New school mooted at Fulford

Schools are not standing still in the islands.

Last week the Gulf Islands School District surveyed the likely future needs of the Outer Islands and Salt Spring Island.

Three-room school at Fulford is indicated, trustees learned.

Galiano could face a need for additional space, but no action will be taken until the picture of future needs is a little clearer.

Present capacity of the Galiano school is 60 students. A new room will provide for another 30. The new room is the project awaiting clarification.

On Pender and Mayne it is anticipated that the facilities will be sufficient for foreseeable needs into the 1980's.

The 'paint-in' was rained out last Saturday so the event has been postponed until July 30.

Residents and visitors alike were invited to take part in the redecorating of the empty building formerly occupied by Gulf Islands Cleaners in Ganges.

Stepping in the cowpacks through Ottawa

John Diefenbaker once said that if there were a 100-acre field with only four cowpacks in it Otto Lang would find some way to step in all of them.

The Trudeau government seems to have developed a similar affinity for getting into unsavory messes. At the moment there are more investigations underway or pending than at any time since Mike Pearson found himself awash in a sea of scandals in the 1960's.

RCMP TO BE INVESTIGATED
The most startling event has been the decision to investigate the activities of the RCMP.

It all began five years ago, when the premises of a left-wing publishing firm were ransacked and the owners wrote Pierre Goyer, who was then Solicitor-General, alleging that the break-in was the work of Montreal and R.C.M. policemen.

Goyer discussed the accusation with RCMP authorities, who denied the charge and advised that the Solicitor-General not acknowledge the letter. From time to time, Tory and NDP Spokesmen have

asked questions in Parliament about this strange occurrence, but they were assured that all was well.

Then the cover-up started to come apart at the seams.

An RCMP officer charged with placing a bomb near the home of a Montreal chain store tycoon blurted out in court that the RCMP had been involved in the illegal break-in of the left-wing publishers.

Three RCMP officers pleaded guilty in court and were given suspended sentences. Then there were further revelations about alleged police break-ins in Toronto, Vancouver, and other cities without any search warrant or authorization.

OPPOSITION STONEWALLED
Members of the opposition parties pressed the government week after week for a full-scale investigation.

To them it seemed important to know whether the force we pay to enforce the law is itself flouting the law. But the Prime Minister and Solicitor-General Fox continued to stonewall every demand for a judicial inquiry.

Both Trudeau and Francis Fox

assured the House of Commons that the Montreal break-in was an isolated instance and was not a practice followed by the Force, despite the fact that former Corporal Jack Ramsay has been saying for a couple of years that there was a "dirty tricks" training course given to RCMP cadets.

After refusing for months to order an investigation into federal police activities the government suddenly caved in and announced the appointment of a Royal Commission.

Why the sudden switch? Because the growing number of allegations regarding illegal activities were making it clear that a pattern was developing which could no longer be ignored.

Canadians have a right to know whether the Cabinet knew of these violations, and if they did, why nothing was done. On the other hand if they didn't know, why didn't they order an investigation five years ago, when it first came to their attention.

In a democratic society the police are responsible to the government and the government is

responsible to the people. We must keep it that way.

WHAT'S A HUNDRED MILLION!

Every week there are fresh disclosures about the goings on in A.E.C.L. (Atomic Energy of Canada Ltd.) where incompetence and hidden pay-offs call for a thorough house-cleaning.

Nearly two years ago it became apparent that A.E.C.L. was going to lose over a \$160 million on its contract to sell a reactor to Argentina.

When we drew this to the government's attention, we were assured that A.E.C.L. was in the process of re-negotiating the agreement and the loss would not be more than \$40 million and might be as low as \$25 million.

Up rose Energy Minister Gillespie the other day to inform all and sundry that the loss under the renegotiated contract will be \$130 million. Some years ago, C.D. Howe was roundly criticized for saying, "What's a million!", but now Alistair Gillespie says, "What's a hundred million!"

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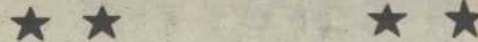

A modern old car



Too new to be old as too old to be new

Did you see the old car advertised in the Colonist, enquired my son-in-law.

I saw it and I hesitated. It was a 1939 model. That's plenty old... but not old enough.

I grew up with that model.

When I served across the prairies and in British Columbia during the war, a 1939 model was

beyond our reach and it represented the ultimate of modern transportation.

It doesn't seem an old car, at all.

Not like a Model T. Or something very old. Not old like my old Britton of 30 years ago, which came out of the plant in 1909.

It wasn't even old like my old Jowett.

I was married when I found the advertisement in an English newspaper. It was a 1926 model and had been standing on blocks since 1929.

The owner was aging and had reached that stage in life where he had to accept that he would never drive it again. In 1929 he had acquired it as a second-hand car. **FOR 20 YEARS**

He made one trip before he suffered a heart attack. The car was jacked up and for 20 years he kept it polished and running.

I taught my wife to drive in that car, despite a violent cone clutch.

Only reason I sold it was to leave Britain for good and even now I wish I had brought it with me.

It was 13 years older and 13 ain't so long. But they were the 13 years standing between ancient and modern. In 1926 this high-slung two-seater with its two-cylinder motor and massive gear-box and two-wheel brakes was yet to be succeeded by the 1939 six-cylinder, flexibly-mounted high-performance, soft engine, with its synchro-mesh gears and chesterfield seating.

So I read the advertisement, looked back in regret and went on eating. **FGR**

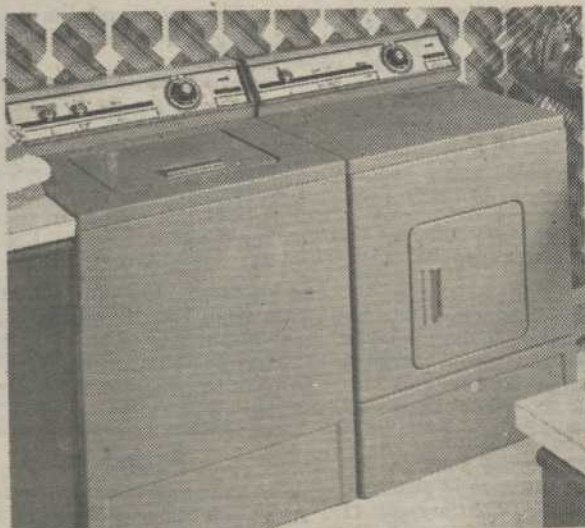

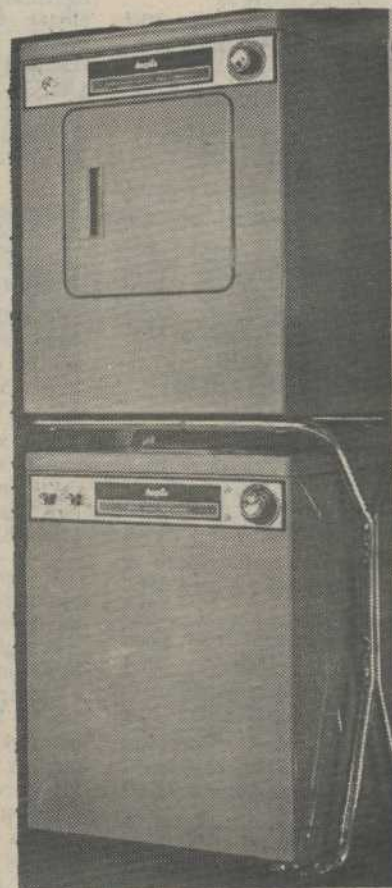

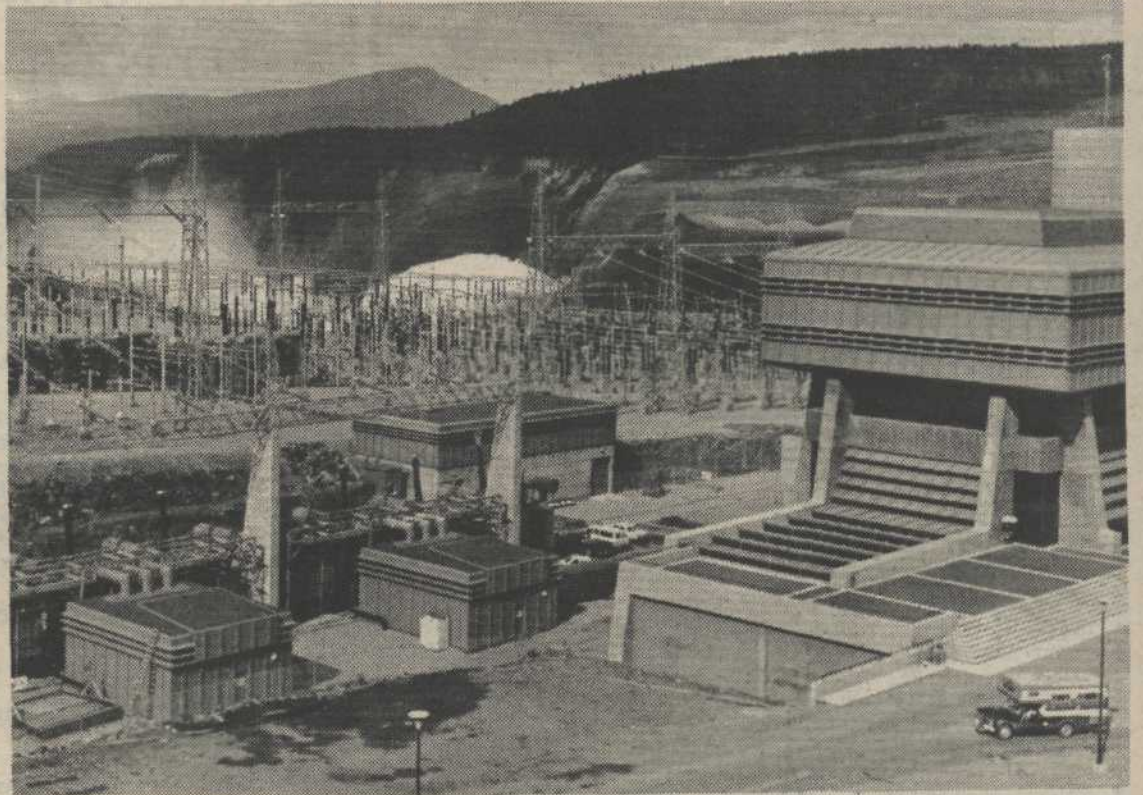
The Peace River power plant

Some 100 million years ago, huge dinosaurs lumbered through the tropical swamps and forests of northern British Columbia, an area now known as the Big Peace River Country.

River with a deposit of earth and snow. The undaunted river was forced to cut a new path in the narrow jagged form of the Peace

River Canyon.

A LEGACY

This left modern man a valuable legacy: the canyon provided an ideal foundation for a huge dam and the moraine, the deposit left only four miles away, contained more than 100 million tons of fill to build it.

Tracks of some of the giant dinosaurs were found during the excavation work for the dam's power plant. Today, casts of these imprints were displayed at the Peace River Project's comfortable Tourist Lookout, perched on the rim of the Peace River Canyon just downstream from the dam.

Other remnants of past ages are exhibited at the Control Building and include plant and turtle fossils and pieces of carbonized wood believed to be from a forest fire in the area 40,000 years ago.

An 11,645-year-old mammoth tusk was also found and is now part of the commemorative monument on the 640-square-mile reservoir, Williston Lake, the province's largest inland body of water. Backing up a total of 225 miles into and along the Rocky Mountain Trench, it stores to 57 million acre-feet of run-off trapped from a catchment area as large as the province of New Brunswick.

NEW WATER ROUTE

The lake provides a new water transportation route for resource industries and has an immense potential for future recreational development.

The dam can be reached via a short drive from the Alaska Highway communities of Dawson Creek and Fort St. John, or from Chetwynd on the Hart Highway.

Tours at the project site begin at the visitor reception centre on the top floor of the transformer-shaped central control building above the power plant. Here you can watch the control console from which the complex operation is directed. Slides, movies and displays illustrate the project's construction saga and the region's historic past.

Then you can descend hundreds of feet into a cavern—blasted from bedrock 500 feet below the dam's east shoulder, as long as three football fields, as high as a 15-storey building, and as wide as a four-lane highway — housing

Victoria Flying Services

They brought air services to the islands a decade ago

Victoria Flying Services has been the islands' air link for the past 10 years.

It was the late Ron Jeune who came to the islands a decade ago to make the arrangements for his company to assume the scheduled services between the islands and the two main provincial cities.

The company was already firmly established at Patricia Bay Airport at that time.

The flying company was established by a veteran provincial pilot, Bill Sylvester. He acquired a hangar at the west side of the airport and set up a training and charter service as well as repair services and the sales outlet for Cessna.

The new firm was at that time a downtown bush pilot operation. Located on the international airport

and within ready reach of the Victoria Harbour which became its southern terminal, the service still operated into all the remote areas of the province.

For the past 10 years Victoria Flying Services has been the first link with outside when sailing schedules were suspended. During ferry strikes the little seaplanes have transported hundreds of passengers in and out of the islands, running second sections and second sections to those second sections.

ISLAND AGENT

The late John Sturdy was Salt Spring Island agent for the airline for a number of years.

The various facets of the air service operation were directed towards Vancouver Island. To island travellers the Victoria Flying

Services represented a flying link with Victoria and Vancouver and nothing else.

Shortly before the death of Bill Sylvester, the air service company was acquired by a new management.

In the last two weeks the operators relinquished the company, which was split three ways.

Ed Davis, Salt Spring Island pilot and manager of the Victoria Flying Services has taken over the charter license to use in connection with his Helio Courier, short-take-off-and-landing machine.

As general manager of the new Cougar Air services, he is also senior partner.

Third company, Juan Air, has taken over the flying school.

Westcoast Air is middle-aged operation

Westcoast Air Services began as a training and rental operation in 1941, and was known as Vancouver U-Fly until 1955, when it became Westcoast Air.

It wasn't until 1964 that the company started dealing strictly

with charters and airplane sales and discontinued the training side of the business. Westcoast Air has been a Cessna parts outlet for 28 years.

Four years ago the company began its first scheduled flights,

taking over routes that were formerly handled by Pacific Western Airlines. These flights were made to places such as Bella Bella, Ocean Fall, Tofino and Tahsis.

The company is still operated by its founders, Lloyd and Al Michaud, and they now have a total of 30 planes.

General Manager of Westcoast Air Service, Russ Minaker, told Driftwood last week that his company intends to try and improve the service between the Gulf Islands, Victoria and Vancouver.

However, they are still operating under a management contract with Victoria Flying Services and will be doing so until the Air Transport Commission approves transfer of the licence.

Until that approval comes, said Mr. Minaker, their "hands are tied" as far as making any changes to Gulf Islands service is concerned.

The story of islands scheduled air services dates back 10 years to the time Victoria Flying Services came in to the various harbours and inlets.

the mighty underground power plant. Here you can stop at one of the subterranean manifold chambers where water surges from 310,000-horsepower turbines at a rate of more than 10 million gallons a minute.

This is the power plant of the Gordon M. Shrum Generating Station where electricity is produced for delivery to the population centres of British Columbia.

MACKENZIE'S ROUTE

To cap a memorable visit, a picnic at the beautiful Alvin Holland Park is a must. Or take a walk down Rock Mountain Portage Road, which leads from the project to the uniquely picturesque community of Hudson's Hope. This 12-mile

journey east follows the route taken by Sir Alexander Mackenzie in 1793 on his famous expedition around Portage Mountain to bypass the canyon.

Despite the hydro-electric project, much of the northern half of British Columbia remains as it appeared to Mackenzie over 180 years ago.

The Peace River region is also British Columbia's share of the Great Plains — golden carpeted grain fields set amid great open country that stretches all the way to Hudson Bay.

Peace River communities offer annual rodeos and curling bonspiels while the surrounding country boasts excellent big game hunting and sport fishing.

ACE MAINWARING

Arm of the law has long held the islands in security.

Ed Lumley lives on Churchill Road like his father did, back in the late 19th century. His father was the first island policeman on Salt Spring Island and ever since Ed Lumley's father, Salt Spring has always had some law to keep order.

Tom Mansell, an island boy from the beginning, became a policeman for the island, working under the B.C. Police, predecessor of the RCMP here. Islanders are familiar with Mansell Road. The ex-island policeman, Tom Mansell, left a namesake. Last islanders heard from Tom was that he was in Edmonton, working as a journalist.

After the First World War Jim Rogers looked after the island and guided islanders on the straight and narrow.

Injured in the arm during the war, Rogers was not in the least put out from doing a good job. He ran a rum runner boat to catch the rum running lawbreakers. But islanders really didn't stir up too much trouble.

Early Island police worked from their homes. They needed no office until during the '20's, when Bittancourts Store, an early grocery situated across from the Bakery in Ganges, was converted to a nursing home by

islanders. Famous for his well-trained Alsatian, Tweedhope worked for the B.C. police on Salt Spring for as long as ten years. Tweedhope was no ordinary policeman; he was very much a part of island activities and took part in sheep shearing contests and fall fair exhibitions.

In 1946, Albert Dillabough and wife, Dodie, left the island after a year of working for the B.C. Police here. Albert Dillabough worked out of the ex-nursing home, located in Ganges. The then Const. Dillabough must have liked the island, because today he lives

TO GANGES HILL

In 1956 another move took the RCMP to Ganges Hill, where the present building was constructed for the police as a residence as well as office. It was converted to all office in the early '70's.

Since George Meyer, in the '50's, Salt Spring has seen a continuously changing detachment at Ganges.

Head of six police at Ganges is Sgt. Ray Stelter, resident of Salt Spring since July, 1974. Native of Alberta, Stelter joined the

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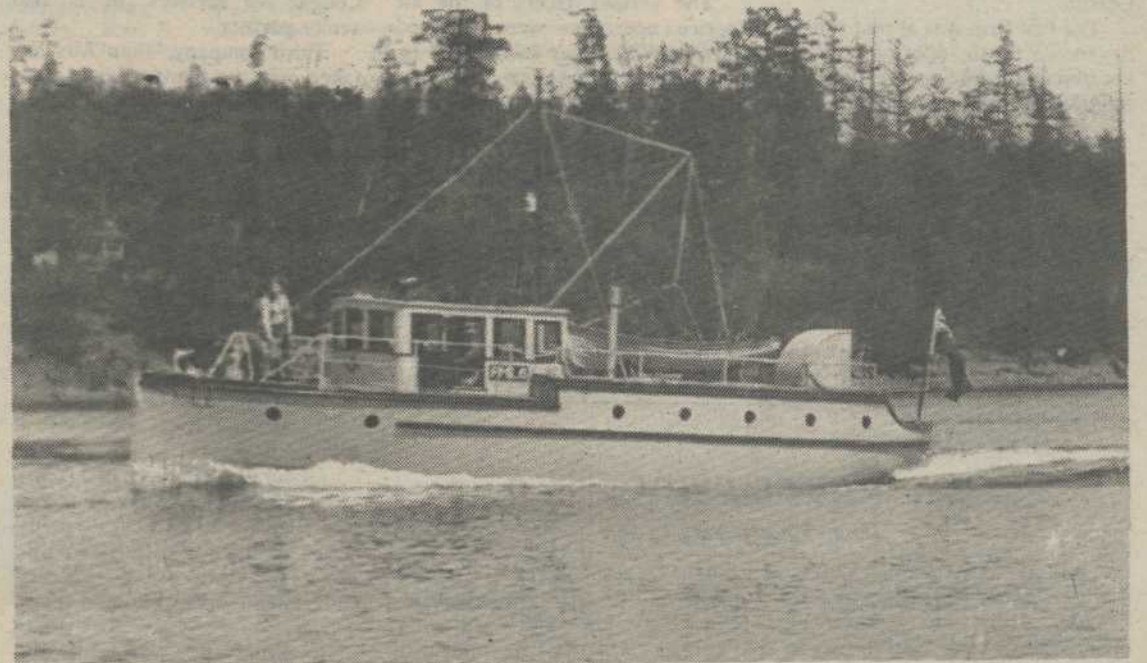

here with his wife.

George Meyer was the first Royal Canadian Mountie on Salt Spring, arriving on the island in 1952, the year the B.C. Police were swallowed up by the RCMP.

George Meyer was just a young fellow when he came to Salt Spring but he stayed for seven years before going on for bigger times in bigger places.

Before George Meyer came to the island the B.C. Police had switched offices. No longer did they work out of the Bittancourt Store, later nursing home, at the foot of Ganges Hill.

The new building used by the Island police for about eight years was the present

force in 1960. Only recently promoted, Ray Stelter was Corporal in charge of two constables. The re-locating of the Islands Police boat allowed for four new constables on the detachment.

Sean Lynch is not a novice at police work nor is it particularly old hat to him.

He first trained in Regina and was then posted at Courtenay, Port Alice, Victoria, Ucluelet, Chemainus and the Outer Islands. Salt Spring is the most recent stop for Sean Lynch.

It's difficult to imagine a minister, after his officials in A.E.C.L. had bungled one contract, allowing them to sign a second one without some proof that their estimate of the loss was accurate.

But Mr. Gillespie did the opposite.

When he found that the loss was nearly \$100 million more than he had been told by the chairman of the board, he promoted the latter to be president of A.E.C.L.

QUESTIONABLE DEALS:

For several years now there have been disturbing revelations of questionable business practices by A.E.C.L. and Polysar - both Crown Corporations set up by the federal government. Former Auditor-General, Maxwell Henderson wrote to Mr. Trudeau in March 1973 about kick-backs paid into numbered foreign bank accounts by Polysar.

Nothing was done until opposition questioning forced some change in this practice, although so far no disciplinary action has been taken.

A.E.C.L. paid over \$2 million into a Swiss numbered account and still claims it doesn't know who got the money.

Instead the Trudeau government has stalled and stonewalled every attempt to clean up some of the scandals which have become all too apparent.

Columbus and Hepburn Both discover Virgin Islands

The British killed the original crop on Tortola and twice the replacement crops has been destroyed in order to find a more profitable use for the soil.

That was the brief historical resume offered to Salt Spring Island Rotary Club last week when Florence Hepburn spoke of her visit to the West Indies.

Tortola is one of the British Virgin Islands, forming part of the Leeward Islands south east of Cuba.

The retired Salt Spring Island teacher made one trip to the islands and was so impressed that she returned at Christmas and spent several months with the native people.

Columbus discovered the Virgin Islands in the 15th century; Florence Hepburn discovered them in the 20th century. Biggest difference is that Columbus never went back.

The island once boasted a heavy growth of mahogany trees, she told the service club, but many years ago these were burned out in order to provide arable land for a sugar crop.

The sugar was mostly used for the production of rum, but the market was not strong enough and in later years that crop was also burned off to make provision for new methods of profitable farming.

STILL MARGINAL

With a population of about 800 people, little water and no well-drilling equipment, the agriculture is still quite marginal, she explained.

The main source of revenue is from the American Virgin Islands, which lie adjacent to Tortola. Tottolans will make the trip across the water in order to earn a little money and return home.

Employment is so scarce that only Tortolans are permitted to work on the island.

The population is largely black. During her first visit, Mrs. Hepburn taught some of her new-found friends the art of ornamentation with shells. She encouraged the islanders to sell their work to assist the island hospital, retaining part of the sale price for themselves.

When she returned, she discovered that the new practice was not only effective, but that the islanders were collecting an impressive price for some of their work.

On her second visit she was presented with a small sum of money by the Rotary Club to buy materials and gifts for the islanders. She bought cottons, she told the club, mostly remnants, and the island people were eager to make their own dresses.

MODELING

The speaker modelled a sample of the island style, half-smock; half-dress. Island women are extremely modest, she told the club and avoid the revealing styles of the north west.

In response to questions, she explained that the local coinage was not minted for use, but for sale to collectors. Transactions on the island are largely in American
