

More Food for Thought

Some of the institute's objectives were listed last week. Here are more:

Local initiative should be encouraged, since local people are in the best position to know what they need; but information and consultation should be provided so they will know what alternatives are available and also so individual projects can be fitted into an integrated plan.

We should beware of government policies based on projections which may become self-fulfilling prophecies (e.g. policies based on population distribution or energy consumption projections).

The media are promising too much and leading people to expect too much from technological solutions such as use of solar energy. Solar energy is an alternative, but only in conjunction with conservation measures.

Sudden and complete change to a conserver society is out of the question. In the transition period provision will have to be made for some people to move back and forth between a consumer and a conserver society.

Special retraining programs will be needed for workers who are displaced in the transition period.

We have to overcome our tendency to equate "job skill" with the amount of capital invested in large and/or complex equipment for a given job, and to compensate the "skilled" operator accordingly.

People promoting a conserver society should support any politicians who speak out in support of conserver principles. We should work through which ever level of government has the power to make the particular changes sought.

Individual survival has been forcefully brought to our attention by Warner Troyer in Macleans'. "Today virtually every personal act requires a suspension of disbelief, a leap of faith enabling us to

believe the engineers, the quality controllers, watchdog agencies and government inspectors are infallible. How else could we dare enter an elevator, use our toothpaste, trust our furnace, our auto brakes, the x-ray machine in our dentist's office? How could we dare eat, drink, breathe, nurse our infants?"

He lists some "leaps of faith" which have been "close to terminally ingenuous". Contaminated mothers' milk, polluted drinking water, poisoned air...are followed by a statement of Robert B. Alexander, vice-president, technical group of the Ford Motor Co.

On Sept. 12, Mr. Alexander said: "Product integrity and the quest for superior quality always have been top priorities at Ford...The best way to describe our efforts is through the motto we've adopted: 'Good quality is the result of doing it right the first time.'"

However, when Ford produced the Pinto it followed an internal cost-benefit study which recommended that the company not spend an extra eleven dollars per car to make their gas tanks less likely to explode in rear-end collisions.

Why? "Computer printouts indicated about 180 people would be incinerated in consequent fires and another 180 severely burned, costing Ford a projected \$49.5 million in damage suits as measured against the \$137 million cost of fixing the hazardous cars." The modifications, said Ford engineers, would not be "cost effective."

Cynicism is not a pretty quality, but that chills the blood, doesn't it? Perhaps Mr. Alexander has had second thoughts in view of the \$11.5 million damages awarded against Ford in a recent case involving a Lincoln Continental. (They didn't even do it right back in 1966, it seems!)

Mr. Troyer appeals for full disclosure, recalling the Nuremberg principle: "That each of us has a loyalty to our fellows that supercedes loyalty to our employer, whether that employer operates gas ovens, builds autos or agonizes over the next general election. We need...to understand that corporations and bureaucracies are neither good nor bad. They are, as entities, ethical castrates. Corporate groups, public or private, have, like the DNA molecule, only one goal: survival."

Warner Troyer, author of "No Safe Place", closes with Edmund Burke's great admonition:

"All that is necessary for evil to triumph is for good men to do nothing."

Tips for poison prevention

The weeks of Oct. 10-24 have been designated by the provincial health minister to make people more aware of how to prevent accidental poisonings.

Many simple steps can be taken to effectively reduce poisonings in the home, among them using medication that has a child-proof cap and avoiding the purchase of tablets that resemble candies in appearance.

The provincial Ministry of Health also warns that all medicines should be stored in a locked or inaccessible cabinet. Old or unused pills should be discarded by flushing down the toilet.

Householders should avoid storing medications in anything other than their original containers unless the new container is carefully re-labelled and placed out of reach. Pop bottles and food containers should never be put to that

use, the Ministry warns.

CALL FOR HELP

If a poisoning should occur despite your efforts, call your nearest Poison Control Centre or your family doctor. If neither can be reached, and if the patient is still conscious, dilute the poison by giving a glass or two of milk or water.

If the poison is not a petroleum product, such as furniture polish, or a corrosive agent, such as drain cleaner, make the patient vomit by giving syrup of ipecac. Follow that procedure by giving one or two glasses of fluids for a child or four to five glasses of fluids for an adult. Keep the patient walking if possible, and if the patient has not vomited within 20 minutes the dose

may be repeated once only.

TO HOSPITAL

If the patient is drowsy or unconscious, or if he has ingested a petroleum product or a corrosive, take to the hospital immediately.

If a substance is accidentally sprayed into the eyes flush them thoroughly with water for 20 minutes for a corrosive and for five minutes for other chemicals.

If there is skin contact, wash with plenty of soap and water.

In any of the aforementioned cases contact your doctor or poison control centre as soon as possible.

It should be noted that syrup of ipecac can be purchased without a prescription from any drugstore. You should always call your doctor before using it, however.

The Queen made two trips to the other islands, returning to Tsawwassen at 4 pm for a final run to Salt Spring after midnight. Many of the Island visitors were rerouted via Swartz Bay and Fulford.

It was reported at the School Board meeting Oct. 10 that the Victoria Metropolitan Board of Health will be offering a series of Sabin oral vaccine for polio immunization. The vaccine will be available to everyone and will be in a series of two doses.

Mr. and Mrs. A. Hepburn gave a 21st birthday party in honor of their daughter Mhora, who was home for the Thanksgiving holiday from UBC in Vancouver.

TEN YEARS AGO

First of the subscription concerts to be held this winter by the newly formed Gulf Islands Overture Concert Association will take place on Sunday afternoon, Nov. 10 when the Western Savoyards, the Gilbert and Sullivan troupe under the direction of Harry Mossfield, will appear in Ganges.

Two islands are pressing the federal government for a breakwater.

Last week Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce asked for the provision of a breakwater to protect the harbour from the winter gales.

For several years Mayne Islanders have been asking for a breakwater to protect Miners Bay from the winds and the wash.

Ganges Harbour is open to the winds in the long approach. Miners Bay is open to the westerlies com-

ing in from the Gulf. It is also wide open to the wash of the provincial ferries coming through Active Pass.

Miners Bay is no haven. Small vessels seeking safe harbour are frequently distressed to find there is no harbour and little safe safety.

The story of Miners Bay is a long one. For many years islanders have pressed for relief, but governments have proved unmoving.

Go, pig go. Operation Greasy Pig-stuff went off without a hitch.

Project to raise funds for the Centennial Park at Ganges drew province-wide attention on Saturday.

While the community chased pigs in a specially-constructed ring at the grounds of the school in Ganges, CBC photographer Agnes Flett sat on the fence and filmed the operation.

FIVE YEARS AGO

RCMP at Ganges are looking for a pound.

Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce last week heard from President Tom Toynbee that the Ganges Police Detachment had informed him that as soon as they can find a resident willing to operate a pound, wandering and stray animals will be taken in.

Many islanders have expressed concern at the large number of dogs straying over the island and sheep farmers have been incensed at the steady loss of their flocks to marauding dogs.

Buildings valued at nearly half a million dollars were approved last month in the island, bringing the year's total to over \$4 million.

Permits for 11 single family dwellings were issued on Salt Spring Island during the month of September for an estimated value of \$271,995. Figure includes miscellaneous permits.

Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce has worked on the preparation of a sanitary sewer system in the Ganges area for nearly 10 years.

After many months of work, the Chamber's sewer committee gained the co-operation of the Capital Regional District in financing the cost of bringing a feasibility study up to date and later, of a new and expensive survey of the area to be served.

Gulf Islands Secondary School has been "fully accredited" by the department of education.

Recollections of the cost of farming

When Webster talked back

This clipping from CJOR News is undated. It was written about 20 years ago, but the tale of Jack Webster's farming exploits, like Webster himself, never ages.

As a hot-liner I can make a living, but as a farmer I am a national disaster.

It all began five years ago when I rushed into the purchase of the Scotchman's dream - land of my own - and in this case it was a hill farm in the jewel of the Pacific, Salt Spring Island.

Not for me the scientific study of the pasture, or even a common sense look at the possibilities (believe it or not) of making a dollar, but just the plunge straight into the cattle business.

By an unhappy coincidence, I had a friend who shall be nameless who is a big time cattle breeder in the Merritt area of British Columbia. Over a noggin we decided he should ship to me forthwith no fewer than 15 of the finest range bred Hereford heifers in the interior.

No sooner said than done. The delivery job was handed to my cattleman friend and my son Jack Jr. and one sunny afternoon they delivered the 15 heifers to Glen Falls Divide Farm.

Prior to the arrival of these animals I had expended untold dollars and hours of labour in splitting 1,100 (correct) cedar fenceposts to surround the hill farm, and in stretching the finest wire, topped by two strands of the fiercest barbed.

A simple sighting of this expensive barricade would have convinced anyone other than Field Marshall Rommel that it would have stopped a Panzer brigade, but when the cattleman and my son arrived with the load of heifers they did not count on one stupid stray dog.

As the heifers were unloaded, the dog spooked the lot. Eyewitnesses tell me the heifers (all 15 - total price in those cheaper days around \$3,000) went through the fence in approved commando style. They swear that the first heifer knelt at the wire and the other ran up its back and on to the highway.

A TALE OF DIFFICULTIES

My dismay was uncontrolled. First, I had to arrange special insurance coverage in case any innocent motorist was impaled on my stray cattle, and secondly I had to arrange to round them up.

I venture to suggest I am one of the few people still alive to tell the tale of the difficulties of trying to re-coral cattle from among the impenetrable logging slash on the hillsides of Salt Spring Island.

Luckily for me, seven of the heifers returned by

accident, they wandered in through the gate. It was seven months before I retrieved the others, and they were worn to skin and bone from emulating the runt deer of Salt Spring. My nights were haunted by the fear that the locals would shoot them as such.

My weekends were spent travelling the logging roads high on the mountains asking stray hippies and others - "Have you seen my cattle?" Numbers of people still think I am a weirdo freaked by Herefords, but in my final extremities I hit on a sure-fire plan to recapture the lost herd.

I had seen it done on television. And what can be done on the Serengeti Plain can surely be done in Salt Spring. Sparing no expense I hired a man who was skilled in the use of the tranquilizer gun. The plan was simple - knock the cattle out with the darts at close range, tie them up and drag them back to the farm.

EVEN HUNTER FRUSTRATED

The only trouble was that the Herefords did not know they were supposed to go to sleep when hit by the darts. "These damn cattle of yours," I was told by the frustrated hunter, "can absorb a dose that would knock out a polar bear, and still walk away."

But he did after the expense of many darts and many dollars manage to tranquilize three animals and haul them back to the farm.

The other five? They got fed up with the paucity of grazing on the mountain and "surrendered" to a friend's farm on the Fulford-Ganges Road.

It's hard to believe that the five final "escapees", skin and bone on return, were the hard core of the 15 expensive Herefords that had caused my beard to turn grey.

Next step was to spend a small fortune with Mr. Buckerfield in an attempt to fatten up the returning prodigals. I gave up all thought of breeding a herd from the ungrateful bovines, and shipped them off to the auction with disastrous financial results.

What now do I do with the farm? I stick with the simpler and less heroic aspects of the agriculture industry. I'm very strong on chickens, geese and ducks. Don't mind the odd inoffensive crop of hay, and as far as livestock is concerned I breed a flock of sheep.

Sheep are a friendlier and more grateful breed. They do not crash through four-foot barbed wire fences. They tend to be a bit more appreciative of free food and accommodation.

Me? ... I'm for CBC!

LET'S ARGUE IT OUT AT THE POLLS INSTEAD!

Me? I'm a CBC man!
I sit glued to the television for minutes on end and the two services I favour are CBC in Canada and Channel 9 in the United States.

Canada needs CBC.
The ordinary small-town Canadian needs CBC. It is the one organ in this land which can program without careful consideration for the views of the sponsoring commercial corporation. And that is good.

It is the one medium which is roundly condemned by the leftist sympathizers for its rightist stand and by the rightish-inclined for its leftist sympathies.

And I don't kick at that.
On Friday morning last week a gathering of newswomen from various parts of the province toured the CBC installation in Vancouver. Majority were impressed. The critics were fearful of the cost of the structure and its facilities. But that is fashionable Canada in the 20th century: Knock it!

What is there about CBC?
It costs. I think it probably costs too much. But I haven't forsaken Scotch on those grounds. And I sometimes eat meat, despite the soaring prices. Neither have I abandoned CBC for the same reason.

CBC is the standing target of everyone. Years ago there was an English expression, "bad form". It was bad form to do certain prescribed things. One of them has stayed with us. It is bad form in the news business to pan an employee. One must knock the elected representative behind him. And what a lovely target that makes of the CBC!

There isn't one of us who hasn't reacted with hostility to some program. And many have immediately gone after the government behind the service.

CONSCIENCE

While the newswomen were examining underground studios and magnificent facilities, the CRTC was examining the conscience of the CBC. There were protests against the national service and there were criticisms galore. The ordinary Canadian,

who watches without input, was impressed to see an employee of the corporation explain how evil was the practice of the Prime Minister's office in controlling the news.

The revelations were thrilling. The characters in the play were all so real. There was the CBC staffer, earnest, conscientious and overclouded by the Mysterious Forces of the Ruling Power.

The radio and television service would reach a decision and the order would come down from the Hill that the decision was to be reversed.

When the Prime Minister wanted to speak to the nation, there were many who challenged the need. But the Enquirers, with their heads-held-high-and-their-banner-blazing-above-them, were there to battle him on behalf of the Nation.

It was lovely! Just like it was real!

FORGET IT!

You could forget that Canada was a free country. You could forget that we have free elections! It was all there in front of you: the Investigating Commissariat and the Administrative Commissariat.

And they are all so good and so Helpful! Saving us Canadians from the trouble of voting! They'll fix it all for us and we won't have to do a thing!

If I feel that the Prime Minister should not have used CBC facilities to speak to Canadians, I still have my vote.

I want my vote.

I want my CBC.

I want CRTC as long as it is not destined to assume the responsibilities which are solely mine, as an enfranchised voter.

And I don't feel that an employee of a radio station is any

better qualified to judge the political values of the nation than I am.

If I were operating a television station I would feel differently, I suspect.

But I don't. And I want those CBC programs and I want the Prime Minister of Canada, a Liberal now: a Tory a decade hence, or a New Democrat, to be empowered to broadcast any message he sees fit, whether it meets with the approval of the station staff or not. And I want that Prime Minister to be accounted to me at the polls and not to a quasi-judicial enquiry over which I have no control.

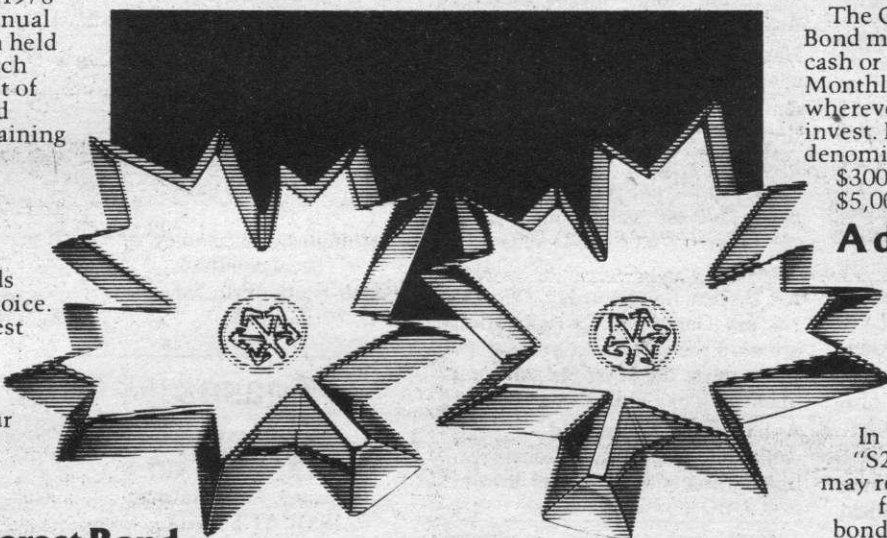

This week I would like to talk a little about the different types of delivery of the ball that people make.

Firstly, we have the straight ball, not very good for mixing action, and prone to leaving too many corners standing, even after a perfect hit on the headpin.

Secondly, we have the curve ball, this is the showy delivery, it gets good mixing action on the pins, but quite frankly I would not recommend this ball to anyone because it is hard to be consistent with it, and picking up those corner spares is a nightmare.

Thirdly, we have the hook ball, Again, a very good ball for mixing action on the pins. And, again, I would not recommend this ball to

the average bowler, because it is only slightly easier to control than the curve ball.

Now we come to the best ball to use. This is the back-up ball. The way you achieve a back-up ball is that, just before you release your ball, you twist your wrist clockwise, so that the palm of your hand rolls outwards as you complete your forward swing. The back-up ball is what we call a working ball, lots of mixing action on the pins and, with practice, fairly easy to control.

This is so because when you twist your wrist clockwise, the amount of movement is restricted -- you can twist only so far before the ball is automatically released. Incidentally, if anyone is interested the back-up is the ball that I use.

You will find two brand new balls on the ball racks. A word of advice, don't try to bowl one frame with a new ball and the next one with an old ball, the difference in the working action is tremendous, the new ball will curve a lot more than the older ball, you've been warned, so don't start complaining that the new balls are no good!

After running the bowling alley for the past few days, I noticed quite a few of the old faces missing from last season, but I also noticed a large number of new bowlers.

To these I would like to say welcome and I hope that you are enjoying your weekly exercise, and may you, somewhere along the way, string 12 strikes together.

BOWLING TIP OF THE WEEK

Always use the correct angle when shooting for corner spares.

The alley is 42 inches wide, so use it to your advantage. For example if it's the right corner you're after, start your approach from the left, making sure you point your toe directly at your target and walk across alley. As I have said before, strikes are nice but it's the corner spares that will win you more games.

measure the rise and fall of pressure in the womb during labour pains, and these measurements are also recorded.

INFORMATION

These and other recently developed tests and procedures have provided doctors with much more information about labour.

When the tests remain normal we know that the baby is not in distress. It took some time to determine the meaning of abnormal records and findings, and until the true meanings of unusual squiggles and bumps in the graphs become known, there was some confusion.

Experience and study has resulted in the accumulation of considerable knowledge, and the findings obtained during fetal monitoring can now be interpreted accurately.

The obstetrician becomes aware of a baby having difficulty earlier than used to be the case, and is in a much better position to intervene in time.

The association presents their referee's course for the second straight year for the upgrading of last year's graduates, teaching new referees how to referee, or just explain the rules of the game to anyone interested.

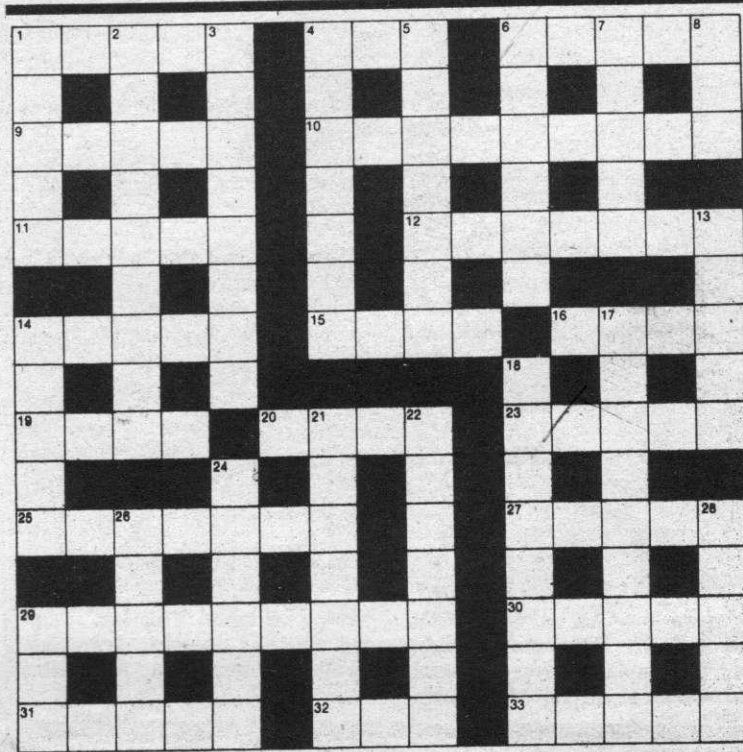

Mayne and Bowen to carry 70 cars

Islands ferries to be stretched as part of new government program

Two Gulf Islands ferries are to be stretched under a \$60 million ferry construction program announced last week by Premier Bill Bennett.

The premier announced that two new Cowichan class vessels will be built for the mainland - Vancouver Island run and the Bowen Queen and Mayne Queen will be stretched.

"This is the largest ferry construction program in the history of our province. It will employ an average of 750 shipyard workers over the next two years, with a

tremendous economic spin-off throughout the entire community," the premier said.

ESSENTIAL TO GROWTH

The ferries are an essential service to the Island and Sunshine Coast communities, he agreed.

"The ferry service must expand if these communities are to continue to grow and realize their potential."

The two new Cowichan Class vessels will have a capacity of 360 cars and 1,500 passengers.

The 50-car ferries, Bowen and Mayne Queen, will be 'stretched' to increase their capacity to 70

cars. Powell River Queen, third of the sister ships, will also be extended. She serves the Sunshine Coast.

The Ferry Corporation handled unprecedented traffic this year.

An all-time record of 845,000 cars and 2,675,000 people was chalked up for the months of July, August and September.

"Continued growth in ferry traffic, rapid expansion of tourism and industry, completion next spring of the North Island Highway to Port Hardy, and the new north coast ferry terminal these are all factors which point to an economic boom for Vancouver Island." Ferry Corporation chairman Sam Bawlf stated last week.

Tenders would be called on construction of the two jumbo ferries for delivery prior to summer of 1981.

Tenders have already been called for stretching the Mayne Queen, Bowen Queen and Powell River Queen for delivery prior to next summer.

Reginald Hill project to be ready by spring of next year

Approval has been granted by the Island Trust and the Department of Highways for Windsor Utley's strata-title project on Reginald Hill at the end of Morningside Drive on Fulford Harbour.

On-site work was begun this past week. Eighteen homesites are planned, most on the waterfront.

Although the road system will be private, at the request of the South Salt Spring Planning Association, pedestrian access to China Bay Beach will always be available, as well as a hiking trail to the viewpoint at the summit of Reginald Hill. A large portion of China Bay Beach will be dedicated for public use.

Archaeological sites and the natural woodland surrounding the beach will remain intact, Driftwood was told.

AMPLE WATER

Wells already drilled guarantee ample water for the project without recourse to Fulford Water District.

Island people are performing vital roles in the realization of this undertaking: A.R. Hardie and Associates have been retained for the surveying and engineering. Norman Twa and Spencer Excavating are doing the road work. Henry Schubart, architect, has been appointed project manager. They anticipate a completion date sometime in the spring of 1979.

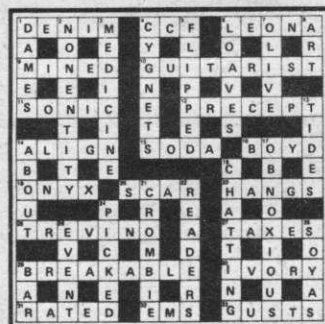
Red tide closes beaches

The federal fisheries department has imposed a widespread ban on the taking of shellfish due to a severe outbreak last week of red tide.

All beach areas from Hardwick Island south to the American border have been closed until further notice. The move affects not only all of the Gulf Islands, but the entire east coast of Vancouver Island.

A fisheries spokesman told Driftwood early this week that samples are being taken in a wide variety of areas. He said he has no idea how long the ban will last.

"It may last a long time," the spokesman said. "It started in Puget Sound and seems to have spread all over."



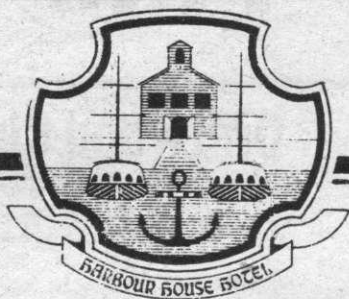
