# They were not bleating

Co-ordinators of the sheep section of the Salt Spring Island Fall Fair weren't just bleating this week when they passed along some advice for sheep exhibitors.

Joyce (ewe lamb) Hartwig and Eileen (yearling ewe) MacKay (the appellations are theirs) are asking people taking sheep to Saturday's event to take their own water buckets, grain and/or hay. A watering trough will be available from Friday evening and on.

All entries should be bathed and shorn and hooves should be cut if needed. The co-ordinators also ask that sheep being entered be dewormed beforehand and checks should be made for any infection or illness.

"There are many very fine flocks of sheep on Salt Spring Island," they said, "so let's everyone co-operate and keep them healthy."

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## Two cases are heard at Ganges

When a Salt Spring Island student pleaded guilty last week to driving without insurance, the provincial judge refused clemency.

Cress Lundstrom was fined the mandatory penalty of \$250.

Court was told that Lundstrom was waiting for the end of the month in order to buy his license. He had a temporary permit, which

prohibits use of the vehicle between 9 pm and 9 am.

How much did he save, asked Judge D.K. McAdam. Saving was \$11, explained the student.

The mandatory penalty is a lot more, observed the judge.

In his defence, Lundstrom explained that he was only going a short distance.

"What is a short distance?" interrupted the judge, "It is far enough to have an accident."

He had a good driving record and he was asking for a suspended sentence, said the college student.

He was prepared to make an allowance on the method of payment, said the judge, but not on the sentence.

Lundstrom said he would pay the fine in full.

"I have a fixed amount to go to school," he explained.

### SECOND CASE

Second driver appeared in Ganges provincial court on Thursday afternoon, facing the same

charge.

Phileas Valcourt told the court that he was driving to church on Sunday morning when he saw the light flashing in his rear-view mirror.

"I saw the RCMP lights and said to my wife, 'I wonder what he wants.'"

Does the regulation have some meaning, asked the judge.

That's the way they set it up, explained the Crown counsel, Rick Law.

"There are so many cases where people are accused of operating outside hours," said the judge, "and face the statutory penalty."

His truck had been out of commission, explained Valcourt, and he had used the car with a temporary license. He didn't intend to use the car again.

"That's your decision," replied McAdam.

He was given a 30-day suspended sentence.

## Oil port study at Capital Region office

Capital Regional Board Chairman Murray Glazier has received a copy of the final Environmental Statement of Crude Oil Transportation Systems to supply United States markets, and is willing to let people read it at the CRD office in Victoria.

The report, prepared by the U.S. department of the interior's Bureau of Land Management, consists of three large volumes, plus a map addendum.

Glazier presided over an information meeting on proposed oil tanker routes, which was held in the CRD board room on July 13, at which time oil company representatives of various groups discussed their proposals and their concerns about the shipment of crude oil through Juan de Fuca Strait.

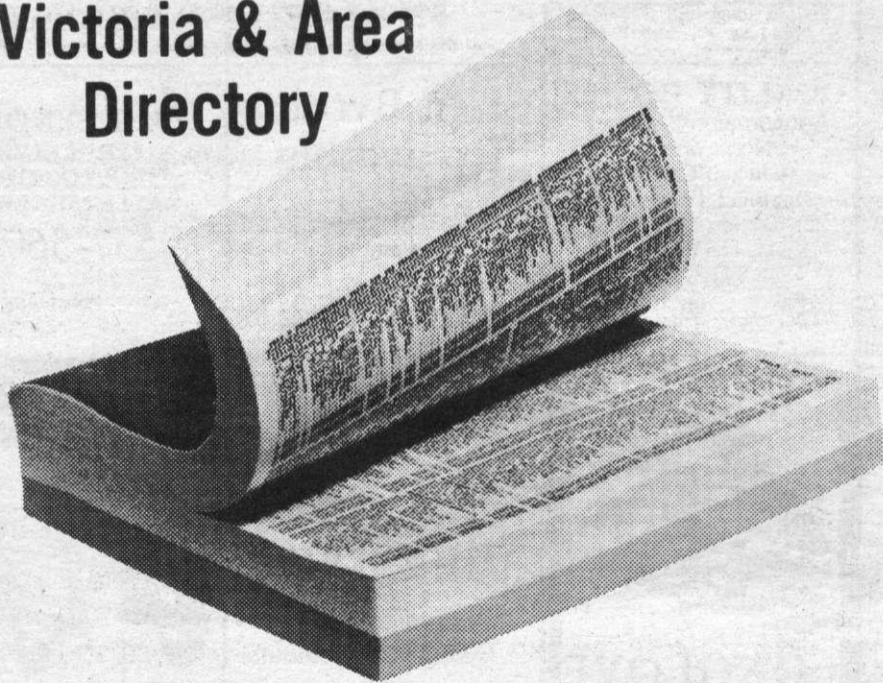

## ANYONE FOR TENNIS?

In the Gulf Islands Championships many of the matches have been rained out, but a beautiful day on Sunday put us back on schedule. If all goes well, we will be able to have the finals on Sunday the 16th for these championships.

For those of you who have not come out to watch, you have missed some terrific tennis. Make a point to come out Sunday - it will be an exciting day.

As you will recall in last week's column, a brief announcement was made concerning the Salt Spring Tennis Association Annual General Meeting. Just to elaborate a little, it should be a very interesting evening with nominations for a new executive, the constitution and presentation of trophies.

## Lottery summary is released

Between April 6 and July 15 of this year, 326 lottery fund grants were made in British Columbia. The quarterly summary of grants was released recently by Provincial Secretary Hugh Curtis. Total value of the grants was over \$6 million.

Three groups on the Gulf Islands were among the recipients. The Salt Spring Golf and Country Club received \$75,000 for its irrigation system; the Salt Spring Library Association, \$37,000 for expansion of its premises; and the Saturna Island Lions Club, \$20,000 for a sports complex.

The islands were also included in a list of grants to agricultural fairs and exhibitions in the province. The ministry of agriculture is providing \$91,569 for prize money and judging costs this year.

The Mayne Island Agricultural Society is receiving \$172; the Pender Islands Fall Fair Association, \$266; and the Salt Spring Island Fall Fair Association, \$223.

This will be followed by a potluck dinner and, later, music and dancing. This is an important gathering of association members, so please give it priority.

## Fernwood School news

Enrolment is up! We have 15 new students so we now stand at 130. All our students are very enthusiastic (not about coming to school but rather about Thanksgiving Day which is the first school holiday).

I would like to welcome back all students and teachers especially to all newcomers, including John MacPhail, our new librarian.

The gymnasium floor has been laid and the lines put down. Markings have been set for basketball, badminton and volleyball games. It is expected that the climbing frame will be erected soon.

Mr. Marsh has instituted a daily physical education program for grades 1-3 with Mr. Prendergast instructing. The program will be developed with special emphasis on gymnastics. Kindergarten students will also have the use of the gym on a daily basis.

We are trying to develop a program which is 30% gymnastics, 30% games activities and 30% fitness and 10% lifetime recreational skills (such as swimming and skating). The Canada Fitness Program will be in operation this year throughout the school.

Sports activities are under way and our girl's grass hockey team is practicing as enthusiastically (and rough!) as ever - so look out World! Boys are kicking soccer balls around and it looks as if our team will be small but fast this year.

How many people?

Trust discloses  
9,490 in all  
Trust islands

According to the 1976 census the population of all the designated islands within the Islands Trust totalled 9,490.

The largest of the 13 islands is Salt Spring, with 4,410 people. Smallest designated island, in terms of population, is South Pender, with 84 people. Close second is Gambier, with 85 persons.

Indicated population of the rest of the Gulf Islands group is as follows: Galiano, 525; Mayne, 495. Both these listings include the respective Indian reserves.

Saturna is 185; North Pender, 720. The two Penders total 804, with South Pender's 84. These figures indicate a total population of the Gulf group of 6,419, two-thirds of which numbers were found on Salt Spring.

The Islands Trust is mainly concerned with the use of islands land. Its jurisdiction is, generally, limited to land use and land-use controls. It maintains this responsibility for all islands in the Trust area.

Most other functions, including provision of building inspection services, are part of the appropriate regional function.

TWO TRUSTEES

Each designated island elects two local trustees to the Islands Trust. The local trustees, sitting as a trust, then elect their own three general trustees.

Local trustees are mainly concerned with matters affecting their own islands. General trustees are concerned with all matters affecting all islands as well.

Islands are grouped together for the purpose of electing regional directors. Salt Spring Island names its own director. The Outer Islands name one to represent them all.

Statistics of the Gulf Islands are listed by the Trust in a booklet released in April of this year.

Galiano covers an area of 14,300 acres, or 5,787 hectares. Population in 1966 was listed as 305, rising to 525 in 10 years.

Island has two provincial parks, Montague Harbour Marine Park of 214 acres and Bellhouse Park covering six acres. There are 945 acres in the Agricultural Land Reserve.

OWNERSHIP

Of the developed land on the island, 301 parcels, or 39% are vacant. Ownership is largely Canadian; 91% being British Columbian; three per cent is owned by Canadians outside the province; five per cent is owned by United States residents and half of one per cent by residents overseas. Mayne Island is 5,750 acres in area. Population rose from 278, in 1966 to 495 in 1976. There are no provincial parks on the island, although 84 acres is held by the Crown. Of a total of 1,387 parcels, 846 are vacant.

Mayne Island is 85% B.C. owned; 12% elsewhere in Canada; 1.5% American-held and 0.83% of parcels are owned overseas.

North Pender covers 6,742 acres and the 1976 population was 720. The population 10 years earlier is not listed. There are two provincial parks: Prior Centennial Park of 39

acres and Garden Bay Marine, embracing 402 acres.

North Pender is 75% B.C. owned. There are 21% of all parcels owned elsewhere in Canada. Americans hold 2%, with half of one per cent held overseas.

Biggest of the Trust islands is Salt Spring, with 45,849 acres.

Population doubled between 1966 and 1976, from 2,238 to 4,410.

Three provincial parks are listed: Beaver Point, or Ruckle Park, 40 acres. The figure is variously quoted from 40 to 1,200 acres, according to the progress reported by the province in formalizing the park acquired from the Ruckle family. Maxwell Park covers 492 acres.

There are 787 acres held in ecological reserve and 8,830 acres in ALR.

Tree farm certificates cover 11,136 acres, including the properties of MacMillan Bloedel and Weldwood.

Of 3,294 parcels on the island, 1,381 are shown as vacant.

British Columbians own 86% of parcels of land; 10% is held in Canada's eastern provinces; 3 1/4% is U.S. owned and 3/4 of one percent is owned overseas.

Saturna has 7,500 acres to look after. The 1976 population is shown as 185. One-third of the island is in the land reserve.

HIGH U.S.A. LIST

Saturna shows a higher-than-average figure for American ownership with 12.62%. Owned in B.C. are 76% of parcels; 11% elsewhere in Canada and 0.32% overseas.

Small in area and low in population, South Pender spreads its 84 people over 2,308 acres.

Beaumont Marine Park embraces 83 acres.

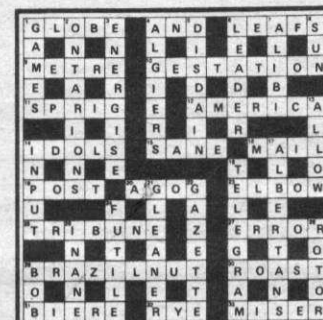

"You haven't had a license yet?" persisted Judge D.K. McAdam.

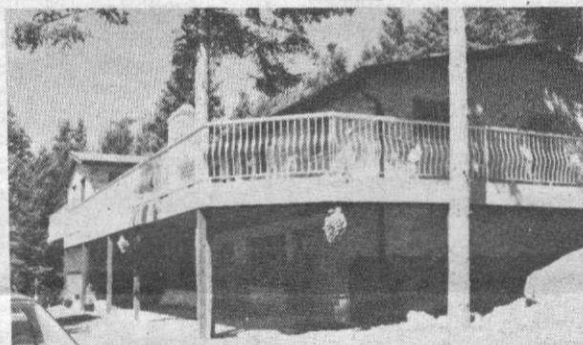
Only a learner's license. "You're making it more difficult to get one, aren't you?" said the judge.

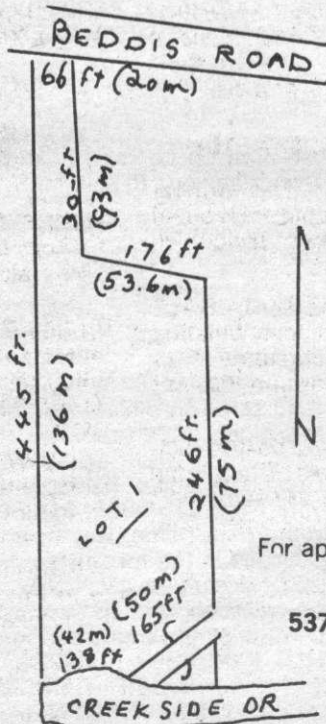

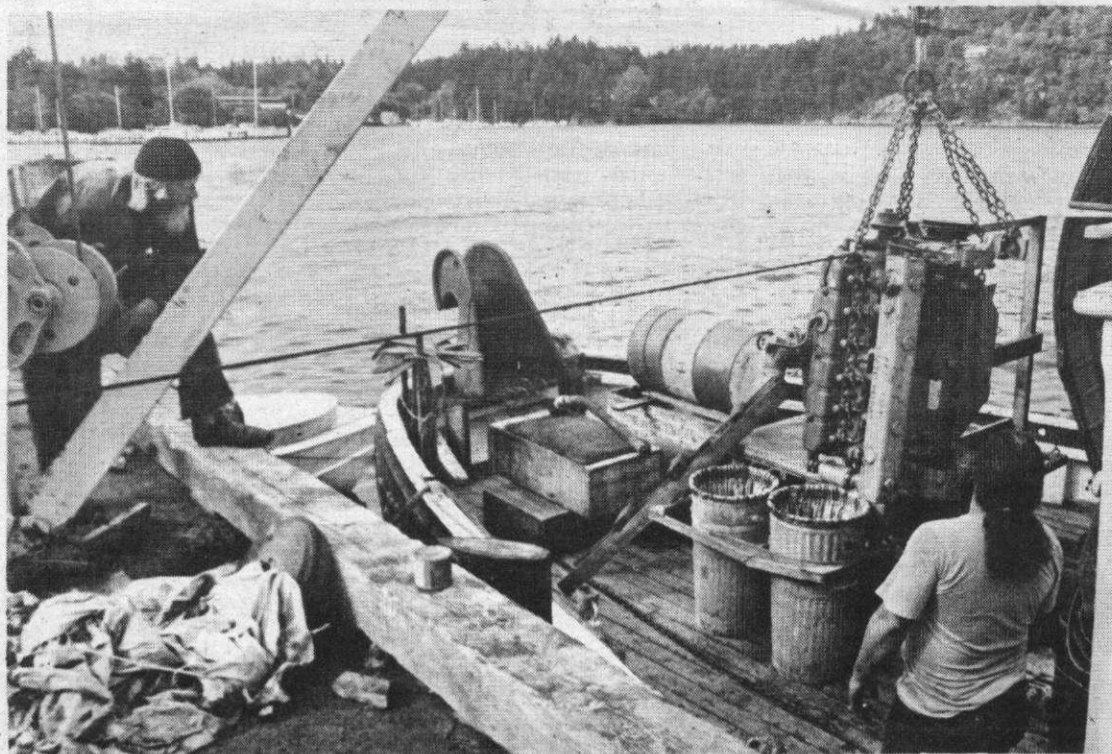

Should a doctor charge for wending his or her way through the receiving line at a friend's wedding? This thought crossed my mind the other night as I was performing the usual pleasant stroll to congratulate the bride and groom and meet the relatives.

A hasty computation immediately afterwards left me with the impression that I had dispensed about \$60 worth of medical advice in those few minutes. Our medical plan doesn't cover situations like this!

The bride's mother had sore feet, not surprising considering how busy she had been. A suggestion was made on how to soak them. The groom's father was healthy, and in any case was not a patient of mine.

The father of the bride wanted advice about increasing the number of pool lengths he was swimming each morning while his charming daughter was concerned that she might be allergic to her bouquet. I told her that she should throw it away, which she dutifully did a few minutes later.

The groom had recently broken his collar-bone and it was all I could do to restrain him from removing his shirt to show me how it was coming along. His brother was coming along. His brother, next in line, was either healthy or did not know that I was a doctor. He had no questions.

**RESTRAINED MYSELF**

The bride's brothers each had a problem. One had a sore knee from a football game and the other had a cough. I restrained myself from unleashing my stethoscope so I could examine him. Finally, the lower girls: fortunately, both lively and healthy.

Doctors (among others) are constantly being approached at social gatherings and other occasions by people wanting advice. # Resident dissatisfied with library service

Mrs. L. Goddu of Salt Spring Island expressed her dissatisfaction with the library service on Salt Spring Island in a letter to Gulf Islands School District last week.

Explaining that she has lived on Salt Spring Island for six years, Mrs. Goddu told trustees that she had previously lived in a city where the library facilities were excellent.

She was writing in support of a regional library service, she explained. She had been advised to write and express her views to the board.

They miss the facilities they enjoyed in the large city.

Her husband has never joined the library. She was critical of the limit of three books and explained that she found this limit "strange".

Mrs. Goddu was particularly critical of the juvenile section. Her son had joined the library in Ganges and had sought to borrow a tome on engineering. He had been advised that only adults were permitted to borrow such books.

The critic went on to explain that she had been interested in a subject not listed in the index. In a large library she would have been able to find a book on the subject within days. In Ganges she was told that it might be quicker if she were to seek the book herself.

She found and purchased the book, but has discovered that she is constantly buying books to fill in for the shortcomings of the local

library. It is a strain on the budget, she noted.

She concluded with the comment that she appreciates the friendly service at Ganges but she would welcome a more professional approach.

"Is she aware of the Open Shelf service?" asked Ivan Mouat. Letter was filed.

# New home for class at Ganges

Building to the rear of the Community Centre on Ganges Hill is to be used for the rehabilitation class in Ganges.

Class under the direction of Mel Coates is for the benefit of students who have either dropped out or for other reasons have failed to complete their high school course.

Class has been conducted in a private residence in Ganges, rented for the purpose.

Only question is the distance from the high school, commented superintendent Bob Huestis. Would transportation be required?

If the students were to jog to the high school for gymnasium courses, they would have no use for the gym, suggested John Zacharias.

# Skidders damaged at Welbury Bay



Skidder at Welbury Bay is one of four that were damaged over the weekend. Pedals were bent, gauges were smashed and glass was broken by vandals. RCMP at Ganges report that damage amounted to several hundred dollars. The equipment was the property of several logging operators.

Incident is still under investigation.

It has been estimated by the Canadian Forestry Service that there is more than 40 million cubic feet of logging residue, or slash, available annually on Vancouver Island. The service says that if it were converted to hog fuel and burned efficiently, it could produce about 1.7 billion kilowatt hours of electricity. That's about the same as B.C. Hydro's total output in some months.

# School board asks for report on lighting of health officer

Gulf Islands School District is to invite the medical officer of health to investigate the use of fluorescent lights in schools.

On Thursday afternoon last week the trustees heard a report from secretary Wilf Peck that two parents had protested the use of such lights on the grounds that they are injurious to sight.

They had been warned that it was too late to take any action before school opened, but that reports and pamphlets would be passed on to the appropriate authority.

He had perused the information, Peck told the board, but he was not competent to assess them.

Board agreed to forward the information to Dr. A.S. Arneil for his examination. It is not a matter affecting only the Gulf Islands. About 90% of all classrooms in the province are lighted by fluorescent fixtures, it was noted.

There are two kinds of fluorescent tubes, reported trustee John Zacharias, hard and soft. Experi-

ments had suggested that the hard type brings out neuroses in a child to a greater degree.

The secretary also reported that research has come up with the conclusion that fluorescent lights increase tooth decay and reduce the sex drive of pigs.

# Sea Capers meeting Wednesday

Preliminary plans will be laid next week for the 1980 Salt Spring Island Sea Capers, scheduled to take place June 7 and 8.

The Sea Capers committee will meet at the school board office next Wednesday at 8 pm to elect a new organizing committee for next year's festival.

A new commodore, two vice-commodores, treasurer, secretary and a committee will be elected at the meeting.

The islands of the Trust, up and down the coast and including the Gulf Islands, are 160,881 acres in area and house 9,490 people. There are 26,015 acres of Crown land and 2,587 acres of ecological reserves. Provincial parks are spread over 2,768 acres. There are 26,975 acres of agricultural land reserve and 23,774 of tree farm certificates.

Of the total 14,344 parcels through the islands, 7,747, or 54%, are vacant.

Here are the statistics of ownership in the islands up the coast:

- Owned in B.C.: 83.3%
- Owned in Canada: 9.4%
- Owned in U.S.A.: 1.5%
- Owned overseas: 0.4%
