Sewer scheme

Ganges is subject of enquiry

—In court

Judicial enquiry will be held in Supreme Court in Victoria on Tuesday next week to consider the circumstances under which the Ganges Sewer project was approved.

Action is brought against the Pollution Control Board and the Capital Regional District.

Sponsoring the enquiry are Phil and Yvette Valcourt, of Ganges.

The specifics of the action question the legality of the order by the Director of the Pollution Control Board in issuing an order that a sewer system be installed in the community. The procedures by which it was obtained are also under fire.

The documents filed in court outline the details of the challenge.

The petition was circulated for a sewer project and the Valcourt company and others averred that there were irregularities in the petition.

It is alleged that the Regional District got around the petition by asking the Director of Pollution Control to order the construction.

Counsel for Mr. and Mrs. Valcourt, Ian Waddell, of Vancouver, termed the manoeuvre "a feat of bureaucratic arabesque".

The action will ask the judge to decide whether the procedures have been legal and will seek an injunction to stop the project.

The action does not question the need for sewers in Ganges, Driftwood was told. It merely asks that the need be looked at and "done in a better way."

Hydro is back

To test Island waters for possible submarine gas line

B.C. Hydro will conduct further hydrographic surveys in the waters off Salt Spring and Galiano Islands this summer.

Purpose of the surveys is to update information obtained in surveys of this region in 1972. All of these surveys form part of preliminary engineering investigations required should natural gas service be extended to Vancouver Island by conventional underwater pipeline.

The survey program, expected to begin on August 21 and take about

three weeks to complete, will be carried out by McElhanney Surveying and Engineering Ltd. in the Strait of Georgia and in Trincomali, Stuart and Satellite Channels.

Data will be gathered from a surface vessel using narrow beam echo sounding to determine underwater contours below the vessel and side scan sonar equipment to obtain underwater contours alongside the vessel's path.

depth and boundaries of sediment and rock and to obtain samples to identify the materials. In addition, underwater photography will be employed to aid in interpreting the information obtained.

A computer-assisted positional system will be used so that data on the sedimentary layers at designated areas of the ocean bottom can be gathered rapidly and reliably.

A small number of engineers and technicians will be based in Ganges for the duration of the survey work.

The program will have no adverse effects on the environment.

GANGES PLAN

SOME REFLECTIONS ON ISLAND AND GANGES BUSINESS CENTRE

The purpose of this review is twofold: to look at the trends developing since the enactment of the Community Plan in 1974, and to provide a base from which the relationship between the Ganges Plan proposals and the rest of the Island can be studied.

The graphic presentation of Ganges population shows the numbers of existing permanent dwellings and cottages and the potential for additional lots which might be created in the various subdivision categories and in Ganges.

This ultimate picture under the Community Plan would result in a population of 18,000, but the regional plan figure of 15,000 is considered to be more realistic

because the rate of three persons per dwelling is likely to be high, especially in the future, and there is little possibility that every potential lot will be both created and built on.

DUPLEXES

The provision for duplexes on lots as presently provided for in the zoning by-law has not, however, been taken into account. In addition, figures have been included to reflect growth in Ganges. These are hypothetical and could vary substantially either up or down when the plan for Ganges is completed.

The study of statistics and the distribution of development potential point to a number of conclu-

sions and implications of importance for Ganges and the Island as a whole. These may be summarized:

- Salt Spring Island, with approximately 4,500 permanent residents, is a little under one-third way to its planned target of 15,000 people.

- Taking an east-west line through the centre of Ganges we find that 59% of people live to the north and 41% live to the south. Ganges, therefore, is north of the geographical centre of the Island, but south of the population centre.

- Under the Salt Spring Island Community Plan, however, the population centre would move south closer to Ganges with 53% to

the north and 47% to the south.

- It can be concluded from these figures that as a place to serve the total island population Ganges is central and well located. There are no special physical or transportation features which would negate this fact.

- The general summary of density on the Island would, under the Community Plan, be as shown in the diagram. The extent of the south and central "empty" areas is significant.

- The extent of the five acre lot size area is shown on Map B, the Community Plan, and also the dot Map C. Of interest is not only the additional population (3,600) that can be expected from the potential

five-acre division area, but the amount of land which will be converted from a rural category to this low-density residential use with its subdivision roads and other servicing needs.

- Ganges has now only 6% of the Salt Spring Island population but assuming full Community Plan development, both in Ganges and the whole Island, and assuming sewers and some apartments, the Ganges proportion of the whole Island would only rise to approximately 15%.

- Ganges is primarily the commercial and cultural centre for the entire Island and not just its own limited population. It is more an

Lammas, or loaf-mass was the Sunday on which the congregation brought the first fruit of the harvest to church and prayed for a successful harvest.

Douglas Harker, Vicar's Warden at St. Peter's, wrote the following report on that ancient ceremony.

"Reverend Sir, we bring the first fruits of our harvest to our Parish and we pray that God's blessing may be upon us as we gather in our crops."

With these words Neptune and Percy Grimmer, Pender Island's most illustrious brothers, handed to Archdeacon David Powell a sheaf of grain and a loaf of bread.

The occasion was the Lammas Day service conducted at St. Peter's Church on the Sunday nearest to August 1.

The minister placed the offerings within the sanctuary and said: "We offer and present this sheaf and this loaf to the Giver of all good in token of our thankfulness and of our humble desire that our harvesting may be greatly blessed."

The Grimmer brothers, both born on Pender Island and one of them soon to become a nonagenarian, quietly returned to their places in the congregation.

It was a moving occasion, the more significant because of its simplicity and because of the complex and troubled times in which we live.

Two island families were united in a marriage ceremony on Salt Spring Island recently.

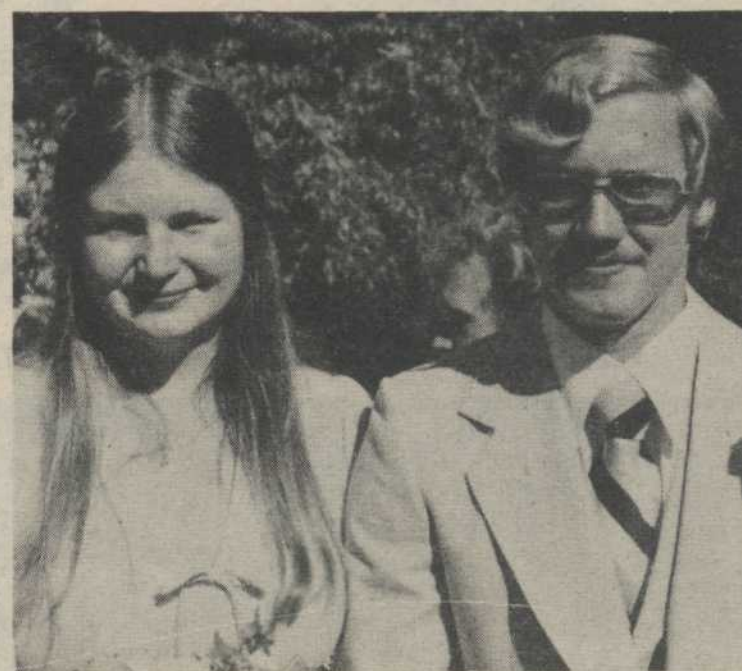

Central Hall nearing completion

The hall is now nearing the final stage of completion, so that a report on its progress might now be in order.

What has been accomplished to date is the finishing of the interior: insulation, gyproc, and painted throughout, including the old main hall. The bright new kitchen is a dream to look at, (and we hope to

work in!) with its beautiful cabinets, similar ones being in the vanities in the washrooms.

The porch has now been completed, and floor levels lined up in the orchestra pit to the main floor level (which was quite an undertaking).

The only major construction yet to be done is the wheel-chair ramp which will follow shortly.

This is how the hall stands today: added facilities of kitchen, washrooms, dressing rooms, storage areas, a new large stage and wings, a "banquet room" or meeting hall in the basement below stage.

The acoustics in the main hall are still as good as ever for those interested in stage plays, vocal productions, or meetings, etc.

Although the grant for labour ended on July 21, we still have one or two devoted workers carrying on to bring the job to final completion. With one final request for further financial support from the public, the hall will soon be ready for public use.

After "good news" there is often some "not quite so good news" to follow.

With all the best intentions in the world we still have not been able to keep up with the rising costs for a public building, which far exceed private construction, particularly when adhering to the fire, electrical, plumbing, and other regulations which have far exceeded our budget by the amount of \$5,000.

We originally hoped to raise \$10,000 with the help of islanders' support, and possibly publish a thermometer from time to time showing how things were going. With generous donations from the public we did raise \$5,100 of this amount, but we do still need

another \$5,000 to complete the hall.

It has always been my sincere hope from the start that we would have the backing of the public for the completion of this facility without having to put the cost of this on to the taxes, as seems to be the trend today, with whatever public facility is offered.

We still hope that there will be one last overwhelming response to our final request for support, from everyone interested in helping this worthwhile project for entertainment, culture, and other community interests in island living.

If anyone is in doubt of our sincerity I would invite him or her to get in touch with me and come to see what has been accomplished so far and what is still needed: \$1500 or more to pay for the balance of the staggering electrical costs owing to so many wires having to be run throughout the building to connect with fire alarms, switches, emergency lighting, etc.

Another \$1500 is also needed as the facilities for both washrooms and kitchen have yet to be installed

It was a storm unlike most island summers. Two weeks ago the heavens crashed apart to dash a half-inch of rain and less on some parts of the area. Bruce McFadyen tells of working at Portlock Park with a group of students. As lightning struck near Ganges, one of the girls showed it clearly. Her hair rose and stood high on her head from the charge in the atmosphere.

I have a cut-out of street car, or tram car, from England. A young, grey-haired brother is on holiday there. And the cut makes you think. As the days are passing rapidly by, you should be giving careful consideration to your exhibits for entry in the Salt Spring Island Farmers' Institute Fall Fair.

Complete programmes are available on a one per family basis. If you haven't already got your copy, pick one up at Foxglove Farm and Garden Store, Patterson's Store, Vesuvius Store or Fernwood Store.

ENTRY FORMS

The yellow entry form is for Section A, Horticulture only. Entries for all other sections must be on the blue entry form. Extra entry forms for additional family members will be available at the end of the month.

RABBIT OWNERS

Have you thought about entering your rabbit in the Fall Fair? Even if you've never entered, the procedure is simple.

The first thing to do, of course, is to obtain a Fall Fair programme and determine in which class you wish to enter your animal. Make sure to fill out the appropriate entry form and get it in on time.

Next determine which of your rabbits would be best to enter. Be sure that your potential prize winner isn't a sick animal, hasn't any infections, sore feet, or ear mites. In addition, try to pick an animal which isn't moulting, or at least not moulting at Fair time. On the day before the Fair, make sure that your rabbit is clean, well-brushed and with no obvious stains on the fur. When you bring your animal in on the day of the Fair itself, bring your own dishes and food. Water will be available on the site. Any questions phone Gina Bennett or Jean Betts.

NEEDLEWORK

Taxes and protests

None of us enjoys paying taxes. Most of us enjoy criticizing the governments for the manner in which they dispose of those funds we reluctantly give them. But let's keep all this in perspective.

The California case in which several ratepayers successfully challenged the government funding of two-thirds of its program has been closely followed. Many a British Columbian has nodded his wise head lugubriously. He has nodded sagely and assured his companion in cups that it's about time we did the same thing.

But bear one thing in mind!

The Californian case has made history. By using the laws of the state, it has been possible to chop two-thirds off government spending this year. Would we could accomplish the same! The Californians now, after being excused two-thirds of their taxes, will pay slightly more than we do in British Columbia, Driftwood learned last week.

We have had no court cases, no furor and no reason to look too closely at California.

Knocking the government is every man's right and privilege, but let's be fair about it!

The mediocrity school

There is no artist freezing in a garret while he strokes his oils into a masterpiece for ever. The garret is centrally heated and he is working on a culture grant.

The great writer of yesteryear or the composer of another era have no counterpart today. The great artists of history were driven to perfection by the spirit which motivated them.

The 20th century artist in every phase of creativity is soft and flabby from too great an exposure to soft living and too long an acceptance of second-best.

He has lived mediocrity, learned it, adulated it and practiced it. The great names in the 20th century fine arts will be known to posterity, no doubt, as the school of mediocrity.

And why not?

If he earns insufficient to survive, he knows that a government grant will bail him out. If a man has not succeeded in selling his work, he knows that the government will support it. It is a sickly assurance, because the governments are becoming patrons of the production that would find no patron elsewhere.

"Who'll buy my sweet-scented lavender?" Grown on a DREE grant, picked under a Canada Works Program and brought to your door by a Young Canada Works Program.

There was, alas, none to approve the maturity of the lavender plant or to supervise its picking and drying and packaging. And it will always sell, because it is so cheap. If it had been made up of skunk cabbage, it would still be profitable. It is an odd legacy we are preparing for prosperity.

Summer Theatre

The season is over. The effort that was Salt Spring Summer Theatre is ended.

The season lacked recent years' presentations of Gilbert and Sullivan. The operatic excerpts were missed.

That is not so much a criticism of their absence as a reminder that previous seasons are still in the mind of patrons of the annual event.

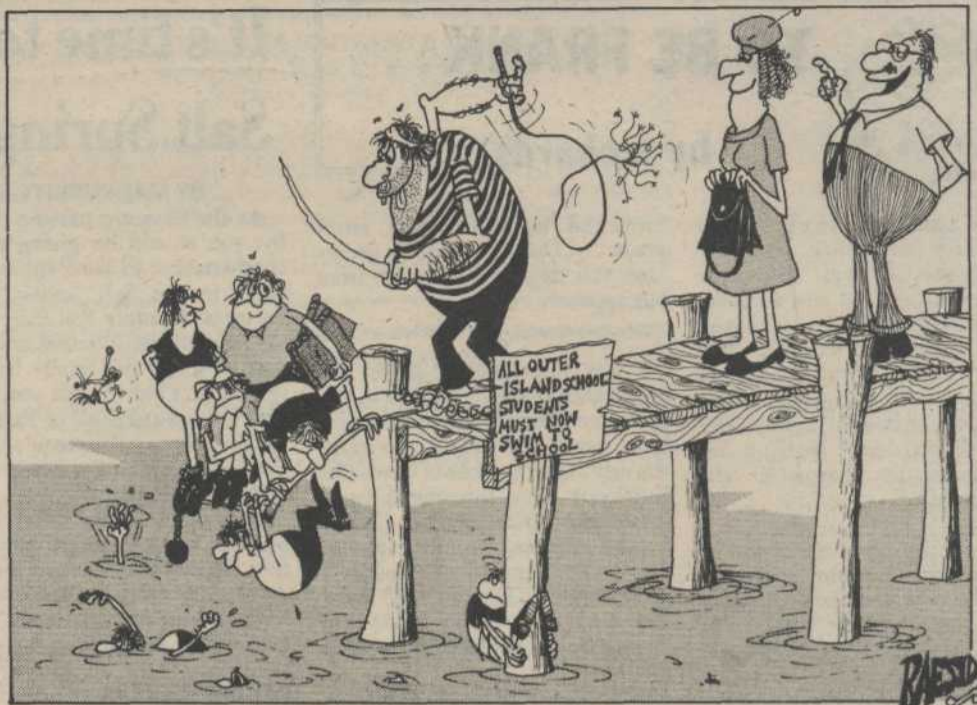
Summer Theatre is a valuable part of the Salt Spring Island summer season. The work of a few becomes a notable contribution to each island summer.

But the return is poor and the sight of empty seats is not gratifying to performer or producer.

The Players, the producers and the participants all deserve the warm commendation of the community.

They deserve more. They deserve help from other functions on the island. A Summer Theatre, presented as a joint effort by the community, tying in other events with the evening stage shows might contribute materially to the annual event.

It would undoubtedly take a weight off the players who are already heavily burdened with the preparation and production of their own plays and features.

There were no disasters, no hold-ups, no frayed tempers or nerves - except possibly Gail's, and she presented an unruffled face to most of us. It was a "once-in-a-lifetime" experience, and I'm sure I speak for all of us when I express

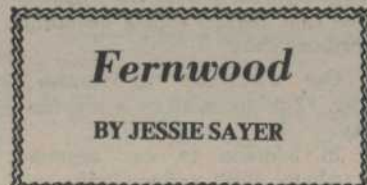

(the plumbing of pipes has already been done.) Lino has to be purchased for kitchen, washrooms, entrance foyer, storage areas, side halls as well as electric heaters bought for these small rooms and the large basement room. Inside casings for all new doors and windows have to be built and painted.

Eventually a permanent floor covering will have to be installed over the new large stage, wings, and dressing-rooms. The stage and orchestra pit areas contain three bars for 18 electric light openings. As yet we have not been able to purchase these.

Poverty and privilege and no matter colour or other characters

"I was told that an impassable gulf divided the Rich from the Poor: I was told that the Privileged and the People formed Two Nations, governed by different laws, influenced by different manners and with no thoughts or sympathies in common..."

That quote is from "Sybil" by Benjamin Disraeli (1804-1881).

At about the same time Alfred, Lord Tennyson was writing:

"Ring out the feud of rich and poor,
Ring in redress to all mankind.

Ring out the want, the care, the sin,
The faithless coldness of the times.

Ring out false pride in place and blood,
The civic slander and the spite;

Ring in the love and truth and right,
Ring in the valiant man and free,
The larger heart, the kindlier hand;

Ring out the darkness of the land,
Ring in the Christ that is to be."

One hundred years later it would seem that Tennyson was the dreamer, Disraeli the realist. There are still two nations, governed by different laws. They have nothing in common. And herein lies the self-perpetuating schism. If only we could find some common cause, something that would unite the rich and the poor, together we would be irresistible!

DISCRIMINATION

I have been reminded of this recently by Cherry Sutherland, and also by a recent trip to Seattle. Cherry and I agreed it is not just the black or minority races which suffer discrimination, but the poor of any race.

Educated, wealthy members of any race or group generally make their own way on their own terms. It was not always so, and it is still harder for some to obtain education or money, but when obtained (and money is the more powerful of the two, education in this context being merely a means to obtaining money) the black or minority person makes the transition from poor to rich, from powerless to powerful, with relative ease. Cherry is an example: she is an educated member of the black majority, but she is poor, and her choices are, accordingly limited.

A group of islanders recently travelled to and from Seattle on the Princess Marguerite. Several times on both trips, the P/A system advised us we were not allowed to "hold" seats on decks or in lounges. Anyone finding a seat

with luggage on it was quite entitled to remove the belongings and occupy the seat.

"There are no reserved seats on the Princess Marguerite" was announced over and over.

YOU CAN BUY IT

Well, of course that is nonsense. There are whole rooms reserved, cabins, lounges, you pay the price, you obtain the accommodation.

On the outward trip I explored the ship. Decks were crowded, lounges were stuffy and cabins claustrophobic. I came to one area which looked most inviting - tables and chairs in a light and airy room. But the way was barred by a young

boy who said: "Sorry, this is reserved." Wherever I have travelled, in Europe or North America, it has been a time-honoured custom to "keep a seat" while one goes for coffee, a meal, or a wash. But on this vessel such courtesies are restricted to those who can pay the price.

We see it on this island. If you or I applied for six acres to be removed from the Agricultural Land Reserve, we would receive deservedly short shrift from the Islands Trust, but that same body is now considering such a request from a chain grocery store. Of course, we need another grocery store here - we only have seven to

serve a population of less than five thousand! They want to deter us from going off island to shop, do they? Have they considered stopping the ferries? (Only joking, folks!)

Was there any truth in the rumour that Idi Amin has abdicated in order to become a race car driver? Who will he find who would dare race against him?

KING UGH!

I had intended sharing with you my thoughts on the Treasures of Tutankhamen. For once I am at a loss for words. It was unforgettable, but very personal and intimate. I applaud the organisers and those who were responsible for the display.

I deplore the crass commercialism which leads to grossly unfunny T-shirt slogans and "King Tut" lamp-shade stands. I even deplore my own use of the abbreviation "King Tut".

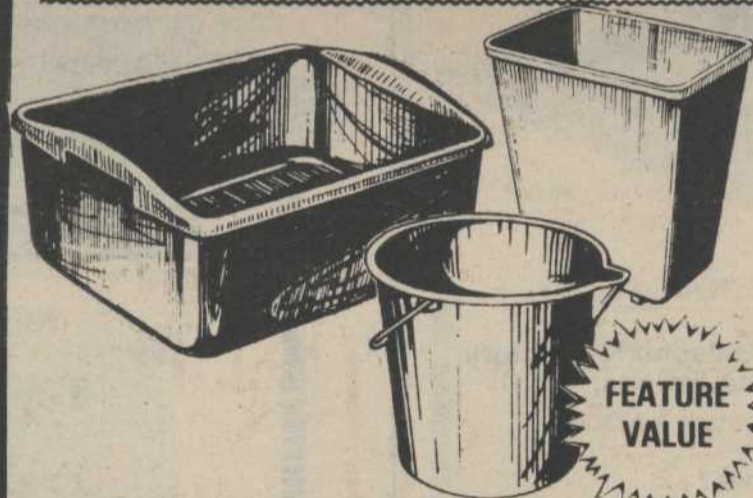

Island centre than a self-contained "village".

Ganges is likely to remain in this position of service centre for many years to come if not until the end of the Community Plan period. This is suggested because:

- i) It would be uneconomic to sewer Fulford and/or Vesuvius in addition to Ganges;
- ii) Fulford is not in a high growth part of the Island and its importance as a ferry terminal may be removed if the ferry relocated;
- iii) Vesuvius is relatively close to Ganges making commercial duplication less desirable;
- iv) There appears to be no insurmountable barrier to Ganges business expansion if the sewer is installed.

Despite the conclusion that Ganges is the ideal centre it must also be recognized that the Island is large and entirely dependent on automobile transportation. The average two-way drive for a Salt Spring family into Ganges is approximately seven miles and dispersal precludes both walking and public transit.

Of all the major Trust Islands, Salt Spring has the lowest proportion of seasonal cottages. This reflects the fact that the Island is a more self sufficient permanent residential community than a part time recreational area for off-island urban dwellers.

The trends from the rate of house building and subdivision are difficult to interpret due to their erratic fluctuation. Through the 1970's the average annual rate for house construction has been approximately 100. Lots being created by subdivision varied from approximately 40 in 1975 to 225 in 1977. This year subdivision is up, building is down. It is possible that the general economic downturn plus increased property taxes are responsible for these opposite trends. If subdivision continued at the 1977 rate it would only take 10 years to reach the Community Plan subdivision ceiling; enough lots to support the 15,000 to 18,000 people.

Preparatory review work for the Ganges Plan requires a study of relevant sections of the Salt Spring Island Community Plan. These are briefly summarized in an appendix.

What does the Ganges Plan aim at? Here are some of the references, relative to Ganges Plan, summarized:

- Conserve Agricultural land.
- Retention of trees.
- Provide for choice of dwelling types.

Higher density only when sewers come.

Ganges to be strong service centre.

Adequate transportation, road access and parking to be provided.

Freedom of movement to be provided for pedestrians.

Allow service commercial users but should be compatible with adjoining users.

Reduce density in "ground slope" areas.

Pedestrian right-of-way along high water.

Twenty-five ft. height limit for waterfront buildings.

Provide open space separation between subdivisions.

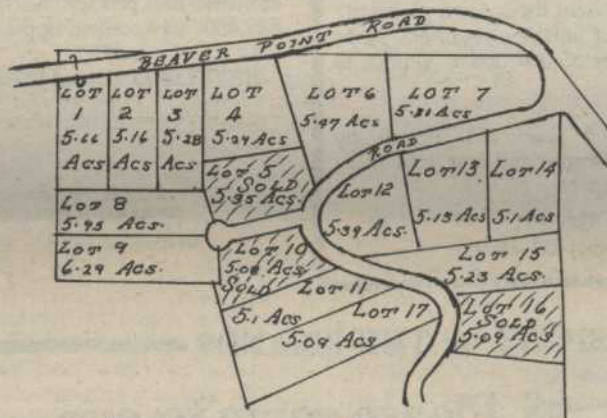
