

The spinning wheel

Basic concept unchanged since invented

Unchanged in basic concept since first invented in the design studios of Leonardo Da Vinci, the spinning wheel has appeared in varying forms from traditional European design to contemporary bulk spinners, like the ones produced by Byron and Carol Marks of Salt Spring Island.

The spinning wheel, particularly the Squamish Indian spinner, has made a place for itself in the economic and aesthetic life of many crafts people living on the west coast.

This, the Marks said, is quite remarkable for an idea that is nearly 500 years old. Carol and

Byron Marks, along with other local craftsmen, make the manufacture of spinners a viable business on Salt Spring Island.

The traditional and colonial designs with small bobbins and flyers were intended to spin fine thread from wool, hair, flax, cotton and silk.

The bulk spinner design used by the Marks traces its lineage to the busy Salish and Squamish weavers and spinners of the north coast. The Indians used immense bobbin and flyer arrangements to produce the thicker yarns characteristic of the sweaters they have been marketing in this area for many decades.

Sewage wells to be tried

Capital Region is to spend \$9,500 on experimenting with digging wells to get rid of effluent.

Exfiltration wells are to be sunk in the area of the Esquimalt Lagoon to ascertain whether sewage effluent can be pumped into the ground and find its way into the sea after filtration through the ground.

Two-phase investigation will not only ascertain the feasibility of pumping effluent into the gravelly ground, but whether such a procedure could be effective for the entire western community.

Grant for park

Beaver Point Park on Salt Spring Island has been awarded a grant by the ministry of lands, parks and housing.

The park board will receive \$573.62 to improve park facilities for the coming summer.

The island park is one of 12 parks to receive improvement grants from the ministry. The grants total \$6,573.62.

On Saturday the Strikers met high-flying Sooke, a combination that always results in an excellent exhibition of clean, heads-up soccer. Sooke, like ourselves, plays a team format of soccer and they defend their end with determination.

With two of our starting line-up missing, scoring-ace Jeff Moger, and a very strong mid-fielder, Todd Chase, it was going to take some excellent playing by the team to keep Sooke under control. TO LEFT FORWARD

Brought up from left full-back to fill the left wing position was Tony Mason, whose good chip shot and the fact that he's left-footed will make for a double threat from the left side of our forward line.

Inserted into the starting line-up to fill the left full-back position was David Kruger, who is also left-footed and extremely fast.

Mike Kruger, who normally plays right full-back, was moved up to right half-back and brought in to fill his position was Rob Minvielle.

Sooke took advantage of some early-game uncertainty by the Strikers and opened the scoring at five minutes into the game. The Strikers came right back, however, and half a minute later Brad Davies

hammered in his third of the season to even the score at 1-1.

FIRST OF SEASON

Fifteen minutes into the first half Tony Mason, new to his position of left wing, showed that he was equal to the task of playing that position by scoring his first goal of the season. The ball was kicked down the right side by Sooke's defence, and Rob Minvielle put a booming kick across the field to Tony's position.

Farming and gardening

A good time to plant summer and fall flowering bulbs

Now that we are into April it is a good time to plan and plant our summer and fall flowering bulbs.

Tuberous begonias are an excellent choice for a shady spot along the east or north side of your house or in the shade of that big tree. Begonias love a loose, moist soil with good depth. I found rotten wood or fine bark mulch an excellent soil conditioner for aerations and water retention.

A depth of 12 inches and equal parts mulch and soil will result in big, healthy plants and tubers as large as your hand in the fall.

A delightful accent for begonias are the blues of the upright lobelia or myosotis. Lobelia is an annual and myosotis is a biennial. Begonias are started from tubers in March and transplanted out after last frost, about the middle of May.

Dahlias like the sun and thrive in a similarly loose and deep soil as described for begonias. Depending on eventual size the tubers are planted from four inches to five feet apart.

EASY, REWARDING

Dahlias are an easy and rewarding plant. If their basic requirements are met they will delight the gardener by massive displays of blooms from August until frost in every colour and shape except blue. Basic requirements are a deep, loose soil, adequate moisture, lots of well rotted manure or compost, and the pinching of spent blossoms.

Dahlias are started from tubers indoors or in the greenhouse in March and transplanted outside in early June.

Modern varieties carry their blossoms well above the foliage unlike the old varieties. They range through a great variety of sizes, colours and types including singles, colarettes, cactus flowered, informal decoratives, pom-poms, incurved cactus and formal decoratives. Even the largest look best in bunches of at least three.

Gladioli are one of the most popular flowers for the garden and for cutting. They are not as demanding of soil condition as begonias or dahlias but will do best in a light loam. They look best planted in odd-numbered bunches like most bulbs.

GREAT RANGE

Here again we have a great range of sizes from giants, large, small and miniatures, (referring to flower sizes); in colours and shades of white, cream, pink, yellow, orange, apricot salmon, red, scarlet, crimson and purple.

Gladioli are easy to care for, the larger ones requiring a bamboo stake to support the large flower stalks in high winds, and liquid fertilizer at 10-day intervals during the budding period.

Gladioli corms may be planted out when the first leaves appear on trees in spring until approximately two months before the first killing frost. To extend the blooming season some gardeners plant gladioli at two-week intervals within that time period.

All the previously mentioned flowers are tender ones and their tubers or corms are lifted or dug up in fall after the first killing frost. A week in dry, cool and frost-free conditions will allow the remaining soil on the tubers to be brushed away easily. Tubers are then stored in dry, dark and cool conditions until next spring.

IN MARCH

Begonia tubers are started or sprouted in shallow, moist peat moss or leafmould, in March, then transplanted into individual pots. A

fibrous loam serves best, until planted out in late May.

Dahlia tubers are sprouted as described for begonias and after the new sprouts are visible, tubers are divided with a portion of the old stem to each division. Cut surfaces are dusted with sulphur or lime to prevent decay.

Gladioli corms are simply set out as described earlier. Small corms or spawn near the base of mature corms may be separately planted. They will bloom in two years. Planting depth for gladioli will allow for three to five inches of soil above the corm, according to size.

All flowers benefit from a tablespoon of bonemeal per tuber or corm. Bonemeal is high in phosphorus, which is essential for blooming and fruiting.

In the jewellery case are hand-made stone-set pieces and clocks by Albert Wardle. Books on sale are by local writers Bill Wilks, Cathy Ford and Marie Elliott, as well as a full line of B.C. history paperbacks. Ceramic novelties are made by Edona Medcalfe, Flo Dean and Ann Connors and Mr. and Mrs. A. Rodine produce the engraved wood plaques, driftwood pieces and many other unusual handicraft items.

Local photographs, wooden toys, decoupage, dolls, hand-knits, macrame, hasty-notes, hand-loomed items and wood carvings show the many and varied talents of islanders, who come in all age groups from an 11-year-old boy, to a 90-year-old woman. Busy fingers shorten the winter months and in the spring we see the results in art shows and our local studios and galleries.

B.C. Hydro safety officials are keeping their fingers crossed at this time of year as kite flyers send aloft their potentially lethal wind-driven craft.

"A 13-year-old Kamloops boy was severely burned last year when his kite touched a power line," said John Thomson, manager of the Gulf Islands power district. "We are hoping that this year the season will pass without any accidents at all."

Thomson said many British Columbians believe that telephone poles carry only low voltage telephone wires and it is only the lines carried by steel pylons that are dangerous.

"That's a misconception," he said. "Most telephone poles are not telephone poles at all but power poles, usually carrying about 6,900 volts per line. It takes only 110 volts to kill."

Thomson said it takes only a light brush by a kite against a power line to create a connection strong enough to kill a kite flyer.

"The power lines are placed in an elevated position to prevent people from coming into contact with them," he said, "but it takes only a thin kite line to transmit electrical power through the kite flyer to the ground."

Hydro officials are especially concerned about new kinds of Dragon kites made of plastic with aluminized backing and long tails.

Thomson said parents and teachers should go beyond forbidding children to fly their kites near power lines by checking kites to see they contain no metal and making sure that kite lines are made of dry string, never wire or metallic string.

SHOULD BE LEFT

He said children should be told never to fly kites near power lines, but if a kite does catch on a power line or pole, it should be left alone.

"Removing a kite from a pole or line is the job of a trained lineman with the experience and equipment necessary to work near high-voltage electrical equipment," Thomson said.

Warning stickers have been issued to Hydro farm customers and to farm equipment dealers throughout the province spelling out the dangers of accidental contact between powerlines and high-rising farm equipment.

The safety program has been carried out by Hydro for several years and includes the development of safety films, articles in newspapers and Hydro's own publication, *Farm News*.

The warnings use the theme *Look up and live!* and remind farmers, their families and employees to check for overhead powerlines when working with equipment such as irrigation pipes, hay conveyors, aluminum ladders, forage blower pipes, cranes, booms, scaffolding and drilling rigs.

They all become electrical conductors on contact with powerlines. Last year, at least one person was killed and two others injured in accidents involving contact between electric powerlines and irrigation pipes in the interior of the province.

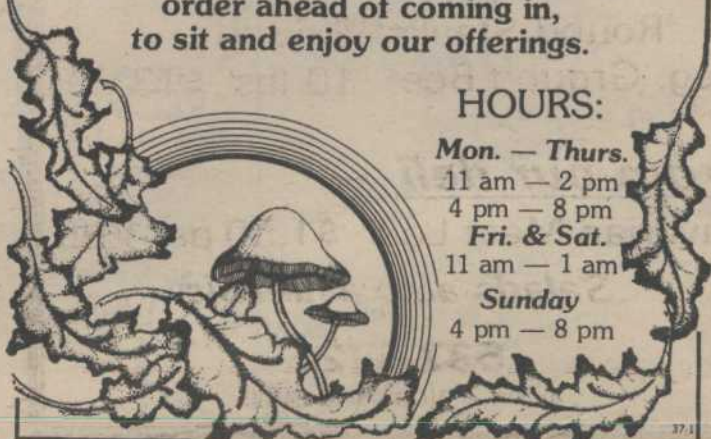

Directors' oratory to be held inviolate for minimum of year

After long debate the Capital Regional Board last week decided to spend \$4,500 on recording equipment to keep records of all debates of the board.

It was initiated as a means of ensuring that no director was misquoted. By Wednesday its purpose was less clear-cut.

The tapes will be available as a corroboration of the minutes. They will not be transcribed unless the board calls for such copying.

The public access to the tapes

was not made clear.

"The citizens are entitled to hear what we say," urged Mel Couvelier of Saanich, warmly commending the purchase.

The meeting then went on to decide that the public would have strictly limited access to the records.

Initial motion to receive and file the report of the committee was defeated, and the directors agreed to keep tapes of their deliberations for at least one year.

Two ways are provided to get opinion on sewer project

It depends on whose opinion is being invited which way the vote is offered.

When the Ganges sewer project was under consideration in the mid-70's there were two alternative means open to its sponsors to get the opinion of the community. The owners of property in the affected area could be invited to sign a petition. Or the residents could be invited to vote on a referendum.

The Capital Regional Board of the period agreed to a petition. The results of the petition were challenged by Yvette Valcourt and others.

Saanich Director John Mika has asked the region to re-present the question in the form of a referendum. He was supported by director Yvette Valcourt.

A referendum would not be presented to the people who signed or refused the petition.

The commercial premises in the Ganges area would have no vote in a referendum. Only residents would vote.

A residential property occupied

by the owner would have the owner vote on the question in a referendum. A residential property rented by a tenant would see the tenant free to express an opinion on behalf of the owner. The owner would be disenfranchised.

The petition, on the other hand, permitted the owners of non-residential property to express an opinion. It permitted the owners of rented property to express their views. It denied a vote to tenants or those who reside in the area but own no property.

The petition required a two-thirds majority. The referendum would be approved if a 51% majority should support the proposal.

The original petition was superseded by the pollution control director's order requiring the installation of a sewer in Ganges.

Upped by 23%

Directors debate big increase in pay at considerable length

Directors of the Capital Regional Board will be paid at a higher rate than in the past.

Last week the directors approved the recommendation, from the finance committee, that a pay hike of 15% and a cost-of-living hike of 7 1/4% be paid members.

Top man on the pay pole is the chairman, Jim Campbell of Saturna. During the debate it was generally agreed that his work load is high and that the time devoted to the job by the board chairman merits a reasonable remuneration.

Chairman gets almost \$2,000 more, going from \$8,551 to \$10,547, or an increase of \$166 per month. The chairman of the Regional Hospital Board continues to receive \$4,274 annually, without any increase.

The directors are paid according to the burden of the work. Top rate is enjoyed by directors from Colwood and Langford. Their reward rises from \$5,870 to \$7,240. Directors from Sooke and Salt Spring are paid \$6,372 instead of the former rate of \$5,166. Those representing Metchosin, View Royal, Outer Gulf Islands, Sidney and North Saanich, respectively, jump from \$4,578 to \$5,647.

AT THE BOTTOM

At the foot of the scale come directors from Victoria, Oak Bay, Esquimalt and Saanich, collecting \$3,620 as against the former rate of \$2,935.

Some opposition was expressed, particularly from directors who felt that it was illogical to boost their own pay by 23% and refuse employees an increase of half of that amount.

Alternate directors will collect \$55 per meeting instead of \$45.

The work load has risen more than 15% for the chairman, members agreed.

Norma Sealey of Sidney stated that her work load has risen 50% since last year and that she has no hesitation in accepting the increase.

Bob Wright of Victoria did not feel that the graduations in remuneration were even within the

authority of the board to devise. They have been in force for a number of years, observed Jim Campbell.

"But not necessarily right," countered Wright.

When John Mika of Saanich called for tabling of the increases, E. A. Lubick was indignant.

"He is also collecting remuneration as a Saanich alderman," he protested. "Not all of us have that!"

Wright was still baffled how directors might justify a 23% increase. His final motion, to have the increases deferred to December 31, was also defeated.

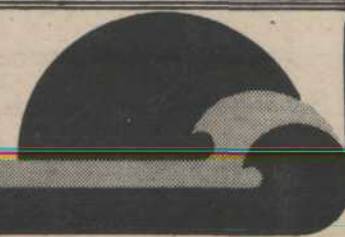

Jack James dies

Percival George (Jack) James, one of Salt Spring Island's most active pioneers, passed away March 26 in Lady Minto Hospital in Ganges.

James was born in 1896 on the Sir James Douglas estate in Victoria where his father served as a caretaker.

After serving in the Royal Canadian Navy during World War One he moved to Salt Spring Island where his parents had established their seed farm. The farm was known as "Barnsbary" and was located on the site of the present golf course.

In 1922 he married Dorothy Lyne of Vancouver and in that same year the couple moved with his parents to the farm in Fernwood, presently owned by the Harkemas.

There the James family started a mail order retail seed business which became the largest business of its type in the province. The James also shipped vegetables to city markets and the CPR boat made special stops at the Fernwood dock to pick up crates of vegetables.

TO COWICHAN

In 1930 the James' business outgrew the Fernwood facilities so the family moved to Cowichan Bay on Vancouver Island. They carried on there until the end of the second world war.

James was hired by the government during the war to supervise the operations of the British ministry of food. The entire province of B.C. was his territory, and he travelled continuously during the war urging farmers to grow more food.

In 1946 he was requested to join the vegetable marketing agency in Kelowna as an agriculturist. He

accepted the position and lived in Kelowna until he retired to Salt Spring in 1960.

Due to ill health he could no longer continue his work with the marketing agency. However, his health did not prevent him from playing an active role in the Gulf Islands community.

Until the day he died, James worked for the government as a consulting horticulturist for the Gulf Islands area. As a result of his contribution to agriculture on the island, he was made a life member of the Farmers' Institute and the Salt Spring Garden Club. His wife Dorothy was also given the same distinction for her participation in the same areas of island life.

James was also a member of the Centennial Park Committee and planned the horticultural work at the park.

In 1968 the James were named citizens of the year on Salt Spring.

Locally produced magazine

In Touch deals with healing; homeopathic, holistic medicine

In Touch is the name of a locally produced magazine that is well on its way to becoming the voice of holistic living for this area.

Originating in Victoria three issues ago, *In Touch* has now become the effort of local volunteers who write the articles and look after the distribution.

The staff of *In Touch* began as a small group of non-professional volunteers interested in natural health and growth, some of them keen followers of astrology and herbology.

Presently, the main energy behind the collective is Patricia Irwin of Salt Spring Island. Covering fields of activity that aren't normally reached by newspapers, *In Touch* orients itself towards healing, homeopathic medicine and holistic medicine.

"It is a journal touching on the healing arts, alternative energy systems and other aspects of living," Irwin writes.

BALANCED LIVING

"The aim of this publication is to provide a news source for local people that will inform them about personal growth and balanced living on their planet."

For example, the last issue included articles on the development of a pedal car, on natural childbirth, seed-saving, nuclear radiation and re-birthing.

Future issues, Irwin said, will focus on renewable energy, "how-to" articles, alternative educational systems and the regular resource directory and calendar of events. Input is mainly from local writers, healers and artists.

Irwin hopes that eventually the journal will publish more than four times a year and that it will serve to pull together people's awareness of their lives as planetary citizens.

"The sooner we all live in that awareness, the sooner we will share one peaceful world."

"Our behaviour, the things we build, the things we think, the way

we behave towards each other are manifestations of our energy that can be directed in positive ways."

Other topics that can be found in issues of *In Touch* include midwifery, psycho-physical exercises, types of yoga-body-work, acupuncture and Chinese medicine.

Waiting for water to drop

Sewage problems continue to plague Lady Minto Hospital

In spite of a \$31,000 rejuvenation project, Lady Minto Hospital's septic tilefield is off the line as requested by the Pollution Control Branch.

The field was recently rejuvenated when regional district engineers discovered that 17 out of 21 tile runs were plugged with grease.

As truckloads of effluent were being pumped daily from the septic tank, district engineers supervised the installation of a new grease trap outside the hospital kitchen and the laying of 17 new tile runs.

When the project was completed less than a month ago sewage pumping ceased and the hospital once again began discharging effluent to the tile field. However, the rising groundwater level has forced the effluent to the surface of the field.

TOO HIGH

The Pollution Control Branch analyzed samples taken from the hospital tilefield at various locations and found that the coliform counts were too high. The branch requested the hospital to return to the practice of pumping out the septic tank. When the groundwater level drops to such a point that it does not cause the surfacing of effluent, the hospital will be allowed to resume using the tilefield.

Hospital administrator Malcolm Pinteau has asked the Pollution Control Branch for permission to use an older tile field that was taken off the system over 10 years ago. Pinteau said that the hospital could quite easily divert effluent to the pre-1969 tilefield and would undertake not to use the field to such an extent that the surfacing of effluent would occur.

Pinteau has also written the Capital Regional District suggesting that they install a sand filtration system for the laundry water, which would greatly cut back the volume of effluent discharged to the tilefield.

TAKE NO ACTION

Pinteau wrote, "We shall take no action with regard to pumping or amendments to our system until we receive your instructions and we shall very much appreciate your early attention to our continuing problem."

The expense of pumping sewage from the hospital septic tank amounts to approximately \$6,000 each month. That was the reason the hospital administration decided

to spend money on a rejuvenation of their tilefield. The project was not designed to solve the long-term problems of the hospital as district engineers believe only a proper sewer system would provide a permanent solution.

The hospital administration has also written the ministry of health

in Victoria requesting assurance that the ministry will provide the necessary funds to meet the costs of pumping the septic tank.

The ministry, which picked up the \$31,000 fee for the rejuvenation project, is expected to pay the pumping fees until such time as the new field can be put back into use.

committee has no plans to initiate a service here anyway.

"It would seem the CRD's only interest in the Gulf Islands in this matter is the \$40,000 to \$50,000 annual income the residents will supply," he writes.

Arnott expresses concern that the financing scheme is "open-ended" so that the regional board is free to increase the Hydro surcharge, initiate a gasoline tax and also levy property taxes as it sees fit.

FLAW

"This evident flaw in the Act, which you authored in 1978 as minister of municipal affairs, became apparent to us all at the beginning of 1979 when the regional board announced the inclusion of all the electoral areas within the district into the taxation area regardless of whether they would be supplied transit or not.

"However," he continues, "you have stated on a number of occasions since last May that Gulf Islanders would not pay taxation without service... so we now urgently... urge you to use your good offices to prevent this travesty of logic and justice."

Arnott says that the CRD decided not to impose the three-cent gas tax after the provincial budget eliminated the 4% sales tax on Hydro bills. He claims it is obvious that the CRD then chose the Hydro surcharge over the gas tax as "a less obvious and controversial tax collecting method."

DISCRIMINATES

"Under whatever guise, it is still taxation that discriminates against Gulf Islanders, who will regard gasoline taxation and a surcharge on Hydro service as one and the same thing."

Arnott concludes with the observation that he feels confident that islanders "can now depend upon the valued support and action from you and your cabinet colleagues before the April 1 deadline".

Curtis has replied to the Transportation Committee, saying he will make "as strong representations as possible" to the regional

board "in an attempt to have it recognize that it is unfair to tax island residents for a service from which they will not benefit."

He says the Capital Region could request the Urban Transit Authority to change the boundaries of the service area "to exempt the Gulf Islands, or, particularly, the Outer Gulf Islands from the Hydro surcharge..."

As of April 1, all residents of the Capital Regional District are to begin paying the Hydro surcharge. For a residential account it will amount to \$12 a year, and for non-residential, \$90 a year.

Pam Taylor, director of diversional therapy, reports that the weather was superb and the travelers spent most of the time on the promenade deck. Each patient and resident had a staff or family member as a companion for the entire journey.

unit. With four or more employees, it is two units. A restaurant is considered two units.

The bylaw outlines the terms of connection whereby each owner is responsible for the connection from the road line and the building. This applies to maintenance and repairs as well as installation.

As a building is connected to the system the owner will be responsible for the abandonment and filling of his septic tank.

These various regulations apply to both projects.

APPLICATIONS

Applications for installation of a sewer connection must be made in writing by the property owner and an accompanying drawing shall show the pipe locations, dimensions, location of clean-outs and, where applicable, location and depth of septic tank.

Property owners have 12 months in which to make the connection once a system is installed. If an owner hasn't done it in the requisite time, the region may make the connection and charge him.

The Maliview bylaws are now in effect, although they have yet to be adopted. The system is in operation and the residents of the area will continue to pay the costs.

The Ganges bylaws are merely paving the way for future installations.
