

Helen Townsend dies at 103

Helen Maude Townsend, resident of the Lady Minto Hospital extended care wing, died Saturday evening. She would have been 104 years of age on October 15.

Born at Ponsbourne Lodge, Hertford County, England, in 1876 Helen Maude Venables came to Canada in 1912. She married Herbert Townsend that same year at North Battleford and together the newlyweds settled in Turtleford, Sask.

In 1931 the Townsends moved to Salt Spring and settled at the foot of Lee's Hill, later moving to the present home of R. Lee in Burgoyne Valley.

Mrs. Townsend was an active member of the Burgoyne UCW during its early days and throughout the years. She was a keen sports fan, never missing a world series or boxing match until she began losing her eyesight.

Herbert Townsend died 15 years ago and his wife lived alone or with one of her two daughters, Mrs. Gladys Lee of Fulford and the late Mrs. Madel Douglas of Sooke.

In 1972 Mrs. Townsend moved to the extended care wing at the Ganges hospital and resided there until her death last week.

She leaves her daughter, Gladys, of Fulford; and four grandchildren, Pat Lee, Ganges; Sharon Voegeli, Ganges; Roy Lee of Fulford; and Colleen Soule of Ruddell, Sask.

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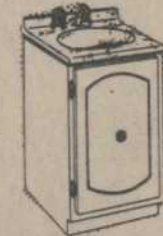
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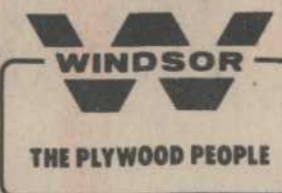
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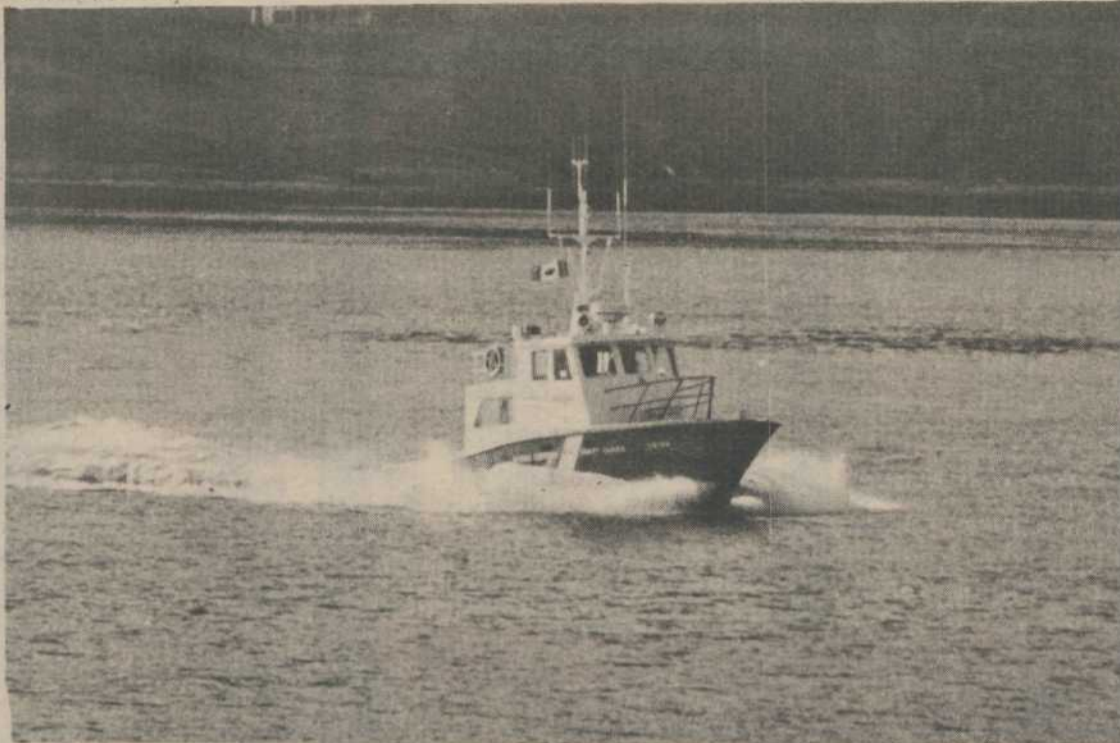
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Recreation centre discussed at meeting

Salt Spring Island. The meeting on Thursday evening last week at the Activity Centre saw a better turn-out of commissioners than listeners.

Glen Woodley, chairman of the commission, presented a complete history of how the recreation plans evolved. The main thrust is that this facility is unique to this island and there's nothing else like it in all of British Columbia.

The reasons for all the decisions made by the commission were explained.

Bob McWhirter chaired the meeting and kept questions flowing. Major concerns were taxes and rates. The table may clarify it for you.

Forgery warning

Local businesses are being warned by Ganges RCMP to watch out for forged American Express travellers' cheques.

The cheques, in \$100 denominations, have been either lost or stolen, RCMP Sgt. Mitch Hanks said Tuesday.

In one case, he said, a cheque cashed at a local store bore a forged signature that "wasn't even close" to that of the cheque's owner.

He suggested that local businessmen ensure that identification is produced by anyone who wishes to cash travellers' cheques.

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Misunderstanding arises over timetable change

A timetable change at Gulf Islands Secondary School has taken up considerably more than three minutes at two recent meetings of Gulf Islands school trustees.

The board approved a change at its last meeting some three weeks ago, a change which was to have subtracted three minutes from the school's lunch period.

But at last Wednesday's board meeting trustee Mary Williamson said there appeared to be some misunderstanding. The students' council, she explained, had been "upset" over the change until

principal Bob McWhirter told the students that the period had been moved ahead three minutes, and that it was still of the same duration.

District superintendent Bob Huestis, who had told the board when the matter first came up that the period was to be shortened, said he would look into it.

Williamson said it was a good example of how matters can be turned around by incorrect information. The consequences could be serious if the same thing were to happen with a more important matter, she warned.

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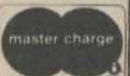
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High school equivalency can be obtained with district's help

Any person in British Columbia over 19 years of age who never completed high school, for any reason, should be aware of several choices open to him.

Attending regular classes at Gulf Island Secondary is one of them, but it is a time-consuming project and seldom meets the needs of adult students. Various correspondence school courses answer the problem for some, but a rather new test called the General Educational Development Test has been a welcome addition to the scene.

The GED test measures the kind of development that takes place in any person who has been working, raising a family, talking to others, reading and watching TV, traveling, learning life skills in a variety of ways.

The test involves one day, a \$5 fee and filling out an application with the minister of education. These applications, along with an information booklet which gives a small sample of questions as a "trial mini-test", are available free from the continuing education department of Gulf Islands School District.

A phone call to me at 537-9251 will bring a copy in the mail. I can also be reached by mail or by a note to the school board office in Ganges.

This fall the continuing education department is offering a little high school brush-up course to help people prepare to take the GED exam. John Hall is the teacher and he will offer eight Thursday evening sessions for \$8 in the little school he has built on to his home on Ganges Hill. Class starts October 9 at 7:30 pm and will use a textbook designed expressly to help adults remedy the deficiencies they may have in language, math,

social studies or science.

One of the finest things about the GED program is that any section of the test that is not passed the first time can be taken again, and again. It is not necessary to repeat the whole thing. This allows a student who has trouble with a certain section of subject matter to read and study in a course like the above or strictly on his own, and then go back and try again. Such a policy helps to reduce the tensions that most human beings feel when

faced with writing an examination!

More and more businesses and schools are accepting the high school equivalency certificate in lieu of a high school diploma. Many others, of course, do not even ask for the latter, but prefer to test or give a new employee a probationary period of work experience.

However, adults who pass the GED have a fine feeling of achievement which helps in tackling the next hurdle along their chosen path.

An interesting program is now being drawn up for the coming year and the girls are planning to include a first aid course, theatre trip, cookouts, camps and more service in the community. New members would be welcome.

Leaders are Marion Goodwin and Gwen Albhouse.

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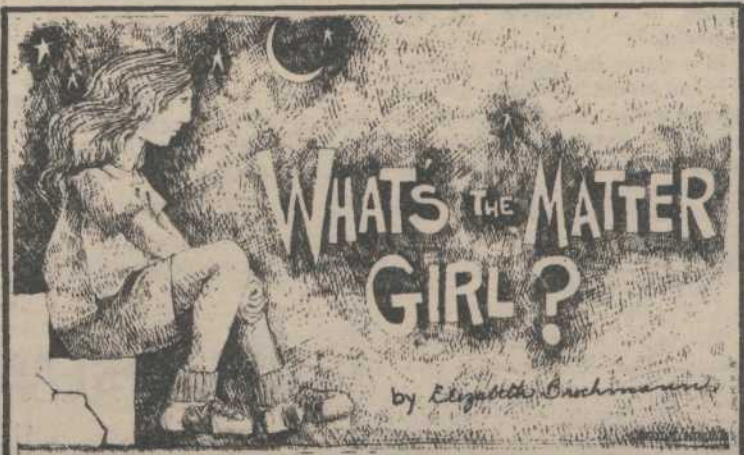

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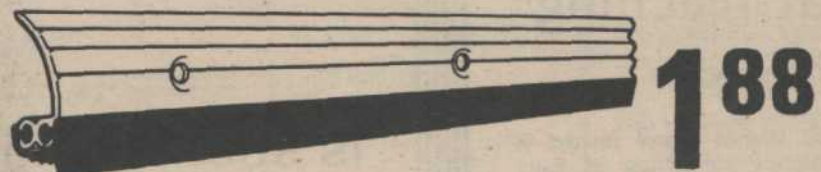
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Low quality construction

Galiano parents to press for new school to replace present unit

Twenty-six parents of Galiano School children met in the school at 7:30 pm on Wednesday, Sept. 24, under the chairmanship of Ann Hennessy.

Parents were invited to inspect the plant for the numerous deficiencies and inadequacies that have developed since the original building was thrown together during a three-week period in 1952.

The 2x3 frame, sheathed with thin plywood would not be passed by a building inspector in 1980, nor would the odiferous toilets and sometimes weeping septic tank be passed by a health inspector.

Possibly the most deplorable inadequacy is the primary room, which provides less space for 23 pupils from kindergarten to grade two than many island living rooms.

This room, converted first from a covered play area to a storage room and on the introduction of kindergarten to a classroom, is not insulated.

In summer the heat is unbearable and in winter, heating must be supplemented by a portable electric heater, a perpetual danger to young children. This room also contains the janitor's storage cupboard and the staff kitchen counter and sink.

CHRONIC LACK

The school suffers from a chronic lack of space.

The facilities are totally out of keeping with the present philosophy and practice of education. Only in the first half of this century might this have been considered an adequate building.

A space of approximately 10 square meters (100 square feet) has to house the principal's office, the secretary's office, storage cupboard, conference room, first aid center and staff toilet. Needless to say this space can only be used for one activity at a time.

There is, of course, no library or audio-visual room, although the number of books and equipment

available is reasonably adequate but scattered among classrooms and storage cabinets.

There is no gymnasium, auditorium or activity room, and for 20 years there has been no covered play area. Although the school was endowed with 15 acres of land by the Robsons, the cleared playground area is now the smallest in the Gulf Island School District.

The one soccer pitch is only half size and the baseball diamond has a barely perceptible outfield. There is no outside lighting, hindering community use of the school after dark.

PARENT POWER PROPOSED

Former principals, staff and trustees have complained, often bitterly, for the past 20 years. It would not be true to say that nothing has been done, but many changes have been cosmetic and improvised with parsimony as the guiding principle.

During the evening a power failure cast the meeting into darkness but not into despair. That the blackout originated on Salt Spring was, perhaps, merely a symbolic coincidence.

The parents decided that it was time for a radical change. They concluded that the only acceptable solution to the multiplicity of problems was an entirely new school building.

Letters will be sent to the school board, together with a request that a delegation of parents appear at the next board meeting to present the case for a new school on Galiano.

It was suggested from the floor that parents should be consulted in the design stage of a new building and that full-spectrum lighting should be installed.

Parents are to take a census of children under school age of young couples resident on the island and attempt to estimate future school population trends.

They also hope to elicit community support by preparing a petition for signatures. A delegation to consist of Ann Hennessy, Susan Friend, Margaret Howell and Sandy Riley was selected to make the presentation to the school board.

Galiano trustee, Jim Ripley, who was present during the meeting, urged parents to make their views known to the school board.

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New act could have 'far-reaching' effects

Gulf Islands School District is considering submitting its comments on the recently proposed Financial Administration Act.

Secretary-treasurer Wilf Peck told the school board last week that the act could have "far-reaching effects" with regard to the operation of school districts.

"It puts enormous power into the hands of the provincial cabinet," he said.

The legislation would place tighter controls on municipal councils, regional districts, school boards and other public bodies.

It has been prepared to replace older legislation such as the Revenue Act passed in 1879 and the Financial Control Act which dates back to 1913.

It's a mine of information even after 100 years of careful use

The evil that men do lives after them. But so does the good!

It is 100 years since Edison's Handy Encyclopedia was published in the United States and announced to the world that the country adjacent to Peru was "Chili". The printer who set it thus must have been at the sauce, but the error has now lasted for 100 years and may last another century. It was frequently so written and it was wrongly so written.

The printed word never dies. If Mrs. A. Beaddie, of Mountain Park Drive, on Salt Spring Island, has her way, the encyclopedia will live on for many years yet.

The pocket-sized reference book is more interesting for the facts that are no longer applicable than for its information.

It is informative. It offers tables of interest and it tells what day of the week any date will be and it explains how to scale timber.

NOT MANY MAPS

The booklet was offered as an authoritative source of information for the United States and Canada. It even offered information on Canada, although it didn't provide much in the way of maps.

Canada covered an area of 3,470,257 square miles. Newfoundland added another 40,000 sq. miles. Even the area has grown over the passage of a century. Canada is now 3,851,809 square miles.

Population in the 1881 census was 4,324,810. It was estimated that by 1887, it would reach nearly 5,000,000. Of this total, it was estimated, 1,298,930 were French;

957,403, Irish; 881,300, English; 699,863, Scots; 254,320 German and 129,525 Indian. In 1881 there were 1,791,982 Roman Catholics; 2,422,285 Protestants and 2,393 Jews.

There was an active militia of 38,000 men in addition to the garrison at Halifax of 2,000 men.

British Columbia has also grown in the interim.

SQUARE MILES

Edison's wrote the province as totalling 341,305 sq. miles and boasting an estimated population of 60,000. Government was by the Lieutenant-Governor and executive council of four members, together with the legislative assembly of 25 members. There were 12 high and superior schools, 2,283 pupils and 71 public schools with an enrolment of 2,188. The Post Office delivered 2,014,000 letters, newspapers, etc. in 1886-7.

Away from the problems of internal geography, the pocket book also tells of the biggest and the greatest.

Highest ascent by balloon was 37,000 feet, about seven miles. The balloonists were Glaisher and Coxwell, at Wolverhampton, on September 5, 1862. Eight largest churches in the world with the seating capacity were St. Peter's, Rome, 54,000; Milan Cathedral, 37,000; St. Paul's London, 25,000; St. Sophia, Constantinople, 23,000; Notre Dame, Paris, 21,000; Florence Cathedral, 20,000; Pisa Cathedral, 13,000; St. Mark's, Venice, 7,000; St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York, 2,500, with standing room for 8,000.

MORE PASSENGERS

The Manhattan Elevated Railroad carried more passengers than any other railway in the world. Average daily patronage was 525,000, or 191,625,000 per annum. Fastest rail speed in the world was over the Philadelphia and Reading Railroad, 92 miles in 93 minutes, or

an average speed of 60 mph. One mile was covered in 43 seconds, which represents about 83.7 mph.

A Salt Spring Island youth was injured Tuesday morning in an accident involving a motorcycle and a car on Booth Canal Road.

Allan Layard, 18, of Rainbow Road was taken to Royal Jubilee Hospital in Victoria after he collided with a vehicle driven by Robert Dugas of Salt Spring Island.

RCMP said that damage to Layard's 1978 Honda amounted to \$2,000 and damage to Dugas's 1980 Chrysler was \$1,500. The latter driver suffered no injuries.

The accident took place at 9:30 on a bend in the road.

Driftwood was unable to get any details on Layard's condition at press time Tuesday but an unconfirmed report said he had a broken leg.

The return set of games will be played at Portlock Park this Saturday at 11 am and 1 pm. Please come and cheer the Strikers on.

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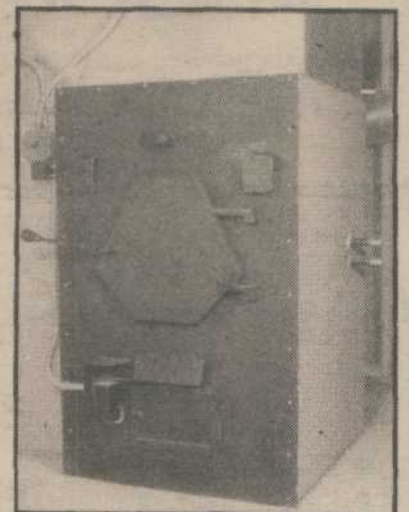
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Down Through the Years With Driftwood

Mayne facilities strained by enrolment increase

An increase in enrolment has placed a strain on some of the facilities at Mayne School, Gulf Islands school trustees were told last week, but the school "can cope with it".

Principal Tony Rogers was addressing the board at its meeting last Wednesday when he said there was a 60% increase in secondary-level students, who now number 16.

Another difficulty being encountered at the school is a lack of space in the library, he said.

However, development of the library is continuing, said Rogers, and volunteers from the community are helping out with its operation.

In reviewing the activities at Mayne School, the principal said the transportation system was working well, although there was

some concern for Saturna Island students who might have a longer walk to the school during the winter.

At present the water taxi takes them to Bennett Bay, which is only about a 10-minute walk to the school. But there is a possibility that the float there will be removed for the winter, in which case the taxi would go into Horton Bay, which is a much greater distance

from the school.

Last year, Rogers recalled, the school had had some staffing problems with what he termed a "very necessary part of the school", the learning assistance program. But this year the program is off to a good start, he told trustees.

He said he believed that the children needed a strong extra-curricular program, and activities

in that area are being emphasized.

Drama, music and recorder clubs are in the process of being formed, Rogers said. The extra-curricular activities are also involving students from Galiano and Saturna.

The district is carrying out a program whereby every principal will have the opportunity to address the board to review his school's activities and outline any concerns he may have.

secondary program, it is stated that there are two overcrowded facilities in the Mayne School. While classroom use is at optimum level, says the report, the industrial education and home economics facilities are now overcrowded.

CHANGE ROOMS, SHOWERS

The size of the gymnasium is satisfactory but change rooms and showers need to be added as they are required for a secondary program. Finally, the locker area is too small to accommodate six additional lockers needed to meet current enrolment needs.

The potential cost of upgrading the facilities is \$432,000, a conservative estimate according to the report, which does not include "a considerable amount" of equipment. That expenditure would provide an additional 7,200 square feet of floor area.

At Pender Island the existing facilities are adequate for the immediate future, says the report.

It goes on to say that the board should consider providing daily transportation for Mayne and/or Pender secondary students to Ganges before committing capital

funds to increasing the facilities at Mayne.

On Salt Spring Island there is a site under consideration for a school at the south end but, the board learned Wednesday, it would be at least two years before a school there could be in operation. In the meantime, it may be necessary to consider adding more rooms or a portable at Fernwood School.

OUTGROWING OFFICE

Another building which the district is outgrowing is the school board office in Ganges. The building is shared with the Capital Regional District community health service, which has a lease that doesn't expire until 1982.

Secretary-treasurer Wilf Peck reported at last week's meeting that the health department was going to look into finding alternative space and what it would cost. (The CRD's lease is for \$1 a year for 500 square feet).

But, Peck noted, the health department's budget is already set and it was unlikely that the school district could take over that portion of the building until 1982.

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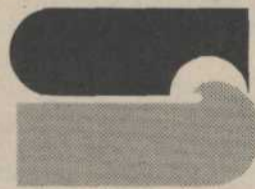

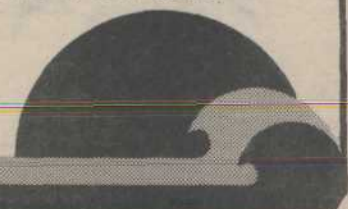

Driftwood takes third place in competition

For the third year in a row, *Gulf Islands Driftwood* has received an award in the better newspapers competition of the B.C. and Yukon Community Newspapers Association.

At the annual convention of the association held in Richmond last week, *Driftwood* was named third place winner in the competition for best all around newspaper. In its class, known as Tabloid 2, are eight other newspapers, all with a circulation over 2,500.

First place was awarded to the *North Shore News*, North Vancouver, which has a circulation of about 50,000. Second place went to the *Grand Forks Gazette*, with about 3,500 circulation. *Driftwood's* circulation is almost 5,000.

In the point system used to determine the winners, *Driftwood* was given 65 out of 100, while the *News* and the *Gazette* got 73 and 70 respectively.

The debate was called to instruct the chairman as to whether he should admit the motion, Campbell reminded Mika.

K.A.S. Hill asked that the motion be tabled to await legal advice. The tabling motion was a tie, at 26-26, and the chairman voted in the negative, defeating it.

It was logical to get legal opinion, suggested Robin Blencoe. The chairman has to make the decision, replied Campbell.

JUDGMENT

"It is a matter of judgment; not a matter of law."

Campbell explained that he would make a ruling and the directors had the privilege of challenging that decision, should they so desire.

Nobody so desired.

Transit committee chairman Norma Sealey warned the board that the transit budget would be chaotic if the service area be changed in mid-year. In addition, she had had a recommendation from a Salt Spring Islander regarding transit and this was being considered at the present time.

On the motion of D.W. Rittaler, of Sooke, an amendment would have extended the exemption to Jordan River and Port Renfrew.

The amendment was defeated. It had been a sad record, observed the chairman. The basic issue had been money for a service deemed not to be enjoyed.

SEMANTIC NONSENSE

"It is semantic nonsense to say that this is a different issue. I couldn't rule it out of order,

although that would have been the proper thing to do."

Some debate ensued on whether islands directors would, in future, be permitted to participate in transit debates, should the motion pass. The chairman asserted that

they would be excluded.

"I want a solicitor's opinion on your comments," said Mika. "I don't believe you have correctly stated the matter."

Motion to exempt the islands from payment for buses was ap-

proved by eight directors, carrying 31 votes, against 10 directors wielding 21 votes.

The voting pattern saw the western sector and Outer Islands directors opposed to the exemption, with the urban centres supporting the islands.

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
