

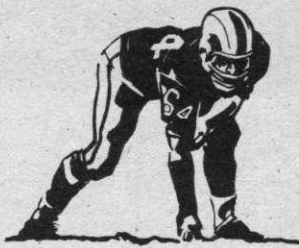
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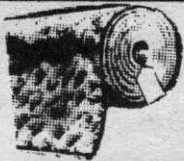
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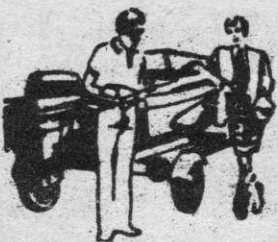

Roller skating makes a come-back

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Long, Long ago, back around 1965, and far away, as far as Fulford, every kid who was anybody converged on Fulford Hall for two hours of roller skating on a Saturday afternoon.

The floor had been re-done thanks to the Fulford Hall Committee and the Lions Club, and often there were 75 or more boys and girls whizzing around. Well, that first year there was less whizzing and more falling down and crawling up again. Parents took turns supervising and collecting the 25 cents admission, which included rental of skates.

That's where you would find Pat Akerman, Dave Moulton, assorted Kitchens, Bernie Reynolds, Phil and Rick Kyler and, of course, Byrons. Soon they had more or less mastered the skating and were looking for more challenges.

Around 1968 roller hockey was started. There were three areas: Fulford, Ganges and north end, and each area had peewee, junior and senior high teams. Sometimes a north-ender would play on a Ganges team and vice versa, but our researcher claims there is absolutely no record of someone from Fulford ever playing on anything but a Fulford team. Just wasn't done. The rivalry was friendly but intense and noisy.

ADVANTAGE

The Fulford kids had a distinct advantage in their proximity to the hall and made good use of it.

Girls were just as keen. No less than six Moulton girls formed a nucleus for a girls' league that ran from 1968 to 1975.

Roller hockey membership snowballed, reaching a peak in 1975.

Last winter interest seemed to take a dip. Those who played had a great time as always, but there were not so many. The roller hockey committee met last week, identified some problems, and came up with great ideas for this season.

First, open roller skating is back for all ages (for if you can't skate you find it frustrating to play hockey) on Saturday afternoons from 1 to 3.30 during the month of December, except when another big event at the hall forces a cancellation. The first hour is for those unsteady on skates. These afternoons will be supervised by parents in rotation and a small charge will be made. No pucks or sticks will be allowed.

SKATES

In the "good old days" the committee had a supply of skates which were rented out each Saturday and they are anxious to build up that supply again. They know there are island basements brimming with outgrown, unused or unrepaired roller skates. Please look, and if you have any, tell Carol Walde. The committee will price them and pay you for them. If the boots have wear left in them, the skates themselves can be repaired.

With the playing of last Saturday's game, the Strikers are half-way through their schedule, and throughout that first half, we have had one serious defect to overcome.

Although the boys have controlled the play generally in all their games, we have been riddled with break-away drives on our goal. On most of these drives our goalie, David Cates, has come up with spectacular saves, but no goalie can be expected to save all of these one-on-one situations.

This continuing problem necessitated some changes in our line-up to plug the gaps in our defence.

Native court worker talks at Ganges

Wayne Paul of the Tsartlip Indian band and native court worker in Victoria for the last four years, spoke to the native peoples awareness class at Ganges Monday, Nov. 12.

He studied at Camosun and U.B.C. and worked in the linguistic division of the museum in Victoria, but said he always wanted to get into the judicial system to help his people.

From 8.45 till 12 he speaks with people who are being charged and acts as a liaison between lawyers, judges and others. An R.C.M.P. detachment, a social worker or probation officer will call him to go and talk with people accused of different crimes.

Many Indian people will not relate well to non-Indian people; do not know their rights and may plead guilty and pay high fines, he explained.

When there are problems with children it should be brought to the attention of the teachers to recognize that the Indians have a culture that is unique, he said.

"Our people have been reaching out to become a part of Canadian society but it is terrible the way the government and people have treated us like second-class citizens. The government has conditioned us to be that way so some Indians don't want to have to do with whites.

"The government is very discriminatory and this is still going on. I see it every day."

Can native people achieve their rights through the legal system as it exists, he was asked.

"No. Through our community and traditions as they exist," said Paul.

Eastern Star looking for stamps

The Trincomali Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star is inviting local residents to recycle postage stamps, proceeds of which are used to fight cancer.

The stamps are cut, sorted and sent to a central office where they are sold. The project is part of a province-wide effort by more than 90 chapters of the Eastern Star. Last year, \$6,753 was raised in this way.

Lead poisoning

A large number of North American waterfowl, primarily ducks, die each year from lead poisoning. This results from birds ingesting lead shot while feeding in heavily-hunted marshes. 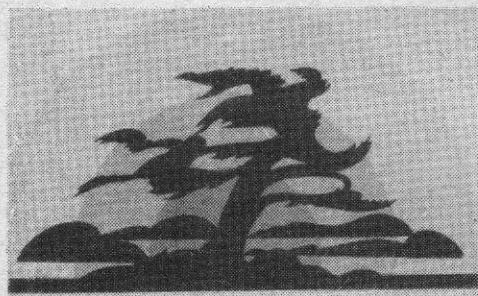

Two faces of Remembrance

And he sees his friends now long gone

There are two faces to Remembrance Day. Most veterans will recognize them readily. Others sometimes fail to understand how they can be.

There is the silent tribute to fallen comrades. The veterans will march on parade. Or they will stay

at home, or go about their chores. Some may attend a church service. But few veterans will fail to give a thought to the servicemen who never had a change to be veterans.

Some will remember the war years with a chill around the heart. Others recall the gladness and the gaiety of that comradeship accom-

panied by the fear of death. Others don't want to remember those days.

In a barrack room in an air force station in England I recall making a commitment that none of us would take part in a military ceremony dressed in bowler hats and raincoats. And I haven't. The only time I have taken part in a ceremony has been when I was in uniform.

For nearly 30 years I have taken pictures of parades, of wreaths, of flags and of the men who came back.

THE LOUSY SOLDIER

My memories are not theirs. I was the ultimate lousy soldier. Unquestioning obedience was not in me. When danger approached I was always in such a lowly rank that I never had decisions to make. But, despite my military incompetence, I was living with shades for the early part of the war.

Many names are gone for good. Red McFadden was a bridge player right up to the night before he bought his. Steve Brodie wasn't his real name, but Steve was what he was called. He was a Yank.

"Of course I like myself," he told us a few nights before he never came back. "A man who doesn't like himself wouldn't live."

Others are phantoms, with faces and forms, but their names are gone. So are they.

But I remember the days before they went. When we would sit drinking in a French cafe for four or five hours, intoxicated, stupid, delighted with each other's company and not giving a damn for war, death or discipline.

They were not of a lesser stature for the fact that we drank like fish. They were the more real, because they were admitting that need to escape from the dangers and threat of reality. My old "oppos" were all flying. I was not.

NEVER ON PARADE

On November 11 I don't go on parade. And there isn't a veteran who has ever suggested I should change my pattern. That's my choice. Sometimes on November 11 I go to the Legion or another veterans' gathering place and have a drink or two.

Some non-veterans are derisive. That's no way to remember, they tell me.

And I think of Josepepe Pepito Calamado Finlayson. We called him Pip.

He was LAC Finlayson, wireless operator-air gunner in the RAF.

Uranium is subject of talk

Learn the facts about uranium exploration and mining and judge for yourself, urged two speakers at a meeting on Salt Spring Sunday.

Kim Roberts, a lawyer for the West Coast Environmental Law Association, and Peter Chataway, Greenpeace co-ordinator against nuclear mining in B.C., presented some facts about the nuclear industry.

They said that deaths from uranium mining are well documented.

Of uranium miners who worked in Germany in the 1930's, the meeting learned, 65% are now dying of lung cancer.

It was pointed out that although the nuclear industry requires costly capital investment and provides few jobs, governments are slow to invest in alternative power sources.

A tape of the talk is available from the Salt Spring Energy Alternatives Study group.

Pip's name was not Finlayson at all. He was Pepe Calamado. And his home was in Gibraltar.

But when he enlisted in the air force he was told that no one could pronounce his name and he'd better find a more English one. So he came up with a family name derived from some English connection.

Pip didn't talk. He spluttered. He always had more words to say than would fit in his mouth at any one time. His English was fluent, but the accent was so Spanish that you had to listen very carefully to even know what he was telling you until you got to know him.

HE ENJOYED LIVING

And above all, Pip enjoyed every minute of the long day. He enjoyed the fresh air, the stuffy bar, the country road or the city street. He enjoyed laughter and he enjoyed cursing the stupidity of his seniors. He enjoyed an evening of drinking and he loved about half the women he met on his journeying through London.

Pip spent a lot of his leave periods with me at my parents' home. He couldn't get to Gibraltar very easily.

He was a good companion.

One day he flew over Belgium and he never came back. His family wept for him, I have no doubt. I know one or two girls who wept for him. It was not easy to visualize his swarthy face without a splutter or a grin. He was gone: like millions of others.

And I drink on Remembrance Day. Am I slighting Pip and all the rest?

A REAL REGRET


Not at all! I drink with a very real regret that he never stayed around to drink with us. And I know that if he is around somewhere, watching, he might be doing many things, but resentment couldn't be with him.

I don't go on parade and my fellow Legionnaires don't knock me for it. And I drink on occasion with others who came back from far worse hells than I ever saw.

But nobody, veteran or other wise, can legitimately claim that don't remember.

I remember only too well and rejoice in the friendships I knew and lost.

That's my remembrance.

the Hotel Vancouver. The nearest was a block away. I rode up in the elevator and asked the young receptionist for information. I was an interloper. It was not for me!

It was the wrong office. This office administers the department and is not to serve the public. The public office was a block over. So I went a block over. Then I walked almost to Stanley Park.

I found the number indicated, but there was no clear advice of how to get into the building.

In 1943 I did a commando course. I knew how to reconnoitre the building without arousing suspicion. After walking all the way around it I discovered that the sign which seemed to be inviting me to an apartment block was really the entrance to the government office.

I went up the elevator and explained to a charming young lady what I sought.

I was on the wrong floor.

ALL FILLED

I went down on the elevator and entered a vast hall. About 100 chairs were placed around the perimeter and about 100 people occupied them. A somewhat peremptory notice indicated the counter with the instruction, "Report here".

Being a reporter all my working life, I reported there.

There was one man a few years my junior explaining a "code" to a man a few years closer to my age. There were two young ladies very busy with files and there were two young men busy with people who appeared to be immigrants, parents of immigrants, friends of immigrants or people like me looking for information.

It was 11.25 am. Everyone was run off his feet. Or les pieds. I was invited to use either tongue. After five minutes one young lady finally finished her chores and came to ask what I sought.

I told her. Would she require her birth certificate?

The enquirer simply had to furnish information on first coming to Canada, she explained.

Would she require her birth certificate?

Not at all! All she needed is proof of entry.

I was chatty. So no birth certificate would ever be wanted?

The citizenship people might want one, but that was another office. They don't do citizenship there.

That was the end.

I'm too old to keep pace with government offices.

But the only advice I have to offer anyone who wants to gain citizenship is think hard. It's a sight easier to be a happy alien than a frustrated aspiring citizen.

And must all Canadian citizens have ulcers built in?

It is a matter of public relations. If the ministry showed a telephone listing and address for information this stupidity would not occur. The staff is overly conscious of people coming in to the country and no longer concerned with any who might already be here.

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Reunion

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Pleasure boat activities increasing in Active Pass meeting learns

that the pilot's view can be obstructed for as much as 200 feet ahead and 50 feet to each side. Small craft lights may be obscured by mist, flags and pennants and diesel fumes, the meeting was told.

Ferry management said that their ships' masters unanimously decided that accidents in the pass would be inevitable unless restrictions were imposed.

NOT FEASIBLE

Ferry operations manager Charlie Partridge told the meeting that it wouldn't be feasible for them to use the East Point route instead of Active Pass. He said fares would increase astronomically due to increased fuel and each sailing would take an extra half hour.

Microphones positioned at each side of the elementary school auditorium were quickly taken up by concerned residents.

Resort and marina operators, fishing guides and others with vested interests provided a large segment of the public input.

Anger was expressed at the speed at which the ferries travel through the pass. One resort owner said small boats have broken free of their moorings as a result of six-foot swells from ferries. Another marina operator said, "We need people fishing here to keep the tourist industry on the island solvent."

BRIEF FROM GALIANO

A brief from concerned Galiano residents said that the laws, rules and regulations that govern the use of the waterway should be observed by all the groups that use it; not just one group of users should be banned.

The brief said the rules should be enforced more, the speed of the ferries must be reduced and the south entrance of the pass should allow one ferry passing through at a time.

A Mayne Island resident suggested a different solution by bringing the meeting's attention to Seymour Narrows and Ripple Rock. Collinson Reef is a similar hazard, he said, being located in a narrow area.

WOULDN'T BE A PROBLEM

If that rock could be eliminated so a ferry could pass over it at low tide then there wouldn't be a problem there, he explained.

Further suggestions to improve safety conditions in the pass were as follows.



- New safety standards must be implemented.

- A visual monitoring station should be established in the centre of the pass.

- A minor coast guard rescue base should be established in Miner's Bay.

- Close-at-hand radio directions to vessels in the area.

- A fishing zone range posted with markers and aids.

- RCMP enforcement must be increased with experienced marine patrolmen.

- Ferry speeds must be reduced.

- Ferries must maintain the same course throughout the length of the pass.

- Stiffer fines for offenders of the rules.

- Ferries should make safety their chief objective rather than keeping on schedule.

In summarizing and closing the meeting Buchanan said he was not sitting there to pass a regulation.

"We are only here to get advice, not to make a decision. We are in a neutral position."

Ferry operations manager Peter De Cunha told *Driftwood* following the meeting that the ferry company has no objection to commercial fishing vessels fishing in the pass, or pleasure craft using the pass in transit.

In a telephone conversation with *Driftwood* Monday, Tom Kew said the Coast Guard would meet in Ottawa near the end of November with federal Minister of Transport Donald Mazankowski.

He said the recommendations they will make to the minister will come from the three public meetings the Coast Guard held at Mayne Island, in Vancouver and in

Victoria. The rules and regulations that will possibly be imposed on Active Pass will be decided on by Mazankowski, Kew said.

Kew added that the Coast Guard regional director, Herb Buchanan, will still accept briefs if they are sent to him within a week. The address to send a brief to is the Regional Director of the Canadian Coast Guard, 700 West Georgia, P.O. Box 10060, Vancouver, V7Y 1E1.

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Restrictions could have 'drastic effect'

The B.C. Ferry Corporation request to outlaw sports-fishing in Active Pass brought a great number of suggested alternatives from the Gulf Islanders present at last week's Coast Guard meeting at Mayne Island.

One of those alternative, a reduction of speed for all vehicles through the pass, could have a drastic effect on the water taxi business, according to Jack Hughes, owner of Gulf Islands Water Taxi.

Hughes told *Driftwood* that on a busy day he will make 10 trips through the pass travelling at about 25 knots. On an emergency medical-evacuation run he can open the boat up to 40 knots. Hughes said that last year he made approximately 80 "med-evac" trips through Active Pass.

He added that if a speed limit of five knots was stipulated for the pass, as suggested at the meeting, then it wouldn't be economically feasible for him or his passengers to use that route. Instead, he said, he would have to try and arrange for other pick-up and drop-off points in order to avoid the pass.

Hughes said that he does take out the occasional fishing party to Active Pass but it is not a major part of his business. He added that if the pass were closed to sports-fishing then "we would have to go elsewhere".
