FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

Fire broke out in a corner room of the Log Cabin Hotel Nov. 8 at 7 pm. No one was injured.

Firemen were on hand within minutes of receiving the alarm turned in by a guest. They had the fire controlled within six minutes. Two rooms and the hall were on fire when the department arrived.

In addition to fire damage there was extensive smoke and water damage downstairs. Fire Chief Donaghy estimates the damage at around \$7,000.

The local Chamber of Commerce at their meeting Nov. 6 in Mahon Hall were unhappy about the inadequacies in transportation and quite satisfied with progress on parks development.

Present ferry transportation took a beating as dissatisfaction was expressed with the outer islands connection and the delay in connection from Fulford with the Swartz Bay-Tsawwassen main ferry.

Salt Spring Islanders who need to go to Saturna or the Penders on business must spend most of a day travelling. One or two trips a week with a direct connection to Ganges would be of very real benefit to this group. The direct connection for Pender and Saturna residents would give better access to hospital services.

Upwards of 60 members and guests attended the annual Rod and Gun Club awards dinner last Friday evening at the Harbour House Hotel, when a delicious dinner of venison was enjoyed by all.

An unexpected feature of the dinner was the attendance of visiting Game Warden, Frank Greenfield of the Nanaimo Game Region.

Mrs. Larry Campbell, convener of the poppy fund drive, reports a successful campaign raising \$402.56 this year. Saturday tag day collected \$67 of this amount.

Following a report of the Pirate Days Central Committee at the recent quarterly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce a member questioned who wanted Pirate Days and what good did it do? Many citizens are against commercializing the island with hot dog stands, etc.

Chairman C. Horel answered that Pirate Days was initiated so that local people could enjoy such get-togethers and to attract the better type of people to the Island. He stated that the Committee feels these objectives were accomplished during the celebration.

TEN YEARS AGO

Pattern of emergency measures failed to save the life of James Hugh, engineer aboard the Sechelt Queen last week when he succumbed to a heart attack. The Sechelt Queen left Long Harbour at 4.40 pm on Wednesday. She returned at speed within the hour to bring her engineer to shore.

Not even an official of the Fish and Wildlife Branch of the provincial government could find a deer on Salt Spring Island last week.

Don Blood, animal biologist with the branch, came to the island as the guest of the Salt Spring Island Rod and Gun Club last week.

Addressing the annual dinner meeting of the club, he reported that he had been out in the woods with Bernie Reynolds, but they had seen not a deer.

Pollution issue is not dead among the islands.

Last week Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce received a letter from Cowichan Fish and Game Association in commendation of islanders' stand on pollution.

"Only an aroused and informed public can insist that better methods be evolved," said the association's letter.

There is no pound district in South Salt Spring Island.

Plans to establish such a district in the southern area of the island met with opposition particularly from farmers who run stock on large unfenced areas of land.

Recommendation was made to the provincial government for a pound district covering merely the area along the Fulford-Ganges Road.

The government rejected the proposal as unworkable and threw out the plea.

FIVE YEARS AGO

Meeting planned by Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce to bring Hugh Curtis, MLA, and Jim Campbell, chairman of the Capital Regional Board together has been abandoned.

The Chamber had invited the two men to speak on the subject of an Islands Trust at a public meeting in Ganges.

Election picture on the islands has been quiet, despite the fact that candidates entered the contest many weeks ahead of the election.

The election of a successor to director Marc Holmes has been an issue for two months as both George Heinekey and Jim Wilkinson announced themselves well in advance of the election date.

Mr. Holmes decided to withdraw from public affairs several weeks ago.

Capacity on the Salt Spring Queen has been reduced. Maximum load for the vessel has been set at 60 tons instead of the 90 tons which was previously the capacity.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Myers, Miners Bay, Mayne Island, lost everything they possessed in a fire at their home on Sunday.

If you missed Pat Wright's exhibition at Central Hall last weekend then you really missed something. I sometimes wonder if we, as islanders, realize how fortunate we are to have individuals of such extraordinary ability among us.

International Park incorporating Point Roberts and part of the Gulf Islands has been recommended by parts of the International Joint Commission. The details of the recommendation were not publicized as promptly as the subsequent recommendation.

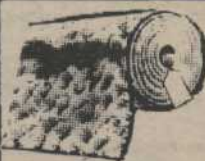

The latest type Automation

BY CEDRIC BARKER

Recent automatic cameras are relatively fool-proof. However, these systems have been going through a process of evolution for the past fifteen years.

The latest type of photographic automation arrived on the market

be a super 8 mm sound camera with a 9-27mm zoom f1.2 lens. It is an updated version of the 350 SL Macro model.

The Chinon 60 AF XL will be a super 8 sound camera with an 8-48 mm f 1.2 lens. Autofocus will be usable with a two-speed focus



this summer with several new automatically focusing cameras.

The Konica C35 AF was the first to be announced, making its debut last year. Shipments to Canada have only just begun.

With a 38mm semi-wide-angle lens and a f 2.8 aperture, this compact 13 ounce rangefinder also sports a built in automatic flash for ranges from 3 to 16 feet. A good retail price will be from \$200 to 225 although the suggested price is \$315 with case.

FIRST IN FIELD

The honour of the first autofocus movie camera goes to Sankyo for the silent 8 mm model ES-44XL with an 8.5 to 34 mm f 1.2 lens.

The Elmo 3000 AF Macro will

change on the 8-32mm portion of the zoom. From 32 to 48mm you must focus manually.

All of the above cameras use the small "Vistronic" module perfected and sold by Honeywell. Two square viewing ports on the front of the camera each project the central portion of the scene onto its own light sensitive cell by means of small mirrors.

If the light contrast on each of the cells does not match, a tiny motor adjusts the angle of one of the mirrors and refocuses the camera lens simultaneously.

Once a satisfactory contrast is achieved, the motor stops and the picture is taken. All of this takes place in a second.

The advantages of such automation are that you need not worry about forgetting to focus and you can focus on a moving subject.

Unfortunately the disadvantages at this stage of development are numerous. The system does not work well on a telephoto lens so movie makers will be restricted to a 4 to 1 ratio zoom lens, with the exception of the unusual Chinon 60 AF XL.

Furthermore, the subject must be centrally located to be seen by the focusing "eyes". This limits the artistic composition of your photographs to strictly "snap shots".

The biggest problem is that the autofocus unit must be restricted to well defined subjects with good contrast. Several vertical lines at different distances, such as a fence will surely fool the Vistronic module.

Polaroid has brought out its own version of autofocus. **SONAR FOCUS**

Scheduled for delivery next year is the Sonar One Step. It is an improved SX-70 Alpha that uses four sound pulses between 50,000 and 60,000 cycles per second. The sonar spot reads a small eight-degree angle of the scene at a distance of eight feet or more. At shorter ranges, it reads a 13-degree angle.

If you are taking pictures through windows, you may switch the sonar off and manually focus by guesstimating the distance to your subject. Otherwise, the camera would take a perfectly focused picture of the window but not the scene beyond it.

This camera focuses on a subject in total darkness, so pictures taken with the flash bar will be sharp.

The photo accompanying my article this week illustrates the sort of result you could not expect from an autofocus camera. The out-of-focus leaves, in the foreground, intrude into the centre of the picture for effect. This would fool both the Vistronic and sonar types of cameras so that the result would have the main subject, in the distance, out of focus.

Linguist speaks to awareness class

Last week in the Native Awareness class John Thomas, a Nitnat Indian linguist, spoke about his people's culture and entertained us with some myths and songs.

Mr. Thomas teaches the Kwakwaka'wakw language under a University of Victoria project at Campbell River, and is developing a phonetic written form for the various Northwest Indian languages. These languages are not dialects but very diverse languages as different from each other as English is from Russian. One even has 60 consonants and 10 vowels.

Mr. Thomas spoke about his early life with his grandparents, who were healers. His grandmother gathered medicinal herbs while his grandfather was a shaman, a calling which required a disciplined life with much meditation. His grandfather left him two wishes when he died; first, that he should never forget God and second, that he should learn the white man's language in order to communicate the Indian culture. Now Mr. Thomas is using his research to instruct other native teachers.

The next speaker will be Jose Arreak from Baffin Island, who is a student at Pearson College. He will discuss the Inuit winter games and myths. For further information on the date and time of Mr. Arreak's talk watch the bulletin boards in Ganges or call 537-5164.

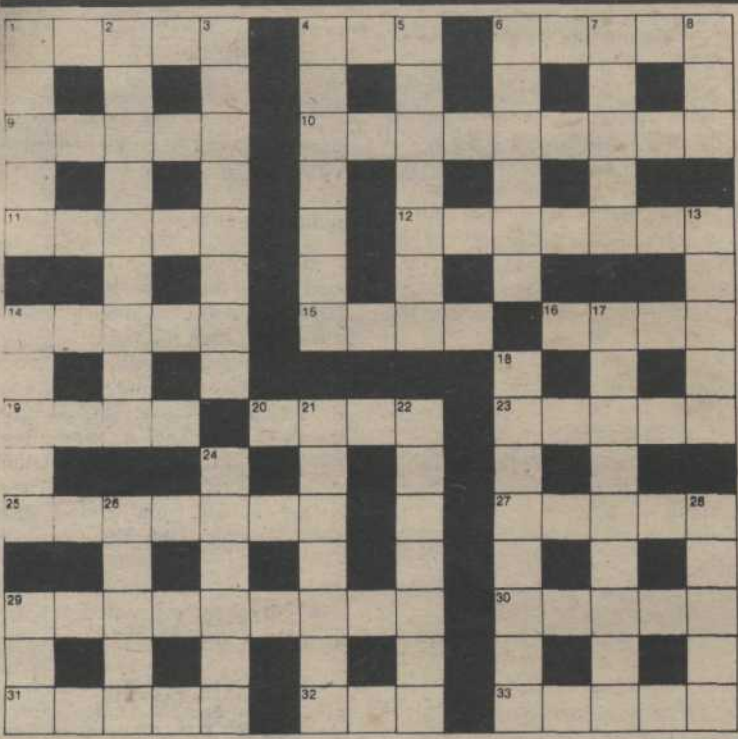

Info-Health

The countryside of ancient Greece was graced by the presence of a bird of a distinctive yellow colour. The bird was probably a golden thrush or a species of oriole, and it was called icterus.

Those of you who are even slightly bilingual will know that jaune is French for yellow, and that jaunisse means yellowness.

In medical terminology jaundice, Anglicized to jaundise, means icterus!

Jaundice or icterus is a discoloration of the skin and other tissues by bile pigments. The colour may range from a light lemon to a dark bronze. A patient may be found to be jaundiced by using chemical tests on the blood before the colour change occurs.

Bile pigment is mainly a material called bilirubin, and most of this is the breakdown product of aged red blood cells. Bile pigments are normally filtered from the blood by the liver, stored briefly in the gallbladder, and excreted into the intestine as waste.

There are many causes of jaundice and sorting out the cause in a particular case is usually an exercise in medical detection.

Bile pigments may be produced in amounts too great for the liver to handle, usually due to a blood disease that causes an increase in the breakdown of red cells.

Many cases of jaundice are due to disease of the liver itself. Damaged or diseased liver cells are not able to process a normal amount of bilirubin. This is known as intrahepatic (within the liver) jaundice.

The third type of icterus is due to blockage of the drainage system of the liver - the bile ducts and the gallbladder.

It is usually relatively easy for your physician to determine whether jaundice is due to increas-

ed blood breakdown, liver disease, or bile duct obstruction. Each of these major groups has a multitude of causes, and diagnosing which is present may be a difficult task.

Jaundice, like a headache or a cough, is a symptom, not a disease. Effective treatment must rely on accurate diagnosis of the condition causing the icterus, and directing attention to treating that condition.

POST HOLE DIGGING TO SHEEP SHEARING

Innovative course teaches farming basics

Well, it sounds nice and easy. A high school-level agriculture course designed to introduce students to the weird and wonderful world of farming.

Thoughts of idyllic days spent outdoors tending cattle and harvesting crops no doubt flash through everyone's mind when they hear of the course being offered at Gulf Islands Secondary School. And, to be sure, there are days like that.

But this chilly November Monday morning Mike Byron and his students have other things on their minds. There are no new calves gamboling about on the classes' 160-acre rented spread. There's little charm or beauty in the countryside, which is shrouded in low grey cloud. And there's no warmth in the sun that occasionally breaks up the threatening sky. Byron and his kids are busy digging post holes and chopping wood -- not exactly the easiest way to spend school time.

"These kids learn EVERYTHING about farming," says Byron as he and a handful of students rattle out to their farm in the program's dilapidated 1967 Ford truck. "We're trying to teach them all aspects of agriculture, and we're trying to teach it from a practical rather than a theoretical point of view."

STUDENTS FINANCE IT

The program, into its fourth year now, is financed almost entirely by the students enrolled in it. They pay the annual rental fee of \$1,000 for their property, they buy the feed and the livestock, and they purchase the equipment.

"We got \$500 from the school board this year," says Byron, "which we haven't spent yet. But the kids earn all the rest of the money they need by cutting wood and selling it and by doing some butchering for people."

Byron estimates that this year's program budget will run in the \$4,000 bracket.

"The ministry is working out a new curriculum right now," he points out, "and once agriculture is

included the programs will be funded through the department. They won't have to be quite so self-sufficient."

For the first couple of years of operation of the local program the classes sold off much of their stock at the end of the school year in

runs a hand over his crew cut and there's a twinkle in his eye. "It's the best way to keep warm, which means the kids don't stand around very long doing nothing."

In addition to looking after their own cattle, the students care for a small flock of sheep that belongs to their landlord.

PRODUCE FEED

"That," says Byron, "covers a lot. We do the shearing and docking -- the whole bit."

The students are also beginning to get into production of at least a portion of their own feed. This year they put a few acres under cultivation and ended up taking 400 bushels of oats off the property.

"The kids did all of it," explains Byron. "And this summer we combined it. It'll help cut our feed costs, and we get the straw as well."

It's pretty clear to anyone that Byron, a 28-year veteran of the teaching profession, believes in showing his students the practical side of life.

"Some of these kids," he says, "have never had the opportunity to use a chain saw or put up a fence. About a third of these students come from rural backgrounds, and the rest come from all walks of life."

Regardless of their background or sex, however, all of the students are expected to pitch in. And they do, without complaint.

The boys may spend an entire school period digging post holes or chopping wood, but the girls are right there to haul and stack the firewood or clear and burn brush. Byron's not exactly any slouch, either -- he's in there with the best of them, falling trees and hacking

away at blackberry bushes that impede the onward march of his fences.

PRACTICAL EXPERIENCE

"It's all good, practical experience," points out the teacher. "And you know, some of the kids that can be absolutely the worst in the classroom settle right down once they get out here and get to work. I certainly haven't had to ask very many of them to leave."

Byron's students are learning, too, that farming isn't confined to a five-day week or even to an eight-hour day. They often pitch in during school holidays to help with vital projects that are necessary for the well-being of not only their animals, but the entire program.

Life for the students in Byron's agriculture class isn't all drudgery, however. If the weather is really miserable, says the teacher, and if there aren't any pressing outdoor projects that must be completed, the students get a fair dose of theory as well. They're responsible for all their own record-keeping and book keeping, and Byron sees to it that they understand such basic matters as the intricate workings of a ruminant's multiple stomachs, courtesy of some beast that's just been butchered and has no further use for that particular organ.

There are lectures on crop production, and the students often run labs on the poultry and cattle kept in their "barn," located in the shop area at the high school.

SIX FURTHER STUDIES

"Basically, though, we work in all weather," says Byron. "If something has to be done, it has to

order to cover costs. They've turned to wood cutting and hauling timber, however, with an eye to building up a cow-calf operation which should eventually be self-sustaining.

Right now 13 head of cross-bred cattle and one purebred Angus have the run of the program's facilities. Byron says he'd like to ultimately see the program built up to include about 20 head of cattle, some sheep and a hog-raising operation.

PRESSING PROJECTS

"We usually have our poultry and rabbits in by this time of year," he says as the truck rattles back to town to drop off one class and pick up another. "But we haven't yet this year because there have been more pressing things that have to be done. We've got to get some fences up because we're expecting about eight calves next spring."

Already, the efforts of the 90 students enrolled in the course are evident. They've done a lot of clearing on the property, and a new corral has been erected.

"But we still need holding areas," points out Byron. "That's what we've got to get done before next spring."

Hence, the post-hole digging and brush clearing that continues throughout this unappealing morning.

"Actually," says Byron as he chunks a double-bitted axe into a massive block of wood, "this is good weather for working." He

be done, and that's the sort of thing any farmer faces."

It's a tribute to the toughness of the students that six of them have gone on to study agriculture at universities and colleges scattered throughout the province.

Byron grades his students via a variety of methods. Worksheets are handed out for completion, and the teacher also evaluates students efforts in both the theoretical and practical areas of the course.

Students wanting to take the course aren't screened says Byron.

My theory is that everybody needs experience like this," he explains. "We're all consumers, and if we have an idea of what the costs involved in production are we're more likely to understand why things cost what they do."

Byron, who has never had formal instruction himself in agriculture, has farmed all his life. And it's clear that he believes in fresh air and constructive work for his students -- that theme echoes throughout his evaluation and explanations of his program.

"Those kids maybe didn't learn

a whole lot this morning," he says as he pilots the truck back to the school for the last time until after lunch. "But what they did was good, constructive work, and when it's finished they'll be able to stand back and say they had a hand in it. And I think that counts for a lot."

8,000 hours of help in months

SAFETY A CONCERN

**Pressure mounting for
closure of Kanaka Road**

The school board has agreed to comply with a recommendation from Charles Baltzer that a letter be sent to the Islands Trust regarding Rainbow and Kanaka Roads.

Baltzer made a presentation to the board at last week's regular business meeting, during which he pointed out that Kanaka Road, which bisects the school playground facilities, is even less safe now than it used to be.

Baltzer called for the complete closure of Kanaka Road and designation of Rainbow Road as a one-way westbound thoroughfare as far as the proposed village bypass. He urged the board to support the planning commission's stand before the new Ganges plan is approved.

Support for the closure proposal involving Kanaka Road also came from Gulf Islands Secondary principal Bob McWhirter and Salt Spring Elementary principal Tom Watson. Both principals expressed concern for the safety of students attending the two schools and using the playing fields bounded by Kanaka Road. Watson suggested that a renewed vigorous effort should be made to procure the closure of the controversial thoroughfare.

District secretary-treasurer Wilf Peck pointed out that the issue has been before the board at least four times in the past eight years. Peck said he had spoken with the Department of Highways about the problem, and suggested that one

step in the right direction would be to ascertain that no residents living along the road would object to the closure.

Peck also noted that the highways department doesn't see Church Road as a suitable alternative to Kanaka.

The department, he noted, will not place speed bumps on a public road, and enforcement could be a problem if a slower speed limit were to be placed on the road.

Peck also noted that a large majority of the traffic using Kanaka is generated by the schools. A reduction in that traffic, he felt, would help reduce the risk to school youngsters using the play-

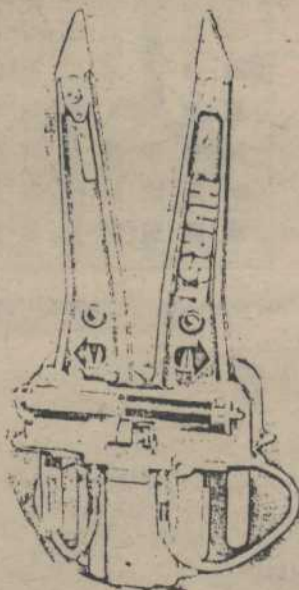
