussions have centred on bringing the statistics

and information up to date as well as discussions of alternative methods of disposal. Oxidation ditches and land disposal are being considered. Committee has directed its attention to methods of treating effluent, its disposal and its use on the land.

Dr. Coulthard is acting as adviser to the committee. He is engaged in research into sewage disposal and is presently investigating methods of converting solid wastes into animal food through the use of high-temperature digesters, Driftwood was told.

The committee will welcome public co-operation.

Another timely topic will be the care of bulbs after the bloom has disappeared, in order to ensure good results for the forthcoming year.

I.S. Shank will be supervising the exchange table, and all members are invited to bring plants that can be exchanged for another plant. Garden members may have an abundance of certain plants that their neighbours lack. Any plants that are left over will be auctioned off.

I mentioned in an earlier Garden Corner that I had purchased a Norita Rose. Progress has been slow, but I was delighted to see buds finally forming. Variations in flowers according to elevation is well illustrated on the island. Immediate ocean-front dwellers have flowers so much earlier than the residents on the various higher levels.

The Vesuvius area also enjoys the earliest blooms, and it is a pleasant drive in the early Spring.

EASIER DRINKING LAWS

Have a beer? A glass of wine? If you run short of either, just nip round to the corner grocery and get a fresh supply.

It's the new drinking pattern in British Columbia. Beer and wine will be available at grocery stores and restrictions on their consumption are to be eased up.

The proposed changes are an indication of an entirely new thinking here on the west coast relative to drinking.

How will this change in availability of intoxicants affect islanders?

On Salt Spring Island the effect will be to make beer and wine available at times outside the normal business hours of the Government Liquor Store. Beer is already procurable from the licensed premises in the community. Wine is not normally to be found.

On the Outer Islands it will introduce a new source of both types of alcoholic beverage. Where there is no liquor store, the availability of beer in quantity at the local store will bring a new ready supply to islanders.

The same change in liquor regulations also provides for the consumption of fermented liquor in public places. As the Attorney-General has said, there can be no harm in a picnic with wine.

Most islanders still have some slight reservations.

The coming week end is one of the frightening aspects of modern living to many island residents. Hordes of young persons, mostly high school children from Victoria and Vancouver areas, will come to the island for a wild week end. They will consume large quantities of beer and hard liquor and they will assume the proportions of rioters.

There will be extensive property damage and public parks will be available to no other holidaymakers.

Just how the new regulations will relieve worried and often frightened, island residents is not clear. It could be that while the cities enjoy a new era of sensible drinking the islands will be paying the shot.

And we have been paying this particular shot for several years already.

SAFE WATER

Sir,
 There is an old saying "that fools rush in where angels fear to tread". We, on this island are now asked to consider the future of our ability to provide the most necessary component to our survival, water in a safe form.

Each cell in the human body is a chemical factory of a complexity beyond the entire known scientific knowledge of man. Since this complex chemical factory is supported in a body that is over 70% fluid, it behoves us as a society to play the part of angels.

To provide safe water within our present meagre knowledge a preference for a rigid-

ly controlled water supply is to be preferred, since an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure. Given this as an impossibility we would use such knowledge as we have to provide a water purification system using such knowledge as is available to mere humans. It would appear we have neither in the matter of supply to a great proportion of the present island population.

Water is taken from a large unprotected lake which is polluted daily by chemicals, bacteria, viruses, etc. The dirt and plant growth is filtered out to some extent, and chlorine (in a form similar to Javex) to keep the bacteria count down, with little or no

Opulent courts

Been pinched lately? Or in the later slang, been busted lately? Either way, if you have been arraigned before the courts in recent months, you'll have seen a change from the first time.

The day is not far back in time when a man was checked for a misdemeanour or a technicality by a police officer; prosecuted by the same officer and in some cases even arrested by that officer. He would then pay his fine to the same officer.

The RCMP officer served as policeman, prosecutor, clerk of the court, witness and prison guard.

It was not a good system. That is why it has been changed.

At one time the accused would stand in the dock by himself. The magistrate or judge would preside and the only other occupant of the courtroom would be the RCMP officer.

Some police officers were excellent prosecutors.

I have sat in while the RCMP officer would search out precedents to shoot back at a defence counsel as fast as the trained lawyer could retort.

There were many loopholes in the fabric of justice under that system. Main shortcoming was the fact that it created some resentment in the minds of those who did not understand the thinking behind it all.

In another court I can recall the presiding Justice scribbling down alternative sentences on a piece of paper and then surreptitiously seeking the advice of the police officer - prosecutor - court clerk.

He used to point to a figure and look at the officer, who would be on tenterhooks lest the action be misinterpreted. And it would have been just that if anyone had spotted him at it.

Court today is like the pub on a Saturday night: crowded. The judge sits above the court

and order is called by the RCMP officer. Charge is read by the clerk and Crown counsel proceeds slowly in order that the court stenographer can take down whatever is said.

With a judge, prosecutor, clerk, stenographer, defence counsel and two police officers, the pace is changed. So is the cost of operation.

The simple offender against society is probably the least affected.

Most court rooms are magnificent. They are constructed and decorated, equipped and furnished in constant recognition of the dignity and majesty of the law.

The result of this tribute to dignity is that only the highest paid members of the court are in familiar surroundings.

Most completely awed is the man who lives simply, works well and rarely sees the inside the a court room. Amid thick ritzy carpets, soft, subdued lighting, panelling and acoustics out of this world, the accused is out of reality before the court is in session.

Even the Ganges Provincial Court room is among the more magnificently appointed buildings in the islands.

Is that a mistake? Or don't people notice? - F.G.R.

THEY REMEMBER PENDER PORTAGE

The Gulf Islands Branch of the British Columbia Historical Society is indebted to the Parks Board for a plaque commemorating a very early means of communication between the Islands and the Saanich Peninsula, and to members of the pioneer Spalding family for the erection of a cairn to display it.

The cairn stands on the road side approaching the Canal from the North Pender side; the Plaque reads: "Near this point passed an ancient trail over which Indians portaged their canoes between Browning and Bedwell Harbours. Across this neck of land, Pioneer settlers later dragged their boats on skids for visits between the scattered island families and to shorten the journey to Sidney by sail or row-boat. In 1903, at local request, the Federal Government constructed the nearby canal dividing Pender Island."

FISHERMEN CONDEMNED

BY SPECTator

A young French fisherman who eats a good deal of fish may expect to be chronically ill before he is 30 and dead at 40.

This prediction appears in the London Times and comes from a French government source, the French National Institute of Health and Medical Research.

Industrial complexes along the Mediterranean coast have made the sea food of the Western Mediterranean dangerous. Crabs containing 10 times the World Health Organization's internationally-accepted norm of organic mercury have been analyzed by the University of Sienna. What does one say about this ...?

We remember Minamata, when 50 Japanese fishermen died and scores of children were maimed horribly. French coastal fishermen will die slowly and painfully during the next 20 years.

Dr. Maurice Aubert, director of the French government research, says, "The task of scientists is to demonstrate before it is too late that the sea is a vital, almost miraculous fluid and that it should not be used simply as an industrialist's waste basket".

But when have our industrialists listened to scientists instead of the stock market report?

What about the oil tankers proposed for Anacortes Is.? If those with power put profits ahead of lives, who is to stop them?

The N.D.P. government has done almost nothing to protect the environment and dare not do so because of all the businessmen who would vote against them if they did. I guess it's up to you and me to fight for the world and our children's environment. And the industrialists and developers?

If they should read this paragraph, they will tell you that I am "crying wolf!"

CHAIRMAN REFERS TO TWO NEEDS

Objectives of the Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital Society are to give the best possible patient care in the hospital and to participate in any activity designed and carried out to promote the general health of the community.

The summary was offered last week by Paul Layard when he addressed the society's annual meetings in his capacity of chairman.

All concerned have striven to improve patient-care, he told the meetings.

"We have made progress, but we still have a way to go." In June the hospital will be examined in detail by the representative of the Canadian Council on Hospital Accreditation.

The report will be of value to the board in improving the quality of care in the hospital and to help with planning, stated the chairman.

Two plans lie ahead.

The board is seeking an updating of the medical-surgical core of the hospital, X-ray laboratories, operating rooms and emergency services need overhauling.

Second project facing the board is the construction of a 20-bed intermediate-20 bed personal care unit on the hospital grounds, explained Layard.

The minister has ruled that the addition to the hospital must be administered by a separate hospital society. This society would be concerned with the second concept of promoting the general health of the community.

Property has already been purchased by the Capital Regional Hospital District for the new facility, he added.

The chairman expressed his thanks to Mrs. Chester and her executive of the Hospital Auxiliary and the membership. He cited the work done in diversionary therapy under the guidance of Ethel Davidson; hospital visiting by Elna Cairns and the Thrift Shop by Mary Yellowlees. He also thanked the outer islanders who come to the hospital to help.

It was a long list. The chairman cited Mrs. Gerry Facca and the candy-stripers; Mrs. French who has retired from the board; Mrs. Lorraine Campbell, who has completed her three terms; to the members of the board and to the doctors at the hospital.

Members plan to keep the public informed of the discussions and to invite suggestions and help.

In a letter to Regional Director Heinekey, Henry Elder and Donna Watt have discounted the suggestion that opposition was made to the proposed sewer plan under the impression that it was aiming to dump raw sewage into the Harbour.

The recent proposal to turn treated sewage into the harbour was rejected because the character of the area into which it was to be discharged was not appropriate, explained the committee spokesmen.

The same letter referred to opposition to the sewer plan as a means of controlling growth. While the two factors are intimately connected, to oppose the sewer solely on the basis of opposing growth would be inconsistent with the Community Plan to which most islanders have agreed.

The signators urged that, at this stage, the issues be debated clearly.

View of the past from a school

The red-painted frame school stands empty, looking somewhat forlorn and alone, in a field of dried, brown grass.

It looks less empty, some-

how, during the spring season, when flowering shrubs and wild flowers lend their charm. The day I visited the building was during last summer when the day was really warm. The flagpole was innocent of any flag and the tall fir trees stood like so many sentinels on three sides of the school.

Inside, over one of the four blackboards was a poster proclaiming in large, red printing that this is Beaver Point School 1885--1951. That period represents the longest continuous use of a school in British Columbia.

Over another blackboard was written: "To commemorate our Pioneers From the divers corners of the earth they came. With naught but their strength and these tools. They

created out of a wilderness our heritage."

There was a list of the families whose children were students at the school. Some of them were Ruckle, King, Pappenburger, MacLennan,

A large and very tattered bible presented by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge was on one of the bookshelves. There was also a prie dieu with a padded knee rest and it held a prayer book, showing much use by its wear-

mosphere."

Let us hope the door may remain open but that vandalism remains outside.

I was unable to find the stream where so many of the early students competed during recess to determine who could

Another list followed of those families with descendants still living in the district: King, second and third generation; Pappenburger, second generation; Ruckle, second, third and fourth generation and Stevens, second and third

The school building was begun in May, 1885, by Charles Beddis and Sons. The school was officially opened September 30, 1885. It was built mostly by volunteer labour.

Another list, a lengthy one, was written on another blackboard. Some of these were smudged and partly erased by time and visitors brushing against them.

These are some of the teachers down through the years: Miss Jackson, 1885; Miss Kate Furnace, Miss Bertha Trage, Miss Agnes Ruckle, Robert Watkins, Miss Flora Fraser, Norman Morrison, K. C. Symons, 1907-08; Miss Lily Rath, John H. Monk, 1920; Miss J. McQueen, 1922; T. Cropley, 1923-24; Miss Inga Dololman, Mrs. W. Cook and Miss Muriel Wrigley 1944.

along with a book of hymns.

Beside the prie dieu stood an old wood stove with a nickel top. In a box nearby was some kindling and a copy of the Vancouver Sun, dated September 26, 1958.

A model of the school, well done, still rests on a shelf inside the front door. There was no indication of the artist.

On another book shelf I found a copy of the Canadian Red Cross Junior dated December, 1945.

The wooden plank floor is a spot scuffed in places and some of the stain has been worn off. Six old-fashioned desks are firmly attached to boards which, in turn, are fastened to the floor. Shelves are missing from two of the desks, whose iron scroll work on the sides is very ornate.

On the back wall there was a coloured illustration of the various crosses which make up the Union Jack and the Canadian Ensign.

One blackboard has notes left by visitors to the school. One notation ringed with white chalk reads: "The Metcalf Family. We are proud of the brave and hardy B. C. pioneers. We hope your Salt Spring Island Historical Society will preserve all the treasures and the building."

Only one square of glass in one of the windows has been smashed and two are cracked.

Near a cupboard are two sets of bookshelves with one lonely, white cup left abandoned. On another shelf I saw a copy of the Teachers' manual of the MacLean Method of Writing. A few exercise books on a lower shelf demonstrated the method. Here are some of the sentences to be copied by the students in that accepted style of penmanship:

Of the whippoorwill afar off
But the wary roebuck started
Someone had left a note of thanks saying, "Thanks for the open door and the lovely at-

Indeed, some horses wouldn't permit an automobile to pass them. Consequently, they had to be left home when the cars became more numerous on Salt Spring.

The story of how an oil pipeline was laid from Norman Wells to the border of Alaska by American Contractors during the Second World War. The trek took place in the winter of 1942 and 1943. The base for supplies was Edmonton.

Out of 435 men in the hotel business in Alberta, Mr. Reid was asked to be responsible for housing and feeding a consortium of American contractors and their employees.

The story became a travelog

from Edmonton to the far North near the Arctic Circle. Mr. Reid illustrated his talk with snapshots of men and machinery, of dogs and sleds and waterfalls. It was a tale of snow and ice, of lakes and rivers and the serving of well cooked food, and plenty of it, to 500 men at a meal and keeping chefs happy at stopping places 50 miles apart. Mr. Reid completed an inspection tour of each place every two weeks.

But the Norman Wells pool didn't prove out as the centre

of an oil field. Many dry wells were drilled. So oil never flowed through the pipeline. After many years the pipe was sold for scrap.

Mr. Reid was given a further assignment the following summer to care for the personnel of barges and tugboat conveying supplies to the North by way of rivers and lakes.

Though the pipeline to Alaska was never used, this heroic conquest of natural forces exemplify the loyalty and co-operation of men in solving war-time problems.

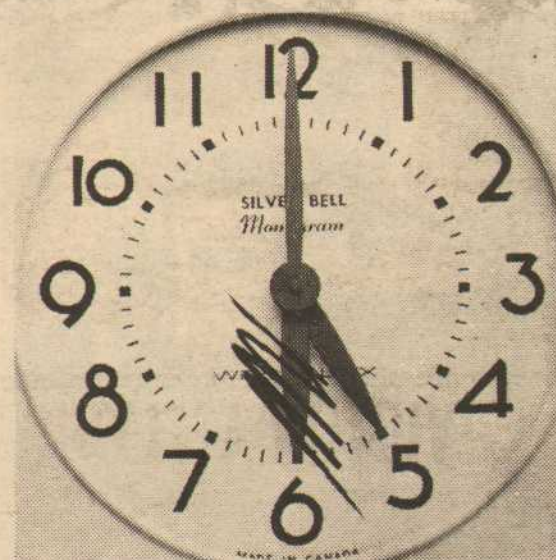

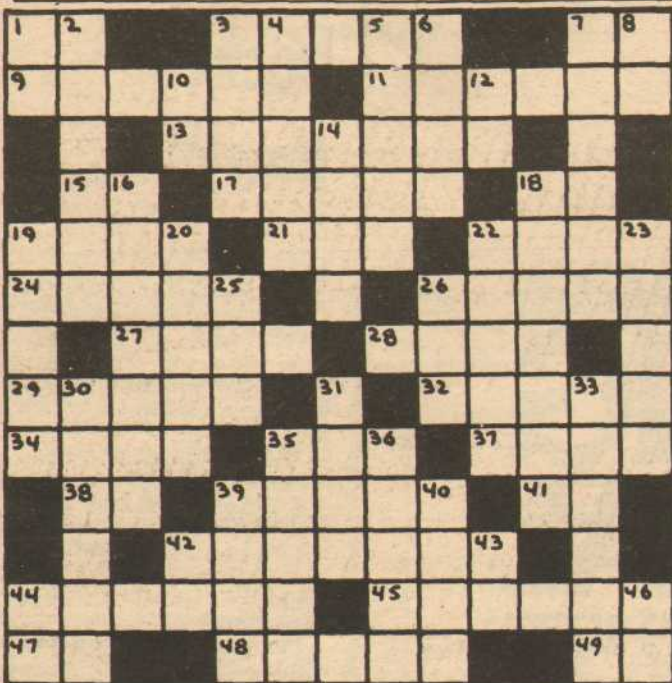

Island couple continues Morgentaler protest

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Williamson, of Ganges, wrote to Justice Minister Otto Lang recently protesting the reversal of a jury verdict in Montreal by a higher court. They referred to the widely publicized Morgentaler case.

The Montreal doctor was acquitted of an abortion charge in a lower court and the Supreme Court reversed the judgment, convicting him.

The Salt Spring Island couple expressed concern for the survival of the jury system when a court could override a jury's verdict.

Here is Mr. Lang's reply:

This is to acknowledge receipt of your letter in which you expressed your views on the recent Supreme Court decision regarding the case of Dr. Henry Morgentaler.

We have considered the implications of the decision of the Supreme Court of Canada, which upheld the power of a Court of Appeal to substitute a verdict of conviction for a jury verdict of acquittal, with a view to determining whether any change in the law in that regard may be required. In our view the very wording of the judgment of the Supreme Court on this point indicated that such appellate power will be rarely exercised and consequently there should be no fear that this decision will have an adverse effect on the jury system. It was noted by the Supreme Court that this case appears to be the first time this appellate power has been exercised in Canada and that in only very exceptional cases can it be used.

The Government realizes that many Canadians believe

that there should be no legal impediment against the simple wish of a woman to have an abortion for any reason whatsoever. Others are equally convinced that abortion is murder and ought not to be permitted under any circumstances. The Criminal Code amendments relating to abortion which were passed in 1969 are, in a way, a middle position between these two views; in other words the second best choice of most people.

The new law recognizes certain medical grounds as a basis for withholding criminal sanctions for an abortion. To identify such cases the law provides for committees composed of doctors to issue a certificate stating that in its opinion the continuation of the pregnancy would or would be likely to endanger the life or health of the expectant mother. This is a medical judgement which Parliament left to experts to determine. It is the Government's view that the present law can work if the medical committees are prepared to accept the responsibility which Parliament asked them to shoulder. We will continue to examine the workability of this law within the broader context of issues which the question of abortion raises in order to determine if improvements are required.

Mr. and Mrs. Williamson have written to T. C. Douglas MP, expressing continued concern and urging his support for John Diefenbaker's proposed

legislation prohibiting the courts of appeal from overturning jury acquittals.

"We would ask you to support such legislation, using every effort at your disposal to make it retroactive," they concluded.

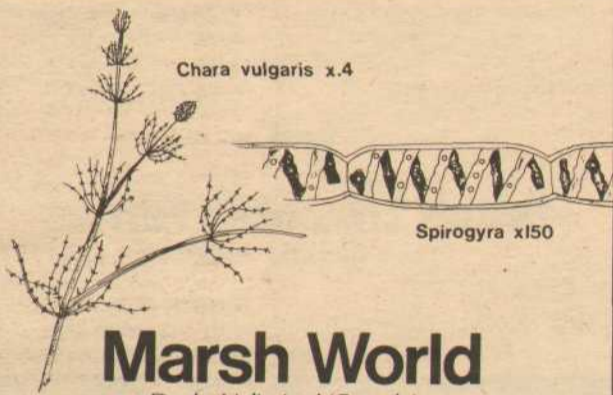

WATERSHED BALLOTS

Islanders call for large lots

Capital Regional Board will decide on Wednesday the fate of the amendment sought by some residents of Salt Spring Island to the official community plan.

Straw vote taken by a ballot published in Driftwood in recent weeks asked for an opinion on minimum lot sizes in watershed areas.

Results of the vote showed 87% in favour of an amendment to the community plan to raise the minimum permissible lots size in watersheds from five acres to 10 acres.

Of 642 votes cast, only 51 were from persons whose names appear on the voters list.

The 141 votes not on the voters list were 18 against the change and 122 in favour. They were not included in the final count.

Official totals were "yes", 446; "no", 61 and four were spoilt.

In addition to the official figures there were 203 rejected ballots. The boxes had been stuffed with "no" votes purporting to be from persons listed on the voters list. In some instances the ballots duplicated a ballot already submitted by an islander.

Mrs. Beth Hill checked out a number of the stuffed ballots and ascertained that they had not been submitted by the person named. They were all readily identifiable and were all withdrawn.

The vote was directed by the Salt Spring Island Planning Association on behalf of the Capital Regional Board. Director George Heinekey was present during the counting of ballots. Taking charge of the count was Adrian Wolfe-Milner.

On Monday Director Heinekey told Driftwood that there is a big difference between changing the community plan and changing a by-law.

"I am going to recommend to the Regional Board that it take into consideration the large 'yes' percentage," he stated.

Plea for a change in the size of minimum watershed lots came originally from SPEC. The conservation society asked the regional board to amend the community plan to require the larger lot size on the grounds that lakes on the island were undergoing eutrophication at an undesirable rate.

The board passed the request

to the island planning association, an unofficial planning association which is elected in the community at an annual public meeting. It has no official standing.

If the islanders showed that this change was popularly sought, he would recommend its implementation, promised Heinekey.

The association staged the straw vote and presented the director with the findings.

ber of Commerce in a drive for recreation funds. The same man is behind the scenes this year.

At 9:30 the day will get off to a start with pancake breakfast sponsored by the High School Band and no waiting. By that time the stalls will be set up and in operation.

First on the program will be the Swap 'n' Shop. This was so successful at its inception last year that Jack Albhouse still has odds and ends in his basement left over from the project.

This year the vendors are on their own. Anyone can bring what he wants to sell, and then sell it. There will be no staff to sell it for him.

The big event of the day will be the parade.

Floats and children and bands and horses will lead off from the hospital at 1 pm, to arrive at the elementary school grounds at 1:30 p.m. The parade will travel on Crofton Road, Lower Ganges Road, McPhillips Ave., Jackson Ave., and into the school grounds.

When the floats and other entries have paraded around the grounds, the new May Queen, Jane Toynbee will be crowned by last year's queen.

YEAR OF CHANGES AT HOSPITAL

Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital Administrator's report for 1974 was given by Harold Hoffman last week.

Operations for 1974 resulted in a surplus of \$28,217, compared with a deficit of \$3,089 for the year 1973, he stated.

Much has been achieved during the year under review. The physiotherapy program has been improved and we now have a full time physiotherapy department. A part-time dietician has been added to our staff, which is of great benefit to patients on special diets. An outpatient dietetic counselling service is being planned for the coming year.

The hospital has co-operated with the volunteer group "Meals on Wheels" by providing the meals since July of last year. Total meals provi-

ded to year end was 1,127.

Another hospital department, Medical Records, was completely reorganized. Dictating and transcribing equipment is now in use and a qualified medical records technician has been engaged.

The hospital has encouraged continuing education among the staff members. An In-service Training Program was held for 5 days in March of 1974 in the clinical area of Intensive and Coronary Care. Members of the staff visit other hospitals to gain extra knowledge in their particular area of endeavor.

On July 1, 1974, the Emergency Health Services Commission accepted the responsibility for the provision of ambulance transportation in the Gulf Islands.

Patients are charged \$5 for

each call and in the Gulf Islands, the fee covers the ambulance on the island, the water taxi and the ambulance from the water taxi to the hospital, or to a hospital in Victoria from Swartz Bay.

The administrator concluded with an expression of thanks to staff and personnel at the hospital.

CLEARING ROADS NOT THEIR BAG

Clearing access roads is not the prime function of the department of highways, Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce was told on Monday evening.

Addressing the Chamber's monthly dinner meeting, George Harper, district engineer for the department, told the Chamber that access to beaches is open to anyone who cares to make use of an access road. It is not the policy of his department to open up these accesses, he noted.

Where there is a clear pub-

lic call for access and where it is clear that health hazards will not be permitted to develop, the department will open up beach or lake access roads.

He has record of cases where an access road has been closed by the department of health.

Mr. Harper took the hot seat for the evening. He was fired on from all sides as members brought out old complaints and new ones.

When a man buys property adjacent to a beach access he should be aware of that road,

observed President Gerry Bourdin.

Most owners are advised, commented Bert Timbers.

He understood that when there is one dissenting vote against the proposal to clear a beach access it would be rejected, pursued the president.

The highways spokesman did not agree. Majority of access roads had long since been pre-empted and closed off, he explained.

"It's a mare's nest," interjected Tom Toynbee. "If

someone goes in and uses an access road, what's his legal position?"

He would be within his rights, replied the highways department man.

It is the policy of his department to require that all beach accesses be cleared in new subdivisions reported Mr. Harper. This also obviates the possibility of the land being subsequently pre-empted.

Bob Blundell suggested that many accesses were impracticable. The meeting agreed with him.

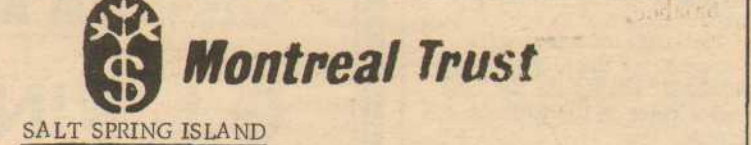

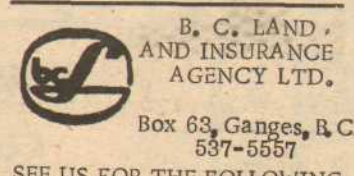

Ganges a mess highwayman told

When Highways Department District Engineer George Harper was in Ganges on Monday evening he offered a report on various island problems for the benefit of Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce.

In reply to a question from Jack Althouse, he declined to commit traffic engineers to a meeting, but he agreed to pass on the request that they pay a visit to the island.

"Town of Ganges is an absolute mess," stated Althouse. "It needs a traffic study. Why do we have to wait until some one gets killed before something gets done?"

Road widening necessitates capital expenditure and he has no funds for such a purpose said Harper, but he was looking at a curbing program for the community. He also reminded the Chamber that the department is not in the sidewalk-building business.

Tom Toynee expressed pleasure at having a spokesman here from the department of highways. The Chamber enjoys better co-operation from the B. C. Hydro and BC Telephone Company, he added.

Department is responsible for litter and for dead animals on the highway, said the engineer. Dead animals on the beach are not within the jurisdiction of his department.

While the Chamber was pressing for co-operation from the department of highways, Mr. Harper also had his beefs. He would like to see more off street parking, he told the

meeting.

The speaker also said he would be prepared to approve restricted parking on North End Road at St. Mary Lake, although he would not undertake to close the lake access next to the Blue Gables Resort

The Chamber formally asked Mr. Harper to investigate the lake access near Blue Gables in terms of safety and desirability. If the investigation supports the Chamber contention that the road is unsafe, then they might look at alternative accesses.
