

Seven districts call for return of control

Joint brief is submitted to review committee

It has been recommended to the Regional District Review Committee that the responsibility for land use planning in the islands be returned to the seven regional districts of the area.

In a joint brief prepared by the seven districts, the review committee has been told that the amendments to the Island Trust Act, which were proclaimed January 1, undermine the concept of regional districts.

"We believe that not only is the basic premise of the changes to the Islands Trust Act inconsistent with the approach of the provincial government to regional districts, but that the process thus established conflicts with the basic principle of area representation," says the brief.

"The clumsy procedures necessitated by the amendments create management problems and delays for local communities that remove the right to effective local planning."

LOCAL LEVEL

The regional districts say that the "centralized provincial government cannot and does not respond well to the local needs of communities" and that land use decisions must be made on a local level.

"Regional government is a very efficient unit for determining the use of land and resources in an area large enough to be recognizable as a system," continues the brief, "while retaining the ability to respond effectively to the particular character of the area and the wishes of the local communities."

The brief points out that the provincial interest was represented when the General Trust Committee was made up of three "appointed provincial officials". But the change in legislation, the regional districts note, will see the General Trust Committee made up of elected local trustees, "who may very well come from one particular area in the Trust."

OUTSIDE THE AREA

If the general trustees were elected from Hornby and Denman Islands, the brief contends, final say in considering problems of the

lower Gulf Islands would be in the hands of people from outside that area.

"As a further result," the brief continues, "the whole agency designed to govern land use in order to protect the provincial interest will not have any provincially elected or appointed representatives."

"Under this system it appears doubtful to us that the provincial interest will be any better protected than it was...under the various regional districts."

The regional districts also feel that the number of elected representatives within the Trust area is very high and out of proportion with that of the rest of B.C. The "responsiveness and the accessibility" of the decision makers and the staff have been "dramatically decreased", the brief says.

DIFFERENT FUNCTIONS

It is also noted that residents of the islands have to deal with different elected people for different functions. There are 29 elected officials dealing with land use and another seven who look after administration of services, such as health.

The taxpayer, states the brief, is faced with the costs of maintaining separate local government structures and "is furthermore burdened with cumbersome if not unworkable process dealing with local problems".

The regional districts conclude that either land use control be returned to them or that a new regional district of the islands be created. Land use planning, they feel, is a process that cannot be viewed separately from "other endeavours of local government".

The aforementioned brief is one of three that have a connection with the islands and have been submitted to the Regional District Review Committee.

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Capital Regional Board

BRIEF CALLS FOR CLEAR DEFINITION OF ROLE OF EACH LEVEL OF GOVERNMENT IN PROVINCE

Capital Regional Board has summarized the character of its own operation to the Regional District Review Committee. In a brief presented to the commission recently, the board concludes with the plea for clear-cut outlines of the duties and responsibilities of each level of government.

Biggest problem facing the regional districts, suggests the brief, is lack of clear definition of role as well as the lack of a clear separation between various local government functions.

The board has urged that the duties of each level of government be more clearly laid out. There would be less likelihood of clash between various levels if this were done and the present position, where large municipalities may frequently find themselves paying for the cost of services to smaller, more isolated communities, could be eliminated.

To assess the needs of the district, the authors of the brief examined the nature of the Capital Region. Covering 945 square miles, the region includes the Gulf Islands, the Victoria metropolitan area and the Sooke electoral area. Victoria, the Saanich Peninsula and the Gulf Islands share the same mild climate, although the western section of the district enjoys a very much heavier rainfall, sometimes exceeding 97 inches, or nearly three times that of the islands.

In 1976 the population of the Capital Region was 230,600 and of this figure, 217,000 are in the Victoria metropolis.

AVERAGE AGE

In terms of average age, the district deviates from the British Columbia norms. The 0-14 group is lower than the rest of British Columbia and the number embraced by the 65-and-over bracket is greater than average.

Activities in the Gulf Islands are mainly directed to services, logging and the recreation industry.

After defining the area and the nature of its activities, the brief asks, "In the interests of the people in this well-defined regional community, which tasks, powers

and responsibilities which are constitutionally held by the provincial government ought to be delegated to local government(s) and what form should such local government(s) take?"

The brief suggests that eight or more local councils would accept responsibility for local servicing and regulation of property and its use; street maintenance and lighting and beautification; sewer collection, drainage, water distribution and local parks and recreation. Local land use would be the responsibility of local councils including zoning, subdivisions and business licenses, local amenities and fire protection, garbage collection, within the regional policy.

REGIONAL CONCERNS

The regional council would, in turn, be responsible for regional land use planning whereby local councils would be required to produce local planning, consistent with the regional plan.

Police, public health services, sewage trunks and plants, garbage disposal and a fire protection policy would all be regional concerns.

Regional road systems and operation of transit; economic development capability, local land use in non-municipal areas, regional parks and local improvements in non-municipal areas would all remain with the regional administration.

The functions of local and regional government should be clearly defined and there should be no conflict in concerns.

The Capital Regional Board feels that the ideal situation from the point of view of the citizen is that he may have access to his elected representative and that he may be able to identify that representative's jurisdiction.

The board asks that at least some of the directors of a regional board hold that and no other office.

Single most urgent need for the regional districts at the present time, says the brief, is the authority to enforce the regional planning function.

THREE OPTIONS

There are three options facing the review committee, concludes the brief. The committee can recommend a retention of the present status quo, whereby the regional districts will continue as they have in the past, with minor amendments and changes.

Or the committee may recommend the elimination of regional districts. The big problem then

facing the province would be the return of regional functions to the municipalities or the province.

Third alternative is the expansion of the regional function.

Capital Regional Board supports the third alternative. It makes its recommendation in its final paragraphs.

"Your committee should affirm that the role of regional districts

and local municipalities should be defined in such a way as to give local municipal tasks to local government and regional tasks to regional government, and assure that there is a minimum interdependence between them.

"It should then identify a form and structure of government to deal with purely regional matters. Having done this, the details of administration will flow naturally

from the process.

"The committee should then remind the Provincial Government in a most positive way that it has a duty to establish, define, support, and put in place the kinds of government which are required at the third level in order that the citizen can be served adequately and responsively in the various special ways to which he is entitled."

Trust replies to brief condemning its role in islands land use

Hands off the Trust!

When the Islands Trust presented a final brief to the British Columbia Regional District Review Committee on May 30, the brief urged that the Trust be permitted to operate as it is now set up for at least two years before any further action is taken.

It will be clear at the end of that period whether the Trust is handling its responsibilities in an adequate manner.

The brief, presented by Chairman Marc Holmes, is as follows:

May I suggest that if ever an issue has been "settled", this one has. Exhuming it once more serves no good purpose.

Briefly, the history is:

In September, 1973, the provincial government's four-party Select Standing Committee on Municipal Matters, having toured and studied the Islands extensively

(A) Unanimously recommended an "Islands Trust" to assume the primary responsibility for...land use, future growth patterns, control of development...etc. This was in recognition of the fragile and finite nature of the islands and the pressure upon them.

(B) Clearly stated that "although regional districts are not geared to carry out all the responsibilities expected of them relative to the future of the coastal islands of B.C., they can well serve the islands for many administrative purposes including...local improvements, special projects, health, building inspection, etc."

FIRST ACT

In June 1974, the N.D.P. Government drafted and the Legislature passed the "Islands Trust Act".

This reflected the spirit of the report but was a half measure in the sense that the Trust in import-

ant land-use matters had only power of review and veto. This meant a degree of duplication of work done by the regional districts, a fact which they frequently criticised.

When the Social Credit government came to power a great deal of study was given to the subject of the proper role of the Islands Trust, if any. Many representations were made by regional districts to the Premier and to the Minister of Municipal Affairs to the effect that the Trust should be abolished or drastically curtailed.

The Government studied the matter at length and finally secured passage of Bill 25, by a unanimous vote of the Legislature, which drastically amended the Act effective January 1978.

INITIATIVE

What this did was to make the 13 Trust Committees representing

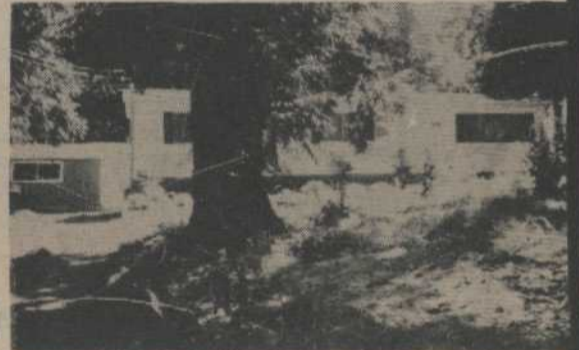

each "designated" island a body with the power of initiative in land-use by-laws - zoning, subdivision, and the like - and to share responsibility with the Ministry of Highways in regard to subdivision approval. This eliminated duplication and ensured "on island" planning and land use control.

What it did not do was to remove such things as hospitals, public health, building inspection, fire protection, recreational parks, various works and services, and other non-land-use matters from the regional districts, the improvement districts, and the many provincial and federal departments which serve the islands in their various fields of responsibility.

ALREADY WORKING

It is here maintained that the new system is already working well and that roughly two years should elapse before further significant revision is considered.

Already the cumbersome land-use control procedures on the islands are proceeding more swiftly with more local input, and with more local knowledge of what is going on. This is largely due to the fact that each island of significance has two resident locally-elected trustees.

It is pointed out that last July, unofficial, but carefully controlled, polls favoured the Islands Trust over the Regional District on Denman Island and Hornby Island by roughly 90% and 75% respectively.

In November last the Capital Regional District held an official referendum on Salt Spring Island, which is roughly half the population of the Trust area.

The result, with no room left for doubt, showed that over twice as many voters favoured the Trust as compared to the Regional District.

About the forest

What is root rot in trees?

Root diseases in trees (and they are numerous) are caused by fungi in the soil. Fungi are thread-like organisms, non green plants that cannot photosynthesize, therefore depend for their nourishment on other living or dead organisms.

A soil fungus, aided by the enzymes it secretes, will penetrate the bark of a tree-root with its string like members. These will spread like a web or network

(called the mycelium) slowly consuming and destroying the root. In mature trees, some root fungi will move up into the trunk.

How do you know a tree is infected with root rot? Viewed from a distance, an infected tree may show no sign, although there is frequently a slowing of growth and sometimes (but not always) the foliage will yellow or thin. What is required is careful examination at

the base of the tree. It is here that you will discover the evidences that point to root rot.

Honey-coloured mushrooms growing around the bottom of the trunk are one sign. These are the fruiting bodies of a fungus and indicate that the mycelium has fed extensively on the root system. One fungus produces what is known as the "fairies ring", a small symmetrical circle of toadstools, close to the base of a mature tree. Another clue would be distension or heavy flow of pitch emitting from the stem down near the ground.

A tree so affected could one day topple over suddenly, quite without warning, even on a calm windless day. In fact, several people on recreational trips have paid with their lives because they did not avoid root rot areas.

When a diseased tree falls or is cut down, the root disease fungus will remain in the soil for long periods of time. As new trees grow, on the site, their roots become infected and the disease continues.

Pioneer surgeon in B.C. nearly 20 years ago

Dr. George Bennett, who has recently taken up residence on Salt Spring Island, was born in Manchester, England and comes from a long line of medical doctors. He was educated at Stockport Grammar School and Manchester and Edinburgh Universities and served in the British Army during the Battle of Britain.

He graduated M.B.Ch. in 1944, from Manchester Royal Infirmary.

After a period in general medicine he did post-graduate studies in ophthalmology at various centres.

He obtained the diploma in ophthalmic medicine and surgery of the Royal Colleges of Physicians and Surgeons of London, England in 1947.

He won the research prize for studies in glaucoma awarded by the South West Regional Hospital Board and worked as ophthalmic surgeon in Penzance and Sunderland. Later he served as eye surgeon to the government and King Idris Senussi of Libya in North Africa.

TO CANADA
Dr. Bennett emigrated to Can-

ada with his wife and three children in 1957 and obtained his Canadian medical licence and specialist degree by examination. He worked as senior eye specialist at the Royal Inland Hospital,

Kamloops, until coming to Salt Spring.

His interests include farming and sailing.

Mrs. Bennett also served in World War II and has done

general, industrial and ophthalmic nursing and will assist her husband in his office.

The island doctor was the first to undertake a cornea transplant in the interior of British Columbia. He carried out the operation in 1960.

This event should not be missed

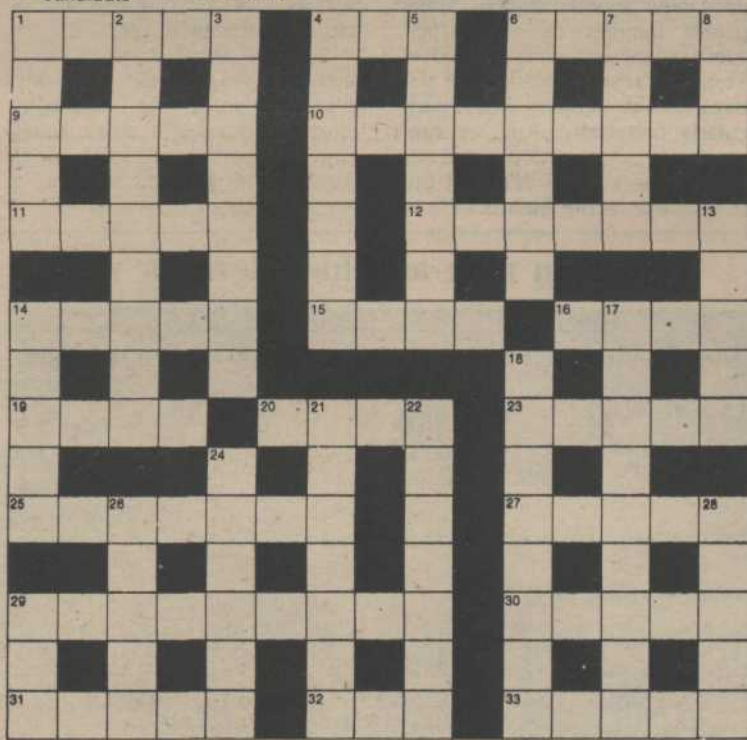
as Fran riding her impressive stallion will give an excellent performance.

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What would you do if half the population of island disappeared?

I have been taken to task for straying from the path of World Relief and Development. I accept the judgement, if World Relief is concerned solely with "over there". My personal feeling is that the Third World is right here among us in many respects, and when these concerns are brought to my notice, I pass them along to you.

However, to return to the Third World as generally defined....

What would you do if half the population of Salt Spring Island suddenly disappeared and nobody could find out where they were, or how they were, or if indeed they were still alive?

I dare say initially your reaction would depend on who they were: whether they were friends of yours, or if they were people you were quite glad to see the last of! But the probability is that half the population of Salt Spring Island would include at least one member of your family.

What would you do?

Presumably you would inquire from the R.C.M.P., your M.L.A., our M.P. in Ottawa, ministers of the governments. And if they are professed ignorance? Would you write a letter or two to the Driftwood....perhaps even to a Victoria or Vancouver newspaper?

More Food for Thought

What then?

CONTACT FAMILY

My guess is that you would get in touch with other members of your family across Canada, and in other parts of the world, and ask for their help. Moral and financial support would be very necessary in such circumstances.

Well, 2,500 people in Chile, opponents of the military junta, have simply disappeared. Nobody can obtain any information as to their whereabouts, and the powers-that-be blandly say: "There are no more political prisoners, we declared an amnesty."

What they do not say is that the amnesty was only extended to certain prisoners, and the rest were re-classified as "common criminals". But where are they? How are they? Are they, in fact, still alive? Why will the government not acknowledge the inquiries made by relatives, friends and international

agencies?

Last March the United Nations Human Rights Commission issued its fourth consecutive condemnation of the military junta of Chile. Red Cross International, Amnesty International and C.I.M.E. (Centre for European Immigrations) have continued to press for information.

HUNGER STRIKE

On May 22, 66 relatives of the disappeared prisoners" began a hunger strike in the UNICEF building and in three churches in Santiago. They have been joined by several hundred supporters in 10 cities across Canada, including the Rev. Wes Maultsaid in Vancouver. Wes is the dedicated chairman of the B.C. Inter-Church Committee for World Development Education. He came to Salt Spring Island recently to talk to our Continuing Education group.

Canadian Memorial Church in Vancouver is the headquarters of the hunger strikers in that city: please direct your thoughts and prayers to them. Petitions are being circulated on Salt Spring Island, so please take the time to read and sign them, and take your own measures in support of those who care so deeply about 2,500 missing political prisoners.

Just remember how you would feel if half the population of Salt Spring Island disappeared overnight, and you could not find out what had happened to them....

The burdens and guilts are real

The stigmas of single parenthood

Much has been written and much has been said about single parenthood, all too often by those who have never experienced it.

Last week's Food for Thought column made it possible for one single parent on Salt Spring to write a little on the frequent misconceptions of single parent families. It is with some regret that I can only speak for myself, however with most single parents I can share this one experience: the stigma of "broken homes".

Most of us did not begin our parenthood lives as single parents. But it happens. The burdens, the guilts (often brought on by the attitudes of society) are real. And in the past, the very recent past, most have had to carry the guilts, the burdens and the children alone.

Support systems had not yet been developed. The financial burden for most seemed insurmountable and social assistance was another stigma (much worse for single parent fathers who share the same difficulties as the mothers). Society is evolving, is becoming more supportive and the support systems and resources are being made available and the stigmas are diminishing.

DON'T WANT PITY

Single parents don't want or need pity: another stigma. Single parent families can be happy, constructive and unified families. True, our responsibilities are perhaps heavier in many areas, particularly financially. And we can't turn to our mate at 3 am and say, "Sarah's sick again. It's your turn to take her to the bathroom", or,

"Today is my day for sitting under my favourite tree without interruption for two hours."

Thankfully, I developed a fine background in tackle football, fishing, fort building, skipping rocks, racing cars, spaceships and the Fonz. They were traditionally contributed to the family by the male counterpart. We must fill in the empty spaces. Perhaps we try a little harder.

Our children can do well in school, and in whatever they choose to involve themselves in. Why not? They don't necessarily grow up with distorted views of marriage or of family. Why should they? Many professionals and back porch philosophers have been trying to convince us of this for far too long. We say, "It ain't necessarily so!"

CARRY THEM ALONE

The report cards, the skinned knees and illnesses, the troubles, the worries we carry alone except when friends listen with open ears and hearts, and at times, even come to our rescue.

Stress? Distress? My greatest distress is felt while observing the destruction of families: single parent, nuclear, extended, as the result of problems brought on by the use of alcohol, the misuse of medicinal drugs, money, immoralities, the lack of caring and sharing and misunderstandings.

In some small measure we all share, as parents, the same joys and sometimes the disillusionments in creating a stable family unit. Support your local single parents and we'll do our best to support you!

Planning association asks for terms of reference of study

Salt Spring Island Community Planning Association has asked for information regarding the Ganges Harbour study.

Meeting last Monday evening, the association discussed the proposed sewer system at some length before it was decided to write to the Capital Regional Board asking for details of the terms of reference of the survey.

Nick Gilbert, member of the Advisory Planning Commission, is to present the Islands Trust with the recommendation of the association that the planning of the Ganges sewer system be co-ordinated with the Ganges Plan.

The association also expressed concern over the role of the Islands Trust in the sewer project. A letter will be written to the Trust enquiring of its position.

Planners will also propose to the Trust that other utilities might be buried while the sewer excavations are open.

CO-ORDINATION LACK

There appears to be a lack of co-ordination in connection with zoning, it was felt. The association will draw the attention of the Islands Trust to this lack.

Ganges Auto-Marine was cited as an example, where the zoning is changed "after the fact". Repetition of the practice would defeat the purpose of zoning by-laws, it was suggested.

The matter of Ganges Auto-Marine was raised recently by the Islands Trust. The property was zoned for automotive sales and service. With the implementation of the marine activity, the zoning is inadequate and must be changed.

The planning association suggested that the health department appears to assume no direct responsibility in connection with St. Mary Lake. It acts on written complaints, the meeting was told, but it does not initiate investigation.

The health department recognizes the need for controls for future development, it was noted, but problems created by existent developments are permitted to continue.

No investigations of existing fields, systems or run-off patterns are being considered, planners were told.

Household wastes and run-off from fields and roads all find their way into the lake.

Possibility of milfoil was also considered.

Jack Fisher, Salt Spring Island Trustee, will report to the next planning meeting on the home occupation by-law of Salt Spring Island.

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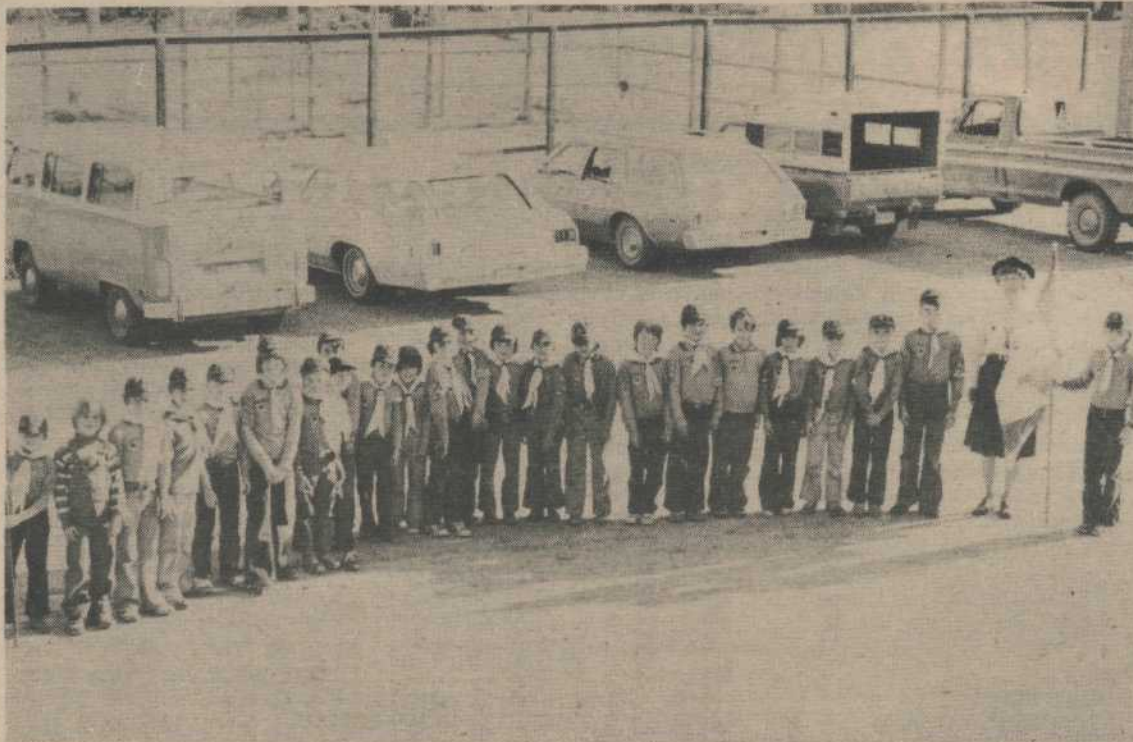
