

Ganges sewer outfall

Dispersal of effluent aided by turbulence

If and when the sewer system is installed at Ganges, the final effluent as it leaves the outfall will be clear and will have no smell. Capital Regional District engineer Mike Williams said Friday that the pollution level of the effluent, 15/15, (15 parts per million of suspended solids and 15 milligrams per litre of biological oxygen demand) was of a higher quality than what many other treatment plants were pumping in to the sea.

The plant at Sidney, he said, was discharging a million gallons of effluent a day, with a pollution level of 60/40.

He explained that the 15/15 level means that about 14 lbs. each of suspended solids and B.O.D. will be discharged daily. He observed that raw sewage would have a level of about 250/300.

When asked about the possibility of the outfall not being of sufficient length to get the effluent out of the harbour, particularly when a southeast wind was blowing, Williams pointed out that dispersal of the effluent would be aided in such a situation.

TURBULENCE

The turbulence in the water created by the tide running one way and the wind the other, he said, would aid diffusion of the discharge.

He went on to say that in England, towns along the Thames River take drinking water from the river, treat it, use it, treat it again, and discharge it back into the river. Quality of the water they discharge, observed Williams was about 10/10.

As far as lengthening the outfall was concerned, the engineer estimated it would cost an additional \$1 million to extend it beyond the Second Sister Island. He suggested the treatment plant could be improved extensively at less cost.

The sludge that will settle out of the sewage in the plant will not be treated because, Williams explained, "such a small quantity was not worth it". It will amount to about a septic tank truck a month.

SLUDGE STUDY

Tentative plans call for trucking the sludge off the island and dumping it elsewhere. The regional district is about to proceed with a "regional sludge study", Driftwood learned.

The biodisc treatment plant

proposed by the region is one that has been in use for many years, and the technology of it is "well established", said Williams.

The building that will house the plant will measure about 30 by 70 feet and will be situated in Moutat Park, behind the Harbour Low Cost Store.

One of the major problems with sewage treatment is handling substances such as Drano and chemical cleaners. There is no method of breaking them down, Williams said.

Williams noted that the regional board recently allotted an additional \$25,000 for monitoring of harbour waters by H.A. Simons (International) Ltd. Nearly \$200,000 has been spent on the Ganges Harbour sewer plan during the past 10 years.

Water board makes list of objections

The North Salt Spring Waterworks District presented some observations on the proposed 10 hp limitation on boats on St. Mary Lake to the Islands Trust last week. Mike Larmour spoke to the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee. His comments were as follows:

In general, a reduction in the recreational use of power boats would be desirable. The precise effect of power boating on the water quality of St. Mary Lake is not well known, but some general observations can be made based on research and similar experience gained elsewhere.

Power boating in shallow water increases turbidity, thus making effective disinfection more difficult. As well, increased turbidity and oil-related tastes may have aesthetic implications.

OUTBOARDS

More than 85% of the boats used for recreation are powered by outboards.

Probably the most important result of the use of outboards is the discharge of raw, unburned fuel into the receiving waters. However, other substances including

Trust to tighten controls on soil and fill removal on Salt Spring

No topsoil or shale may be removed from property in the islands without approval from the Capital Regional District. A permit must also be obtained from the Ministry of Mines.

On Wednesday last week the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee heard reports of the removal of shale from a property on Fulford-Ganges Road at Cusheon Lake Road. Owners of the adjacent property complained that it was reducing the value of their holding.

If the complaint is that the owner is removing gravel or fill, then it is a matter for the Capital Regional Board, the committee was told.

If, however, it is complained that he is selling it, it becomes a concern of the Islands Trust.

The heart of the problem is opening a pit in a watershed, said planner Chris Foord.

Did the operator, Harvey Reynolds, have a license, enquired Gordon Wallace.

He has a permit from the Ministry of Mines, said Foord, although the pattern of digging does not conform to the permit.

The property looks like a moon-

scape, reported Bud Kreissl. He had spoken to Harvey Reynolds, he reported, and had been accused of trying to stop people making a living on the island.

Trust will write to Mr. Reynolds advising him he is contravening the

zoning bylaw. A letter will be sent to the Capital Regional District pointing out that the project contravenes the Municipal Act, section 8.68.

The Minister of Mines will also be advised.


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17.13" of rain since September

High temperatures, little rain during April

April was a dry month, although quite a number of days gave rain. In general, the amounts were small, less than a tenth of an inch, the highest rainfall being less than half an inch. From the 20th of the month to the end, we had a period of clear skies and sunshine, with temperatures reaching maximums and near maximums. My own records do not go back far enough to be definite, but certainly they surpassed those for the past 14 years.

However, there is always a snag. The rainfall to date is quite small, and this, coupled with a low rainfall over last fall, can give cause for concern. Since last September, the period of our real rainfall, we have had 17.13" of rain. When one allows for the run-off, not too much has been stored in the ground for our yearly water supply. Ten inches of rain per annum, or less, gives desert conditions, so there could quite easily be a water shortage through the summer, unless we get more rainfall in the drier months than is usual.

My creek, which is a good indicator of the amount of surplus water in the land, has been just a few pools for the last 10 days. Over a long term average, it dries up in the second half of June, two months away.

For the moment, for this island, it would seem that we have to adopt a policy of "ca'canny" with our water.

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No dumping in Fulford says Trust

Application by the Otter Bay Logging Company to dump logs in Fulford Harbour has been disapproved by the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee.

The committee was advised on Wednesday last week that the company had been advised that a decision was to be reached last week.

In that case, said Bud Kreissl, he had to vote against it, because there were 130 signatures opposing it.

Local trustees Kreissl and David Lott had called a meeting for Tuesday evening to discuss the whole matter.

The project in question is the old Cudmore dump. It was recommended that the Trust Committee turn it down on the grounds that the location is not suitable for the project.

Among other reasons, it was stated that the site was aesthetically undesirable, too close to the ferries and contrary to recommendations for the protection of the harbour.

There has to be somewhere on Salt Spring Island where logs can be dumped in the water, said David Lott and the local trustees are investigating a public dump at Burgoyne Bay.

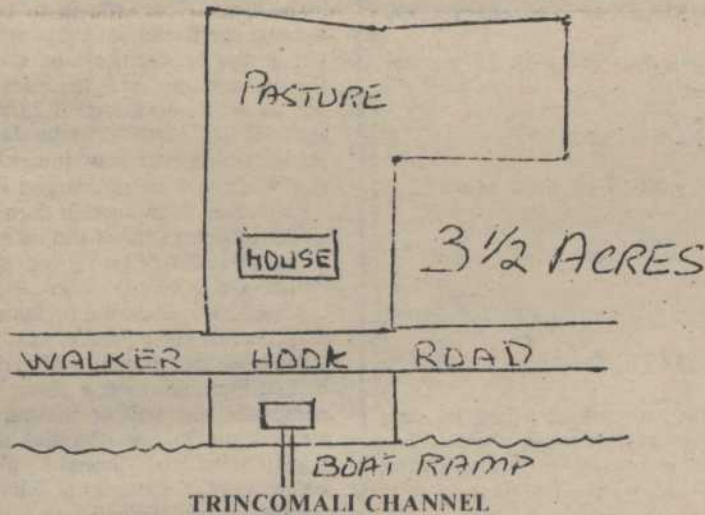

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Better to question than risk obedience to evil powers

"Honour all men; love the brotherhood; fear God; honour the King."

That was my school motto, and when I was 12 I believed in it implicitly. I couldn't do it. But I believed it. Now I question each phrase. Some men (and even some women) are dishonourable; many Christians are unlovable and I'd rather love and emulate than fear God. However, I certainly honour the Queen!

If you advocate unquestioning obedience, ponder on the results of experiments carried out at Yale University. (*Obedience to Authority* by Dr. Stanley Milgram, 1974). They consisted of the Experimenter, dressed in a white coat; the Student (an actor hired by the experimenter) and the Teacher (the actual subject). The Teacher sat at a panel bristling with switches labelled from "Low Voltage" to "Danger". The student gave a series of responses to word clues from the Teacher. At each "incorrect" response the Teacher was to "shock" the student, such shocks supposedly increasing in severity with the frequency of error. Students responded to the (faked) shocks in varying ways, feigning

we are in a minority! Dr. Milgram found that on average two-thirds of the people tested (not "criminals", but very ordinary people from all walks of life) carried out his orders - some under protest, but not enough to terminate the experiments. (I would like to see this test repeated every decade to see if our attitudes change.)

One result of the enquiries into the activities of the RCMP will be, I hope, not loss of respect for law enforcement officers per se, but a heightened awareness of morality on the part of the public as well as members of the force. Of course there will be dangers, my morality is possibly not yours. But we have already fallen into the trap of unquestioning obedience in my lifetime, when at least six million Jews were exterminated in response to orders from on high.

BETTER TO QUESTION

That is the danger: we obey the bad as well as the good. Surely it is better to question early in the process, rather than risk complete obedience to evil powers and policies.

A recent "New Internationalist" feature on law and order draws clear lines between victimless crimes (over 30,000 arrests in the U.K. in 1978): crimes of violence (Detroit, pop. 1½ million, has more violent deaths annually than the U.K., pop. 55 million and a civil war in Northern Ireland); white-collar crime (a term first coined in the 40's) and crimes of poverty.

The Great Train Robbery of 1963 netted 2½ million pounds and the perpetrators received 30-year sentences. The same year the Ferranti Corporation tried to defraud the British government of 5½ million pounds. This was later reduced "through an amiable agreement" to 1 million pounds; still three times the agreed profit margin. There were no prosecutions for the intended fraud.

GOT 30 DAYS

Price fixing in the U.S. cost that country an estimated \$22 billion in 1974. One conspiracy alone, in Seattle, jacked up bread prices by \$20 million. But no one has been imprisoned for this offence since 1961, when seven executives received 30 days each!

Tax fraud is another white collar crime which pays. France lost \$7 billion and Italy \$13 billion in 1975. Inland Revenue in Britain asked for more staff to deal with the problem. Instead, the number of welfare inspectors increased. In '72/'73 more than 80,000 cases of false tax returns were settled without prosecution, and only 17 brought to court. The same year 12,000 fraudulent claims by welfare clients were prosecuted, the amount recovered being less than 15% of that recovered in the 17 tax prosecutions! One magistrate heard a case of underpayment of income tax to the tune of several

thousand pounds. The offender was a former magistrate. The adjudicator refused to indict the case for trial on the grounds it would undermine the confidence of the public in the workings of the judiciary!

The owner may not take the advice of the commission. The Islands Trust regulation takes precedence, it was noted on Wednesday at the Salt Spring Island Trust Committee meeting.

"Perhaps we should send a copy of our bylaw to the Ministry of Lands," quipped Gordon Wallace.

PUBLIC NOTICE ROYAL COMMISSION OF INQUIRY INTO URANIUM MINING

COMMUNITY MEETINGS

The following Commissioners were appointed in accordance with the British Columbia Public Inquiries Act:

- Dr. David V. Bates, Chairman
- Dr. James W. Murray
- Mr. Valter Raudsepp

Within the Terms of Reference, the Commissioners are to inquire into the adequacy of existing measures to provide protection in all aspects of uranium mining in British Columbia. In particular, they are to examine the adequacy of existing Federal and Provincial requirements in British Columbia for:

- (a) The protection of the health and safety of workers associated with exploration, mining and milling of uranium, and
- (b) The protection of the environment, and
- (c) The protection of the Public.

On completion of the Inquiry, the Commissioners will make recommendations to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council for setting and maintaining standards for workers and public safety, and for protection of the environment in respect to exploration, mining and milling of uranium ores.

The purpose of the Community Meetings is to give the Commissioners the opportunity of understanding the local issues facing these communities that could be affected by uranium mining in British Columbia. It will also permit local organizations or members of the public an early opportunity to express their views regarding the issues that are to be considered by the Commission. The Commission plans on returning to these and other communities where required, at a later date after more technical information is available.

Public interest groups who are applying for "Participant Funding" may, if they wish, make an opening statement at these Meetings, but they will not be expected to present their main submissions until the Fall Hearings. However, anyone who particularly wishes to speak at the above Public Meetings in June or July, and who have not already done so, are requested to advise the Secretary in advance.

During the course of the Hearings, the Commissioners will make on-site inspections of uranium deposits and local environmental settings.

The locations, dates, and times of the individual Public Hearings will be published in advance in the appropriate regional and local newspapers.

the dock over two years ago by the then Islands Trustees. Later, when the Trust took over zoning decisions from the Capital Regional District, their advice apparently changed.

SUBJECT TO ZONING

John Rich conceded that at least one trustee had had a change of mind. He added that, to the best of his knowledge, approval had been given at that time "subject to zoning".

Mrs. Pinchin described the Trust meeting which decided the fate of bylaw 10 as "a railroad job" and claimed that she and her husband "didn't get a fair shake".

"We still want a dock," she said, "and I still think that most of the islanders do too. This island is being strangled by a few. I honestly think that a plebiscite would come out in favour of a dock."

Commenting on financial projections made by Don Sprague at the recent public hearing, Mrs.

Pinchin said that the dock they had designed would have cost in the neighbourhood of \$40,000 not \$60,000, \$75,000 or \$90,000. Using Sprague's cost/profit ratios, she estimated that they might expect to make about \$18,000 per annum, making sale of the inn to a yacht club unnecessary.

EARN LIVING ON MAYNE

Further to that question, she said that she and her husband had been looking for some way to earn a living and stay on Mayne ever since buying property there in 1964.

The Mayne Inn seemed the ideal opportunity to establish a family business.

Mrs. Pinchin describes her husband Weldon as a "very private person, a loner, not a club joiner". Nevertheless, she says, he likes people and is very supportive of community activities and local businesses.

"All those people who say they don't want change," she concluded, "had better think about what Mayne would be like without the Mayne Inn."

John Rich may have put it in a nutshell when he said, "Nobody 'won' the hearing and nobody will 'win' in the future."

Hospital open house to be held on Saturday

On Saturday the renovations and extension to Lady Minto Hospital will be formally opened by Mrs. Warren Hastings of Ganges. Mrs. Hastings is a former chairman of the board of management of the hospital and was one of the prime movers when the hospital was built, in 1958, on its present site. She will officiate at 2 pm.

The extended care wing has been enlarged with the addition of 10 new beds. Open House will follow the ceremonies and the public will be shown around. There will be exhibits and displays to be seen. Tea will be served by the Hospital Auxiliary at the end of each formal tour of inspection. Open House will be closed at 4.15 pm.

Supertanker traffic topic of meeting when Liberal candidate presents film

On April 30, David Anderson, the federal Liberal candidate of the Cowichan-Malahat-the Islands riding came to Salt Spring to discuss the controversial issue of supertankers on the B.C. coast and to answer questions related to this and other topics.

After being introduced, Anderson presented the film *Tanker-bomb* to the audience. The film dealt with supertankers in general, but more specifically, introduced the proposed supertanker routes along our coastline. The narrator of the film, David Suzuki, said that the chances of an oil spill in our waters is a matter of probability. If the proposed supertanker port is built at Port Angeles, the number of supertankers going through Juan de Fuca Strait daily would increase from six to 40, thereby

increasing the probability of a major oil spill. David Anderson would like to see our governments admit to making a mistake before it's too late, and reinstate the plans for a pipeline because, in his opinion, it is the only way to stop this eventual disaster. Upon being questioned on Canada's deflating economy, Anderson said that the Liberal government spends less money than most European governments and has given Canada the world's

highest employment growth rate. Someone retorted that the many immigrants entering Canada approximately 100,000 annually are receiving jobs which belong to the natural Canadians, but Anderson said that many of the immigrants take the menial jobs which Canadians don't want. In addition, he said that in the state of the world today, it is morally right for our relatively sparsely populated country to allow immigrants to enter.

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
