

Hugh Curtis to officiate

Pender School opening on Saturday afternoon

The official opening of the new Pender Community School will take place starting at 3:30 pm on Saturday, Nov. 26. Islands MLA, Municipal Affairs minister Hugh Curtis, will officiate. The opening ceremony will be followed in the evening by a dance in the new school's gymnasium.

This new facility which replaces the old Pender School, part of which was built in 1902, is a joint venture by the communities of North and South Pender Islands and the Board of School Trustees of the Gulf Islands School District.

The communities have put up over \$100,000 in funds raised over the years by the Pender Hall Society and other local groups, local by-law money, and provincial recreational grant funds.

ARCHITECT

Architect for the project was Henry Schubart of Ganges.

The school was built by the school district acting as general contractor and employing almost all local labour and tradesmen from the Penders or other Gulf Islands.

Much of the materials were bought through local dealers.

The eight-acre site, on Canal Road, was purchased last year, planning started over a year ago, with construction getting under way last April. The project was completed within days of the October 31 target date and occupancy commenced November 18.

Pender is the second Outer Island school to enroll Grades 8 and 9, the enlarged Mayne School having been opened last spring.

The new building includes four classrooms, a library, office and medical room, a full-size gym-

nasium with 22-foot ceiling and community meeting facilities.

Residents of all the islands, Salt Spring and the Outer Islands have been invited to subscribe to CARS,

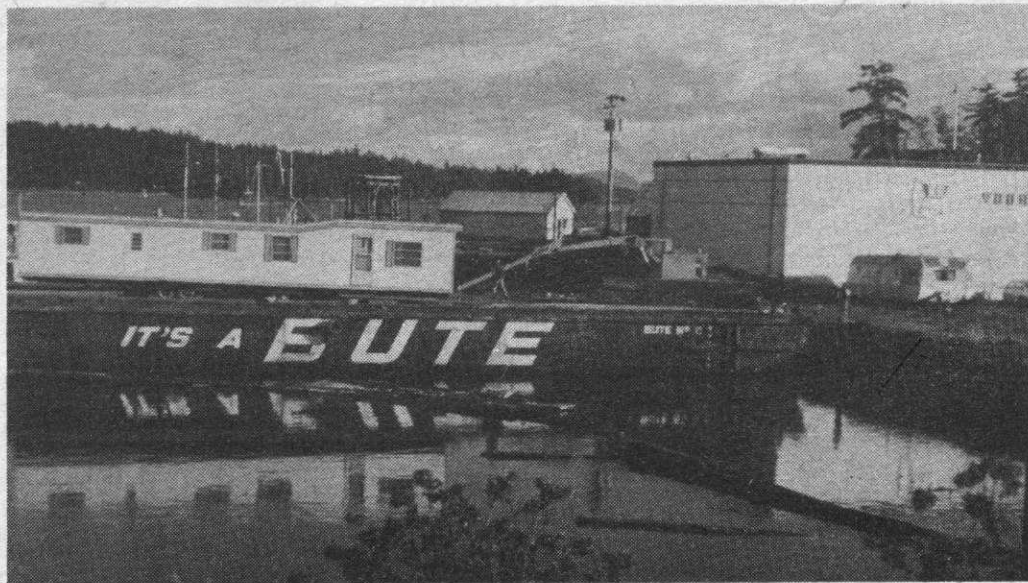
but the response has been considerably lower this year than it was in 1976, says the chairman.

Another petition seeks to restate support

—For Ganges sewer project

Another petition was being circulated in the Ganges area early this week for presentation to the Capital Regional Board at its regular meeting on Wednesday.

Ganges pharmacist Les Ramsey said Monday the petition was "seeking signatures to restate support for the sewer system."

The new petition follows in the wake of the regional board's decision of two weeks ago to delay further action relating to the sewer project. The validity of the sewer petition has been challenged by the Committee of Concerned Citizens, of Ganges.

"We're kind of upset that a few people can cause a majority petition to be temporarily shelved," said Ramsey.

The petition was certified a few weeks ago by the regional district as containing consent of 68.2% of the property owners in Ganges to go ahead with the sewer project.

Ramsey said that the regional district received 15 letters from property owners wishing to add their signatures after the petition was finalized.

This would indicate that more than 68.2% are in favour of the sewer system, he said.

Curtis assures sewer critics that they will be considered

The Committee of Concerned Citizens at Ganges has received a reply from Municipal Affairs Minister Hugh Curtis. Reply acknowledges a petition presented to Mr. Curtis by a number of opponents of the Ganges sewer project.

"I wish to acknowledge your petition of November 1 which expresses concern over the proposal to install a sewer system in the Ganges area of Salt Spring Island," wrote the minister, who is MLA for the Islands.

The petition has been certified as sufficient by the secretary of the Capital Regional District under the provisions of section 592 of the Municipal Act, he notes, and this legislation provides that once the sufficiency of the petition has been

determined, it shall be deemed to have been and to be a sufficient petition.

"The proposal has not, however, been forwarded to my ministry with a request for the approval of the Inspector of Municipalities and before the installation can proceed the project must be considered financially viable under the provisions of the Municipal Act.

"May I assure you that before any approval is forthcoming, the matter will be closely examined in light of all the representations that have been submitted," concluded the letter.

The letter from the Salt Spring Island committee has been placed on ministry files for reference purposes, protesters were told.

To connect with Ganges sewer system

Tenders are called for construction of facility

Tenders have been called for the Gulf Islands Intermediate and Personal Care facility at Ganges. The new building will offer 50 private rooms for Gulf Islanders requiring this level of care.

The sewage disposal will be a separate project; it is planned to use the proposed Ganges sewer

system. It is hoped that the new sewers will be ready at the time the building is completed. If not, considerable additional monies will have to be used to provide a septic tank system and disposal field.

Funds for construction are from a Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation mortgage while furn-

ishings will have to be provided by local donations. Each individual bedroom will cost approximately \$1000 to equip. This includes drapes, bedding and furniture. In addition, there are lounges, craft and hobby rooms, hairdressing room, residents' laundry, kitchen (not fixed equipment), and offices to furnish.

The Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital Auxiliary is providing \$60,000 for the furnishing of the dining room and the main lounge. The board of the Gulf Islands Intermediate and Personal Care Society has expressed appreciation for the support received to date and looks for full participation of the community in preparing this building for full operation.

Story of a lake



To be discussed in Curtis's office

Future of St. Mary Lake is to be carefully debated at a special meeting in the office of Municipal Affairs Minister Hugh Curtis, on December 8.

The present use of the lake as a recreational centre and as a source of domestic water will be analyzed. The meeting will also seek to establish a likely and logical pattern of development over the coming years in order to establish a pattern of lake use in future.

The meeting will include local residents and provincial technical specialists. It has been called by the minister following a special request from the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce.

In recent years there have been frequent challenges to the use of the north Salt Spring lake for the dual purpose of domestic water supply and recreational boating

and swimming as well as sports fishing.

When the minister was on the island recently as the local MLA, he met representatives of the Chamber who pressed for an official examination of the lake and its future in all phases of use.

Announcing the meeting, Chamber vice-president Gary Macpherson, spokesman from the Chamber, ministry of highways, pollution Control Board, Water Rights Branch, ministry of the environment, Parks Branch North Salt Spring Water District, Fernwood Water District and the Maliview and Walker Hook water districts.

Curtis and his executive assistant, Wayne Steeds will also be present.

It is hoped that the meeting will determine the pattern of use for the lake afterwards.

Rotary Club still offering foreign study scholarships

Bert Timbers, President of the Rotary Club of Salt Spring Island, has announced that the club is searching for young people as candidates for Rotary Foundation educational awards for study abroad in 1979-80.

The awards, for graduate and undergraduate students, teachers of the handicapped, students in technical training programs, and journalists, provide round-trip transportation, educational and living expenses for one academic year, and funds for intensive language training, if necessary.

Since the program began in 1947, the Rotary Foundation has sponsored more than 10,000 students at a cost of over \$35 million and involving 127 countries.

A trust supported by voluntary contributions from Rotarians, Rotary Clubs and others in more than 150 Rotary countries, the Foundation will spend \$25 million in the next three years.

Winter series of concerts to open with Kopanitsa Dancers



The Kopanitsa Dancers, led by Karia Leschka, will open the local winter series of concerts, Sunday afternoon, November 27, at 2 pm in the Activity Centre at Ganges.

Folk dances of Bulgaria, Macedonia and other Balkan countries will be featured on the program. Miss Leschka plans to offer members of the audience the opportunity to learn some of the steps and join the performing dancers for part of the program, if they wish.

The troupe's name, Kopanitsa, comes from a particular Bulgarian dance, which, in turn, is named after the town of Kopanitsa. It is a rhythm made up of 11 sixteenth notes to the bar. The performers

will be wearing authentic costumes complete from colorful head-dress to exotic footwear with turned up toes.

Karia Leschka is already known to some islanders from a short series of lessons she gave here recently under the sponsorship of Continuing Education. She was born in the United States and she has been dancing all her life. Since she has been in British Columbia, she has been engaged in Serbo-Croatian studies and folk-dance

workshops to increase the authenticity she brings to the performances of the troupe. The Kopanitsa group has been in existence since 1975 and includes both men and women. It evolved from the Seabird Dancers, an all-woman ensemble that formed in 1972.

This event is cooperatively sponsored by the Anglican Parish of Salt Spring Island, Continuing Education and the Community Arts Council.

Memorial service was held in

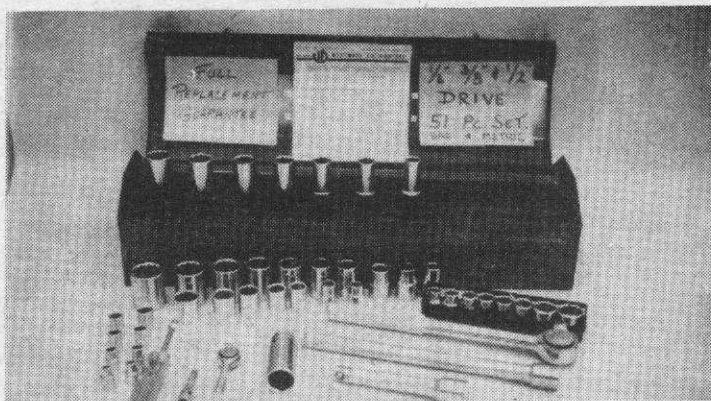
Vancouver on Friday afternoon, Nov. 18 and cremation followed.

Kitchen Corner

Christmas entertaining can be a sure-fire success for guests and hostess alike when special holiday treats are made well in advance of the season and frozen, allowing the cook to get out of the kitchen and relax when those well-wishers start knocking on the door.

When the ferry brings unexpected visitors, you'll be well prepared with these fantastic "Hammies". My mother makes them every Christmas, and they've become legend with family and friends, both for their incredible flavour and their disappearing power! Thanks, Mom, for sharing this recipe with us!

HAM PASTIES

PASTRY:

5 cups All Purpose Flour
1 tbsp. brown sugar
1 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. baking powder
1 lb. lard
3/4 cup cold water
1 egg
2 tsp. vinegar

1 egg
1 tbsp. water
Poppy or sesame seeds
...Measure flour (without sifting) into large bowl. Add brown sugar, salt and baking powder; stir well to blend.
...Add half the lard and rub in with fingertips. Cut in remaining lard until particles are the size of small pease.
...Combine water, egg and vinegar in small bowl and beat slightly. Add all at once to flour mixture and stir with fork until dough holds together.
...Form into a ball and wrap in waxed paper. Chill before using.

...Roll out portions of the dough on lightly floured surface to 1/8 inch thickness. Cut into circles using 3 1/4" or 4" cutter.

...Place on baking sheets, then spread a scant tablespoon of Filling (below) on half of each circle.

...Moisten edge with water and fold over. Seal edges with tines of fork.

...Cut slits on top of pasties for steam to escape. Brush pasties with mixture of 1 egg beaten with 1 tbsp. water. Sprinkle on poppy or sesame seeds.

...Bake at 400 for 15 to 20 minutes or until golden brown. Makes 4 1/2 dozen.

FILLING

3 cups finely diced or minced cooked ham
2 tbsp. chopped green pepper
2 tbsp. chopped pimento
1 tbsp. minced onion
1 10 oz. can undiluted, condensed cream of mushroom soup.
...Combine all ingredients and mix well.

***These pasties may be baked and frozen, to be re-heated before serving, or they may be frozen unbaked.

GOLDEN FRUIT CAKE

1 cup dried apricots
1 cup granulated sugar
1 cup water
1 1/2 cups almonds, chopped
2 cups golden seedless raisins
3 cups ready-cut citron peel
4 rings candied pineapple
1 cup yellow glace cherries, halved
1 cup butter
1 cup granulated sugar
5 eggs
2 1/4 cups flour
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder

New approach to piano is brought to Salt Spring

The Suzuki method of learning to play an instrument is called the Mother Tongue approach, for it resembles learning to speak one's native tongue. By repeatedly hearing our native tongue we nearly all learn easily to speak it well. It is the heritage of all of us and we are not in competition regarding it for we all share it.

Thus it should ideally be with music: the heritage of all. A newborn infant has already begun his musical education, willy-

nily whether his environment offers adequate or benevolent stimuli or not.

A child of three is ready to begin an instrument.

In Suzuki, the first lessons are taken, mostly, by the supervising parent, with the child observing. Soon he or she, depending on age and other factors is ready to play, too.

The most important home task for the parent is playing the record three times each day to absorb the sounds the student will be or is reproducing. This can be done while the child is at play, eating, or even asleep, but it is of the utmost importance, for if this is done a high measure of success is insured.

PLAYING SONATINAS

It is astonishing indeed for the newcomer to attend a Suzuki workshop and hear great numbers of little people playing lovely Clementi Sonatinas and many 8-9 year olds playing works normally placed in Grade 8 Toronto Conservatory.

They play with artistry, lovely tone and great confidence and have an extended repertoire, as nothing is ever abandoned. As new pieces are added the old ones are also retained.

Yet Suzuki's first ideal is to help students become finer people through music, rather than making a goal of becoming famous or prominent musicians. Although the rate of this is high in Suzuki-trained students it is regarded as incidental.

The groundwork for reading begins even with three-year-olds at the first lesson when they begin to

recognize four basic rhythmic patterns in 16th, 8th, and quarter notes, and their components.

This is followed by recognizing skipping and stepping up or down: written, heard, and "write" these also. It is a short step to identifying pieces already performed.

DESIGNED FOR THE YOUNG

This method, while designed for young children of three to eight as beginners is also effective with older beginners and adults, usually in modified form. It is also effective to transfer some students who have already studied in one of the traditional ways.

One of the attractions is the high quality of the music.

A small Suzuki piano instruction group is forming under the tutelage of Madge and Tao Kimball at Ganges. While the instruction is individual, the stimulus of the group gatherings is very effective.

Madge Kimball holds a B.A. in music, has taught for 20 years, was on the faculty of the Langley Community Music School, participated in the '75, '76 Suzuki Workshops in Vancouver and is a traditional teacher, as well as traditional.

Tao Kimball studied piano with his mother and with concert pianist Willi Bartsch and has been intimately involved in the piano teaching and learning field all his life.

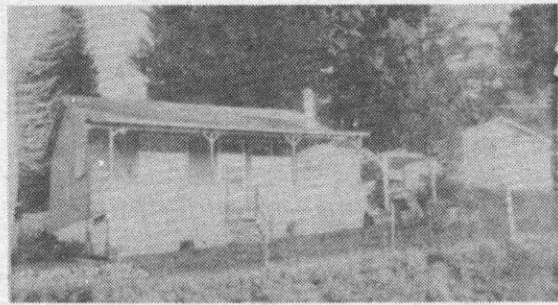

Wood gas once ran axis cars and might well ease up load on Canada

BY WILF BANGERT

When, in 1943, the Russian armies occupied the oil fields at Ploesti, Rumania, a most critical fuel situation had developed for the Axis Powers at the height of W.W.2.

A solution had to be found immediately! The liquefaction of coal was put into high gear, but not nearly enough gasoline could be produced in this manner to satisfy an entire, gigantic war machine; an alternate source of energy was urgently required.

The answer was found in the carbonization of wood, and by early 1944, every truck and car in continental Europe had a boiler-like contraption on its back or in its trunk, but no longer any gasoline in its tank.

The system worked quite well, was cheap to operate, non-polluting, and it used a renewable resource - wood!

The principles involved are well understood in the coal mining and processing industries. Hard coal is carbonized by subjecting it - under exclusion of air - to a temperature of between 900 and 1000 degrees Celsius. The volatile constituents of coal are thereby driven out, and are then utilized as heating gas (city gas). The residue is coke.

WOOD CUBES

In the carbonization of wood, small cubes (ca 2x2x2 inches) of non-resinous wood (hardwood) are heated within an airtight container made of boiler plate or cast iron, over a fire fed by cheap resinous softwood. Again, volatile constituents are driven out, to be used as automotive fuel, or as heating and lighting gas. The residue in this case is charcoal.

On Salt Spring Island, we have vast stretches of forest, among them substantial stands of arbutus, alder, and maple - all of them being

of the non-resinous hardwood variety.

As governments of any political persuasion just cannot be bothered with alternate energy research as long as one drop of oil remains in this world - we may as well take matters in our own hands! We might create an energy self-sufficient island! With imagination everything is possible!

First of all, let us consider what our local population annually spends on energy. The following figures are - by necessity - only very rough estimates, but sufficiently accurate to illustrate the point quite well.

\$1.5 MILLIONS

Approximately 3,000 cars and trucks are driven a total of 30 million miles a year, and consume a minimum of 1.5 million gallons of gas costing \$1.5 million! The island's homes and businesses, about 2,000 units at \$400 each for heating, light and appliances, run up an annual bill of about \$800,000, for a total energy cost of close to \$2.5 million on this island alone!

This vast amount of money is irretrievably lost year after year.

Rather than paying such a fortune to off-island interests, why not mount a vast community effort, and build a wood carbonizing plant manned by islanders in order to manufacture and sell pressurized wood gas to local motorists and home owners! The by-product, charcoal, could be bagged and sold off-island as barbecue fuel.

Funds for the construction of the plant could be raised by local subscription, and by outright government grant (after all, they blow a lot of money on lesser projects).

About 10 to 15 people should be able to run the miniature logging operation, dry kiln, carbonizing unit, bottling and sales, at an annual payroll of less than \$200,000, all of which would be spent right here!

Let's hear from others who know about this technology, and from those who are enthusiastic about island self-sufficiency. We may need it sooner than we think!

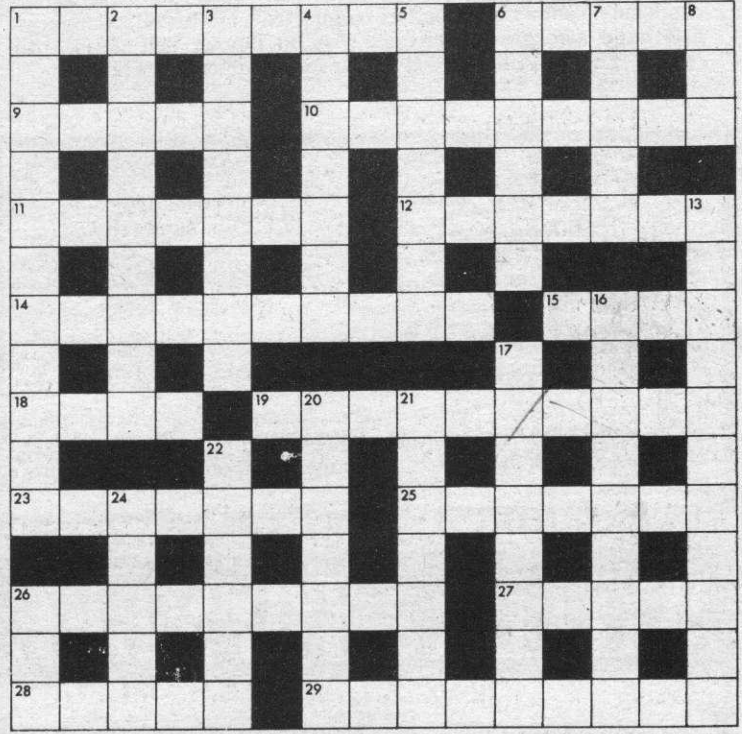

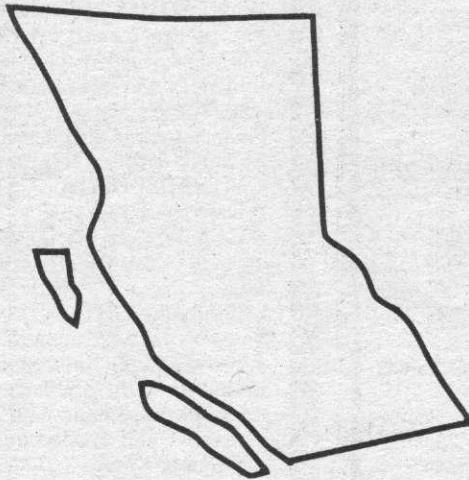

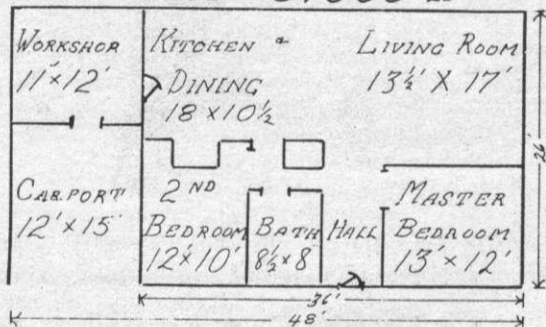

Tax concessions lead to Inco incident!

BY T.C. DOUGLAS, M.P.

From the day Parliament was opened by Her Majesty the Queen, Members have been pre-occupied with the problem of unemployment. And well they might. Not since the Dirty Thirties has the economy been in such dire straits.

All the economic barometers are giving storm warnings. The cost of living, unemployment, deficits and our foreign debt are all going up, while the growth rate of our G.N.P. is going down.

In addition to the human hardship involved, unemployment is costing Canadians over 8.8 billion annually, and its effects are being felt not only by the jobless, but also by the whole business community, who are selling less because idle workers have less to spend.

It is no wonder then that unemployment has become Public Enemy Number One in almost everyone's book.

TAX CUTS TO THE RESCUE!

For three successive years the Trudeau government has pinned its

hopes on tax cuts for the corporations under the assumption that they would invest these windfalls and thus stimulate the economy.

Former Finance Minister John Turner tried this method in 1974. His successor Donald MacDonald followed suit, and in his budget last March, he gave the corporate sector another \$1.2 billion in the form of tax cuts. The session prorogued before this bonanza became law so the new Finance Minister, Jean Chretien, re-introduced the measure in his mini-budget, presented three days after Parliament opened.

The N.D.P. members argued that these tax concessions hadn't produced jobs during the past three years and moved an amendment to switch the \$1.2 billion to Canada Works for the purpose of putting the unemployed to work on socially useful projects.

Not unexpectedly, both the Liberals and Conservatives combined to vote down this proposal. The tax give-aways are safe for

another year.

TAX CUTS DON'T PRODUCE JOBS

Our objections to corporate tax concessions are not based on some deep-seated hatred of big business but on the simple fact that they don't provide jobs.

How could they?

For the past four years our economy has been operating at a little over 80% of its capacity. What corporation in its right senses would enlarge its plant when it isn't using all the capacity it already has?

The tax incentives have failed for very obvious reasons. The fact is that we have no assurance whatsoever that the money corporations get from tax cuts will be used for the purpose that was intended. Indeed the evidence is all to the contrary.

The classic example is the International Nickel Company, commonly known as INCO. This firm has done very well for itself in Canada. Over the past ten years its profits amounted to \$1.7 billion or a 14% return on its investment.

Its profits for this year are estimated at over \$100 million plus a tax concession of \$10 million. In addition to all this largesse, INCO has deferred taxes of \$378 million, which are, in effect, interest-free loans.

To put some icing on the cake, the government's Export Development Corporation loaned INCO \$70 million, at lower than commercial interest rates, for the purpose of opening up mines in Guatemala, Indonesia and New Caledonia.

LESS JOBS, NOT MORE!

With all these munificent hand-outs one would have expected INCO to increase its operations in Canada and hire additional manpower.

But it hasn't!

It has just announced that it will lay off over 4,000 workers at Sudbury, Port Colborne and Thompson, Manitoba.

Canadian taxpayers should know that they have made it possible for INCO to expand its operations abroad while 4,000 of its Canadian workers will join the ranks of the unemployed.

The story of Northern Telecom Corporation, a subsidiary of Bell Canada, is a repetition of INCO's performance but on a smaller scale.

Their tax concession this year amounts to over \$3 million, and in this case it is being invested in plant improvement with the result that the corporation has announced it will be laying off over 1,000

workers. Thanks to a tax cut, they have boosted their production but reduced their staff. Far from curing unemployment, the government's policy of tax cuts for corporations is making the situation worse.

NEED WORK AND WAGES

How much better if the \$1.2 billion in question were used to help municipalities improve their local facilities. This would provide jobs and wages for thousands of the unemployed.

That money would be spent, and the business community would feel the impact of new purchasing power.

Finance Minister Chretien seems to have great difficulty deciding the cause of our economic malaise.

On one hand he echoes the Prime Minister by saying that "The Canadian worker must lower his expectations and start living within his means". But the next day he told a TV audience that "Canadians should spend more and save less".

It is difficult to understand how Canadians who are living beyond their means can be accused of saving too much and spending too

little. Perhaps it is beginning to dawn on the new Minister of Finance that the people who have money don't spend it because they don't need any more goods, while those who would gladly spend more haven't the money to do so.

If Jean Chretien wants to stimulate the economy and reduce unemployment, he should begin by creating jobs for the unemployed instead of using \$1.2 billion on useless corporate tax cuts.

He should seek to provide purchasing power for the four million Canadians who live below the poverty line.

If there are to be tax cuts, let them be for those in the low and middle income groups who will use that money to buy the goods and services that partially operating plants and unemployed workers are only too anxious to produce.

Events have proven that priming the pump at the top in the hope that some of the benefits will trickle down to those at the bottom, doesn't work.

The time is long overdue for pumping purchasing power in at the bottom of the social scale and letting effective demand get the economy moving again.

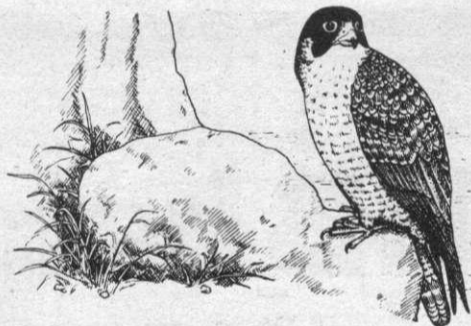

More food for thought

(Interchurch Committee for World Development and Relief)

To continue the story of "Bottle Babies" we take further material from the World Hunger Education Service, Washington, D.C.

A major United States corporation, Bristol-Myers, is being sued by the Sisters of the Precious Blood, a small Dayton, Ohio-based order of Roman Catholic nuns affiliated with the Interfaith Center for Corporate Responsibility (the American counterpart of the Canadian Task Force on Churches and Corporate Responsibility)

The legal issue of the suit is whether or not Bristol-Myers told the truth to its stockholders about sales promotion practices used to develop markets for infant formula products of its Mead Johnson division (ENFAMIL and OLAC).

The greater issue for the Sisters is the health and well-being of infants in developing countries, which they believe is being seriously jeopardized by the spreading use of a commercial product harmfully inappropriate under most Third World conditions.

SEEKS DISMISSAL

Bristol-Myers has asked the court to dismiss the suit on the grounds that "the subject of the abuse of infant formula marketing practices is a matter for which no remedy can be provided by the U.S. Federal Court."

With this act, the company highlights what is surely one of the major economic, ethical, and legal quandaries of our time: can a multinational corporation based in the United States be compelled to make its actions abroad conform to the ethical standards of the laws at home? If so, how?

That a business corporation bears a debt of responsibility toward the larger society which provides the economic, social and legal infrastructure upon which its very existence depends is an established ethical principle in Western society, and millions of dollars are spent annually by business firms, large and small, to convince the public that their social responsibility is being fulfilled.

Despite this public relations effort, however, the inevitable conflict in every corporation remains; the needs and welfare of the broader society versus the need of a corporation to return a profit to

its investors. "The higher, the better".

EXTENSION

When they brought suit against Bristol-Myers, in which they are investors, the Sisters of the Precious Blood indirectly extended the recognized scope of the arena of social responsibility.

By their act they seem to imply that their own welfare as stockholders is linked to their welfare also as citizens of a world in which infants are suffering, dying, or surviving with irreparably stunted brains and bodies because of certain profit-making actions of infant formula companies.

They demand an end to those actions.

They raise this demand both as stockholders under the law and as

believing Christians united through their faith to the victims of suffering and oppression everywhere, even the victims of an oppression with as strange a name as "commerciogenic malnutrition." If what the Sisters charge is true, simple human decency must agree. Will the U.S. federal courts?

Fined \$75

Gary Denchfield of Salt Spring Island, was fined \$75 in Provincial Court at Ganges November 9 when he pleaded guilty to a charge of indecent exposure.

Charge was laid following an incident that took place at the Harbour House Hotel July 22. He appeared before Judge D.K. McAdam.

When distant relatives get distanter instanter

The ferry strike is in the past but some memories are still vivid.

An island couple, having been offered a couple of prize sheep in Edmonton, decided on a fast trip over to fetch them.

They fastened a small trailer behind their compact. With rumours of the impending ferry strike, no time was lost in getting back with the precious cargo of two wild sheep in addition to a crate of chickens.

Lo and behold! Upon arriving at the ferry dock they learned that the strike was in full swing. Short of swimming, accommodation had to be found for all concerned to wait out the strike.

After futile efforts with motel owners, an alternative was decided upon.

After some frantic phone calls a long-neglected distant relative agreed to accommodate the couple with pleasure. That was before realizing the implications of it all. They proceeded to unload and tether the sheep on a well-groomed lawn, and a terrific struggle ensued with tempers flaring, mud and turf flying. The sheep had, nevertheless, a temporary home. Now, a place to release the tightly-packed fowl had to be still found.

Again, after much phoning, by recommendation of one distant relative, another place was found on a farm, many miles further up the road.

After a better part of the week of this kind of visiting, the distant relatives are now more distant than ever, they report!

Your 1978 property assessment... a fairer way to share.

Changes in assessment law now make it possible for property owners to accurately measure whether they are fairly assessed.

Your 1978 property Assessment Notice, issued by the British Columbia Assessment Authority, is in the mail and will be arriving at your door shortly. An information brochure explaining the changes accompanies the notice.

When they arrive, please take time to read both carefully...

Why changes in assessment law?

Assessments had become outdated. They had become inequitable in terms of their actual value relationships. Properties having identical market values were assessed at widely differing amounts. This resulted in some owners paying more than their fair share of taxes and others less.

The new law required production of the 1978 assessment roll based on fixed percentages of actual value for each class of property. This means that the inequities will be removed, and that each class of property will be assessed on the same basis. In all, it provides a fairer way to share the cost of essential local services.

What will happen to taxes?

The assessment roll provides the rate base used by municipalities, school boards and other local governments to raise the funds necessary to provide essential local services.

The costs of these services determine the overall amount required to be raised by local property taxes.

The purpose of the change in assessment law is NOT to raise more taxes but to provide a fairer basis upon which to apportion the costs of essential local services more equitably between property owners.

Since assessments are now directly related to actual value, your assessed values may be higher or lower than in previous years. An increase or a decrease in your assessed values from those in effect last year does not

necessarily mean that your property taxes will change significantly. Tax notices based on your new assessed values will be issued later in 1978.

Is my 1978 assessment fair?

As your assessment is now based on a fixed percentage of what your property is worth its fairness can be measured by actual value comparisons.

The Assessor's estimate of your property's actual value (market value) is shown on your 1978 Assessment Notice.

The fairness of your assessment may be determined by comparing the Assessor's estimate of actual value of your property to your own estimate of its current market value as well as by comparing it to the current market values of properties of similar worth.

The percentage of actual value at which each class of property will be assessed is:

Residential - 15% (includes apartments, condominiums, mobile homes, etc.)

Business and Other - 25% (includes commercial, some industrial).

Industrial, Utilities, Machinery and Equipment, Forestry - 30%.

The Assessor and his staff will give you every assistance necessary to properly check your assessment.

What appeal do I have?

Your Assessor is prepared to provide you with a detailed explanation of how your assessment was determined.

If you are dissatisfied with the assessment and wish an independent review, a right of appeal is available to you. The procedure to complain is simple and is fully explained on the reverse of your 1978 Assessment Notice. The deadline for any written appeal is January 20, 1978.

The new assessment method is fully explained in the brochure that will accompany the mailing of your individual Assessment Notices.

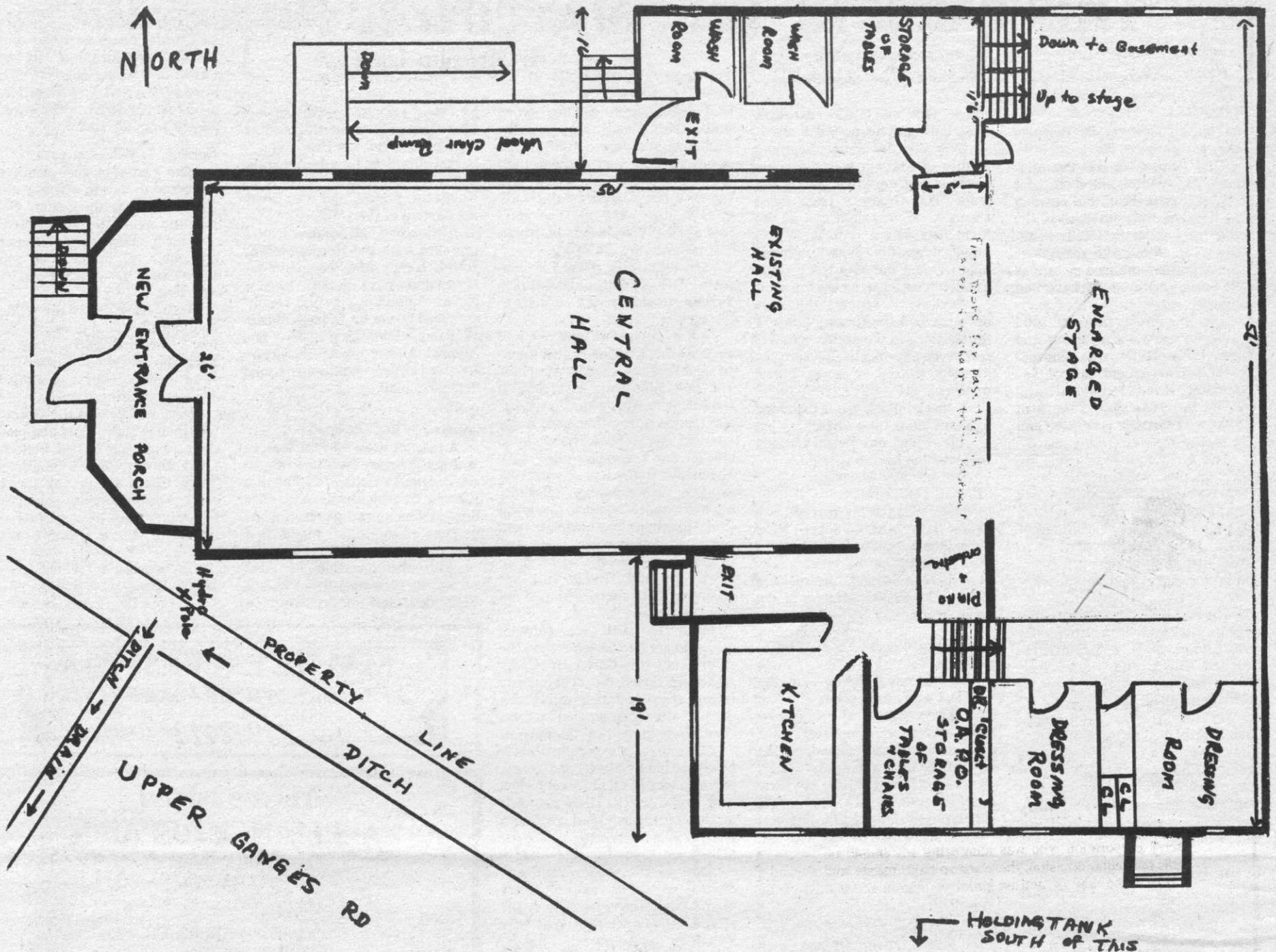

Proposed additions to Central Hall

The above sketch of Central Hall shows the proposed additions of washrooms, kitchen, storage areas, dressing rooms, new stage, stairs and hallways for exits.

Basement will be under the new stage wings, and dressing room area, with entrances on either side.

Because the land area is limited, flat, and non-percing, a holding tank has been installed to the right

of the property. A wheel chair ramp has also been provided on the left, or north side of the building, and additional exits will be noted on both sides. The board of variance has now given approval of the new entrance porch.

Because it is a public building there are more restrictions and rulings than for the average home. The building inspector requires 5/8" gyproc fire walls surrounding stairs, exits, under and around the stage and basement, as well as larger stairs and other requirements which will add greatly to the overall cost of the structure. It is now realized that the extra costs over and above what the Central Hall committee had originally planned for may run from \$10 to \$20,000 higher than funds on hand.

The construction had to be started in October, otherwise the grant of \$11,111.33 from the Department of Recreation and Conservation would have been withdrawn altogether. Without this amount and what the committee had from other sources, the building addition could never have been attempted.

It has now become necessary for the committee to appeal for financial help from the public, something we have not had to do before. To this end a special meeting is being called for Wednesday, Nov. 30 at 8 pm at the Central Hall, requesting that each organization on the island send a representative, as well as any other interested persons, who may be able to help us find ways and means of providing the necessary funds.

It was pointed out to us 10 years ago when the Capital Regional Board came into being that if we were unable to run the hall efficiently, a representative would be sent up from Victoria to run it, and the community would be taxed for it. But we wanted to avoid anything being put on the taxes, and so far have been able to run it without loss.

Please attend the meeting and lend us your support.

We wish to take this opportunity of thanking all those who have already sent donations, some of which were anonymous, to this project.

No more passes

Islander tries every level

A Salt Spring traveller was in a hurry last week. He drove to the ferry and boarded the Queen of the Islands in Fulford. At Swartz Bay, he blithely drove into Victoria and went about his business. Came lunch-time and pangs of hunger and he and his wife went to a city restaurant.

Tragedy! He had left his wallet at home!

His wife depended on her husband for the odd bill and had left with little money and a few credit cards. They were not forced to starve, but paid for lunch by a credit card.

What did it cost to take the ferry back? He racked his brain and could come up with no answer. So he called for information and learned that the ferry rate was \$12 if they had no identity cards.

But he had neither card nor \$12. They were at home, gathering dust on the dressing table or wherever he stores them.

TO THE AUTHORS

His first move was to the Capital Regional District, the authors of his missing card.

The staff expressed their very sincere regret that they had no idea of how to get a duplicate card.

They called the B.C. Ferry Corporation. The first official didn't know how to go about getting a new card or a letter guaranteeing eligibility for a pass; neither did the second official; nor the third; nor the fourth; nor the fifth; nor the sixth. By this time he was beginning to steam freely.

He was an islander. His member was in Victoria and he called Hugh Curtis's office. Nobody home! So he called Hugh's alter ego... which is French for Man Friday... and asked Wayne Steeds to find out how he could get a letter of proof of residence.

He was put on to Jack Davis. The minister didn't know. So he was referred to a senior department official, who summed up the whole issue for him.

There was just no way!

THERE IS NO WAY

According to the minister and every official of the ferry corporation who was answering his phone on this particular occasion, there are no more passes and there is no way of getting proof of eligibility for a pass.

This islander was saddened. In fact, he was hopping, screaming mad. The basic fact that he had dug his own little travel-grave himself did not ease his indignation.

He drove along the Patricia Bay Highway, probably at speeds in excess of the posted kilometre and reached the ferry in time for the 3.45 sailing from Swartz Bay to Fulford.

It was not his day. He followed another island car. As the car sped into the ferry lane, he pursued it relentlessly. That was a mistake. He merely repeated the error of the driver in front and they both found themselves in the Vancouver line-up.

REFRAIN AND TURN ROUND

He manoeuvred around, humming a light-hearted refrain and jammed that damned car in the lane where it belonged! At 3.40 pm he was still in the line-up waiting to board the Queen of the Islands. Slow sale of tickets: new man on the job, he figured.

At this point he was struck with a brilliant scheme. The ticket seller in the booth was weary and run off his feet and the Island driver flourished his papers and bought an island resident's ticket. How he did it will not be revealed for fear of reprisals. But he acquired the ticket he had lusted for and made his way on to the ferry. He found out later that the \$12 was the wrong figure and he could have bought his way home easily.

You can bet he won't go into the big city again without his pass! But what of the unpassed people of the islands? Are they out of luck for ever? -FGR.

SEA WORMS

SHOWN HERE ARE EXAMPLES OF 3 DIFFERENT KINDS OF SEDENTARY MARINE WORMS WHICH MAY BE FOUND AROUND CANADIAN COASTS. THEY RESEMBLE EACH OTHER SUPERFICIALLY, HAVING STOUT BODIES WITH AN EXTENSIBLE ANTERIOR END

PRIAPULID WORM: Up to 80 mm. in length. Burrows into sand and mud leaving only mouth at surface. They prey on slow-moving, soft-bodied animals. Found only in cold waters.

SPOON WORM: Up to 300 mm. in length. Burrows into sand and mud, in which it may build a U-shaped tube. Scoop-like proboscis collects micro-organisms in its sticky secretions. World-wide distribution.

PEANUT WORM: Up to 180 mm. in length. Burrows into sand and mud or lives in rocky crevices or empty snail shells. Tentacles at end of body pick up minute plants and detritus (dead organic matter) settling from sea. World-wide distribution.

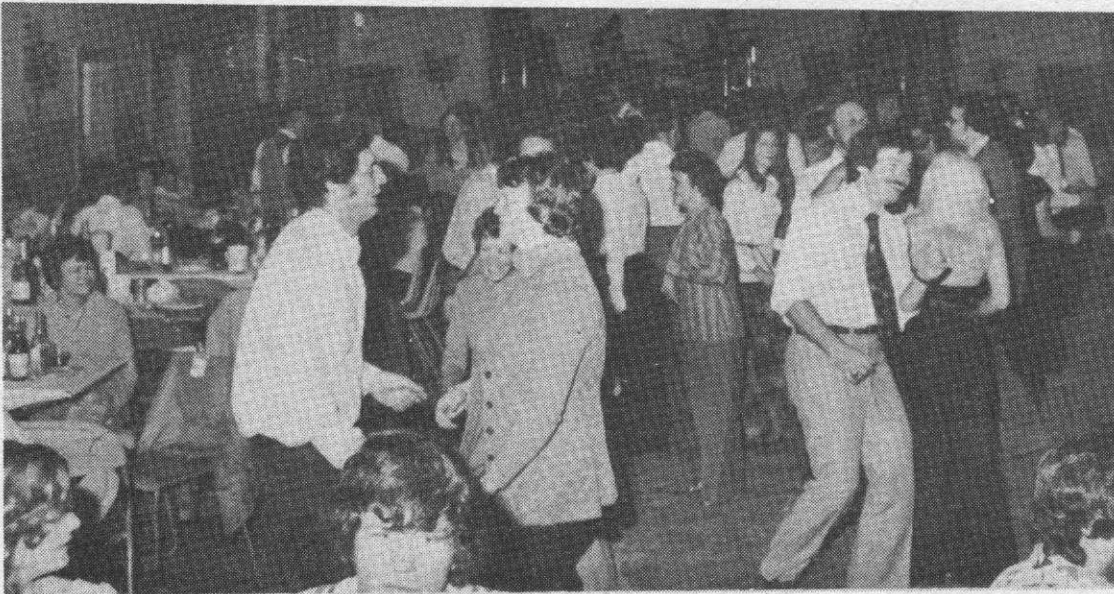

Amendment by-law number 28 is an application for commercial zoning on a residentially zoned property on McPhillips Avenue. It is located adjacent to the library, on

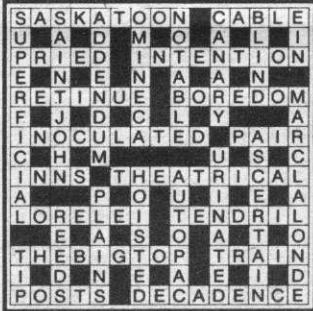
the east side. Applicant is Spencer Marr.


