"Have no intention of complying with letter," he responded, "Will use any frequency as situation warrants. If not satisfactory, either be more specific or prosecute, or advise what limitations are on using channel 19A during distress or incidents."

Joyce Klein claims Channel 22A is frequently used by 'scrambler' traffic, communications which are bleeped out for privacy. She says it would be impossible to monitor round the clock simply because of the terrible noise.

Channel 16 is a distress channel. Though they could monitor that, Joyce feels that their briefest responses, position reports, etc., would clutter the channel intolerably.

Klein feels his actions comply with International Telecommunications Union regulations.

In this he has the support of a staff member of Vancouver Coast Guard Radio, who has indicated compliance, "as usual, with ITU regulations, and that the safety of life at sea will remain paramount".

Klein has had a reply from the Department of Communications. He can use channel 19A, they say, providing the Coast Guard authorizes it. Klein is not optimistic.

If they instigated the move in the first place, he says, they're hardly likely to give him carte blanche now. Obviously, further negotiations are in order.

Hydro warning to 'Sunday loggers'

"Sunday loggers" are making their annual spring assault on power lines, according to B.C. Hydro.

In the most serious incident this year to date, a tall tree was felled against a half-million volt transmission line near Langley.

There was a spectacular flash as the current shorted through the tree to the ground and started small fires in dry grass and shrubs. A circuit breaker tripped immediately and shut off the power before it could either burn through the wire or set the whole tree ablaze,

said a Hydro spokesman.

The logger and his helper were alerted by the first crackling sound and jumped clear. They could have been electrocuted. In this instance service to Hydro customers was not interrupted as other transmission lines took over the load, and the tree was removed by Hydro linemen later in the day.

But in other incidents amateur woodsmen have been injured and power outages have affected large numbers of customers.

Sunday loggers are usually taking down unwanted trees on their own property, and either fail to consider the proximity of power wires, or feel competent to do the job safely, *Driftwood* was told.

ASSISTANCE

Hydro will provide professional assistance, normally at no charge.

"For their own safety, we ask people not to take down trees around power lines by themselves," advises district manager J.R. Thomson.

These are Hydro's policies regarding trees near power lines:

- If, in Hydro's opinion, a tree appears in danger of falling or being blown on to a power line, Hydro will take it down at no charge.

- If an owner wishes to take down a healthy tree near a power line Hydro will provide a lineman to stand by if reasonable notice is given. There will be no charge during normal working hours, but a charge will be made if this service is required outside regular working hours.

- Disposal of felled trees is the responsibility of owners.

The policies apply to trees near the wires between Hydro's poles and a customer's house as well as to the lines on roads, streets and lanes.

"These procedures are provided primarily for the safety of the public, as well as to protect security of service to customers," said Thompson. "If they were fully observed, much sorrow and inconvenience would be avoided."

"Among the more violent white collar crimes is employer negligence....." W.G. Carsen examined the records of factory inspectors. In a sample of 200 firms in one area of England every factory had between two and 94 violations of the law, a total of 3,800 offences in all. The majority were not trivial, 38% being lack of secure fencing around dangerous machinery. Of the firms investigated only 12 were threatened with prosecution. Ten came into court. All pleaded guilty, and the average fine was 50 pounds!

P. Kinnersley in *The Hazards of Work* calculated deaths from industrial accidents and diseases in the United Kingdom as approximately 3,000 a year. Victims of murder and manslaughter number around 600, the average sentence being between 10 and 20 years in jail. The author agrees there is "criminal intent" in industrial deaths, but employer negligence which results in death may well be thought "criminal". And the mild-

ness of enforcement procedures and sentencing reinforces the belief that a double standard is working within the judicial process. **POOR BACKGROUNDS**

Convicted criminals come overwhelmingly from poorer backgrounds in Western society. For instance, in the U.S.A., while non-whites constitute only 20% of

the population, they make up 50% of its prisoners. As the American Friends Service Committee points out, their country has more blacks in prison than in college. We in Canada have similarly unbalanced prison populations.

My point is not just the obvious double standard of "one law for the

rich and one for the poor". Our society is founded on the unequal right to accumulate wealth. Such a society "gives rise to the legal and illegal desire to accumulate property as rapidly as possible" according to the authors of *Critical Criminology*. Those who cheat by acquiring easy money offend against all of us. Unfortunately, the most significant cheating - the crimes of the affluent - are the least publicized, investigated and punished.

It will be interesting to see the ultimate result of the dredging fraud cases recently tried in eastern Canada.

DISORDER

The *New Internationalist* feature on crime says:

"The law does not provide social justice. It does not ensure a fair and just protection for the rewards of hard work and the due punishment of offenders. The judicial system, through loaded judgements of the severity of a crime, and through differing punishments, assures not order, but disorder and a grossly unfair society.

The point could be no better put than by Richard Nixon, who as president remarked: "The organized criminal relies on physical terror and psychological intimidation, on economic retaliation and political bribery, on citizens' indifference and government acquiescence. He corrupts our governing institutions and subverts our democratic processes."

The New York Supreme Court in 1976 formally ruled that Nixon was guilty of obstructing justice by impeding investigation of burglary, interfering with legal defence in a court case, concealing evidence of crimes committed by his staff and approving huge money payments to conspirators. He was never even sentenced."

The American Friends Service Committee said:

"Actions that clearly ought to be labelled criminal, because they bring the greatest harm to the greatest number, are in fact, accomplished officially by agencies of government. The overwhelming number of murders in this century have been committed by governments in wartime. Hundreds of unlawful killings by police go unprosecuted each year. The largest forceful acquisitions of property in the U.S. have been the thefts of land guaranteed by treaty to Indian tribes; thefts sponsored by the government... Civil rights demonstrators, struggling to exercise their constitutional rights, have been repeatedly beaten and harassed by police and sheriffs. And in the Vietnam War, America violated its own constitution and international law."

WHAT LAW, WHOSE ORDER?

So next time you hear political candidates or anyone else boasting that they stand for law and order, ask them, "What law and whose order?"

When people claim to respect authority, remember Dr. Stanley Milgram of Yale University and his shocking discovery that two-thirds of the people will inflict pain on the other third if told to do so by an authoritative figure.

In Canada, the top 20% of the population enjoys 42% of the annual income, while the bottom 20% has to make do with four percent.

And in the world at large, one-third of us live at the expense of the other two-thirds.

Perhaps we should stop talking about law and order, and concentrate on justice.

Inspector examines shale pit

inspector. Her original impression had been that Reynolds was going to start a shale pit and keep on mining.

Robinson said that after he spoke with the neighbour on the other side of the quarry and explained the situation, that neighbour too was "perfectly satisfied".

Following new complaints about the pit this year, Robinson said, he made another visit to the island May 11. He spoke with Harvey Reynolds, who told him that he had seen the Trust representatives that same day and they "were now quite happy with what is being done at the pit".

RECLAMATION

Reclamation has already been started at the pit, he continued.

"Two areas have been sloped, covered with topsoil and planted with daffodils, hyacinth, iris and other flowers. Topsoil has been piled and sloped at another area as required by the Inspector of Mines. Three apple trees have been planted at another area.

"Mr. Reynolds has operated this shale pit in accordance with the agreement made with him by the Ministry of Mines," concluded Robinson. "There is no reason to believe that he will not continue to do so."

However, two days before Robinson wrote the letter, the Islands Trust wrote to Harvey Reynolds advising him to continue his operation, but bring it to a halt "as soon as is reasonably practical, with a restoration of the site so that no appreciable erosion occurs that would affect the water quality of Cusheon Lake".

By Tuesday, the local trustees had not received a copy of the letter from the Inspector of Mines.

A press release from the Trust said the Capital Regional District is being advised of the proceedings being taken so that "they may evaluate the situation in relation to their building bylaw".
