

One win, one loss for Screaming Eagles

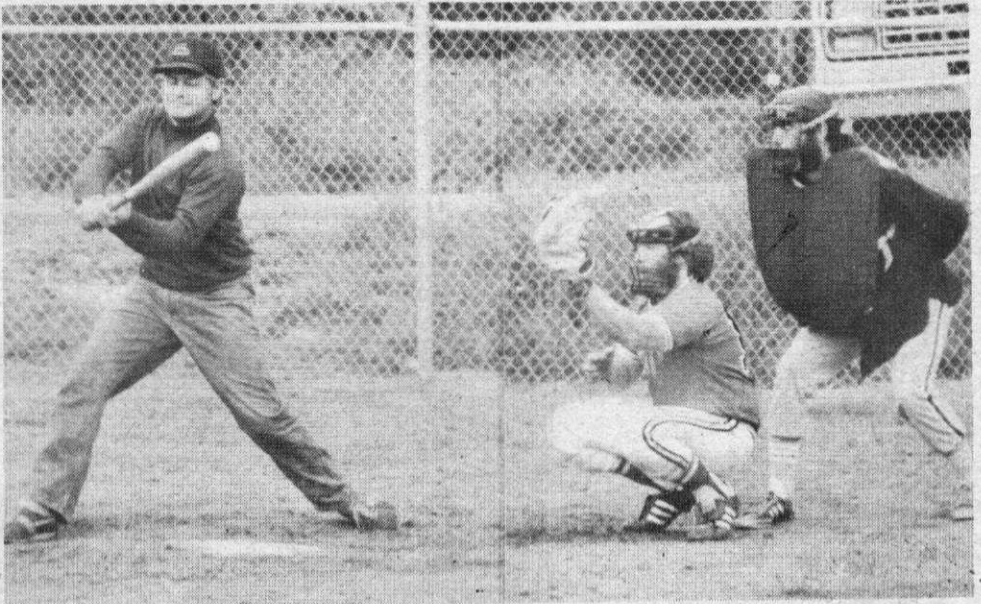

No sale

The Gulf Islands School District's plan to sell its Isabella Point Road property has been scrapped as a result of a protest launched by the South Salt Spring Residents' Association.

School trustees voted unanimously not to proceed with the sale of 0.61 acres which had been donated to the district by Johnny Pallow, one of the island's early Hawaiian settlers.

At the board's regular meeting last week secretary-treasurer Wilf Peck read a letter from the residents' association and reminded the trustees of a petition signed by 50 Isabella Point Road residents.

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Galiano

Expedition to Galiano for patients from Lady Minto last week

Seven visitors from the intermediate and extended care departments of Lady Minto Hospital boarded the ferry last Wednesday, en route for a pleasant evening on Galiano. The four wheelchair patients were carried to the promenade deck by crew-members of the *Queen of Sidney*.

The expedition was arranged and led by Mrs. Pamela Taylor, director of diversional therapy, accompanied by her husband and a staff orderly. After supper was served by Jessie Bellhouse and Winnie Liver at Jessie's home, the guests were transported to Bluff Park to enjoy the view of Active Pass.

Included in the troupe were former residents of Galiano, Mrs. Mel Spouse and Mrs. Bil Kolosoff. Mel joined the party, as did Mrs. Jean Patterson to greet her mother, Mrs. Mary Cranswick. The success of the outing was confirmed by the proposal to repeat the experience at monthly intervals.

JOINT EXERCISE

On the evening of Monday, May 26, the alarm rings on the emergency phones alerted the fire department to a fire at the old Zala house in the valley. The house was occupied at the time by Pat Doyle whose "son", Drew, was trapped in the upper storey. Mr. Doyle, who attempted to rescue Drew, suffered a broken leg when the burning staircase he was mounting collapsed. Both he and Drew suffered second and third degree burns and the boy was also affected by smoke inhalation.

The volunteer firemen arrived in time to rescue both victims, Drew having to be evacuated through a second-storey window and carried down an extension ladder. Under the direction of Fire Chief Chester Williams the fire was eventually extinguished but only after the pumper had poured several thousand gallons of water on the blazing building. The new 1,000-gallon holding tank was brought into use for the first time, and the tanker truck was used to replenish it so that the pumper could draw continuously from this supplementary supply.

The victims were treated by members of the volunteer ambulance service, co-ordinated by Peter Dunn. Some of the injuries were treated on the spot but the burns needed specialized attention. A helicopter was called and the injured man and boy were conveyed to Vancouver General Hospital for treatment in the Burn Unit where both are making satisfactory progress.

The scenario for this realistic simulation exercise was devised by Ken Hardy. The objective was to provide practice for the firemen and ambulance attendants in working together in an emergency situation. Many valuable lessons were learned by those taking part, in particular the parking of emergency vehicles in limited space and the distribution of personnel posed a number of problems.

The communications system was given a thorough testing and the portable storage tank proved a valuable addition to the equipment now available for fighting fires.

GALIANO SHOWBOAT

What is hoped to become an annual event, Galiano Showboat filled the Community Hall to capacity on Saturday evening.

The cast was a judicious blend of youth and age from young Jean Eastbrook performing a charming ballet solo to senior citizen Joe Fleming reciting a humorous, anatomical monologue.

The curtain rose to reveal a backdrop of wheeling seagulls and Loney Rockeyfella who compered the evening. To young Michelle Laughlin fell the onerous task of getting the evening under way with her recitation of *The Twins*. Music played a prominent part in the program with the guitar the most popular instrument.

The Sweet Adelines, a group of seven young ladies conducted by Elizabeth Brinson, rendered old favourites in close harmony with stray catches of syncopation. An interesting combo consisting of Pat Weaver on accordion, Chris Bird and Dan on guitar and Francine Renaud on violin played ballads, jigs and reels.

Variety was added by a demonstration of martial art by Roy Trelaw, story telling by Steven Nemtin, ballads by Keith Holmes, juggling by Spar Street and a skit with a cast too numerous to mention. The piece de resistance was the Galiano School Ukelele Band, a disciplined well-trained group directed by Elizabeth Brinson, who played and sang with verve and cheerfulness, including their own composition, the *Galiano Song*.

The proceeds from the evening's performance go to the Galiano Club to help finance some of the many activities it undertakes on behalf of the community.

POETS' CORNER

Westminster Abbey has its "Poets' Corner", where many of Britain's illustrious bards are buried. Galiano has a poet's corner on a

community notice board outside the Corner Store. Almost hidden among the "for sale", "work wanted", and community events notices was pinned a small scrap of paper on which was written a poem in praise of Wednesdays.

Echoing the sentiments of many islanders, the anonymous poet, who signed herself D.L., began by deriding the concept of the quiet Sunday on Galiano. She then continued by praising Wednesday, when the three island stores are shut and roads are quiet. These few lines, penned perhaps by one of Canada's most famous poets, added a nice touch to a mess of commercial messages. Why not make this "poet's corner" a feature of each community notice board to encourage the gentle art? **NATURE NOTES**

The first of the harvest brodiaea are now blooming on the bluffs. Only a few inches high with leaves which have withered by the time the buds are open, the flowers are conspicuous for their beauty. The six petals, an indescribable combination of blue, purple and violet, form a small trumpet. Set in the heart are three white stamens with three sterile stamens looking like small white petals.

Named for Scottish botanist James Brodie, the Latin adjective is "coronia", meaning "related to a garland", referring to the chaplet of successively opening flowers on a single stem.

The western columbine is also blooming in damp, shady places. The five scarlet petals have tips swollen by nectar accessible only to a creature with a long tongue. Lewis J. Clark writes that this wild flower is easily transplanted to the garden where it will self-seed and prove a great attraction to swallowtail butterflies and rufous humming birds.

It must be the 1980's. The age of instant dinners, instant families, instant farms. So much for my petunias.

Who isn't intimidated by a chainsaw? I've spent a lot of years pushing a Swede saw back and forth for firewood. But faced with clearing out young maples from around my vegetable garden I decided I would try the formidable machine. Undoubtedly one could develop a very good pitching arm trying to start it. But once it was going the prevailing thought in my mind was that I would come out of it all with at least one less leg. I soon got the hang of it, however, and by the time I was done I felt like a new woman. Who says we can't do anything just as well when we put our minds to it?

FOR THE 24TH TIME

I recently read of a fellow named Glynn "Scotty" Wolfe, aged 71, who was getting married for the 24th time to a 17-year-old girl. I calculate that to be a marriage approximately every two years if you assume he started at the age of 16.

Wolfe has the distinction of being the world record-holder for the most marriages, according to Guinness. At least as his wife-to-be, one would have no illusions.

I've been trying to estimate my minimal erythema dose. According to *Consumer Reports* magazine, that is the factor most conveniently understood when figuring out your sun exposure limit. It's tanning time and the most in-depth survey (wow) I've ever read consists of seven pages in the aforementioned magazine dealing with all the data relating to getting a tan or avoiding a tan if the sun has an adverse effect on your health.

What you want, to achieve a great tan, is just the right amount of exposure to the sun in increasing amounts each day. So if you know how long it takes for your skin to redden, you can predict and schedule the consequences of further exposure.

DAILY EXPOSURE

To tan without burning, *Consumer Reports* advises "the quickest

route to a tan entails a daily ultra-violet radiation exposure (the rays of the sun's spectrum that produce that 'sexy, healthy-looking glow') of about double your minimal erythema dose. That's the exposure time that keeps the skin in a state of painless redness and the pigment cells at maximum production of melanin."

It all seems too difficult to me. But wait, there are simpler ways of acquiring a tan. It seems that "tanning booths" are becoming a popular fad. These emporiums provide you with a small room with about 24 fluorescent sunlamps, and privacy so you can tan everywhere, for about \$2 - \$5 a visit. So now you can be brown all year round.

And if that's too expensive, they've invented a nice, simple pill that contains an artificial carotenoid dye (such as is used in colouring butter or cheese) that stains the fat tissue under the skin so you look brown. Isn't that nice? It's an insane world.

SOUNDS HARMLESS

The mention of an artificial carotenoid dye lead me to search further. So I looked it up in *A Consumer's Dictionary of Food Additives*. It sounds harmless.

"Found in all plants and in many animal tissues, it is the chief yellow colouring matter of carrots, butter and egg yolk. Extracted as red crystals or crystalline powder, it is used as a vegetable dye in butter, margarine, shortening, skimmed milk, buttermilk and cottage cheese.

"It is also used to manufacture vitamin A and is a nutrient added to skimmed milk, vegetable shortening and margarine... Insoluble in water, acids and alkalis. Too much carotene in the blood... can lead to carotinemia, a pale yellow-red pigmentation of the skin that may be mistaken for jaundice. It is a benign condition and withdrawal of carotene from the diet cures it."

So don't be alarmed. Yet.

Official recognition for principal

Salt Spring Elementary School principal Tom Watson has been given official recognition by the ministry of education for outstanding work as a school administrator.

A copy of the letter sent to Watson was read to Gulf Islands school trustees at their regular meeting last Wednesday.

Education Minister Brian Smith wrote that he appreciated the outstanding service that the principal had provided in this district. The board was told that the congratulatory message was the result of a report to the ministry filed by district superintendent Bob Huestis.

Objection raised to airstrip at Pender

An airstrip being constructed near Clam Bay Road on Pender Island is "entirely unnecessary", an Islands Trust member for Pender said Monday.

Trustee Gordon Wallace told *Driftwood* that the landing strip presently under construction is not needed because the island already has one.

Several residents of both Pender and Mayne Islands have voiced objection to the strip because of potential noise pollution, he said.

No application has been made to the Agricultural Land Commission for conditional use of the farmland. Wallace said he has informed the enforcement division of the commission that a violation is taking place.

Bob Fearn, owner and builder of the landing field, said he did not apply to the land commission because he is opposed to rules and regulations that govern what a man does on his own land.

Fearn said that his small two-seater Cessna would be the only plane landing on the field. The topsoil on the field was rotovated and levelled but not removed, he told *Driftwood*.

A pilot with a major Canadian airline, Fearn said that in the past he has protested noise pollution

from aircraft. He claimed to be sensitive about noisy engines and said that his Cessna makes no more noise than a lawn mower.

He said he uses his plane about 40 hours a year to commute to Vancouver, and has been landing his plane at the present Pender Island airstrip for five years. He said it would be more convenient for him to use his own field.

The agricultural value of the land would not be damaged, Fearn claimed.

"I'm not about to destroy a field that I've cultivated and farmed for eight years. And if it wasn't for my effort, 30 acres of land on this island could not be used for farming."

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Frost danger over

Time now for tender plants

Now that the danger of a late frost has passed we can set out our pepper, cucumber, squash and other tender plants.

Take it easy with the nitrogen for the peppers, or tomatoes for that matter. Lots of nitrogen will result in abundant green growth without any fruit.

Peppers, like tomatoes, can be planted deeply to encourage large root systems. Side-dress peppers and tomatoes with high phosphorous fertilizer such as seaweed fertilizer of seaweed tea (2 lbs. seaweed to one gallon of water, let steep).

Try a few peony cages or similar small wire cages around your pepper plants this year. Gardeners report a three-fold increase in fruit.

For your winter-storage cabbages the beginning of June is the latest to seed directly outdoors. Storage cabbages mature slowly and do not start making heads until August for harvesting in October.

Other vegetables, such as beans, carrots, beets and kale, can be sown at two-week intervals to as late as July 15 for a succession of fresh crops. Later sowings of the cool weather crops such as lettuce, spinach and radishes will extend the fresh vegetable season with welcome variety.

WATCH THE WEEDS

Keep on top of the weeds. Young onions especially cannot stand any competition from weeds; they are easily overwhelmed and completely lost among the weeds. Use weeds as a mulch, but wait until your soil is thoroughly warm, otherwise the mulch will keep your soil too cool.

Late June and early July, depending on location, is soon enough to apply mulches. Apply them thickly (approximately four to six inches deep) to keep weeds down and to preserve moisture in the soil. As an added benefit the mulch will provide nutrients (nitrogen from

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leafy mulches, phosphorous from seaweed and potash from straw-type mulches) and organic matter to your soil. If at all possible use some type of drip irrigation system to conserve water and provide deep moisture penetration.

ONLY ONCE OR TWICE

The long, slow and deep soak need only be provided once or twice a week. It will also result in deep-rooted, drought-resistant plants.

The simplest drip irrigation system consists of cans with a few small holes in the bottom, just enough to allow a slow drip. Manure or seaweed in these cans will provide readily available nutrients as well. The cans may be sunk partially or totally into the ground, depending on size.

This about covers the launching of our gardens. Just a short note on carrots: the pointed kinds are better suited to light sandy loams, whereas the blunt-tipped sorts do better in heavy clay loams or muck soils.

All we need to do now, until harvest, is to weed, water, mulch

and side-dress with fertilizer as required. Vegies which require thinning, such as carrots and beets, should be thinned out often and generously. Crowding will result in misshapen produce and reduced yields. So give them lots of room and watch them thrive and grow.

HARD ON THEM

With the rhododendron season almost over, a few hints on rhodos. Going to seed is very hard on them. Break off all spent blossoms. This will also reveal the new green shoots. If there are any less than three new shoots of about the same length under the spent blossom, pinch the shoots off as well.

Three or more new shoots will grow and result in a denser, more compact shrub with more blossoms. Also fertilize your rhodos and azaleas again to assist the new growth.

For compact mugho-mugho pines the new candles should now be cut back or cut in half. This will force growth energy into side shoots, resulting in a dense and compact shrub. A light application of fertilizer will help things along nicely for these shrubs as well.

Call for copies is tabled as cost is formidable

Request for a copy of all correspondence concerning her area was made by Salt Spring Island regional director Yvette Valcourt last week. It was tabled.

"That each director be sent a copy of any correspondence coming in or going out of his area or affecting it in any way and that this copy be mailed to the director by the same mail as it came in or went out," read the motion.

The procedure would require an augmented staff to handle the extra work entailed, warned Chairman Jim Campbell. The amount of mail it would generate would be huge, he forecast.

The directors are mostly com-

plaining of getting too much in the mails, observed Norma Sealey.

The board should not be engaged in debating a motion that is impossible, she added, citing the final clause.

She was very concerned about an amendment to a permit and she had not been advised, said the Salt Spring representative.

Motion was tabled.

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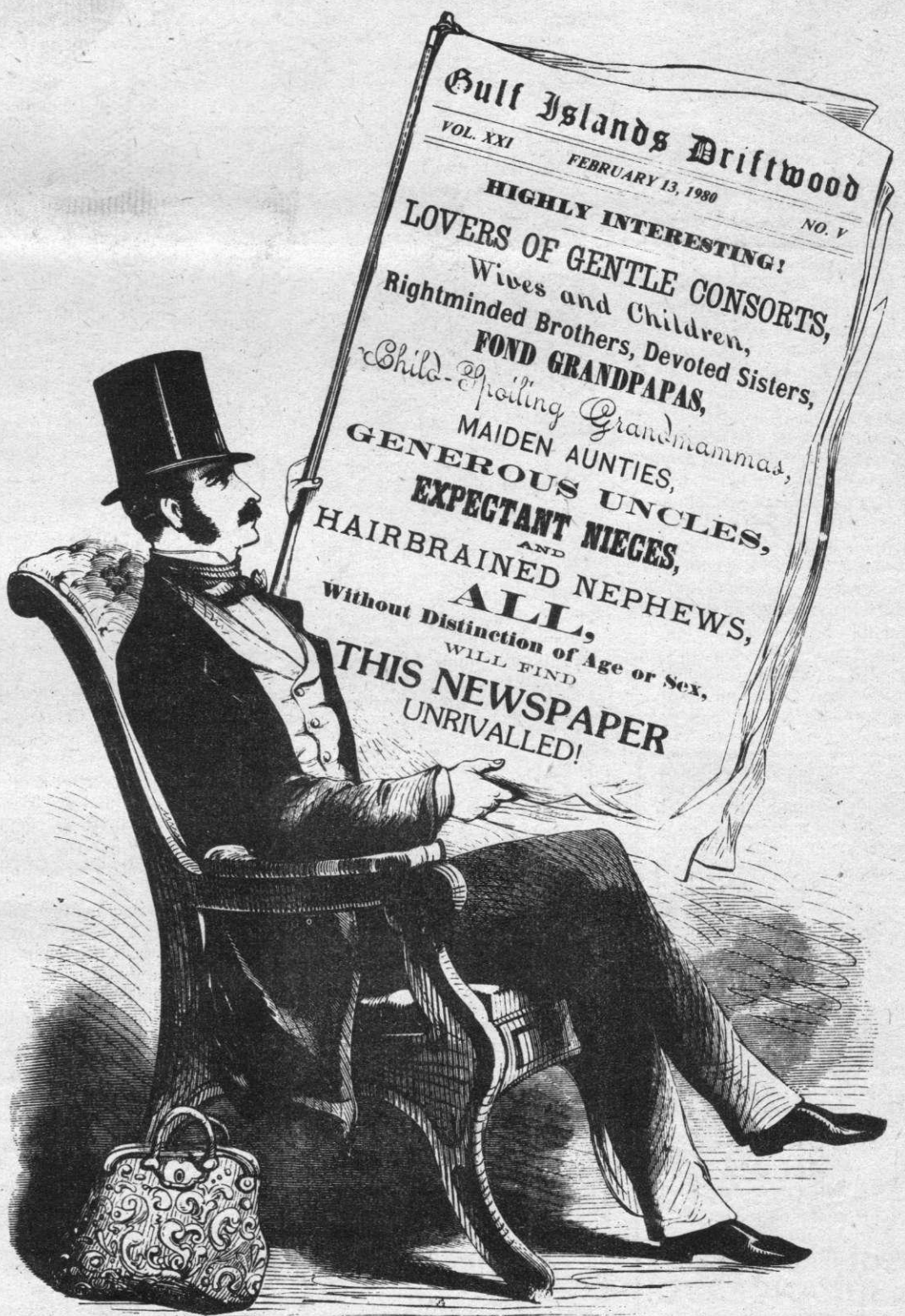
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At Ganges

He and Ken Jones are still in partnership and have moved Handy Andy's to a new location adjacent to Gulf Island Decorating.

Testart said he bought the decorating store when it had reached a low point in its popularity. With a lot of promotion and good customer service, he added, Gulf Island Decorating will grow.

"One of the big problems with the store's business," he said, "is that nobody knows we're here." Testart said he plans to enter a costumed participant in the Sea Capers parade. The "Pittsburgh Peacock" will advertise the store and the line of paints it carries.

The store also offers carpets,

linoleum, drapes, hardwood for floors, wall-paper, tile and janitorial supplies.

Handy Andy's, right next door, will clean carpets, rototill the garden, wash windows, make general repairs and, Testart said, "do just about anything."

Testart, who lives with his fiance Myrle Sherwood at their home near Cusheon Lake, said he likes the slow pace of the island. He said he is also looking for an "industrious person who can do just about anything" to work for Handy Andy's.

Down Through the Years With Driftwood

FIVE YEARS AGO

Ken Maneker has been named principal of Galiano School. He has been acting principal for the past year. Mr. Maneker was originally named to the island to carry on for one year in the temporary absence of Basil Bengier. Last week Mr. Maneker was confirmed in his appointment as principal and the board approved the appointment of Mr. Bengier as education consultant for the Outer Gulf Islands.

Fire Chief Kelly Hanke of Salt Spring Island gave trustees of Gulf Islands School District something to think about last week. The fire chief had listed a number of features of the high school which had to be changed to meet with the fire marshal's regulations. Included were provision of panic hardware, clearing of storage in areas not suitable for the purpose and the clearing of stairs and halls.

Former school dormitory on Salt Spring Island and former Lady Minto Hospital building on Ganges Hill took a step away from school trustees last week. Trustees had already tentatively approved the use of the structure as a day-care centre subject to the transfer to a provincial government department at a nominal price. Last Thursday afternoon the trustees agreed to hold the building for a further period in order that the Salt Spring Community Society might negotiate its acquisition through the department of human resources.

TEN YEARS AGO

A massive burst of new subdivision has taken place on the Gulf

Islands in recent months. Charles H. Wakelin, planner in charge of the Gulf Islands for the Capital Regional District, told a meeting of the Pender Island Chamber of Commerce Saturday night that government regulations designed to curtail development on the islands had actually accelerated creation of new lots. A total of 2,000 new lots was submitted for approval between October 1969 and March 31, 1970 Wakelin said.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

A minor accident involving an oil truck and a small English car happened shortly after lunch on Tuesday. The oil truck was oiling the roadway into Harbour House when a collision occurred with the small car. No one was injured but considerable damage occurred to the left side of the small car.

Dangerous TREE TOPPING

Andy goes into trucking on the long haul

Andy McGoldrick, of Bittancourt Road, Ganges, is in the trucking business. And he's there in the picture standing by the side of his new rig to prove it.

The White Freightliner is his pride and joy, but there's a good reason to be happy over it.

For a number of years the Ganges driver has been a sick man. This spring he was a patient in Lady Minto Hospital and underwent an operation. It's not only put him back on his feet, but he's gone back to driving, which is where he started.

Last time he was in the trucking business, Andy was driving for Haida, hauling heavy loads for the owners of his unit. This time he's in business for himself.

The picture was taken last Tuesday as he set out for Calgary, the first leg of his first trip. He hauls from Calgary to Houston, in Texas and then back to Edmonton. From Edmonton he brings a load to Vancouver and then back home for a break. The run covers about 4,300 miles and includes two provinces and about 13 states. Andy explained that he owns the tractor and contracts to the trucking company. Take a look, urged Andy when he showed a *Driftwood* reporter his new liner. The reporter climbed into the driver's seat and found himself on top of the driving world in a padded room atop the engine. The cab is more comfortable than any ordinary car, with padded upholstery over the engine unit and around the walls and the seat, mounted on a hydraulic pillar. Behind the crew is a bunk, or sleeper, with a folding padded curtain. Each driver sleeps while the other is driving. The provision allows the crew to sleep in comfort until they switch. Among the handsome array of switching is the hi-fi stereo. The tri-axle unit is equipped with a Cummings diesel

with 14 speeds. Andy explained that the fifth wheel, or pivot on which the long trailer is mounted can be moved fore and aft to vary the weight distribution on the tractor. The possession of the big

tractor is the realization of a dream for the Ganges man. All he has to do now is drive and keep pace of the economy as he roars down the highway hauling the national prosperity back and forth.

Hospital vote open to owners and registrants

Members will hear the annual reports as well as appoint an auditor.

The Gulf Islands Intermediate and Personal Care Society will hold its meetings at the same time.

TWO AND ONE
Two members will be elected to the board of management from Salt Spring Island and one from Galiano.

Eligibility is similar to that provided for the hospital meetings. In both cases non-property owners must register one month prior to the meeting. Initial announcement by the two functions was published earlier in the month to afford interested residents the opportunity of registering.

In addition to routine business, the Intermediate and Personal Care Society meetings will consider special resolutions to amend the constitution and bylaws.

Meetings will be held during the week, June 9 to June 16.

Ed Lumley looks back

Today, one in 10 might survive hardships of 80 years ago

On May 30, 1899 the residents of the southern end of Salt Spring Island increased their number by one. A baby boy was born to the Lumley family of Isabella Point.

On Friday, that birth was celebrated at Ganges with a party for Ed Lumley.

There were no hospitals on the island when he was born and the roads and the means of transport were such that it may have taken days before the whole island knew of young Ed Lumley's birthday. Those were the horse and wagon days.

"We didn't even know what hospitals were back then," he told *Driftwood* last week. There were many things that the early pioneers had to pay in the way of dues for the independent lifestyle.

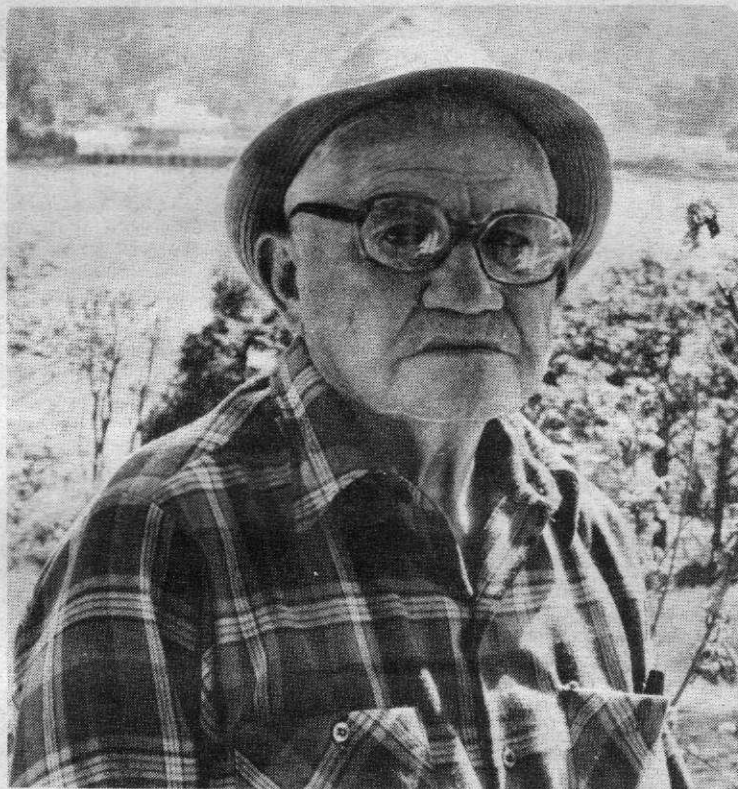
Hardships, that by today's standards would be considered intolerable, were accepted as routine. "Maybe one in 10 people today might survive," said Lumley, while thinking about the incessant chores he and the other seven children in his family had to do.

FIRST POLICEMAN

His father William, who was the first provincial policeman on the island, earned about \$75 a month until he died in 1908. "We would work, and when we finished we were given more work."

When he was four years old Ed Lumley was registered at the Isabella Point school, one of eight schools on the island at that time. Although, as he phrased it, "I was too young to learn anything," Lumley went faithfully every day to keep the numbers in the school up so it wouldn't be closed down.

"I slept all day," he remarked.

And he was allowed to, just to keep the numbers up. "All I had to do was go there and sleep," he said. "I never enjoyed it too much."

Lumley remembers when his mother's family travelled by canoe down the Fraser River and across the Strait of Georgia to visit Salt Spring. They made their own entertainment and their own cider and prune wine. "It was pretty potent stuff."

The only way they could get around in those days was by horse

and hay buggy, he said. "There were about five families from Fulford to the end of Isabella, and they were all pretty well out of touch with the rest of the world."

TOO HARD

"Those old days won't come back, and it's a good thing. Life was too hard on people then. Most winters we had five feet of snow."

By the time he was 23 Lumley had learned to log, farm and fish

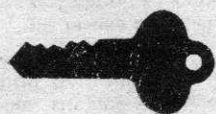

District to purchase Apple micro-computer

Will an Apple last six months, a trustee on the Gulf Islands School Board asked his colleagues last week. He didn't think it would but the board decided to get one anyway.

The Apple, costing \$2,000, is a micro-computer. The ministry of education has bought a large number of them and is offering to sell them at discount prices to school districts.

Trustee Charlie Baltzer argued that the machines are being outdated so rapidly that his own, which he bought six months ago, has had to be modified five times.

Baltzer said the government probably got the micro-computers at a reduced cost because they were obsolete.

However, the board decided that the Gulf Islands Secondary School would be permitted to try to obtain one.

District superintendent Bob Huestis informed the board at its meeting last week that computers are coming in like radios and

televisions did. "It is essential that our secondary students become familiar with computer language," he said.

Baltzer said that he still believed it would be better to lease one.

Education levy

Movie provides opportunity to see 'how other half lives'

I was delighted with the number of teenagers who went to see *Norma Rae* recently. It was an excellent and unique opportunity for young rural dwellers to see "how the other half lives". Not many of us will ever visit a textile factory, but the movie conveyed the incredible noise, the all-pervasive fibres and the "tough" atmosphere of such a milieu.

The Deer Hunter, another excellent and realistic movie, also served the purpose of demonstrating the brutalizing effect of certain kinds of occupations on basically reasonable and decent human beings. To a slightly lesser degree, great concern is being felt in our own province about the mental health of people who work in plywood mills. The noise in which they work is said to be making them withdrawn and neurotic.

My children wanted to know why the management of the factory in which Norma Rae worked resisted the union so vigorously. I explained it was largely a matter of money - there's an element of division of authority, true, but it's mostly a question of money.

KEEN TO MAKE PROFITS

They found it hard to believe: there are people in this world who are so keen to make profits that they will not pay their employees a decent wage and will not spend time or money to improve appalling working conditions! (My children have obviously not been reading my columns!)

Patrick Watson, featured speaker at the B.C.S.T.A. annual general meeting, told us of the advances of micro-technology. "Chips" featured largely in his talk. So I eagerly read April's *New Internationalist* and an article headed "Cheaper than machines".

Diana Roose writes about Kim, a 19-year-old, one of 100,000 workers in South Korea's export-orientated electronics industry. Some 90% of these are women aged 18 - 23. They work eight to 10 hours a day, six days a week, and in 1978 the average wage in Korean factories

woman with no family - allowing only for half-a-pound of meat, no medical care or entertainment.

Kim suffers from headaches, hunched over a microscope, soldering tiny gold wires to almost invisible chips of silicon, while jaunty music plays in the background.

EYE PROBLEMS

In a similar plant, 95% of the total work force developed severe eye problems in their first working year: chronic conjunctivitis, near-sightedness and astigmatism. Virtually anyone who stays on the job more than three years must wear glasses and is called "grandma" by her friends.

In one investment brochure, designed for western investors, the Malaysian government extols the "manual dexterity of the Oriental female". In 1977 several members of the American Friends Service Committee visited the National Semiconductor Plant in the free trade zone in Penang.

They talked with young women whose work consisted of dipping assembled units in large open vats of sulphuric and nitric acid. They wear boots and gloves which sometimes leak, causing burns. They suffer from nausea and dizziness from exposure to trichloroethylene, xylene and benzene. One woman, who had worked in the sulphuric acid section for three years, told of her fruitless visits to the doctor. He said she had 'flu, and the company refused her requests for a transfer.

HAVE NEVER WORKED

The electronics industry recruits many women from rural areas. Most of them have never worked before. When asked why they had left their families to work for \$2 a day, they said there were no jobs in their villages. They are less sophisticated than the city women who remain unemployed while their country cousins work for one or two years. They then become sick, quit, and swell the ranks of the city's unemployed.

Many factories work around the clock. According to one plant manager:

One worker, working one hour, produces enough to pay the wages of 10 workers working one shift, plus all the cost of materials and transportation.

And that, children, is what is called "free enterprise".

Unwelcome Coon Bay visitors

Some visitors at Galiano Island two weeks ago will not be welcome on the island should they return.

North Galiano resident Devina Baines said this week that a group of visitors left garbage strewn all over the beach at Coon Bay, on the north end of the island. About 20 campfires were lit on the property, she said, which is owned by MacMillan Bloedel. Signs posted in the area warn visitors against lighting fires.

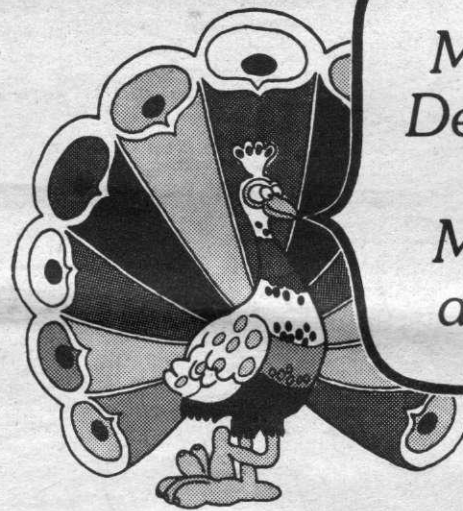
A patrolman for MacMillan Bloedel, on discovering the campfires,

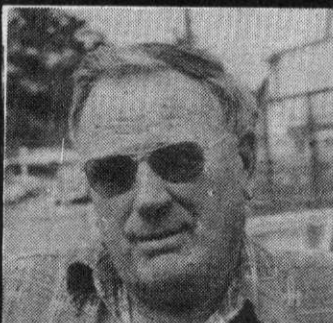

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Tunnel is ludicrous

Trustees hear one-woman campaign

Terming a fixed link between Vancouver Island and the mainland as "ludicrous", Mrs. W. Donato, Victoria one-woman campaigner against a mainland tunnel warned the Islands Trust on Saturday that the cost would be phenomenal.

In addition, it would not be feasible to construct the fixed link safely, she stated. Trust manager Tony Roberts reported that the "pre-feasibility study" has already brought in the Islands Trust to gain information on the Islands.

The pre-feasibility study will ascertain, at a cost of \$100,000, whether there is any merit in launching a feasibility study at greater cost.

The route is from the mainland to Galiano, thence to Valdez and Gabriola and Vancouver Island. Alternative route sees Salt Spring Island as the path.

Proposals call for a tunnel on the seabed or a tunnel floating above the bottom of the sea, but below the surface or a floating bridge.

Shortest sea route lies between Sand Heads and Galiano and covers 14 miles.

"It could be a floating bridge," observed Jim Tyhurst.

"And it could sink," added Dick Nixon. He cited the dangers of high winds and damage by shipping.

DYING IN TUNNELS

"More die on railroads than in tunnels," submitted Saturna's Jim Money. "I'd like to get an electric train and get to Victoria or Vancouver in 10 minutes and I'd give them a place to land on my property."

"At first sight it seems absolutely mad," went on Tyhurst, "but that doesn't stop anything."

He looked beyond the proposal and criticized the approach to Vancouver Island's future development.

"There is no rational plan for Vancouver Island's development as a livable region," he reminded his colleagues. The island should

for his livelihood. Together the three occupations could provide for a family, so he married. His wife Becky lived with her family on Salt Spring when she was home from Pyuallup where she attended school.

They met and were married in 1923. To support the three daughters that followed he took to the tug boats for a living and obtained a master's ticket. That was his occupation until his wife died seven years ago. It was time then to retire, he said, back to the home on Ganges Harbour which he built in 1928.

Since then he has had time to sit back. *Driftwood* asked him what he thought of the present era and its people.

"People are not like they used to be. Nobody will stop to talk with you anymore; just a few words and off they go."

PAID TOO MUCH

"Some kids these days are as good as kids used to be but some are a heck of a lot worse. Young people get paid too much these days. They won't do anything unless they get paid a lot; \$4 an hour just for a kid to cut the grass? It's crazy."

"I never locked the door in my life here, but in the last year I've lost quite a few things. Never locked the house soon enough, I guess. Well, that's the way it goes."

Lumley went on to look at the proposal for a tunnel across Georgia Strait.

"A tunnel from the mainland would be a good idea. It's pretty painful to see people having to wait for hours just to catch the ferry. You can't hold people back; they're going to come regardless, so we might as well build a tunnel."

"The government is allowing so many foreigners into the country there is nowhere else for Canadians to go. They might as well come here."

"I just wish the government would stop taxing old people. It's all right to tax younger people and those with a pile of money. They can find out who's got all the money easily enough."

"I've never been politically outspoken, though. We had to work to make 'er and that's it."

Although Lumley underwent surgery three years ago, he said, "There's not a damn thing wrong with me, except for those stitches."

He lives on Churchill Road with his daughter Gwen. He has three daughters, nine grandchildren, two great-grandchildren and another one expected in December.

strive to avoid metro conurbations by following the mainland support for decentralization.

While residents' groups and others are expressing opposition to the plan and its advertised price tag of \$2.5 billion, the Islands Trust should take no action until the pre-feasibility report is brought down, he urged.

John Gaines, Saturna's general trustee, supported him.

TOTAL FARCE

"I view the whole thing as a total farce," he told the Trust council, "but let's wait until the first study is completed."

Bud Kreissl, from Salt Spring Island was pessimistic. Given enough time and money, anything can be built, he warned.

"I am fearful of its impact on what we were trying to protect in the Trust area."

It makes no difference to the movement of population whether they travel by ferry or in a tunnel, suggested Money.

The cost factor is enormous, warned Mrs. Donato. To replace the entire ferry fleet would cost about \$600 millions, she reminded trustees. This would not even look at a bridge or tunnel, she urged.

Chairman John Rich expressed appreciation of the work undertaken by Mrs. Donato and urged her to "stay with it".

Watch for drums, asks minister

The minister of environment, Stephen Rogers, has issued a plea to the public, particularly the boating public, to keep an eye open for 45-gallon, orange drums containing an industrial biocide. They were lost from an American barge northwest of Cape Scott on Vancouver Island late last year, and may still be floating around in B.C. waters.

The minister's request follows the sighting of an orange barrel seen floating near the shore just south of Estevan Point, northwest of Tofino, by a log salvage operator on May 15.

Rogers said the Coast Guard had been notified immediately of the sighting, and had sent out a helicopter to attempt to locate the barrel, but were unable to make a sighting. The reported barrel is now thought to have drifted back out to sea.

If a barrel is sighted, says Rogers, the Coast Guard or the headquarters of the provincial emergency program in Victoria (387-5956 - 24 hours) should be contacted immediately so that salvage operations can be undertaken.

Rogers stressed that the contents of the barrels are considered to be toxic and dangerous, and the public is not advised to attempt to handle the barrels in any way.

Getting round the act is growing as Trust fearful

Relatively speaking, section 713 A, of the Municipal Act benefits the family. Islands Trust was debating the section at the week end meeting.

It is the provision whereby a property may be subdivided, irrespective of the zoning regulation to allocate part to a close member of the family.

Historically, the section is not working out, trustees decided.

There is no prohibition of resale. A property owner, denied permission to subdivide, may split his property under this section and give it to a member of his family. The recipient may then sell it on the open market.

The Trust agreed that a number of amendments were needed in the section, particularly a measure to require that the recipient of land under this section be required to retain it for five years or return it to the donor-vendor.

Essential equipment

A life jacket or personal flotation device is an essential piece of equipment for a boater. The Red Cross recommends that you wear your lifejacket or personal flotation device whenever you're in a boat.
