New pontoons for ferry terminals

Tenders have been called by the ministry of highways and public works for replacement of pontoons at the Crofton and Vesuvius Bay ferry terminals.

Due date for the bids is August 8.

The pontoons are the floating portions of ferry terminals which support the ramps and move up and down with the tides.

The present timber pontoons, originally salvaged from the old Ladner ferry landings in the early 60's, will be replaced by concrete units 11.8 metres long by 9.6 metres wide by 2 metres deep.

Hundreds warned

Police patrol Active Pass as three operators nabbed

RCMP from Ganges and Sidney have been patrolling Active Pass very closely. The check is a follow-up of increasing complaints that the large fleet of pleasure boats fishing near Active Pass fails to give way to ferries passing through.

For four days, Friday to Monday, a marked police boat and a plain boat were engaged in the patrol.

At one time they counted more than 70 vessels in the southern entrance to the Pass, all engaged in fishing.

They report having warned hundreds of operators. They also laid charges against three operators.

The patrol is to be continued through the summer and boat operators who obstruct the passage of larger vessels will be charged.

Rezoning is sought

Plans laid for massive supermarket in Ganges on Quesnel property

Plans of K & R Your Food Store to build a 30,000 square foot supermarket in Ganges were revealed on Tuesday afternoon last week when initial application was filed for releasing the property from the agricultural land reserve.

Appearing for the company, Walter Large explained that the market would be located on the property of Mrs. Frances Quesnel, with the exception of that part of the property abutting on Jackson Ave.

Application for rezoning the land and for its removal from the land reserve was submitted at the same time.

Large noted that the present development plans for Ganges provide that this property will be served by the Ganges sewer system.

In addition to the supermarket, the company anticipated that within two or three years there would probably be other stores forming a mall adjacent to the proposed food market.

About half the site, or some three acres would be devoted to a car park, the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee was told.

The Islands Trust has made no comment on the applications which will be studied. If the Trust should favour the proposal it must still come before a public hearing for an expression of opinion from the public.

The food store will provide about 28,000 square feet, said the company spokesman after the public meeting.

Asked for an estimate of the costs involved, Walter Large suggested that the building will cost

about \$750,000 and that, with equipment, they are "talking in terms of a million dollars". The estimate does not include the cost of the 6½ acres of land.

K & R has been on Salt Spring Island for six years, recalled Large.

"We have been looking for a location in the core area of Ganges," he told Driftwood, "and we are hoping to make the core area a better place to shop."

It is not the business already enjoyed on the island that the store is looking at. It is the business which currently goes off-island.

"We want to make more business stick on the island," he told Driftwood, "and this will benefit all island businesses."

He visualizes a shopping area embracing the present core area of Ganges and extending to Rainbow and Jackson.

K & R operate five stores, of which four are located on Vancouver Island. The company is currently looking at developing their Sooke store, as well as the Ganges project.

Who wants Mahon Hall?

Who wants Mahon Hall? The veteran Community Hall at Ganges will be up for grabs in December.

On Thursday afternoon last week trustees of the Gulf Islands School District agreed that the hall would not be required for school purposes after that time.

In December it is expected that the Fernwood School will open and the pressures on Salt Spring Elementary School will ease up.

The alternate classes will move into the main school building and the present site of the special classes will no longer be in use.

The insurance commission and the fire marshal's office require extensive changes to the hall if it is to be used for school purposes.

The board was reluctant to publicize the modifications called for on the grounds that they will not be required of any future operator of the hall if educational purposes are not continued.

"We'll try to eke out our existence with the hall as long as we can," reported Buildings Committee Chairman Don Fairweather. "If the community wants to take it over, then, it's up to the community."

Unlike majority of buildings relinquished by the school district, Mahon Hall started out as a community hall. It was taken over by the school system decades ago and put into use, with its adjacent property, as a school facility.

The board formally decided that once Fernwood School is opened, the hall will no longer be used for school purposes.

Island community groups will be invited to make proposals for its adoption.

Galiano school population, however, rose from 47 to 49.

His license was suspended for a minimum of three months.

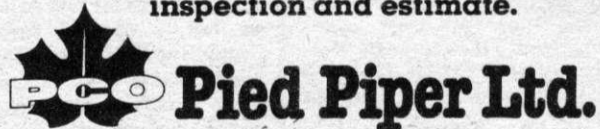
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TO BE FRANK . . .

Accident rate is up here

Shortage of beer has had one logical result in the islands.

Confiscation of beer by the RCMP Detachment at Ganges has fallen sharply since the labour dispute in BC breweries.

There was one such incident in July, three in June and 13 in May.

Police statistics on highway patrol show a sharp increase during July in the number of accidents.

Of a total of 25 accidents on Salt Spring Island and Galiano Island, in July, 21 involved property damage exceeding \$200; three involved personal injury and one led to a fatality.

Large number of speeding charges arose from the accident reports.

Statistics also indicate that there were seven charges of impairment and one of being in charge of a boat while the ability was impaired by alcohol. There were also seven charges of driving without due care and attention. This is higher than average and most of the charges arose from motor vehicle accidents.

Wins out when no details

Henry W. Pickering benefitted on Wednesday last week when a full information on a traffic offence was not available to Ganges Provincial Court.

Pickering, 18, resident of Beaver Point, was charged with being in possession of liquor while a minor; carrying no driver's license and failure to keep to the right side of the road.

Act now: vote later!

Every Canadian capable of reading a newspaper or watching a television show knows that an election is in the offing.

And every Canadian will be eligible to cast his ballot in that election when it comes.

But nobody else will be able to vote.

It's not like the last election. At the time the Canada Elections Act, of 1970, was only partly operative. There was a five-year stay in the act, which permitted non-Canadians to vote in federal elections if they were already qualified as voters. That's all over.

When the mysterious election is called, only Canadian citizens will be eligible to express their opinion on the next government of Canada. And rightly so.

This doesn't apply to provincial elections or municipal voting. It is only for federal elections.

If any reader is a British subject and not a Canadian citizen, his days of voting are over. Until he becomes a Canadian citizen. That's easy. But it is also essential to casting a ballot.

If this applies to you, get cracking!

This is stupid!

There is something utterly stupid and frustrating about the islands school situation.

The people of the islands are required to pay substantial taxes to help the larger centres of the province educate their more numerous children. Then each Outer Island parent must dig yet deeper into his own pocket in order to find the funds to either board his children on Salt Spring Island or pay the cost of transporting those children across the water.

Where does the provincial government get the gall to have us pay for other people's children while we have to pay twice for our own?

If the principle of sharing costs is sound, then the cost of transporting students in a sea-girt community such as ours should be shared. We should be entitled to a substantially higher transportation subsidy than a community where wheels can run.

If the ministry of education does not think along these lines, then the whole principle of robbing Peter to pay Paul for school costs is a rip-off.

Outer Islanders pay taxes to support their own schools. Then they pay taxes to support the unfortunate rich in the larger centres. And finally, they pay a third levy to get their own children to the schools that have already cost them dear.

Is this British Columbia justice?

Based on the Neighbourhood Watch program, the plan calls for marking of all movable items on boats and a keen eye on other people's property.

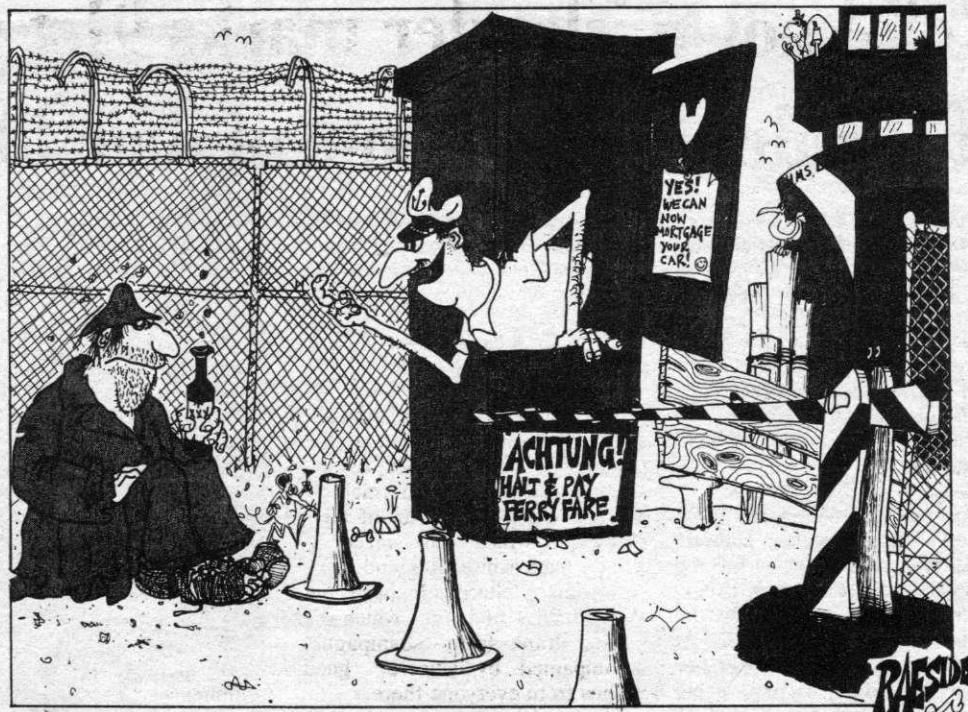
Only one or two owners responded to the invitation to set it up.

Alternate class spokesman asks for sole use of Hall

Trustees of Gulf Islands School District were commended last week for their approval of the growth of the alternate class with the appointment of an additional teacher this coming year.

John Roise addressed the board, at Galiano, on behalf of the parents of students in that class.

Parents want to make various appurtenances for the class, he reported. These would include lockers, partitions, shelving and other furnishings of wood.

Parents also asked for changing the lighting system from fluorescent lights to incandescent bulbs.

Book press, mathematics laboratory, specialized reading material, musical instruments and transportation were also requested.

Total cost was estimated at \$2,975.

TO PRINCIPAL

The request should properly be addressed to the principal, explained Chairman Tom Davidson. Much of the requested material would be payable from the school allocation which is given to the principal.

The parents would also like to meet half the cost of these extras, reported Roise, in addition to contributing labour.

The finance committee of the parents of the alternate class would also like to meet the finance

committee of the school board, said the speaker.

Parents also asked for the exclusive use of Mahon Hall until such time as the class moves into the elementary school.

Board could not agree to the exclusive use of Mahon Hall. There are commitments already undertaken for its use out of school hours, Roise was told. He was invited to discuss the request initially with the principal.

TRUST SAYS NO

Rezoning of property to the west of Valcourt's development has been turned down by the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee.

Meeting in Ganges last week, the committee heard an application from Allen Cunningham for rezoning of property located between Valcourt's new mall and Valhalla Road from residential to commercial for the establishment of a mobile home park and building centre.

Trustees noted that a number of applications had been made for the rezoning of the property during the past seven months.

On the motion of Chuck Longueay and Jack Fisher the application was rejected. Vote was unanimous, it was noted.

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
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Tennis attracts 44 contestants in height of summer heat on Salt Spring

PAINTER BRUCE CLARK RETURNS TO ISLAND

On a summer day, about five years ago, the well known artist Bruce Clark sailed into Ganges harbour in the yellow boat he had so lovingly built himself, with the idea of spending a short holiday on the Islands and doing a little painting.

He made the Little Gallery in Mouat's Mall his headquarters and painted his oils and acrylics for a delighted audience of Islanders and tourists and anyone else who happened along.

To say that Bruce Clark charmed all visitors to the Gallery would be putting it mildly. He set up his easel and talked while he painted; giving impromptu painting lessons to his audience while he worked.

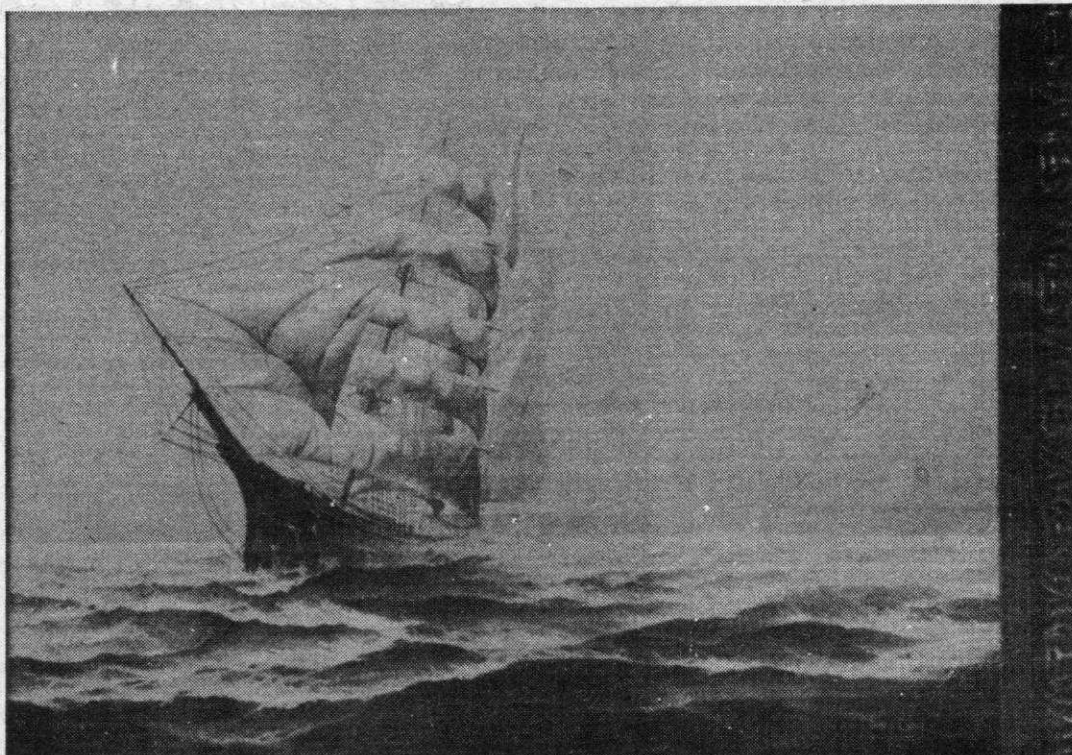
Bruce was already well established as an artist of no mean ability, having had several successful art shows to his credit, appeared on television demonstrating his art, and been written up in a splendid article which appeared in

the week-end Islander Magazine of the Victoria Colonist.

EARLY SHIPS

He is perhaps best known for his large paintings of early sailing ships. Somehow he manages to get hold of an ancient plan for a barque or brigantine and then sets about recreating the original vessel with brush and canvas, clearly demonstrating his abiding love of the sea.

Yet Bruce Clark's vivid paintings of early sailing ships, riding the seas in full sail, are by no means representative of the full measure of his creative ability. Many of his fine artist's paintings embody a whimsical quality which art lovers find irresistible; such as the charming acrylic of the little boy with the paper hat, pretending to be captain of the ship as he plays on the slanted deck of an old derelict which has been left to rot on a lonely beach, and just for an added touch of whimsy, the child's antics are being lazily observed by a bored cat. Another delightful can-



vas shows two parrots lovingly sitting beak to beak on a single perch.

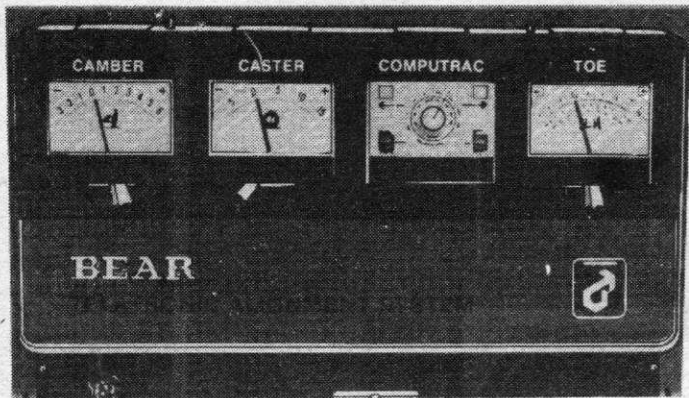

Chemicals for Island water show sharp divergence among Trust

There was a sharp divergence of opinion in Salt Spring Island Trust Committee last week when the question of lake protection was discussed.

The committee was considering the study of St. Mary Lake. And they considered Eurasian milfoil.

In passing it was noted that at Lake Kalamalka, in the Okanagan, there had been a "90% kill" with chemical treatment.

Both governments are aware of the need for research into the weed infestation, it was agreed.

"If we got into the milfoil question," suggested Chairman Marc Holmes, "we should distinguish between lakes used for potable water. I would not be a party to its use."

He referred to the chemical treatment of milfoil.

"Ken Patrick would be very

opposed," noted Jack Fisher.

Patrick is chairman of the North Salt Spring Waterworks District.

Nelder Boulton was cautious. He would want to hear from the scientists before taking any stand on the matter.

The United States government has directed that greater attention be paid to the use of 2-4:D, commented the chairman.

"It could be more serious than believed," he observed.

More and bigger parks for islands people and visitors

The provincial government has increased the size of one marine park in the Gulf Islands and authorized the establishment of another.

Cabbage Island, near Tumbo Island, was purchased through the co-operation of the Nature Conservancy of Canada and the Devonian

Foundation and is to become a Class "A" Marine Park.

"The island has significant recreation and scenic values with opportunities for boating, fishing, swimming and nature appreciation," said Hugh Curtis, Municipal Affairs Minister Hugh Curtis, MLA for the Islands.

"The acquisition of Cabbage Island ensures a small but greatly needed land base to Reef Anchorage, a popular location with Gulf Islands' and coastal residents," he added.

In addition, Curtis announced, that Montague Harbour Provincial Marine Park on Galiano Island has been increased in area by ten hectares (25 acres).

"It is one of the Gulf Islands' most popular public areas and will now have an area of 97 hectares (239 acres)," said Curtis.

Mill rate for two years is examined by school board

When the Gulf Islands School Board met last week on Galiano Island, the comparison of school costs for two years was offered in graphic form.

Biggest single increase was in the basic local educational program.

Cost in 1977 was 25.6 mills. By 1978 the cost had risen to 32.1 mills.

Next highest, the grant that is taken from some districts to be paid to others, stood at eight mills in 1977 and fell to 6.8 mills this year. Reduction was due to the increased local costs.

Non-sharable operating costs were 2.7 mills last year and 3.8 mills this year. Debt services rose from 1.7 mills to 3.1 mills.

Non-sharable capital costs remained the same, at one mill, while adult education doubled, from 0.1 to 0.2 mills.

Secretary-treasurer Wilf Peck explained that surplus from 1976 reduced the 1977 rate and a deficit from 1977 increased the 1978 level. Trustees expressed regret that the financing is not understood by the majority of taxpayers.

The Haigh's back after 18,000 miles

Val and Ernest Haigh returned to Salt Spring Island last Wednesday in their Trimaran, Tryste II after a one-year voyage to the South Pacific.

They spent four months in New Zealand, stopping on the way there at San Francisco, Hawaii, Fanning Island, Suvarow Island and Vavau in the Tongas.

On their return they called at Fiji, Rotuma, Funafuti and Nukifetau in the Ellice Islands (now renamed Tuvalu) and Kusaie and Ponape in the Caroline Islands.

Ponape was their last port of call before starting on the last passage to Victoria, a distance of 5,100 miles which they accomplished in 39 days.

Their total distance covered in the year amounted to almost 18,000 miles.

They must clean it up

Application has been received by the Islands Trust for subdivision of a Fulford property, trustees were told at last week's meeting in Ganges.

Chris Foord reported that the ministry of highways had called for a fill to cover the septic disposal field to arrest a current problem of sewage running off the property.

Trust called for the assurances of the health authorities that the sewage could be handled on the subdivided property before proceeding with the application.

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National unity and Quebec

Danger! Economic disparity is greater threat!

Canada is one nation and Canada will remain one nation.

Nevertheless, it will be a nation with a new approach to national problems and a new awareness of the responsibilities as well as the benefits of each region.

Canadians, in the past 10 years, have opted for unity.

An islander who is at the heart of the debate on unity has spent the past week or so at his home on Goat Island, in the harbour off Ganges. He is Stanley C. Roberts, president of the Canada West Foundation.

For the past several years Roberts has been the western spokesman for western provincial recognition. Canada West Foundation is a representative of the four western provinces and it was created to ensure that the aspirations and the interests of western Canadians shall not be forgotten while the nation wrestles with the return home of its constitution.

Speaker, listener, writer, debater, Roberts is everything that the occasion demands when Canadians gather to discuss unity and confederation.

Canada West speaks for Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia.

Stan Roberts speaks for the Foundation.

Who better?

He was born in Manitoba, taught at Simon Fraser and now lives in Alberta.

The Foundation started off to look after western interests. If the constitution was to come home,

then the west must be remembered.

THERE WAS NO WEST

When confederation was accomplished there was no west. The interests of the west were as far from the minds of those early fathers of the nation as Timbuktu. The land west of the Ontario border was wild country peopled by unknown native nations and paved with buffalo chips.

They knew there was a Pacific Ocean, but there was no way they were going to make provision for off-shore drilling or Pacific salmon or the great inside seas.

In Roberts' words: The chief objective of the Canada West Foundation is to strengthen the position of the west within confederation.

It seeks to provide information, knowledge and a mechanism for expression of interests common to the Western Region. It attempts to express the West's concerns and aspirations and to ensure that those concerns and aspirations are heard in all areas where decisions affecting the West are made.

The Foundation believes that more decisions affecting the West should be made in the West by Westerners.

It is determined that the West shall be served by national policies which will allow it to grow and prosper. It intends to ensure that the West's voice is heard in the expected national debate on the federal system of government.

COUNCIL

Guiding the Foundation are some 40 responsible western citizens. It was they who early in the game recognized the first decision to be reached. Speculation on the future of Quebec led to speculation on the future of unity. What was best for the West?

The first decision by the Council was that the four western provinces would fare better as four provinces than as individual national entities, together or separately.

When the Council reached that decision, it imposed a positive direction on the Foundation. The western voice must be raised in the interests of unity. In seeking proper and acceptable changes in the constitution, the Foundation must direct its energies towards and assurance that there will be a confederation to exercise that constitution.

The President is back from a tour of the east. On Friday he was in Ganges and answered a few pressing questions.

Will Quebec secede?

It is not likely. The election two years ago, with its sharp swing towards the Parti Quebecois, let off a lot of provincial steam. Tempers were high and la Belle Province had been seething over its sense of trailing behind the rest of the country. The election of Rene Levesque and his PQ was the

climax of this sense of frustration that had been festering for decades.

FRENCH IS SECURE

The past year has seen a contentment in Quebec over many accomplishments. French is secure as the provincial language and changes in provincial legislature brought in by the new government has answered the demands of many formerly dissatisfied quebeois.

The province wants changes. The people of Quebec want recognition.

But the majority appear to have reached the same conclusion as the majority of Canadians in every region: they are better off as part of this vast nation.

The biggest threat to Canada's integrity today is not cultural disparity: it is economic stress.

Roberts cited the plight of the maritime provinces. Their resources have failed and their industry has collapsed. The rest of Canada is called on to help the maritimes. Result is protest from many who are called on to give and protest from those who receive help and depend on it, when they should be able to stand on their own feet.

The pulp industry cannot compete with the west coast and the fishing industry has met disaster

after disaster. Steel mills have cut back and industry is at a standstill.

Yet, the spokesman for the West is optimistic. New, unknown coal reserves have been found in Nova Scotia. And the limits have been extended to 200 miles. Stan Roberts sees the two factors as the opening of a new lease of life for the maritimes.

Every region of Canada is distinctive. Residents of each region are protective and conservative.

They are also unpredictable.

In many national debates the sympathies of various regions switch from section to section. Not infrequently the spokesmen for Quebec will express sympathy with western pleas for greater consideration. This alliance sometimes sits heavily with the staid, conservative easterners.


Canada West Foundation is funded by the western provinces. It is open to any resident who is interested in the western voice as part of the national expression.

It has already accomplished one achievement never previously known in the west. The Foundation has brought four provinces together and to agreement on a number of national issues. Those four provinces have not previously recognized their common concerns and they have never, in the past, travelled east to speak in one voice on any subject.

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Driving costs him \$650 fine
Lorne K. Roland was fined \$650 when he pleaded guilty on Wednesday last week to impaired driving.

There's got to be enough water or there's no building there!

Islands Trust has established a yardstick for measuring the amount of water which must be available in a subdivision.

Last week the amendment of the Salt Spring Island Subdivision By-law was approved whereby an adequate supply of potable water is positively defined.

The by-law will now read that the adequate supply means a protected supply of drinking water which is developed on or supplied to a parcel and which, in the opinion of the approving officer, is capable of producing, on site, a minimum flow of 250 imperial gallons per day per dwelling any time in the month of September.

The water quality must meet approved drinking water standards.

It was noted that the amendment does not mean that a well must be drilled on every parcel.

If the medical health officer demands the service, the approving officer may now demand a community water supply system for subdivisions creating lots of five acres or less in size. If there is not a community system, then each lot, smaller than five acres must have its own water supply.

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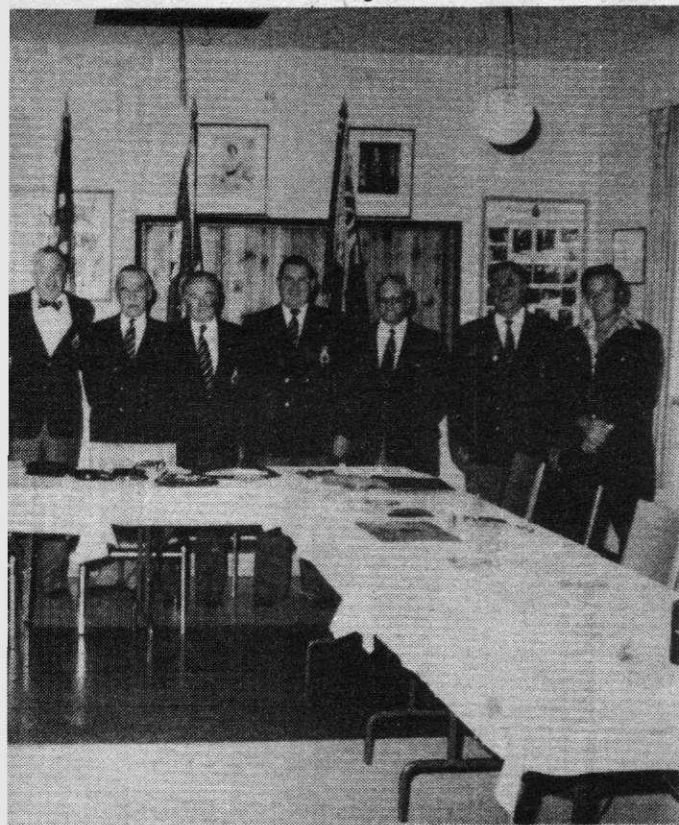

SHUTTERBUGS

Support that Camera!

Says Cedric Barker

Most people do not realize how many of their pictures suffer from camera shake.

In most cases it is readily apparent in the "proof" pictures, those first prints received with the developed roll of film. Those photographers who decorate their homes with pictures have certainly been shocked at least once when their enlargement returned from the processor.

"But that slide seemed so sharp!" they always say.

The truth is that projection screens for your slide shows are

TEMPORARY HOMES

Islands Trust is to consider a ban which has been imposed on the construction of temporary residences on Salt Spring Island.

Meeting in Ganges on Tuesday last week the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee learned that the Capital Regional District has imposed a ban on the issue of permits for the construction of sheds to be occupied as residences only until such times as the home is completed.

Such structures are then required to be converted to storage or garage use.

Question which has arisen, it was explained, is that of making the conversion mandatory. The owner has not always kept his bargain and eliminated the temporary structure as a residence. It has in some instances, become an illegal cottage.

Nelder Boulton suggested that the posting of a bond would settle the issue. If the conversion were not made, then the owner would forfeit his bond.

Committee decided to meet with the planning and the building inspection departments of the Capital Regional District to discuss the problem.

made so that minor flaws are invisible. Therefore, use a flat-white-painted wall to check your transparencies. The small size of proof prints also tends to hide the fuzzy nature of your pictures.



Glossy print surfaces show the greatest detail in proofs, while silk finish hides most minor flaws.

A SUPPORT

Assuming that you have focused your manual camera under good lighting conditions, the next most important thing is to find a sturdy support for it. Instamatic and instant print cameras stand to benefit more than any other type because of their light weight, small size and slow shutter speeds.

A tripod is obviously your best support and recently even 110 instamatics have been made with

tripod sockets. The disadvantages are the cost of a tripod (\$15 and up) and the added weight to carry.

Monopods and tabletop models are a good light-weight alternative. However, numerous institutions have banned tripods from their premises, including the Provincial Museum in Victoria and the Colosseum in Rome.

SOLID OBJECT

Our first alternative is to attempt to locate a solid object to rest the camera on such as a railing, fence post etc. You may hug a street sign or hold your

camera tight against a wall or telephone pole. Make sure your horizon is straight, though.

Failing to find this support, you may sit on something and brace your elbows on your knees. I have had success by lying on the ground to shoot up at church spires or making 1/2 second or longer exposures.

In time the location of these supports will become second nature to you and the quality of your images will be substantially improved.

Last Saturday evening, July 22, Galiano Island was honoured to be the sylvan setting for the opening night of Circus Minimus's first tour of the Gulf Islands.

Outside Galiano Community Hall, the greens and browns of the trees provided a perfect backdrop for Circus Minimus's new season program of masque, mime and clowning based on the tradition of the great European circuses.

The circus was founded in 1974 and that year, with the aid of a Canada Council Grant, toured Canada from Vancouver to Halifax, introducing audiences to a kind of circus rarely seen in North America. Billed as "the smallest show on earth", where anything might happen, emphasis is on improvisational theatre supplementing a structure of mime and clowning. A

sketch may take off from its basic plot in response to audience reaction.

CAST OF FOUR

The cast of four bring to their playing a wide range of experience and a variety of backgrounds.

Ida Burrows, born in Padua, Italy, a founder member of the original Circus has the role of Puccio the Clown.

She is also creator of the imaginative masks, animal heads, costumes and props.

Mary McGillivray, born in France, has worked in the circus for several years as "Sparkletoes" in many capacities but confesses that her favourite role is that of the front end of a uniquely decorative horse called Staggering Beauty who displays his many talents by responding to audience requests.

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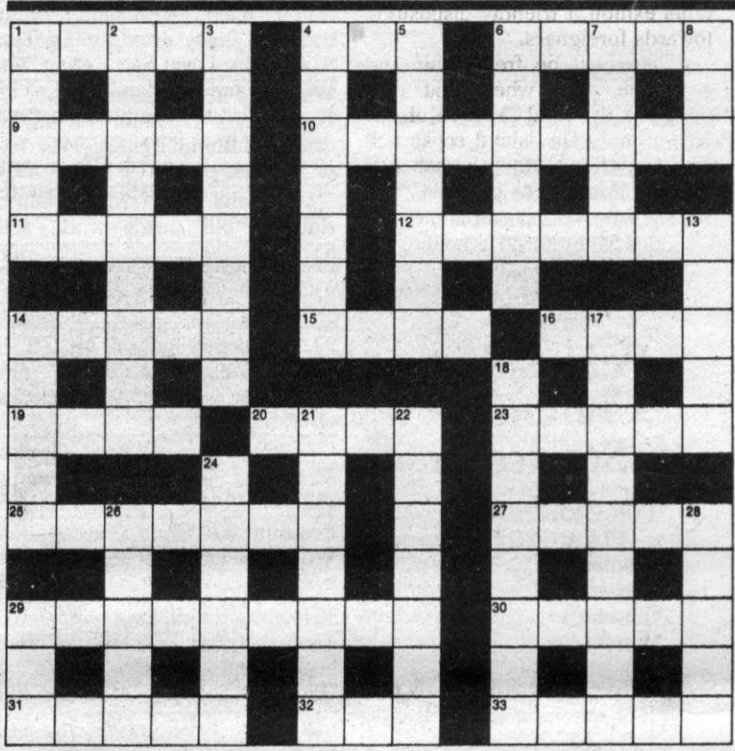

Of wealth and taxes and trips to Tutankhamen's showing in Seattle

I have written so much about the poor over the last two years, that the rich may feel neglected. (As my critic accused me of neglecting the Russians when I campaigned against the American Trident project.)

Unfortunately I am too poor to conduct any extensive research in Canada, so for the moment I have to rely on the Wallace family - Irving, David and Amy - for the following information:

"The following major corporations paid no federal income taxes in the U.S. in 1975: Ford Motor Co., Delta Air Lines Inc., Northwest Airlines, Inc., Chemical New York Corp., Manufacturers Honover Corp., Western Electric Co. (a subsidiary of A.T. & T.), Bethlehem Steel Corp., Lockheed Aircraft Corp., National Steel Corp., Phelps Dodge Corp., Freeport Minerals Co.

In 1975 that nation's (United States) 148 largest corporations paid \$20 billion in taxes to foreign governments and only \$10 billion to the U.S. government.

The eight largest banks in that nation all showed a profit for the year, but none paid taxes.

Ford Motor Co., by taking advantage of foreign tax credits and investment tax credits, not only was able to avoid paying U.S. income tax for 1974 and 1975, but actually received a \$189 million refund for these years at the taxpayers' expense." (Source: Facts on File, Nov. 13, 1976.)

Aren't you glad you live in Canada?

SHIPS AND PLANES AND VIP'S

We just spend our money on sailing ships which go aground: on jet planes to carry V.I.P.'s around the country so they don't have the inconvenience of rubbing shoul-

ders with poor people who wait for ferries, buses, trains: on McCain's so they can buy B.C. potatoes cheaper than we can: on McCains' so they can open plants in the U.S. without losing any subsidies....

Read the Auditor General's report next time so you know what "they" are spending "our" money

Generally, the poor pay less for shelter than the rich, except when the poor have the temerity to buy their own homes. Then they pay the same interest rates as the rich, only their mortgage payments are usually a larger share of their income.

If you're poor, you're supposed to eat less and rent your home from a rich landlord...then, if you're lucky, you'll have enough left to pay your taxes. Oh yes, the poor pay more (proportionately) in taxes than the rich. So when your rich friends complain about welfare, stick up for yourself and tell them that we pay a larger share of the tax income than they do, so if some of us, from time to time, get a little back of what we've paid - why should they complain?

Is there any truth in the rumour that our governments are taking steps to assist small businesses? When they make it possible for self-employed people to draw unemployment benefits when necessary: when they stop sending out regular monthly requests for information which they already have on file; when they allow small businesses to spread their losses over a period of years without penalty; then we'll know there is some truth in it.

By the time this column appears, sixty islanders will have returned from Seattle. The Society for Educational Alternatives lived up to its name by organizing a charter group to visit the King Tut Exhibition. Thanks to Gail Secor for doing all the hard work. More of this next week.

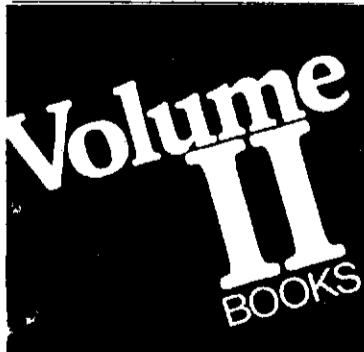

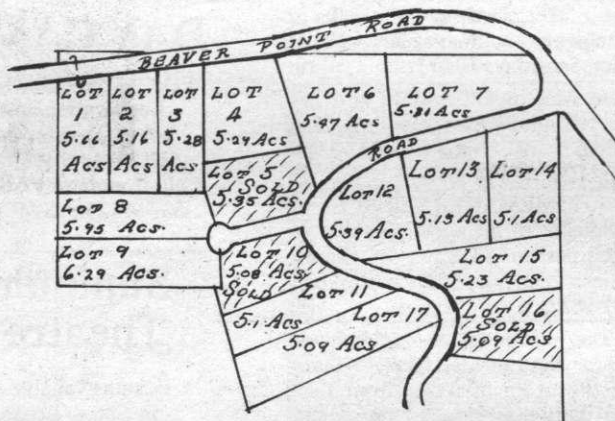

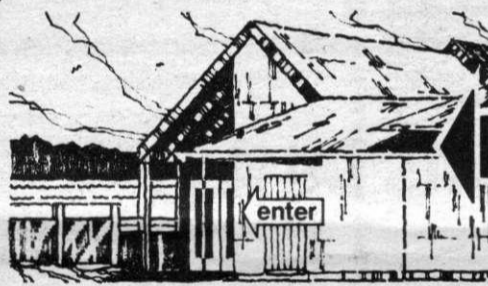

Trustees list alternatives

Daily transportation for Outer Islands still debated

Daily transportation is still keeping Gulf Islands school trustees on their toes.

On Thursday afternoon last week the School Board met at Galiano.

They considered at some length the proposal to offer daily transportation to Ganges for the Gulf Islands Secondary School.

The trustees are considering as many alternatives as possible.

The ministry of education has been sounded out on the subject

and the three main requisites had been agreed between the provincial and the board level.

Proposals must be socially acceptable; logistically feasible and the cost must be within the reach of the district.

PROPOSALS

Among proposals under consideration are a vessel for the three inner islands and a larger vessel staging from Saturna:

- several smaller vessels to serve all the islands:
- Air service:
- A combination of these:
- A bridge between Saturna and Pender or Mayne;
- Dormitory at Ganges;
- Closing the junior-senior operations at Mayne and Pender.

It was immediately clear that the possibility of a dormitory was not attractive. It proved socially unacceptable to Galiano islanders present.

Board members will consider the alternatives and their implications as well as coming up with new proposals which might suit the circumstances. The discussion will then resume with Les Canty, Superintendent of Administrative Services for the ministry of education.

Ivan Mouat noted that the entire proposal hinged on the approval of the ministry of education of an increased transportation allowance.

"That is going to be part of any recommendation we make," agreed Chairman Tom Davidson.

FOR GALIANO ONLY?
It was noted that the Galiano group had raised the point. It had been proposed that the transportation allowance be increased in order to underwrite daily service to Ganges.

"If we deal with any island," responded the chairman, "we must offer it to all islands."

When parents met their counterparts on other islands there was only response to the proposal for daily transportation, the board was told.

If the board should arrange daily transportation for one island the others would want the same, suggested Davidson.

One Galiano parent asked what would happen this fall. Six Galiano parents have not yet looked for boarding homes in the hope of relief.

"My advice is to start looking," replied the chairman.

Petty theft prevalent in Islands

Petty theft has been plaguing police on Salt Spring Island during recent weeks.

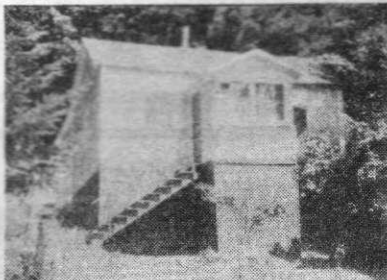

Request for relief

Walker Hook proposals are turned down by Islands Trust

Islands Trust declined to consider two proposals for a property in the Walker Hook area of Salt Spring Island last week. Charles Sutcliffe asked for approval of the withdrawal of some 16 acres from the Agricultural Land Reserve for use as a mobile home park.

Alternatively, he sought approval of the subdivision of the property into four lots.

Planner Chris Foord reported that Mr. Sutcliffe had asked what he could do with his property if the Trust should turn him down.

He is in the same position as many other owners, commented the chairman, Marc Holmes.

The property provided poor access to a subdivided property and it is in an area where intensive development is not desirable, the Trust agreed.

The Trust committee rejected the application.

Trustees of Gulf Islands School District met in Galiano School last week.

No service on those terms here!

Several weeks ago a Galiano resident had asked the Gulf Islands School District to initiate a book-mobile service to the island.

On Thursday last week the report came back from the board. The service could be arranged for the entire school district and not for any one part of it. Cost would be 1.46 mills.

Mary Ann Neal was quick to respond. She looked at the proposal without warmth.

"We don't want to lose the Open Shelf," she said. No action was taken.

Filtered water to be sold in aid of Central Hall fund

Mike Larmour's excellent article in last week's Driftwood on dealing with the problem of drinking water taken from St. Mary Lake has great merit and his suggestion for fitting a charcoal filter under the sink indeed does offer a solution to the problem.

However, as the quality of the water is seldom below standard for more than two or three weeks at a time - and then only in late July and August, not everyone can afford to spend \$50 or more for once-a-year use.

In order to offer a practical solution to the problem, Central Hall Committee has entered into an arrangement with Highland Water System Ltd. whereby anyone can obtain charcoal filtered water for a few cents a gallon.

CHARCOAL FILTER

Highland Water System Ltd. have installed an "activated charcoal" filter in their pumphouse on North End Road and will fill any container you bring along, in return for a coin donation to the Central Hall Appeal Fund; note, a coin, not folding money!

This service will be available from 6 pm to 7 pm each evening when Frank Bate, the supervisor, will be at the pumphouse to take care of your requirements, in any quantity up to ten gallons.

Although the lake water does take on a taste and odour at this time of the year, it is perfectly pure and safe to use, but sometimes tea and coffee do not taste their best.

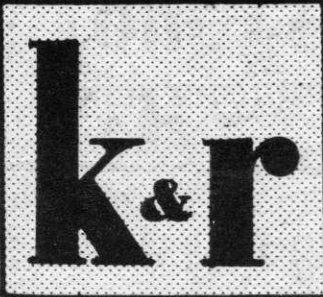
