

**COMPETING FOR RESCUES, SAYS KLEIN**

**Lack of co-ordination charged**

Two recent incidents involving marine rescue co-ordination have added fuel to the fire that Horst Klein of Pender Island is lighting under the Rescue Co-ordination Centre and the Coast Guard. Klein is charging that there is a lack of co-ordination between the two and that they are competing for rescues to the detriment of the service.

The first incident took place on the night of April 12-13 when Klein's daughter Sandra was called into the search for missing Sidney boater Horst Keding. Sandra claims that she had great difficulty in establishing radio contact with her "on scene commander", Coast Guard supply vessel *Sir James Douglas*, and that when she finally got through, they neither knew who she was nor told her what to look for.

Later in the search, she claims, the Coast Guard vessel *Ready* and the Hovercraft 039 searched the same area of Salt Spring coastline within minutes of each other. She also reports that during a sweeping search, the *Ready*, which she says is equipped with a powerful light, "used no light when searching for a body in the water at night." Sandra's final complaint was that it took too long to find a radio channel which could be used by all the searchers and that as a result, communications were poor.

**PHONED COMPLAINTS**

Upon her return to her home, *Queen of Storm*, Sandra phoned her complaints to the Rescue Co-Ordination Centre charging lack of co-ordination, poor communications and an unwillingness on the *Sir James Douglas*' part to co-operate with the volunteer vessel.

A day later, on Good Friday, the Kleins were returning from Swartz Bay when another incident made Horst decide to complain in person to the Rescue Co-ordination Centre.

Winds were stiffening at about noon when the *Queen of Storm*, underway for Otter Bay, heard a call for assistance from the 30-foot motor vessel *Ruffian*, with owner Mike Gye of Victoria and his wife Pat aboard. The boat was drifting in Haro Strait with what seemed to be a lost propeller. Klein advised the Rescue Centre, via Vancouver Radio, that he was in the vicinity and would help. Less than 10 minutes later, Klein and Sandra

headed out in the whaler with an estimated time of arrival of 15 to 20 minutes. RCC was advised.

**GO NO FURTHER**

When the whaler arrived within sight of the *Ruffian* RCC ordered him to go no further and not to touch the drifting vessel because the *Ready* was being dispatched. On the *Queen of Storm*, Joyce Klein double-checked the order to stand down, explaining the whaler's proximity to the *Ruffian* but was told that if the whaler continued it would be on its own and that it would not be covered by provincial insurance or compensation.

The whaler turned back and reached the *Queen of Storm* by 12.45. Klein claims that when he asked RCC why he was stood down, he was told that "the taxpayer would rather" the work be done by a government vessel.

Meanwhile, the *Ready*, which was "on scene" some time between 1.10 and 1.20 had accepted the offer of an American vessel, the *Discovery* to tow the *Ruffian* into Roche Harbour. The *Ruffian* was taken in tow at 1.45, arriving at Roche three-quarters of an hour later. Klein claims he could have

saved at least an hour of that time, prevented the *Ruffian* from drifting to within one cable of Danger Reefs, as it had done by 1.30, and avoided what Mrs. Gye called "a really horrible and frightening experience."

Interviewed the next day in Friday Harbour, Washington, Mike Gye, an experienced sailor, said, "It's ridiculous to say that the taxpayer would rather be saved by a government vessel when you are bobbing around out there...I would not have cared a scrap who saved me."

Klein has made an appointment with an officer of the RCC to discuss what he sees as a general breakdown of communication. Among other specific suggestions, Klein would like to see a standardization of terminology. He says that questions such as, "Are you in any immediate danger?" are so open to interpretation that they are often useless and, what is worse, sometimes misleading.

Gerry Hutchinson, Director of the Vancouver Island Region of the Provincial Emergency Program, would not comment on any specific incident, but supported Klein by affirming that "the lines of communication have to be kept open."

**INFO-HEALTH**

Most pregnancies are still unplanned. The pill, the IUD and other contraception methods are reliable, but occasional failures occur. Far more unplanned pregnancies occur in girls or women who have no knowledge of birth control measures, or given the education, do not apply it.

Many people, both men and women, are on medication. The volume of drugs consumed, of both the prescribed and over-the-counter varieties, is immense. It is not uncommon at all for a person to be taking six or more drugs on a regular or semi-regular basis.

A woman who is taking a drug and, unknowingly, becomes pregnant, may be placing the baby at risk. So may a woman planning a pregnancy if she is unaware of the wisdom of avoiding medication at this time.

The fact that a pregnancy has occurred is unknown until about two weeks after fertilization occurs - then a missed period gives a clue. The woman on medication will have exposed her offspring to possible adverse effects for two weeks before she is aware that she is expecting. These are important days for the embryo, and drug actions may be disastrous.

In actual fact it is probably true that most drugs do not have an adverse effect on pregnancy. If they did, most of us would probably not be here! It is disconcerting, however, to discover how many drugs, previously thought to be safe, are now known not to be.


It is interesting that almost all new prescription drugs come with a warning that they should not be used by pregnant women. In some cases use by women in the child-bearing age group is discouraged, in case the person becomes pregnant while on the drug.

In most cases the drug company is protecting itself, avoiding future lawsuits should its product prove to cause birth defects. Experiments are not of much help - the only suitable experimental "animal" is a pregnant woman.

Obviously medicines are often legitimately required by ill women who happen to be pregnant. The medical need must be assessed, and the drug chosen with care, if a pregnancy exists or is a possibility.

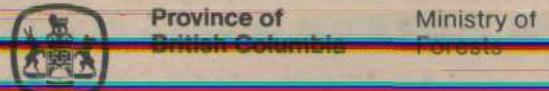

# Fulford artists invade Kenton House Gallery

South of the border, at Blackburn road, three talented people will cross the border of North and South Salt Spring and consolidate their position at Kenton House Gallery. This artistic invasion takes place on Sunday, April 22 until Sunday, April 29.

Toni Luton, resident hostess at the gallery will introduce visitors to the works of "Corky", Pat Duke, and Kay Catlin. The hours of viewing are 10 am until 5 pm daily.

It has always been a pleasure to review and interview the people who have exhibited their talents at the island gallery but this time it was not only a double but a triple pleasure.

### PETROGLYPHS

Ladies first!

Pat Duke is exhibiting a selection of rubbings of petroglyphs. Other folk, (me included) travel for miles to take rubbings of saints and angels, and other figures ensconced in churches, generally in Great Britain and the continent of Europe.

Not so Pat Duke. She has concentrated on Vancouver Island mainly between Nanaimo and Parksville. Not for her the raised

surfaces dear to the heart of rubbers.

She does it the hard way with ruts and grooves of petroglyphs. She uses canvas duck as a backcloth and oil paint as a medium.

For the uninitiated petroglyphs were created by Indians dating back 2,000 to 5,000 years ago. They used stone as a chisel and rock as a surface (am I right, Beth Hill?)

Pat has a life-size rubbing of a bear but my favourite was a fish. The colours were exquisite.

### PETROGLYPH PEEVE

Pat has a pet peeve about people who desecrate petroglyphs with graffiti and initials and a word of advice to all budding rubbers "Please do not paint the rock before rubbing." Stick your canvas with masking tape and then colour the indentations.

Kay Catlin is an oil painter of over 10 years' experience, and has sold numerous paintings. My favourite is a two-toned.....maybe three...landscape of a barn and fencing in sepia and brown shades.

Kay settled at Fulford Harbour three years ago. George, her husband, is a descendant of

George Lucius Catlin, the renowned American Indian Artist.

### SOAPSTONE

Kay also dabbles in soapstone sculpture and showed me an owl painted in a delicate shade of green. Her works are in great demand, particularly in San Francisco.

I can't resist the corny gag of "I left my art in San Francisco".

Whilst waiting for the ferry at Fulford Harbour you would be well advised to see samples of her work displayed at Nan's Cafe. Kay works from photos which she has to magnify in due proportion on canvas.

Finally, we come to "Corky".

His real name is taboo with this very talented young man who sculpts all his work on a potter's wheel.

He uses natural clay and the result is functional and decorative. He shapes elephants, owls, and lamps (outstanding work!) and I was particularly impressed with two lovely grained rounds for wall hanging with two inserts of convex mirrors.

"Corky" came to Salt Spring Island in September, 1978 and brought with him five years of experience as a professional sculptor. Having viewed his work it is

easy to understand it is his living, and that the demand exceeds the supply.

For variety and artistic excellence Toni Luton is to be congratulated on welding them together under one roof for the enjoyment of

the public.

Coming North or South it is an exhibition not to be missed.

## If energy conservation is so important what are you doing about it?



### The why of conservation:

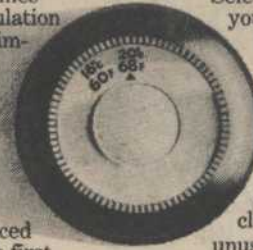

Preliminary results are very promising—savings in excess of 20% are indicated over levels usually encountered.

your insulation to recommended standards. Based on present energy costs, the cost of insulation can sometimes be recovered in as little as five years of use. After that—it's money in your pocket.

### Reduce indoor temperatures:

Select the minimum temperature you need for comfort. Try 20°C (68°F) for daytime, and 16°C (60°F) at night. Use the night setting if your home is unoccupied for a few hours. It only takes a half-hour or so for the average home to return to 20°C. For further savings, turn off the heat and close the registers and doors in unused rooms.



## Here's what we're doing

### Practising what we preach:

At Hydro, conservation begins at home. So we've initiated a number of continuing programs to cut down our own energy use. In our head office building, in Vancouver, lighting levels have been significantly reduced in a number of areas. We're conducting ongoing reviews of energy efficiency in all our buildings. And, of course, we have reduced our thermostat levels to the temperatures we recommend to other British Columbia business and industrial users.

At our natural gas headquarters, in Burnaby, we are now using a solar water heating system. This provides part of our hot water requirements. When our new research and development centre is completed in Surrey, later this year, its architecture will include integrated solar panel designs. We will monitor the results closely. What we learn could be of benefit to homeowners throughout B.C.



### B.C. Hydro Home Insulation Finance Plan:

To date, B.C. Hydro has financed over \$1,000,000 to customers taking the first easy step in energy conservation. We make up to \$500.00 available—at a modest 10% finance charge—for bringing insulation and window glazing up to recommended standards. The "Home Insulation Finance Plan" is available through participating insulation applicators or retailers.

### Industry gets the message:

"Save Energy—Save Money" is a province-wide program to help commercial and industrial energy users reduce their use—and, of course, cost—of lighting energy. Hydro specialists provide information for recommended changes. We also offer guidance and advice to any firm wishing to undertake an audit of its total energy efficiency.

We're conducting a series of seminars on all aspects of industrial energy use. These have been attended by executives and engineers from some of British Columbia's largest firms. As proof that business and industry in this province are taking energy saving seriously, many firms are now appointing their first energy conservation officers.

### Check weatherstripping, thermostats, dampers:

Make sure windows and doors are properly weatherstripped to eliminate drafts and heat losses. Storm doors are another energy saver.

Thermostats should be located on inside walls where they are not affected by heat from the sun or appliances—or by drafts. Keep fireplace dampers securely closed when not in use.

### Water heating is big too:

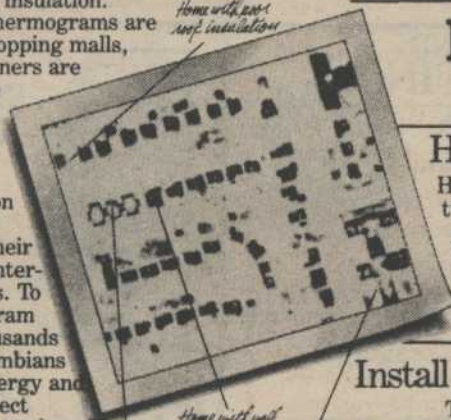
Next to home heating, water heating is the biggest consumer of energy, so check those drips. One drip per second adds up to a tankful every week. That's energy and money down the drain.

Make sure the temperature control on your water heater is at the lowest setting compatible with cleaning efficiency. Long pipe-runs waste heating energy. Water heaters should be located as close as possible to the point of use. When this is not feasible, it helps to insulate the hot water pipe.

### Aerial thermographic surveys:

Hydro is conducting a continuing series of aerial missions to help British Columbia homeowners fight high heating costs. We're taking infra-red aerial pictures of thousands of rooftops. Individual temperatures are recorded on magnetic tape to produce black-and-white "thermograms". These pinpoint heat losses by showing them as whitish or light grey areas—indicating the need for better insulation.

The thermograms are displayed in shopping malls, where homeowners are invited to come and see how their insulation measures up. B.C. Hydro personnel are on hand to help people locate their homes and to interpret the results. To date, this program has shown thousands of British Columbians how to save energy and money. We expect thousands more to benefit.

### Public information programs:

## Malcolm Legg outlines brief history of Salt Spring Island soccer

No soccer season is complete without the Annual Soccer Tournament, and the 1978/79 season is no exception as the Salt Spring Soccer Association is holding its third tournament on April 17 and 18 this year.

This year's Tournament looks to be bigger and better as there is a total of 10 games, two of them being of the fun games, and all of the games will take place on our new soccer field at Portlock Park.

The weekend will be a real show for our association as all our players, coaches, managers and referees will be involved in the event. The players will be competing for 10 different trophies in the matches and all players participating will receive ribbons.

Eight of our trophies are named in recognition of the contribution some of Salt Spring's old-time

soccer players made to the game on the island. The men whose names appear on our trophies played between the years 1915 and 1939 and are only a few of the many good quality players of that period.

### WHO WERE THEY?

Who were these soccer stars and for whom did they play? In reality many of them are well known but not for their soccer exhibits and the following resumes should give an insight into Salt Spring's soccer past.

Ed Lumley played from 1916-35 and was noted for his scoring prowess as center-forward for the original Fulford team. He recalls many of those early games when they played against Ganges for the McPhillips Cup and says Fulford was the stronger. The long-time logger and tug skipper later played for Ganges when they competed for

the Hart Trophy. (Both trophies are in the Fulford Inn today). Ed reminisces about losing a toe in a soccer game - they had some pretty mean defenders in those days.

Fred Morris was renowned as Salt Spring's first bus driver and probably the most popular. Fred, like Ed Lumley, was one of Fulford's early players, although he also moved to Ganges later on. Most of his playing days were at half-back.

### SKILFUL PLAYER

Captain Drummond was another long-time Fulford player, playing mostly at center-half. He was a very skilful player who was known for his shifty moves. Retired on an army pension, he played for many years and was a member of the Fulford B team when they had two teams from the lower island.

Tom Isherwood, long-time logger and steam donkey engineer, was a goalie and full-back for Fulford in the 1920's. He now lives in Alberni.

Pete Roland was another long-time Fulford player from the 1920's who now lives in Duncan. The long-time logger, of Hawaiian extract, played many positions in the Fulford team.

During the 1920's the Ganges team became very strong as they took their turn at winning the McPhillips Cup.

Des Crofton was one of Ganges early stars and played mostly at inside forward. The Croftons are noted for the involvement in the building of the Harbour House Hotel.

Harry Nichols' arrival from

England in 1926 with his brothers Alf and Jack gave Ganges a very powerful squad. Harry, who was a carpenter and then worked for Mouats, was an exceptionally skilled half-back who played from 1926-39 and also coached from 1959-64.

Stan Wagg was another early Ganges player playing in the 1920's, who was noted for his flair with the ball.

### TALENT ALWAYS EXISTED

Hopefully, this synopsis of these players gives you an idea of the talent that has always existed on Salt Spring in soccer. The sport has always been popular on the island and as our association grows we must never lose sight of those who pioneered the sport on the island. Every sport has its heroes and the trophies that today's heroes are competing for, are named in honour of yesterday's heroes.

The final two trophies are for the special games in the tournament. The executive trophy, called the Silver Cup, pits the mothers against the Intra-island Allstars. The President's Cup is a competition where the Executives match their skills against some tough opposition. This year they play the Fathers in the tournament's final game.

All in all, our tournament should be a lot of fun for one and all because that is what our association's theme is for the tournament: "Soccer is Fun". Come out and join in Salt Spring's number one and see how our product has progressed since the 1920's.

Remember the Soccer Banquet Friday, May 4 in the High School Auditorium. You can win a trip to the Whitecaps and enjoy food, fun and prizes.

## Sign smasher pays \$518 after pleading guilty

Her Majesty the Queen. Damage exceeded \$50.

Incident occurred when Seymour was driving with two companions at between 4.30 and 5 am. Damage amounted to \$268.07, according to the estimate from Highways Foreman Ken Stevens.

Describing the incident, Prosecutor Rick Law asked for compensation.

Terming it an idiotic and dangerous business, Judge McAdam imposed a fine of \$250 and ordered restitution of \$268.07.

Seymour was placed on probation requiring payment of the restitution and not to operate a vehicle on the highway anywhere in Canada after 12 midnight.

## Extension is granted by court

# Advertising and dead babies in third world countries are cited

What have you done to honour the International Year of the Child?

I went to hear the Rev. Bob MacRae talk about Bottle Babies, the abuse and misrepresentation of infant formula by multi-nationals in Third World countries.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus, but you can't prove it by the Nestle conglomerate. Nestle is the largest promoter and seller of infant formula in Third World countries. (Interestingly they do not market their infant formula in Canada. I wonder why?) Because they are a Swiss-based corporation, we cannot even get to a stockholders' meeting, let alone hope to make any impact through stockholder resolutions.

Therefore, the only action open to us is a boycott of all Nestle products.

In addition to those bearing the parent company name these

include: Taster's Choice; Nescafe; Nestea; Libby's; Stouffer frozen foods (and hotels); Souptime; Maggi soups; Crosse & Blackwell's; Cherry Hill, Swiss Knight, Gerber & Old Fort cheeses; L'Oreal cosmetics; McVities;

## More Food for Thought

Keillers; Contique by Alcon and Lancome.

Nestle has announced its intention of doubling its U.S. size in 1980 by buying up U.S. companies. So the boycott list may well grow!

### BOYCOTTS

Boycotts work. Nestle have written a "Dear Pas-

tor" letter to every single clergyman in the U.S.A. protesting the boycott!

And pressure brought by groups of concerned people is even more effective than individual action. If you would like to make a bigger impact, form a chapter of INFAC right here on Salt Spring Island. Sue Yardley or Sue Blagborne would be glad to help, or you could write to INFAC CANADA, 1611 Quadra Street, Victoria, B.C. V8W 2L5 (nice to know this is the first branch in Canada, there are over 300 world wide) and ask for advice.

Meantime, whenever the opportunity arises in your daily life, encourage the concept of natural breast-feeding. We were told firmly on Wednesday that only mothers suffering from tuberculosis or those on birth control pills are physically unsuitable for breast-feeding.

If you feel inclined to write to the head office of Nestle in Canada, sent your letter to the President, Nestles (Canada) Ltd., 1185 Eglinton Ave. East, Don Mills, Ontario, M3C 3C7.

### WHY NOT HERE?

Perhaps you could ask why they do not market infant formula here?

Is it, perhaps, because the market is already flooded? That didn't stop them bringing out Taster's Choice? Is it because of a "gentlemen's agreement" with the other companies concerned? If so, what did they obtain in return for staying out of Canada? Or could it be that the product does not come up to our standards? It would be interesting to know.

In November, 1978, Michael Latham, nutritionist and author, addressed the Governing Board of the National Council of Churches in New York. He spoke of his experience with dying babies in East Africa, Kenya and the Philippines:

*"When I see an emaciated, dehydrated, seriously ill baby, and I learn from the mother that he has been bottle fed and that she could have breast-fed that baby, I do become emotional.*

*I wonder how our countries, generous Christian countries like the United States and Britain and Switzerland, can allow this to happen. Yet it is our major food corporations who are responsible.*

*These are respectable corporations whose directors attend our churches, ones in which we as individuals and institutions invest, and businesses which most of you support with your dollars when you purchase their products.*

*I have read the Nestle view presented to you and I have heard their statements. I find that their argument is clever, yet largely fallacious. Nestles, like many of the large transnational corporations, can afford millions of dollars to promote their products while appearing to adhere to newly promulgated guidelines and they can spend huge sums fighting the boycott and producing evidence for you.*

*In contrast I, and other concerned doctors and nutritionists, churchmen and lay workers, get no financial support for our fight to oppose them. All we can do is take a few hours off from our busy schedules to speak out against the actions of the corporations and in favour of our silent constituency, the infants*

*Saltie* had been tied up, resting, for over a week. She had come out in a hurry when the *Pender Queen* broke her drive-shaft on Tuesday.

The ancient wooden hull had been pulled into dry dock for repairs. On Thursday the dry dock was having difficulties.

"Looks like we'll be going into the holiday weekend with only one ship," moaned a staffer. Fortunately, he was wrong. *Saltie* limped through the pressures.

# Logging trucks not getting deal on ferry

Logging trucks running from Fulford to Swartz Bay are not travelling at bargain rates, a B.C. Ferry Corporation spokesman said Tuesday.

A Salt Spring resident suggested Monday that the trucks were paying at Swartz Bay when their trailers were pulled up on the back and that they were not being charged anything for the return trip with a load of logs.

However, terminal agent Bob Anderson said that each truck pays \$45 for the return trip; the basic rate is 50 cents per foot. When the trucks come over to the island piggy-backing their trailers, they measure about 30 feet in length, said Anderson. Returning with a load of logs, the length is about 60 feet.

### VERY HELPFUL

He also noted that the operators of the trucks had been very helpful. When the *Tachek* first started on the Fulford run, different trucks that were going to use the ferry

were allocated certain times at which they could make the trip.

Then, Anderson said, the logging trucks began using it. An informal meeting was held between ferry officials and loggers who wanted to use the ferry.

One of the local loggers agreed to wait until a Victoria company had finished hauling before he began taking his logs off the island.

It was also agreed that the trucks would have assured loading on the 11 am and 5.15 pm sailings on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday. On Tuesday and Friday, the trucks use the 2.15 pm sailing.

The *Tachek* can only carry 12 cars when a loaded logging truck makes the trip. Capacity of the ferry is 120,000 lbs. and weight of a logging truck when loaded is about 76,000 lbs.

# Apology, retraction demanded

A Ganges resident has been asked to make an apology for and a retraction of certain statements made about Capital Regional District executive director Dennis Young.

Yvette Valcourt has been asked to make the retraction of statements made at a public meeting on Salt Spring, on a "hot-line" television program, in letters to *Gulf Islands Driftwood* and in letters to the CRD.

She said on Monday that she had no intention of apologizing for or retracting what she had said about the CRD staff member.
