Death of Col. Mosedale in Victoria hospital Monday

Notable Salt Spring Island military figure died on Monday.

Lieut.-Col. Walter J. Mosedale, Isabella Point Road, was a patient in Royal Jubilee Hospital in Victoria. He was 67 years of age.

Col. Mosedale and his wife, Mary had owned the seafront property on Salt Spring Island, which they used as a summer residence for many years. They built their permanent home here upon retirement.

His close association with the Canadian Scottish Regiment (Princess Mary's) dated back to 1935. He was Commanding Officer at one time and was recently appointed Honorary Lieut-Colonel of the Regiment.

Regiment will furnish pipers and assist at the memorial service which will be conducted by Rev. Bruce Molloy at McCall Brothers Funeral Chapel, Vancouver St., Victoria on Friday, June 22.

At the request of the family, there will be no flowers.

Col. Mosedale was a keen fish-

erman and nature enthusiast and loved the island dearly.

While a resident of Victoria he served for many years as a member of the board of directors of St.

Joseph's Hospital, now Victoria General Hospital. He was a former chairman of that board.

Besides his wife, Mary, he is survived by his son, Don, in Vancouver and daughter, Cicily Quin, Victoria.



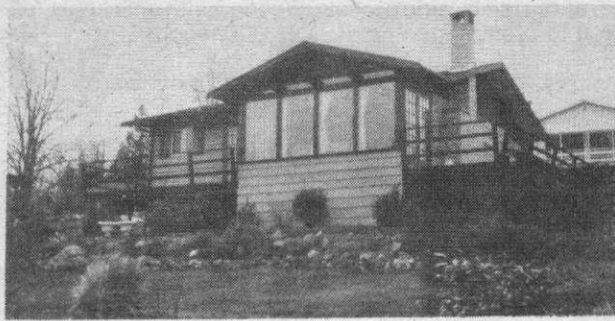

Salt Spring Island pioneers

Two families started big clan

Seaside lamb has always been a dish for the connoisseur.

The lamb bred and fed on the slopes down to the sea has always commanded a special price. The Parisian chef knew it well.

When Joseph Akerman and his bride came to Salt Spring Island in 1863 they didn't know that seaside lamb was a delicacy. To the early island settlers it was a necessity.

Martha Akerman was a newcomer, but her new husband, Joseph, was an old-timer in British Columbia. He had left his native English hearth in Wiltshire, eight years previously.

His departure is recorded in the family bible on a drying-out piece of paper in his own meticulous hand:

"I, the undersigned, left my home, the village of Chirton, Wiltshire, England, Europe, November 9th, 1855, left Canada west, March 1860. May 14th, 1863, married in Victoria, Vancouver Island, to Alisth Martha Clay: Joseph Akerman.

"Martha Clay was born at Hink-

ley, Leicestershire, England, arrived in Victoria Jan. 1st, 1863, in company with her two sisters, Fanny and Emma."

The 125-year-old record goes on with the legend, *"The generations of Akermans mentioned in this book..."*

FAMILY BIBLE

The book was the family bible, but the reference to the generations appears to have been the beginning of a sentence left unfinished in 1884.

The name of Akerman has been identified with Salt Spring Island for the intervening years.

If South Salt Spring Island had been a municipality of its own, Bob would have been the mayor. Bob Akerman is the authority on island history and customs. He is also the patriarch of the historied family.

Genial, gentle and eager to help anyone in need, Robert M. Akerman is Fulford Harbour. He is the island logger, the island farmer, the island property owner, the island historian, the island patriarch and a very proud Salt Spring Islander. As is Molly. Member of the Mouat family at Ganges, she

knit the island together by her marriage.

When the Provincial Museum sought two 70's children to formally open a *Yesterday's Child* exhibit in Victoria recently, two of Bob and Molly Akerman's grandchildren were selected. Lynda and Michael Allard, of Victoria, great-great-grandchildren of Joseph Akerman officiated.

They are the descendants of two Salt Spring Island pioneer families, not one.

ANOTHER PIONEER

When Joseph Akerman was looking at Wiltshire for the last time, an Irishman totally unknown to him was contemplating departure and a voyage to the New World. Ireland in the mid-19th century was a land of misery and conflict and famine. There was little to encourage 19-year-old Michael Gyves to stick around.

In that same year, 1855, he left his native sod and sailed for New York.

His first job in his adoptive land was with the army. He enlisted and served four years. In 1859 he was discharged as a Company Sergeant-Major. The army had taught him to march and he put that training to good use when he walked to Barkerville in 1860.

He went to Barkerville to join in the prospecting for gold. He carried

his mining tools on his back. Backpacking a century ago was just as gruelling as it is today. It was probably more so, because a man had to carry all his food on his back as well as his tools, clothes and anything else he might need on the trek.

When Michael Gyves set out he was carrying a 75 lb. pack. He carried it into the Cariboo.

At no point on the journey was it easy and his reminiscences included burying many a man on the trail who had succumbed to exhaustion.

NO RICH STRIKE

What sort of luck he had in the goldfields is not entirely clear, but he certainly didn't hit it rich.

Like many another British Columbian gold miner he ended up in the islands. Southern British Columbia looked very attractive to those early prospectors who were artisans and labourers and clerks from the cities of the world, who were smitten with gold fever.

The west was, of course, not new to the Irish soldier-pro prospector.

During his military service he had been stationed in Oregon, where he had been engaged in pressing his adoptive country's claims to what was originally British property on the coast.

The Pig War settled the fate of San Juan Island: and of the settlers there. It was during those blood-

less battles that the young Irishman had encountered the west.

Years after, he used to recall rowing up the coast in a small boat and finding Fulford Harbour. He fell in love with the island and even settled on the property he intended to acquire for his future home.

LUMBER BUSINESS

While the Akerman settlers were looking at farming and trade, the first of the Gyves family started up the lumber industry on south Salt Spring Island.

Michael Gyves cut cedars, sawed them and split them, loaded the shakes on his back and carried them to his boat. He then rowed across to Cordova Bay, north of Victoria and carried them into the areas where new homes were going up.

It was profitable and living off the land, but it demanded every small source of energy in a man's body.

While Gyves was hauling shakes, Akerman was looking for success nearer home.

The first Akerman home was raised in the bright summer sunshine and shivered all winter in the gloom of winter's shadow.

They moved away from the shade of Mount Bruce and further down the valley. They planted a house and garden and fruit trees. Big firs and cedars were everywhere, but they had little value to the settlers. The only problem with big trees was that of getting rid of them to leave room to raise a crop.

MORE PEOPLE

When the Akerman land had been cleared and was producing their food, Joseph Akerman was well aware of the increasing traffic to Salt Spring Island and decided to cater to it.

A log building on his property became the Travellers' Rest. It also became the first hostelry on Salt Spring Island and enjoyed a brisk business. His entry into the world of commerce was so successful that Joseph Akerman went further and constructed a general store next to the hotel.

The hotel still stands. Long converted to a private home, it is now the residence of the French family at Fulford.

Martha Akerman had arrived in Victoria aboard the brides' ship, when many women came out from Britain to meet and marry the bachelor settlers in the colony. Michael Gyves wasn't around at that time. While he built his log cabin on south Salt Spring Island more than a century ago the Akermans were raising sheep and crops and a family.

REFRESHMENTS

Michael Gyves was in the habit of offering refreshments to the many Indians who came to the island. During these times he was attracted by the 16-year-old daughter of a Cowichan chief.

Mrs. Gyves readily settled into the valley life. Besides looking after her own family she became the island midwife and brought many a pioneer islander into the world.

Today, more than a century since the Akerman and the Gyves families settled the south end of Salt Spring Island, the evidence is still there. Ancient buildings, ancient trees still stand to bear witness to the settlement of the island by newcomers.

And both names are part of the fabric of Salt Spring Island.

As are the sheep, still bred here by a fifth generation of both families and still in demand.

Site has been purchased by the Capital Regional District for a new intermediate care hospital or nursing home. Property consisting of 1.75 acres was purchased for \$37,500.

Driftwood, located for a number of years in the former Ganges Liquor Store, has now followed the liquor store to take up new premises on McPhillips Ave. It is now at the end of the Yellow Dirt Road behind the Government Liquor Store.

It was a bombshell when Tom Davidson reported to the Gulf Islands School Board last week that 30 families are rumoured to have purchased a 160-acre property on Saturna Island. If it should prove correct, Saturna School will be inadequate for the immediate needs of the island.

Yvette Valcourt has been named Victoria Diocesan President of the Catholic Women's League.

Annual dinner of the Galiano Chamber of Commerce heard Mrs. Clair McAllister on the need for low-cost housing in the islands. About 100 were present in Galiano Hall on Saturday evening. They were welcomed by president John Liver and Mrs. Liver.

Salvation Army campaign last Friday closed off with a total of \$778.23. Salt Spring Island Lions Club directed the drive in the islands and Lieut. Col. Desmond Crofton headed the campaign through all the islands.

"We're not going to," concluded acting chairman Charles Baltzer.

Nearly 70% of taxes go to schools as Gulf Islands notices are received

Tax notices are in the hands of most islanders. And the worst is known.

The rate for general taxation is pegged at 10 mills. This covers the services provided by the province, such as policing, highways and other administrative functions.

Tax rate for the Islands Trust is three-quarters of a mill. A credit levy for health services this year amounts to three-quarters of a mill, to cancel out the Islands Trust. Credit is allowed against the general levy of 10 mills which covers health services no longer provided by the government.

Fire protection services cost 3.704 mills. This maintains the fire equipment and pays salaries and expenses to protect the island.

Capital Regional District takes another 4.124 mills. The region

supplies building and health inspection services and now controls dogs. It also administers debt services and for Salt Spring Island is the administrator of sewage investigation services.

Salt Spring Island recreation is also financed from an additional rate of 0.227 mills. The main source of funds for providing the range of recreational services offered on the island through the parks and recreation commission is the Capital Regional District.

Hospital taxes takes another 3.248 mills.

Overriding levy is for schools. This takes 46.938 mills or 69% of the total levy.

One Salt Spring Island taxpayer reports that his total taxes represent slightly more than a month's pay.

On the credit side of the same ledger is the provision of the Home-Owner Grant. This is a basic allowance of \$380. In addition to the basic allowance, an old-age pensioner also enjoys an additional allowance of \$200.

Car driven by William B. Knutsen of Ganges sustained \$1,800 damage in a single-car accident at St. Mary Lake last week.

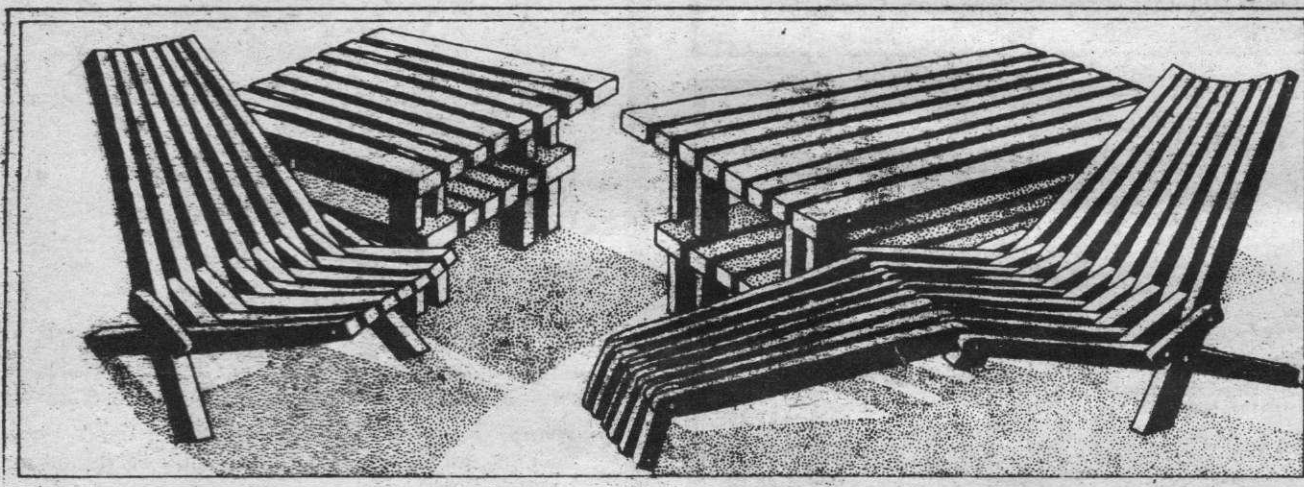
