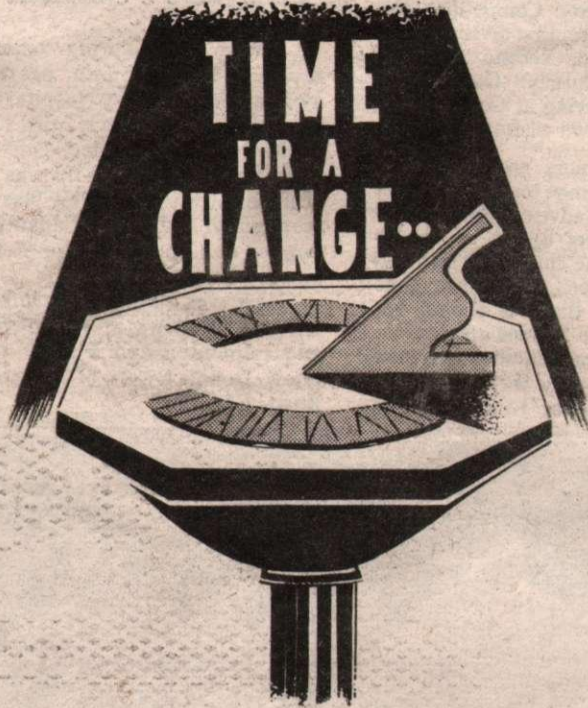

## Two speak against changes in zoning Mouat's land

—By-law contravened she says

When a public hearing considered six zoning applications in Ganges on Monday the six all came from the same owner, Mouat's Trading Co. Ltd. and referred to adjacent properties.

Two voices were raised in opposition to the applications and a letter from Michael Larmour, of SPEC, expressed opposition to any change in zoning until a sanitary sewer has been installed.

Former lumber yard in Ganges, opposite the Ganges Crest was industrial and Mouat's asked for a change to commercial.

Yvette Valcourt expressed opposition to the change sought in zoning of the Miller and Toynbee Realty Office from industrial to commercial. He had no idea why it had been industrial, commented Tom Toynbee speaking for his company.

Mrs. Valcourt explained that it had been used for the manufacture of candles when the zoning by-law was introduced. The property has been used in violation of the by-law, protested Mrs. Valcourt.

**SHOULD AWAIT SEWERS**  
Second opponent was Deborah Gisi, who felt that no change in zoning should be made until the sewage problem in Ganges was settled.

Third application was for the rezoning of a property on the east side of Lower Ganges Road and opposite the Ship's Anchor

Inn. It is zoned Water "C" because it is land filled property.

Is the property government-owned, enquired Miss Gisi. It is not, replied Tom Toynbee.

The landfill had already been created when the zoning was brought in, explained Toynbee, and an error was made in calling it water.

Toynbee, as spokesman for the company owning the land, explained that an application was made about seven years ago to the provincial government for a permit to fill the area, in the vicinity of the site of the K & R Food Store. It was provincial, he noted because the province controls the land underneath the federal water.

Prior to gaining authority to fill, the company had to prove ownership of the upland property: in this case the Ship's Anchor Inn.

### COULDN'T APPLY BEFORE

When the fill was completed, they made application to purchase it. The application could not legally be made until the fill was completed, he explained in reply to a challenge.

The negotiations for its purchase were delayed by an oversight, he noted. Despite the lateness of the application, it was promptly approved by the federal government.

Advance poll will be held on June 8 at the Regional District offices, and polls will be open on Galiano on June 11. Voting will take place at Galiano School.

# Trustee reviews career of retiring superintendent

## Peter Cartwright looks back on 26 years' service

Peter Cartwright was the water district in the eyes of many consumers.

For years he was the only man they knew in the department. When they had troubles, he came to sort it out and when it was time to pay the bill, there was Peter Cartwright to read the meter.

Last week the trustees and consumers of the water district heard a warm commendation of

the man who devoted a quarter-century to the district.

In February Cartwright left the water district to enjoy a more leisurely life.

On Thursday evening Trustee Norman Mouat expressed the appreciation of the district for the record accomplished by the retiring superintendent.

He started with the district in April, 1951, recalled Mouat and there were many in the hall who

did not live on the island in that year. There were many, he suggested, who had never heard of Salt Spring Island in 1951.

Peter Cartwright was raised on the island and attended school here. He left the island in the 1930's and went to various logging camps. He also served with the B.C. Police before enlisting in the RCAF to serve as pilot and to become a flying instructor.

### SAFER ON THE GROUND

With the end of hostilities, recalled Norman Mouat, Peter Cartwright decided it was safer on the ground and went to the pulp mill at Ocean Falls.

In 1949 Peter and his wife, Freddie returned to Salt Spring Island.

He already had a family connection with the North Salt Spring Waterworks District. His Grandfather Lang was the insti-

gator of the original Ganges Water and Power Company, in 1914.

That company installed the original three-inch wood stave pipe to bring water from Mount Maxwell to Ganges. It brought water here for many years, recalled Mouat.

The company successfully pumped water and Salt Spring (Turn to Page Ten)

# TO BE FRANK . . .

And when we went home we decided that one of the most enjoyable aspects of island living is buying garden machinery.

Complaints department: Man has a flag-pole and a collection of flags. So he dips his flag to salute a ship steaming by. No reply comes from Her Majesty's Royal Canadian Navy....or whatever its official name is now. Why not? Is flag-dipping one of the things that went out with the united forces?

Thinking of flags, I had a call a few days ago. Where could the caller buy a Canadian flag? She had a pole and lanyards and all the trimmings. All she needed was a fair-sized flag. But the only flags she could find were intended for little ships and would look odd flying from the top of a man-sized mast. Or a person-sized mast, if you like. Who sells flags?

Give me the fine old British system. Years ago I had two letters from the British Air Ministry. One referred to my rank of corporal and came addressed to "Mr." Richards. He knew where the house was and he knew where that room-sized part-stump had fallen. Next thing he knew there was a gasping, shouting woman running across the field towards him. She was near-hysterical and shouting as she ran. He couldn't make out a word she said, but he got more worried every time she said it. So he took the hint and trotted back towards the house with her. As they rounded the barn, he was almost breathless, waiting to view the damage but the offending stump lay in a batch of barnyard manure, less offensive than the bed it lay in. Still they went panting towards the house. Inside she pointed to the cellar door and the hysterical woman in the cellar. The weeping occupant of the cellar was making like an air-raid shelter. A war-bride, she had been badly shocked in an air raid and for several years had made a good recovery. There is something very illogical in the lack of adequate marina facilities on an island the size of Salt Spring Island.

This month saw the familiar Scott Point Marina taken over as the reserved mooring area for the Royal Vancouver Yacht Club. And more power to the Royal members! They found the facilities they needed and they are now the proud owners of the Long Harbour cruising centre.

But what of the rest of the water-borne fraternity? Where do we go from here? If we have boats we have no vast choice.

During the summer months there are facilities in Ganges Harbour and to a more limited extent in Fulford Harbour.

Not all the private facilities; not all the public facilities can meet the demand.

There is more space needed for local vessels, let alone visiting craft.

The pressure for new and additional facilities is building up.

Where do we look now?

The sheep dog can be the worst menace amongst sheep, as he is born with the knowledge of controlling sheep, a factor of which we make use, but, also, he can be controlled and trained.

Most other dogs, if reasonably controlled, would hardly bother sheep, but, when allowed to range, and form packs with other dogs, they become nothing but a menace, both to sheep and the deer population.

However, today, so many people seem to have so little regard for their neighbours that they make no effort either to control their dogs, or learn to do so, a not very difficult task.

It would seem that the Gulf Islands are not the only place facing the problem. This cutting, taken from a recent edition of "The Irish News", shows that they have the same problem,

actually accentuated by the fact that flocks are largely maintained on the hills, where they range with little supervision.

### Killer dogs cost farmers £1m. a year

Marauding packs of sheep killing dogs are costing Northern Ireland farmers here up to £250,000 a year and driving some of them out of business.

Now they are looking for a "marksman" who will be paid £5 for every dog he kills.

The police say it is not illegal for farmers to kill dogs which are worrying their sheep as long as the animal is on their land and is caught in the act of doing just completed it.

Perhaps many dog owners would take the trouble to read a few lines written by Robert Burns about 200 years ago, "that we could see ourselves as others see us."

#### TEN YEARS AGO

Gulf Islands School District mill rate has taken a drop.

Mill rate this year has been set at 25.82. Last year's rate was 25.92.

This figure compares with the provincial average of 30.02.

Gross budget this year amounts to \$474,441, of which the district finds \$423,798 and the provincial government, \$44,885.

Three candidates are announced for the May Queen contest at Fulford. They are Sherrin Stevens, Grade 10; Laura Rozzano, Grade 11; and Betty Riddell, Grade 12.

New entry into the hardware trade on Salt Spring Island is Valcourt Building Supplies Ltd. The lumber yard, located opposite the government building on Lower Ganges Road, will extend its operation into the hardware field at the beginning of June.

The building supply company was established three years ago when Phil Valcourt came to Salt Spring Island from Langford.

# Report of water trustees reveals new license

North Salt Spring Waterworks District expanded its services by some 9% in 1976, according to the report of trustees last week. Draw from St. Mary Lake was boosted to half a million gallons.

Report covered the activities of the District during the year, the noteworthy events that took place and on the condition of the water system at year's end, explained Chairman Ken Patrick.

As one measure of the growth of the system, the number of water connections went from 837 to 912 during the year, an increase of almost 9%.

This includes 13 in the new Southey Point area and 18 in the recently completed Cottonwood section. The addition of these areas has expanded the total area of the water system that must be patrolled and maintained. Preventative maintenance has been carried out conscientiously, but age does take its toll. Leaks were located and repaired, and from time to time, repairs were required to the pumping plants and other facilities.

The Mobrae water storage tank will need to be replaced in the near future, probably in a larger size to meet the growing demand on it.

### TWO STATIONS

Readings of the two weather stations installed in 1975 were taken regularly, the one at St. Mary Lake on a twice-daily basis, and the information for-

warded to the Federal Atmospheric Environment Service in both Victoria and Vancouver.

When a sufficient period of record has been collected, the rainfall record particularly will be of inestimable value in determining parameters essential to future water system designs.

In addition to the weather stations, your District is installing a Parshall flume in the stream leading from Maxwell Lake and will soon be obtaining a continuous record of stream flow from it.

In time, these data will give us a sure knowledge of the amount of water that may be taken, safely, from this Lake.

This flume is now in operation, he noted, stressing that the report covered last year only.

The Southey Point project was substantially completed and put into service in 1975 and so reported at the last general meeting. However, full use was not made of it until early 1976. The final net cost of this job was \$135,356.36, some 9% below estimate.

### IN SERVICE NOW

The Cottonwood system was constructed during the year and is now in service, complete except for a small amount of additional work required by the Department of Highways.

The ever-increasing use of the water system and the low pressures that have been experienced during the summer, high-demand periods, plus the reluctance of the Water Comptroller to approve proposed improvements until an overall study and general design of the future system had been made, led your Trustees to retain John Motherwell, professional engineer, to make such a study and report.

After an extensive investigation of the system both on paper and on the ground, many discussions with the Superintendent and a number of sessions with your trustees, Mr. Motherwell prepared his report and submitted it to the District in December.

It was accepted by the trustees on your behalf and forwarded to the Provincial Comptroller of Water Rights for his approval.

As this approval has not yet been received, it can only be said that the report is a general study of the whole system, complete with future water demand forecasts.

When approval is received, members of the District will be welcome to peruse it at the District office at their convenience.

### TO DEFRAY COST

To help defray the future cost of capital expansion, By Laws 84 and 93 were passed during the year increasing the capital expenditure levy on each lot created within the District and for each lot of all areas that petition to come into the District and are accepted.

These charges are now \$500

per lot and the monies received therefrom are placed into a special account to be used only to augment the works of the District.

# REQUIEM MASS FOR KITTY HUNT-SOWREY AT GANGES

The funeral of Kitty Hunt-Sowrey was held on Wednesday 13 April from Our Lady of Grace Church at Ganges, Requiem Mass being celebrated by the Rev. Fr. P.A. Bergin, followed by interment in the Calvary section of the Ganges cemetery.

She had died suddenly on Easter morning, following a massive stroke.

There was a large attendance of old-time residents of Mayne Island, which had been her home for rather more than 30 years, and many beautiful floral tributes.

Pallbearers, both active and honorary, were furnished by the Royal Canadian Legion, Branches 84, Gulf Islands and 92, Ganges. She would appreciate being carried to her last resting place by veterans, as much of her training as a nurse was done in the military wing of the hospital in which she trained during the First War.

### LEFT TO MOURN

She leaves to mourn her passing her husband, Walter, on Mayne Island, and relatives in Ireland, England and the U.S.A.

Of your charity pray for her soul, that she may be granted eternal rest.

Kitty Hunt-Sowrey (nee McCann) was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., in January, 1894. Her father died shortly after she was born, and her mother returned to Ireland, where she spent her younger life.

She went to school in Glenariffe and Ballymena, finishing her education at Ballymena Academy.

During the First War, she decided to take up nursing as a profession, and trained at Nottingham General Hospital in England. As was the case with so many hospitals in England during the war years, part of the institution became a Military

Hospital, and much of her training was with troops. The war ended just before she finished training, and thus she was not able to do the thing she wanted, join Q.A.I.M.N.S. and go overseas in the service.

### TO CANADA

After nursing for a few years in England she married and came to Canada at the end of the twenties, to nurse, as a Field Matron, with the Department of Indian Affairs at several points on the B.C. coast. She ran the family farm while her husband was overseas with the Canadian Army in the second war.

She and her husband came to Mayne after his demobilization, and she lived on the island until her death.

She identified herself with the Ladies' Auxiliary to the Royal Canadian Legion during its full period of operation and with the Mayne Island Agricultural Society and Fall Fair. She never held office in this organization, but her husband could never have carried on as secretary for the number of years that he did without her great help, both doing farm chores at home, and being unofficial everything at the fair itself, in addition to contributing up to forty entries in every Fair.

She was a direct descendant of John Mhor MacDonnell, the first of his clan who returned to Ireland from Scotland in the 1400's and thus of Somerled, the progenitor of the MacDonnells and MacDonalds.

Kitty was a gentle soul, deeply religious, and always willing to help whenever she could. Her last four years were spent as an invalid, following a number of strokes, the last of which caused her death.

She will be greatly missed by her husband, her many friends up and down this coast, and her few remaining relatives in Ireland, England and the U.S.A.

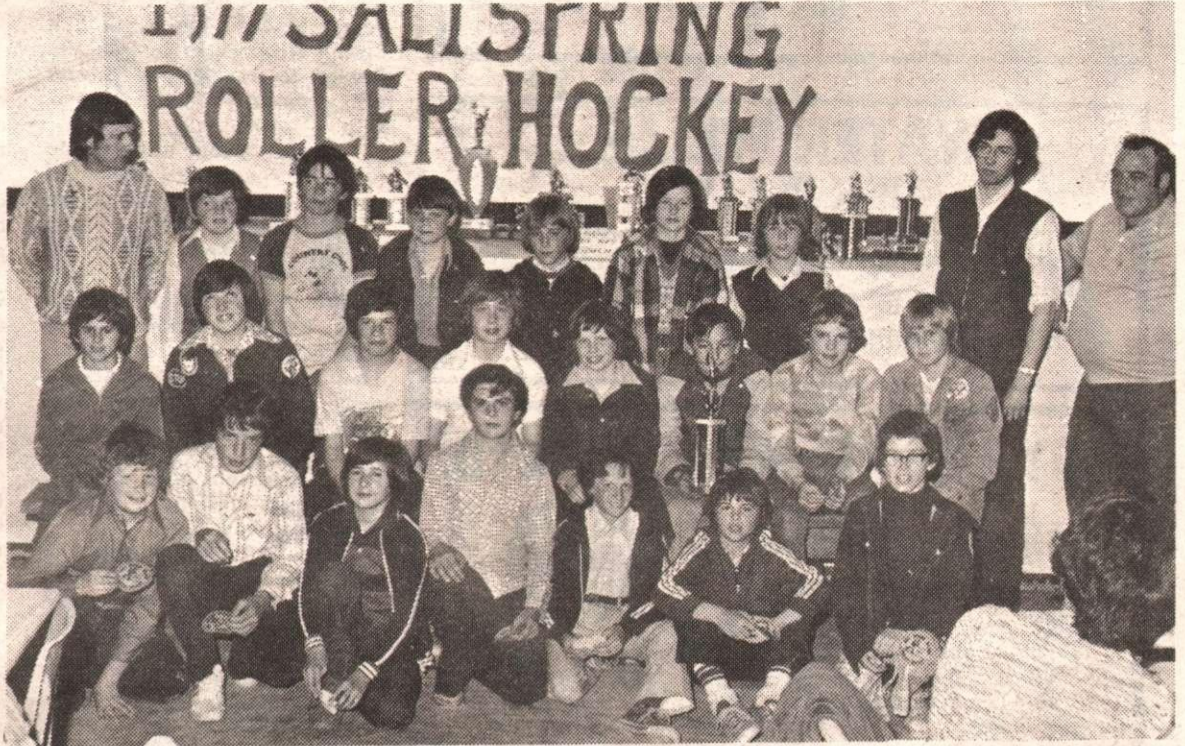

#### UNDERSTUDY

Mike Larmour, Mr. Cartwright's assistant for several years, was asked if he would consider understudying for the Superintendent's position during the year before Mr. Cartwright was to leave. This he consented to do.

Apart from the general aging of parts of the system and the growing inadequacies in carrying capacity of certain portions, both of which will be corrected in due course, the water system is performing satisfactorily. That this is so is to a great measure due to the devotion and plain hard work of all members of the staff.

Island consumers successfully took the water for better than 30 years. In 1948 the North Salt Spring Waterworks District was formed to transfer the private utility company to public ownership.

The new public utility made two initial purchases. It bought out the power and water company and it took over the Vesuvius Bay water system.

**HEATED PLANS**

From the outset the meetings were heated as methods of raising money were discussed. The first and most significant move was to put in a new line from Maxwell Lake to Ganges.

It was to this project that Peter Cartwright came in 1951. The project was, by this time, well under way.

Peter Cartwright's uncle, the late Vernon Case-Morris had been associated with the private utility company and he was still looking after the accounts of the public utility. While he watched the accounts, his nephew watched the water.

By 1952 the pipe was clear through to Vesuvius Bay.

They had no back hoes, recalled Mouat.

"In those days they used a Fox No. 2," he told the meeting, "a shovel."

Peter dug many a ditch to put in many a line, he recalled, and they are mostly still running.

In the early days there were not as many customers and the work was less demanding that it is today. In order to fill in, Peter Cartwright worked a full summer on the system and then in winter he would work on Gavin Mouat's farm. Gavin was Norman Mouat's father.

**NO ONE WILL EVER KNOW**

"No one will ever know the hours and hours Peter Cartwright has devoted to this water district," said Mouat, "And Peter won't say!"

The retired superintendent is putting together a history of the waterworks going back to 1914. He has kept a daily diary since the day he went to work for the district, explained the trustee.

In that time he has served under eight different chairmen.

"He has served you people well and I am just lost for words. Past water users; present users and future customers owe a debt of gratitude to Peter for his extreme loyalty during 26 years," concluded Mouat.

His summary of a career in water distribution was received with loud applause.

The year was 1941; war was raging in Europe. Ora Currie had come from Vancouver to help her parents look after an Island Dairy Farm.

After years of ranching in the Kamloops district, the Currie family moved to Salt Spring because of Mr. Currie's health.

When Gavin Mouat heard that Ora was a hairdresser, he suggested a Beauty Parlor shop was exactly what Salt Spring was in need of at that time.

Does anyone remember Ora's first shop and Salt Spring's first Beauty Parlor?

It was the back curtained-off half of Mr. Walkdon's Barber Shop and was immediately popular.

At that time there were a number of ladies with their children living on Salt Spring

from the Far East.

If one thinks back to events of that day in Asia, the Japanese had been in China and had conquered most of it and many of the "Westerners" menfolk were interned by the Japanese, but the women and children often had left the country earlier, some to live on Salt Spring Island.

Ora's shop was a great "boon" to these ladies, who had been accustomed to servants to do everything for them and had never even washed their own children's hair. How the prices have changed since those far-off days! It was 50c for a haircut; 75c for a finger wave and heat "perms" were \$5 to \$7.50.

# St. Mary Magdalene church marks birthday

On Sunday, May 8, following the morning service conducted by the Rector, Rev. James P. Daniels, parishioners and friends will gather in the Rectory to celebrate the 80th anniversary of the founding of St. Mary Magdalene Church at Mayne Island.

Refreshments will be served and there will be the cutting of the anniversary cake. Parishioners are extending a warm invitation to all those, who in the past years, have worshipped in St.

Mary Magdalene Church and who are not now living on Mayne Island, to join them on this memorable occasion.

The first service was held in the church on the fourth day of April, 1897 and was conducted by Canon Paddon, founder of St. Mary Magdalene. The Church was consecrated by Bishop Perrin, in 1898.

The contractor was a Mr. W. Cann, of Galiano and he seconded Canon Paddon in the completion of the Church interior. Mr. Cann also gave the prayer desk made of native oak. Many others gave generously of their substance, gifts of furnishings and labour.

UNIQUE FONT

Parishioners take a particular pride in the baptismal font for it is indeed unique. It consists of a rock found on the shore of Saturna Island near East Point Lighthouse, fashioned into its remarkable shape by the action of the sea. Canon Paddon and a Mr. Grey transported it by boat to Mayne Island.

The Lych Gate was erected by the Canadian Legion at the main entrance to the Church grounds, in memory of comrades who fell in the first World War, and is inscribed: "In Memory - Lest we Forget, 1914-1918". It was dedicated by the Rev.

William Barton.

In 1910 a Mr. Inglis donated five acres of his property which adjoined the Church grounds and in the twenties, by another generous act, Mr. Richard Hall donated land bordering the Church grounds.

RESPONSE TO APPEAL

An appeal was made to Mayne Islanders a few years ago by the congregation of St. Mary Magdalene for help in undertaking much needed repairs to preserve the Church.

The response was very gratifying and financial assistance and offers of labour came from organizations and individuals. In addition, a Book of Remembrance was donated to the Church and gifts from friends and families of those who have passed on have insured their names are recorded as a memorial.

As a result of this tremendous support and the improved finances, the Church now has a completely rebuilt and equipped vestry, new windows installed and painted on the west end wall, the Lych Gate repaired and painted, tulips planted along the

path to the Church and a new cemetery fence and gate.

There is still much work to be done and they are confident of continued support, knowing the Islanders have the same feeling

of dedication to the restoration of the one-and-only Church as its founders had when they undertook to build St. Mary Magdalene Church on the hill overlooking Active Pass 80 years ago.

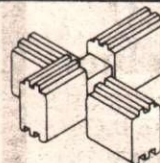

**Two new trustees named to water board by biggest meeting ever**

Two new trustees were named to North Salt Spring Waterworks District last week. Dr. L.J. Kreissl and Mining Engineer Don Lochhead edged out the incumbents, Norman Mouat and Spencer Marr.

St. George's Hall was packed to the last chair as an unprecedented crowd took part.

Ken Patrick chaired the mee-

ting and Chuck Harrison presented the financial statement.

Statement aroused few comments although the purchase of a geophone was questioned. It is a machine which picks up the sound of running water on a sensitive microphone, explained the chairman. It will trace a leak in a pipe and enable the crew to

locate it without wasteful digging.

"It has already saved more than it cost," he noted.

The new flume will measure the flow of water from St. Mary Lake. The water districts record the water taken from the lake and the total of the two figures will yield a clear picture of the amount of water taken, said Patrick.

**HAVE WE ENOUGH?**

"Have we enough water?" asked T.J. Sharland.

"We are trying to find out," replied Patrick.

Stan Sage took the chair during the election of the new trustees.

"I would like an expression of gratitude and thanks to the retiring trustees," said the chairman, "they have worked long and hard during the past year."

Mrs. Valcourt suggested that the purchase price should be public knowledge. He agreed and explained that the federal government department had that information. Price was not disclosed on Monday.

Strip of land alongside Manson Ave. was zoned rural, although there were storage buildings on it at the time of zoning, stated the applicant.

Yvette Valcourt expressed objection.

She had already brought to the attention of the regional director the fact that the K & R store is built on three lots, she stated, contrary to the zoning by-law and in defence of the original building permit.

The building permit for that store was issued in 1971, for Lot 174, she told the hearing. The structure was constructed on Lot 174, Lot 351 and Parcel "B", west of Manson Road.

**ALREADY PROTESTED**

She had previously protested this fact to the Regional District she told the hearing, but had received no co-operation from the regional director or the building inspection department.

"It is, therefore, an illegal building," she told the hearing, "and anyone else breaking the by-laws has been taken to court."

If it is rezoned commercial, suggested Miss Gisi, there will be more parking problems and sewage disposal questions.

Fifth application was for the rezoning of a rock wall, two feet wide, which had been zoned rural, despite the commercial zoning of adjacent property, reported Toynbee.

The zoning of the wall brought into question the logic of the zoning map, he charged. It would be illogical not to rezone the wall, he urged.

Would it make it more diffi-

cult to get in and out of the parking lot, asked Miss Gisi.

**OPEN SPACE**

For every square foot of floor space in the buildings on the Mouat Trading Company's property there are four square feet of open property, replied the applicant.

Final application referred to a narrow strip of land running alongside the grocery store and to the waterfront.

"These are merely matters of housekeeping," suggested

Islands Trustee C.J. Longueay.

They are all housekeeping matters and they all conform to the new proposals for Ganges Secondary Plan, he added.

He was supported by his fellow trustee, Dr. John Fisher.
