## Dangerous saunas

Owners of some sauna heaters are being urged to stop using them because of a potential fire hazard, according to the Canadian Standards Association (CSA).

CSA has investigated two recent reports of fires in Mississauga, Ontario, apartment buildings. About 1,100 of these heaters were manufactured by Sauna World Limited from 1972 to 1976. None of these saunas have been certified by CSA although they bear the CSA mark.

They were designed to be placed on non-combustible surfaces such as solid concrete floors, but in the fire incidents, wood underneath ceramic tiles was ignited.

The sauna heaters can be identified by the marking "Electro" and "Chromalox Sauna Heater".

# He's 90 years of age

## Catholic parish pays tribute to Leo

On Sunday the congregation of the Catholic Church at Ganges staged a dinner for the former church treasurer.

It was Leo McNeil's 90th birthday and the parishioners came out in force to congratulate him.

The birthday party included a large birthday cake and the warm wishes of his many friends.

The diminutive treasurer from Vesuvius Bay had ample time to look back over 90 years. Short and using a stick since he broke a leg last year, McNeil has an impish sense of humour to match his stature.

He gains as much amusement out of having injured his leg as he might out of seeing someone do it in a television comedy.

Born in Grace Bay, Nova Scotia, the young Leo McNeil wandered about Canada, working in communities from the coast west to

Winnipeg until 1919, after the First World War. In that year he went to various cities, ending up in Detroit. For the next 38 years he lived south of the line.

**ENGINEER**

For about eight years he was a stationary engineer. He switched to toolmaking and inspection and spent the rest of his working days at that trade.

It was in Detroit that he started to run as a hobby.

He found that running was part of the community sports there and he joined in with enthusiasm. It paid off.

Leo McNeil has run in about 100 different events and he has kept about 50 trophies and medals.

Most recent of all his medals was not for running, however.

Last year he was awarded the Papal Medal for his long service to the Roman Catholic church on the island. It was a tribute to the work he put in as parish treasurer.

**HIS LAST RACE**

When he was 49 he quit running. He came in fourth in his last race and he never tried again. That was 41 years ago.

Nearest he came to athletics in recent years was breaking his leg last year. He explains very frankly that he got mad taking off his pants. The leg wouldn't leggo and he kicked, lost his balance, fell and broke his leg.

There's a moral, says Leo.

"Never get mad at a pair of

pants. They might turn on you!"

What does a man do when he's 90?

Only McNeil knows.

He figures things out.

Right now he's still figuring daylight saving time. Each spring the clocks are moved forward an hour. Each fall their tale is delayed that same hour.

All wrong, says McNeil.

Set them back two hours in the fall, he urges.

That extra hour would enable people to lie abed an hour later,

relieving the strain on power by permitting the house to warm up in the sun and eliminating the need for lights.

**NONE REPLIED**

He wrote his proposal to various elected authorities last year, but not one has replied. But he still thinks it's a good idea and a workable idea.

When you're 90, you don't want to wait too many years for a reply. You may be in more of a hurry.

And if Leo McNeil is any guide, you can still be bright and happy to mark your 90th birthday.

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## What's happening at Salt Spring Elementary School?

One of the most misunderstood, if not mysterious terms encountered by the parents of school-age children is that known as "Professional Days". To some this term represents a day of challenge: the children are home, disrupting the weekday schedule, what are those guys doing anyhow?

Some see it as a teacher holiday (it's always on a Friday isn't it?); some envision it as a day of staff meetings (don't they "meet" enough as it is?); and some are totally at a loss as to the significance of the event.

Rest assured, the day is put to extremely good use. Professional days are those times when teachers become the student and learn (and observe) where normally they pontificate.

**MANY ACTIVITIES**

What do they learn? Oh, astronomical activities, classroom management, personal and creative writing activities, how to be an administrator (principals take note) and development reading programs, to name a few.

In essence, it is a real cross-section of the needs and interests of individual teachers.

Otherwise, a reminder to all parents of primary children, the gross motor (or primary co-ordination) program has begun. Essentially this is a series of activities developed in a structured manner that encourages muscular development, eye-hand co-ordination and hopefully develops better self-image.

On Tuesday she returned home to Mayne Island to recuperate. Taking part in the search and rescue operation were Al Brau, Ken Smith, Colin McKenzie, Ian Cocker, Fred Bennett, Jr. and Bob Poole.

**Norma Lisa Allen, 38**, died in her Ganges home when her bed caught fire on Sunday. Fire Chief Kelly Hanke attributed the death to smoking in bed. Alarm was sounded on Sunday morning when a neighbour heard the window blow out in the adjoining duplex suite. Firemen found Miss Allen still living, but extensively burned. She died shortly afterwards.

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# Diverse book hard to sum up

BY JOHN HALL

**Creating Alternative Futures** by Hazel Henderson (Berkley Windhover, 1978. \$4.95)

*Creating Alternative Futures* by Hazel Henderson is a collection of her writings and addresses over the last decade, dealing with the current dilemmas of business and society. She has been active in promoting the public responsibility of corporate business and government, and has been much praised for her wide-ranging and well-researched arguments.

Part One, *The End of Economics* contains 12 essays on the problems of our age, and Part Two, *Creating Alternative Futures*, suggests many ways to redress the wrongs both personally and as a society.

I cannot sum up such a diverse and important book, so let it speak for itself.

Traditional economic models are useless: "as the industrial system grows more complex it becomes increasingly difficult to model the labyrinth of variables in such a web of social and physical systems. Any system that cannot be modelled cannot be managed."

On inflation: "Complex technologies, not small businesses, usually receive subsidies. This tends to favour capital-intensive, large corporations. For example, investment tax credits help substitute capital for labour, thereby increasing structural unemployment and structural inflation."

## BOOK REVIEW

### ENCOURAGING MOVE

After a productive visit to Japan she writes: "Most encouraging of all is the move among Japanese economists to reassess economic theory in light of our new understanding of environmental constraints. By contrast, American economists have felt too inhibited to step outside the politically safe bounds of market economics for fear of being branded as radicals."

To correct these problems she advocates new approaches for coping with rapid change and with the use of information and social mediation. Technology too must be reassessed in the light of moral and philosophical principles. We need new "software" technologies in-

cluding "institutional redesign, more open political processes, conflict resolution mechanisms, world-order modelling, daring scientific speculation and new hypotheses."

"So as I have talked of breakdown and the exhaustion of industrial cultures' metaphysics of 'progress', reductionism, compulsive quantification and its profane, manipulative view of nature, I have tried also to celebrate what is being born: the overlooked shoots of a more benign technology, less materialistic goals, more holistic, reintegrated vision, a gentler metaphysics, a humbler, more realistic view of ourselves. Our present task is to tune in to operating principles, which are peacefulness, humility, honesty, co-operation and love. Only then will we be a species fit to be loosed into the universe."

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### Buildings to make way for new stores

### Stiffer fines, better compensation wanted

The Salt Spring Island Farmers' Institute wants to see tighter controls imposed in order to combat the continuing problem of dogs killing sheep.

Institute president Allan Gear said Tuesday that he wants to see stiffer fines for dogs running loose and a better form of compensation to farmers for lost sheep.

"There should be a \$200 minimum fine for a dog at large," he said, "and there shouldn't be a second chance."

He described the compensation plan as "stupid" and explained that the farmer gets an amount equal to 74% of the gate value of sheep. The gate value, which is set monthly by the ministry of agriculture is an average of prices paid at livestock auctions in the province, said Gear.

"All the animals sold at the auctions are old deadbeats."

He also said the institute is anxious to see the law permitting a farmer to kill a dog for chasing sheep brought back into effect.

#### LAW WAS CHANGED

Gear explained that when the Capital Regional District took over

dog control from the ministry of agriculture, the bylaw which was written for it failed to include a section which would permit dogs to be shot. Only a police officer or animal control officer is now permitted to do so.

Gear blamed the exclusion on a "bunch of bureaucrats who wouldn't listen". He said a number of people had attempted to convince the CRD that farmers should be permitted to shoot dogs for bothering sheep.

But since the bylaw was passed, an amendment has been written which would see a return to the previous law. However, such a change can only be made through an order-in-council and that is not expected to be given until February of next year.

Gear said farmers were doing all they could to speed up the process and have the law changed before then.

#### GIRL KILLED

He gave *Driftwood* a copy of a story which appeared in the *Victoria Colonist* September 25, about a six-year-old girl who was believed to have been killed by a pack of dogs. The incident took place near Phoenix, Arizona, when the girl was waiting at a bus stop.

She was found by a neighbour who heard her screams. The neighbour got the girl away from the dogs and called police. She had been mauled on the throat and legs and officials thought at first that she had been the victim of a traffic accident.

There was no reason why it couldn't happen here, said Gear.

Two candidates so far identified for election to Gulf Islands School Board in November are Chairman Tom Davidson from Saturna and Mary Williamson of Ganges.

There will be five vacancies to be filled, three on Salt Spring Island and one each from Saturna and Mayne Islands.

Two trustees have announced their departure from the administrative scene. They are Spencer Marr, Ganges accountant, and Norma McCallum, who has left the island.

On Tuesday neither Jeannine Dodds of Mayne Island, nor David Stacey of Salt Spring, was available for comment.

There will also be two vacancies on the Capital Regional Board. Terms of Mike Clement of Salt Spring Island and Jim Campbell of Saturna both reach an end in December.

Mike Clement has served one year, completing the unfinished term of the late Jim Bryce. He will seek a further term.

Jim Campbell has served 10

years, including many years as chairman of the Capital Regional Board. He has not yet decided whether to run again, he told *Driftwood* this week, because of the demands of his Saturna farm.
