Sometimes there's good news

Most reporters, even in small places, spend much of their working lives covering disasters and controversies of one sort or another. The disasters may not be earth-shattering and the controversies may have no meaning outside their own community, but those are the things that make up much of the world's "news".

It's a special occasion, then, when one of these world-weary souls is released from the eye of the storm, however briefly, to go and do a story about something that's simply "nice".

I drew one of those assignments a couple of weeks ago as a sidelight to my regular duties in covering an Islands Trust committee meeting on Mayne. The "nice" part of the junket was the story idea on the 5 Roosters restaurant, run by 25-year old Barbara Ross.

DISTINCT ENTHUSIASM

Now, I don't claim to be a world-travelled restaurant buff but I do harbour a distinct enthusiasm for good food. I've eaten in commercial establishments as far north as Haines Junction in the Yukon Territory, as far east as Toronto, and damn near every place in between. The leisurely Saturday evening spent with Barbara and her good-humoured bartender, Michael Cross, has to rank as one of the nicest experiences I've had in a restaurant anywhere. There's no such thing as a specialty: the whole meal is a specialty. It's obvious with every bite that Barbara Ross loves what she's doing and as far as I'm concerned, that's the most important asset any cook can have.

LET'S GET SERIOUS

On to more serious and less pleasant things. A couple of weeks ago Driftwood ran a story outlining a proposed schedule of license fees that will be imposed on dog owners living in unorganized areas of the Capital Regional District.

The proposed bylaw, which can't receive final approval until the regional board receives its supplementary letters patent, would see owners of unaltered male and female dogs pay a \$15 fee. Neutered dogs and spayed bitches will be assessed a fee of \$5 each.

All fine and well. What's sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander, as the old saying goes, and there can be little doubt that unaltered male dogs add as much to the dog population problem as unspayed bitches.

That doesn't explain however, why such major population centres as Victoria and Saanich, also within the CRD, don't adhere to the same principle.

Victoria residents get away with paying a license fee of \$5 for either

a spayed female or a male, period. Unspayed bitches bring a license fee of \$15.

In Saanich, males of every ilk and spayed females face a \$6 license fee. Once again, owners of unspayed females are levied a fee of \$15.

Either the aforementioned municipalities are behind the times or the CRD is moving ahead in great leaps and bounds. Whatever the case, it would appear that there's need for discussion and some conformity in the fee structures.

To be sure, roaming dogs pose a special problem in such areas as the Gulf Islands. But there can be little doubt that dogs in municipalities are of equal concern, if in other ways. Why rural people should get stuck, again, for a major part of the load is beyond me.

Last Sunday afternoon we were treated to a performance of some fine chamber music by the Purcell String Quartet. Even the weather and the setting, the Schubart home on Old Scott Road, contributed to the enjoyment for the large audience.

The concert began with a work by Haydn, the quartet op. 54 no. 2. The quartet played it with poise and revealed a well-blended tone. They obviously enjoyed the work themselves. A forceful and driving performance, especially the last two sections.

On Monday the quartet performed for the high school, discussing their instruments and the music they play. A pity the elementary school did not hear them, because I noticed several young children at the Sunday concert who sat entranced by the music. A chance like this is so valuable for all to enjoy.

Many thanks to the quartet for coming to our island again and for giving us a rare treat: great chamber music well performed.

Transit system no use to islanders

The following letter has been sent to the Capital Regional District by Islands Trust general trustee Gordon Wallace, of Pender Island.

I am dropping you this note as both the local trustee for North Pender Island, and also as a general trustee for the Islands Trust. The recent announcement

by the Capital Regional District that we, in the Outer Gulf Islands including Salt Spring, are to be included in the surcharge area for .03 a gallon on our gasoline prices leaves me somewhat amazed.

There is at the present time no viable way for residents of the Outer Islands to get to Victoria other than by private car, and

therefore the use that the people of the Outer Islands can make of any transit system in Victoria is absolutely nil.

People in other regional districts, i.e. the people of the City of Duncan, being outside the Capital Regional District, do not contribute to this surtax as they also obviously do not use the bus service in the City of Victoria. I therefore petition you to either remove your intentions of the .03 a gallon on Outer Islands and Salt Spring on gas consumption, or, publicly state what your rationale is for implementing such a surtax.

I am including letters from the Farmers' Institute of Pender Islands and from the Chamber of Commerce from Pender Islands to further let you know the feelings of the people in the area which I represent.

As a general trustee I have also made it my business to poll organizations on the islands of South Pender, Galiano, Mayne and Saturna and I can tell you the majority of the people on these islands as well as all across Salt Spring, feel exactly the same way as we do at Pender. An answer to this plea would be appreciated.

Financial report presented by treasurer Mrs. L. Martin showed donations in 1978 totalled \$70,000. Intermediate and Personal Care Society received \$60,000 to furnish the lounge and dining room of Greenwoods; \$8084 went to Lady Minto Hospital for new equipment, and \$1,000 was paid out to build a

ramp for wheelchairs at Central Hall.

Thrift Shop convener Mrs. Mary Yellowlees reported sales remained at a constant high throughout the year. Staffing was attended to by Mrs. M. Jones. Workers put in 7,500 hours during the year. All work done in the Thrift Shop is voluntary.

THERAPY DIFFICULT

Reporting for Extended Care, Mrs. Ethel Davidson said the present building alterations are making therapy work difficult for both volunteers and residents. Cramped quarters make it impossible to use the number of volunteers needed for morning therapy and serving of afternoon tea, but everyone is cheerfully making the best of the situation.

During the year residents celebrated the sixty-fourth wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Grist and birthdays of two centenarians: Mrs. Townsend 102 years, and Miss Mary Lees, 101 years. Volunteers helped to decorate the lounge and create the party atmosphere that prevailed on these special occasions.

Auxiliary members have been faithful in providing home made cakes for the residents each week end all through the year. Mrs. Joan Buckley keeps the roster for this project.
