

David Anderson, veteran of federal and provincial elections and a nationally-known environmentalist, has been named Liberal candidate in the islands.

On Saturday evening 200 people attended the Liberal nomination meeting in Mill Bay, to give Anderson a resounding support.

The Sooke-based Liberal will meet Donald Taylor, Conservative; Jim Manly, NDP, and Ernie Knott, Communist when the Cowichan-Malahat-Islands riding goes to the polls.

Vote was 144 to 53.

Defeated candidate Jim Campbell is Saturna director on the Capital Regional Board and chairman of that board.

At the beginning of the meeting, Campbell expressed regret at the apparent number of Anderson supporters from outside the riding. Later Anderson suggested to Driftwood that the delegates who appeared to be from outside were, in fact, residents of the riding. About one-quarter of the riding is in the Victoria postal area, he remarked.

FEDERAL MEMBER

Anderson was a federal member in Esquimalt-Saanich where he won the seat earlier held for many years by General George Pearkes, VC.

In 1972 he left the federal scene to assume the provincial leadership of the Liberal Party. While he was in Ottawa he became a national figure over his unyielding stand as an environmentalist.

During the nomination meeting Campbell was described as a practical man. He spoke for improved employment conditions for young people.

The Cowichan estuary was the subject of Anderson's comments. Fisheries, recreation and tourism

are the activities which should be encouraged, there, he urged.

SHOULD BE PROTECTED

He feels strongly that the Cowichan estuary should be protected from industrial development. He would refuse to support any cabinet minister who supported any measure which would not afford protection to the estuary, he told the meeting.

The Cowichan-Malahat-Islands riding is a group of separate communities with no central point and little in common with each other, he observed.

And it's a long way round. He referred to the distance between Saturna and Port Renfrew.

"The campaign will be fought in all parts of the riding, he told Driftwood afterwards. "Not just in the populous Cowichan Valley centres."

Mobile intensive learning experience

MILE program brings 17 tacky college students to Salt Spring

If you noticed anything tacky around Ganges at the beginning of the week, it was probably brought about by 17 visitors to Salt Spring from Toronto.

Known as the Jasperettes, they were on their way to California when they dropped by on Salt Spring looking for alternate lifestyles and anything theatrical.

Word of their arrival here spread quickly, due mainly to the fact that one of the two vans they were travelling in bore the inscription, "Jasperettes, if it's Tacky - Do it."

The Jasperettes are not to be confused with baton-twirling majorettes nor are they a drum and bugle corps. Most of them are college students and all of them were on Salt Spring as part of a

college program that takes the students out of the classroom.

MILE

The program is known as MILE: mobile intensive learning experience, and 25 such miles take place every year, with students taking part coming from a college in Toronto. In its seventh year, the MILE program costs each participant \$525 for five weeks of travel.

The group that was on Salt Spring were taking two credit courses on this particular MILE: theatre and alternate lifestyles.

To put it very briefly and very simply, the Jasperettes' study of the two courses entails seeing presentations by various theatrical groups and visiting communes or looking into any lifestyle that differs from the norm.

Members of the group vary in age from 18 to 35 years and two of the 17 people are instructors.

In addition to their two credit courses, the students are learning a lot about themselves, they told me. They began their trip two weeks ago and most of them hadn't known each other before then. Nevertheless, they describe themselves as being a very tight group, a close family, with "lots of love, sharing and communicating".

WITH HUTTERITES

A few of them took part in a MILE last year and spent time with a Hutterite community in Alberta and moving west, staying at author Ken Kesey's farm in Oregon.

"We experienced the Hutterites instead of reading about them," one of them said.

Basically, they said, the MILE is intensive learning and experiencing that cannot be done in a classroom.

Why come to Salt Spring? A few of them had heard of the place from others in Toronto.

"We heard that Salt Spring was a worthwhile place to visit," they explained.

Service gains new manager

Telephone Answering Service on Salt Spring Island has been taken over by a new manager. Rosalie Miles, of Miles Mimeo, has taken over the management in place of Pamela Jay, who launched the project and nursed it into life.

The Answering Service is a non-profit operation, providing a service to businessmen and others who cannot attend their telephones during the day.

Proceeds from the service are devoted to two functions for the handicapped.

They help to support the Achievement Centre and the Handicapped Society. The service also trains handicapped people in office skills.

The answering service and the secretarial service have been combined since last August. During that time a number of people have been helped in office training and several of them have gone on to full-time work.

There are now no handicapped people on the island in need of the training.

Having brought the service to its present stage of accomplishment, Pamela Jay has left to resume gainful employment.

Secretarial services offered by the program have been expanded with the addition of the Miles Mimeo machines. A greater range of duplicating services will be offered, says Mrs. Miles.

People on the government's Incentive Program or handicapped persons will be able to learn duplicating, billing and other office procedures.

Mrs. Miles hopes to expand the answering service to cover the evenings and week ends. She is contemplating the engagement of writers who need "studio space" and would undertake the duties for a small salary. She is also inviting artists to exhibit their work at the service office in the Valcourt Mini-Mall.

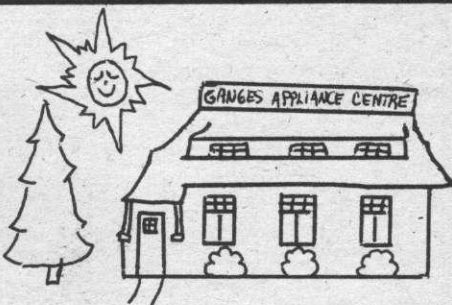

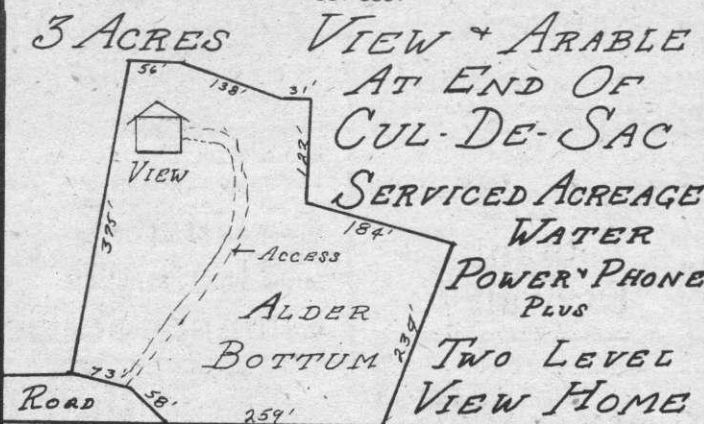

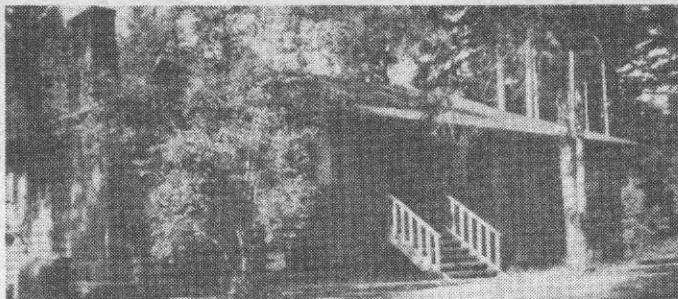

Participation runs planned

Are you feeling sluggish about your body? Or maybe you're in great shape and want to stay that way.

Whether the first or second description fits, Participation Runs are designed for you.

Participation Runs are a series of runs to be held on Salt Spring Island each Sunday at 10 am rain or shine.

Don't let the word 'runs' scare you. It is used in a liberal sense. You can run, walk, run-walk, or crawl the run; competition is not the emphasis, participation is.

Every participant will receive a ribbon, every time he joins in a run. The first man and the first woman to finish will receive a small medal in recognition of their achievement and as an incentive to the others to try and better their own time each week.

An additional reward system will work this way. Each time a participant reaches a 25-mile mark

he will receive a special medal commemorating the occasion. If you come to a Participation Run each week you will, of course, reach the 25 mile mark that much sooner. However, there is not pressure to commit yourself to running on a regular basis. It is hoped that people will try to make it one of their weekly habits.

You may have assumed by now that the courses and the lengths of the runs will vary each week.

The longer runs (four miles or more) will have a halfway turning back point for those who wish to use it.

Ideas for routes will be welcomed from the participants. In fact, it is hoped that a co-operative spirit will evolve as the programme continues.

Pre-schoolers to O.A.P.'s are invited to join in. Bring the whole family or come alone. It is strongly recommended that everyone planning to come out gets the "go sign" from a physician, particularly if

they are not accustomed to this type of exercise.

Volunteers are needed to perform a variety of important tasks such as taking names and finishing times, providing liquid refreshments, distributing awards etc.

It is necessary to request \$1 per participant for your first run to cover the initial costs. For subsequent runs this amount will be reduced and possibly eliminated altogether if financial support is found.

The first run is four miles with a turning back point for those who only wish to make it a 2 mile run. It is scheduled for Sunday, June 4 at 10 am.

The starting place is at the corner of Fulford-Ganges and Cusheon Lake Roads.

Attendance conference held in Richmond

School board discusses absenteeism

To school trustee David Stacey it seemed an expensive way to carry out a work shop when he told his fellow trustees at last week's school board meeting of the attendance conference at Richmond in which he took part.

"It cost us \$10,000 to come up with recommendations which were obvious," he said.

Adding that what came out of it were "Things we already knew", he asked district superintendent Bob Huestis if any of the workshop's results would be of any help to the ministry of education.

Replying that he thought they would be of help, Huestis talked of one of the speakers, an attendance counsellor from Ontario. Six years ago, he said, that province changed the Public Schools Act in order to make it mandatory for school districts to employ an attendance counsellor. Working outside the school, they try to get students back into the school by dealing, for instance, with family problems. There are now 600 counsellors in Ontario, said the superintendent. **OPERATION SCOOP**

Stacey said that another method of getting students in

school that was discussed at Richmond was one known as Operation Scoop. Used in a Vancouver school district, it employed two policemen in an unmarked car who waited around an area where a lot of thefts were occurring.

They were able to catch students in the act of committing a crime, "scooped" them up and returned them to their school.

"The crime rate dropped," said Stacey. "It seemed to satisfy the needs of the police and got the kids back to school."

A number of trustees expressed the belief that absenteeism, in many cases, was not objectionable. David Stacey pointed out that his daughter had gone to England for 10 days and during that time had been marked absent from school. Yet the trip was educational, he noted.

Anne Foerster suggested that perhaps there should be an absent with leave classification.

"A case could be made for non-compulsory attendance, too," observed Ivan Mouat.

Running is his life

Everybody knows Bob Anderson runs to Ottawa for Big Brothers

Everybody knows Bob Anderson. Tall, thin Gulf Islands Ferry Terminal Agent, is a runner. He runs to work and he runs home. He runs across Europe and he runs back to the airport.

He has run home first in the Salt Spring Lions Walkathon so often that he knows every soft oil spot on Fulford-Ganges Road. Anderson is extending his experience. He's running to Ottawa.

He left Salt Spring Island on Friday night, to face a run from Victoria to Nanaimo. Then he ferried to Vancouver and took over at Abbotsford.

And if any reader wonders why even a keen runner would run all the way to Ottawa, it's for the Big Brother movement. Big Brothers are sponsoring the long trot. To ease up the picture, the eight runners participating don't have to run the whole distance. It's a relay run. Each team runs about 10 miles and is relieved by another team.

REST TEAM

Two men run and two drive the escort vehicle behind them. They switch at 10 mile intervals. About 60 or 70 miles down the road is the resting team, in a 40-foot motor home and a 20-foot camper van.

Big Brothers have also arranged local runners, who meet the relay teams in the larger centres and join them for pre-arranged distances on a sponsorship basis, where a sponsor pays a contribution for every mile run.

The run has been arranged for two reasons, said Bob Anderson before setting out. It is intended to raise funds for local Big Brother operations by the pledges offered and it is intended to splash publicity on the entire system of Big Brotherhood, whereby a volunteer is named big brother to a youngster who is orphaned or otherwise left without a father.

FROM B.C.

Running from British Columbia, besides the Salt Springer, are four from Vancouver, one from Toronto, one from Lethbridge and one from Victoria.

Each relay runner will cover about 250 to 300 miles and they will fly west on June 18.

And as each team strains to reach Ottawa, another group of teams is panting along the roads from the Maritimes. They also set out on May 27, from St. John's, Newfoundland.






About the forest

What causes burls on trees?

Not too much is known about burls and in many cases we cannot say for sure what has caused these lumps or swellings that will sometimes appear on the stems or branches of trees.

We do know burls are evidence that something has set off a disturbance of the cell mechanism. This has caused overnourishment resulting either in excessive cell division or in an abnormal increase in the size of the cells. Sometimes, we find a combination of both. What happens is part of the tree's reaction to an injury or other disorder, but the exact process is not clearly understood.

In several coniferous species, dwarf mistletoe is believed to cause the development of burls. Aphids, insects, irradiation through sunspot or ultraviolet light may also be related. Often there is no visible or

traceable cause. In such cases, there may have been some other unknown agent of injury, such as a dead tree falling against a nearby living tree and damaging the cambium or living bark layer.

It is quite common to come upon the situation where a burl appears on one isolated tree, with neighbouring trees quite unaffected. In fact, burls rarely occur in sufficient abundance to warrant concern on the part of foresters.

It may be of interest to note that what may be the largest burl in the world was hauled out of the forest in the Port McNeill area about 200 miles northwest of Vancouver. It grew on a spruce tree about 185 feet tall, weighed 22 tons and was 45 feet in circumference.

At this time of year, many young couples have marriage on their minds, and if any such couples have a respect for tradition, then Sid Timms is the man to call. For it is an old tradition that a chimney sweep be invited to a wedding in order that the marriage will be a happy and successful one.

Timms is the owner of Coquitlam Chimney Service and he expanded his business to include Salt Spring Island when he moved here at the beginning of May.

Timms considers himself as a traditional chimney sweep: he doesn't always wear tails on the job, but he does wear a top hat. Apparently, rich people used to pay their sweep with discarded clothes, and that's where the top hat and tails came from.

Formerly in the roofing business, Sid Timms turned his attention to cleaning chimneys when he began having trouble with his legs.

To give good service, he says, the heating system in a house must be kept in good running order.

CUT DOWN EFFICIENCY

"A dirty furnace, chimney or pipes can cut down the efficiency by half and should be cleaned each year."

His equipment consists of a special type of vacuum cleaner and different brushes that are lowered down the chimney or furnace pipes. He warns that a dirty chimney can contribute to a serious fire.

A lot of people, says Sid, make the mistake of trying to clean their own chimney.

"One guy tried to clean his chimney with a Christmas tree. He got it stuck in the chimney and had to call me to get it out."

Another method that has been suggested in the past is sticking a chicken in the flue and letting it flap its way out.

So if you're thinking of getting married or having your chimney cleaned, Sid Timms is the man to call.
