

Local fish plant provides high quality feed for killer whales

It seems only fair that if killer whales are to be kept in captivity, the fish that they are fed should be of the highest quality.

According to Gil Hewlett, that is the reason why the Vancouver

have had some delays while "ironing" out mechanical problems. He said they process only five tons a day so the one boat fishing for him must be careful not to catch more than that.

time, Hewlett added, so why not get them the best. He said that the herring the aquarium has got in the past from other companies has been very poor. He added that sometimes they had to throw away 20% of the fish because they hadn't been processed quickly enough and had turned rancid.

Hewlett said that the fish they get now are not battered and bashed up as they have been in the past. The herring from Salt Spring is "the very best", he concluded.

The quota for the Vancouver aquarium is 90 tons and Christianson said that quota should be filled by the middle of January. He said it usually takes about six weeks on the average to get enough herring for the whales.

Christianson said that they just put a new boat in the water and

He said in another month or two they will be processing bait strip for sports fishermen and then herring roe in March and April.

E. F. Schumacher

He makes economics humane pursuit

BY JOHN G. HALL

A guest column this week while Mary is away. Thank you both, Mary and the editor, for agreeing to let me use this space for a vital and timely discussion.

For some time I have been much impressed by the views of E. F. Schumacher. An economist who went to Britain from Germany as a Rhodes scholar, he stayed to become a valued advisor to several UK industries. He has now given us an insight into the way in which economics should be used in the troublesome years ahead.

In his books *Small Is Beautiful* (1973), *A Guide For The Perplexed* (1977) and *Good Work* (1979), he deals with our prime trouble spots and yet goes much further than most in analyzing our ills and in prescribing basic cures.

Small Is Beautiful tells us that economics must depend upon a

clear understanding of human needs and societal goals, rather than be looked on as the science of industrial profit. Besides, it is not really a science at all because it assumes roles far beyond the factual and observable. The size and impersonal nature of many of our governments, industries and technical achievements show that we have lost sight of man's need to be creative in his work and to enjoy the sense of contributing to his fellows' welfare.

INEFFICIENT

We are really inefficient, he says, in our industry because we misuse resources, including our educational systems, disrupt the balance of man in the environment, and then have the nerve to encourage developing countries to copy us. What we need is "appropriate technology", the use of tools and materials which suit each country's

people and its ecology. Along with this, there must be a willingness to accept other countries' aims on their own merits, rather than view them as sources of profit for ourselves.

His last book, *Good Work*, shows us how to revise our workplace habits. Our industrial processes disrupt the organic relationship of man with his surroundings, degrade the moral and intellectual qualities of man, and complicate life to the point of violence. There is all too much evidence from personal experience and from general observation that this is in fact what happens.

FOR REAL NEEDS

Instead, we can learn to provide for our real needs and services, not our greed; to develop our abilities and use them in the general benefit of our society, rather than for individual profit; and to work in a

way which does not deny the "vertical" or spiritual dimension of men. Many companies today are realizing the need for more self-reliance on the part of workers and for more co-operative and less centralized management but all too few.

Through all these essays there runs the underlying theme of concern for the human spirit. Thus all of his economic and social advice depends upon a moral view of man's nature. And in *A Guide For The Perplexed* he develops this theme in detail.

How can we plan a "map of life", he asks. By understanding the hierarchic structure of the world and the levels of being, by using the fields of knowledge and subjects of man's learning, and by having faith in man's experience and vision to solve or see through the various problems we meet.

We need a philosophy comprehensive enough to embrace the whole of knowledge, a system of meditation which will concentrate our minds on any subject, and an art of living which permits us to use each activity to guide us on our way.

OBSCURED

Schumacher thus reminds us of

the long-established traditions of our intellectual and spiritual heritage which today are obscured by most of our practices. Our assumptions in evolution, the survival of the fittest, and the relativity of all values and ethics have led to disregard of the sacred in life, competition, and the loss of stability in society.

And yet we educate ourselves increasingly in these destructive modes. We still have the capacities to examine our inner experiences and our perceptions of the world, and the capacity to respond to inner illuminations which shows meanings of things beyond the mundane. Only by appropriating these abilities will we become a sane society.


These are very strong views and provoke us into serious thought. The implications are very important, because they lead us to re-examine ourselves and our institutions. For me the *Guide* is a crucial book, reminding us of our traditions and showing us that they are just as vital as ever.

THERE IS HOPE

These views are also found, at least in part, in the work of many leading writers on the crises in ecology and energy. Most of the books I have read (and reviewed) deal at base with man's moral dilemmas and offer moral solutions to problems as much as economic or industrial. We should be heartened to see this: humanity has not withered, and there is hope for us all.

But as Schumacher says, if you know something you must act on it, or it will tend to go sour.

I hope you will read Schumacher and think about what he says. It is challenging yet encouraging. In this short article I can only sum up what he writes so clearly and movingly. He makes economics become human, and gives it the metaphysical scope it needs to become a truly humane pursuit.

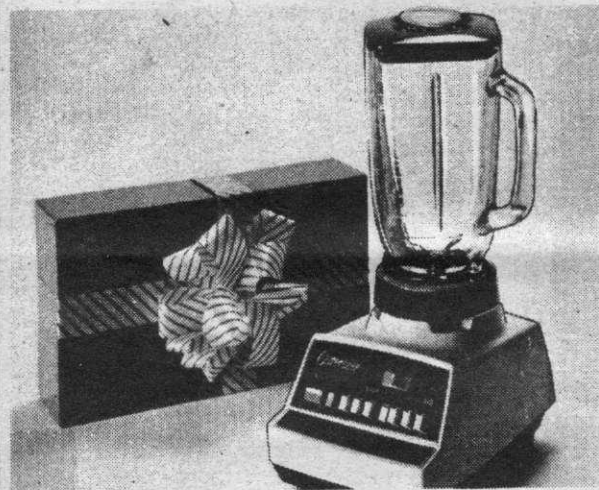

Down Through the Years With Driftwood

FIVE YEARS AGO

Total of 22 new homes among the islands during the month of October brings the year's total to 192. The month's starts were valued at \$658,644, to make a year's total value of \$5,129,661.

New routine has been established for the islands building inspector according to the Chief Inspector M. F. Neal. He will spend two days a week on Salt Spring Island, with the rest of the week divided among the other islands and duties elsewhere in the region.

Two charges have been laid by RCMP at Ganges on the evidence of breathalyzer tests already, although the equipment has only been on the island for two weeks.

Four LIP projects have been approved among the islands. Three are on Salt Spring Island and the fourth is located at Galiano. Total value is \$59,685. Galiano Chamber of Commerce has successfully sponsored a project to gain access to the Stones Road waterfront. Project value is \$11,336. On Salt Spring Island the three projects include a Rod and Gun Club plan to clear streams. At a cost of \$20,050 a crew will devote 150 man-weeks to deepening holes, preparing spawning beds and improving the fishing and productive value of island streams. Lions Club gets \$18,632 to clear and prepare the 10-acre site at Central for a soccer pitch and includes drainage and other preliminaries to recreational use of the land. Playing field at Fulford, Fulford Hall and trails on Mt. Bruce will be the targets of the \$9,667 awarded to Salt Spring Recreation Commission.

TEN YEARS AGO

Third centennial project has been proposed for Salt Spring Island. Already brought up have been the development of Drummond Park and provision of improvements at Vesuvius. Third proposal is the construction of a new room to the rear of the Salt Spring Island Library at Ganges.

Joan Purchase, of Pender Island, regional director for the Outer Islands, has informed Driftwood that each island will participate in its own planning. An Advisory Planning Commission will be established on each island in order that islanders can make a direct contribution to the planning function.

Director Joan Purchase was re-elected to the Capital Regional Board on Monday from the Outer Islands. On Salt Spring Island newcomer Marc Holmes was elected. Both were elected by acclamation.

Jim Campbell, Gulf Islands school trustee for the past 11 years will face a contest next month. Tom Davidson has challenged his seat on the school board. James B. Stewart and George Lampier will contest the Fulford seat and at Ganges there are five candidates for two seats. George Heinekey, chairman of the board, is the only sitting member looking for re-election. Others in the race there are Annie I. Barnes, Harold E. Bryan, Ione V. Guthrie, and W. John Stepaniuk. Two are already elected by acclamation. They are Mrs. Elizabeth Ross, on Mayne Island, and a newcomer to the board, Harold Hoffman, of Ganges.

It was a big 10th birthday on Friday evening when Salt Spring Island Lions Club celebrated its charter night in Fulford Hall.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

Three cougars have been shot on Salt Spring Island in one week. Bob Akerman, who hunted down one of the depredators on Saturday, was asked why the incidence of cougars was so high. He expressed the opinion that a female swam across to the island in the past several years and had raised a litter of kittens here. As all the animals so far killed have been males, there may be a female cougar still prowling the woods.

Five new Canadians from Greece were shipwrecked in Active Pass recently when the 21-foot cruiser in which they were travelling suffered an engine failure. They drifted for 12 hours and were finally washed up at the north end of Galiano. They were discovered after Air-Sea Rescue had notified the Gulf Islands voluntary coastguard, directed by Capt. V. C. Best. The boat went for repair on Galiano and the occupants went to Vancouver by ferry.

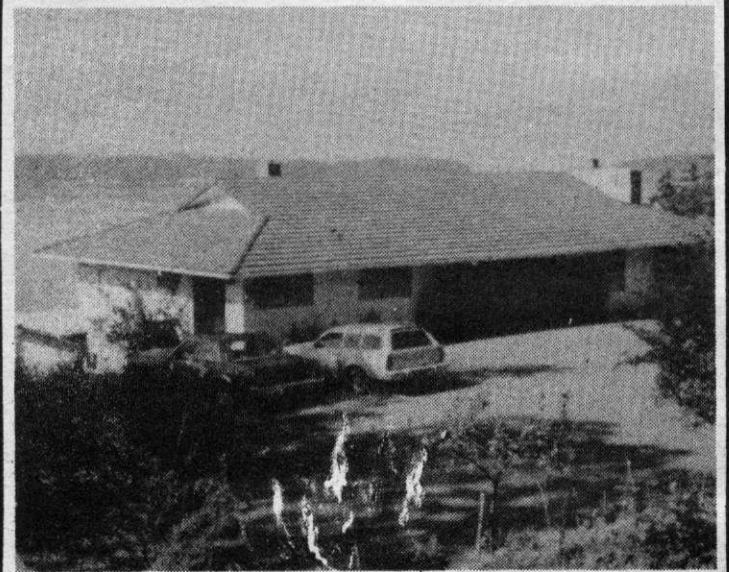

Christmas trees make good crop says agriculturist at institute

The Farmer's Institute December meeting on Tuesday, December 4, at the Legion Hall were re-introduced to Christmas trees.

The president, Mrs. Helena Turner, chaired the meeting and introduced the guest speaker, Mr. Peter Ewert, the District Agriculturist from the Ministry of Agriculture office, Abbotsford.

Mr. Ewert is a specialist in growing and marketing Christmas trees for the province.

He has personally engaged in Christmas tree farming for the past nine years. It is interesting, rewarding and fun and a good project for a family. He said it has taught his children new skills and gave them business knowledge.

Mr. Ewert said that customers want good quality Christmas trees today. There are very beautiful artificial trees on the market.

"Good quality trees can produce a nice financial turnover" he said. "Anything less than top quality is not worth bothering with."

There are two ways to farm Christmas trees; natural stand trees and plantation trees.

THEY'RE CHEAPER

In a natural stand, the farmer does some thinning, some shearing and some fertilizing. The natural stand tree brings a price of approximately one-third of a plantation tree, but as the labor and other costs are also proportionately lower and the trees can be marketed two or three years after cultural work is commenced, the net income compares very favorably with plantation trees.

In the plantation system, a farm field is plowed and prepared for planting of the seedling trees as for any crop. The trees are fertilized and shaped by shearing.

Competing weeds are controlled by mowing or herbicides. Six to seven years later the trees are harvested and the harvest may be spread over two or three years: After seven years, one acre producing 1,400 marketable trees at the current farm price of \$7 per tree, will gross a total of \$9,800. Christmas tree production is considered farm income for purposes of land assessment.

SHORTAGE

There is an acute shortage of cultured Christmas trees. It is a very strong market. Cutting Christmas trees is not a destructive practice, as the land can be kept fully stocked through quick replacement.

Apart from the planting year and harvesting years, Mr. Ewert estimated the average time input of 40 hours per acre per year. The natural stand may give the farmer better wages than the plantation stand.

Christmas trees do well on a wide range of soil from the highly fertile to Class 5. Douglas Fir is the most popular in the marketplace and it is hardy and grows the fastest. Mr. Ewert recommended Noble Fir and Lowland Balsam (Grand Fir) for a plantation on Pender Island.

In a test of seeds collected from Oregon to northern B.C., horticulturists found the best seed came from trees on the Sunshine Coast and the Gulf Islands.

Seeds are usually collected in early September. Seed should be taken from "mother trees" that have upward turning branches and lots of branches in each whorl. The cones are picked, dried in a gunny sack in a well-ventilated place, and then shipped to an extractor in Courtenay.

Seedlings are planted in early spring, after February 20 approximately. The farmer can grow his own or buy seedlings. To buy, the cost is .10c. to .15c. per seedling. Seeds may be extracted by hand. The cone is heated to 140 deg. F., for a couple of hours and the seeds are shaken out.

If using a wild tree take one that is less than one foot high. A bigger tree will go into transplant shock for three years. When transplanting a wild tree never bend the root. If necessary prune the roots so that it goes straight down into the soil. Wild trees should go into a

transplant bed for a year and then into the field.

Shearing the trees is a fast job. The first time the farmer can do an acre, 1,000 - 1,400 trees in a day. By the time the trees are seven feet tall it takes a day to do 500 trees.

Douglas firs are pruned late summer or early fall. Market trees for the year are pruned as soon as buds have hardened.

Use nitrogen to fertilize the stand. Mr. Ewert suggests ammonium sulphate, 21-0-0.

If trees are planted 5 ft. x 5 ft. spacing, an acre will contain about 1,500 trees.

Irrigation is not necessary for Christmas trees and the added expense could not be justified. Deer can damage young trees up to the first three or four years. A high fence may be necessary to keep them out. They seem especially attracted to fertilized trees.

Last week George Heinekey was named Citizen of the Year by the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce.

The report in the veterans' newsletter explains that the Legion at one time owned the property on which the United Church stands. And the present Legion Hall was the United Church.

Under Heinekey's chairmanship a swap was arranged. The Legion acquired the small property with its church building on it and the church took over the larger lot and went ahead with the construction of the present church. The newsletter makes a cautionary observation, "so the story goes".

The original building has been considerably enlarged since that time.

There are few records extant and the Legion depends on oral reports for the history of the branch a quarter-century ago.

Legionnaires commended the choice of the Chamber of Commerce in making the nomination.

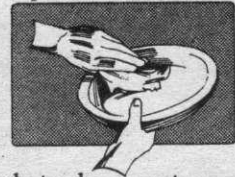

- Christmas lights are a traditional part of the festive season. Turn them on only after 7 p.m.

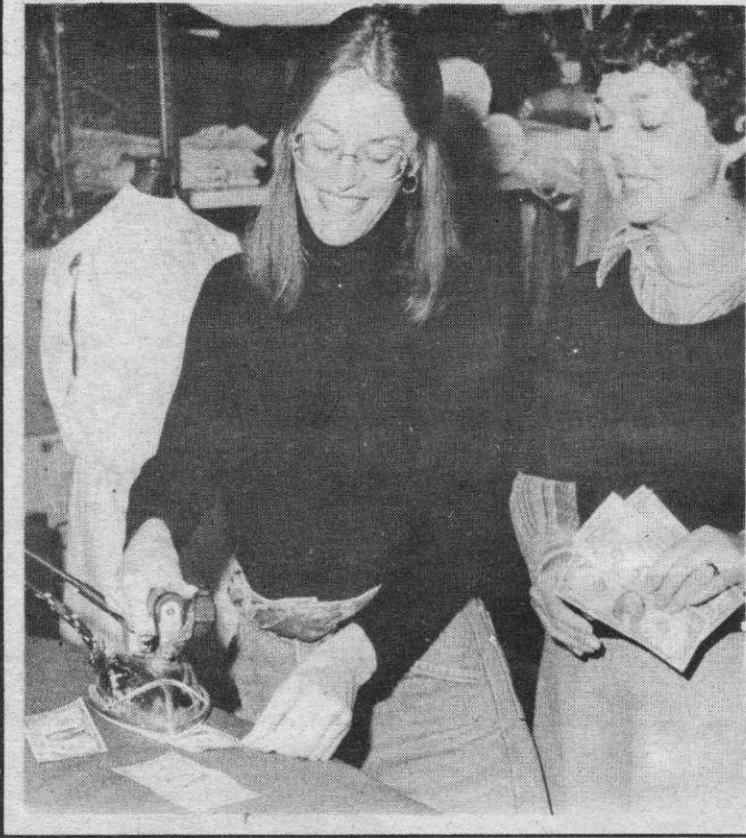

Islands Trust seeks power to control mineral exploration

The subject of mining on Gambier Island was brought up at the meeting of the Islands Trust Council in Victoria last Friday and Saturday.

Gambier Island trustees Elspeth Armstrong and Bev Baxter brought the meeting up to date on what the Gambier committee was doing with regard to the proposal of 20th Century Energy Corp. of Vancouver to strip-mine over 34 million tons of ore to a depth of minus 300 ft. elevation, covering two thirds of the island.

Baxter said she and Dave Morris, chief planner for the Islands Trust, met with then Minister of Environment Rafe Mair and

members of his staff on November 13.

She said Mair informed them that the problem extended beyond Islands Trust jurisdiction because the whole of Howe Sound is a major recreational area and "hard decisions had to be made as to just what that implies".

TO EXAMINE ISSUE

Baxter said that since the meeting the Islands Trust has received a letter from the ministry of environment stating that the environmental land use committee (ELUC) of the department has been directed by the minister to examine the environmental and land use characteristics of the proposed mine.

She said Mair told her that on the basis of examinations, further consideration will be given to whether a mining development should proceed and under what conditions.

Baxter said that Mair's consideration of a mining development is inconsistent with his assertion that Howe Sound is a major recreation area.

General Trust chairman John Rich of Bowen Island informed the council that the ELUC has written to the Trust saying studies would be finished February 1 and that those studies would only result in defining what the terms of reference for future studies would be.

A MOTION

The council of 26 trustees discussed the matter and a motion was brought to the floor.

The wording of the motion is: "That we approve in principle a request to the executive council that an order-in-council be passed under Section 8 of the Mineral Act that they prohibit a free-miner from locating or recording a mineral claim on land specified in the order in respect of all minerals or a particular mineral specified in the Trust area; including coal, under the coal act, and petroleum; absolutely."

Section 8 of the Mineral Act states "that council may by order prohibit a free miner from locating or recording a mineral claim on lands specified in the order in respect of all minerals or a particular mineral specified in the order either absolutely or subject to such conditions as may be specified in the order."

Mary Lee, administrative officer for the Islands Trust, explained that this motion will be dealt with by the general trustees, and they will decide whether or not the request should be made, and if so how it should be worded.

She said that Section 8 cannot be applied to the Gambier mine situation or to any other claims in good standing. What it could do, she said, is prevent something like the Gambier mine from happening elsewhere.

Students fill court room

Judge gives lecture

In provincial court at Ganges last week, Judge D. K. McAdam gave a lecture which Crown counsel later explained was "a part of the judge's public legal education function; which he doesn't get the chance to express very often."

The lecture was given to the court after the last case of the day and after the lawyers, clerks and deputy sheriff had all left the room.

"Anyone who wishes to leave may," said McAdam, "but I have something to say to all of you with regard to what has happened here this morning."

A class of students and over 50 other youths who were there stayed in the room.

McAdam invited those who had filled the aisles to sit at the desks near the front. The courtroom was silent while he spoke.

"I hope none of you have been here before," he began. "Court is a place where you could find yourself in a lot of serious trouble, like the young boy who was here before you this morning who drinks too much."

"We take it very seriously that if you are going to drink, you must learn to handle it."

"You have seen this morning," he continued, "a warrant issued for the arrest of another man."

McAdam paused, at which point someone asked from the back if the issuing of a warrant carried a penalty.

"Yes", he replied, "but if we have to issue a warrant we are happy to get the person in court and do not usually proceed on it."

For the next few minutes he spoke to the students in the room concerning what a "stay of proceedings" meant and other legal matters that had come up that morning.

The audience listened and no one left until the judge finished. For those who were there it could be the last time they get the chance to remain sitting when a judge

leaves the court room.
