CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT BY-LAW NO. 513

A BY-LAW TO ESTABLISH THAT PORTION OF SATURNA ISLAND IN THE OUTER GULF ISLANDS ELECTORAL AREA KNOWN AS LYALL HARBOUR/BOOT COVE AS A SPECIFIED AREA OF THE CAPITAL REGIONAL DISTRICT FOR THE PURPOSE OF ESTABLISHING A WATER SUPPLY AND DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM.

WHEREAS the Regional Board of the Capital Regional District has been requested to establish a specified area for the purpose of establishing a water supply and distribution system;

AND WHEREAS the Regional Board is empowered with respect to that part of the regional district not within a city, district, town or village to undertake any work or service under the provisions of PART XVI of the Municipal Act;

AND WHEREAS to provide the domestic water supply and distribution system within the specified area, the estimated cost of which including expenses incidental thereto is the sum of \$582,700.00 which is the amount of debt intended to be created by this by-law;

AND WHEREAS the amount of the authorized debenture debt of the regional district incurred pursuant to section 786 of the Municipal Act is \$40,895,818.01 of which \$23,790,774.62 is existing outstanding debenture debt and \$17,105,043.39 is authorized and unissued debenture debt, and none of the principal or interest of the debenture debt of the regional district is in arrears;

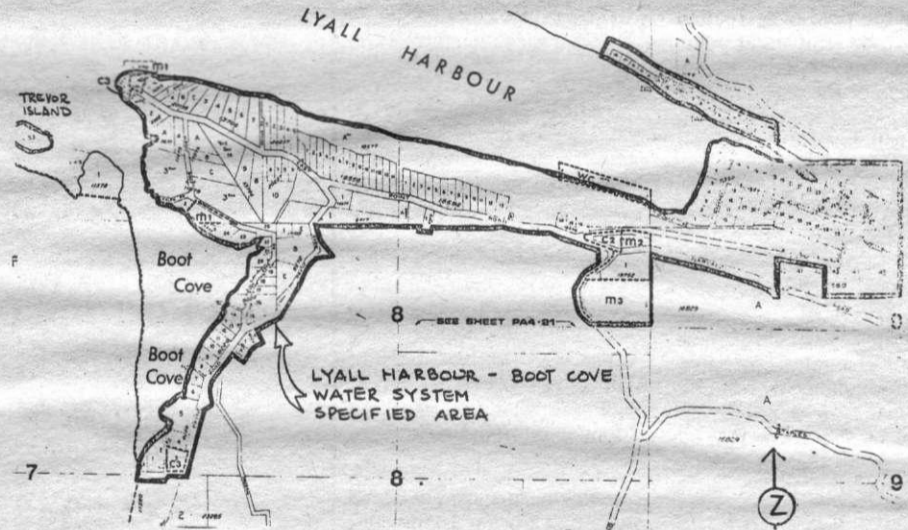
AND WHEREAS the amount of the authorized debenture debt of the regional district incurred pursuant to section 787 of the Municipal Act is \$19,791,322.58 of which \$19,791,322.58 is existing outstanding debenture debt and nil is authorized and unissued debenture debt, and none of the principal or interest of the debenture debt of the regional district is in arrears;

AND WHEREAS the approval of the Provincial Health Officer has been obtained;

AND WHEREAS the maximum term for which debentures may be issued to secure the debt created by this by-law is twenty-five (25) years;

NOW THEREFORE the Board of the Capital Regional District in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

1. The Regional Board is empowered and authorized:
 - (a) To establish within the Outer Gulf Islands Electoral Area a specified area to be known as the "Saturna Island Water Supply and Distribution System Specified Area", as described on Schedule "A" attached hereto and forming a part of this by-law.
 - (b) To undertake and carry out or cause to be carried out and provide a domestic water supply and distribution system for the said specified area and to do all things necessary in connection therewith, including the construction of the water system generally in accordance with plans approved by the Provincial Health Officer and on file in the Regional District office and without limiting the generality of the foregoing:
 - (a) to borrow upon the credit of the Regional District a sum not exceeding \$582,700.00
 - (b) to acquire all such real property, easements, rights-of-way, licenses, rights or authorities as may be requisite or desirable for or in connection with the construction of the aforesaid water supply and distribution system.
 - (c) to levy annually commencing in the year 1979 an amount necessary to meet the principal and interest payments arising from monies borrowed for the establishment of a water supply and distribution system.



2. The cost of providing for the establishment of the aforesaid water supply and distribution system in the said specified area shall be borne by the owners of land in the said specified area and the Regional Board is hereby empowered to recover the said cost by means of the imposition of a user rate, frontage tax and/or parcel charge. Any deficiencies arising from a shortage of revenues generated by the aforesaid user rate, frontage tax and/or parcel charge shall be requisitioned from the owners of land in the said specified area in the manner prescribed in the Municipal Act on all lands and improvements on the basis of assessment as fixed for taxation for school purposes, excluding property that is taxable for school purposes only by Special Act within the said specified area.
3. The specified area established by this by-law may be merged with any other specified area or areas for the same purpose whether contiguous or not, in the manner provided in Section 619(3) of the Municipal Act.
4. This By-law may be cited as the "Saturna Island Water Supply and Distribution System Specified Area Establishment and Loan Authorization By-law No. 1, 1978"

Take notice that the above is a true copy of the proposed by-law upon which the vote of the electors of Saturna Island in the Outer Gulf Islands Electoral Area will be taken at:

on the 18th day of November, 1978 between the hours of eight o'clock in the forenoon and eight o'clock in the afternoon and that the Advanced Poll will be held on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, the 15th, 16th and 17th days of November, between the hours of nine o'clock in the forenoon and five o'clock in the afternoon at:

Down Through The Years With Driftwood

15 YEARS AGO

Real estate sales and home construction continues to be active on Salt Spring and other Gulf Islands. Salt Spring property transactions totalling \$750,000 have been recorded by Ganges provincial assessor's office since January 1 of this year. Reports indicate that local construction firms have orders in hand that will provide work for at least a year ahead.

Federal winter works grant is expected to add further impetus to the local housebuilding scene.

Just to prove that the last of summer is not gone in spite of the wind and rain this past week, Mr. J.H.M. Lamb brought in a ripe strawberry picked fresh from his garden last Saturday just after Mr. Harry Loosmore brought a dozen big juicy raspberries.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Harkema of Fernwood Farms have been hard at work for five years to improve their Holstein dairy herd. Their work has been rewarded recently when two of their cows topped the Van-Isle (South) producers. Records were checked by Dairy Herd Improvement Association supervisor Dale Lundstrom.

The SSI Recreation Commission is looking for some young person who would like to avail himself of free training in the field of recreation. Instruction is given at points on Vancouver Island. The purpose of the training is to find a young man or woman who will be willing to give instruction in the local community in sports and physical training.

10 YEARS AGO

Hospital building referendum presented on Saturday throughout the Capital Regional District gained approval of the voters. At no point in the district did the assent of the voters show more forcibly than among the islands. A resounding 93 per cent support was offered by the islanders.

Bylaw required a 60 per cent majority to pass.

Voters attended the polls throughout the day in order to give approval to the expenditure of some \$9 million on chronic care facilities all over the southern Vancouver Island and Gulf Islands area.

Passengers to Vancouver by ferry can scarcely wait to get on board in the mornings these days. The ship sails each morning at dawn and with the rising sun comes the breakfast - bacon and eggs, no less!

B.C. Ferries has relented. No longer is the early morning passenger limited to hamburger for his first meal of the day. He can join his fellow Canadians from coast to coast in enjoying the traditional bacon and egg.

Passengers and island observers have long pressed the ferry authorities to intro-

duce a breakfast in keeping with tradition. It is here.

Fire which was attributed to children playing with firecrackers completely demolished the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ib Knoblauch on Douglas Road, Ganges, on Sunday afternoon.

Firemen attended with two trucks and it appeared that the blaze was well under control until it sharply broke out and took the entire roof. Within minutes the building was a mass of flame.

Sequel to the death in the woods last week of Peter Arnell is a petition on Salt Spring Island calling on the provincial government to prohibit rifles from the islands.

Response has been in the vicinity of 90 per cent so far. Number of opponents to the petition feel that it is a matter which calls for public education and guidance rather than prohibition. One sheep farmer suggested that he needs a rifle in order to protect his sheep from marauding dogs.

FIVE YEARS AGO

Islands are growing and there's no doubt about it in the minds of the administration. New voters list for the islands this year shows an increase of more than 300 names over the previous list. This increase is in the listings of property owners, whose names are automatically added to the list when a property is registered.

There are also 40 or 50 new names for resident and tenant electors, who must register in order to have their names listed.

Every Victorian knew that corsets have whalebones, but the question at Galiano is whether whales have leg bones. Cpt. Frank Smith, of Vancouver, operating a dredge at Whaler's Bay on Monday brought up two very large bones.

Sewage disposal at Epron Rd., Salt Spring Island, has been approved by the Capital Regional Board. The board last week approved an application from Gulf Islands Septic Tank Service and Alf Pistell for the use of a dump on Epron Road for the sludge from septic tanks.

Teachers, school trustees and proponents of an alternative course in elementary grades on Salt Spring Island met on Tuesday evening last week to debate the need and the pattern.

Donna Watt spoke on the basic concepts of a separate, alternative system. It had been evolved by various parents who feel the need for a pattern of elementary education which will involve the student to a greater degree and present him with a challenge which is not geared to his age or any other stereotyped pattern.

The proposed course would entail wider use of teachers' aides and of resource persons in the community.

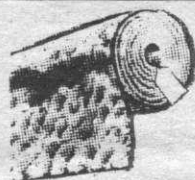

The scoring was opened by Cordova Bay at 10 minutes into the first half on a deflected shot which offered Mike Cue, Salt Spring's goalie, no chance for a save. Much to the boys' credit, they rallied immediately and within 10 minutes tied the score on a drive by Brian Kaye, who played with unending

determination in his position of forward Striker.

The first half was slightly marred by the Colts' manager, who in his role as linesman, seemed to think that an offside was constituted by any threat by the Strikers to score, and many good Striker plays were blown dead because of his concept of the "offside rule".

Much to the referee's credit, he was able to see this obvious flaw in the linesman, and during the second half, tended to generally ignore his constant screams of "offside", "offside".

The Colts' second goal, during the second half, was a beautiful feat of soccer skill and they deserve full credit for its execution.

The ball was brought up the wing to just slightly over the centre line, passed into the middle and after two or three steps was passed back out to the wing.

The winger carried the ball for about six steps and passed it back into the centre again, by this time the Colts centre was virtually alone.

In front of our goal, as our defence were in the process of fanning out to cover the wing, Mike Cue came out of goal, as he should, to cut down the angle, and although he was able to get a hand on the ball, the kick carried past him and into the left corner of the net.

The effectiveness of this relatively simple play was not lost to the coaching staff of the Strikers and our next opponents will have the opportunity of seeing this play used against them on numerous occasions.

In this game a new defensive strategy was used by the Strikers and proved to be very successful, turning back many potentially dangerous scoring threats before they could obtain full momentum.

Next week, some minor changes will be made in our forward line to add a little more punch to our scoring ability.

This first half-season is a time of adjustment for the team, as the boys try out different positions until they find the one where they feel most comfortable and are most effective. The boys' ability to play team soccer is increasing by leaps and bounds with every game played, and they can be well satisfied with their progress to date.



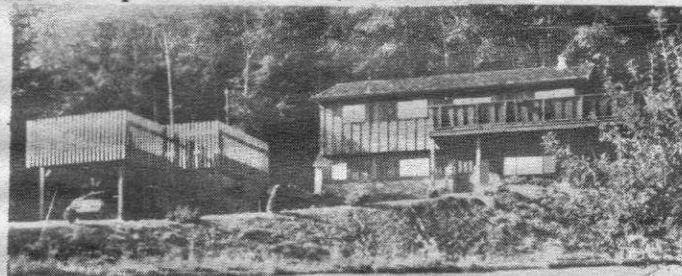

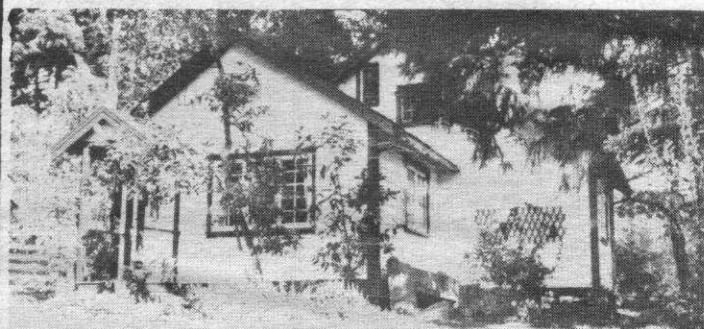

Two candidates to run as team in Salt Spring race

Two candidates for Islands Trust on Salt Spring Island are running as a team. They are Fulford marina operator, Quentin Wilson and veterinarian Dr. David Lott.

Both are long-concerned with planning on Salt Spring Island and both have been pressing for proper and adequate land use controls.

Wilson came to Salt Spring Island 21 years ago and has been widely recognized for two functions.

He operates the only marina in Fulford Harbour and he is the inventor of a device which is used for the control of forest fires all over the world.

The fire-fighting device is a machine for use from aircraft which starts a fire on the ground to back fire forests from the air. The Wilson device enable two highly explosive chemicals to be mixed in pellets and immediately dropped on to the ground. If the pellets should hang up and ignite in the gun, they are automatically doused with water.

The device gets around. There are two in operation in the Victoria forestry district; two in Ontario, two in the Yukon Territory and one in Australia.

Australia bought the patents and manufactures the device there.

PAST CHAIRMAN

Quentin Wilson is a past chairman of the Salt Spring Island Planning Association.

He was on the original committee for the Ganges Plan, before either the Chamber of Commerce or the regional district was in on the picture.
