

# Successful Fun Fair held at Fernwood despite the date

Fernwood School held its first annual fun fair last Friday, June 13. Nobody was superstitious about the date and the few who were concerned about the weather soon forgot their worries: they were having too much fun!

It began at 6.30 that morning when John Christianson and Allan Hardie arrived with four lambs and a quantity of salmon for barbecuing. Two of the lambs were donated by Hardie and Alan Marsh, and the salmon by Ron Nordine.

At 9.30 Harry Williamson and Mark Goodrich arrived to build the craft booth, loaned to Fernwood by Babs Bremner and Sharon Puhky before being taken up to the Courtenay Faire later this month. Vivian Pinteau and Margaretha Nordine later sold over \$100 worth of crafts from this booth.

### STEADY STREAM OF PARENTS

At recess some of the kids started festooning the pillars and fences with streamers and all morning a steady stream of parents arrived with donations for the stalls. Betty Pinchin triumphantly reported taking over \$200 at the home baking stall; they also sold the vegetables as it was too hot outside. Toys, books and records found their way to Jean Anderson who turned in about \$60 as a result. Mesdames Smith and Severn sold about \$70 worth of plants, and the silent auction, run by Jean Rowell, took \$45.

During the afternoon the children enjoyed a wide variety of games. There was fortune-telling, by Monique Nordine and Sarah Wiebe; the haunted house, with Claudia Clarke and Karen Reiss; candle squirt, ball toss, lucky dip, cube throw, ring toss, nickel flip and a steady hand exercise by Tom Wright which defeated all comers! The Alkoffs brought their donkey over from Wallace Island, and Don Cunningham gave free rides on the little 5½ Fire Truck.

### LOTS OF FUN FOR \$1

Most of the games were available to holders of 5c tickets: imagine the amount of fun a kid had for just \$1! A great achievement in these days of high cost/low value almost everywhere!

A baseball game between kids and adults was handicapped: adults had to wield the bat with only one arm, and when they ran, it was only a hop! I couldn't even watch the mums versus dads! Joe Bossio and Rob Tranter supervised.

The Cake Walk cost 15c and the lucky dip only 10c. Mrs. Tamboline's father won a large jar of popcorn, having guessed the amount correctly. Of course there was a raffle. First prize, a \$50 hamper of groceries donated by the

Fernwood Store, was won by Elizabeth Sampson. Second prize, a hairdo donated by Cecilia Sampson, was won by Tom Wright (no comment!) and Sue Douglass won third prize, a cuddly pillow crocheted by Vicky Miller's mother. Fourth, a repair job donated by Gulf Islands Repair Service, was won by Bill Anderson. Salt Spring Glass (Dennis and Elsie Marshall) donated the lucky dip prizes.

### NO PROFIT

The only stall which did not make a profit was the candy stall, manned and supplied by the students! 'Nuff said?

The soft drinks were also sold by students and profits of about \$100 go to their Student Council.

About 5.15 we began to line up for supper. For \$4 we had a generous portion of lamb or salmon, mint sauce, coleslaw with a magnificent dressing and a buttered bun. Dessert was coffee and a cupcake. Irene Wright made over 400 scrumptious cupcakes and the kids helped her with the frosting. Eli Trory sold about 130 hot dogs.

All the takings were pooled and amounted to \$1,843. After bills are paid, the Parent Advisory Committee, which set up the event, will have about \$1,500 profit. This will help to pay for the planned

adventure playground. **ENDED WITH CONCERT**

The day came to a triumphant conclusion with a concert played to a packed gymnasium. There is no stage or stage lighting at Fernwood School, but the staff improvised brilliantly and the children gave of their all.

The kindergarten performed a sketch about the weather, primary classes sang three enchanting songs (Mrs. Smith conducted and Mrs. Severn accompanied) and the intermediates (aged nine through 13) acted a short version of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. They were splendid! Irene Wright, directed, costumed, played the familiar Mendelssohn music and prompted on the very few occasions when memories faltered. As the proud parent of one of the featured players, I cannot mention individual performances, but it was an ambitious undertaking and a credit to all concerned.

A well-earned presentation was made to Mary-Jane Hardie, the parent-convener, whose organizational abilities are matched only by her charm and unflappability!

Altogether it was a most satisfactory inaugural event, and we're already looking forward to next year's annual Fernwood Fun Fair.

## Shared teaching positions sought in islands district

A delegation of local teachers has requested the Gulf Islands School Board to establish shared teaching positions.

If the board decides to support the idea two teachers will be allowed to share the same class, meaning they will work less and have more time off.

Delegation spokesman Margery Cade told school trustees last Wednesday that 40 teachers had been surveyed and that at least half of them expressed an interest in shared teaching.

More time off, she said, allows a teacher to make a meaningful contribution to the community and his family. She told the meeting that shared teaching means the teacher is not as prone to illness

and stress.

She said stress in the classroom is becoming increasingly serious in this district. Cade also listed several ways in which teachers could spend their extra leisure time. Community involvement, professional development and class preparation, she said, are things teachers can work on.

"This will make teachers more enthusiastic," she added.

The board informed her that the matter would be studied before any policy was decided on.

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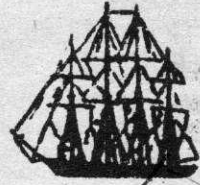

# Week-long course brings nearly 100 artists to Salt Spring

The sight of easels and paintbrushes is a common one around Ganges this week, as nearly 100 members of the Federation of Canadian Artists are here enjoying their first annual summer school.

And judging by the enthusiasm displayed by the visiting artists, Salt Spring could be the site of a larger summer school in 1981.

The group arrived from Vancouver and Vancouver Island last Saturday. Eighty students and 10 instructors will paint and draw various aspects of Salt Spring Island, ranging from marine subjects to local buildings.

During the week-long course, beginners and professionals will be provided with expert instruction from established Canadian artists, including Allan Edwards, Bruce Stapleton, Harry Heine, Robert Genn, Dave MacLagan and Carl Kristofferson.

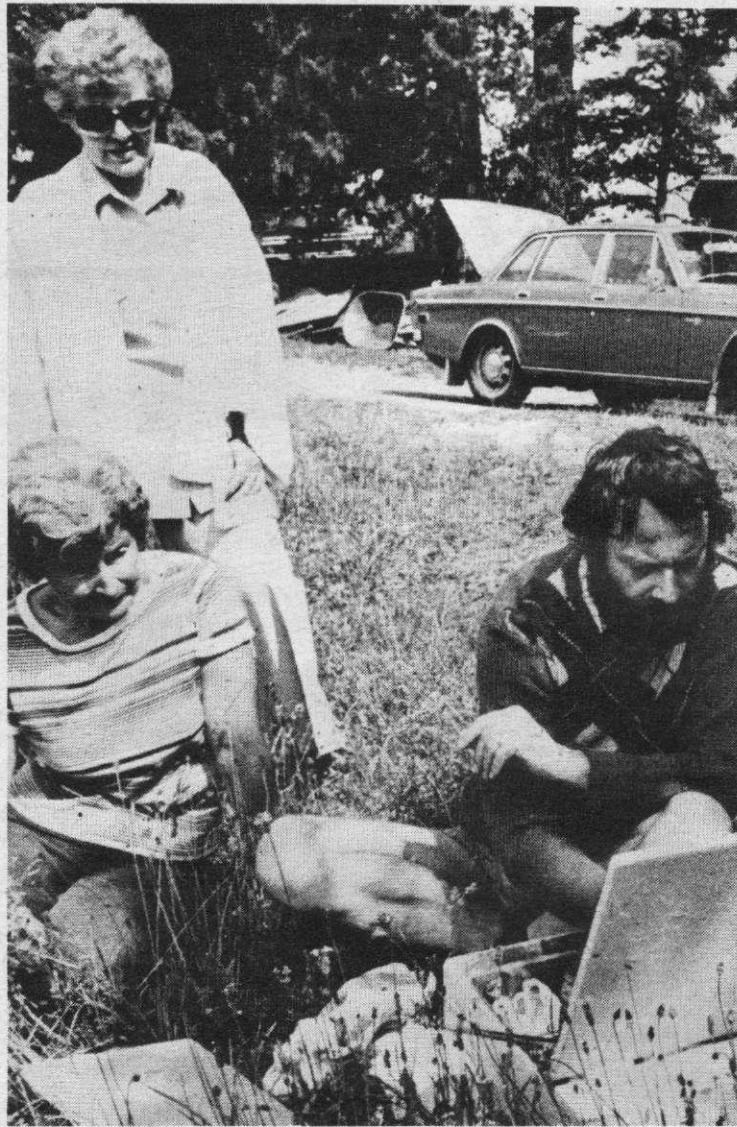
Stapleton, who is president of the federation, will instruct portraiture painting using oils, and former president Edwards will teach painting with water colours, using different subjects. Marine painting with water colours is the specialty of Heine, a Victoria-based painter.

On Saturday, beginning at 1 pm, the public will be given the opportunity to examine and purchase the canvases produced during the show.

A panel of judges will select the paintings as only work of a certain standard is exhibited. The federation has sponsored itinerant exhibits which have been seen in northern B.C. communities and in towns along the west coast of the United States.

While on Salt Spring the painters have been staying at Cedar Beach Resort.

The local Painters Guild catered a dinner for the artists last Saturday evening at the Rod and Gun Club. This coming Saturday the school will wind up with a banquet catered by the ladies of the Eastern Star.

## Looking back to 1919

### He was Dowansa

Circa 1919 to 1920 I was with the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps, stationed at Resthaven Military Hospital in Sidney. At the time I had charge of the nursing sisters' dining room, and evenings played the piano for the sisters to dance with the patients or whoever came in to visit.

When I was discharged I went for a visit to Fulford and stayed with Mr. and Mrs. Horel and their son, Percy, who was discharged from Resthaven Hospital at the same time.

While there I met most of the local Indians and picked up a smattering of their language, which greatly interested me. I was also shown how to prepare the sopal berry, which was mixed with sugar and beaten to a froth. It was eaten and then everyone would throw it at each other, it being the routine procedure for fun, as messy as it was!

On 19 I was visiting a local lady and her children and I told her about the preparation and fun we had with it. I used the Indian word for this, when all of a sudden the children just burst out laughing!!

#### TO SHUT UP

Their mother promptly told them to shut up, then smiling, and using the Sioux Indian name given to me, Dowansa, (the musical one), said she was glad I had enjoyed the new experience.

I stayed there that night and when we got into bed the son burst out laughing again and said, "Do you know what you told mother? You mispronounced the Indian word and said you had a very dirty smell, all beaten up with sugar then eaten and flung at each other!!"

Shortly after, I had a job offered to me delivering groceries to various places on the island with a little Ford car. I had never driven one before, so Clifford Wakelin offered to teach me. In an open field behind the community hall, he taught me the "do's" and "don't's" of the little monster and got me to drive down to the store.

I cut in a bit too close to the curb and a chap riding on the running board nearly got "pinched". Then the manager said take it around to the back of the store and park it in one of the stalls that shoppers tie their horses to. I did not get the thing stopped quite soon enough

so I bashed into the wall killing the engine, and a couple of loose boards landed on top of the car. But I soon got the hang of the thing and had no more trouble.

#### OPPOSITE MOUAT'S

I lived in a little shack, on the small bit of land - opposite Mouat's store. One day, with several crates of eggs, I went down to the boat at the end of the wharf. But I took a corner a bit too fast sending a case of eggs crashing on to the road, leaving a mess of scrambled eggs all over the place!

The value of the eggs was deducted from my pay check.

At the end of the wharf was a section on hinges to move up and down with the tides. One day this section was crowded with people when the whole thing collapsed, sending everyone into the chuck.

I used to play the piano for local dances and one day a special gathering was announced. And they said they did not want any of the Indians from Fulford attending. This burnt me up because these people were friends of mine.

I refused to play for this special gathering and sent word down to Fulford that I was putting on a

"pow-wow" and wanted everyone to come up.

I put up a large Sioux Indian teepee I had from Manitoba and with this and refreshments, entertained my Indian friends.

Shortly after that gathering I left for Victoria and entered St. Joseph's Hospital as a male nurse.

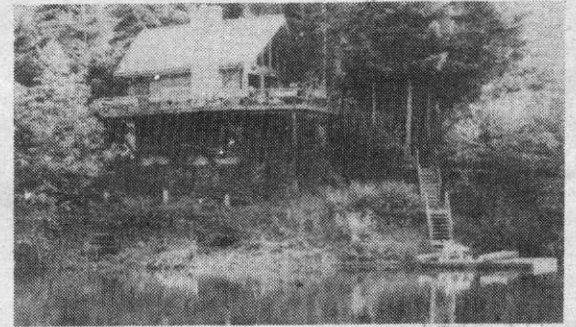

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## Changes plea, fined \$350

Seventeen-year-old Danny Reynolds of Ganges, who had earlier pleaded not guilty to an impaired driving charge, changed the plea at his trial last week.

Evidence of Reynolds' behaviour in the RCMP office after he was picked up February 22 had not been anticipated by his lawyer, Dave Lisson.

Lisson explained to Judge D.K. McAdam that all the particulars of the case had not been sent to his office from the office of the prosecutor.

Lisson had hitherto argued that Reynolds had failed the balance tests Const. Glenn Hanna had demanded because he had been wearing high-heeled platform shoes.

But Hanna's descriptive observations of Reynolds' attempt to use the police station's toilet surprised Lisson and led him to request a short recess so he could consult with his client.

After the break Lisson told McAdam that his client wished to change his plea. Lisson told the

court that Reynolds had been an upstanding citizen of Salt Spring and had won numerous awards and distinctions as a trap shooter and member of the Rod and Gun Club.

Reynolds, he said, is an apprentice mechanic in Ganges and cannot afford a large fine.

As a result, McAdam ordered Reynolds to pay the \$350 fine in monthly instalments.

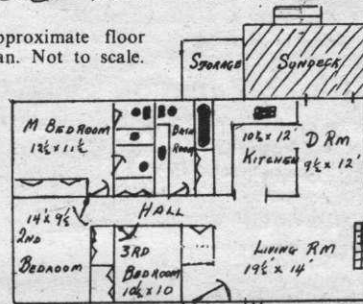
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# Fisheries-related issues are raised

For many years the Fisheries Improvement Loans Act has guaranteed money lenders against loss on loans made to fishermen under this plan. Bill C-28, which we discussed in parliament last week, extends the life of the plan and increases the borrowing limit from \$75,000 to \$150,000.

Although it was a routine bill, Bill C-28 was the first fisheries bill to come before the house since before the last two elections. Along with other members of the New Democratic Party, I used the occasion to raise some important issues relating to our fisheries.

Ted Miller, from Nanaimo-Alberni, NDP critic on fisheries, pointed out that the bill is "more important to the banking community, which insists on having loan guarantees to fishermen, small businessmen and farmers, than it is to the fishermen themselves." The current revision of the Bank Act should have forced banks to live up to their responsibilities to make funds available to fishermen. **ABDICATED THEIR ROLE**

Instead, the government has allowed banks to abdicate their role at the taxpayers' expense. The result has been to create the need for the Fisheries Improvement Loan Act.

Miller went on to say that while fisheries in Atlantic Canada needed such a bill to encourage fleet development, British Columbia fisheries suffer from over-capitalization. The failure of the government to recognize new technology, sophisticated electronic equipment and larger, more powerful boats has resulted in a greater pressure on salmon stocks.

This results in "shorter and shorter periods of fishing time". Obviously more loans to buy more equipment will not meet the needs of British Columbia's fishing industry.

While Ted Miller outlined our total response to the bill, I concentrated on one or two factors. First, I pointed to the contradictions between the Salmonid Enhancement Program, designed to increase fish stocks, and the failure of the department of fisheries to protect fish habitat.

### COWICHAN ESTUARY

In my speech I raised my concerns about the Cowichan Estuary in our riding. Estuaries are easy places on which to expand industries, but we are only beginning to recognize the tremendous potential of estuaries in the life cycle of many fish. Increased industrialization of the estuary involves land fill and dredging. This will be harmful to fish habitat.

What has the department of fisheries and oceans been doing in order to protect this estuary? It was two years ago that a task force was appointed by the provincial government on which the federal department of fisheries had representation. When I meet people who are involved in trying to save this estuary from industrialization, I realize that they are becoming disillusioned.

In good faith two years ago, they put their submissions before the task force, yet the report has not

been tabled. I would like the federal department to use some of its clout to get the provincial government to table the report. At the very least, the department should move to reassure the people of Cowichan Valley that there will be no further industrialization which in any way will adversely affect fish habitat. **URGENT MATTER**

Further to my comments on the Fisheries Improvement Loans Act I have raised the issue of the Cowichan Estuary as an urgent matter for the House of Commons to debate. The motion failed to get the "unanimous consent" needed under House of Commons rules. However, I will continue to raise the Cowichan Estuary as I have raised the issue of government inaction on the question of coastal tanker traffic. The debate over Bill C-28 was an opportunity to again make the government aware of its failure to protect our coast from tanker traffic.

"We on the Pacific coast are very much concerned with the threat of increased tanker traffic. When tanker traffic is increased, not only is the danger of eco-disaster increased, but inevitably the day-by-day increment of seepage and small spills is increased, and this has a very detrimental effect upon our fisheries. Quite frankly, we are not happy with the very inadequate response so far from the government.

"As we look at the salmonid enhancement program, we are happy that it exists, but we wonder what the point is of trying to provide this program on the one hand, while on the other we do not preserve the existing fish habitat. **HURT MOST**

"One group of fishermen that is being hurt the most is the Indian people. In fact, the entire culture

and civilization of the native people along the Pacific coast has been dependent upon the resources of the sea.

"When the reserves were being set up for the people of British Columbia, instead of the larger reserves that are found in other parts of the country, the reserves for coastal Indians were very small. It was recognized that they faced out toward the sea and got their living from the sea, in large part, rather than from the land."

Over-capitalization is squeezing young native people out of industry they have occupied for hundreds of years. It has caused job losses in smaller communities as canneries moved to larger centres. This is a shameful waste of our human resources.

Bill C-28 has passed second reading in the House of Commons and has gone to the Standing Committee on Fisheries and Oceans for point by point debate.

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No alternate class

# Board votes against proposal for Pender

The question of using public funds for an alternate school at Pender Island was resolved at a school board meeting at Mayne Island Thursday.

Gulf Islands school trustees voted four to three against the proposed family grouping class, which had been the recommendation from a Pender Island citizens committee.

Comprised of district administrators, Pender School staff and representatives of groups supporting and opposing the concept, the committee had stated last month that a separate school was needed to improve the "intolerable situation" at the Pender School.

The school board's education committee, which had been directed to discuss the matter and report back to the board, also recommended the establishment of the special class.

Before the education committee's motion was voted on a member of the audience was permitted to speak against the resolution. Pender resident Gordon Wallace, who claimed to represent a majority of islanders, told the board that only a few "dissident parents" on Pender wanted an alternate class.

Wallace said he had a written statement from the Pender School staff which claimed they had been pressured into going along with the idea of an alternate class. He

added that the school staff had stated there was no need for the class.

Board members were also handed 45 letters from Pender residents who opposed the class on the grounds that it would increase property taxes.

When the vote was taken Mary Williamson, Vivian Pinteau and Jeanine Dodds were in favour. Salt Spring Island trustee Strick Aust abstained from the vote. He said after the meeting that he would have voted for a motion which stated only that there was a need for change at the Pender School.

Helena Turner, spokesman for the Pender group seeking change, told the meeting that 11 children would not be attending the school this fall.

She objected to the allegations that the Pender teachers had been pressured into accepting the alternate school concept. "It's a serious allegation against the people on the committee. I thought we had reached a compromise with the staff, but now I don't know where we stand," she said.

Trustee Mary Williamson told her colleagues that all their work to resolve the controversy had been in vain and that the division in the community still existed.

"It was a very disappointing decision by the board," Williamson said.

## It wasn't a wildcat strike

At 6.58 Tuesday morning they started their motors: the big truck and all the little cars. The sleepy drivers stretched into a somewhat upright slouch. The sea churned; all appeared in readiness, but the gate did not go up. At 7.07 they turned off their motors. Puzzled drivers gathered on the dewy wharf to speculate about a wildcat strike.

There was much running up and down stairs, peeping and poking at windows, and jiggling of doorknobs. Surely not...but yes, the captain has locked himself out of the wheelhouse.

The ship was quietly loaded and on her way by 7.20.

The 10.30 run from Crofton left on schedule, with no hint that the *Vesuvius Queen* was a slow starter on some mornings.

## Fined

A 19-year-old Salt Spring Island man was fined \$50 for possession of liquor in provincial court last week. James Clark pleaded guilty to the charge, laid after Clark's vehicle was checked by RCMP April 12.

A case of beer with seven full bottles was seized. The court was told that two juveniles were also present in the car with Clark at the time of the incident.

# Director investigating issue of health permits

Salt Spring Island regional director Yvette Valcourt is investigating the issue of health permits in Ganges. On Wednesday afternoon last week she told her fellow directors on the Capital Regional Board that she believes some permits have been issued in conflict with development permits issued by the Islands Trust.

Regional directors upheld Valcourt's right to obtain copies of permits whether or not she might be placing the board in jeopardy by releasing confidential information.

The island director told the board that she had been refused free access to health permits by executive director Dennis Young. His refusal was based on legal

opinion that the board might be responsible for damages should information on the permits be revealed to a third party.

Saanich Mayor Mel Couvelier was indignant at the suggestion that the board protect a director against possible indiscretions.

It is up to the voters to take action if she abuses her office, said Couvelier. The board cannot suspect something and seek to prevent her taking any action, he averred.

On the motion of director W.J. McElroy, Valcourt will specify her requests to the chairman. She, with the chairman, the executive director and two other directors named by her will then report back to the board.

island enjoys 14 ferry services a day.

"Some must want to get back and forth," she suggested.

Turning point in the decision to exclude the island was the petition presented by Valcourt. Petition bore 1,715 signatures. The voters' list carries 2,400 names and the proportion had to mean something, suggested Mel Couvelier.

Arnott addressed the board after Valcourt had introduced a motion to permit him to speak. When Mrs. Betty Pinchin spoke from the audience, director W.J. McElroy moved that the board also hear her views.

### THEY DIDN'T PAY

She told directors that she had taken part in collecting names for the petition.

"Three-quarters of the people signing have deducted the charge from their Hydro bills," she said.

Chairman Campbell was opposed to the move for exclusion of the island.

"The argument that there is no room for parking begs the question," he suggested, "of moving the ferry terminal."

He didn't cite Isabella Point, but he suggested a location where the trip is half as long and there is ample room for parking.

He urged that the matter be referred to next year's board, in order that the financial implications might be more clearly met.

Director Valcourt also presented a letter from the North Salt Spring Waterworks District deploring the action of the Capital Regional Board in placing city bus costs on the Hydro bill. The water district is a non-profit organization and is required to pay \$750 a year to buses, said the district's spokesman.

It was another Boston tea party on Salt Spring, said Bob Wright.

"We're saying to the people of Salt Spring Island, 'We know what's best for you, so we're going to give you a service and we're going to charge you for that service.'"

He had heard no pleas nor had he read any requests for a service for the island, he added.

"I hear Salt Spring Island does not want to be in the regional district," said Wright.

"It would make my life easier. They're two per cent of the area and take up 30% of the time, what with transit and sewers over there."

Norma Sealey saw a two-way street.

The people of the province are paying \$50 million a year towards a ferry service they will never use, she reminded the directors.

The ferries serve other people, Valcourt reminded her, and islanders also pay a million towards schools they never see.

The Sealey vote to postpone the withdrawal until the end of the year was defeated.

When the vote was presented it was declared defeated, with 21 weighted votes in favour and 20 against. Straight voting showed only six directors supporting the motion and nine against it. A weighted vote is based on the population of each component of the district.

On Friday Campbell announced a reversal of the ruling and explained that the motion should have been declared carried.

"I have instructed the executive director to place a request to the Urban Transit Authority at once to have Salt Spring Island excluded from the transit service area."
