## Dr. Arneil gains closer awareness of Ganges

— TAKES PART IN TOUR

Use of holding tanks for sewage in the Ganges area was the subject of discussions at a recent Capital Regional Board meeting in Victoria.

Last week the Regional Community Health Committee came to the island to examine the picture and to better understand the need.

Chairman of the committee, Director W.A. Noel told Driftwood that his committee could well understand the need and that his committee would hold a meeting prior to the next board meeting in order to reach an agreement and to prepare a recommendation for the board.

He was being interviewed on television, when an island wag warned him to be careful what he was about to say.

**I'M WITH YOU!**

The chairman assured the gathering that he was not critical.

"I'm with you all the way!" he assured his listeners.

Regional Health Officer Dr. A.S. Arneil was less expansive.

He had enjoyed the opportunity of a first-hand examination of the community, he said, on leaving and it would help him to reach a decision.

"I don't want to be too harsh and I don't want to be too lenient," he explained.

The use of holding tanks will be finally adjudicated by Dr. Arneil.

**LIMITED WORK**

This provision would enable Ganges property owners to con-

tinue with limited structural alterations despite the fact that there is no sewer system here. Such tanks would be pumped out regularly and the contents dumped in areas already set aside for the reception of the contents of septic tanks.

In the meantime, the sewer committee is awaiting news of the provincial government's suggestion that the community might be assisted in its plans with a pilot treatment plant. It is hoped to install a biothermal treatment unit designed by Salt Spring Island scientist, Dr. Lionel Coulthard, of the University of British Columbia.

Don's done it again!

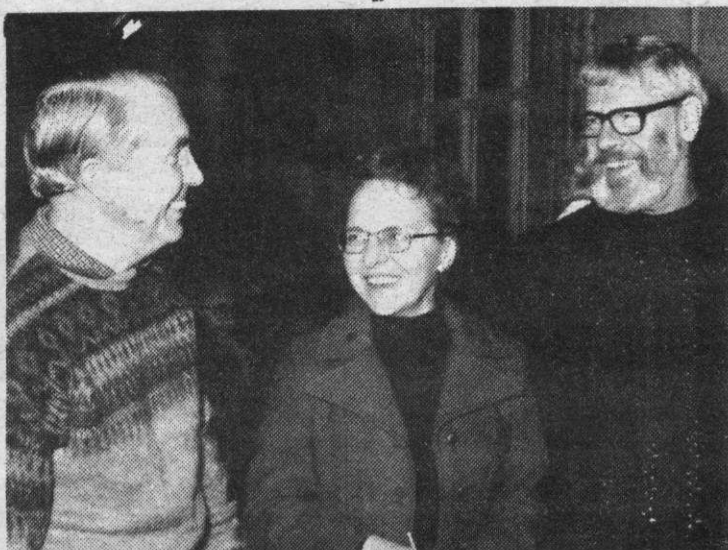
When Don's Radio and TV is closed at the beginning of March it will be because the Texas-voiced proprietor, Don Perkins, is off to Hawaii.

## Benger heads Club as

# Directors retire after abuse over logging in Bluffs Park last year

The 52nd annual meeting of The Galiano Club held on Saturday night elected Basil Benger president for 1977. Charlie Partington was elected vice-president, with Mrs. Joan Carolan, secretary and Miss Jane Rule, treasurer.

There were 126 members in attendance to hear reports of Club activities in the past year and elect the new officers. Arthur Platt's report on the financial condition of the Club showed a healthy balance in the general funds in spite of the very heavy expenditure on hall repairs during the past year.

President Jean Lockwood gave a full report on the work done by the 1976 committee, including the raising of funds through various projects, the staging of the two large community children's parties and the annual arts, crafts and hobby show.

### GARBAGE DUMP

Responsibility for the maintenance of the local garbage dump has been an irksome task, she said, to a committee whose principle function according to the by-laws is the promotion of social and cultural activity within the community. The Galiano Club undertook to raise the money needed each year for the dump when it was moved to its present location and some corporate body needed to be responsible for it.

The meeting supported the move of the 1976 committee in appealing to the Capital Regional District to hold a referendum this year and have the maintenance costs put under taxation.

A letter was sent to Jim Campbell, Chairman of the Regional Board some weeks ago, giving notice that the Galiano

Club would not be responsible for the dump after this year, but there has been no acknowledgment to date.

### THEY NEVER REPLIED

Miss Lockwood reported that several years ago a similar attempt was made to interest the Regional Board in this problem and help Galiano find a solution, but at that time not one letter was ever answered. It is hoped that the local governing body will not continue to ignore the request for help.

In reply to a question from the floor, the president stated that the investigation being carried out by her committee last year as to the possibility of taking timber off the back part of Bluffs Park property had been dropped after the public meeting in December.

It was up to the new commit-

tee to take the matter further if it wished to do so. With the exception of one person, her entire committee refused to stand for re-election to office as a result of the personal abuse levelled at them on this matter by a small group of Islanders.

### STANDING OVATION

Following the President's report O.H. New moved a warm vote of thanks to the chairman and her committee for the work they had done during the year and they were given a standing ovation by three-quarters of those present.

Elected to serve on the executive committee for 1977 were Terry Champion, Bob Knowles, Zona Macdonald, Bert Mozley, Sonia Maans, Pip Finnis, Marie Hardy and May Ferguson, with Cecil Gore as runner-up.

# Drycleaning plant opens on Salt Spring Island as MacPhersons take plunge

Newest business venture on Salt Spring Island is the Salt Spring Drycleaners on Lower Ganges Road, in the new Lancer Building and immediately next door to the Court House.

The drycleaning business is the brainchild of Mr. and Mrs. Gary MacPherson. The couple have launched the business and Pat MacPherson is looking after it.

Gary is manager of the Top Floor at Mouat's.

Located in a bright and pleasant building, the new business is equipped with new machinery and nothing is less than current model.

There's more to managing a drycleaning establishment than operating the machinery. Pat has undertaken a series of courses in Vancouver on the operation of the cleaning and pressing equipment as well as the treatment of fabrics and the recognition of different materials.

The same course also explained how to tackle different stains and blemishes on clothing brought in for cleaning.

### EMERGENCY ROUTE

Even after a long course on cloths and clothing, Pat has an emergency system. If she finds a stain in some materials she hasn't encountered before, she has a 24-hour service which will tell her, by telephone what measures to take in the handling of almost every type of material in the world.

The cleaning machine is the big feature of the place. It is either operated manually, when the operator presses the appropriate

button for each operation, or it is automatic. A card is inserted into the reader and the machine will then go through the routine appropriate for whatever materials or garments are inside.

By this system, the cards tell the machine what the fabrics are and the machine is pre-set to adopt the proper temperature time and routine for the contents.

It's not as simple as you might think.

The drum contains the clothes and the operator sets it running. It must take in the drumful of solvent. Odorless and non-flammable, the solvent is brought up from a reservoir. Like a washing machine, the cleaner runs the clothes through

until it is switched into the spinning and draining cycle.

### PRE-SET DISCHARGE

There are three reservoirs and the machine is pre-set to discharge the remaining solvent into its appropriate container.

When the solvent is finished with, it runs through a still, to be cleaned ready for the next load.

Any water-soluble, or other resistant blemishes are handled at this point.

A second machine, equipped with steam and a vacuum tray, is used for the water-soluble stains.

Various other equipment is employed for more sophisticated problems.

### YOU'VE SEEN IT BEFORE!

The rest of it is old hat to everyone who has seen a cleaners' at work. There are the presses and the spongers and the dummies and the coat is ready.

The steam is produced in an electric boiler hidden away in an insulated closet.

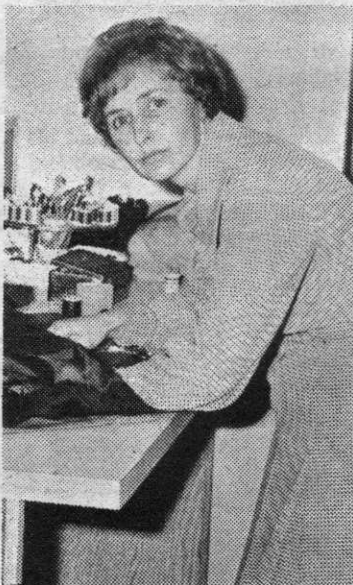
End of the road is the power-driven clothes rack.

Inga Villadsen is there to do a quick fix on small sewing work in connection with the cleaning job.

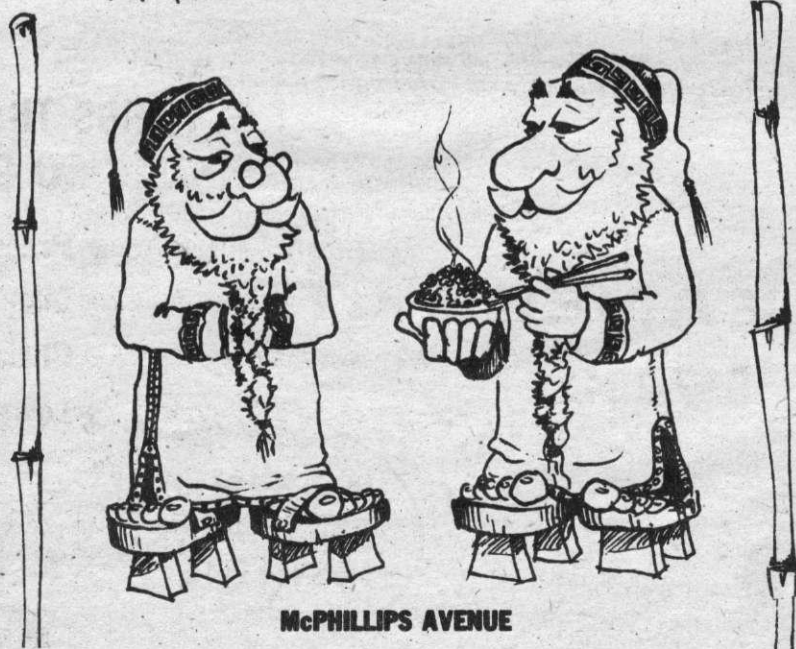

**Want to do a swap?**

**Island couple will show you how**

Have you ever thought about swapping your home with someone far away as a means of arranging a comfortable and inexpensive summer holiday?

Charles and Marion Woolley, Salt Spring Island, did just that a few years ago, following Mr. Woolley's retirement from the airline and travel industry.

Not only did they enjoy their home exchange holiday, but they liked the entire concept so much that they have now become owners of their own Canadian-based home-exchange program.

The service they provide is simply called Canadian Holiday Home Exchange (C.H.H.E.), which they took over from its Ottawa-based managers one year ago.

Since then, the Woolleys, with plenty of time on their hands, have been operating C.H.H.E. out of their Ganges, British Columbia retirement home.

According to Mr. Woolley, house-swapping is a relatively new concept in Canada, but is a well-established practice in Great Britain and the United States.

The home-exchange program has been given a great boost through the development by Air Canada of transatlantic and domestic charter class fares - which have kept pre-planned vacation travel within the financial range of tourists both in Canada and abroad.

"Aside from cutting down on expenses, lots of people prefer a home atmosphere to costly hotel or motel accommodation with limited facilities, particularly during a long vacation," said Mr. Woolley.

"While we are based in Canada, we operate in other countries," he explained. "We have subscribers in the United States, the Caribbean, Europe and the United Kingdom."

The service the Woolleys

offer is basic, in that they publish a Canadian Holiday Home Exchange Directory, both for parties wishing to offer their own homes in exchange for other holiday residences listed in the directory, and to others interested simply in finding out what is on the market.

The Woolleys do not become involved in the actual home exchange itself, leaving this to the subscribers to work out among themselves.

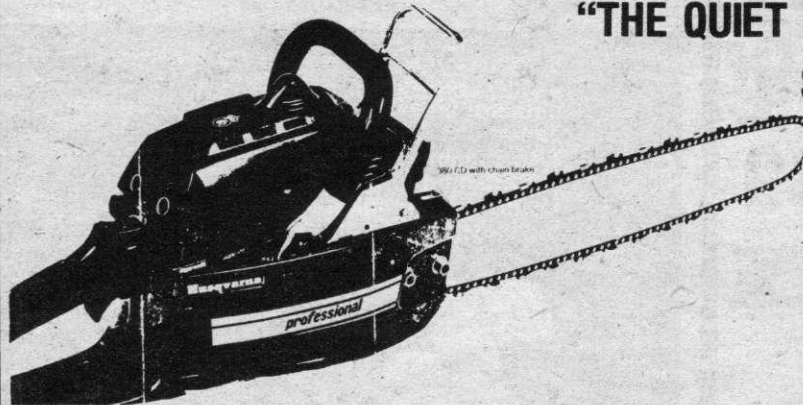

The Douglas version he said, was "Behind every successful man there is a surprised mother-in-law".

But Douglas left his listeners with more than a laugh. He touched on issues affecting Canadians today - from Quebec to the proposed Kitimat oil pipeline.

A Kitimat pipeline could be disastrous for the west coast of Canada," he said. "It's a horrendous proposition. We won't get one barrel out of it except for what spills on our beaches."

He added that the Canadian government had, in all likelihood, already made a deal with the American government for the Kitimat line, but he urged the local party to fight against it. "We are a handful against 26 of the biggest oil companies in the world."

**NOT RETIRING**

Douglas also said he would not be retiring from the party even though he would no longer be seeking political office. When the current parliament is dissolved, he will not be running again, but he will still be working for socialism in Canada and the world, he said.

"Wherever I am, I will be working to carry out what we all began so many years ago."

He said at least half his time would be spent working for the Douglas-Coldwell Foundation, an NDP foundation which, he said, he would be working through to bring world-renowned lecturers and leaders to Canada on Speaking tours.

Douglas was presented with a cheque for the foundation by the local party along with a giant card signed by party members, and a cake. Cowichan-Malahat MLA Barbara Wallace was on hand, along with Ladysmith Mayor Bob Stuart to say their final goodbyes to the MP.

**NEVER MORE PROUD**

Mrs. Wallace, who gave the official thank you for the Sam Guthrie Club, said that she had never been more proud, yet never had a more difficult job to do.

The Cowichan-Malahat MLA traced Douglas' life through the 41 years he has been in both federal and provincial politics. It was 41 years ago last Friday, she said, that he made his first speech in the House of Commons.

"Douglasisms," she said, would go down in the history of the country and the party.

"The stories of Tommy Douglas are almost parables in the party."

Mrs. Wallace later said that although the Saturday night party was the official farewell to the veteran MP, Douglas would not be dropping out of sight.

"We decided to have it (the party) now, because after the next election is called, there won't be the time," she said.

the fledgling railway out of one of its many financial crises.

The park entrance is reached via a highway interchange just east of the bridge which crosses the Columbia River at Revelstoke. A 16-mile (26-kilometre) road, first begun in 1911, switchbacks right up to the mountain summit, 6,375 feet (1913 metres) above sea level.

There, at the park lookout, arrows identify the panorama of peaks and glaciers that crowd the sky -- triple-peaked Mt. Begbie, Mt. Cartier, and 8,620-foot (2586-metre) Mount Courcier -- giants of the Selkirk and Monashee Ranges.

There are no campgrounds or overnight accommodations in the park itself, but over 18 motels and five private campgrounds are close at hand, in and around the town of Revelstoke.

**ALL YEAR ROUND**

The park is open all year round. Winter features cross-country skiing from early December to late March. The Revelstoke Ski Club, formed in 1915, was a pioneer in championship ski-jumping.

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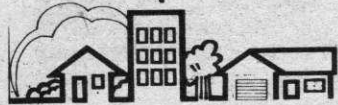

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# Recreation Commission enjoyed revenue of near \$30,000 in 1976

Salt Spring Island Recreation Commission enjoyed a revenue of \$29,435.65 in 1976.

According to the financial statement recently accepted by the Commission, this revenue was derived mainly from the tax levy, which amounted to \$24,377.71. In addition, the Commission received \$4,000 from the Gulf Islands School District as the school share of the groundsman's salary.

Other minor revenue was derived from the administration grant of \$300, swimming fees, \$299.50 and earned interest, \$458.44.

Grants were made as follows: Old Age Pensioners, \$750; Library, \$300; Trail and Nature, \$75; S.S. Players, \$200; Riding Club, \$1,000; Guides and Brownies, \$150; Beaver Point Community Hall Assn., \$100; Firemen (fireworks), \$315.

The Commission helped oth-

er groups with expenses such as sports and travel. These were:

Little League, \$400; Soccer, \$300; Roller Hockey, \$250; Softball, \$250; Game equipment, \$71.42; Advertising, \$90.71.

**SWIMMING COSTS**

Swimming was one of the heaviest commitments, with an expenditure of \$908.07 in 1976 and allowance of \$1,100 for the 1977 program in Duncan.

These grants and provisions for specific purposes took

\$6,160.20

Field and park maintenance was the biggest undertaking.

Truck and tractor rental cost \$1,386; wages, \$11,804; deductions, \$617; equipment repairs and maintenance, \$789.46; seed and fertilizer, \$538.18; ditching, \$320; supplies, \$651 and utilities, \$271.36, for a total of \$16,377.65. Capital equipment added another \$790.20 and provision of \$4,000 for the purchase of a tractor, grass-cutter and trailer in 1977 made a grand total of \$21,167.85.

Equipment purchased in 1976 included a green machine, steel tennis net and storage shed.

## Resume of problems is heard over radio

Resume of the history of Ganges sewage problems was offered over CBC radio on Monday morning.

Sequel to recent publicity over the situation in the commercial area of Ganges was an invitation to Henry Elder to speak of the development of the community in his capacity of chairman of the Ganges Sewer Committee.

Mr. Elder recalled the concern of the community several years ago when the effluent from septic tanks ceased to run off and lay on the ground to become clearly evident. The effect was that this water ran into the harbour and caused discoloration and was an invitation for the development of algae.

The community pursued plans for the establishment of a sewer system in the area between Lady Minto Hospital and the Embe Bakery.

The Pollution Control branch approved the application and issued a permit.

When SPEC protested that the effect of the plan would be to cause pollution of the harbour, the appeal group of the branch, the Pollution Control Board, supported the protest and cancelled the permit.

The cancellation led to the formation of the present committee, he recalled.

The new committee examined the methods open to the community of treating sewage, he told his radio audience. It was at this time that the committee encountered the research already carried out by Prof. Lionel Coulthard, an agricultural engineer at the University of British Columbia.

Prof. Coulthard has developed a system of treatment which has proved efficacious in the range of experience so far enjoyed. The solids in the sewage are separated from the liquid and the bacteriological action is permitted to generate heat up to a very high level.

The final material is dry, clean and very high in protein, noted the chairman.

**FEED OR FERTILIZER**

The final product could be treated and fed to animals, he suggested, or used as a fertilizer.

In the meantime, the liquid is subjected to treatment. The committee has investigated the available means of such treatment and has settled for a Swiss process, known as the Rohrer system.

The treatment methods proposed are of an entirely new type and the provincial government has already expressed interest in their use and their adaptation to other islands up and down the coast, where the same problems might well be encountered.

The province has expressed some interest in taking part in the experimental plant to the extent of making a contribution to the cost of the treatment system.

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
