# Wages for housework is goal of international organization

*Wages For Housework* was the subject of a poorly-attended lecture on Saturday at the Family Centre in Ganges. Speaker Ellen Woodsworth, however, said the turn-out was indicative of the powerless situation women are in

when they have neither the time nor the strength to attend a meeting dealing with an issue vital to every housewife.

"Our capitalist society is based on the free labour of women. It amounts to slavery."

Ellen Woodsworth is a member of the International Wages for Housework (IWH) campaign with affiliated groups in seven North American cities and London, England. She is currently establishing such a group in Vancouver.

Their goal is simple: wages for the work women do in the home.

Referring to a report by the Federal Advisory Council on the Status of Women, Woodsworth said that work done by the Canadian housewife is worth at least \$26 billion a year to the economy,

the people," Woodsworth said. "We have instead a government that is making cutbacks in all the areas relating to women at the low-income level. The social services area has seen major cutbacks and this is an area especially serviced by women."

"Yet, once wages for housework are established the whole social structure will change. The work will be done by both men and women. There will be an option for the members of the household to decide who will do the work at home. There will be status for working mothers. The government will start providing day-care centres because it will be cheaper to have women working outside the home."

**GOLF CLUB**

Someone in the group mentioned the \$75,000 grant recently given to the Salt Spring Golf Club by the provincial government to put in an irrigation system.

Woodsworth laughed. "The least they could do is put in a daycare centre at the Golf Club so the men can take the children along."

Sharon Popovich, who scheduled Woodsworth for this lecture, said that women are creating a volunteer syndrome for themselves, when out of their dependence on men they seek worthwhile outlets to establish their own validity.

"They volunteer for anything just to feel worthwhile in their own eyes and society's."

I told the speaker I was fortunate in that my husband and I shared our wages equally, despite the fact that I only worked part-time.

"You work full-time at home and part-time at a second job while your husband works only full time. Therefore, you should be earning more than him!" she replied.

Woodsworth recalled a Mother's Day protest in England a few years ago when hundreds of women marched on the Parliament Buildings with signs saying things such as, "Every Mother is a Working Mother" and "Today is Mother's Day - When is Pay Day?"

From a Women's Rights Conference held in Montreal in 1974 and attended by 800 people, the organization has grown to the extent that in 1977, 20,000 women attended the National Women's Conference held in Houston, Texas, where the Wages for Housework Campaign announced itself as a national and international force.

In 1977, the U.S.A. released figures compiled by the Prudential Life Insurance Company, which estimated the value of woman's work in the home at \$283.49 a week. In Britain, the Liberty Life Assurance Company estimated the value of women's work in the home at \$230 a week. And in Italy in 1977, a parliamentary recommendation was made to pay Italy's 12 million full-time housewives a salary of \$60 a month, with a provision that the salary be automatically increased with the cost of living.

It would seem that victory for the movement, in the form of wages to women everywhere, may be in store for the future.

or \$6,000 for every household in the country.

"That means that five million Canadian women are producing services equal to 27% of the gross national product," she explained.

Statistics Canada has released a study which estimated that every woman over the age of 16 in Canada performs approximately \$120 worth of housework per week.

A bulletin published jointly by the Power of Women Collective and the Falling Wall Press, both based in England, says the difference money would make to our lives as housewives would be the same as any other job.

**CAN BARGAIN**

"The wage recognizes that you are a worker, that you can bargain and struggle against the terms and the quantity of those wages", says *Wages Against Housework*.

Without that wage the situation is different.

"Not only has housework been imposed on women but it has been transformed into a natural attribute of our female physique and personality, an internal need, an aspiration, supposedly coming from the depth of our female character. In essence - a labour of love, and as such we are seen as nagging bitches, not workers in struggle."

"Even after 20 years of day-to-day training to prepare a woman for the role of housewife, few are the women who do not feel cheated when the bride's day is over and they find themselves in front of a dirty sink. .... This fraud that goes under the name of love and marriage affects all of us .... It has created a true masterpiece at the expense of women."

"By denying housework a wage and transforming it into an act of love, it has got a hell of a lot of work almost for free, and it has made sure that women, far from struggling against it, would seek that work as the best thing in life. At the same time, it has disciplined the male worker also, by making his woman dependent on his work and his wage. In fact, our role as women is to be the unwaged but happy, and most of all loving servants of the working class."

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So where will the money come from to pay every mother a wage? The IWH suggests that the government tax big businesses and corporations instead of giving grants to those corporations "which are grossing billions of dollars in profits annually".

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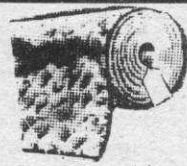
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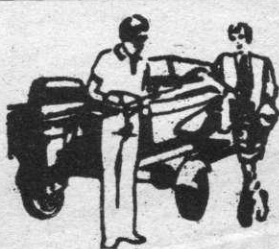
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Con and Clare Farrell new Salt Spring residents

He spent his working life flying

Last Friday, Clare and Conway (Con) Farrell left Galiano to take up residence on Salt Spring. For 16 years they have lived on Galiano in a house perched high on the side of Mt. Sutil.

It is fitting at this time to pay tribute to Con, a modest man who gave all his working life to flying.

In April 1917 Con enrolled in the newly created Royal Flying Corps which soon became known, according to Con, as the Royal April Fools. By the following December, with nine hours and 50 minutes flying time to his credit, he was flying over France, exposed from the shoulders up in the open cockpit of a small fighter aircraft, the Sopwith Experimental 5. Three times he was shot down, once landing upside down in water and another time in No Man's Land where, in a shell-hole in the company of two dead Germans, he

was strafed until he was rescued.

After the war, Con signed on permanently in the R.A.F. but, frustrated with peace-time inactivity, he bought himself out. He returned to Canada and studied medicine for four years in Winnipeg. However, flying was still in his blood.

BUSH PILOT

A family friend, Lee Brintnell, formed a small air company, Western Canada Airways, later to develop into C.P.A. Con was offered a job and became a bush pilot, first flying into the almost uncharted country east and north of Winnipeg. At the beginning the company only had six or seven planes, Universal Fokkers. Navigation, with only a few poorly done maps, was hit or miss.

To quote Con, "You wet your finger and put it up."

Once Con and his mechanic were lost for 11 days and for five of those

days he slept, as he was very tired. They had on board enough canned food to provide one meal a day until they were rescued. Con always checked that extra food and a spare set of clothing was on board before each flight. Often there was the danger of water or slush on top of the ice and the possibility of a sousing.

HAND-SEWN PARKAS

All Con's parkas were handsewn with babiche, sinews from the back of a caribou. He wore them Eskimo fashion, fur inside, north of Ft. Norman, but duffel-side in, like the Indians, further south. He soon learned that a hole dug in the snow was warmer than a tent. He was never severely frostbitten.

Con enjoyed meeting the people of the north; the Eskimos in their igloos lit by seal-oil lamps, drinking boiled tea, treacly with sugar. Eskimo women would offer to chew his mukluks to make them more

supple while the men would help gas up his plane without being asked. He remembers their mechanical genius and their strength, how a "415 lb. barrel of gas would be lifted with two fingers".

For 13 years Con flew the bush circuit, and then the Prairie Air-mail for 14 months. On the night mail run from Edmonton to Winnipeg he was paid six cents a mile.

ON WEST COAST

In August 1939 Con, still on the reserve, was called up and became a flying-boat pilot on the west coast. After taking a navigation course he now felt flying was like reading a book. He flew out of Ucluelet and Bella Coola looking for enemy submarines.

Two years later, because of his knowledge of the north, Con became the first commanding officer of the North West Staging Route, organizing a series of R.C.A.F.

Campaign starts November 1

The 1979 British Columbia Christmas Seal Campaign, with a target of \$715,000, will start on November 1 with the mailing of 190,000 appeal letters to homes throughout the province. By the end of the month, more than 1,200,000 homes and businesses in British Columbia will have received their Christmas Seals in the mail.

Every year since 1903, Canadians have used Christmas Seals on their Christmas cards and parcels as a symbol of their support for research and public education in the field of respiratory disease. Between 1903 and the early 1950's, funds raised by the annual Christmas Seal Campaign were used almost entirely for medical research, treatment and prevention of tuberculosis, but in recent years, the whole field of respiratory medicine has come under the Christmas Seal umbrella.

airports parallel with the Alaska Highway up to Fairbanks, so supplies could be flown in for two squadrons in the Aleutians and for building the highway.

Russian aircraft, sometimes piloted by women, would stop on their way to Vladivostok. Often they would land without permission, sometimes causing accidents.

Con finally came south ending his career in charge of seven squadrons and 1,200 troops at Sea Island, which afterwards became Vancouver International Airport. This was his last assignment and he retired with the rank of group captain in 1945.

Tsartlip elders visit class

David Elliott and Gabe Bartleman were on Salt Spring Monday evening, October 22, to share with the Native Peoples Awareness Class some of their history and concerns. Both are elders from the Tsartlip Indian Reserve in Saanich. Following is a summary of their observations.

"When the white man got acquainted with us they found that we were living a bountiful life, rich beyond measure. We believed that all things had the same right to live that we did so we never killed except for need. We seldom cut a tree down and if we did we spoke to the tree by its sacred name telling it that we were so sorry that we had to cut it but our need was great.

"Our people were so good, so kind, so honest, so just, so fair, because they walked hand in hand with the creator.

"In our homes there was no TV, radio or papers to come between parents and children. The problems young people face today are the uncoupling with their parents and families. Lying, thieving and suicides happen because a child cannot reach its parents. The parents need to spend more time with their children and give them useful work to do.

"We became uncoupled with our children when the children were taken away to schools. I was lucky never to see the inside of a school and to be able to hear the teachings of the old people telling about our way of life.

"We are trying to get this way of life back, by teaching the children our old way of life and language."

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# A cold grey cloud is hanging overhead

There is a cold, grey cloud spreading over Britain today, more ominous than the thunderclouds of war. It is the threat of an end to freedom and independence for the individual Briton. Government by the mob is walking hand-in-hand with the extremist elements of socialism and its threat is to be found everywhere.

For the past two decades militant labour has strangled the economy. No matter where you look you find the same unhappy answer. Industry after industry has collapsed into a state of suspended animation, supported by donations from the taxpayers.

The old and the sick look forward to misery in the winter, waiting for the next arrogant showing of power by organized labour. Will they lose their heating fuel? Or their food? Or their pensions? The winter display of might by the unions is part of living in England today. Distribution may be brought to a standstill by a strike of truckers. Or it may simply be a brown-out when the hydro workers show their claws.

The three estates of Britain's Houses of Parliament were augmented to four when Burke recognized the press gallery as the Fourth Estate, more important, by far, than them all, he cautioned.

### THE FIFTH ESTATE

Today, there is the Fifth. No matter what the Commons might rule; irrespective of the wishes of the Lords Spiritual or temporal, often with the connivance of the Fourth Estate, organized labour

now rules the land, the Fifth Estate at the helm and steering for the rocks.

When Prime Minister Edward Heath tangled with the Fifth Estate, his government fell. The new regime was not prepared to subscribe to any laws but its own.

Today there is a new government in the land. Margaret Thatcher has the privilege of serving as the first woman to lead the ruling party. She also has the distinction of forming the first Conservative government to take office since the fall of the Heath government. She has yet to meet this new power in a show of strength.

Much of this is old hat. The Fifth Estate has ruled for some years, with the connivance of the unseated Labour government. Bear in mind that the Fifth Estate had its own fifth column in the halls of Parliament.

Even while the nation looks to the winter's brawl with labour and the strike after strike which will bring the country to a standstill, there is a further element of disaster looming ahead.

### ANALYSIS

The unseated Labour Party is seeking to analyze the reasons for its fall in the last election. A commission of enquiry has been set up within the party. And the enquiry is very clearly representative of the extremist faction in the party.

The cloud which hangs over the

nation is not simply the threat of strife and strike looming in the winter. It is the fearsome possibility that the extremist elements of the Labour Party might assume the reins of power within that party and then win the government in a subsequent election.

This fear is not the natural reluctance of the very wealthy to relinquish his possessions under an extremist regime. It is the distaste

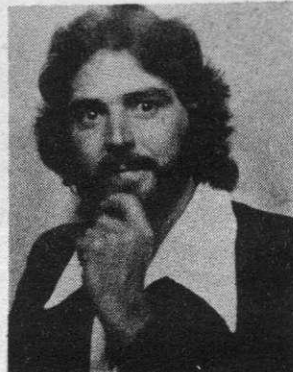
But in reality they should not feel bad as they played a strong game and many bright spots were apparent.

**Safety project initiated**

A province-wide safety project for school children is being initiated by Transportation, Communications and Highways Minister Alex Fraser.

Fraser has written to 75 school districts in British Columbia recommending the use of a special booklet called *A Teacher's Guide for the Safest Route to School Project*. Copies of both the booklet and letter are also being sent to the ministry of education and the B.C. Safety Council.

The "safest route" booklet was prepared originally by the traffic and engineering safety department of the American Automobile Association and is endorsed by the B.C. Automobile Association.

"It deals with a simple technique whereby children can be shown which roads and streets to use to come to school, and how they can concentrate at the best points for crossing busy highways," the minister says in his letter to the school boards.

The booklet includes sample street maps, child participation forms, film information and parental guidance material, using both printed copy and drawings.

Parents are encouraged to help select the "safest route to school" and agree to its regular use.

In his letter to the boards the minister said that another important aspect of the "safest route" technique is that "it can be the basis of planning approved footpaths and school crosswalk protection."

Christmas Ship will sail into the islands 10 days ahead of Christmas Day.

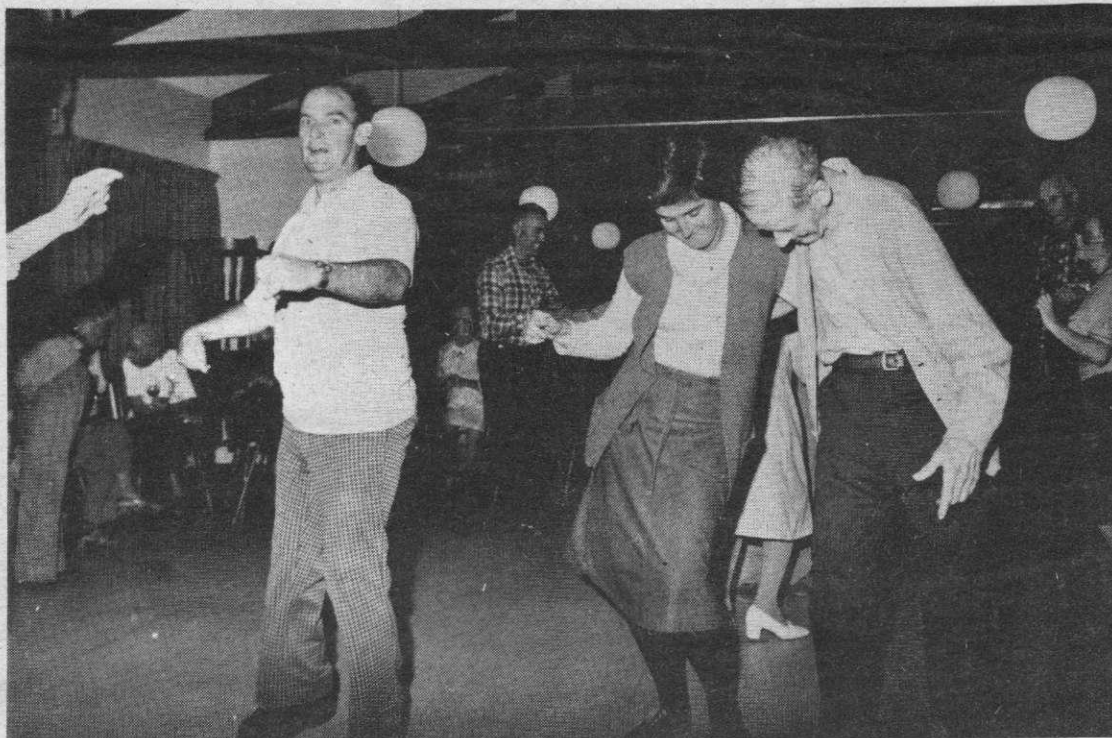
The annual voyage of Santa Claus, out of Bellingham, Washington, and through the Gulf Islands will take place on December 15 and 16.

## Corporation explains plans to meeting at Mayne

# Islands Trust will make final decision on ferry dock

"The only way to meet the increasing demand for ferry service in the Gulf Islands is to build a second berth at Village Bay," B.C.

He said the demand on the *Mayne Queen* went up 10% in July, 15% in August and 25% in September.

large ferry stopping at Mayne would be like building a highway over to the island from Vancouver. However, the majority of those at the meeting applauded a young woman who said she thought the residents weren't concerned with the people who came to the island, bought land and settled down.

The position of the ferry company in expanding its service, Ramsay said, was to "cope with existing growth without fostering more". He said the company is trying to serve a demand that is already there.

When asked why a major vessel couldn't dock at the existing facility, Ramsay replied that the length of the ship was the major factor: the *Queen of Alberni* being 84 feet longer than the *Queen of Sidney*.

Ramsay said it is far too difficult and dangerous to bring a large ship in.

"Just ask a master", he added. Captains who have brought their ships into Otter Bay when requested by management have told the company not to make a habit of it, Ramsay added.

#### DIFFERENT SCHEDULES

"An additional berth at Village Bay would give us flexibility in scheduling which we don't have at the present time," Bouchard said. With that "one extra factor in the equation", he added, "we could develop all sorts of different schedules."

"Could it develop into something more than just a peak load, non-scheduled service?" one resident asked.

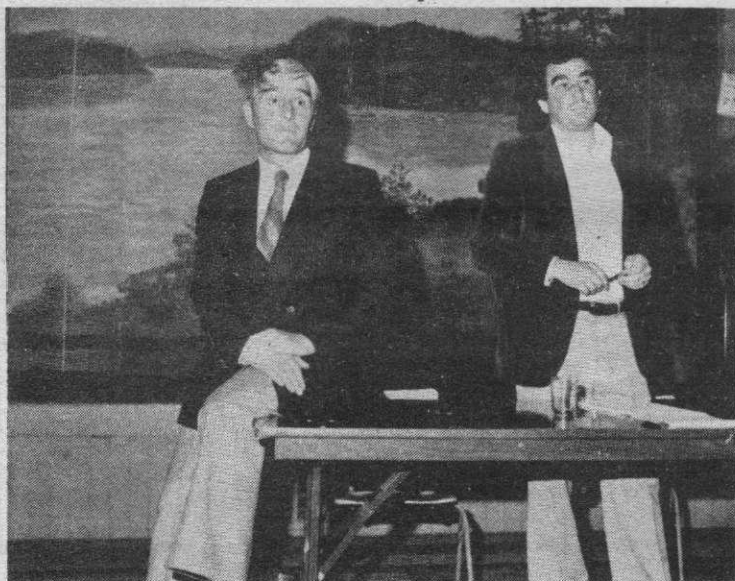
"The potential is great," Bouchard replied.

A woman in the crowd asked Bouchard if Mayne Islanders would lose the connection they have with Salt Spring Island where their hospitals and doctors are.

Bouchard replied that he didn't know and that he hadn't thought about it. At that point Ramsay suggested that the *Queen of Sidney* would likely provide connections.

When someone asked the ferry officials if they wanted an answer from the residents that night, somebody said there weren't enough people at the meeting to represent the island and that they should have a referendum.

Bouchard told the audience that the answer should come as a

The two men discussed the proposed second berth for Village Bay at a meeting with Mayne residents last Friday.

Ferry Corporation officials told Mayne Island residents Friday night.

Corporate communications manager Bill Bouchard and Frank Ramsay, superintendent of terminals, addressed a capacity-crowd at Mayne's Agricultural Hall.

The berth which they propose to build, Ramsay said, would accommodate the docking of a major vessel such as the *Queen of Alberni*, which cannot use the present facilities.

A major-vessel capacity at Village Bay would allow ferry schedulers to relieve the *Mayne Queen* of her Swartz Bay traffic during peak hours on weekends and holidays, Bouchard said.

As an example, the *Queen of Alberni* could stop at Village Bay in the morning on her Tsawwassen-Swartz Bay run. That, he said, would eliminate the need for the *Mayne Queen* to stop there.

#### NO FLEXIBILITY

Bouchard said the existing schedules have been "fine tuned" and increased to the point where there is no longer any flexibility in scheduling ferry runs.

The growth of demand on the Gulf Island routes, he added, is greater than the demand on any other route in the ferry service.

"We can expect demand to increase 20% for October," he added.

The \$1.5 million berth would be built alongside the existing dock at Village Bay, with vehicular and pedestrian traffic using the present terminal facilities.

Ramsay said that the project was still "only on the drawing board" and that the ferry corporation had no plans as yet to let out tenders for the work.

#### TEST PILES

Ramsay said he has already had test piles driven at the proposed dock site and has found that the floor of the bay there is good. He said he would like to go ahead with construction immediately and have the berth finished by the summer. But, he added, public input must be given serious consideration.

Many persons in the audience voiced reservations about the plan.

Some expressed concern that Village Bay would become a transfer terminal where transient people with "time on their hands" would be waiting around for a ferry.

Some other residents in the audience said the island could use a second dock in case the first one got knocked out as it had been two years before.

One resident said that having a
