Retired officer describes Mau-Mau uprising in 50's

Zimbabwe Rhodesia came into being last month. After a long history of strife, the land of Cecil Rhodes relinquished its government by the white minority and accepted a multi-racial administration.

When Charles Sutcliffe spoke to Salt Spring Island Lions Club last week he set the clock back to the time when Africans were engaged in the bloody Mau-Mau uprising as part of the campaign to gain recognition. Sutcliffe headed up the special police in Tanganyika and was engaged in investigating and putting down the vicious society in the 50's.

He made some comparisons between the Kenya-Tanganyika Mau-Mau risings and the later terrorist activities in Rhodesia. During his address the retired police officer used the traditional English names for the various countries because those were the current names at the time he knew them.

He recalled that the greatest difference between the Mau-Mau and the Rhodesian terrorists was in their formation as fighting groups. The Mau-Mau were bound by oaths which totally controlled their behaviour and activities. The Rhodesians were an underground force held together by a common design to gain recognition and control.

Furthermore, the Rhodesian activities were based outside the country. In Kenya and Tanganyika the activists were within the country.

WITH THE KUKUYU

The Mau-Mau outrages were born within the Kukuyu tribe, hill folk whose life was always punctuated by intrigue. The Mau-Mau was the Kukuyu. The Kukuyu had no chiefs. They were guided, or ruled, by elders, all of whom were witch doctors and highly versed in poisons and witchcraft.

The Kukuyu were surrounded by the Masai, who were a fighting people. When they wanted to fight, which was most of the time, they usually fought the Kukuyu.

This pattern of life was torn apart in the 1880's, when the crops failed and the Masai again stole women and cattle from the Kukuyu. The same year saw the arrival of the white settlers.

The tribe, recalled Sutcliffe, was an agricultural people, although without science in their approach to growing crops. They would cut down tracts of jungle, cultivate their crops and move on. The effect of their cultivation was to change the nature of the countryside.

The advent of the British East Africa Company put a change to this process. The company allocated land to the settlers without reference to the fact that it was the cultivated land of the nomadic farmers. They were good settlers and good farmers. They chose crops that would flourish on the local land, coffee, maize and other produce. They also bred animals to the needs of the new climate.

PROSPERITY

The arrival of the white people, with their strict sense of law and order, prohibited the native black people from following the pattern of their forebears. The Masai were restricted from raiding the Kukuyu and the Kukuyu prospered as never before. They grew in numbers and their people needed more land. It was their land, they asserted, despite the fact that it now provided the setting for prosperous new farms.

The farms flourished because labour was plentiful. The Kukuyu gradually became squatters, picking coffee. They lived with their wives and children near the settlers.

When the missionaries arrived schools started up and the Kukuyu children were taught to read and write and other skills.

In the early 1920's a young African became the spokesman for the Kukuyu. Jomo Kenyatta had attended the missionary schools and subsequently graduated from university.

As a leader of African Union, he petitioned the government in London for the return of the Kukuyu lands. He spent a long time in London. For 15 years he lived in the British capital. His life there was notable for two incidents, recalled the speaker. He made two trips to Moscow and he married an Englishwoman.

After the Second World War, Kenyatta returned

to Kenya where he became the leader of the Kukuyu Association.

BY WITCHCRAFT

The Kukuyu still had no chiefs. They were yet governed almost entirely by witchcraft. The white government named various chiefs who were nominally responsible for administration but they were not recognized by the people. If the white administration arrested the chiefs and punished them it was a matter of complete indifference to the rest of the tribe. Those chiefs had no importance to the black people. They were government figureheads.

Among the customs of the Kukuyu which was resisted by the missionaries was that of circumcision. The Kukuyu carried out a primitive surgery on both male and female infants. The character of the tribe was illustrated by the speaker when he recalled an incident which aroused horror among the whites.

A woman missionary refused to permit the young girls in her care to be circumcised. The missionary was kidnapped, circumcised then released.

This was merely the surface outbreak of hostility. Only the Kukuyu themselves knew of the undertow of resistance. There were agitators stirring up the people to an awareness of their loss of property, but neither the government nor the settlers took them seriously.

One of those agitators was Kenyatta.

ENTER THE MAU-MAU

The stage was set. The Mau-Mau came into being. It was a combination of the intrigue for which the people had a particular flair and of the desire for land. Nobody, then or now, has any idea of the origin of the name. All they knew was that the new organization imposed an oath on its members and no Kukuyu would dare to break his oath. The aim of the Mau-Mau was to have every member of the tribe sworn into the brotherhood.

At first the oath was bland. As the organization became stronger the oath became more revolting. It was tied in with sexual practices and blood.

The Mau-Mau not only practiced terrorism. They perfected it. A Kukuyu sworn into the association could be required to murder and mutilate the family for whom he worked.

This was the faction which Charles Sutcliffe was required to combat.

The atrocities undertaken by the Mau-Mau were so revolting that even when reports came into the police office, they were not at first believed.

PAINFUL AND BLOODY

The Mau-Mau murdered their victims as painfully and bloodily as possible. They then cut the hamstrings, or tendons, in the arms and legs. Even if a victim survived the brutality, he was unable to operate as a human being afterwards.

Sutcliffe cited some of the instances where families were butchered by the Mau-Mau.

In the midst of the bloody strife Kenyatta was arrested for membership in an illegal organization and was sent to prison for five years.

It was a fortunate sentence, suggested the speaker. The African leader was thus removed from the vicious crimes of the association and possible retribution. He was also addicted to alcohol at the time, recalled Sutcliffe, a weakness which he overcame during his incarceration.

Kenyatta was one man. The Kukuyu were a large tribe and two million members were sworn into the Mau-Mau, every one terrified to refuse to serve, no matter how evil the project, and fearful of betrayal of the society.

Nevertheless, the government forces won. In the long battle with the Mau-Mau, 11,500 terrorists were killed and 26,600 arrested. The campaign cost \$180 million and 2,044 members of the government forces were killed.

The Mau-Mau collapsed. African pressures continued and control of governments has moved away from the white minorities to be vested in the black as well as the white communities.

Charles Sutcliffe went on to become assistant commissioner of the Hong Kong police, from which appointment he retired to live on Salt Spring Island.

And the affairs of Africa, once so vital to him in his professional role, are now part of history.

Safeguarding their welfare SPCA's objective

Safeguarding the welfare of all animals is the primary concern of local SPCA inspector Christine Wooldridge. For the past 22 years she and a small group of Salt Spring Island residents have carried out the functions of the SPCA in this community.

Those functions are numerous and necessary. Like children, domestic animals rely on their keeper for food, shelter and medicine. Some pet owners do not understand the long-term commitment that must be made when an animal is taken in and make a part of the household.

Wild animals are also regularly cared for by the inspector. An eagle with a broken leg or a deer hit by a car may need the attention of a veterinarian. The SPCA will pay the costs, whether it is for euthanization or short-term care.

Investigating cases of cruelty to animals is another job which the inspector is called upon to perform. The cases are few, but not unheard of. In 1979 the inspector dealt with five cases, including one where two horses were seized and relocated.

NOT PLEASANT

The job is not a pleasant one. In a small community like Salt Spring Island a cruelty case could involve someone that the inspector lives near, possibly making it harder to resolve.

Each month on Salt Spring there are, on the average, three cases of alleged cruelty that the inspector must investigate. Neglect and disinterest are the first signs of

cruelty. The manifestations of neglect can be evident in the animal's appearance. If it is not being fed properly then it won't appear healthy.

Most of the cruelty cases, Wooldridge said, involve horses. Very often people acquire horses for their children without knowing anything about looking after the animal.

MISUNDERSTANDING

Wooldridge investigates each complaint but most of them, she said, end up being a misunderstanding on the part of the complainant.

"People often phone, saying they pass the same farm twice a day and never see food out for the animals. After finding out the usual times of the day that the complainant passes the farm I then drive by the farm myself, but at a different time. Almost always I find that the animals are fed regularly just half an hour or so after the complainant has gone past."

But sometimes the neglect is real. Families with problems at home often take out their frustrations on an unwanted animal. The problem might also be money, or the absence of money. Looking

after any animal can be costly if the services of a veterinarian are needed.

A simple lack of education is another reason why some animals do not get proper care. The SPCA inspector is available to help people who are concerned about giving their animal the right care. Money is available through the society to help with unexpected veterinary costs. Information about how to look after a particular animal can be obtained through the inspector.

PRACTICAL ADVICE

For instance, Wooldridge will inform horse owners if they are having any particular problem in looking after their animal, and she can offer practical advice when problems do exist.

In most cases the questions she asks animal owners make them think a little harder about whether they really want that animal. And in many instances the problem of caring for the animal is solved when the owner decides that it would be best to sell it.

Wooldridge finds it very easy, she said, to be sentimental with animals. She and her husband, Dr. David Wooldridge, who is president of the Salt Spring auxiliary to the SPCA are "surrounded" by eight ponies, eight dogs and five cats.

She grew up on a farm in England, which she and her mother ran, and later she attained a university degree in horticulture.

BRED PONIES, DOGS

In 1960, the Wooldridges moved from England to Calgary where they spent 16 years breeding half-Arab ponies and Norwegian elkhound dogs. They came to Salt Spring Island in 1976 and purchased the MacGregor farm on the southeast slope of Mount Maxwell.

In 1977 a meeting was held at the Wooldridges home to see if anyone on the island was interested in

starting an auxiliary branch to the Victoria SPCA. At that time Bill Leach, now the animal control officer for the Capital Regional District, was an executive director for the B.C. SPCA. Leach attended the meeting along with seven other people who later formed the present auxiliary.

Pat Fullerton was elected president and David Wooldridge was, in his absence, elected vice-president. The other members of the group were Hazel Thomson, Joe Stewart and Grace Bracher.

ACTIVITIES GREW

They started off slowly, attempting to help solve the perennial stray cat problem, and forming a registry of lost and found animals. But very quickly the activities of the auxiliary grew to where it became necessary to use the services of the local answering service.

Early in 1979 the Victoria branch began to run a spay-neuter program through a clinic in their city. When Salt Spring veterinarian Dr. Claus Andress offered to take part in a similar program on the island, the local SPCA became even more effective in serving the community. In 1979 the auxiliary assisted in 37 spay-neuters.

The program is designed for owners who can't afford to have the job done. The customer and the SPCA each pay a portion of the cost and the vet subsidizes the rest. Applications for the program can be obtained at Annie's Access in Ganges. One family is restricted to one animal per year in using the program.

SHOULD BE ALTERED

Animals that are not going to be used for breeding should be altered, Wooldridge recommends.

One thing unique about the Salt Spring auxiliary is that it has access to the animal shelter operated by the Victoria branch. Wooldridge said if she gets a call from someone who doesn't want an animal it can be transported into Victoria and looked after at the Victoria shelter at no expense to the local auxiliary. The animal will be kept at the shelter for three weeks before any decision is made about it.

Water conservation 'of utmost importance'

April was a relatively dry month, and three days accounted for more than half the total rainfall. The month also gave us quite a lot of sunny days, or days with more sun than cloud.

There was an absence of frost, but frost was possible in low-lying spots. At the moment the land is relatively damp, quite enough to start germination, but I can see a note of warning. The height of water in any creek or river, when not in spate, shows the run-off from the surrounding land. Mayne does not cover a very large area, so the reading at any point is approximately correct for the whole island. We do get variations, but they are slight.

My creek became just a series of pools, not too many of them, on the last day of the present month. I have lived within yards of that creek for well over 30 years, and in all that time it has never dried up before early June, the average

being mid-June.

It has usually recommenced in mid-November, but last fall it was early December when it began to run. This can only lead to one conclusion: the moisture in the land has reached a new low, and this is our only source of potable water. I have drawn attention to this fact many times.

This whole area is in a rain shadow, meaning that we get less rain than surrounding areas. At the present time sunspots are at their maximum, and this invariably means a dry period. Every indication points to a shortage, if not a lack of water this summer. I notice that across all western Canada forestry departments are bracing for one of the driest summers on record.

We have had dry summers before, but there was much more timber on the island and timber does hold the water in the land. Water conservation would appear to be of the utmost importance in 1980.

The 1 1/2 was transposed into 12!!! (The purchase price of \$55,000 mentioned later was of course for that 1 1/2 acre lot)

Having cleared that up, to nobody's satisfaction but my own, I must confess that three days in a luxurious Vancouver hotel is not the best base from which to write a column on poverty and justice.

EDUCATIONAL

However, the purpose of my visit was educational, not self-indulgent! I was attending the annual general meeting of the B.C. School Trustees Association, and it was indeed an educational experience!

There were 30 or more motions or resolutions before the assembly, and time after time, when the vote was called for, our board was characteristically split, two "Ayes" and two "Nays". A neighbouring trustee leaned across at one such juncture and said to us sympathetically, "Now I understand what you have to put up with!"

literacy - "Back to Basics" is really little more than nostalgia. We have to enable children to examine and evaluate the visual impact of the media so that they will not become its victims.

UNABLE TO HELP

This was a phrase I heard over and over from different speakers. Children learn discrimination, or they will be victimized by the consumer-creating media. Many parents are unable to be of much help in this direction, as they themselves are the unwitting victims of a system of merchandizing without morality.

As I walked along West Georgia on Saturday, around 5.30 pm, a young man jumped out of a 15th floor window of the Four Seasons. His fall was broken by the canopy over a side door, and when I arrived at the scene he was just being placed on a stretcher prior to being lowered to the ambulance. It was a heart-stopping moment, and along with the prayers I said for the unknown victim, I was painfully aware of the contrast of the scenes I had just left.

I find the opulence of big hotels increasingly offensive. There are printed notices in some asking patrons to save energy by turning

off air conditioning and unwanted lights. They then change the towels and sheets every day, even when the same person is occupying the room for, say, three days!

The quantity and quality of the food is gross, when two-thirds of the world is starving. The furnishings and lighting are unnecessarily extravagant. One man said to me "each hotel has its own 'glow'. The danger is when you begin to think that is natural!"


WATER A DELIGHT

One delight was being able to drink the water!

We spent nearly \$40 on a water purifier for our kitchen tap, and although I suppose it makes some difference, our tea, coffee and water itself taste awful! I understand it has something to do with the bottom of St. Mary Lake turning over, but whatever the cause, the effect is disgusting. If we all become sick from the water, who do we sue? The water company, or God?

In many parts of the world, women spend most of their waking hours just carrying water from miles and miles away. I bet that water tastes sweet to them and their families and its probably dirtier than ours!

It was great to see Valdy in Vancouver. As the star of the movie made by the BCSTA, *Local Autonomy - a good thing getting better*, and also in person, I congratulated him on "making like an actor" and he loved it. What a delightful guy he is - he's given so much pleasure to the kids in the Alternate Class, that they will never forget him.





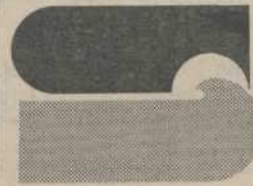

Story of Jamaica

Galiano students hear first-hand report on its customs

Last Friday, April 25, was a busy day at Galiano School.

BASKETBALL GAME

Mayne Island School came to Galiano to play basketball. It was a fast 45-minute game and was quite well played. Mrs. Cocker, the Mayne coach, was a very good referee. The finishing score was in favour of the Galiano grade 5,6,7 class. Good sportsmanship was shown on both sides. - By Megan Foster, Grade 7.

JAMAICA

Mr. and Mrs. Doug Fletcher, who live in Jamaica, came to give the Galiano school children a lecture about that country. They have some information to pass on.

They started out by talking about Jamaica's climate. It is summer all-year-round and the temperature

only drops at night. Still, they only cover themselves with a sheet while sleeping.

They also talked about co-co. In Jamaica, the seeds are boiled and made into a tea. They also are ground for export out of the country. It has been discovered that this plant has no nutritional value at all!

COCONUTS

Coconuts were another topic. There are many different stages when a coconut is growing. When it is green in colour it is all water inside and not meat. Then gradually the water changes to a jelly and when it is fully mature is hardened. Often coconuts are carved into plant holders and sold to tourists.

Mr. Fletcher also brought a

machete with him and told us a bit about it.

"Machete" is actually pronounced "machtet" - a fact that many people do not realize. The machete is used for everything - from chopping vegetables to cutting down trees. It is so sharp that some Jamaicans use it for shaving in the mornings!

BREAKER BEAN

There is a bean pod that, when it becomes hardened, falls off the tree. This was often used as a weapon if a machete was not within reach. It is hard enough to break a neck with and was often used to do so.

Bananas are another important part of Jamaica. They are grown everywhere. They must be taken out of the ground and laid on top of

it to receive oxygen. This must be done every five years or the tree will no longer reproduce.

Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher also passed around bits of a bean that tasted like molasses. Then leaves were given to everyone. They smelled like allspice and lemons. There were also many coloured leaves that were interesting to look at.

Mr. Fletcher told us that instead of blossoms, many plants have colourful leaves.

BEAN YO YO

We also saw a Jamaican yo-yo. It was made out of the hollow beans and went sideways instead of up and down. Mr. Fletcher said it cost the equivalent of 25c. in Canadian money. He remarked that land was

also very cheap. He said it cost hundreds of dollars in Jamaica compared to thousands in Canada. He also told us it is possible to live very cheaply in Jamaica.

We also learned that goats are permitted to wander in the streets. It is very unlikely that you'll hit a person in Jamaica but quite possible that you'll hit a goat!

Shells of enormous sizes can be found lying all over the beaches. Also there are small shells that are so thin that they can be seen through.

All the information that Fletchers gave us was very interesting. It was fascinating to learn what life is like in Jamaica. We appreciated them coming. - Claire Thomas, Grade 7.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Transit matter tabled by board

A good part of the Capital Regional District Board Meeting, April 23, was taken up discussing Salt Spring and the transit service area. As alternate director, I stated that the residents of Salt Spring did not want to be included in the transit service area.

Mr. Campbell was asked if the Outer Gulf Islands also wanted out and he replied that they did not. Several of the directors felt that since Salt Spring was an island and would receive no service they should be allowed to opt out.

The following recommendation from the transit planning and management committee was voted on and defeated.

"That the Capital Regional Board take no action in 1980 on the request of the Honourable H.A. Curtis to amend the transit service area to exclude the Gulf Island but that a review of the effectiveness of transit be conducted prior to the signing the transit operating agreement for 1981."

(A written request was received from Curtis to exclude the Gulf Islands from participation in transit cost sharing. The committee felt that a review must be undertaken on the effectiveness of transit service in the CRD before any

amendment to the transit service area be considered).

However, before any further action could be taken a coffee break was called and when the meeting resumed, Dennis Young (secretary) was asked what the count had been. He replied that he had not marked it down and did not remember.

Mr. Campbell seemed to feel that because of this there should be another vote. The second vote was held and resulted in a tie. The matter was then tabled.

Director Couvelier asked that the alternate director from Salt Spring say something about the sewer problem in Ganges so the directors would get another person's view on the subject.

I stated that there were two main concerns about the sewer:

1. The people did not want the harbour polluted. They did not

want there to be any possible chance of the harbour being polluted.

2 The enormous cost to the people.

I added that there were many people who just could not afford the cost and were very concerned that they might have to sell their homes. If the sewer is designed to enable some property owners to develop their property and reap a profit while others on low and fixed incomes were forced to pay for something they did not need and could not afford, then it was very unfair.

FIVE YEARS AGO

New sewer committee has been formed to investigate a sewer system for the Ganges community. Taking part in discussions on the question are Lionel Coulthard, George Heinekey, Mike Larmour, Paul Layard, Spencer Marr, Isobel Marr, Norman Mouat and Tom Toynbee. Initial discussions have centred on bringing the statistics and information up to date as well as discussions of alternative methods of disposal. Oxidation of ditches and land disposal are being considered.

May Day is growing up. Salt Spring Island will mark May Day with a program running from breakfast to supper-time. The annual gala day on Salt Spring Island was given a shot in the arm last year, when Jack Albhouse took over the reigns for the Salt Spring Island Chamber of Commerce in a drive for recreation funds. The same man is behind the scenes this year.

TEN YEARS AGO

Hospital Day and energy

Energy conservation as a health care priority in the 1980's will be the theme of Hospital Day at Lady Minto Hospital.

Patients, staff and visitors will be pressed to reduce the consumption of power when the islands hospital marks Hospital Day on Monday, May 12.

Energy conservation is a high priority at the Ganges hospital, Plant Manager Stan Carlyle told Driftwood this week.

Salt Spring Lands is donating land proceeds to Pioneer Village and the centennial project. A lot has recently been sold for \$2,250, \$1,450 of which will be given to the Pioneer Village project and the balance of \$800 will go to the centennial committee for the local centennial project.

Proposed By-law No. 13 for Mayne Island is a By-law to amend the "Official Community Plan (Mayne Island) By-law, 1978", by deleting the Mayne Island Community Plan Map as described in Part 1, Section 1.1 and replacing therewith a new Map identified as, "The Mayne Island Official Community Plan Map, 1980"; and which is attached to the proposed By-law.

2. Proposed Zoning By-law No. 8 for Mayne Island is a By-law to regulate the use of land, buildings and structures and regulate the height and siting of buildings and structures on Mayne Island. The regulatory provisions of this By-law have been drawn up to conform as closely as possible with the policies contained in the Official Community Plan for Mayne Island, adopted by Mayne Island Trust Committee By-law No. 2 in 1978. The By-law establishes both provisions of general applicability and provisions and regulations for each of the seventeen (17) zones established by the By-law.

In response to an application and in conformity with the Official Community Plan for Mayne Island, a portion of Lot 4, Plan 15263, Section 8, Mayne Island is proposed to be zoned Settlement Commercial (Limited) - C2L.

The 'General Provisions' section of the proposed By-law includes regulations and requirements for such items as the issuance of Development permits; building setbacks from lakes, swamps, ponds and the sea; home occupations and off-street parking.

The zones may be summarized as follows:

SETTLEMENT RESIDENTIAL (SR) ZONE

Allows for land uses such as residential, Public Service, Parks, Agricultural, Home Occupations, and Residential guest accommodation of a parcel of land in this zone. One single family dwelling unit per .6 hectare is permitted in this zone.

RURAL (R) ZONE

Allows for land uses such as residential, Agricultural, Horticultural, boarding and breeding of animals, Veterinarian hospitals, Riding stables, Ecological Reserves, Parks and Home Occupation on a parcel of land in this zone. In addition processing and sale of agricultural products and Residential guest accommodation use of a parcel is permitted. One single family dwelling unit per 4 hectares is permitted in this zone.

UPLAND (UP) ZONE

Allows for land uses such as residential, Agricultural, Riding stables, Ecological Reserves, Public Park, Public utility, Home Occupation, Residential guest accommodation, processing and sale of agricultural products on a parcel of land in this zone. One single family dwelling unit per ten hectares is permitted in this zone.

AGRICULTURAL (AG) ZONE

Recognizes Agricultural Land Reserve lands and allows for land uses such as those permitted in the Agricultural Land Commission Act. Except as otherwise permitted by the Provincial Agricultural Land Commission, one single dwelling unit per parcel is permitted.

COMMERCIAL ZONES (C-1, C-2, C2L, C-3, C-4, C-5)

Allow for a range of commercial services and retail uses of land in these zones, except for the C2L Zone. Each zone permits a single family residential unit in conjunction with the commercial use, under specified conditions.

INDUSTRIAL (I) ZONE

Allows for land uses such as Light processing, manufacturing, assembly and repair, warehousing and storage on a parcel of land in this zone. One dwelling unit for the owner, manager, operator or employees is permitted.

PUBLIC SERVICE (PS) ZONE

Establishes a zone to provide for the development of public service facilities, public parks and public recreational facilities.

PRIVATE RECREATION (PR) ZONE

Establishes a zone to provide for the development of private recreational facilities.

WATER ZONES (W-1, W-2, W-3, W-4)

Regulate the use of water and foreshore areas. W-1 provides for the preservation of certain foreshore and water areas. W-2 permits non-commercial and non-industrial boat moorage. W-3 provides for foreshore oriented commercial facilities. W-4 provides for foreshore oriented industrial uses.

This By-law will not supersede the provisions of the Agricultural Land Commission Act and where land is classified as Agricultural Land Reserve, the provisions of the Agricultural Land Commission Act shall take precedence over the By-law.

Directors worth three times more

If a politician's worth is related to the salary he's paid, then Capital Region directors are nearly three times more valuable than school trustees and members of the Islands Trust.

A survey shows that salaries paid to members of the Capital Regional Board almost triple the stipends received by elected officials of the other two local jurisdictions.

And in the case of the chairmen, the disparity is greater. Regional board chairman Jim Campbell gets \$16,194 annually; John Rich of the Islands Trust is paid \$9,600; and Ivan Mouat, chairman of the school board, takes home \$2,000.

The amount of pay the directors of the Capital Region receive depends on the area

they represent. Directors from Salt Spring Island and Sooke, earn \$6,372 annually. Their colleagues from the Outer Gulf Islands, Metchosin, View Royal, Sidney and North Saanich get \$725 a year less.

The Islands Trust has been trying to persuade the government to increase the \$1,600 yearly stipend paid to trustees, but one official said the request has fallen on deaf ears.

The two vice-chairmen of the Trust are paid \$7,600 yearly.

Those filling elected positions on the school boards across the province are paid \$200 each month during the 10 months that the schools are in session.

Last weekend school trustees learned at the annual meeting of the B.C. School Trustees Association that their pay rate may be increased.

Increased taxes necessary to complete major improvements

Consumption of drinking water in the North Salt Spring Waterworks District was up five per cent last year and few, if any, shortages occurred, the annual meeting of the district was told last week.

In 1979 nearly 64 million gallons of water were consumed by the water district's members.

The board of trustees reported that the system operated satisfactorily, although peak demands during the summer were again of serious concern. Water pressures dropped to uncomfortably low figures at various places even though stringent sprinkling restrictions were imposed.

There were two vacancies on the board of trustees this year with three men running for office. Don Lochhead and Dr. Bud Kreissl were re-elected to the board, and Ira Tepper was the unsuccessful candidate. Sixty-three ballots were cast.

HIGHER TAXES

In the trustees' annual report, higher taxes and fees were forecast at least until the major improvements being planned for the system are completed. After that members can expect a sharp decline in new expenditures and an increased membership to shoulder the financial load.

The amount of the increased tolls and fees, the report stated, depends on how successful the district is in obtaining provincial government assistance.

Plans have been advanced to increase the pumping capacity of the St. Mary Lake pumping station, and the Vesuvius pipeline from Tripp Road to Sunset Drive will be enlarged.

The full benefit of the new portion of the Cranberry main will not be felt until it is completed to Maxwell Lake. Approximately 11,000 feet of the 17,000 foot Cranberry main has been converted to 10-inch diameter pipe, replacing the 28-year-old four-inch main that was too small and had deteriorated seriously. The new main is designed to take all the water available from the Maxwell watershed.

Completion of the project includes an extension to the lake, the construction of a new intake and the construction of a dam to increase the storage capacity of the lake.

NEXT ONE COSTLY

The cost of the section completed was \$325,413, which includes interim financing. The next section will be difficult and costly, the report said, as the line must go through a rocky gorge and a long stretch of swamp.

The Donore tank was completed in time to assist in maintaining water pressure to the Donore Heights area. The final cost of this project was \$34,162.

The lower Ganges Road pipeline of eight-inch diameter, extending from Central to Booth Canal Road was completed early in the year. The project, which trustees say proved to be a great benefit to the maintenance of adequate water pressures, cost \$ 76,603.

"Much more upgrading will be necessary in the following years if we are to maintain satisfactory service to you," Trustees reported. "We are roughly half way through the updating program that was outlined to you some three years ago."

MORE COSTLY

"All this work is costly and becoming more so due to inflation

and to the extremely high interest rates."

A continuing program of testing the water quality at St. Mary Lake has been undertaken by the district in conjunction with the department of health and the ministry of environment. The quality of water in the lake remains within the government health standards. When the testing program has been completed a further study will be undertaken to determine the best manner in which the advanced state of eutrophication of the lake can best be combated.

In concluding their report, the trustees reminded the membership that at the beginning of 1979 the water district, along with all other water improvement districts in the province, was transferred from the control of the ministry of environment to the ministry of municipal affairs.

estimated value of the actual lakefrontage, the developers said.

Larmour said he hopes the property would not be used by the government as a park. "Parks are usually used to the limit which would contradict our efforts to control water quality," Larmour said.

NO CONTROL

The water district would have no control over the property if it became a park and park officials would likely give recreation the highest priority, he added.

A subdivision means approximately 11 homes would be built, which the developers feel would not seriously threaten the lake. But Larmour is concerned that the pressure of property taxes 20 years from now could force lot owners to subdivide their 10 acres.

But Mouat, who was also a trustee of the water district for 13 years, said he believes the opposite will happen, as larger lots are becoming increasingly more attractive to buyers.

St. Mary Lake is considered the most important source of water on the island. Mouat said that he feels very strongly that the watershed area should be preserved. "It would cost each person taking their water from the lake less than \$100 to preserve that watershed," he said. "If the community wished to participate they would have our assistance," he added, referring to himself and his partner, Rod Pringle.

Mouat said that his company is moving ahead "very slowly" with the development plans and that letting the property sit means incurring a "great expense".

North Salt Spring Waterworks sent a letter last week to Victoria requesting a meeting with Chabot. Hugh Curtis, minister of finance and MLA for the islands, "has expressed his concern and is sympathetic to our cause," Larmour said.
