Under no circumstances should a bus driver require a student to leave the bus on the side of the road. If the student is uncontrollable, the driver should stop and wait for a passing car to pass on a message.

If a student were set down at the side of the road, the school board would be showing disregard for his well-being afterwards.

Student behaviour on the bus is nothing to do with the board,

really, suggested Spencer Marr. The bus is legally an extension of the school, countered superintendent Bob Huestis.

Fernwood School will open in June.

Board of Gulf Islands School District last week agreed to open the school at the beginning of next month on Monday, June 4.

It was estimated that pumping the septic tanks during the initial month will cost about \$500.

Ken Byron Excavating has been preparing plans for a modified disposal field ready to present to the Capital Region building inspector and he has already started clearing, reported secretary-treasurer Wilf Peck.

He noted that the estimate of pumping tanks is based on the optimum use.

"It could be cut in half", he told the board.

"Careful dieting," suggested Spencer Marr.

Schedule revised as Tachek taken off run

Ministry of Highways ferry Tachek has been taken off the Fulford-Swartz Bay run, the B.C. Ferry Corporation announced Monday.

The highways ministry has recalled the ferry, which was on loan to B.C. Ferries, in order to service another route. It was taken off the run Sunday afternoon and has been replaced with the Salt Spring Queen.

Queen of the Islands will continue to operate on the same schedule as before for the time being.

"We regret the inconvenience caused by this revision," said the corporation's manager of corporate communications, Bill Bouchard, this week. "All travellers can be assured that every effort is being made to complete the project as quickly as possible."

Launching ramp cost

The Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce looked into constructing a boat launching ramp at Erskine Point at one time, but abandoned the proposal when it was found what it would cost, the island Parks and Recreation Commission learned Monday.

Former Chamber president Steve Nelson told the meeting that it would be possible to build a ramp using rocks and concrete to make a more solid base on the beach so that vehicles would not get stuck.

He suggested that the ramp would probably have to be at least 50 feet long in order to get out to deep water. The Chamber had decided it would cost about \$10,000 for materials, mainly concrete, said Nelson.

New government has new future to shape

A government is returned and all is joy in the province of British Columbia.

Think again!

The Social Credit government returned to power last week with a reduced majority as had been forecast. The next several years will be the proof of the voters' wisdom. Like a good car, a government can only be assessed by what it has done. Every shiny new steel monster has promise, but many a rusty heap of metal collapses after half a lifetime.

Where would a new government be looking?

In the months immediately preceding the provincial election there were a number of incidents where the provincial forces clashed with the federal administration. Notably, the federal fish and the provincial forests met in mid-stream and the only victims were the people of the province.

Victoria must establish a philosophy that can debate the issues before engaging in a costly confrontation with the national government.

TRANSPORTATION POLICY

Nearer home, the government has to wrestle with the problems of transportation and gasoline tax and ferries. The past record of simply raising prices and justifying the move by offensive notices helps nobody. There must be a firm policy on transportation, to include ferries, highways, bridges and railways. When a bridge is con-

structed in one part of the province, there should be no suggestion that the users of the bridge are inferior citizens for having needed it. When a length of track is laid, the travellers of the future must not be held up to derision for the fact that it was laid. And when a ship is put into service, the people of the islands must be privileged to use it as a matter of policy and not as a charitable donation from an excessively indulgent government.

Still closer to home, the policy of taxing a "depressed community" in order to assist those more prosperous to meet their school costs needs a major overhaul, now. It has been long promised. We can scarcely wait!

FISHING INDUSTRY

In a realm which is affecting the islands to an increasing degree, the fishing industry is in need of a close examination. Although the federal government holds the strings of the net, the fishing industry is peculiarly provincial. The problems of east coast fishing are the same as the west coast, yet vastly different.

There are areas in which the province must be concerning itself. We have seen the industry suffer the ravages of excessive fishing in the name of sport. We have watched with a concern not always shared by government as fishing is struggling with industry to survive. And we have watched the federal government policies fumble fish and fishermen.

The province should be vitally concerned with the incursions

made by foreign ownership into an industry that is essentially British Columbian.

In the past century the provincial governments have been increasingly aware of the problems of people and wastes and water. Today we have advanced little beyond the Romans who walked the roads of Britain 2,000 years ago. The Social Credit government inherited a system of sewage disposal in provincial centres which is based on the blithe assumption that the recipient downstream or up-coast can look after the problem. And it is little changed.

REQUIRES ATTENTION

It is an area that requires close and careful attention. It appears to have received little so far.

Only the legislators appear to be convinced that they have a key to economic problems. It is likely that if the economy could be properly and effectively controlled by legislation there would never have been the major recessions which have plagued the world for all time.

But even if the new government is unlikely to accomplish great changes economically, it can still look once more at the energy picture and BC Hydro.

The revenues from lottery are valuable assets to any government seeking the support of the electorate. But while the province is struggling to keep its hospitals open and effective, it would seem logical to take a leaf out of the Irishman's notebook and devote the proceeds of the lotteries to the support of hospitals.

There is no limit to the challenge facing the new government today.

The manner in which it accepts these challenges and deals with them will probably decide whether in four, or three years, or less, the people of British Columbia will continue a habit and re-elect a Social Credit government.

It rests with the new government.

But promises and assurances substitutes for firm, valuable accomplishment. and glances at the record are poor

Additionally, proposed By-law No. 4 provides for a change in the zoning classification of the unsurveyed foreshore abutting Lot 5, Section 8, Plan 8220, Cowichan Land District, (as shown on Plan No. 2, attached to the By-law) from the Water A zone to the Water A1 zone.

2. Proposed Saturna Island Trust Committee By-law No. 5 is a By-law to amend Capital Regional District By-law No. 250, cited as "Official Community Plan (Saturna Island) By-law, 1975".

The proposed By-law provides for the addition of a Plan policy which allows for Senior Citizen Housing at a density not to exceed 4 dwelling units per acre.

3. Proposed Saturna Island Trust Committee By-law No. 6 is a By-law to amend Capital Regional District By-law No. 103, 1972, cited as "Zoning By-law planning Area No. 4, 1972".

The proposed By-law provides for the addition of a new zoning classification, Senior Citizen Residential (SCR) which allows for one family, two family, or multiple family dwellings at a density not to exceed four (4) dwelling units per acre.

Proposed By-law No. 6 also provides for a change in the zoning classification of the unsurveyed 2.11 acres, being the most easterly of the east 22 chains of the fractional SW¼ of Section 18, Saturna Island, Cowichan District, except Plans 3515, 6417, 14677 and 18577, (as shown on Plan No. 1 attached to the By-law) from the Rural 2 zone to the Senior Citizen Residential zone.

Planners to debate Kirchmeir charges with regional engineers

First challenger to the sewer project in Ganges Harbour, Hermann Kirchmeir, of Ganges, outlined his analysis to the Salt Spring Island Planning Association on Monday evening.

The fiery critic of the sewer proposal explained his opposition to the scheme and outlined the brief he has presented to the Pollution Control Branch.

Dr. Kirchmeir paid particular attention to the announced results of dye tests carried out in the harbour and the flow of the dye material.

He explained that the dye was introduced into the water at the general area of the planned outfall discharge.

The maps showing its dispersal reveal that large quantities flowed into the harbour and ended up on beaches in greater concentration than was acceptable to him.

He suggested that if the dye had been effluent, it would have moved in the same pattern, finally

accumulating against the beaches in the harbour.

Regional director Mike Clement

estimated the additional cost of discharging into Trincomali Channel at about \$1,000,000.

COST A BARRIER

The meeting was sympathetic with the suggestion of transferring the discharge point to Trincomali, although the extra cost was considered a barrier.

Not all present were prepared to accept that Clement's figure was firm.

The planning association accepted Mike Clement's invitation to attend a meeting in Victoria to discuss the Kirchmeir charges with the regional engineers.

Ray Popkin-Clurman and Charles Sutcliffe will represent the association.

Chairman Nick Gilbert told Driftwood that the questions raised are potentially valid and should be looked into.

The association is looking.

RCMP detachment at Ganges is getting heated over animals.

There are constant complaints of animals not being kept under proper control, Driftwood learned this week.

In future, the owners of straying animals will be charged under the Pound Act or the Animals Act, said a spokesman for the detachment on Tuesday.

Mouat Park may be available for centre meeting is told

There is a strong possibility that Mouat Park will be available to Salt Spring Island for the construction of a recreation centre, it was announced at Monday's meeting of the Parks and Recreation Commission.

Bev Unger told the meeting that two spokesmen for the Ministry of Lands had indicated to her that the park might be a suitable site for such a facility.

Both spokesmen are willing to come to the island to talk about it, she said. They also said they had been reading the recreation Master Plan, said Mrs. Unger, and had expressed interest in it.

Meanwhile, Dr. Hugh Borsman said the recreation committee of the commission had met to discuss the various proposals that have been made concerning a recreation or community centre.

BROAD-BASED

He repeated the recommendation he made at the last meeting of the commission, that the facility should be "broad-based", to include a theatre, crafts space, kitchen facilities, meeting rooms, saunas, whirlpool and exercise gym. A shower and toilet facilities should also be planned for use in conjunction with a swimming pool, he said. The pool would come later.

He said the first thing to be done was decide on the type of facility and its size.

"The concept is getting more exciting all the time."

Spencer Marr, however, felt that the idea of a pool should not be forgotten. He reminded the commission that the survey done in preparation for the Master Plan found that most people wanted a swimming pool.

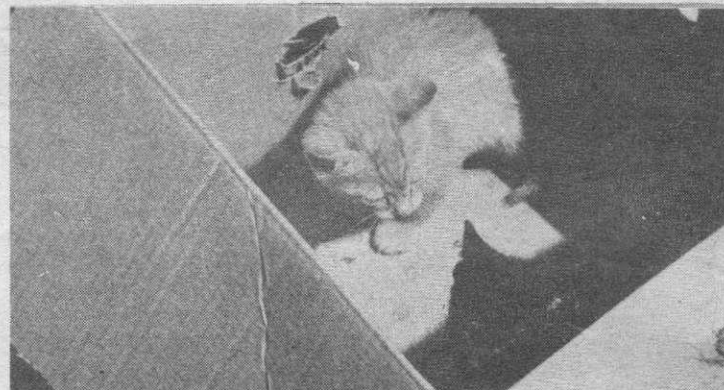
