Parents back School Board as curriculum is debated

Gulf Islands ratepayers have reacted without sharp comment on the proposed core curriculum, Gulf Islands School District was told last week.

In some instances local parents have shown greater sympathy with the islands school district and its proposals in the area of curriculum than the proposals of Education Minister Pat McGeer.

On Thursday afternoon last week the Gulf Islands School Board heard reports on meetings in the district to consider the school curricula.

It was a peaceful meeting, reported Nonie Guthrie of the Ganges meeting last week.

Principal Bob McWhirter was disappointed in the number of people attending, she confided. There were about 50 participants. **NOT UP IN ARMS**

The teachers did not appear to be up in arms against the minister's proposals, she noted, and nobody backed up the BC Teachers' Federation.

The Federation ran a series of advertisements in provincial papers, challenging the core curriculum set out by the minister.

Pearl Brau reported that on the Outer Islands parents appeared quite happy with the work already started by the board on the subject of curriculum.

There were 11 parents at the Galiano meeting and 18 at Mayne she reported.

"The people there appeared to be quite happy with what the board was doing," reported Mrs. Brau, "and they will listen more readily to the board than to McGeer."

He had always thought there was a core curriculum, observed Chairman Charles Baltzer.

Superintendent Bob Huestis suggested that the important aspect of the booklet prepared by the department of education is what is not in it, rather than what is.

Physical education is among the notable absentees, he submitted.

MORE EXAMINATIONS

Outer Island parents gained

the impression that McGeer is aiming to re-introduce examinations, said Mrs. Brau.

"I wish McGeer would come out and state positively that there will be no tests," she told her colleagues.

"I think there will be lots of

tests," responded the superintendent, "but not government examinations."

What happens if he fails his 10 subjects in Grade One, asked Trustee Ivan Mouat.

"We'll buy you a calculator," promised the chairman.

Everything is going up in cost

The rising cost of fuel is reflected in the rising cost of schools in the islands.

Last week Finance committee chairman Trustee Ivan Mouat told the Gulf Islands School Board that fuel costs were estimated at \$12,000 against last year's figure of \$9,000 to allow for anticipated fuel cost increases.

Highway too close to school

Gulf Islands School Board has expressed strong disapproval of any community plan which might bring the main island highway too close to the school grounds.

On Thursday afternoon last week the trustees of the district passed on their objections to the department of highways and the Capital Regional District.

Change or change to new type

Large businesses, using fluorescent lighting in any degree, change the lamp bulbs every three months, Gulf Island School Board was told last week.

Board was considering current reports that fluorescent lights have an adverse effect on students and change a child's personality.

Both the intensity of the light and the vibrations due to flickering are blamed for the phenomenon.

Board is looking at incandescent lights for those areas not requiring too high an intensity, observed Secretary-Treasurer Wilf Peck.

The changing of tubes at frequent intervals anticipates their breaking down and flickering explained Chairman Charles Baltzer.

Secretary-treasurer reported that a new bulb was coming on to the market which would not be subject to the offensive characteristics.

Benjamin recovers at home

Five-year-old Benjamin Clarke, who was hit by a truck outside his home on January 6, is reported to be doing very well.

His father, Joe Clarke, told Driftwood on Tuesday that it will take time for Benjamin to make a full recovery but they are "very pleased with his progress".

He returned home a week ago after spending a month at Royal Jubilee Hospital in Victoria.

Highways Department to enjoy casting vote on size

Department of highways will have the casting vote when the size of Ganges commercial village area is finally established. At the final Ganges planning meeting on Wednesday evening last week Planner Henry Elder explained that the location of the by-pass around Ganges will determine the size of the commercial area.

It was generally agreed that the department is the toughest government department to deal with, although there has been a closer co-operation between the department staff and the public in the past few months.

The meeting examined the

plan and pursued the enquiries already heard at earlier meetings. Dick Lloyd, who identified himself as a "new boy" on the island, asked why large areas of agricultural land reserve were retained in the village. This was particularly significant in respect of the plan for sewers, he suggested.

Already in lot sizes, the properties were available for single-family dwellings, he was told.

LIONS ASK FOR HELP FROM ISLANDERS WHO CAN SEE NEED

The people who get the benefit of Phil Sawford's campaign will never read this.

Phil Sawford, of Hundred Hills, is the chairman of the Gulf Islands campaign for the Canadian National Institute for the Blind. And he is asking for the support of the islanders.

The campaign will buy recreation, entertainment, sports and even vacations for Canadians who are unable to see.

Proceeds will help the afflicted to enjoy life a little more fully despite their disability.

Campaign is launched by the Salt Spring Island Lions Club on behalf of the CNIB. Sawford is a former secretary of the club and a fervent supporter of its campaign for the blind and partially blind.

"If you can read this," said Sawford, "Please help us to help those who can't!"

He emphasized that no proceeds whatsoever are devoted to the costs of appeal or collection. The Lions Club pays the expenses of the current campaign and all contributions are handed over to the Bank of Montreal to be opened and added to the record.

"Every penny," he stressed, "goes to the CNIB."

Contributions may be left at the Bank of Montreal in Ganges or mailed to that branch.

Fisheries research vessel "Veleva" tied up in Ganges Harbour on Monday evening and will remain here for the next six weeks while herring are spawning in local waters.

The 80 ft. long, two-storey barge comes from Nanaimo and will be home to five researchers

and divers until the end of March.

The barge houses a laboratory and equipment in the lower storey and accommodation above for those on board. At present there are nine people on board. After March 1, four of them will go to Barkley Sound, another major herring spawning

area.

The divers on board will be going down to pick up samples of herring spawn, noting the type of bottom and vegetation as they do so, and from there the researchers will take over, studying the quality and quantity of the spawn.

All the data will then be

compiled to determine the population of herring on the coast. This information will then be used to decide what quotas will be imposed upon the herring fishery the following year.

Here come the supertankers!

In recent months we have heard with dismay of tankers of Panamanian and Liberian registry foundering on the east coast of the United States and causing enormous oil spills. In British Columbia people have said to themselves "Thank Heaven it's not happening here".

Not so! Unless something is done to stop it, the supertankers are going to invade our coastal waters.

THE KITIMAT PIPELINE APPLICATION

The Kitimat Pipeline Company is a consortium of U.S.-owned, or controlled, oil companies which has applied for a permit to build a pipeline from Kitimat to Edmonton, designed to transport oil to refineries in the United States.

The pipeline will be 750 miles long and will carry 300,000 barrels per day initially. Later, this will be stepped up to half a million barrels per day.

This company intends to build a marine terminal and a \$40 million storage facility. It also plans to construct two floating docks capable of handling tankers up to 350,000 tons deadweight. They are pressing

for a decision from the Canadian government by July 1 of this year with a view to completing the project by April, 1979. FROM FURTHER AFIELD

While the avowed purpose of the pipeline is to move Alaskan oil to the U.S. the fact is that 66% of the oil will come from Indonesia and the Middle East, probably in tankers of Panamanian and Liberian registry, because the American refineries are not equipped to handle the sour oil from Alaska and a mix of sweet oil is required.

Kenneth Hall, President of Trans-Mountain Pipeline, whose company has withdrawn from the consortium, says that it is not a matter of "whether" there will be a spill, but "when".

There is a 60 mile channel which must be travelled to Kitimat and Ralph Wills of the Federal Hydrographic Protection Service says that this is a treacherous and complicated route for tankers of this size to navigate, especially when we have little knowledge of the ocean currents in that area.

Some of the channel has not yet been charted, although an inter-departmental committee is to undertake this task next summer.

OBVIOUS DANGER

The damage which would flow from an oil spill in that area is obvious.

John Millen, a federal ecological protection officer, says an oil spill would be disastrous, especially if it happened during the herring spawning season.

Millen says "there is also the danger of spoiling good salmon feeding areas in the Kitimat estuary".

Vancouver consultants have warned of the dangers inherent in the project, not only for the fishing industry but also from the pipeline itself it is built through the Telkwa Pass, which is very sensitive and fragile terrain.

WHY KITIMAT

You may well ask yourself, "Why are we even considering a project which has such dangerous possibilities?" The answer is obvious. Ottawa has of necessity been phasing out our exports of crude oil to the U.S.

because of our rapidly diminishing reserves.

The American refineries in the northern and mid-west states are thirsty for oil. The United States is building a pipeline from Prudhoe Bay to Valdez and from there oil will be shipped by tanker to U.S. west coast ports.

But this will not utilize all the Alaskan oil and there is a need for oil in other parts of the United States. The Americans looked at Port Angeles, in the State of Washington, but the residents there rejected this proposition by a 65% vote. Long Beach California, was considered, but discarded on the grounds that the oil vapours would add to the smog problem.

So our American neighbours decided, with unwanted generosity, to transfer their problem to British Columbia. After all, why not?

They said to themselves "Those Canadians have plenty of open spaces; they're a docile lot and all you have to do is tell them the pipeline will create more jobs and tax revenue. They'll buy the idea; we'll get the oil and they'll get the pollution".

ARGUMENTS FOR THE PIPELINE

The American oil companies are good at public relations and they have advanced three arguments for proceeding with the Kitimat pipeline. The first is that this will enable Canada to get oil when our present supplies run out.

The fact is that for the first 10 years of the pipeline's life all oil has been committed to U.S. refineries and after that there is no guarantee whatsoever that Canadians will get one barrel of oil from the pipeline except in the form of oil spills and leakages.

The second argument is that we shall get between two and three thousand jobs during the construction period. But from past experience we know that much of this work will be done by importing specially skilled workers from the U.S.

Kenneth Hall of Trans-Mountain Pipeline says that the permanent jobs will be 120 and the most optimistic figure from the consultants is 200 jobs. Surely that's a poor exchange for wrecking the fishing industry around the Queen Charlotte Islands?

The third enticement we are offered is that the consortium will be paying taxes on their installations and pipeline am-

property owners to clean up their premises in Ganges.

Regional Director George Heinekey told him that at the present time property owners are not allowed to make changes in their property in Ganges.

Only a sanitary sewer system in the area would clear the way for new construction.

There was extensive discussion of the proposed sewer system for Ganges and Director Heinekey announced that he expected a concrete report by the end of the month.

The committee for planning Ganges will study the reports of the meetings and modify the plan in accordance with community trends and preferences.

There will be a further meeting when the Ganges Plan is more nearly final. A public hearing will then be given to the by-law accommodating the plan before it becomes part of the fabric of local regulations.

ounting to some \$25 million a year. Does anyone think this sum of money will compensate us for endangering the livelihood of 2,000 fishermen in the area and for the tremendous cost of cleaning up our shoreline from oil spills?

WHAT CAN WE DO?

Faced with the potential dangers of the Kitimat project, the average citizen may be asking "what can I do to stop it?" Opposition M.P.s have been questioning the responsible Cabinet Ministers.

Environment Minister Romeo LeBlanc says he "hopes" that public hearings can be held - but when? If you are concerned I urge you to join with your fellow citizens in making two demands:

Petition the Federal Government to delay any decision on the Kitimat project until an environmental impact study has been completed and made public.

Petition the government to hold public hearings in the areas affected before allowing the National Energy Board or the Department of Transport to make a final decision on the matter.

Remember that in a democracy, governments are your servants and not your masters. It is your land, your environment and your future which are at stake.

Now is the time to speak out in clear and unmistakable terms and say, "Keep the Tankers Out Of Kitimat!"

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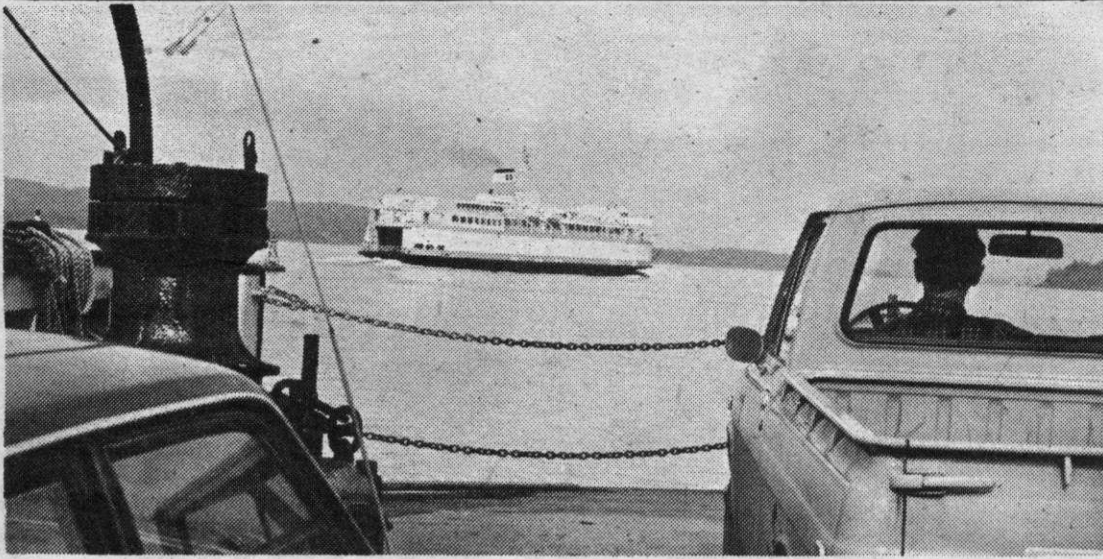

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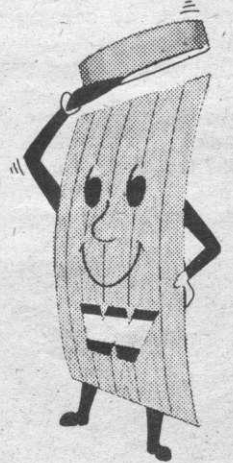
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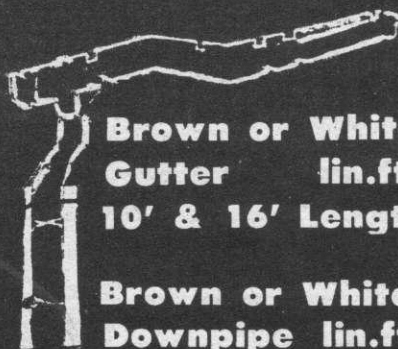


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Mud is feature of District Cup game at Fulford field

INFO/HEALTH

Considerable ritual remains in the practice of medicine. One tradition that seems difficult to modify is the patient's expectation of receiving a prescription at each visit to the doctor.

From earliest times the clinician would prescribe some form of treatment after his consultation with the patient. Not too many decades ago physicians were revered by the number of ingredients and the complexity of their prescriptions.

A certain mysticism existed and a prescription, often mixed by the physician himself, was part and parcel of every medical visit.

CASH RETURN

Part of the ritual, I feel, was the result of the traditional fee paid to the physicians by the patient. I am sure that there were times when the patient felt cheated if he received only verbal advice from his doctor.

After all, every other time he spent his hard earned money he received something in return. The prescription filled this need.

A doctor may spend considerable time explaining the nature of the illness and how to cure it -- many ills are effectively treated without medicines -- but even

today some patients feel that they have been fraudulently treated if they are ushered out of the office without the magic piece of paper.

Unfortunately, doctors can fall into the trap of unnecessarily prescribing drugs. How easy it is to say "take this medicine and you will be better in a few days". The doctor does not add that "you will be better in a few days without any medicine".

IT'S ALL OVER!

Regrettably, the prescription may also be used as a 'reverse' calling card by the doctor -- an unspoken indication that the interview is over.

I must hasten to add that most medicines prescribed by present day physicians are beneficial and necessary, and prescriptions should, of course, be filled and taken as prescribed.

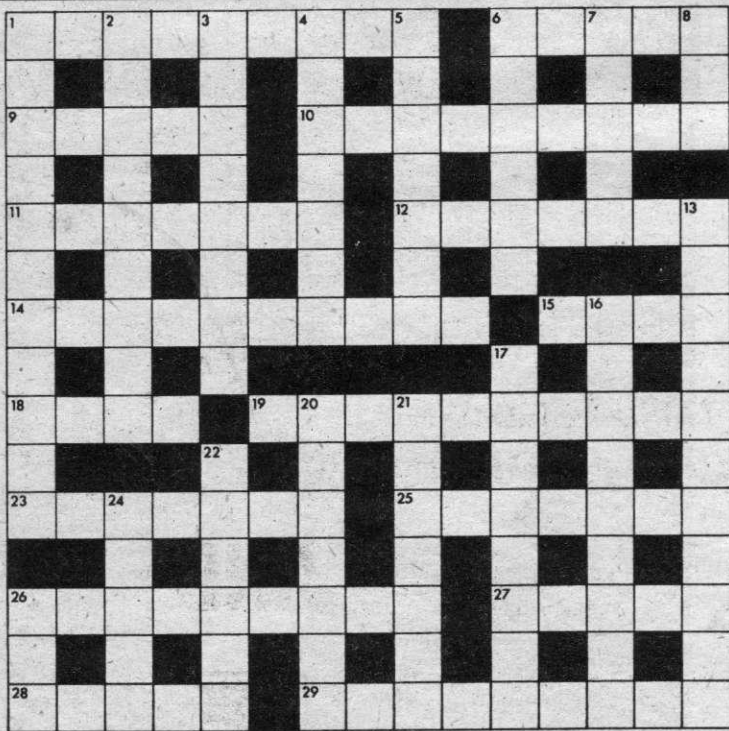
My point is that you, as a patient, should not be disappointed if you do not receive a prescription every time you leave your doctor's office. A prescription when necessary, but not necessarily a prescription!

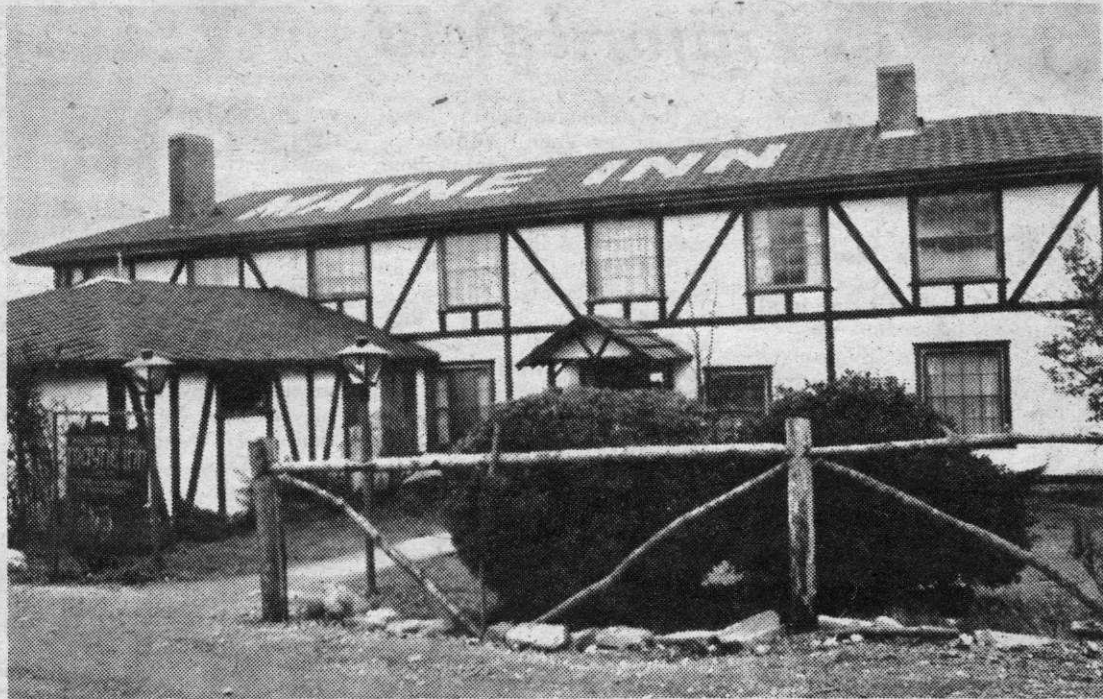

The popular island hostelry, operated by owners Anne and Weldon Pinchin, has never looked back.

There isn't a long history to look back on.

The brick company prospered until the outbreak of the First World War and the crews disappeared across the world to fight in France. The works closed and never re-opened.

For 30 years the Mayne Inn remained closed and empty. In 1942, the Second World War reversed the First War pattern and the building was re-opened as a hotel. It has served in this capacity for the past 35 years.

Mayne Inn was acquired by its present owners in November, 1975.

The resort stands overlooking Bennett Bay, about three miles from the Village Bay ferry wharf. The bay boats one of the few shady beaches on the island.

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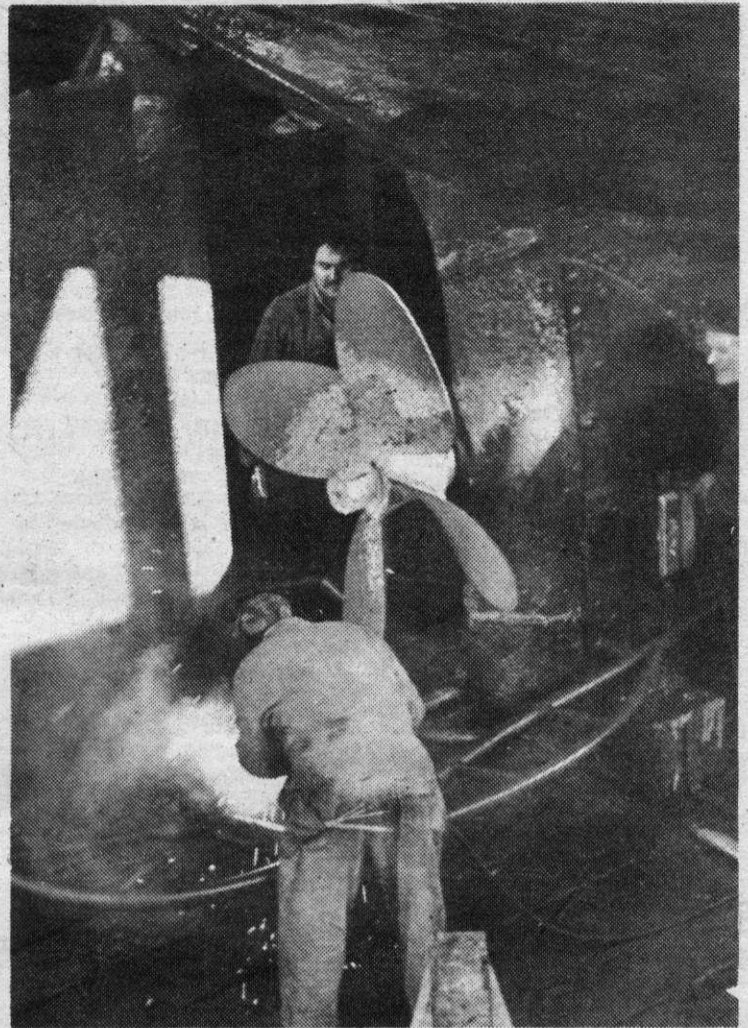
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Herring season opens on coast



Welders' Torches are busy in west coast shipyards as operators of about 200 seine and 1,300 gillnet boats prepare for this spring's herring roe fishing season expected to start in early March. Second only to B.C.'s salmon fishery in dollar value, the herring industry now employs about 3,500 fishermen, 6,000 shoreworkers and a wide

variety of specialists in maintenance and supply industries. At the other end of the operation is Salt Spring Island Sea Products plant in Ganges. After the shipyards and the fishermen have done their stint the Rainbow Road fish plant processes the herring and ships out the roe for export to Japan.

Nutrition workshop takes new look at island table and beyond

Nutrition workshop launched by the Salt Spring Island Community Society and the island Anglican Parish of Salt Spring Island, will be staged on Saturday and Sunday, Feb. 26 and 27. It is part of the Thought for Food program on Salt Spring Island.

Program, under the direction of Phyllis Coleman and Alan Martin, will cover the value of food and the lack of value of some diets.

On Saturday the program ranges from the definition of food, proteins, amino acids, unsaturated fats, carbohydrates, sugars, vitamins and minerals, to nutritional therapy.

Choice of foods for an optimum diet, supplements, the value of the North American diet and the need for meat, eggs and dairy products will be discussed.

The workshop will examine the popular diets, vegetarianism, obesity diets, fad diets and macrobiotics.

FOOD ADDITIVES

There will be a discussion on food additives, nutritional deficiencies and excesses as well as diets for hypoglycemia, arthritis, heart disease, cancer and diabetes.

The discussions will also face the negative aspect of food and consider fasting.

On Sunday the workshop will veer towards world nutrition.

Major world health problems, protein malnutrition and caloric malnutrition will be considered. It will look at famine, protein complementation and a film, Hunger in America.

The Nutrition Canada report will be examined and its application to the individual will be considered.

Committee formed to study dog control

— At Farmers' Institute meeting

A committee has been named by the Salt Spring Island Farmers' Institute to look into the problem of dog control on the island.

The committee was formed upon the suggestion of Mike Byron at the annual meeting of the Institute on Wednesday evening of last week. Members of the committee are Paddy and Ted Akerman, Merv Walde, Michael Murray and Gary Kaye.

The problem is fast becoming a serious one as new reports of sheep being attacked and mauled by dogs come in every week. There are many rules and regulations governing the control of dogs commented Jan Harkema, chairman of the group, the problem lies with enforcing those rules. Paddy Akerman suggested that perhaps dog owners could be educated in some way to help combat the problem. Ted Akerman suggested neutering and spaying dogs as such an operation results in a more apathetic attitude on the part of the dog. He also recommended that license fees be raised for unspayed dogs.

FARMERS MARKET

Dave Phillips, who has acted as liaison officer between the Institute and the Farmers' Mar-

ket, reported that the Market had been very successful over the past year, with good turn-outs during the summer months.

"But if it is to continue, it should get some kind of accommodation," he told the meeting.

Mr. Phillips proposed that the Institute sell its warehouse in Ganges and purchase a more suitable property for staging the Market. Jake Buitenwerf countered the proposal by saying that in Europe farmers' markets were held in places similar to Centennial Park, where the local market has been held, and that they were highly successful. The costs involved in the construction of a building would be prohibitive, he added. Mr. Phillips replied that he was looking into the future, and that the present location was indeed a satisfactory one for the present.

TRANSPORTATION

Ted Akerman brought up the problems facing island farmers in regard to transport of livestock on the ferries.

"It's not good for the animals when you have to wait in a ferry line-up for a few hours at a time," said Mr. Akerman.

He suggested the Institute work towards getting priority on loading for farm vehicles carrying livestock. He also suggested

that ferry fares be lowered for all farm vehicles, with or without a load.

GOVERNMENT GRANT

Mike Byron reported that a Federal Government Work Program grant for about \$14,000 had been applied for. The grant would give work to six students from Gulf Islands Secondary School for one week during both of May and June and then full-time during July and August. He said there was work to be done on school property at both Fulford and Ganges for use by students interested in agriculture. Some field crops will be planted as well with the help of Jack James. Mr. Byron also said that those students involved would also be available for help in preparing for the Fall Fair.

NEW DIRECTORS

Five directors for the coming year were named by the meeting. Jan Harkema, who will serve another term as chairman, Paddy Akerman, Dave Phillips and Mike Byron. Bev Byron will replace Isobel Marr as secretary-treasurer.

Pat Lee will head the Fall Fair committee this year, Mike Byron will serve as Membership Chairman and Dave Phillips will continue to work with the Farmers' Market.

Fisheries research vessel

Haegele, from the Pacific Biological Station at Nanaimo, are in charge of the operation.

Mr. Haegele told Driftwood that each herring lays approximately 12,000 to 30,000 eggs, which will hatch two weeks later. The young herring will remain in local waters until the Fall, feeding mainly on the larvae of

oysters and barnacles. At that time, most of them will leave the Gulf, going as far as 150 miles off the West Coast, where they will feed on small shrimp known as euphausiids, the major diet of the herring.

The herring fishery is due to open on February 27 in the Gulf and the quota has been set at 10,000 tons. The total quota for the whole coast is about 90,000 tons.

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Dog control taken over by Region

Dog control and sheep protection have, for decades, been the responsibility of the department of agriculture.

Regional Director George Heinekey reported on Friday that the Capital Regional District has been asked to take over the function.

A new regional by-law is under preparation now, said Heinekey and a full-time animal control officer will be appointed to Salt Spring Island.

The domestic animal controller was employed until last year by the provincial government. Cost of the new program will be levied against islanders, through the regional district.
