School fire out quickly

Two fires called out the Salt Spring Island Fire Department last week.

On Tuesday evening an emergency arose when fire broke out on the roof of the Gulf Islands Secondary School.

Crews rushed to the scene and had it under control before any damage could result. Alarm was tuned in by the school office staff.

It was attributed to sparks from the incinerator in the furnace room area.

Grass and brush fire on Upper Ganges Road, opposite Hugh's Machinery, was put out in short order on Saturday morning.

Hope for further help

Portlock Park soccer field to be ready for use by fall

What is happening at Portlock Park?

At the present time the Salt Spring Island Parks and Recreation Commission is contemplating finishing certain areas of the project.

First, the soccer field will be ready for use this fall. Goal posts will be erected and the edge of the track will be backfilled, raked and planted. Funds for this will come from the Commission's regular budget.

Secondly, the septic tank will be installed to complete the washrooms and change rooms. These washrooms will be operable by the fall, and funds again will be taken from the Commission's yearly budget.

Finally, the newly seeded area will be raked, rolled and cut, plus some watering so that this field will be used in the spring; small backstops will be erected then.

APPLICATIONS

In the meantime, the Commission has put forth an exhaustive application to the Public Facilities Fund and is awaiting word from this agency. This grant would allow the Commission to complete other aspects of the facilities and perhaps even add to the present facilities.

Therefore, with some good fortune, the Parks and Recreation Commission will be able to provide an area for people to enjoy softball, soccer, tennis and running by the spring of 1979, with changerooms and washrooms.

Further development from that point on will be based on the

results of the survey for recreational needs currently being undertaken by the Commission.

The Commission would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank the Lions Club for their foresight and interest in acquiring this site for the people of Salt Spring.

Their efforts are greatly appreciated along with all the other people who have contributed to the development of this site for the people of Salt Spring Island.

Found drowned

Massive search for missing boy in vain

Massive search for a six-year-old boy at Fulford Harbour was called off on Sunday when divers found the body of Heath Johnston Miller in Fulford Harbour.

Between 150 and 250 persons were engaged in the search after the youngster failed to return to his home on Friday evening.

Alarm was sounded on Friday evening by the boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph D. Miller, of Morningside Drive, Fulford. At about 10 pm they reported to Ganges RCMP that the boy was missing and that a community search and telephone check had failed to locate him.

Initial search had revealed his bicycle on the wharf at Fulford, by the rest rooms.

Check was made on the ferries and ferry terminals to ascertain that he had not left the island.

On Saturday morning the search was set into motion and the RCMP dog was called. The police had ascertained that the boy had last been seen at 2.30 pm on Friday.

The Saturday search was cancelled when police received a report that the boy had been recognized on the Swartz Bay ferry on Friday. By the time it proved that the report was erroneous it was too late to make any further investigation.

BIGGEST EVER

Sunday morning the Ganges Detachment, RCMP, put into operation the biggest search ever initiated on the island. Const. Ace Mainwaring was in charge of the investigation and afterwards he was uncertain of the exact numbers involved.

The Canadian Coast Guard, the Rotary Club, Fire Department, Ed Davis and Cougar Air, Wayne Cooper and the Cubs and Scouts,

with volunteers from all parts of the island covered every square foot of the south east corner of Salt Spring Island.

The volunteers searched from Isabella Point to Beaver Point and as fast as a party returned from one search area, it was re-directed to a new section.

Mainwaring explained that he could not possibly list all those who took part. He could only string off the names of some of the leaders who took out parties.

In the meantime, dogs and dive teams from the RCMP had come to the island and they, also, took part.

Headquarters for the search was the site of the Fulford Inn and the Fulford Hall Association rallied to the call. Art and Kit Moulton with Jocelyn Holmes were there to provide drinks and sandwiches for the searchers.

The major search was launched at 7 am on Sunday. It continued for eight hours.

At 3 pm on Sunday the RCMP divers from Port Alberni and Colwood, located the boy's body in the water.

Despite rumours and reports, the police detachment have yet no idea of how the boy got into the water and the investigation is continuing, said the police officer on Tuesday.

Search party was a cross section of the community and most ofers of help were entirely spontaneous.

Pleads not guilty

Dan Ellis, of Salt Spring, entered a plea of not guilty in provincial court last week to living in his home before a certificate of occupancy had been issued by the Capital Regional District.

Case was remanded for trial to September 27.

Detachment chief reviews past year

Problems of policing these islands!

Salt Spring Island is a difficult place to police, due to the fact that there are so many varied kinds of people living here.

That was an observation made by Ray Stelter, RCMP sergeant in charge of the Ganges police detachment when he spent a morning last week talking to a Driftwood reporter.

A variety of topics were discussed including criticisms of the police force and the crime rate on the islands. Stelter also talked of the possibility of a driver being charged with impaired driving, with the Crown's evidence being based on the observations of a police officer through the use of physical sobriety tests to determine impairment.

He pointed out that where a breathalyzer test is not given, the policeman must be prepared to give other evidence of impairment in addition to results of a sobriety test.

He must be able to say in court, for instance, that he followed the driver for a while before stopping him, and saw him cross the centre line, or drive erratically. There is little likelihood of a conviction, said Stelter, if the policeman's observations are based on physical tests and nothing more.

ONLY TWO OR THREE

In Ganges, he said, there have only been two or three cases in the last two years in which a driver was charged with impaired driving without having provided a breathalyzer reading.

But what if a member of the force has a grudge against someone? If a policeman has a strong dislike for a person, would he not be able to charge that person with impaired driving and fabricate the evidence so as to make a conviction?

Sgt. Stelter felt it was unlikely that it could happen.

"We demand a high standard of

policing from each other," he said of himself and fellow members of the detachment.

A policeman, he noted, especially a young one, has "a thin line to walk": on one side, his superiors are watching, and on the other is the public.

"I've seen disputes, but they've been settled privately. If one day you and I had a real set-to about something, I would even avoid stopping you for anything for a time afterwards."

EXPERIENTIA DOCET

With regard to a police officer being unable to judge correctly whether or not a driver was impaired, his evidence in court (if no breathalyzer reading were taken) would carry less weight, for example, if he had only been in the force for six months, and had only dealt with two or three impaired cases. Again, Stelter felt that a conviction would be unlikely in such a case.

Criticism of the police can go both ways. Sgt. Stelter has a drawer full of letters from people who have criticized the detachment for not doing enough.

"Lots of people feel better if we're well-armed," he said.

He recalled that the park facilities on the islands had a bad name not too long ago. The average family who wanted to camp out in an island park was being put off by the large numbers of young people drinking and having a wild time.

"We had lots of nasty letters as a result," Stelter said, "and so did the parks board."

And on the other hand, of course, are the criticisms of over-policing. There has also been a lot of ill feeling lately about the shotgun that is occasionally carried in the police vehicles.

TOTING A GUN
Stelter agreed that it was not in the best interests of the police to carry it in open view. It's a Canada-wide policy that permits them to carry the gun, though they are not required to do so.

There are six policemen and one recruit stationed at Ganges and their jurisdiction includes Salt Spring and Galiano Islands.

Taking into consideration the summer increase in population, Stelter estimated that there is one officer for every 1,000 people on the two islands. The Canadian average is roughly 1:800 in rural areas and 1:500 in cities, he said.

The crime rate here has dropped in some areas and the number of cases that are solved is high. The

biggest drop this year is in breaking and entry.

In the first four months of 1977, there were 39 B. & E.'s reported; during the same period of this year, the figure is down to 20. The decrease is not as marked in other offences, such as theft under \$50: 18 reported in the first four months of this year, and 20 last year.

LIQUOR OFFENCES

On the other hand, there has been a drastic increase in offences committed under the liquor control act and other provincial statutes. In the first four months of 1977 there were 30 such offences reported. This year, for the same period, there have been 73. RCMP at Ganges attribute the larger number this year to increased patrolling; more vehicles have been checked and more liquor has been seized.

The statistics for impaired driving charges are difficult to evaluate because last year the figures deal with all the Gulf Islands, including Valdez. This year, Salt Spring and Galiano are the only islands represented in the statistics. However, it is possible to see that the number of impaired charges laid is up. As of Friday of last week, 38

impaired charges have been laid this year; there were 48 for the whole of 1977. The average breathalyzer reading this year has been 0.184, up from last year's 0.174.

There have been 53 motor vehicle accidents since January and alcohol was known to be involved in 12 of them. Last year there were 181 accidents; 18 involving alcohol.

WORKING HARDER

Ray Stelter guessed that the reason for the increase in impaired charges was, again, increased patrolling. It's not that more people are drinking and driving; the police are working harder at catching them.

To conclude this statistical summary, 24-hour driving suspensions were given to 34 drivers last year and so far, 26 this year. And finally, one interesting point of law (that I, for one, tripped over) is that once given a 24-hour suspension, a driver cannot be charged with impaired driving.

So if you get stopped and your license is suspended for 24 hours, you can demand a breath test without any fear of the consequences if you blow over 0.08.

I wish I'd known that two weeks ago!

New ferry questionnaire is further instalment February traffic survey

There is another ferry questionnaire looming.

Passengers will be invited to complete a form outlining their pattern of ferry travel. BC Research is carrying out the survey on behalf of the BC Ferry Corporation.

It's not the first survey to be undertaken. It is probably not the last.

According to L.R. Roueche, manager of planning, forecasting and economic analysis for the corporation, the survey will be taken up between July 12 and August 12.

On Route 4, between Fulford and Swartz Bay, Sandy Sandvik and Selina Shum will be conducting the survey on July 13, 14 and 15.

Route 4A, between Fulford, Swartz Bay and Otter Bay, will enjoy the services of Sandy Sandvik and Susan Fraser on August 10 and 11.

Susan Fraser and Abigail Gowans will work July 13, 14 and 15 on Route 5, Outer Islands - Swartz Bay run.

Between Vesuvius and Crofton, which is officially designated Route 6, Susan Fraser will ask the questions on July 20, 21 and 22.

Long Harbour run will enjoy the same enquiry with Sandy Sandvik and Selina Shum on those same days, July 20, 21, and 22.

Mr. Roueche has urged the co-operation of passengers in the project.

"Please remember," he adds as a caution, "That the young ladies are university students. They are not responsible either for the questionnaire or the running of the ferries."

Enquiries or complaints should be directed to the head office of the ferry corporation in Victoria, he suggested.

The purpose of the questionnaire is to assist the corporation in planning services for the 1980's.

Last survey was taken in February. This is the summer version of the same enquiry. There had been some indignation on that occasion because the questionnaire was offered more than once.

On this occasion it is planned to invite the traveller to report the number of times he expects to use the ferries during the next few days. It is hoped to avoid repetition by this means.

Water poses problems

As North Salt Spring Waterworks District imposes additional restrictions in sprinkling, a number of users are protesting the quality of water available.

This week the water district is requiring that sprinkling be restricted to two hours in the morning and two hours in the evening on designated days. The distribution problems of bringing water from Maxwell Lake are responsible for the restrictions, consumers were informed.

The supply from St. Mary Lake was under fire at the end of last week from users in the Vesuvius area. Water was unpleasant tasting and bears an offensive odour, Driftwood was told.

Spokesman for the water district explained that the condition is due to the level of the lake. It occurs each year about the same time, but some years its effect is less noticeable.

The water is bacterially pure and potable, despite the taste and smell.

It can be cleared by the use of a filter, Driftwood was told, although

the equipment may be quite expensive.

Appreciation

On Friday evening the volunteer firemen of Salt Spring Island were entertained by the Fire Protection District at the annual appreciation night.

It is the annual occasion when the community of Salt Spring Island makes an effort to express its gratitude to the volunteer firemen for their efforts on behalf of every resident of the island.

The timing was near to perfect.

The firemen taking part in the event had, several days earlier, been engaged in saving the roof of Gulf Islands Secondary School. A fire in the core area of Ganges represents the ultimate disaster to the fire department. Dry, inflammable materials surrounded by storage tanks of gasoline and oil is the danger spot of Salt Spring Island.

The department had, on Tuesday, proved its efficiency and its value to the community by the call to the school. Had there been none to respond to the cry of "Fire" there might well have been no Ganges to deplore it.

The appreciation night was a sandwich.

By Saturday morning the same department was busy attacking a grass and brush fire on Upper Ganges Road.

The only effect the season has on these activities is the nature of the fire. Had the occasion been marked in winter, it would probably have been sandwiched between chimney fires as some unfortunate householder stokes up his fire too hot for the structure.

The firemen are popular in the community: in all communities: every resident is glad they are there, but no one wants to see them.

The Friday evening function was an expression of appreciation. It is shared by all islanders. How could it be otherwise? The volunteer firemen are prepared to leave their work or their meals or their beds to attend a fire, no matter where it might be or whose life or property is threatened.

There is little reward for their service. They receive a pittance for their efforts and even the compensation they enjoy for accidents or injuries on the job is small.

The recognition is not restricted to Salt Spring Island.

Every island community served by a volunteer fire department owes a debt of mammoth proportions to the men who work all hours, all days in all weathers simply to help their neighbours.

The rest of us might be hard pressed to sleep at night if the volunteer firemen had not offered their services.

Appreciation night could be every night of the year!

A through road

Sir,

May I commend you for permitting free and open discussion on controversial topics through your newspaper.

I note that some South Pender Islanders have already availed themselves of the freedom of expression in respect to the events of the Property Owners Association meeting that was held on May 21, 1978 on South Pender Island.

The members of this association and others assembled to hear a report from the chairman of the Fire Committee of South Pender Island, which culminated in his calling for a closed vote on three proposals for fire-fighting equipment designated A, B, and C. As the voting was in progress the assembly was told that if proposal A carried it would in effect be a vote for a referendum.

In his letter, which appeared in the June 27 Driftwood C.A. Glover states that the result of the closed vote was 90% in favour of proposal A, but the question does arise as to whether all who voted were indeed entitled to vote, since residents are not necessarily property owners.

Finally, I would presume that it is precisely for the purpose of learning and discussing all "facets" of this matter that a public meeting under the chairmanship of Mr. Jim Campbell, chairman of the Capital Regional Board, is most desirable.

Death of Flo Bellhouse at Galiano in her 91st year

A link with the early days of nursing in B.C. was severed on June 30th with the sudden death of Mrs. David Bellhouse on Galiano Island. As the former Florence Gilmour, she was one of the last surviving members of the graduating class of 1915 of the School of Nursing in the Royal Columbian Hospital, New Westminster.

Born in England in 1888, she was one of the five children of Captain and Mrs. W.H. Gilmour. When the family immigrated to Canada she entered the nursing profession, obtaining her R.N. For some years she worked in Portland, Oregon, but frequently visited her sister and brother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Crawford Twiss, who had come to reside on Galiano Island in 1913. During one of these visits she helped to bring her niece Barbara into the world.

It was here, too, that she met David Bellhouse, a member of a pioneer Island family, and in 19212 they were married in Christ Church Cathedral in Vancouver. Their two daughters, Betty and Nancy, were born in Long Beach, California.

A short time later the family moved to England and lived at St. Annes-on-the-Sea, Lancs., but the call of the Canadian west was strong and in the early 1930's they moved back to Galiano. Mr. Bellhouse died here in 1959.

Mrs. Bellhouse, affectionately known as "Flo" to Islanders of all ages, celebrated her 90th birthday on January 18th with a large gathering of friends at the Galiano Golf and Country Club. Always keenly interested in community activities, the garden at her home at Sturdies Bay was frequently the



setting for some of the most worthwhile and exciting Island fund-raising affairs.

She was a gracious hostess with a warm personality and a delightful sense of humour, and she will be sadly missed by a countless number of friends.

Her death came as a shock to the community. On Friday morning she had done her usual weekend shopping with friends at the Corner Store, lunched with other friends and her daughter Nancy at "the Deli", and greeted friends and neighbours at 1 o'clock at the post office. In mid-afternoon she became ill and Dr. Armitage was called. She was taken by helicopter to the Royal Jubilee in Victoria where she passed away a short time later.

Mrs. Bellhouse was predeceased by her husband David, her

What possible connection could there be between Salt Spring Island and the English Channel?

But there is. Burgoyne Bay, on the south west coast of Salt Spring Island and Burgoyne Valley, which adopted the name from that bay, are memorials to Commander Hugh Talbot Burgoyne, VC. He was serving in HMS Ganges, under Capt. John Fulford, when the Ganges was making a survey of the coast.

It was the practice to name topographical features after members of the ship's company.

Commander Burgoyne joined the Royal Navy at the age of 14, in 1833. He was commissioned Lieutenant in 1854. He was the only son of Field Marshall Sir John Fox Burgoyne an eminent engineer officer of the Peninsular War.

As senior lieutenant in HMS Swallow during the Crimean War, he was awarded the Victoria Cross.

In May, 1855 he destroyed a large quantity of Russian stores at Genitchi, under "most perilous" circumstances. Shortly afterwards he was named Commander of the Ganges, and came to the Pacific Station in 1857.

FIRE!

His name was notable on the station when an American ship caught fire in Esquimalt Harbour. Admiral Robert Baynes extolled the conduct of Comm. Burgoyne in

a despatch to the Admiralty referring to the incident.

Seamen from the Ganges, Py-lades, Tribune and Plumper saved everything possible from the burning ship. The merchant ship, Northern Eagle was burnt out. The fire occurred during the night of September 21, 1859.

In May, 1861, after having sailed back to Britain, he was named Captain. It was his death warrant, for his first command was HMS Captain.

His new vessel bore a dignified name. It was in the original Captain that Nelson broke formation without orders at the Battle of St. Vincent, February 14, 1797. Horatio Nelson was a Commodore at that time and his action was characteristic of the man. By breaking line of his own volition he bottled up the Spanish fleet and

prevented their escape. It was the eighth deadly sin in the Royal Navy to take the initiative in that manner. Commander in chief was Sir John Jervis and his flag captain called his attention to the fact that Nelson had not awaited orders.

"I forgive him, Sir," replied Jervis, "and if ever you act in such a manner without orders, I'll forgive you, too!"

TWO PRIZES

Nelson's manoeuvre enabled him to capture the Spanish San Nicolas and then to take the San Josef from the Nicolas.

This was the tradition passed on to Capt. Burgoyne's new ship in 1870.

Nelson's Captain had been converted to a hulk and was lying at Plymouth, many years earlier, in March 1813. During the night it

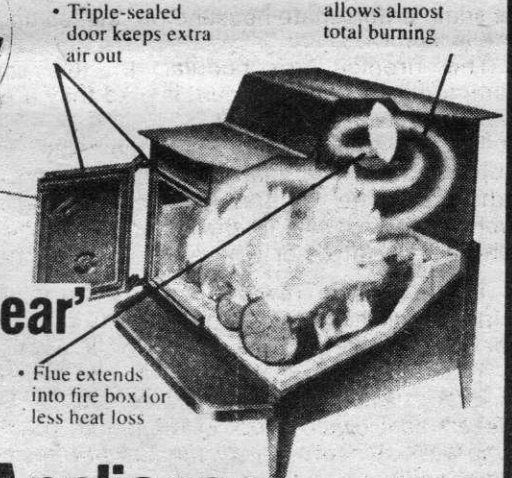

On Tuesday afternoon, June 27, parents of South Salt Spring showed their appreciation to Jack Smith, school bus driver on the Fulford run for over 20 years.

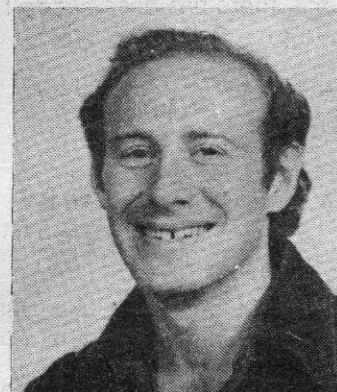
Jack Smith was "hijacked" on his return past the head of Fulford Harbour.

Found guilty of one

Tried for two charges of impaired

Care and control of a vehicle while impaired cost a Pender Island man \$500 in provincial court at Ganges Wednesday. Jens Hansen appeared for trial on two separate charges of care and control while impaired and was found not guilty of the second.

On the first charge, sole witness for the Crown was RCMP Corp. Terry Driscoll, who testified that he had found Hansen's truck in the ditch on Bedwell Harbour Road on the evening of November 18, 1977. Driscoll said that Hansen was seated behind the wheel of his vehicle.

His breath smelled out of alcohol, said the police officer his

speech was slurred and he was unable to keep his balance.

Defense counsel Ray Chauinard asked Driscoll if the accused had been asked to do any sobriety tests, to which the officer replied that he had not. He didn't know how long Hansen had been in the ditch and was not acquainted with rates of alcohol absorption by the body.

ADJOURNMENT

At this point, Chauinard asked for an adjournment in order to obtain an analyst to testify in the trial. His request was refused by Judge D.K. McAdam, who said that the trial date had been set on February 8 and pointed out that it would be October before the trial could continue.

Hansen was called as the only defense witness. He told the court he had been drinking rye and coke at the firehall prior to the accident. He said he believed his judgement was "not quite right" because of the drinks, and that was the reason he went into the ditch.

The catcher of the biggest salmon will be the winner of the \$50 prize and will have the honour of having his name duly inscribed on the Legion Derby Trophy.

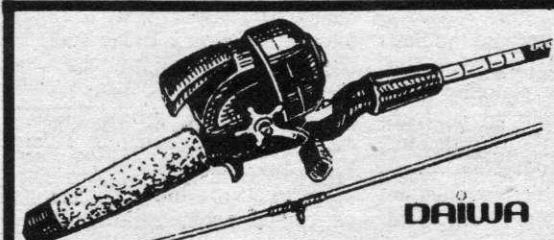
There will be trophies for the biggest cod, the biggest of species other than salmon and cod and a trophy for the most unusual fish.

It is difficult to teach people when undernourished

BY MARY C. WILLIAMSON

Most educators agree it is difficult to teach undernourished children. Extensive research programs have resulted in nutritious school lunches and, in some areas, breakfasts.

Yet these same people will point to the Third World and express horror at the population growth of the poorest countries. Why will they not learn? Why can they not understand? Why will they not adopt (our) sensible birth control measures?

One reason is that it is difficult to teach undernourished people, or an undernourished country.

Otis L. Graham, Jr., is a professor of history at the University of California at Santa Barbara. In this month's "World Issues" he writes on "India's Dilemma".

"Six hundred and twenty million people inhabit India. The country's crude birthrate is a formidable 36 per thousand, a population doubling in 35 years...Roughly 40% of the Indian population is under 15 years of age...Of the poverty afflicting all but a few at the top, I need not speak. It is not just that India is poor; she has been poor for all the centuries.

AS NEVER BEFORE

"It is that this enormous misery is multiplied now as never before by explosive population growth, pyramiding upward, toward what? ...We can envisage an India clog-

ged not with 300,000,000 people, or 600,000,000, pressing upon her resources, but an India with perhaps one billion by the year 2000, topping out no one knows where, finally balanced off by malnutrition and pestilence...

"In 1952, India became the first Asian nation to begin government support for family planning, and she has since claimed a high reputation among Asian states for squarely facing population pressures. She placed more population control professionals in the field than any other state...the government claims it has 80,000 to 10,000

professionals in 35,000 birth control clinics. But this commitment has not brought satisfactory results. Over the years, as China pulled her birthrate from the mid-thirties down to 25 per thousand per year, as Taiwan went to 23 per thousand, as Japan attained a striking 17 per thousand (all three nations now have population growth rates under 2%, India has been able to lower her birthrate to only 36 per thousand."

TEEMING CITIES

Skinner paints a graphic picture of the teeming cities, with squatters settling in under any hospitable tree, in hedges, prevented only from occupying lawns by private guards employed for that

purpose.

"Rural India is also jammed, but agriculture, which absorbs 70% of the working population, cannot offer employment, let alone other acceptable rewards, to the 5 to 10 million who wish to enter the work force every year...Today India is the 10th largest industrial nation in the world, second is Asia, behind Japan...Economic growth in 1976 was virtually stagnant. Things were somewhat better in 1977, but between 1975 and 1977 annual per-capita income shifted only a dollar or two, i.e. from about \$134 a year to \$135...In a country whose annual grain crop is 120 million tons, grain reserves of 20 million tons are a razor-thin edge against starvation.

BELOW SUBSISTENCE LEVEL

"The Economic Times acknowledged in January that 43% of the population is living below subsistence level, and that 25% of the work force is unemployed."

Professor Skinner asks how a nation can achieve economic development when it is not even properly a nation, linguistically, geographically or ethnically?

"There are 15 main languages in India, Hindi being the chief one. English is the linkage language, though perhaps only two percent speak it...Only in Africa do we find nations so divided by the profusion of tongues."

There is so much substance in this article, substance which we need to understand if we are to comprehend the basic problems of the Third World, that I would like to present more of it next week.

On Tuesday the machine quit. On Friday Tony quit.

The machine is the electronic wizard that makes the words you are reading now. It is half electronic and half magic.

Tony is the guy who used to doze in the office during the day to keep up with his elbow at night.

We could fix the typesetting machine.

And we did.

The last time the escapement motor froze the manufacturers expressed complete mystification because it was the first time they had ever heard of such a thing. The second time it froze they were just as mystified.

The motor makes quite a difference. It's part of the magic side of the machine. It decides without anyone telling it how much space should be left in the column for different-sized letters.

If you want an "M" you need more space than for an "L" and so on. But the motor was tripping up on its own cycles and letters were climbing over each other.

That's when we started climbing up each other.

IT TOOK 10 DAYS

A call to Toronto confirmed our worst fears. We needed a new motor. Last time it took 10 days to get the machine running again.

This time we paid \$55 to expedite the part. And it did. We ordered it at 10 am and it was at Patricia Bay Airport waiting for us at 11.30 the same night.

A retired slot-machine-fortune-teller at Sidney picked up the package and met me on the

morning ferry. I was back in the office at 10 o'clock and the machine was running that afternoon.

And there is a moral to all this.

Don't operate mysterious machines and don't fire your staff just because the machine is on the fritz and above all, if it costs \$55 to ship some part in a hurry, figure out how much you lose by not paying it!

I guess that's the only way to fly when it comes to parts.

In finding Hansen guilty, McAdam observed that there was sufficient evidence to show impairment.

"Two weeks ago," said McAdam, "I had occasion to make comments about a police officer who didn't think it necessary to require sobriety tests.

"In this instance, I can see no need..."

Hansen, he noted, had admitted drinking prior to driving.

On the second charge, Corp. Driscoll said he had driven through the parking lot of the pub at Browning Harbour, Pender Island, on the night of March 27.

IN A DITCH

He had found Hansen in his truck, in a ditch near the pub. The accused emerged from his vehicle, said the officer, and appeared to be impaired. Driscoll said he offered Hansen a ride home, but he refused the offer and walked. The officer said he watched Hansen walk a distance of 60 feet, staggering as he did so.

Asked about sobriety tests, the officer said he hadn't thought they were necessary.

The defense produced no witnesses and Chauinard merely observed that there was not sufficient evidence. Hansen had been able to walk home, and that, he said, left reasonable doubt that he was not impaired.

Judge McAdam agreed that evidence was insufficient and noted that the odour of alcohol on Hansen's breath had little meaning.

Such an odour was not surprising, he said, considering he was in the parking lot of a neighbourhood pub.

Booklet prepared by Islands Trust

Planning progress in the islands is reviewed

What's the score in the islands? Planning came to the Gulf Islands in 1967. Since that time there have been innumerable meetings, thousands of documents prepared, regulations promulgated and administrations changed.

What is the status today of the various planning projects?

A Guide to Zoning Planning and Subdivision Control in the Gulf Islands explains the position relative to every island.

Galiano, North Pender, South Pender, Saturna and Salt Spring Islands all have community plans approved and adopted. Mayne Island's plan has been prepared but has yet to receive final approval.

The community plan outlines the guidelines for development as

sought by island residents.

The zoning by-law provides the structure whereby the community plan is implemented. It sets out regulations governing the use of any parcel of land. All the "Gulf Islands" above have zoning by-laws. Mayne, Saturna and South Pender Islands are covered by an acceptable by-law.

Zoning by-laws for Galiano, North Pender and Salt Spring Islands are awaiting amendment.

Subdivision by-laws sets out the manner in which new lots may be created, after the zoning by-law has decreed what land may be used for what purpose.

Salt Spring, Saturna and South Pender Islands have subdivision by-laws. Such a by-law is being prepared for Galiano, Mayne and North Pender Islands.

LAND CONTROLS

The system of islands land controls was introduced under the administration of the Capital Regional District. It has since passed into the realm of the Islands Trust.

The booklet introduced the reader to the concept of planning in the islands and the designated function of the Islands Trust, relative to the 13 islands it embraces as well as the six "Gulf Islands".

It is an agency, explains the introduction, established in 1974 by an Act of the British Columbia Legislature. The Islands Trust Act gives the Trust the responsibility of preserving and protecting the unique amenities and environment of the Trust area for the benefit of the people of the islands and the province generally.

In 1977 the act was amended to

transfer authority for all land planning matters on the islands to the Islands Trust from the Regional Districts.

The Islands Trust has a General Trust Committee for the entire Islands Trust area. The General Trust committee oversees the operation of the Trust office and considers and decides on land planning matters that affect the Trust area as a whole.

LOCAL COMMITTEES

There is a Local Trust Committee for each of the designated islands. The Trust embraces more than those 13 islands, but the smaller islands are administered by the General Trust.

Development and population growth was once considered a benefit to every community. Lately population growth has been seen as a mixed blessing and many associate growth with a deterioration of the quality of the natural environment, says the booklet.

Coupled with this comes the strong feeling that those affected by land development should be

involved in the establishment of policies that affect their area.

Involvement of the residents of a community in matters of planning and population growth has introduced two new functions into the islands.

The Board of Variance is a body of three unpaid, appointed citizens who have the authority to grant relief from a literal enforcement of a zoning by-law.

It serves two purposes. It may determine whether officials are misinterpreting the meaning of the by-law or misapplying it.

RELIEF OFFERED

The Board may also grant relief from certain provisions of the zoning by-law if the property owner can show that compliance with those requirements will deny him reasonable use of his property.

The Advisory Planning Commission is also a body of unpaid citizens. It represents a local group, on the spot, to advise the Trust on community planning, rezoning and other matters refer-

red to it by the Trust.

Neither the Community Plan nor the Zoning By-law can be changed without an official public hearing at which all local residents may express their opinions on such an amendment.

The Subdivision By-law does not require that public hearing.

General Trustees are Chairman Marc Holmes, of Salt Spring Island; Vice-chairman Nelder Boulton, of Gabriola and Trustee John Gaines, of Saturna.

All three were appointed by the provincial government. In November their terms will expire and the next general trustees will be named by the local trustees from their own ranks.

Local trustees for the local islands are, Galiano, Ron Thompson and Hart Scarrow; Mayne Island, Isobel Geehan and John Mundie; North Pender Island, Gordon Wallace and Kelly Irving; Salt Spring Island, John Fisher and Chuck Longueay; Saturna Island, Barry Crooks and Jim Money; South Pender Island, Allan Brooks and Hope Jennens.

Charge is withdrawn

A charge of driving a motor vehicle while disqualified from doing so was withdrawn in provincial court at Ganges on Wednesday.

The charge against Rino Landucci was scheduled for trial but Crown counsel asked that it be withdrawn due to lack of evidence.

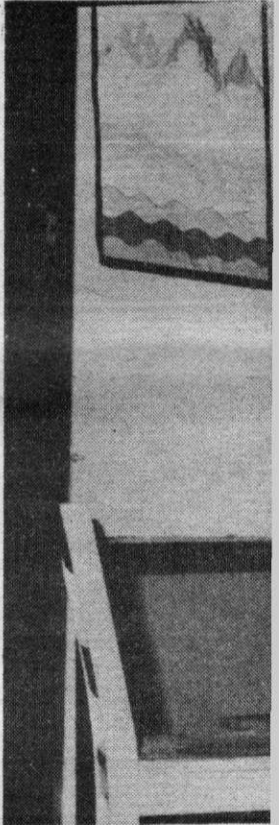
This year's show has been concentrated a little and the available floor space has been more carefully carved up to accommodate the larger number of exhibits.

Down Through The Years With Driftwood

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

Today marks another step in improved ferry service for Gulf Islanders when MV Queen of the Islands sails in to Ganges dock at 12.20 pm on its maiden run between Tsawwassen and the Gulf Islands.

The new vessel is 236 feet long and can carry 40 cars and 400 people. It will travel at 15 knots and employs a crew of 12.

Miss Kathy Butt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Butt, Beaver Point, last week took over management of Nan's Coffee Bar at Fulford.

There is available a local, drugless treatment for high blood pressure and ulcers, which practically never fails. TEN YEARS AGO

There is no longer a forest ranger building in Ganges. The familiar headquarters of the ranger service was sold last week to Alex McManus for \$14,300 when his bid was the highest at a public auction.

The building was constructed shortly after the second world war and served all the islands at one time.

Last spring staff was withdrawn from the island and the building was vacated. Standing on more than one acre of land, the building is located next to the RCMP office.

The Lady Minto Gulf Islands Hospital has received the green light from the regional board to purchase a property adjoining the present hospital and covering four acres for their future needs.

Interest in the Centennial Park at Ganges proved to be very weak last week when only six persons attended the Chamber of Commerce meeting to name a committee.

The meeting went ahead with its plans and named Adrian Wolfe-Milner, Henry Geigerich and Norman Mout as trustees of the park fund.

On Wednesday evening the flag staffs at Centennial Park in Ganges proudly bore their flags.

On Thursday morning the two sticks were bare. For the third time in a year the flags from the cenotaph had been stolen.

A year ago a group of navy cadets were held responsible for the theft of the flags. They were apprehended and the flags recovered.

New Salt Spring Island church proved too small for the crowd which gathered for its dedication on Sunday.

Church was packed and congregation and visitors were seated in the porch at the formal ceremony for the Community Gospel Church Drake Road.

Minister, Rev. M.V. Gilpin introduced the various participants and the officiating minister, Rev. L.A. Pritchard, of the Evangelistic Tabernacle in Vancouver.

The new building is 50 feet long, by about 27 feet wide.

FIVE YEARS AGO

For the second time in a quarter-century, Saturna Lamb Barbecue ran short of lamb before I reached the serving table. The last time there was a shortage was the first time it was staged.

On Sunday, the visitors came in cruisers, charter vessels, ferries, ships and planes from everywhere. Half way through the day Cliff Sacker reported 300 small boats in the bay.

Scottish dancing will be among the highlights of the Drummond Park Clambake on Saturday.

Fulford is a busy place as the community sets the pattern for the third annual clambake in the harbour children's playground.

It will be a day of seafood, games and entertainment. In addition to the Scottish traditional dancing there will be a repeat performance of parachute jumping and log rolling.

Water bombers doused a fire on Galiano with water when firemen were unable to reach it from the road.

Fire was in the deep woods at the head of Georgeson Bay on Friday evening. The heavy bomber was accompanied by a smaller plane carrying a public address system. The smaller plane warned people on the ground to get out of the way of the water bomber.

It took five passes and the fire was out.

The fire was one of two on Galiano during the holiday week end. Both were attributed by firemen to carelessness in the woods.

More than 50 boats sailed out of Miner's Bay on Sunday to try for the "big one" to win prizes provided by the Mayne Island Lions Club. The day was ideal for onlookers and we assume it was the same for the fishermen.

Al Brau, of Mayne, was the big winner, catching a 29-lb. 5 oz. salmon, taking the first prize of \$250. Don Turberfield was second, with 17 lbs. even, winning \$100. Mrs. Mitzi Saito's 10 lb. 1 oz. catch took third, winning \$50. Roy Crispin won the hidden weight prize. His 6 lbs. 7 oz. fish won him a Polaroid camera.

Historical Society names winning writers

SATURNA ISLAND PIONEER: Mrs. A. Bavis

Grades 4 and 5 . . . Second

KELLY CROOKS
Grade 5 Saturna

Q. Where were you born?
A. I was born in England.

Q. Why did you come to Saturna Island?
A. For a holiday. Mr. Bavis was logging and I came for a month's holiday, beginning April 29, 1946, 1946.

Q. When did you start to live here?
A. April 29, 1946. I never went back.

Q. How old were you when you came?
A. Twenty, and I had my twenty-first birthday on the island.

Q. How did you come here? Were there ferries?
A. No, there was a C.P.R. boat, the "Mary" but I came in by a small boat. It was called the "Billy Girl".

Q. How many years have you been on the Island?
A. I have been on the Island for 32 years.

Q. What time of the year did you come?
A. I came in the spring. It was pouring with rain and we came in a howling gale. But the 1st of May was beautiful and the Island looked just terribly beautiful. When I got to the wharf I nearly turned back but the second day I loved it.

LIVED AT NARVAEZ BAY

Q. Did you live in this house or did you live somewhere else?
A. I lived at Narvaez Bay. It was a four bedroom house and full of cobwebs and spiders and mice and water. We had a well but we had to drain it because there was a dead deer in it and the water wasn't so good. When we first came we had to pack the wood from the beach in a basket because we didn't have a car.

Q. How did you cook your food?
A. I cooked on a fire stove, a very old one in fact. I think any lady would be happy to have it now, but I wasn't too happy at the time.

Q. For your vegetables, did you go to the store or did you have a garden?
A. Yes, I had a really big one. I used to sell my vegetables at Mrs. Ralph's store in the summer.

Q. How did you get your meat?
A. We went fishing every day because we didn't have a refrigerator, and on boat day we could have a roast for the night. In the summertime we had to cook it right away.

FURNITURE

Q. What kind of furniture did you have?
A. There was a rocking chair and when you sat in it, it tipped over so you had to sit very straight. There were two other chairs and a kitchen table. We had to fix one leg on it. Our bed was made out of a bedspring we found on the beach and there was a mattress upstairs which the mice got at. But I was only coming for a months holiday. I didn't bring anything to sleep on.

Q. How many people were there when you came?
A. Well, there were about ten families on the island but more came later.

Q. Were there any cars around?
A. Yes, they came by lifting them on to the deck of the boat with the crane and then lifting them off. But the logger's cars came by barge.

ISLAND ROADS

Q. What were the roads like?
A. The roads were a lot narrower than they are now. There was grass growing in the middle because the horse carts and the cars were high centered and nothing could ever bother the grass, so the roads were very pretty. They weren't rutted because there was never any hard traffic on them whatsoever. Everybody helped trimming the grass to work off their taxes.

Q. Where was the mill?
A. The mill was down at Boot Cove. It was not running when I came but it started up again.

Q. Where were the stores when you came?
A. There was two stores just like now. One was down at the wharf and the other was down at Narvaez Bay. Mr. Jackson ran the one at the wharf. Mr. Ralph ran the other.

NOT AS BIG

Q. What was the wharf like?
A. It wasn't too different than it is today. It didn't have a ferry slip and it wasn't as big as it is now. But it was quite similar.

Q. Were there any farmers when you came?
A. One was farming at that time but afterwards there were none. Mr. and Mrs. Campbell and another young couple, but the young couple didn't stay very long because there wasn't very good farm land.

Q. Was there any sign of Indians?
A. Oh yes, we had one in the Bay fishing, but not living on the island. He was very friendly. He used to bring me fish. I think his family is living on Galiano. His name was Patty George.

Q. How did you tell time?
A. We had battery clocks and radios but we had to order our batteries from the store.

Q. Did you work or did Mr. Bavis just work?
A. Well when we didn't have electricity, no water and had to go get wood, I'd say, yes, I did work.

Q. Did you like living on Saturna Island?
A. Oh, yes, I loved it. I don't think I would like to live in a city after this.

Grades 6 and 7 . . . First

THE HISTORY OF GALLIANO SCHOOLS

NICOLE ALBRECHT:
Grade 6 Galiano

I am writing about all the schools that have been on Galiano Island between 1893 and 1978.

The first school was kindly built by Mr. Gru'bb in 1893. It was built at the bottom of Bluff Road where Pip Finnis lives now. But after a few years the school stopped being used so it was discarded and built into some small cabins up Morgan Road, and they are still there now.

The new school was built up Burrill Road.

Then, in 1906, the school from Burrill Road was moved. It was built up on the old logging road opposite Whaler Bay. That school remained there until approximately 1920. At that time Mr. Murchinson was in charge of schools. Soon the new school became what is now the Galino Building Supplies.

At the North end of Galiano there is an old building frequently used as a hall. A long time ago it was a school. It had been built in 1927. In the back of the school there was a section, separate from the actual school, for the teachers to live and sleep in.

There was also a school by Retreat Cove.

ON MCCLURE ROAD
Up McClure Road there also was a school. The building was a cabin

where the loggers from the nearby logging camp lived.

In 1953, Mr. Robson gave 15 acres of land to the school board and our school now is built on part of that fifteen acres. Now only two of the fifteen acres is cleared.

Any place that there were ten or more children, a school could be built, or a different building could be temporarily used as a school. But as soon as the school bus came into use there was no need for more than one school.

Several years after our present school was built there was a group of grade eights and nines, and there was no room for them inside the school. Some people brought an old streetcar to the school, and desks were installed. They even had electricity in the car. All of the two grades fitted. Even now there is a black tube at the corner of our school. That tube carried water to the streetcar.

Several years ago a park by the name of Centennial Park was built on part of the school property.

Just lately some of the Galiano School students found the sides of the old style desks between ten to fifteen years old.

That is all of the schools that have been on Galiano Island.

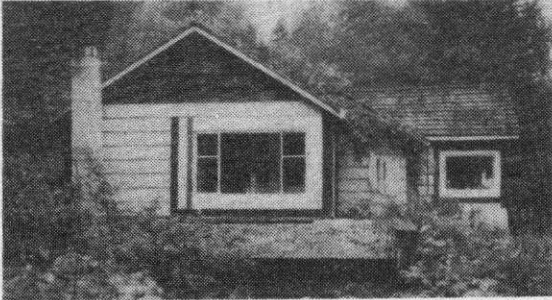

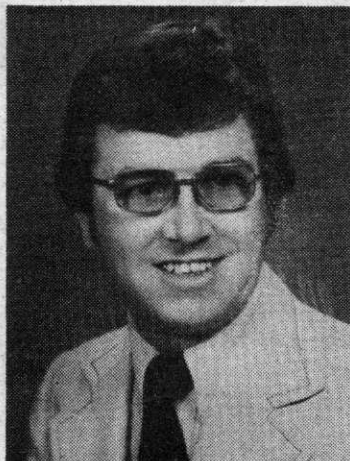

was burned out. Lying next to it was the prize taken by Nelson in the Captain, the San Josef. With difficulty, it was saved.

When the new ship was designed by Capt. Cowper Coles, RN and built in Laird Brothers' yards at Birkenhead it was given the famous name.

The new Captain, commissioned the turret ship on April 30, 1870. She was a new design altogether, with a low freeboard and fully ship-rigged. She sailed less than six months.

Attached to the Channel fleet, the Captain turned completely upside down and foundered during the squally night of September 7, 1870.

THEY WERE LOST

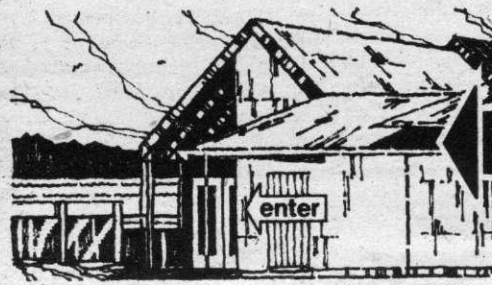
Almost the entire crew of 500 perished in the disaster. Included in the list were Capt. Burgoyne and the designer, Capt. Coles.

Two brass plaques were placed in St. Paul's Cathedral commemorating the names of the officers and men of the Captain. The plaques were placed there by Capt. Richards, RN, who commanded HMS Plumper, west coast survey vessel in 1859.

That was the brief story of the triumph and the tragedy of the man who gave his name to a small cove on Salt Spring.

Booklet recalls history

INDIAN WEAVING AS AN ART

It was interesting to glance through the Hancock House booklet on weaving and see a picture of Ed Underwood.

The late Chief of the Tsaut Reserve at Saanichton is shown on the cover of Indian Weaving Knitting Basketry of the Northwest, by Elizabeth Hawkins.

The 32-page book shows the various styles of Indian work in brilliant colour. It brings to the fore some of the traditional work of the native people in a splash of colour.

Everyone is familiar with the Indian sweater, or Cowichan sweater, with the pleasing designs and its utility. A Cowichan sweater will keep out the cold and it takes a lot of soaking to really get through the wool.

The book shows the traditional styles and introduces some more modern dying which has been introduced in latter years.

Weaving has always been an art practiced by the Indian people and particularly among the tribes of the lower Fraser Valley and Vancouver Island, writes Elizabeth Hawkins.

I hadn't realized that Bernadette Underwood was from Koksilah, although her workshop on Pat Bay Highway at the Saanichton traffic lights has long been a landmark and an outlet for her knitted Indian sweaters.

The booklet will be of particular interest to the growing group of islanders interested in weaving and similar crafts.

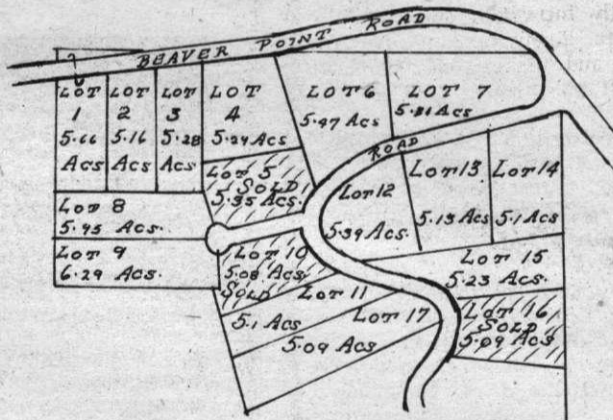
