

Roof party held as health centre nears completion

There is an old tradition that once a building project has reached the roofing stage a roof party is held, at which time a tree is mounted on the roof, provided the boss passes the criteria set by the workers.

on the roof of the Pender Islands' new health care centre. The boss in this case was Stan Carey, president of the Pender Islands Lions Club, who has spent a lot of time over the past three to four years to bring this project to its present state.

All the work on the building has been done by volunteer labour and from nailing of the first plate to completion of the roof took only 10 days, including all the interior partitions. The building is 2,200 square feet of standard wood framing and is to be finished in cedar siding. Rough plumbing is completed and the building has passed inspection.

PARTY AT PENDER LODGE

A roof party was held on Friday evening at the Pender Lodge and the guests were those who had worked on the building.

There were two speeches, the first by Stan Carey in which he thanked all the volunteers. He stressed that he spoke not only for the Lions Club but for the community at large. A large percentage of the volunteers were not members of the Lions Club, but enthusiastic citizens giving freely of their time to help. Carey said that "it has often been said that the average

age of the Penders is deceased" but he would match his group of volunteers against any group, regardless of their age.

The lumber for the building has been supplied by Pender Island Lumber and Freight Co. at cost, and Klein Electric has donated all the labour and supplied all the materials at cost for the water pump, the plumbing and electrical work.

THEY WORK TOGETHER

Carey said "the development of this community-owned health care centre proves that people on the Penders do work together for the mutual benefit of the islands."

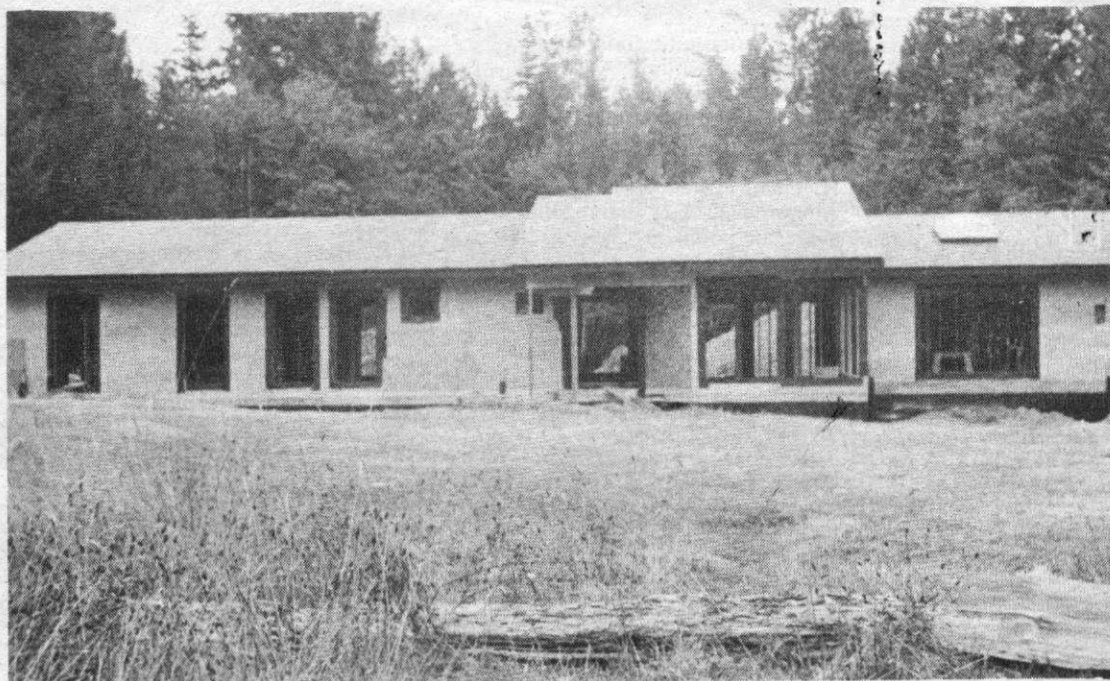
Besides the volunteer workers, Stew Corbett has reported for the Lions Club that donations to the building fund from organizations and individuals have been extremely generous and are continuing to grow.

When the centre is completed and the Lions turn over the key to the community, any funds left over from the building fund will also be turned over for the purchase of furnishings, and equipment and for landscaping among other things.

When the health care centre officially opens in a few weeks, there will be two resident doctors, the Homemaker Service, a physiotherapist and an optometrist. Rent will be paid by those occupying space and thus the centre will be self-supporting.

PROUD TO BE A MEMBER

saying that he was proud to be a member of the Lions Club which

has sponsored the project, but was also very proud to be a part of the Pender Islands community.

On behalf of the community he then said there were two people present who were acknowledging their appreciation in a tangible way, by providing the roof party for the volunteer workers. He then

introduced Mr. and Mrs. Alf Evans.

Mr. Evans spoke briefly, saying that all the praise should go to Stan Carey, that he has been the star and guiding light throughout and without whose work, direction and enthusiasm the event could not have taken place.

The final supper party of the summer season was hosted by Service Club member Florence Dodwell on September 10 when a group of intermediate and extended care residents led by director of divisional therapy Pam Taylor came by afternoon ferry to Galiano, had supper with the Dodwells and returned to Salt Spring on the evening boat.

The Service Club needs volunteers to help prepare for the annual bazaar scheduled for December 6, or to promise a regular date at Salt Spring reading to a small group at Greenwoods.

Please phone president Betty Ree if you are able to help. At their meeting the members also voted to donate \$200 to the Terry Fox Cancer Fund.

COMING EVENTS

The Women's Auxiliary to the Fire Department is engaged in raising money for a new communications system for the department. Next Saturday book lovers may converge on the Fire Hall to sample the printed treasures at their monthly book sale between 2 and 4 pm.

The Saturday promenade may

be extended by venturing on Burrill Road as far as the Thrift Shop to browse among the varied stock, also between 2 and 4 pm.

FIRST AID COURSE

A five-weekend, 50-hour course in industrial first aid began at Galiano School on Saturday. The instructor is Mrs. B. Lane of Pender Island, a former industrial nurse. The syllabus and text are supplied by the Worker's Compensation Board and supplies and equipment by St. John Ambulance.

Seventeen students have registered for the course. Of these, 11 are members of the volunteer ambulance service on Galiano; two, Joyce Robinson and Leyland Kirkness, are members of the volunteer ambulance team on Pender Island; and Jim McPherson, ambulance unit manager from Salt Spring, is attending.

The course is designed to provide training and qualification for industrial first aid attendants but is also a prerequisite for emergency medical attendants, and that is the reason the majority of the students are volunteer ambulance drivers and attendants. Since the reorganization of the Galiano ambulance service at the beginning of this year volunteers will have undergone 130 hours of instruction, attended in-service training sessions every other Tuesday as well as call-out duty which seems to have occurred more frequently this summer than in any past year.

This is equivalent for each volunteer of more than a month of full-time work on behalf of the

community. That enthusiasm is maintained can be attributed to the skill of the instructors, the esprit de corps that has developed and the compatibility of the very mixed group of people who constitute the volunteer team.

He is now studying fine arts at the University of Victoria.

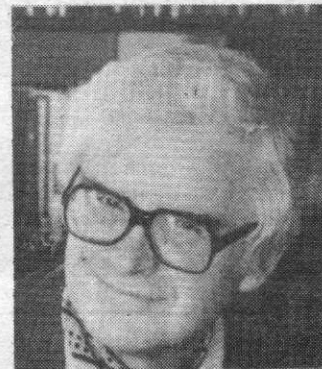

Pharmacy Facts

Les Ramsey, Ganges Western Drug Mart



This article is concerned with the treatment of wasp and bee stings.

The difference between these two stinging insects is that the bee leaves his stinger imbedded in the victim's skin, and afterward dies; whereas the wasp can use its stinger over again. The result of this difference between bees and wasps is a difference in the treatment of the sting.

With a bee sting, the difficult part of treatment is removing the stinger. Using a gentle scraping motion over the affected area, carefully dislodge the stinger and slowly pull it out. The reason for this is that the sac containing the venom is found at the tip of the stinger. If the area is squeezed, the venom may be released. Apply a paste of meat tenderizer (papain) in water (eg, 1/4 tsp. in 1-2 tsp. water) to relieve pain. Leave the paste on as long as necessary, then wash with soap and water. An antihistamine can be taken as well to help ease the swelling.

For wasp stings, where removal of a stinger is not involved, take an antihistamine immediately and apply ice packs to the affected area.



Now, the treatments suggested in the above paragraphs apply to people who are not allergic to insect stings. Those who are should not attempt to treat themselves. Instead, they should be rushed to the nearest doctor or emergency ward; similarly those whose stings become uncommonly irritating and swollen.

New women's soccer program to emphasize fun and recreation

The soccer season opened on many fronts last week with the Blues playing their first league game, the intra-island holding its first practices and women's soccer holding its first meeting. It is with this last item I wish to take issue this week.

Over the past few seasons our women's soccer program has primarily consisted of the Sockeyes, an off-island team, and girls participating at the intra-island level. The program was growing at the younger level, especially noticeable with the Kanaka Tuffies who played several off-island teams, and with the growing number of girls playing at the younger age levels.

Unfortunately, at the senior levels the program has stagnated somewhat resulting in the decline in the number of girls participating. Although the Sockeyes had several very successful seasons, the over-competition, dirty play and poor officiating of the Victoria league combined with the long season and tremendous travel load was killing the participants' enjoyment of the sport.

NEW PROGRAM

Our association felt a change was needed and therefore we have instituted a new program with emphasis on the fun and recreational aspects. We feel that this approach will allow more girls and women to participate and at the same time learn the game of soccer.

The main aspects of this new format are as follows:

Registration is open to girls 14 years of age and up and all women. We will allow 13-year-olds to play if they feel they can handle themselves at this level. Also, by all women, we mean all women, whether you have ever kicked a soccer ball or not - age and skill are not determining factors.

The registration fee will be a minimal \$10 to encourage participation and allow us to cover costs of balls and shirts.

TILL CHRISTMAS

The season will only go up to Christmas, thereby allowing people to do something else after and not drag the season on too long.

To begin with, the teams will play seven-a-side soccer on small fields, using smaller goals, allowing players a chance to better understand the game and become more involved.

The association will supply the shirts, balls and referees with the players supplying their own shorts and footwear (either soccer boots or running shoes).

All games will be played at Portlock Park commencing with the first session this Sunday at 3:30 pm, when we will try to form some teams. The games will be every Sunday at 3:30 pm and once the teams are set they can arrange extra practices if they want to.

Whether you are an old pro or a young rookie, whether you have played before or not, whether for exercise or fun, come on out Sundays at 3:30 pm for the best in women's and girls' soccer.

INTRA-ISLAND

The first week at this level deals primarily with registration and sorting players into age groups. From all appearances we will have the same set-up as last season with a four-team loop in the senior section and a three-team loop in the junior.

The only problem we face is a lack of coaches as to date we have seven teams but only four coaches. One coach is needed at Fernwood, the other two in Ganges.

The need for coaches is very urgent as these teams require the leadership to ensure they can compete properly in the league. Without the coaches the players play disorganized soccer and soon become disenchanted with the game and quit.

To become a coach at this level a person does not have to be knowledgeable about the game but rather enjoy children and enjoy sports, because we are promoting fun and participation rather than winning.

Our association will supply the necessary assistance to understand the wonderful world of soccer.

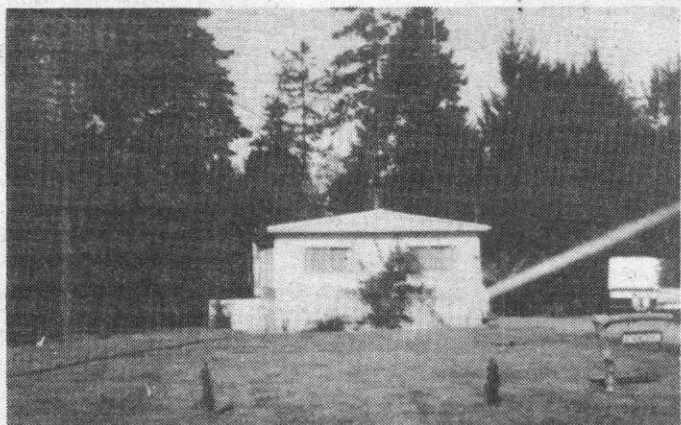

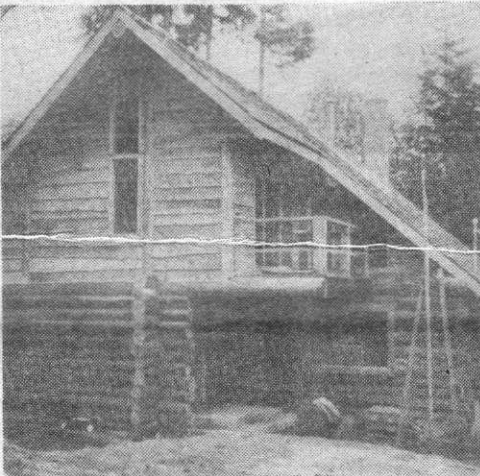

under the direction of Peter Bingham, training officer.

Commander James Napper pointed out this week that apart from the basic boating course, advanced courses are also offered to squadron members. They include seamanship power, seamanship sail, advanced piloting, junior navigator and senior navigator.

To become a member of the squadron, it is necessary to pass the basic boating examination first.

Over the past six years, 206 Salt Spring residents have taken that course and 203 have passed it. To be eligible to join the squadron a student must obtain 80% in the examination.

"This points out the high standard of training," said Napper, "and the intelligence of the students who

wish to be safer on the water and recognize dangers and avoid accidents before becoming a statistic."

Across Canada an annual average of 11,000 students of all ages pass the basic boating course.

Officers, lecturers and instructors of the squadrons receive no remuneration, said Napper. They are all volunteers.

"Local and off-island physicians give of their time freely to give lectures on first aid, RCMP officers... give lectures on maritime law and local dangers. After all, they are out there to help you stay out of trouble and possibly save your life."

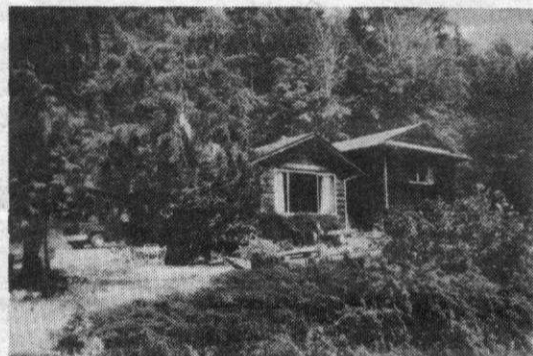

yarns including silk and linen, handwoven articles and tapestries.

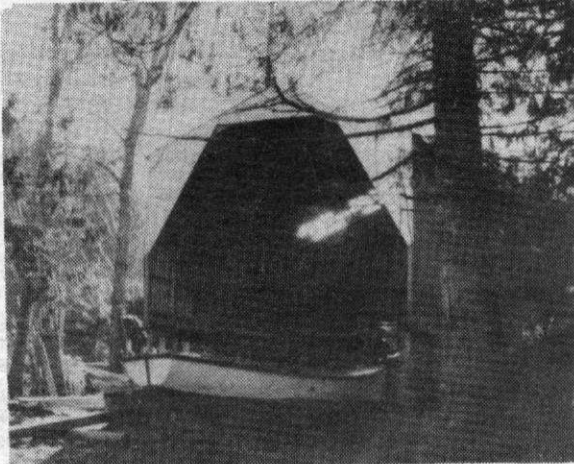
Much of the handweaving could not be purchased for any price, having been done for the use and satisfaction of the weaver.

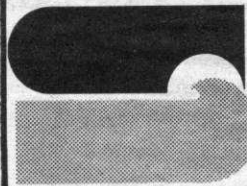

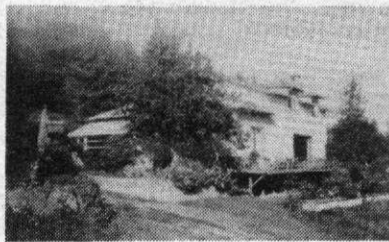

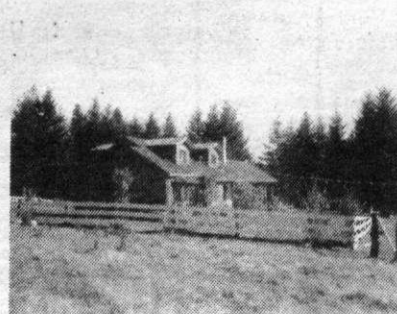

New plant examined by alternatives group

New sewage treatment plant that is guaranteed against failure was examined by a gathering of Salt Spring Island community spokesmen on Thursday afternoon last week.

John Hooper, of North Vancouver, outlined the advantages of his Arco Wastewater systems.

The plant employs a minimum of machinery and a 10 hp motor could drive the whole unit in the event of a power failure.

The presentation had been ar-

ranged by David Skinner, of the Salt Spring Island Sewer Alternatives Committee and the meeting was in the living room of his home.

Taking part were Wes Edwards, T. A. Toynbee, Terry Elford, Malcolm Pinteau, Regional Director Yvette Valcourt, Gail Secor, David Skinner and Dan Carlyle.

The meeting heard an analysis of the system and its operation.

His company is Aqueonics, Canada Ltd., explained Hooper. It was originally established in the United States and developed a process of treating sewage. It was not economically as successful and was ultimately bought out by Atlantic Richfield.

GUARANTEED
The international oil company has offered an unconditional guarantee of the equipment, said Hooper. It is now on the market, but has not yet been installed in a municipal system in Canada.

He described the process as the equivalent of the bio-disc, where a wheel is rotated with its lower circumference in the liquid. As it rotates the bacteria on the rim are treated with oxygen while passing through the air and by a non-oxygen process at such time as the rim is beneath the surface. The Aqueonics system affords the same alternatives of aerobic and anaerobic alternatives by running the liquid through the process, without using a mechanical vehicle, explained Hooper.

With an assurance against failure the effluent could be discharged into the embayed area at the head of the harbour, suggested Hooper. He was not familiar with the dispute over sewage disposal in Ganges. It was also mooted that the discharge would be perfectly safe in St. Mary Lake.

The proposal is to be discussed with the engineering department of the Capital Regional District this week.

Pender vote on sewer and water set for November 15

Residents of the Magic Lakes Estate on North Pender Island will be invited to approve the taking over of their sewer and water systems by the Capital Regional District when they go to the polls in November.

If the referendum is approved, the region will take over the present sewer and water installations and spend another \$1,825,000 to bring them up to the necessary standards.

Necessary bylaw was given initial readings last week at the regular board meeting.

ELECTION
Elections will be staged on Saturday, Nov. 15 in the islands and the referendum bylaw will be presented at the same time.

Pender Island voters will also elect two Islands trustees for North Pender and two for South Pender and one school trustee on November 15.

Other islands will name two Islands trustees and at Galiano and Salt Spring Island school trustees will also be elected.

On Salt Spring Island there will be presented a referendum asking for the approval of voters for the construction of a recreation complex at a cost not exceeding \$2,120,000.

VOTING HOURS
Voting will be from 8 am to 8 pm at three points on Salt Spring Island: the School Board Office, Central Hall and Fulford Community Hall; Galiano School, Mayne Island school, Pender Island school, Bedwell Harbour Resort and Saturna Community Hall.

Advance poll will open 8.30 am to 4 pm on November 10, 12, and 13, at the School Board Office in Ganges or the Capital Region offices on Yates St., in Victoria.

New law

There are some sweeping changes in the new financial administration act, reported chairman Jim Campbell at last week's meeting of the Capital Regional Board in Victoria.


The board decided to hear a report on the measures when the staff has analyzed the legislation.

It was also to be examined at the convention of the Union of B.C. Municipalities this week.

Man charged following search

A Salt Spring Island man has been charged with possession of stolen property following a search conducted earlier this month by Ganges RCMP.

Allen Michael Warner, 26, of Fer de Lance Road, has also been charged with possession of a prohibited weapon, a sawed-off shotgun.

RCMP Sgt. Mitch Hanks told *Driftwood* Tuesday that the search made September 5 recovered about \$15,000 worth of property which had been taken in a number of different break-ins last winter.

The articles found included silverware, crystal, jewellery, an accordion and a dinner set. They were found on or near the property where Warner lives, Hanks said.

Call for Campbell

When the Salt Spring Island Planning Association reached an impasse of 5:5 in a vote last week, outside help was suggested.

Better send for Jim Campbell, suggested a member.

Campbell is chairman of the Capital Regional Board and has been a vigorous opponent in the close fight by the islands to be excluded from the urban bus levy. At one point the inaccuracy of counting votes was the factor which kept islanders in the area.

Region to gain legal opinion on routine followed by transit

Motion that a solicitor be hired by the Capital Regional Board to provide legal advice on recent procedures of the Board was not accepted at last week's board meeting.

Salt Spring Island Director Yvette Valcourt protested that every interpretation of legal niceties had been made by chairman Jim Campbell without recourse to a lawyer.

She referred to the confusion which surrounded the vote on island participation in city bus costs. A vote was taken and later proved wrong when challenged by the Salt Spring director. The chairman had recommended changes which were not approved by the board and later had preferred his interpretation of the legalities over Valcourt's, she told *Driftwood*.

Director K.A.S. Hill suggested that the cost be met by the Gulf Islands.

"If the Islands director wants to challenge the board, they should be the one to pay the cost," he urged.

There would be no way of levying such a charge, replied the chairman. He declined to accept the amendment.

NO FUNDS FOR ADVICE

Valcourt told the board that there are no funds for legal advice for the directors and that a point of law in the relevant section of the act had been ignored.

John Mika and Mel Couvelier moved that the solicitor be instructed to offer Director Valcourt the advice she seeks.

They also asked that the solicitor be instructed to review the entire voting procedure on the transit

issue and to submit a written opinion as to whether the procedure complied with the municipal act.
