

Areas of concern are explained in map of Ganges-schools traffic

This map indicates the centres of concern of the new Ganges Safety Committee.

Promotor of the map and author of the recommendations of the committee, Gwen Althouse, prepared the key to the safety map. These are her areas of concern.

POINT A

Intersection of main road and Upper Ganges Road (Harbour House). There used to be a painted

crosswalk here. This no longer exists, nor are there any signs. There is no safe place for children to cross and continue on Upper Ganges Road.

POINT B

Walkway between St. George's Church and Mahon Hall.

This is unsafe and inadequate. In winter it often disappears under stretches of water and pedestrians are forced to share the road with

the traffic. In fog, which is not unusual at this point during winter, it is a particularly gloomy and dangerous spot.

Perhaps this shoulder could be widened and preferably raised or properly defined with a curb.

POINT C

Rainbow Road corner. This is a busy spot for both traffic and pedestrians. Visibility is very poor for both, because of the hedge.

Traffic must move into the path of pedestrians in order to see if the way is clear to proceed and the cars and people dodge around each other, while traffic approaches from the other direction. In winter this spot is also worse due to large pools of water lying around at the corner. Children especially have to make hasty decisions that are not always the right ones. In the last few years there have been several accidents here. I can recall two myself, which involved pedestrians. In both cases an ambulance was called.

POINT D

Outside Rita's Inn. The traffic here crosses the sidewalk to park or back out of the parking area.

POINT E

Crosswalk by Trading Company and Bank of Commerce.

Traffic parks here not only on both sides of the crosswalk, but very often on top of it. Pedestrians stepping out from behind a parked truck, for example, can be a third of the way across the walk before they can see approaching traffic from their left or be seen by approaching drivers.

In any case, this crosswalk is poorly marked and tends to be ignored by drivers. To cross from the Trading Co. to the gas station on the corner of McPhillips is also hazardous.

In addition, drivers proceeding from the stop sign outside the firehall sometimes must try to see around cars parked beside the crosswalk on that side of the road.

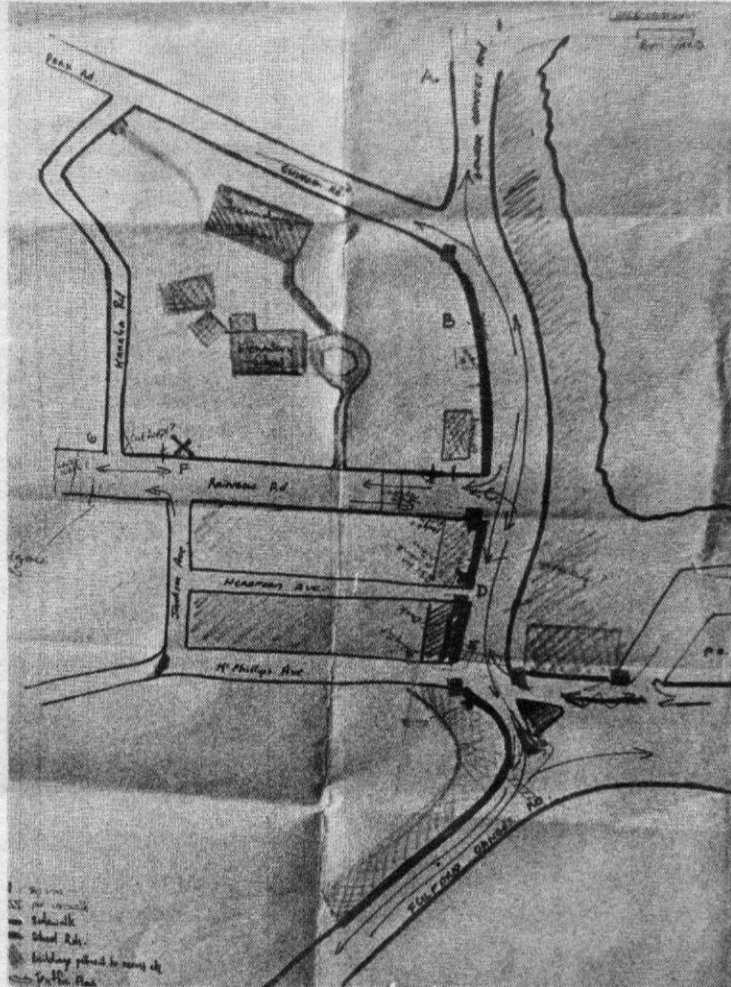
POINT F

Easy to rectify. The school exit gates opposite Jackson Ave.

This exit is a poor one because cars are often parked right across the gates at school leaving time or during sports events.

Parking should be allowed only beyond a certain distance from the gate so that students can be seen more clearly by the traffic on Rainbow Road, as they emerge.

Perhaps this gate should be closed altogether, or made into a proper crosswalk, but left as it is, it is dangerous. Additional school signs and speed restriction signs could also be considered in Ganges. We would appreciate especially the guidance and assistance of the Highways Department in all these matters.

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MOVING TOWARD ECONOMIC DICTATORSHIP

Canadian economy controlled by 442 people, says Douglas

Retiring Member of Parliament for the Gulf Islands constituency, Tommy Douglas, received a standing ovation both before and after his speech at a New Democratic Party meeting in Ganges Friday.

The veteran Canadian politician was applauded numerous times during his speech, which included anecdotes and stories relating to his 44 years of experience in politics.

He looked back to the time when he was both premier and minister of health in Saskatchewan and one day was touring the grounds of the mental hospital in Weyburn. He ran across one of the patients of the hospital who looked Douglas over "from head to foot, which isn't too far" and asked him who he was.

"Well, I'm Tommy Douglas."
"What do you do?" asked the patient.

"I'm the premier of Saskatche-

wan," Douglas replied.

"Oh, you'll get over it. I thought I was Napoleon when I first got here."

Weyburn, Douglas explained, was in his constituency.

"A lot of people used to say that's why I got elected: everybody was crazy about me."

ECONOMY GETS WORSE

On a more serious note, the former leader of the federal New Democratic Party observed that there were two types of democracy: political and social. The latter, he said, was economic democracy, "but we haven't got it". Political democracy gets better, said Douglas, and the economy gets worse.

He told the meeting that 14 years ago the history of wealth in Canada had been examined. At that time, it was found that 886 people, through interlocking directorates, controlled the Canadian economy.

Today, said Douglas, that num-

ber has dropped to 442.

"We're moving towards an economic dictatorship."

Douglas went on to point out that there were only two parties in the forthcoming election. One (Liberals and Conservatives) was out to maintain control of the wealth in the hands of economic tycoons and the other (NDP) was out to restore the wealth into the hands of the people.

He recalled a motion put before to the House of Commons by NDP Leader Ed Broadbent. If it had become law, it would have required companies to submit a record of their prices and profits every three months, and among other things, it would have required prices to be rolled back if it was decided that a company was taking more than was justified.

VOTED AGAINST IT

The Liberals and Conservatives, said Douglas, joined hands to vote against it.

"Why didn't the Conservatives vote with us? Because the people who control the economy of this country would have cut off their support instantly."

Douglas concluded his speech with a tale called *Mouseland*, "a place where all the little mice lived together. They had good days and bad days. Days when they felt they were making progress and days when they were discouraged and sad at heart. Like us, they had governments and elections."

But the government in Mouseland, said Douglas, consisted of big black, fat cats.

"And if you think it's strange that mice should elect big fat cats, you haven't read the history of Canada."

They were nice cats and passed good laws, Douglas continued. They were good laws for cats but not for mice. There were laws such as the one that dictated that when cats were still sleepy in the

Socreds 'sleaziest government' - Mika

About 100 islanders turned up at the Activity Centre in Ganges Friday evening to hear two candidates tell them why they should vote for the New Democratic Party in the two forthcoming elections.

Provincial candidate John Mika told the audience that he had a tie with the Gulf Islands, having been the first permanent resident of Piers Island, where he and his wife had a hobby farm.

Speaking of the provincial election campaign, he said that the truth is always stretched a little at election time but he found it "distasteful to see how many half-truths are being bandied about by the Social Credit Party". He said that electors had a choice between those who would sell the province's resources for a short-term gain and those who wished to retain control of those resources.

He labelled the Socred govern-

ment as opportunist and asserted that they were "quite capable of selling the home farm for a few dollars".

DISTORTIONS

Mika said there were "gross distortions" in the advertisements being published by the Socreds. As an example, he cited the tourism ad that has appeared in different newspapers, which says tourism has been very prosperous in the last three years compared to what it was when the NDP was in power.

"They forget to mention that the Canadian dollar was worth \$1.10 US then," said Mika. "That has some bearing on the amount of tourism in the province."

He observed that in his work as a news reporter, he had read a lot of the history of politics in B.C. The past Socred regime, he charged, was the "sleaziest government in the history of B.C."

"No true Liberal would like Pat McGeer. No true Conservative would be proud of Hugh Curtis and no true Socred could be happy with Bill Bennett."

He reminded the meeting that Hugh Curtis and Bill Bennett would be "helicoptering" in to the islands next week and suggested that when "Hugh Curtis comes down out of the sky", he be asked about some of the grievances islanders have had in the recent past.

HE WROTE ACT

"Ask him where he was when the three-cent gas tax was introduced," said Mika, adding that implementation of the tax was a part of the Act which Curtis wrote.

Where was Curtis when islanders complained about the school equalization tax? asked the NDP candidate.

"He has 10 minutes to drop down out of the sky in a helicopter but he doesn't have a few hours to devote to your grievances."

Mika went on to promise that he would hold annual accountability sessions in three parts of his riding if he were elected.

In closing, Mika gave the meeting three reasons why islanders should vote for the New Democrats and, he said, "they all concern Hugh Curtis."

"He was a Liberal and he switched; he was a Conservative and he switched; now he's a Socred it's time to switch him right off."

In a brief question period, Mika replied to a question concerning nuclear power in B.C. He said an NDP government would call an "absolute halt" to proposals for nuclear power, that any such plan would be "tossed right out".

Candidates to visit Outer Islands

John Mika and Jim Manly, provincial and federal candidates for the New Democratic Party plan visits to the Outer Islands this week.

On Thursday they are scheduled to be at the Health Centre on Mayne Island from 2 to 4 pm and on Galiano Island at the Community Hall from 7 to 8 pm. They will welcome the attendance by all islanders in order to meet with them for discussion of matters of local interest and concern, *Driftwood* was told by an NDP spokesman.

Pender Islands will be visited by both candidates on Saturday, where they intend to spend the afternoon meeting local residents.

Environmental protection major concern says Manly

"We're fighting two elections together and we're fighting them to win," federal New Democratic Party candidate Jim Manly told a campaign meeting in Ganges Friday.

The NDP candidate for Cowichan-Malahat-The Islands said he felt there were four major issues that had to be dealt with in Canada. First, he said, was the need for industrial strategy.

"A bit of planning would provide work for everyone so we wouldn't be spending four billion dollars on Unemployment Insurance."

Later in the evening, Manly said there was a need for Canada to become more self-sufficient. He said transportation policies with energy conservation in mind had to be developed and suggested that Canada should have a merchant marine.

The second issue was control of the economy.

Prime Minister Trudeau, said Manly, talks of the importance of repatriating the Constitution. Repatriating the economy was more important, asserted the New Democrat.

MEDICARE

Maintaining a medicare program was another concern of Manly's, who said that following government legislation two years

ago, more and more provinces were allowing doctors to opt out of medicare schemes.

The last point he made was that protection was needed against unfair profiteering and price-gouging. He urged that a fair prices commission be set up with the power to roll back unfair prices.

As far as local issues were concerned, Manly felt that protection of the environment was an important matter on the west coast. Of the threat of oil tankers, he said "we have to insist we do not want increased traffic in Puget Sound."

Manly drew loud applause with a story about a sheep-shearing contest. He said the fleece of one animal was being hacked at and hewed, "but the poor sheep was getting in worse shape."

"I looked at the face of that

sheep, and it reminded me of something: it was the face of the Canadian taxpayer."

Asked later in the meeting what his party's position was on military and defense spending in Canada, Manly said he felt the proposed purchase of fighter planes was unnecessary.

He said he favoured the idea of hospitals, schools and other services being financed by the government and "bake sales to raise money for fighter planes".

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Secondary students hear NDP candidates speak

The local NDP campaign made its way into Gulf Island Secondary School Friday afternoon as both the provincial and federal candidates for this area made an appearance. Addressing the students were John Mika, the provincial candidate in the Saanich and the Islands riding, and Jim Manly, the federal candidate in the Cowichan-Malahat-The Islands riding. Following the presentations was a short question period.

John Mika began the program by telling the students that the NDP was a party completely differ-

ent from the others. He praised the NDP's "power to the people" slogan, deeming that the other parties have "power to the privileged" policies. Speaking on politics in a broader sense, he encouraged the students to become involved, declaring that participation in politics is "the only process in which you can control your environment".

Jim Manly, after taking the stand, gave a speech characteristic of a candidate rallying for supporters. He outlined the four major points of the NDP federal campaign to be a national industrial strategy which will put Canadians back to work, control of our resources and economy, maintenance and expansion of Medicare, and the initiation of a fair prices commission with the power to control prices.

It wasn't until the question period that the NDP's position on environmental dangers was discussed. Upon being asked, Jim Manly expressed that the NDP is strictly opposed to nuclear generators and supertanker shipping lanes in Canada and extremely concerned about the location of major industry.

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Down Through The Years With Driftwood

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

Gulf Islands School District has received approval of its 1964 budget from the Department of Education. Total is \$297,652, an increase over 1963 of approximately \$29,000. The increase is made up of \$13,700 in boosts to teachers' salaries and \$5,600 in increases and additions to the non-teaching staff. Balance of the increase, \$10,000, covers additional maintenance, equipment, administration and other expenses. Increase in pupil enrolment over 1963 is 8.76%. The assessment has gone up 11.5% and the mill rate is 21.38, or 1.75 over last year's. Provincial average is 23.41 mills. As a result of the additional homeowners' grant of \$15 there will be no appreciable increase in taxes for those owning property with an assessed value of up to \$10,000. The provincial government will accept a 9.71% share of the costs, with the school district to pay 90.29%.

Queen of the Islands will be out of service for two weeks commencing April 27 when she will undergo her annual refit. On May 7 she will be back on her three daily round trips to Tsawwassen. No replacement service will be offered.

Motion to apply for a separate recreation commission for South Salt Spring Island was defeated 13-9 at a public meeting in Mahon Hall, April 13. Jack Roland and Bob Akerman said they accepted the majority decision and that they will co-operate to the full with the Salt Spring Island Recreation Commission. Both were named to the commission. Others serving are Mrs. Dennis Deacon, Ivor Ginn, Robert Patterson, Barney Lukas, Mrs. A.M. Brown, Dr. E.E. Groff and T.J. Sharland.

TEN YEARS AGO

Plans for fire protection are still under active consideration on the Pender Islands. Browning and Bedwell Harbours and Magic Lake will each have its own portable equipment. The fire engine will be at North Pender. Miss Joan Purchase will be co-ordinator, with a private phone, to be used only for fire calls.

School trustees meeting in Ganges last week were in agreement on the road to Mahon Hall. It is a danger to traffic and to students, asserted trustee Betty Ross, of Mayne. Cars streak past Mahon Hall and over the hill, she told her colleagues. Everything converges on Mahon Hall. Buses, children, cars, parents, dogs: they all rush to Mahon Hall, trustees agreed. When buses loaded on Kanaka Road there was a hazard to children as they backed into the bays, observed C.W. Hatch. No school bus should be reversed unless there is a second person to watch from outside, stated Jim Campbell. Measures will be taken to improve traffic conditions at the schools.

Chairman of the Gulf Islands School Board, Jim Campbell has called for the resignation of the medical officer of health, Dr. J.L.M. Whitbread. Whitbread recently visited the islands and stated that the sewage system at Gulf Islands Secondary School discharges directly into the sea. He also stated that permission to build the secondary school was granted on the strict understanding that a community sewer system was imminent and that the school would then be required to connect with it. If Dr. Whitbread approved the system and there is anything wrong with it, then he should resign, asserted the chairman.

be wholly at the mercy of those who control the external markets! (Many of them in the Third World!)

It is a relief to know that we World Development freaks are not alone. It's not just "those crazy Christians" or "those silly socialists", it's those conservative capitalists who are beginning to worry!

John Bullock is head of the 54,000-member Canadian Federation of Independent Businessmen. He is very concerned about the proposed takeover of the Hudson's Bay Company.

"When the Thomson offer came through, we were worried," he says. "When the Weston offer came through we were really alarmed. We couldn't believe it."

SETTING RENTS

Bullock's main complaint is that a Bay controlled by Weston "has the capability of controlling the development of plazas" and therefore of setting rents that affect consumer prices.

Mr. Bullock is calling for an investigation by the Combines Branch of the federal Ministry of Consumer and Corporate Affairs. But he knows that Robert Bertrand has very little clout in the face of deals that run into billions of dollars!

We are inclined to read about these huge takeovers as though they only concerned beings from another world. And in a sense they are very remote from us. The Westons and the Thomsons live in a sphere where inflation certainly doesn't mean hardship. Where the rising and falling dollar doesn't affect their purchasing power or the way they live, it's more like a game of checkers! But Mr. Bullock sees clearly that a grocery conglomerate acquiring the vast real estate holdings of the Bay poses huge dangers to his organization and to us, the real people of Canada.

REAL ESTATE

In a sense the department stores we think of as the Bay are only the tip of the iceberg. This struggle isn't about who sells Bay fashions to those who can afford to buy them! It's about who controls vast tracts of real estate. This control would provide Weston's with the capability of forcing food prices up even higher than they are now. Then the final breakdown of the food chain will be under way.

Weston's don't care if every farmer in Canada leaves the land. They will continue to import from the cheapest source abroad, sell at the highest profit the market will bear, and possibly employ the ex-farmer in their retail stores at minimum wages. Or complain about their taxes supporting the unemployed!

But don't let this spoil your pleasure on Saturday. Go to the World Relief Tea, give more than you can afford, secure in the knowledge that when our turn comes, World Relief Teas will be held in Jamaica, Latin America and parts of Africa, and we shall reap what we have so generously sown.

What do B.C.R.I.C. shares represent?

The B.C. Resources Investment Corporation is the holding company for shares held by the province in a variety of B.C. resource industries and enterprises. B.C.R.I.C. holds 81% of the common shares of Canadian Cellulose, 100% of the common shares of Kootenay Forest Products and Plateau Mills, 10% of the common shares of Westcoast Transmission, plus oil and gas rights in a vast area of northeastern B.C.—investments transferred at a value of over \$151 million. B.C.R.I.C. shares represent partial ownership of this whole range of enterprises.

How can I apply?

Application forms are available at banks, trust companies, credit unions and investment dealers throughout B.C. When making application, you must present two of the following pieces of identification: a.) driver's licence; b.) Social Insurance card; c.) Medical Plan card. If you are 65 years of age or over, a Pharmacare card is sufficient proof of identity.

Mothers or guardians applying for children under 16 are required to furnish only a medical plan number or a birth certificate for such children. Young people, 16 and over,

When do I receive my shares?

Distribution of free shares by B.C.R.I.C. will begin immediately after British Columbia Day, August 6, 1979. The person making application has until September 30, 1979 to pick up the shares where application was made.

Can I buy additional shares?

Yes. If you qualify for free shares, you have the option of purchasing up to 5,000 additional shares at a price substantially below their underlying value. This price will be specified on your application form.

No individual or corporation may own more than 1% of the voting shares of B.C.R.I.C. (although pension funds may own up to 3%). Corporations and pension funds, however, are not allowed to participate in the initial share issue.

Will I be able to sell my shares?

Yes. Stock market trading in shares is expected to commence shortly after the distribution date . . . and at this point, a "market value" will be established. However, it is hoped that a majority of British Columbians will not only retain, but enlarge, their share holdings. In this way, they will participate directly in the continued expansion of our resource industries, while ensuring that control of these industries remains in B.C.

What if my shares are lost or stolen?

The free shares will be "bearer" shares—in other words, owned by and saleable by the bearer, and not registered to any individual. Therefore, there is no protection against loss or theft. However, each block of 100 shares or more will be registered in the name of an individual share-holder (and thus protected). Because registering takes additional time, persons planning to purchase blocks of shares for registration should submit their applications as early as possible. Note: only the holders of registered shares will be eligible to vote on company matters and receive financial information and other communications from the company.

How will B.C.R.I.C. use its money?

All money invested in the B.C. Resource Investment Corporation will be used to further its investment objectives, including the development of resource industries within British Columbia.

Maximum harvest permitted by the current regulations is 15 oysters in the shell.

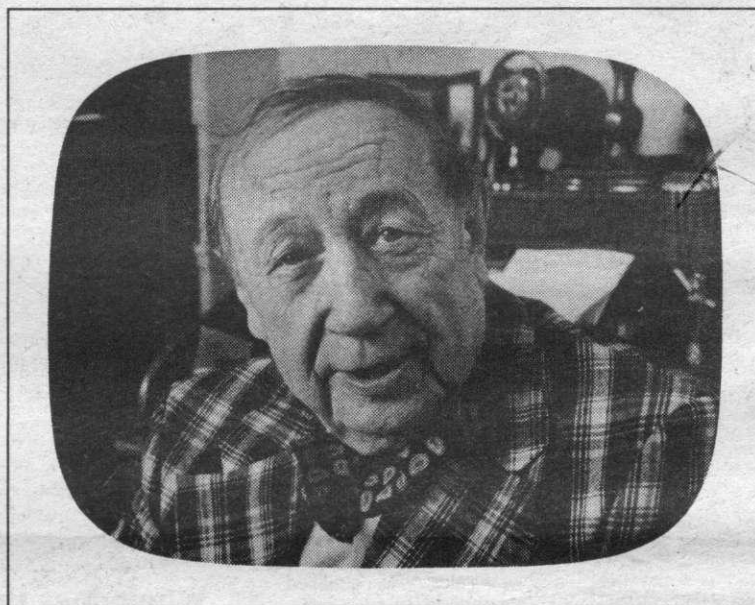
Terry Elford reported that he had encountered a group of off-island residents taking them in garbage cans.
