## BY-LAW READY AT LAST

- AFTER TWO YEARS

Salt Spring Island Subdivision By-Law is now brought up to date, with all amendments sought by the Islands Trust incorporated, says Regional Director George Heinkey.

The Salt Spring Island director told Driftwood that he hopes to have the by-law approved by the Capital Regional District either this week or in two weeks' time.

"That's the end of two year's work," he said.

## No Steel For Pool Building

Lions recreation project at Central called for a prefabricated structure for the projected skating rink.

On Monday evening Regional Director George Heinkey told the Salt Spring Island Recreation Commission that a prefabricated steel structure was not suitable for a swimming pool. An architect's plan must be drawn, he added.

The regional district is considering the sponsorship of a feasibility study of the recreation plans. The study was asked for by a public meeting called earlier by the commission to consider the project.

The director also noted that if the project goes ahead, the cost of the study will be added to the cost of the project. If it should not go ahead, then the Capital Regional District absorbs the cost involved.

## PENSIONERS GET \$1,000

Old Age Pensioners' Organization on Salt Spring Island are \$1,000 better off than they were last week.

On Monday evening the Salt Spring Island Recreation Commission voted the \$1,000 cheque to senior citizens to assist in their projects for the elderly.

## Jury Calls For Road Signs

Inquest was held last Wednesday and Thursday into the death of a Victoria youth, John Bernard Gingell, who died on Pender Island at 8:35 pm, October 11.

The youth died due to multiple injuries caused by a collision with a motor vehicle. Death was accidental and unnatural, attributed to negligence on the part of several persons but no one person was to blame, said the jury.

The inquest concluded with several recommendations, including a yellow centre line to be painted on Otter Bay Road, Pender Island; that all bicycles be sold with proper lighting equipment, and that a helmet be mandatory for cyclists.

Final recommendation urged that signs be posted at ferries and on Gulf Island ferry landings, warning the motorist and cyclist visiting the islands of road conditions on the islands, rougher and narrower.

## Pearson CARE Tree Fund Is Growing

Contributions have started to come in for the Pearson Care Tree at Pender.

The tradition of sending a donation to CARE at Christmas was established a decade ago by George Pearson of North Pender Island.

He strung lights on a large tree on his property overlooking Navy Channel. Each contribution received for CARE was acknowledged by another light on the tree.

Contributions and lights grew bigger each year.

This year he has passed over much of the work to Pender Island Lions Club. The tree has been moved to the west side of the island and the Lions Club is doing the spade work. The originator of the scheme, now well into his 80's, is still associated with his brain-child.

Record donations are unlikely to be received this year.

The absence of outside mail makes contributions difficult.

Despite the problem facing the Pender project, donations were approaching \$500 this week. Contributions may be left at the Royal Bank in Sidney and they are being taken by Driftwood in Ganges. Official receipts will be sent out as soon as the strike is over.

The lights will be glowing on Pender Island, again.

## BLOOD FLOWS ON FRIDAY AT GANGES

Blood flowed freely on Friday in the Legion Hall at Ganges, when the Canadian Red Cross set up its blood clinic and collected 140 pints from Islanders.

The clinic was staged, as usual, by the Royal Canadian Legion.

Legion set a target of 175 pints, only once exceeded, but the island didn't have that much blood.

Death of Francisco Franco takes many of us back into the pages of history. It takes me back because the Spanish dictator rose to power as I rose to manhood. He was born of a revolution in which almost every phase of European opinion was embroiled. The terms of Communist or Fascist came into rival currency with the outbreak of the civil war. Many of the hundreds or thousands of foreign troops who fought for the government in that war were politically unconcerned. Many were violently concerned. It was the time when many of us saw the translation of political concern into war and death. It was a time when we might have devoted more thought and time to the philosophies involved were they not tearing each others' throats out. The Spanish war gave way to the world war and the world war gave place to the turmoil that is nuclear dominoes. Maybe he's well out of it!

The rise of Franco was, of course, the era of the Italian attack on Abyssinia, later known as Ethiopia. We were singing gleefully, "Will you come to Abyssinia, will you come? Bring your own ammunition and a gun! Mussolini will be there, shooting bullets in the air. Will you come to Abyssinia, will you come?" We didn't go.

**STRIKE**

Had any good mail lately? Of course everyone knows that there is a mail strike!

The pensioner waiting for his cheque; the family waiting for critical news and the businessman trying to keep up his stock, all know only too well that there is a mail strike.

It is the nature of the Canadian economy that the majority of Canadians are out of sympathy with the strikers. It is the history of the Canadian economy that has led most Canadians to look askance at constant calls for more money, only too well aware that the money must come out of some sucker's pocket and very fearful that they are the suckers.

Teachers in Toronto have decided that money is the name of the game and that high-sounding principles are very fine when the pocket is jingling. Like many Canadians, they cannot afford to have principles and education be damned if they can't get as much as they would like!

The mail sorters have problems. Blackmailing the country is not the answer. The present strike may bring a bonanza to the strikers. They may end up millionaires. It is very unlikely. One result is already in the making. Postmaster General Bryce Mackasey has gained a following which could be envied by many a politician.

While the striker strikes and the victim, concerned with neither big business nor big labour, suffers the government must eventually come into the picture, before the nation crumbles.

The postal strikers have missed the boat in one respect. They are speaking of their dispute with the government and the effect of the strike and negotiations on the public. The government is the public. The only counsel for the defence of Canadians is Mr. Mackasey.

Pender Islanders have supported the extension of the projected school activity room into a building large enough to serve the community.

The idea is sound and islanders may be commended for taking advantage of the offer by the Gulf Islands School Board.

They should be watchful, nevertheless.

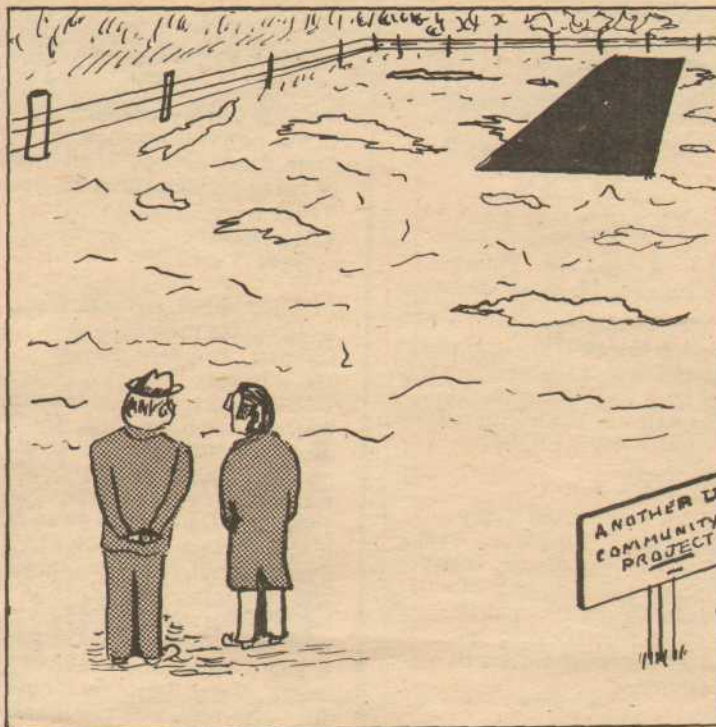
Pender must learn by others' mistakes. Take Salt Spring Island, for example.

The Gulf Islands school trustees are planning to correct many of the mistakes made in the provision of the community facility. Pender Islanders, being forewarned, may avoid all these pitfalls and end up with exactly what they are looking for.

**A MOVEMENT**

SIR:

Today I listened to Mr. A. Williams speaking on CJOR in support of the Social Credit proposal to reinstitute the transferable vote if elected to power, contending that such a vote is true democracy. I contend that such a vote would be a negation of democracy and, furthermore, that this proposal is merely an election gimmick on the part of the Socreds. The transferable vote was used once and once only by WAC Bennett, and dropped, when by use of it, W.A.C. was elected by a large majority in 1952. After the first time the people of B.C. realized how they had been duped. The only way voters can get the government they want is by working and voting for the person of their choice whose principles they approve. Suppose we had the transferable vote in this election and have four candidates running in this constituency - Conservative, Liberal, NDP and Social Credit I could not under any circumstances put even my fourth choice in the space for the Social Credit candidate after twenty years of Socred government. The horror of the proposal is that it sounds so truly democratic. The politically conscious voter wants his vote to belong solely to the candidate of his choice and marks no other choice, in which case he is faced with the possibility that the empty spaces on his ballot could be filled in for him, particularly in the

large centres where he has not the time nor the opportunity to watch what is being done with his ballot and where the scrutineers cannot all be watched at the time of the count. **CYCLING SAFETY**

Sir,

Recently a young cyclist was killed in collision with a motor vehicle.

It seems a pity that people who are using this form of transportation are not getting some recognition from the rest of us.

By coming to the islands cycling, they are helping to relieve the traffic congestion which occurs at the ferry terminals all the time and more and more frequently these days.

The roads could be made safer for cyclists by not doing any more than widening the shoulders of the road so that cyclists or pedestrians when in danger from vehicles can leave the travelled portion of the road without falling in the ditch.

This would help save their lives. It would allow cyclists to move over and let cars go by if travelling in the same direction.

Quite often this situation dev elops on a stretch of road, a group of cyclists on a stretch of road holding up a string of cars cause it isn't safe to pass.

On the credit side a greater use of cycles would ease traffic on the highways, be a cheap alternative for hitch-hiking, help the fuel crisis and the high cost of gas and give people a healthy way of travel. Some time in future there will be a jam up of ferry traffic like none of us have ever seen, where it will take a whole day waiting at the ferry terminal and people sleeping in their cars to be first in line. Already there are up to seven hour waits at Swartz Bay, where one busy weekend this year the traffic for the ferries got so heavy that the police were called in to divert traffic away from the terminals.

As the populations of the cities to which we are so near increases, and with the publicity that the islands have already received, more and more people will be coming here every year. Even if there are larger and more ferries put

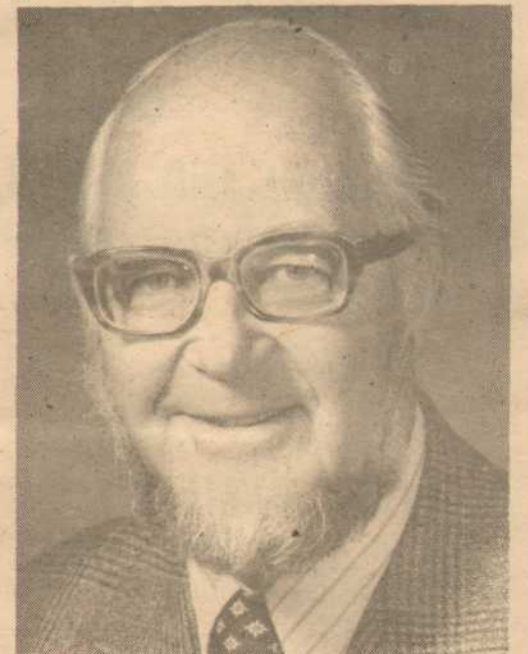

# Irene Block Replies

I very much welcome the issues you raised in your November 12th editorial. I will try to give my own and my Party's point of view in the following part of my letter, but I am sure you appreciate that I must be brief so that I can elaborate on my answers on a face-to-face basis.

With respect to the Land Commission Act: I believe that its basic precepts are correct. If one is to preserve the environment for our own benefit as well as the benefit of future generations, curbs must be placed on building development. However, for those people who own good farm land on which they have worked for many years in the hope of a retirement nest egg, there is a very simple way of reimbursing those people at a fair, independently estimated market price - the Land Bank concept. Through this means, the Land Bank could buy the land and the farmer would be able to retire with his nest egg while at the same time ensuring the preservation of its use in perpetuity. It could be rented out on a lease rental or rental purchase basis to young farmers who would thereby not find the price beyond their reach.

So far as the Islands Trust is concerned: if it does indeed duplicate the function of the regional districts and serves no valuable function, let it go; but if it does not, then it must be retained. Let me say at the outset that I am dedicated to the protection and conservation of our environment, as is my Party, and I could not sanction any proj-

ect that trespassed on that point of view.

Your following point is the local concern when MacMillan Bloedel announced plans for a major development project on former certified tree farm licensed land. My first question would have to be: is that what the people want? I suspect that they do not. I do not believe that the majority of Islanders live there because they desire a commercialized housing development. I think they live on the islands because they value their independence and their freedom from the tensions of the concrete jungle. They value their sea-girt retreats and want them to remain unspoiled. I, personally would be dead against any further development that is not in the interests of the island communities, or that is not in the interest of the preservation of that environment.

As you stated in your editorial, there is no doubt, since Mr. Bennett has already so stated, that if he should form the next government the powers of the Land Commission will be eliminated. I ask all of you to think very carefully before you vote on December 11th, and ask yourselves whether that is really what you want. As it stands now, there are two free enterprise parties in this Riding, so you have a choice. We can again elect a free enterprise candidate who will have the welfare and wellbeing of her Riding at heart and who will make regular visits there to get direct input of your concerns, or you could choose the big business dominated

candidate. The choice is yours.

My final point is that under no circumstances will the Progressive Conservative Party sanction perpetual tree farm licenses. We would convert these to 21-year renewable licenses with full compensation for proven capitalized investment in timber renewal.

The above has been a very brief reply to the points raised in your editorial. It is somewhat frustrating for me to have

# They Keep Their Customers Well

Gulf Island Trading Company has held the doors open since 1912. A group of local islanders began the business at that time, serving the pioneers of Salt Spring Island with grocery, meat and livestock feed.

The persons involved with the formation of the Trading Company include T. F. Speed, J. C. Scovel, H. W. Bullock, Col. B. V. Layard, F. L. Scott, G. Scott, J. C. Lang, A. G. Smith, E. Walters and V. Case-Morris.

Ten years after the store's opening, on a June day of 1922, Stan Wagg appeared on the island, leisurely taking a holiday. The Trading Company needed a truck driver and Stan was recruited, regardless of the fact he couldn't drive a truck.

Practising on the school grounds using the Trading truck, Stan caught on quickly and since that day until his retirement in the late '60's Stan Wagg remained with the company, later becoming manager.

Grant and Binda Carignan own and operate the Gulf Island Trading Company, having bought the store in May of 1972. The Carignans came from

Duncan, where Binda had worked at a Safeway Store for 11 years, and Grant had been employed in a similar position at a Duncan grocery. Life on Salt Spring has proven to be less demanding and hectic as that of the bigger island.

Grant originally comes from the prairies. His family moved west when Grant was eight years old. They lived in Prince Rupert for four years and went south to Victoria where Grant finished his schooling and was an apprentice meat cutter.

Binda was born in New Westminster. The family moved to Duncan when she was three months old, so her recollections of the Vancouver suburb are few. She left Canadian soil for a brief stint in San Francisco. There she worked as a hostess in a nightclub restaurant.

Son Robert William was born in August and was exactly 14 weeks old, November 22, and smiling.

Along with Grant, Binda and Robbie at the Trading Company a staff of seven seem to keep the shelves stocked and make sure the chair is out the door at nine each morning.

Women at the till include Winnie Edwards, Heather Foran and Chris Parker. Winnie is from Victoria where she worked for the R. C. M. P.; she's well up on the law. Winnie enjoys handcrafts such as wood working oil painting, sewing, crocheting

and a number of other handy hobbies.

Heather is from Nanaimo, and before Nanaimo she came from Victoria. Her hobbies involve the outdoors where cycling, gardening and taking walks take up much of her leisure time.

Doreen Penston came to Salt Spring Island in September. Coming from Victoria, Doreen finds Salt Spring a familiar place to live, having known the island for 13 years. She may become a sharp shooter like sister, Sharon Reynolds.

Doreen works alongside Doug Wiedman at the meat counter. Doug comes from Victoria and took his apprenticeship with meat appraising there. He began working with wholesale and retail butchers eight years ago. He commutes daily leaving his wife and twin girls in Sidney. The Weidmans hope to live on Salt Spring soon.

John Denison stocks the shelves and aids the girls at the till in wrapping groceries. With wife and nine-month-old son Jeffrey, John intends returning to his home town of Niagara Falls for Christmas after having been away for a year.

Chris Parker came from White Rock in July and began working at the Trading Co. in August. She is a prairie girl



and has seen every province but the Maritimes. Her husband was a bush pilot, which made Canadian voyaging a full-time expedition. Her green thumb is with her plants. Recently starting golfing, Chris has become quite interested in the game.

Dennis Scott came from Victoria last April with wife and two children. They have

recently moved into their new home on Mobrae Heights.

Trading Company has long served Salt Spring Island and the staff are eager to make the service as good as the staff made it in 1912.

John Hazenboom is a Salt Spring Islander from way back having attended both elementary school and high school on

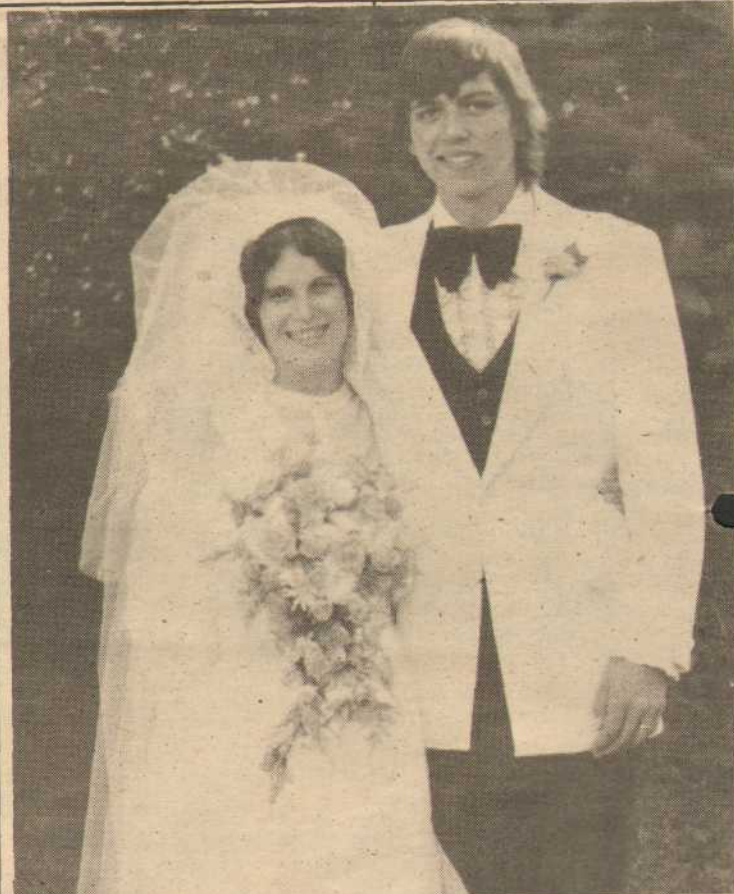

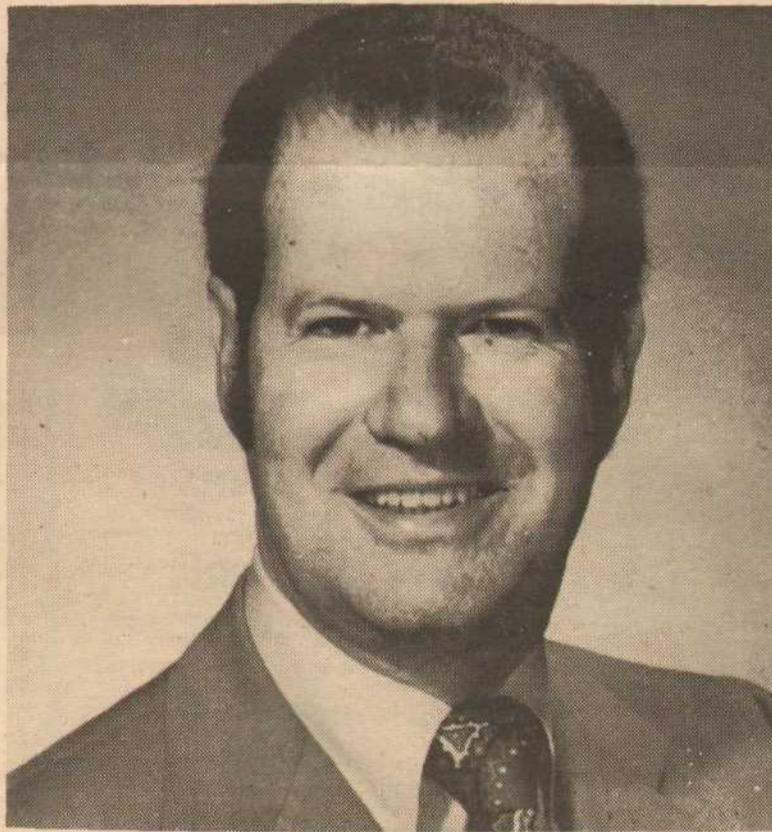

## L.I.P. Contract Undertaken

ed Philip King's See How They Run most evenings last week. Islanders who went to the Mahon Hall theatre Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday or Saturday were glad they did. Islanders who did not go missed a brilliantly funny farce presented in a professional style with not a hitch or a delay in the fast moving pace. When it was all over it was difficult to sit back and find any player who dragged the play down. It was equally difficult to find any one player who towered above the rest of the company.

From first to last, the play maintained a fast, unrelenting pace and every player lived up to it. The play is far from new. It has made records in London and it has tickled ribs in every land where it is not frowned on to laugh uproariously.

The play is a confusion of clergymen. It is set in the vicarage and as fast as one clergyman moves out of orbit another comes in. Some are authentic, dyed-in-the-wool ministers and others are wolves and worse in black sheep's clothing.

Where do you start? Pat Desbottes was the maid, Ida. As ever, she was a pert Cockney maid down to the corns.

Marilyn Taylor proved herself able to hold a comedy role without strain. She appeared as Miss Skillon, the old maid who took a nip for the first time and set the stage for running, although she did little running herself.

Nigel Desbottes was the unfortunate Rev. Lionel Toop. The vicar and mild-mannered head of the house was the string tying the play together. Whether he was remonstrating with his wife for showing too

much leg or with Miss Skillon for her concern over decorating the pulpit, he was still gentle and slightly submissive. He was only strong and firm when he appeared in his short pants.

Jennifer Wiebe, vicar's wife retired American actress and the author of a mild intrigue was convincing and, in common with the rest of the cast, unrelenting.

Peter McCalman, appearing with the island group for the first time, was an American army corporal.

It was fitting he should disguise himself as a clergyman in order to enter an establishment otherwise off-limits to a United States serviceman. Only problem was that he was obviously irked by the unfamiliar collar. He was a valuable addition to the island company.

Terry Hockley was in trouble. He was trouble. An escaping Russian spy, he also adopted the disguise of a minister of the cloth and joined the chase. It was a brief, hurried role with a broken English. Most of his appearances were in a run and he literally kept up the pace.

Bryan Smith, already familiar to island audiences, was the Bishop of Lax, warm, bewildered and finally indignant.

Less well-known, John Lomas took the part of the visiting clergyman, Rev. Arthur Humphrey. He dithered and appeared to be a simple soul completely out of his depth. He was.

Reg. Taylor was Sgt. Towers, the arresting soldier who finally sorted out the men of the cloth. He, also, is a familiar face on island stages.

The play was an excellent choice. A good comedy farce, well presented and carefully directed, is my meat for any amateur company. See How They Run excelled. It is riotously funny, it was exceptionally well directed. Responsible for that aspect of the presentation was Ken Gaylor who has been through the mill at Ganges with the Players and with school presentations.

It would be a sad commentary that did not pay tribute to the direction. The play ran like clockwork. When a player was expected to come a-running, a-running he came. There was never a sad, awkward pause while the cast waited

for someone to happen. The direction was exceptionally good.

The support from backstage was less obvious, but the effect was apparent. The simple stage setting was pleasing and effective and the burst of light outside the french door could almost lead the audience to wonder whose garden was hidden.

The staff behind the play outnumbered the players, which is not an unusual proportion. There were Producer David Fitchew and Gerry Facca; Stage Manager Don Cunningham and Dorothy Roberts; wardrobe Lilliane Johnson and Peggy Farina; scenery and sets, Keith Evans, Phil Dews and Charlotte Keeping; lighting Reg Taylor; make-up Annette Keeping; hair styles, Deborah Gist; publicity, Owen Hind-Smith; properties, Marion Rush; House Manager Norman Hind-Smith and programmes, Phil Dews, Roma Sturdy and Norman Hind-Smith.

The Mahon Hall setting, with its impression of intimate theatre, was emphasized by the use of a discarded back drop from Harvey as a temporary partition in the rear of the hall.

A further innovation for the week was the provision of a refreshment counter serving wine as well as coffee. The European style of theatre bar was well-patronized.

It is unfortunate that this play is not eligible for a competitive presentation. It had everything and the glass of wine to boot! - FGR.

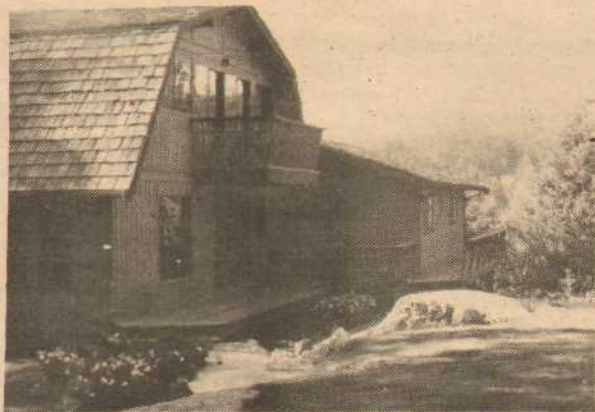

# SHE LIVED OUT HER LIFE ON GALIANO

Ellen Georgeson Sallybrass died in Lady Minto Hospital on November 17.

Ellen Georgeson was born in a little cabin at Georgeson Bay, on Galiano Island, at the southern entrance to Active Pass.

She was the fifth child of John Georgeson, native of Nanaimo, and the granddaughter of Scotty Georgeson, who came to the islands from the Shetland Isles in the 19th century.

Scotty was a colourful figure. He jumped ship when a sailing schooner came into the early settlements of the province at the time of a gold rush.

The Shetland islander found no gold, but came to Mayne Island to be the first lighthouse keeper on the island. He preferred the coast to the interior.

He also acquired a great deal of land, at Georgeson Bay on Galiano, as well as a little further up the Island.

On the land, up the Island went John and his wife, in due course, to wrest a living out of their farm, and to live there for some years.

Ellen recalls walking many miles to school, over a large mountain overlooking Montague Harbour, and having to wear heavy boy's boots "because they were more practical."

Even though the pioneer island children had to walk all of this way, at least four miles, they received honour rolls for regularity and punctuality, and they were given books, suitably inscribed with their names, for other accomplishments. These are treasured possessions of the family.

Upon the death of her father, in 1909, Ellen moved over to Mayne Island, to live with her

grandparents.

She did not have too much time for frivolity, as there were many visitors at the lighthouse, and many rooms to help keep clean and tidy. An excellent cook, she worked hard to care for the large family and friends who always seemed to gather there.

Her marriage to Albert Hawthorne, in 1923, was a gala occasion.

He was a butcher, who came from Sedgley, Wolverhampton, England, in 1910, and travelled around buying sheep and lambs in all of the Gulf Islands.

Just exactly how he got to know Ellen at the lighthouse is hard to tell, but they were very happy.

Her middle child, Mary Ellen was born on their boat, on the way to the Lady Minto Hospital at Ganges Hill.

The only son, John Henry, was safely born in hospital, after special precautions were taken to ensure his mother got there on time.

The first daughter had been born on Mayne Island, at home.

The first daughter married Tom Head, and they resided on Galiano, to present Ellen with five grandchildren, one girl and four boys. They, in their turn, have had two Centennial babies, to delight grandma, along with eight others, all of whom now reside on Galiano.

When Ellen's husband died very suddenly in 1929, she was left with not only two small children to bring up and feed, but her ageing grandfather, "Scotty", and an uncle who was not too well either. They all lived in "the big house" in Georgeson Bay, which had two

storeys with a total of nine rooms.

Adding to her problems was the great depression of the "dirty thirties."

There were no jobs for women those days, so Ellen did the only thing she knew well.

She took in washing: miles and miles of washing, it seemed every day, and for very little recompense. She could not charge too much for all of this hard work, just a few cents for the white shirts, and four pennies for dozens of men's handkerchiefs.

The hard cake soap had to be carefully shaved and used sparingly. Bleaching was done on the green grass and pretty successfully too.

There was some kind of government agency those days which gave a little money. With it came a woman, remembered only as "horrible", who invariably brought Ellen to tears at her harshness.

Garden produce, supplemented with fish, which were plentiful, and deer and grouse in season, somehow or other kept the family fed.

The children grew up, and when it came time for Mary Ellen to go to school, the distance was too far, she was a small child, so Ellen taught her at home by correspondence for the first three years, until John got old enough to go to school.

These were happy years, even though they were hard for the widowed mother. She had a way of making a game of the work. The children had little buckets to carry water from the creek, and soon Mary Ellen was helping her with the ironing, and really liking it, too.

There were many parties, especially when the brothers came home for a visit. Five of the brothers played violins, and all loved music.

Ellen could always find time from her busy days to welcome everyone who came to visit, and it seems it was a popular homey atmosphere with the spacious rooms and big cosy kitchen.

She loved to give, always giving little gifts to all of her family and friends. Nothing pleased her more than to give someone something.

In 1954 she married Bernard Sallybrass, and they moved to a little house not far up the hill from her original home.

Each problem as it occurred. The patient did not respond to treatment, but he did not get any worse. Eventually the treatment took effect, and he began to rally. Two days later he was alert and gave little indication that he had even been ill.

Two useful lives were saved by skilled, dedicated men who refused to give up while a glimmer of life remained.

Dr. Bob Young

I would like to share two recent experiences which I found both stimulating and gratifying. They illustrate, I think, the dedication and skill of our surgical and medical specialists, and also the fact that, no matter how hopeless a case may appear, perseverance sometimes pays dividends. The first patient had severe bleeding from the stomach. He was middle-aged, previously healthy, and an active man. The initial operation, a simple one, would normally have solved the problem, but the patient continued to bleed. A further operation was done, this time to remove the stomach. Due to a blood-clotting defect, bleeding continued, and in spite of many transfusions the patient continued going downhill.

My only contact with the patient was late one night when the surgeon felt he had to re-operate or lose the patient. I happened to be in the hospital and he asked me to assist him.

We worked for over four hours, repairing the rent in the stomach, where the pressure of blood had ruptured the previous line of stitches.

A further operation was necessary a few days later. The patient asked the surgeon to "let him go," save the blood for someone more likely to survive. The surgeon persisted, and the last operation was successful. The patient, of course, was extremely grateful, and the surgeon must have had a glow of satisfaction in having saved the patient against almost over-

whelming odds.

The second patient, also a man, collapsed at home and stopped breathing. His wife gave him mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and the ambulance attendant provided oxygen on the way to the hospital, but in spite of this he was near death on arrival.

Resuscitation measures were undertaken, with no appreciable effect. The interns, emergency room physician, and the attending doctor all gave the patient virtually no chance to survive. The consultant internist also felt the same way.

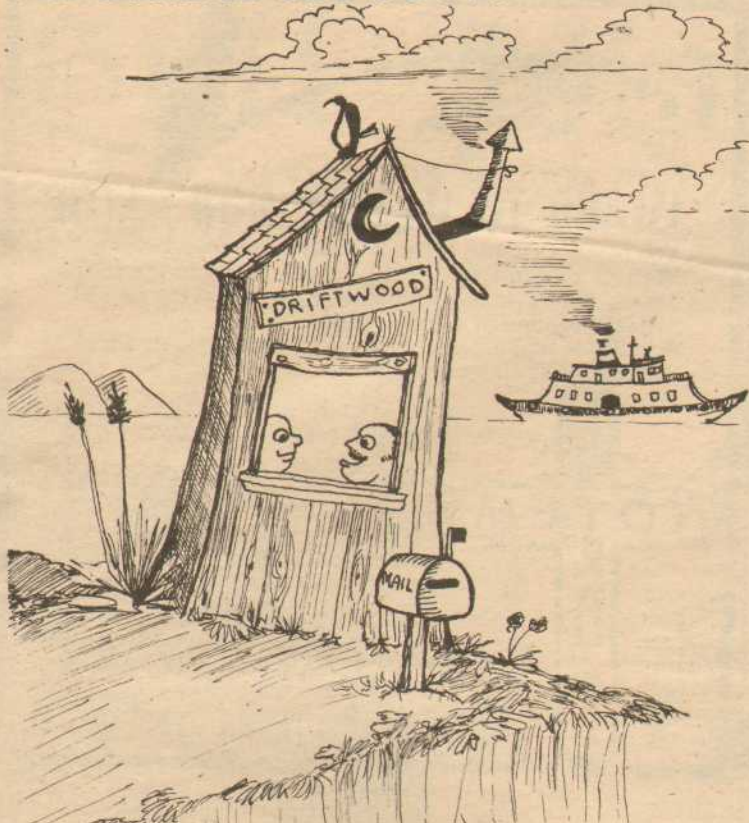

do an issue of the Driftwood some day. They are a pretty canny bunch of smart kids from the age of five to 12.

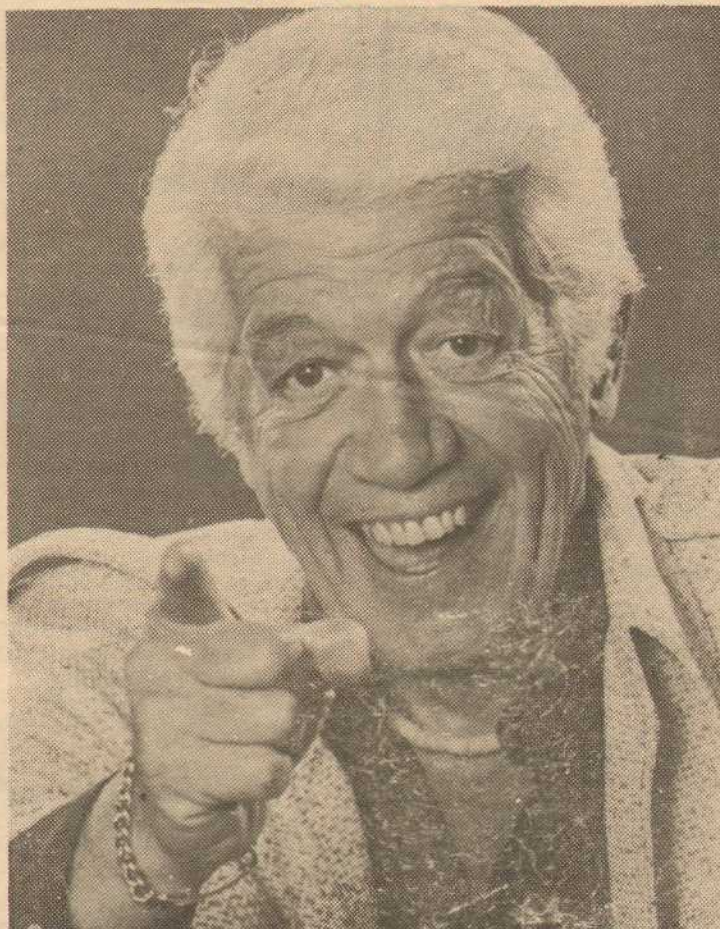

Semi-finals must be held before next May 3rd and the finals before May 10.

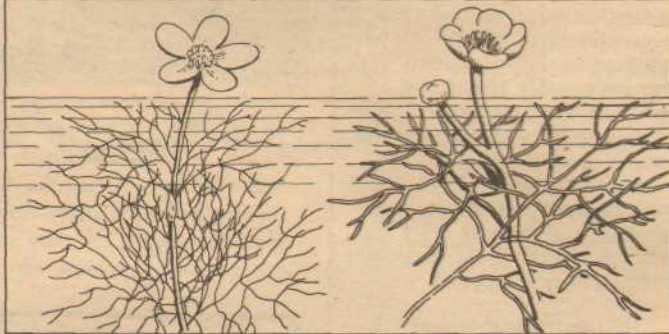
Hopefully, this year a team from Salt Spring Island will get into the winner's circle and thus be winning a free trip to Reno.
